Now a committee made up primarily of individuals who worked on or with the study committee has suggested a formula for putting the incentive plan into operation. The reasoning behind the

proposed formula is this: The unit for measuring educational need under the foundation program is the classroom unit. A basic classroom unit is one teacher and 27 children. The number of classroom units in each school district is determined by average daily attendance and services such as transportation, vocational education and special education.

So the committee would use the assessed valuation behind each classroom unit as the basis for arriving at incentive-grant figures for individual school districts. To qualify for the incenitve plan a district would have to set a tax rate above that required for full participation in the foun-

The amount of incentive money allotted to a qualifying school district would be determined by the ratio between the assessed valuation behind each classroom unit in the school district and the assessed valuation behind each classroom unit for the state as a

Currently the state's average assessed valuation per classroom unit is about \$20,000. For individual school districts that would qualify for incentive funds the lowest assessed valuation per classroom unit is about \$5,000 and the highest is about \$30,000.

Under the proposed formula the district with the lowest figure thus would get \$4 for every \$1 it put up, since the ratio would be

The district with the highest figure would get \$1 from the state for each \$1.50 it put up, since the ratio would be \$30,000 to \$20,000. from district to district except in cases where districts had the same asserted valuation per classroom unit.

Equalization, it is pointed out, is built into the suggested formula just as it is built into the foundation program. "Poor" districks would get proportionately more incentive money than scurces are greater.

Local revenue from the propenty tax, permissive non-property taxes (occupational tax, utility tax, or surbax on income), or a combination of the property and non-property taxes could be used

to qualify for incentive funds. According to current-year figures about 170 of the state's 199 emblic-school district would qual-My for incentive funds.

The committee said the maximum amount to be distributed through the incentive plan should be not more than 10 cents for each \$100 of assessed valuation multiplied by the total final assessed valuation of property in the state for the year preceding the year in which the distribution of incentive-plan funds would be

It also said that "any local school district which is not levying taxes equal to a rate of 10 cents or more on the \$100 assessed valuation of property, or special permissive taxes that produce revenue equal thereto, for general school purposes, above the amount required for full particination in the foundation program" should be permitted to levy additional taxes "not to exceed an amount produced by a tax rate of 10 cents per \$100 assecred valuation above the amount required for full participatien in the foundation program, or equivalent revenue from permissive taxes, in order to receive funds through the incentive
