PIKE DEPUTY IS ACCUSED In Death of Bryant

From Bullet Wound First Said Mishap

Cecil Tackett, Pike county deputy sheriff, was arrested Saturday in the death of Charles Bryant of Melvin, which resulted from a gunshot wound suffered on May

The warrant was sworn out by Sheriff Joe W. Lewis after two persons had stated they saw Tackett shoot Bryant.

Tackett told authorities Bryant shot himself. First reports received here said the shooting was accidental and that it occured while, or immediately after, the two men engaged in target practise near the Bryant home.

The accused man executed \$5,000 bond to answer for examining trial here, June 23. It was said here that he has resigned his post with the Pike county sheriff's office. Bryant, who was shot in his chest, died at the McDowell Memorial hospital, two days after the shooting. He and Tackett were described as friends.
