VIRGINIA POLLUTION OF RIVER DISCUSSED

NO SOLUTION TO PROBLEM DISCOVERED

Pickard Cites Danger To New Pike-Co. Lake From Virginia Water

The problem created in the Big Sandy River by coal wastes originating in Virginia was discussed at length in a hearing held last Friday at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park, on proposed water quality criteria for the Big Sandy and Tug Fork, and no solution to the problem was reached.

Ralph C. Pickard, executive director of the Kentucky Water Pollution Control Commission, looked on the black water from Virginia as a particular threat to Fishtrap Reservoir, the Pike county impoundment which is nearing completion.

"The time is approaching," he said, "when something will have to be worked out. It is the concern of official agencies and citizens, too, that Virginia is not controlling the black water problem."

"I don't know how long it will take, but eventually the flow of coal solids out of Virginia into Fishtrap can have a serious effect on aquatic life," Pickard added.

The hearing was attended by about 35 representatives of industry and others interested in the criteria to control water pollution. Some offered statements, pro and con; some came merely as observers.

Pickard also said that Virginia's reluctance to be forceful with the problem creates an enforcement problem in Kentucky. "It is more difficult to invoke Kentucky standards that are more stringent than those of another state," he said. "If black water is coming to coal washers from another state, it is more difficult to demand of Kentucky producers that they abide by Kentucky standards."

FATHER OF 9 AUTO VICTIM

Floyd Man Not Held As Death-Car Driver In Pikeville Tragedy

A widowed father of nine, working on a Work Experience and Training (Happy Pappy) program on the Pikeville bypass, was killed, shortly before noon Monday, when struck by an automobile driven by Harrison Hunley, 75, of Betsy Layne.

The victim, Woodrow Mullins, 53, of Robinson Creek, was struck while pushing a wheelbarrow used in helping clear up debris left by the recent flood.

No charge was lodged against the Floyd man. Hunley said he did not see Mullins and first became aware that an accident had occurred when he felt the impact of his car striking an object. He stopped, saw Mullins lying on the road and hurried to the injured man. Officers quoted Hunley as saying he was driving at a speed of about 30 miles when the tragedy occurred. Other workmen said they did not see the accident.

Mullins' wife died in 1965. His funeral was conducted today (Thursday) from the Long Fork Regular Baptist Church of which he was a member.

NYC TO GIVE JOBS TO 300

50 Positions Assigned Floyd-Co.; Applicants Asked To Act Quickly

The Big Sandy Area Community Action Program, Inc. is beginning an out-of-school Neighborhood Youth Corps program which will place 300 boys and girls between the ages of 16 and 21 on jobs with public and non-profit organizations in the area. There will be 50 positions to be filled in each of the six counties in the Big Sandy area. These counties are Johnson, Martin, Pike, Floyd, Lawrence and Magoffin.

Bids for Surfacing Of 3 Floyd Highways To Be Opened Apr. 21

Bids for three bituminous surfacing projects in this county will be received by the Highway Department on April 21, Gov. Edward T. Breathitt and Highway Commissioner Mitchell W. Tinder announced last week.

The projects are: The Spurlock Creek road from KY 122, extending southeasterly 1.5 miles; the East McDowell-Hamilton Branch (KY 1929) road from 1.2 miles east of KY 122 to one mile west of KY 979, a distance of 3.1 miles; and the Salt Lick road from KY 7 to the Knott county line, a distance of 1.5 miles.

REGISTRATION LISTS 897 AS NEW VOTERS

County Clerk C. Ollie Robinson said this week, following the close of the voter registration books, that 897 persons have registered to vote since Nov. 14, last. Of this number, 738 registered for the first time as Democrats, 155 as Republicans and four as Independents.

In Prestonsburg Precinct No. 2 it was nip-and-tuck between the two parties in the new voter registration, 20 registering Democratic and 19 as Republicans. Overall, the precinct, however, is heavily Democratic.

The registration period saw an unusually high number of voters making transfers of registration from one precinct to another—an activity which resulted, mainly, from the wet-dry contest suit in which many voters were regarded as illegal voters because they voted in precincts in which they were not residents.

Mr. Robinson said the clerk's office is now accepting applications for absentee ballots and will continue to do so until May 4. Any voter who states he or she will be outside the county on election day will be outside the county on eligible to vote by absentee ballot, he said. Application for such a ballot must be notarized, however, and must be postmarked to the County Clerk on or before midnight, May 4.

WATERFIELD ENTERS RACE

As Anti-Administration Candidate for Governor; Three Announce Locally

Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield announced Monday his decision to make the race for the Democratic nomination for Governor, joining seven other anti-administration candidates in the quest for votes at the May primary.

Among the candidates with whom he will vie for public support is Ex-Governor A. B. Chandler with whom Waterfield has been allied for years. All eight anti-administration candidates apparently will be gunning for former Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, who has administration backing for the gubernatorial nomination.

Waterfield, in his statement to the press, claimed he has alone stood opposition to the administration since 1963, and that if nominated and elected, he would "correct the flagrant abuses that have been practiced by the Breathitt administration."

More locally, Clifford B. Latta, Prestonsburg attorney, this week announced he will seek the Democratic nomination for State Senator from the 29th district (Floyd, Knott and Martin counties). The only other Democratic candidate for the office is Henry C. Hale, of Blue River. Johnny C. Hall, of Martin, is the lone Republican candidate for the office.

In Legislative District 96, Representative Ben Martin has three opponents as he seeks the Democratic nomination. They are Homer Osborne, of Melvin; Everett Akers, of Martin; and Wallen Mitchell, of Minnie.

Besides promising to begin retiring the state's debts in an "orderly" manner and to oppose any increase in state or local taxes, Waterfield said he is opposed to any efforts by local units of government to pass open-housing legislation.

Waterfield thus became the second candidate for governor to come out against open-housing laws.

Although the open-housing controversy has been centered in Louisville, Republican Louie B. Nunn last week stated his opposition to such laws, thereby injecting the matter into the statewide gubernatorial race.

Waterfield said the open-housing topic "needs discussing now . . . as it particularly relates to the Louisville situation at this moment."

\$1½ MILLION GRANT MADE

To Provide Training In Special Skills For 813 in Area

The Department of Labor notified Congressman Carl D. Perkins last Friday that a grant of just over a million and a half dollars has been approved to provide training in special skills to 813 persons in Floyd and 12 other Eastern Kentucky counties.

Of that number, 300 will receive eight weeks pre-vocational training under the Manpower Development and Training Act.

Special occupational training for 513 others will include machine operation, automobile mechanics, electrical workers, building maintenance, making of springs, draftsman's work, nurseryman and farmhand training.

For the pre-vocational trainees, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is providing \$32,775 for instructors and classroom work. The Labor Department will pay \$179,100 for transportation and subsistence.

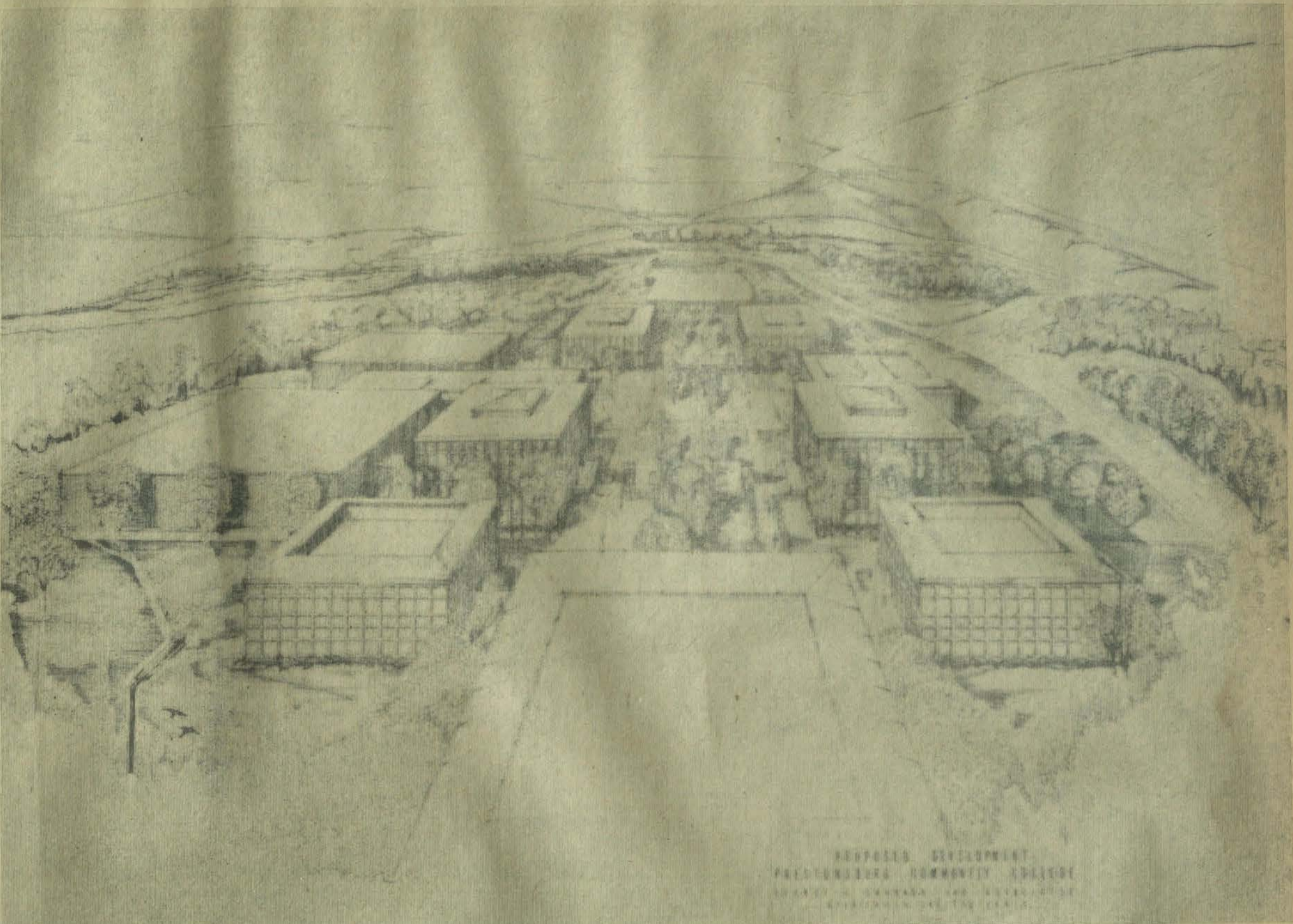
In the program of training for specific occupations, HEW will provide \$400,575 for instructors and classroom work. The Labor Department will pay \$1,095,420 in allowances.

Counties to take part in the program are Floyd, Pike, Morgan, Harlan, Perry, Wolfe, Knox, Breathitt, Letcher, Bell, Owsley, Clay and Jackson.

DEWEY LAKE FERTILIZING SCHEDULED

Project Cost, \$25,000; Commission Approves Limnological Study

What is believed to be the biggest lake fertilization project to be undertaken in Kentucky waters will be launched shortly at Dewey Lake, it was announced this week.

Fertilization of the entire 1100-acre impoundment was promised Monday, to start almost immediately, by Minor Clark, commissioner, Kentucky Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources, with the Fish & Wildlife Resources Commission later approving the action. Approximately 40,000 pounds of fertilizer will be used.

The undertaking, which will cost an estimated \$25,000, is the result of work of the Dewey Lake Fish & Game Club, which was given the support of the Prestonsburg Chamber of Commerce and the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club in urging the big lake improvement program. State Representative W. J. Reynolds appeared at the Frankfort meeting as spokesman for the clubs.

Heretofore, fertilizing has been restricted to small lakes and farm ponds.

The fish and game club also scored heavily on another petition to Commissioner Clark. This asked for a limnological study of the lake. (Limnology is the study of bodies of water, particularly their physical, geographical, biological and other features.)

Bernard Carter, director of the Division of Fisheries, said this study will follow fertilization and that it will be done in cooperation with the University of Kentucky. Sedimentation, other pollution and acidity of the water will be determined during the study. Fish and game officials here feel that what will be learned will determine future work to improve the lake.

Commissioner Clark threw in an unexpected bonus when he announced that Dewey Lake will receive a generous stocking of a new fish, a hybridization of the white bass and the striped bass. (See Story No. 1, Page 6)

3 SUITS FILED HERE ASK \$171,000 TOTAL

Three suits filed in circuit court here within the week seek a total of \$171,000 in damages and hospital bills as the aftermath of two highway accidents.

In the death of Will T. Allen, who was injured at Harold, Feb. 4, \$125,000 is asked by Bud Allen, administrator of his estate, in a suit lodged against the Wells Motor Co., Pikeville, and its driver, Donald T. Williams, and the Ranier Construction Co., Prestonsburg, and its driver, Clayton Eugene Holland.

Allen died Feb. 23 at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, allegedly of injuries suffered when the Ranier Construction Company truck and a truck owned by Wells Motor Company collided and the Ranier vehicle left the highway and struck a parked car in which Allen sat.

Allen, the suit points out, was a passenger in an auto owned by Florence Norris. The car, it was said, was legally parked

off the highway, near the Harold postoffice. The plaintiff alleges that the collision between the two trucks resulted from negligent operation by their drivers.

In two almost-identical suits damages totaling \$30,000 and doctor's bills of \$1,600 are sought for two girls who were injured in a collision at Lancer, March defendant in each action. In one, 29, 1966, R. L. Johnson is named. Cleo Bartley sues as next friend of Dena Bartly, 13; in the other, Juanita Ousley is plaintiff as next friend of Mona Kay Ousley, 41.

Permanent injuries are claimed to have resulted to both girls when the Johnson car collided with an auto owned by Doug Stanley, and in which the girls were passengers. The plaintiffs allege careless and negligent operation by the defendant. Each suit asks \$15,000 damages and \$900 to cover doctor bills.

CONFUSION IN PROFUSION

You know, the news quite often is confusing. Take two news-stories published within the week, for instance.

One of these tells of the perplexity with which state officials face the certain damage to result to Fishtrap Reservoir from coal-blackened water which originates in Virginia to settle in the new Pike county lake. Kentucky, obviously, has no control over its neighbor-state.

The other news-story tells of the mandate handed down to the city of Salyersville by a federal agency to put a halt to its pollution of the Licking River.

What makes reading of the separate items a provoking anomaly is this:

The federal government can order a municipality such as Salyersville to stop its pollution of a stream; but a state, catching another state's polluted water, cannot get the same protection from the same federal government.

To put the problem in another way, as a question:

If Salyersville or any other town or city can be forced by the federal government to stop the pollution of a stream with its sewage, why in the name of all that's reasonable and right can't private industry in Virginia or any other state be forced to stop pollution of the Big Sandy or whatever stream that may be affected by its industrial wastes?

which, originally, was a salt water fish. The hybrid has a rapid rate of growth and is expected to be an important addition to many Kentucky impoundments.

"Dewey Lake has top priority, and in all probability will get these fish this year. If not, it will get an abundance next year," Clark told The Times.

The main uncertainty lies in the hybridization of the fish under hatchery conditions. Hybrids have been caught where cross-breeding has occurred under natural conditions.

Besides supplying a game fish of unusual size and fighting qualities, the stocking of the hybrid species would add what is expected to be an important cure to the control of the shad and rough fish population of the lake.

Taking part in the successful conference with Commissioner Clark and others at Frankfort were Robert Burchett, W. J. Dingus and Irvin Harris, of the Dewey Lake Fish & Game Club; Burl Spurlock and Marvin Music, representing the Chamber of Commerce; County Attorney Barkly Sturgill; Woodrow W. Allen, of the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club, and Representative Reynolds.

San Gamett, of Hazard, member of the Fish & Wildlife Resources Commission from this district, telephoned The Times Tuesday to express his pleasure because of the gains made for Dewey Lake. He said that "coon-hunters will be interested in knowing that of a shipment of 100 raccoons expected in this section shortly, half will be released in the Dewey Lake game refuge, with the remainder going to Buckhorn.

"I will say, though, that we are not going to let coal washers run unabated in Kentucky."

Pickard said he was impressed that no major objections to the proposals were presented.

K. O. Schwab, chief of technical services for the federal Water Pollution Control Administration, said the Kentucky criteria are generally acceptable and in keeping with federal guidelines.

C. Scott Clark, sanitary engineer for the Ohio River Sanitation Commission, said the proposals are compatible, except for minor differences, with the eight-state compact of his agency.

John Hall, assistant chief of water resources in West Virginia, said a hearing in his state last week on the Big Sandy brought up a few differences with Kentucky, but nothing that cannot be worked out.

Milton R. Bradley, superintendent of the Ashland Oil & Refining Co. refinery at Catlettsburg, said Ashland Oil has no serious complaint against the criteria.

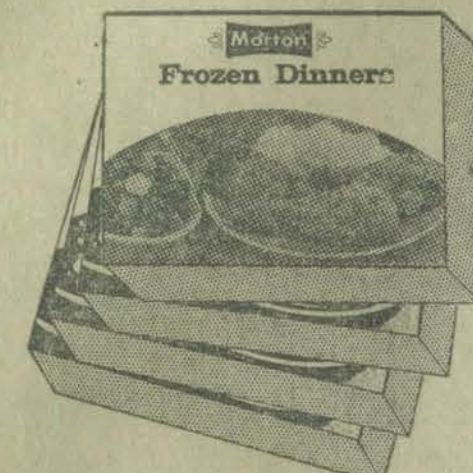

EDA GRANTS TO FLOYD OVER \$1,629,000 TOTAL

More than \$1,629,000 in grants have been paid into this county by the Economic Development Administration (EDA), according to Robert M. Cornett, administrator of the Kentucky Area Development office in Frankfort. Cornett, whose office handles state-level administrative duties connected with both EDA and Appalachian programs, said the county's share of EDA dollars was part of more than \$21.5 million invested in the state by the Federal program since the first grant was approved for Kentucky a year ago. Since last February, 43 projects have been approved in the state.

A Jenny Wiley State Park project was approved last May at a total cost of \$577,000—\$346,200 in EDA funds and \$230,800 in State matching money. The project was sponsored by the State Department of Parks.

Approved last September was a \$1,283,000 water system project, with \$1,283,000 in Federal funds, of which \$513,000 was a loan. It was sponsored by the Sandy Valley Water District of Floyd and Pike counties.

On the state level, Cornett said, Kentucky is second only to West Virginia in dollars gained from the EDA program on a per capita basis. In total dollars received, it ranks fifth behind California, Michigan, West Virginia and Pennsylvania.

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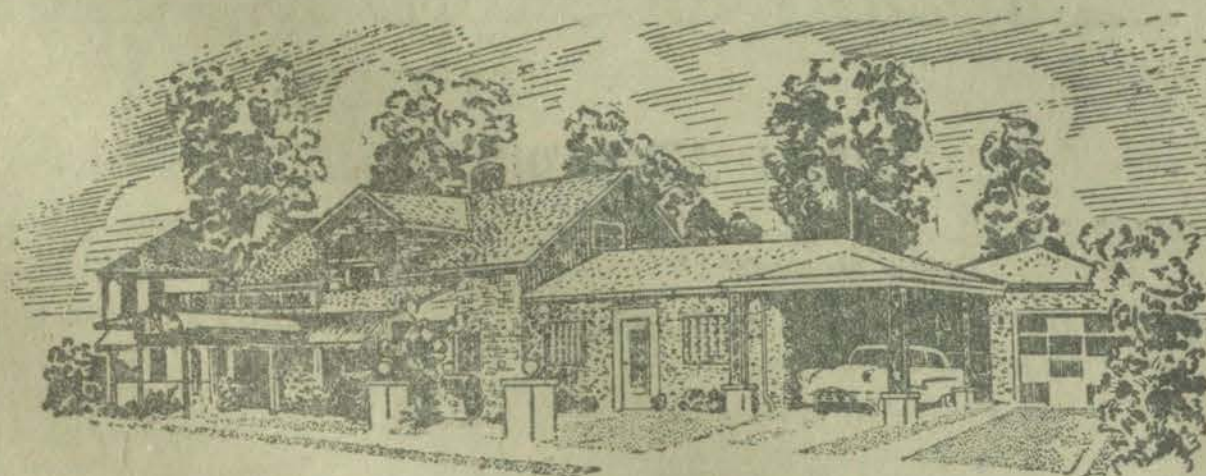
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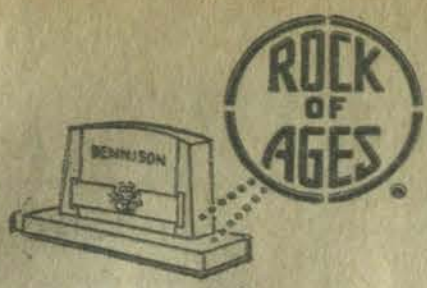

Federal Funds Approved For Tomato Cooperative Study in East Kentucky

Approval of \$11,000 for a study to determine the feasibility of establishing a tomato growers and marketers cooperative for a 26-county Eastern Kentucky area was announced today by the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The Wolfe County Improvement Association, Inc., applicant for the federal assistance, will invest \$1,500 in the study, in addition to the EDA funds.

The study will center on a five-acre, plastic-covered greenhouse complex to be heated with natural gas from an unused underground supply. The complex will be located at Hazel Green in Wolfe county.

In addition to studying greenhouse production in the Hazel Green complex, the study will deal with packaging and marketing of tomatoes grown in the greenhouses of farmers in the area.

The Improvement Association says establishment of a marketing cooperative would provide a source of additional income for the farmers in addition to about 20 jobs at the central complex. Counties to be included in the study area, in addition to Wolfe, are:

Floyd, Breathitt, Bath, Carter, Clay, Estill, Elliott, Fleming, Harlan, Johnson, Jackson, Knott, Knox, Lee, Lawrence, Letcher, Leslie, Magoffin, Menifee, Martin, Owsley, Powell, Pike, Perry and Rowan.

The study will consider Bibb lettuce as a secondary crop for the Hazel Green complex.

Grebe Associates, which owns the natural gas resource, has agreed to reimburse EDA for the study if it leads to the establishment of a growers and marketers cooperative.

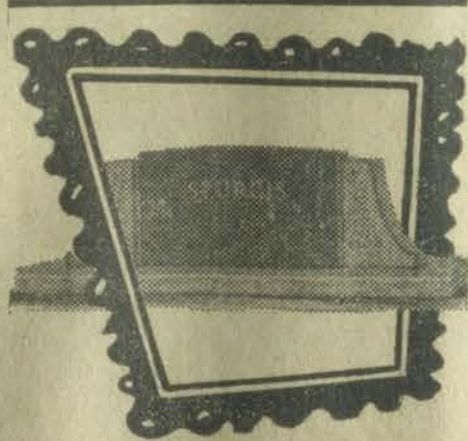

PUBLIC COAL, POWER OWNERSHIP URGED

A plan to "shake off the poverty of Appalachia" and "build a new society" by putting coal and power resources under public ownership was advanced Saturday at Hinton, W. Va., by a group called the Congress for Appalachian Development.

The organization's board of directors representing five states agreed to call a "people's Congress" from Appalachian states this summer to map the movement's plans.

A spokesman for the directors said Saturday night the plan essentially calls for public service districts to buy and build dams around Appalachia, generate power and sell it back to the people.

Because the dams likely will need stream to power turbines, the plan also calls for public service districts to buy coal properties, even in cases where private companies now mine or own coal resources.

The principal spokesman for the CAD is Harry M. Caudill, a lawyer and author, of Whitesburg, Kentucky.

"The main objective is to devise ways to develop this region, to shake off the poverty of Appalachia and build a new society," Caudill said following the meeting of the directors.

He said the plan would closely follow the concepts de-

veloped on the west coast where counties have formed public service districts to develop and sell the resources.

"Appalachia is the last stronghold of absentee colonialism in the nation," Caudill said. "We want to break that hold."

He said the Appalachian region is one of the richest in natural resources but is losing the benefits to absentee owners "who have carted our wealth away."

Caudill said the most logical place to start the plan was at Bluestone Reservoir near here, where there already is a dam constructed with facilities for turbines to generate power.

Membership of the CAD's board of directors includes State Sen. Paul J. Kaufman, D-Kanawha, as well as a minister, newspaper editor, engineer and others from Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Virginia, West Virginia and Georgia.

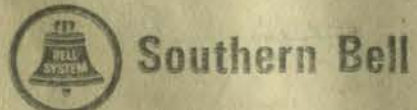

**Osborn, P'burg Native,
Seeking Re-Election
In Fayette County**

State Representative Ted R. Osborn, who is a native of Prestonsburg, recently announced he would seek re-election to the House of Representatives from the 54th Legislative district.

Osborn was a member of the 1960 and 1966 sessions of the Kentucky General Assembly, serving during both sessions as chairman of the House Committee on Higher Education. Representative Osborn has also acted as vice-chairman of the State Commission on Higher Education. In the 1966 session, Representative Osborn was the initial sponsor of House Bill 238 re-amping public institutions of higher education and requiring that the Council on Public Higher Education voting membership be composed of nine lay members. The bill on Higher Education also provided that a University of Kentucky Community College be established in Jefferson county and Mason county.

Representative Osborn was also instrumental in the passage of strip mine legislation. He was the first legislator personally to inspect the mining areas, and his trip precipitated inspection visits by most other legislators who viewed the affected areas prior to voting on the proposed bill. Among other legislation sponsored or co-sponsored into law by Osborn were bills which revised the teacher's retirement system; authorized fiscal courts to establish a merit system for county police and fire departments; established the motor vehicle inspection law which requires periodic inspection of all automotive vehicles; and a bill clarifying the scope and coverage of the Wage Board with resultant amendment giving protection to all employees.

Osborn, well known over the state as a business leader in Lexington, is president of the American Businessmen's Life Insurance Company and is active in various other business enterprises. He is a 1950 graduate of Transylvania College and served his alma mater during the 1961-'62 years as president of the Transylvania College National Alumni Association. He has been honored many times for his civic work and leadership, being named Outstanding Young Man of Fayette County and selected as one of the Three Outstanding Young Men of Kentucky.

Mr. Osborn is married to the former Della Wheeler, and they reside with their four children at 9 Tanglewood Drive, Lexington.

Born at Prestonsburg, Representative Osborn is a son of Clarence and Virginia Adams Osborn, and he has many relatives in Floyd county and Eastern Kentucky. He has visited Prestonsburg many times in recent years, usually in connection with his work in Kiwanis International. He is a past president of the Kentucky Mountain Club and has been selected as "Mountain Man of the Year."

A Price food store has been disqualified from participating in the food stamp program by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service because of program violations.

The Consumer and Marketing Service said B. & C. Grocery and its owner and operator, Mrs. Beatrice Little, have been disqualified from the food stamp program for a period of six months, effective March 21.

Food stamp officials pointed out that disqualification does not preclude further action to collect claims under food stamp program regulations or possible prosecution under any criminal or other applicable statute.

After the six-month disqualification period, the operator of B. & C. Grocery may apply for reinstatement. If approved, she will be issued a new authorization card and number, Consumer and Marketing Service officials said.

The Consumer and Marketing Service continually reviews program activities in all food stamp program areas. Investigations are made periodically to insure compliance with the program regulations.

There are nearly 4,000 grocers in Kentucky authorized to handle USDA food coupons, and there are 14,692 food stores authorized throughout the Southeast.
