## BOARD READY TO ASK BIDS ON BUILDING

### McDowell Annex Job May Involve \$100,000; Other Work Approved

The Floyd County Board of Education accepted Saturday final plans for the eight-room addition to the McDowell elementary school and set May 27 as the date for opening of contractors' bids on the job.

The work will involve the expenditure of around \$100,000.

The board also authorized G. L. Shannon, architect, to advertise for bids on blacktop surfacing of the Betsy Layne school playground. This is an undertaking intended to help the athletic program of the school in the absence of a gymnasium. The Betsy Layne gym was destroyed by fire, a few months ago.

The Osborne elementary school was accepted as completed, and final payment to the contracting firm, Akers & Akers, was authorized when the Building and Grounds Division of the State Department of Education gives its final approval of the project.

The \$225,95 bid of Charlie Hamilton for a used school bus was accepted. Bids were rejected as too low when the bus was originally advertised, and re-advertising was ordered.

Insurance checks on school fire losses were accepted by the board—\$14,887.40 on the Betsy Layne gym and \$1,200 on the Spurlock school building. The board also received checks totaling \$25,894.35 to cover Neighborhood Youth Corps expenses for March and April.

Permission was granted the Clark elementary, Wheelwright and Martin schools to use school buses for supervised school trips. (See Story No. 5, Page 4)

## COURT KILLS TIME CHANGE

### Resolution Adopted Tuesday Backs Ward; Health Service Urged

The Floyd fiscal court made short shift last Thursday on any notion of a time change. It voted unanimously to retain Eastern Standard Time.

At a meeting held Tuesday the court by unanimous vote adopted a resolution endorsing the candidacy of Henry Ward for the Democratic nomination for Governor.

The resolution described Ward as a "great administrator" and "a person to get things done." It cited his past record as a road-builder and his promise to expand the Rural Highway Program by \$10 million.

The court resolution also pointed out that "Henry Ward pushed hard to build the Mountain Parkway, while one of his opponents said it was a 'Road to Nowhere.'" (See Story No. 6, Page 2)

## Contract on Bridge At Maytown Goes To Danville Firm

A contract for the construction of a bridge over Beaver Creek at Maytown on the Allen-Lackey-Hindman (Ky. 80) road has been awarded by the Highway Department, Gov. Edward T. Breathitt and Highway Commissioner Mitchell W. Tinder announced Tuesday.

Edward & Webb Construction Company, Inc., Danville, submitted the low bid of \$208,318.32. Construction of the span will eliminate a dangerous bottleneck on the highway.

## East Kentucky Youth Band To Present Concert Sunday

Eleven Floyd county high school students are members of the Eastern Kentucky Youth Band which will present a concert Sunday at 5 p.m. in the amphitheater at Jenny Wiley State Park.

The band, directed by Gus Kajos, chairman of the Fine Arts Division at Prestonsburg Community College; is composed of high school students from Floyd, Johnson and Pike counties. It is a volunteer organization that has met on Saturdays at the college.

For their concert the band will perform "Coat of Arms," by Kenny; "Folk Song Suite," by Williams; "Sequoia," by LaGas-

sey; "River Jordan," by Whitney; "Hill Country Ballad," by Clifton Williams; "Dixieland Jamboree," by Warrington, and "My Fair Lady," by Lowe.

## Allen Wins Suit To Correct Name Of His Opponent

A suit in Franklin circuit court ended last Friday in favor of Nelson Allen, Russell educator and Floyd county native who is seeking the Democratic nomination for railroad commissioner in Eastern Kentucky.

Allen had filed action to force Lee Lewallen, of Hazard, to use his right name in the race. The Russell man and his attorney, Terry McBrayer, said in affidavits Wewallen was "a dummy candidate" induced to run by incumbent Railroad Commissioner Doug Combs, who seeks re-election.

Franklin Circuit Judge Henry Meigs ruled Lewallen's name must go on the ballot in one spelling rather than "Lee Lew Allen" as originally given to the secretary of state.

McBrayer's affidavit said Lewallen, whose birth certificates and other records all spell the last name in one word, told him it had been filde "to confus the voters."

County clerks in the 44 counties of the Third Railroad District will be advised to make the ballot change.

## AKERS GETS POOL WORK

### Floyd Firm Low Bidder On Park Construction Project; Asks \$295,844

Akers & Akers' bid has been accepted and the contract awarded, Parks Commissioner Fox later announced.

An apparent low bid of \$295,844 was made by the Akers & Akers Construction Company, of Dana, for construction of new swimming and wading pools and for making alterations and additions to the bathhouse at Jenny Wiley State Park, Gov. Edward T. Breathitt said this week.

The next lowest of five bids was submitted by Midwestern, Inc., Miamisburg, Ohio, which asked \$299,000 for the work. These bids were based on 180 days to complete the work. Breathitt said dimensions of the new swimming pool will be 47 by 93 feet, with a 35 by 35-foot diving well. The wading pool will be 16 by 20 feet. Both will be of concrete construction. The community-size pool, to be built near the Stratton Branch beach, will accommodate 500 bathers at one time.

## O.K. WATER TO KENWOOD

### \$348,000 To Finance System for Service Of Industrial Park

Approval of \$348,000 to finance a water system to serve the Kenwood industrial park was announced this week by the Economic Development Administration.

The project, which includes a main, booster station, storage tank and distribution lines, will permit completion of the 119-acre industrial park, five miles south of Paintsville. Completion of the water system is expected in about seven months.

Of the total funds, \$278,000 is a grant and \$70,000 a loan. The industrial park is being developed by the Big Sandy Industrial Foundation, Inc., a non-profit development organization.

A new wood products plant, Kanwood Products, Inc., hopes to occupy about half of the park. Headed by Robert Sloat, of Paintsville, the plant would employ 615 men.

## 7 COUNTIES IN PROGRAM

### Floyd County To Share In Training of Workers; 17 Projects Approved

Floyd county will share with seven other counties in training 234 men as skilled workers under the Manpower Training Act, it was announced Monday.

In all, 17 institutional training projects have been approved to train 888 persons in Kentucky at a cost of \$1,877,431.

The projects will provide training as ward clerks, surgical technicians, machine operators, auto mechanics, electricians, welders, auto body repairmen, building maintenance men, draftsmen and nursesmen. Three hundred will be given pre-vocational training.

The projects for this area: Perry county redevelopment area; 12 persons will be trained as ward clerks for 13 weeks at a cost of \$12,473.

Floyd, Pike, Morgan and Harlan counties; 72 persons will be trained as machine operators for 59 weeks.

Floyd, Pike and Wolfe counties; 90 persons will be trained as auto mechanics for 39 weeks.

Floyd, Morgan, Perry, Harlan, Knox and Breathitt counties; 72 persons will be trained as electricians for 39 weeks.

Pike county; 35 persons will be trained as welders (combination) for 33 weeks.

Letcher and Perry counties; 36 persons will be trained as auto body repairmen for 39 weeks.

Letcher county; 15 persons will be trained as springers for 16 weeks.

Perry, Letcher and Harlan counties; 54 persons will be trained as building maintenance men for 24 weeks.

Breathitt county; 18 persons will be trained as draftsmen for 39 weeks. (See Story No. 4, Page 2)

### Congressman Perkins To Be Speaker Friday At PCC Commencement

Twenty Floyd county students will be awarded associate degrees and 21 will receive certificates of college studies at the second graduation exercises of Prestonsburg Community College on Friday, May 12. Carl D. Perkins, U. S. Representative from the Seventh Congressional district, will deliver the main address. The ceremonies will begin at 7 p.m. and will be held at the college. In all, 37 students will receive degrees and certificates. Dr. Ellis Hartford, dean of the University of Kentucky Community College System, will confer the degrees and certificates.

Congressman Perkins, a native of Hindman, is now serving as chairman of the House Committee on Education and Labor. He has long been a supporter of improved education facilities. The late President Kennedy once referred to him as "Mr. Education." Congressman Perkins is a strong advocate of the junior college movement, himself having graduated from Alice Lloyd College.

## Gain Of 600 In Population Shown In Birth-Death Data; Big Killer Is Heart Disease

Floyd county had a population gain of 600 last year on the basis of births and deaths, data released last week by the Floyd County Health Department shows. The number of births totalled 827; deaths, 227.

The biggest killer was heart disease, which caused 40% of the deaths.

The 227 deaths were 60 fewer than for the preceding year, and represented the lowest death rate in a five-year period.

Although the number of reported tuberculosis cases was 43, the highest for any year since 1962, the disease did not result in a death last year. The increased number of known cases is ascribed to improved detection methods.

As of April 28, this year, there were 65 known active

t. b. cases in the county and 153 inactive ones. In 1962 there were five deaths from the disease. The number dropped to two in 1963, to one the next year and rose to two in 1965.

## SIMS NAMED COACH HERE

### Dixon Resigns Post; New Mentor Transfers Here from McKell Hi

Thomas Sims, former all-Ohio Valley Conference quarterback, will be Prestonsburg high school's new football coach. He will succeed Bert Dixon, who has resigned the post to become associated with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Commitment to Mr. Sims has been made by the Floyd County Board of Education, but he will not be formally employed until the regular June meeting of the board when other school personnel will be hired.

Sims comes to Prestonsburg from McKell high school where as football coach his teams have compiled a 41-7 record over the five years of his tenure there. During this time McKell won the conference championship four years and in the other was co-champion.

While at McKell, Sims was named conference coach-of-the-year at the end of three separate seasons. He was graduated from Morehead State University where he was all-conference quarterback three years.

He was employed Tuesday by City Park Commission as director of Archer Park here during the summer, and he, Mrs. Sims and their three sons are expected to move to Prestonsburg shortly.

Perry county: 10 persons will be trained as surgical technicians for 33 weeks at a cost of \$32,034. Some 3,000 of Appalachia's hard-core unemployed will be schooled and trained for jobs under a \$1.5 million Labor Department program administered by the AFL-CIO. The one-year program will cover all states in the region. About 200 trainees will be recruited in Eastern Kentucky. "We are going after the educationally deficient, the handicapped, the long-term unemployed, the minority, the older worker, the draft rejectee and the school drop-out," Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz announced. Wirtz said AFL-CIO local union will fund on-the-job training slots for the men in the program. The trainees attending special classes will receive a subsistence allowance.

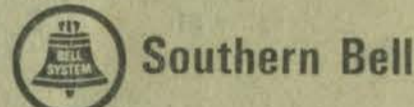

### Employment Service Helping Recruit Girls For Job Corps Program

Frankfort, Ky.—The Kentucky Employment Service is helping recruit some 225 girls for the Job Corps by the end of June, says State Economic Security Commissioner C. Leslie Dawson. The Employment Service, which has recruited only boys, joins Women in Community Service, Inc., in recruiting girls. Federal officials asked that the Employment Service recruit in areas where the WICS has not reached enough girls or does not have offices.

Girls may contact any local employment service office or a WICS office in Louisville, Lexington or Paducah. The Job Corps is a residential training program to give boys and girls, ages 16 to 21, basic education, skill training and work experience. It is operated by the federal Office of Economic Opportunity. The State Employment Service has recruited and screened some 4,200 boys for the Job Corps since March, 1965.

**SCHOLARLY GOVERNOR**  
Kentucky's 11th Governor, J. T. Morehead, was a scholar. His reputation rested mainly on a series of letters that appeared in Kentucky newspapers under the heading "Mea Scripta." A notebook containing some of these copied by Morehead is now owned by the Kentucky Historical Society. Morehead, whose term expired in 1836, served in the U. S. Senate also.

### STUDENT JOBS ARE FEW IN AREA, COLLEGE FINDS

Pippa Passes, Kentucky — How do college students find summer jobs in a region where even their fathers find employment opportunities limited?

That is the question facing Alice Lloyd College guidance counselor Carroll Shaver as the college vacation period approaches.

Because their families' average annual income is below \$3,000, summer employment often is essential to Alice Lloyd students' continued education. Although the college channels about half its \$617,000 budget to grants and scholarships, students must still pay a modest educational fee and room and board charges. And then there are clothes, books and other expenses of college life. Three months of work can pay these costs.

But Shaver and the students are having slight success in their job-hunting efforts. Few summer jobs are available in the region, where 25% of the work force is unemployed. And often it costs students more to work away from home than they can earn.

Yet, if they are to work at all, leaving home may be necessary. Several students have applied to such employers as an Illinois cannery, the National Park Service, utility corporations, and Kentucky mental hospitals. So far, no jobs have resulted from these contacts.

For students the largest employer may be the federal government. Eight have been accepted as counselors in the Upward Bound program to be conducted on the Alice Lloyd campus, and there may be jobs available in other OEO

projects to be conducted this summer in the mountain region.

Shaver is working to make more employers aware of the students' needs and is hoping that those with summer opportunities will contact him before the end of the month.

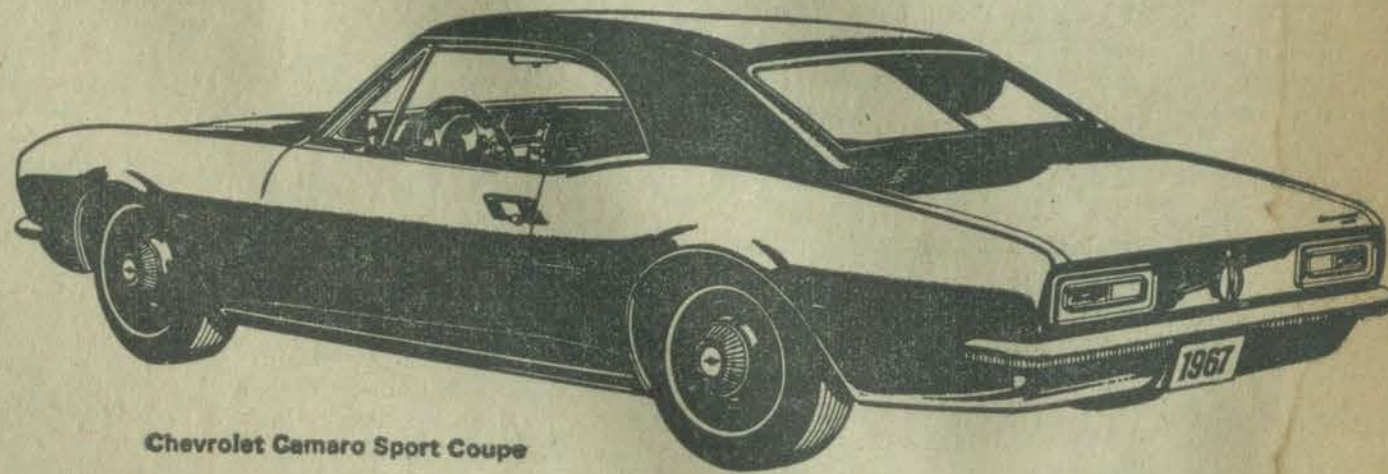

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

ON DAYTON DAILY NEWS ARTICLE  
EDITOR, The Times:

I wish to take this opportunity to clarify false and misleading statements made by John Nichols (Dayton Daily News, April 5-6) concerning Appalachia and its people. Mr. Nichols has cleverly taken a few isolated cases of poverty and used them as a basis for an unprincipled attack against the present political structure and religious institutions in Eastern Kentucky. The two articles are filled with innuendoes, half-truths and perverted truths. They are a discredit to the concept of "freedom of the press," and their author has prostituted his journalistic talents in a manner that will alienate the people of Appalachia against all future poverty workers. The central theme of the two articles is class hatred and religious bigotry. The author insinuates the religious institutions are failures because they do not teach "materialism" instead of religious doctrines based on faith and the political structure fails the people's needs because it is not Socialistically oriented.

In answer to specific untruthful statements made in the two articles, Floyd county has a new court house, a public library, health center and a community college. These public improvements were not planned or built by poverty workers.

The number of Catholic families in Floyd county is not five. Martin, Ky. has a large, well-attended Catholic Church, a school (children of many religious faiths attend this school with Catholic children), a hospital now operating, and a new, modern hospital under construction. As implied in the articles, religious bigotry is not practiced in Floyd county. If at all, it is a rare exception rather than a general rule. From the above record, the most skeptical must conclude Catholics, as such, are doing much good for Floyd county.

In reference to the statement, "Children eat coal to satisfy a nutritional deficiency," I would remind Floyd county when and where this statement was first used. During the early 1960's, at the time of the bitter labor dispute between coal operators and miners, clothing, food, etc. was shipped into Floyd and surrounding counties by unknown donors. In this "poverty assistance" were bundles of "The Worker," the official propaganda organ of the Communist Party U.S.A. In one issue of this "hate sheet" was an article which I quote in essence: "While the starving children eat coal to satisfy their hunger the rich operators live in comfort in their fine brick homes." This is a classic example of the art of promoting class hatred and class warfare.

It is not necessary to quote the misleading statistics concerning illiteracy, internal parasites, unemployment and malnutrition, or to comment on the photographs depicting Prestonsburg, Ky. as a poverty stricken mountain village; therefore, I respectfully submit the following suggestions and observations for the future guidance of week-end poverty workers' use when dealing with the people of Appalachia and their problems:

1. An individual who cannot resolve his own "inner conflict" is unqualified and unsuited to advise others concerning their problems.
2. Commuting, week-end poverty workers cannot possibly understand the problems or the philosophy of the people of Appalachia.
3. Those physically able to work should not be "rewarded" for their unproductivity. This practice destroys the individual's incentive to seek gainful employment and will further the present governmental trend toward the "welfare state."
4. A citizen of this Republic is economically responsible for his own welfare and morally responsible for his transgressions.
5. Class hatred and religious bigotry should not be taught or insinuated where none exists.
6. The theory of taking from the "haves" and giving to the "have-nots," or "penalizing" the industrious and "rewarding" the unproductive, is Communism-Socialism. It is an alien ideology opposed to the principles of the free enterprise system.

**Soil Conservation News**  
By HAROLD R. WALLACE  
Soil Conservationist

How many different kinds of soil do you think there are in Floyd county? Well, there are 103. In Kentucky there are 800, and in the United States as a whole there are 70,000 different kinds.

"Each soil has its own distinctive traits of characteristics. To make wise and intelligent use of the land, it's best to know what kind of soil we are working with. Some soils, for example, can be used safely and productively for cultivated crops. Some can't."

"Some soils will support a housing development or a factory. Others won't. On some house lots, the soil will filter sewage from a septic tank. On others the soil won't."

To find out about proper uses of soil for both rural and urban residents, SCS soil scientists survey 50 million acres a year. Their reports are used by farmers. They're also used by planning commissions, zoning boards, architects, builders, developers, school boards, health departments, tax assessors and highway departments.

### SPORTS AFIELD

By TED KESTING

Will knowing the temperature of the water make you a successful fisherman? It will help—but it is far from the whole story. Some trusting souls, after reading the ads for expensive electronic temperature finders, think that all they have to do is buy one, drop the probe down, watch the dial until they find some certain temperature—and promptly begin to haul in fine fish hand over hand. It's not that simple. There's no royal road to learning, and no expensive equipment you can buy that will make you a good fisherman; you still must learn something about how to fish.

Nevertheless, one of those electronic things certainly can be useful indeed, especially in very quickly finding the thermocline, below which there just are no fish.

The thermocline itself is a boundary line, with no thickness. It's as though a huge, invisible sheet of thin cellophane separated an upper warm layer of water from a lower cold layer. It can vary greatly in depth in different parts of the same lake; at a given spot it may be within six feet or less of the surface or 40 feet or more deep. Below the thermocline there is no free oxygen, so fish can no more live there than they could if thrown on a hot sidewalk.

During most of the daylight hours in summer (but not very early mornings, late evenings and at night), most fish strongly dislike being in shallow water. So if you fail to get a strike in a normally good spot, maybe it's that the thermocline happens to be shallow there at the time but on the other side of the lake it may be deep enough so that you'll

catch them just above it, in the coolest part of that upper layer.

That's the hard and slow way to find a thermocline—though it's what a huge majority of fishermen do a huge majority of the time. The easy, quick and certain way is to use one of those electronic things.

If you can't afford one—or won't be bothered with anything that bulky—a quite small sum will buy you a handy little fishing thermometer with a cup in which to bring up water around the bulb. You'll find that it will serve well at moderate depths but behave poorly when you're trying to find a thermocline if it's deep. As for surface temperature—all you need to know generally in a stream, often in a lake—the cheapest bulb-type thermometer from the dime store will do as well as a \$200 one.

It is true that fish of various species have specific temperature levels at which they are generally most inclined to feed. Here is the list compiled from his own experience by Jason Lucas, Angling Editor of Sports Afield Magazine.

Largemouth bass—72 degrees; smallmouth bass—67; walleye—64; Pike—68; muskellunge—56; brook trout—63; rainbow trout—65; brown trout—70; bluegills—67; perch—63.

Knowing these temperatures will be of little help to someone who just won't go to the slight trouble of learning a little about how to fish. But by using them together with your head, you might find them doubling, even tripling, your catch.

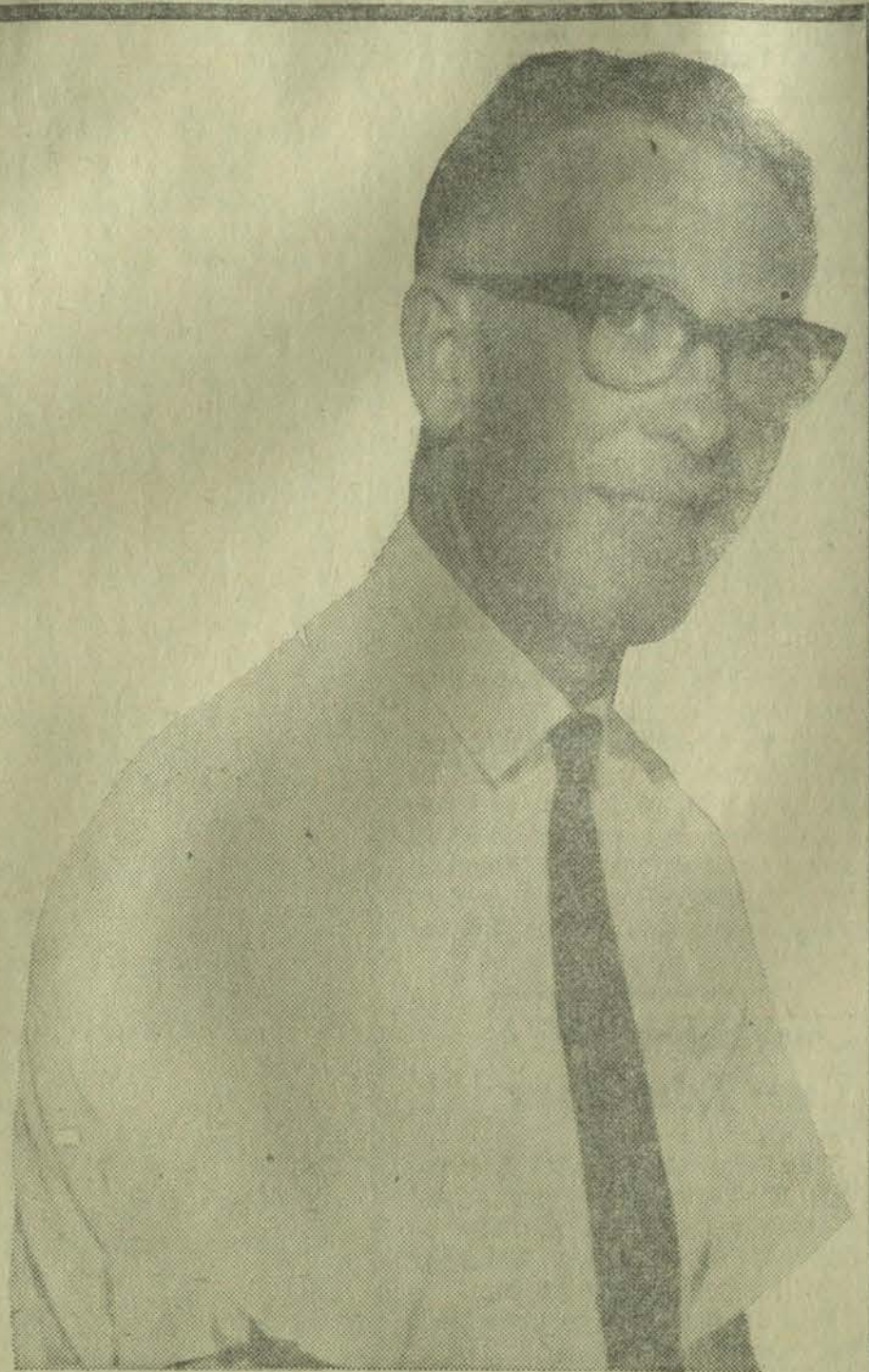

**TIDBITS of KENTUCKY FOLKLORE**

By GORDON WILSON, Ph. D.

**WHY WE WERE ALIKE**

In my one-roomed school I often asked questions to determine whether there were any large differences between a school in far-western Kentucky and in the south-central counties. Though two hundred miles separate the extremes that I have studied, there was so little difference that even I, born and raised in the western extreme of the state and living nearly all of my mature life at Bowling Green, was surprised. This set me to thinking.

In the first place, our people who came in in pioneer days were largely alike, with Scottish-Irish blood predominating. A few differences are noticeable between my childhood people and those I have known later, for the central areas of the state had been settled for more than a generation when the Jackson Purchase was opened for settlement. Hosts of the settlers in this "last West" of the state came directly from North Carolina, some of them from families that had arrived long after the seacoast settlements were made. But even this brought, largely, differences in vocabulary rather than in customs.

For a long time our school books were identical, all over the state. Generation after generation used the McGuffey Readers, the Ray Arithmetics. Older people had grown up on the Blue-back Spelling Book, though it was not in active use after I could remember. We had learned to spell syllable by syllable, to read one word at a time, to rattle off the multiplication tables. The teaching devices suggested in the introduction and notes of our texts were taken seriously, so that a school in Barren county was reading a selection from McGuffey's Fifth Reader in exactly the same way as my own Fidelity, back in the very early 1900's.

Even the terminology of the schools seemed copyrighted. Everybody whom I have consulted, from very young people who attended a one-roomed school to the very old ones, called the period spent in the schoolroom books. And every one called the morning and afternoons breaks recess, with the accent on the first syllable. Some people would say noon, but would immediately correct themselves and say dinnertime. School took up and let out or got out. Every person remembered the annual treat given at the end of the school, just before Christmas, or one then and another at the end of the term when the school term had been lengthened. Standing up and staying in were remembered punishments, called by these names.

The customs from the time the morning school bell rang until school was over were almost

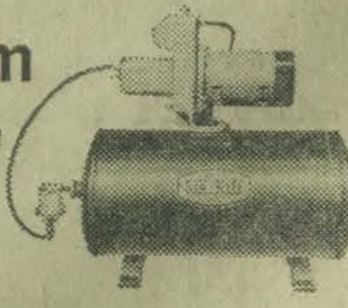

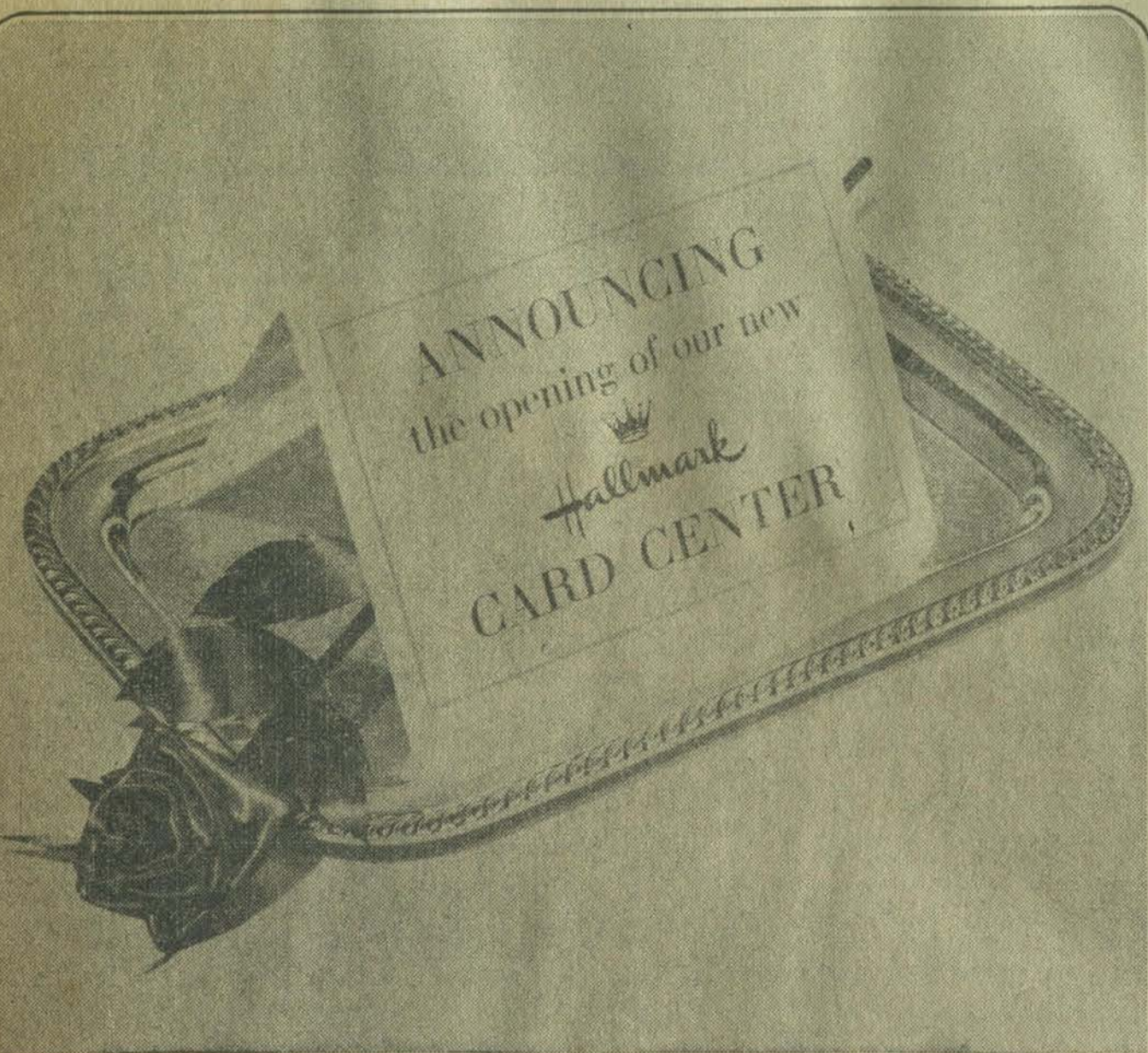
