As the tracks seemed fresh, probably from the previous evening, clear in hard frozen snow, Eric Shipton followed them, noting how the toes of the creature had dug in as t leapt over crevasses, and the single pair of tracks it made as it landed on the far side.

The excellent photographs brought by Snipton and his accurate description made it quite clear that some large creature, apparently walking on its two hind legs, had been purposely crossing this isolated glacier at 19,000 feet. Tilman, who led an unsuccessful attempt on Everest, made references to Homo Niveus Disgustans - with his tentative conclusion that it would be rather jolly if there were indeed strange semi-human beings in the High

In 1954 two British mountaineers in the rugged area to the east of Mount Everest noticed prints - eight inches long and four inches broad-in the snow. At the side of the print of the sole was a rounded mark like the ball of a thumb, and at the end of the sole were the marks of toes, and of unmistakable

In 1960 the distinguished mountaineer-scientist Sir Edmund Hillary, conqueror of Everest, led an expedition to search for the maker of these tracks, and to try to solve the mystery of the Abominable Snowman.

Sir Edmund's search failed to prove or completely disprove the existence of the Abominable Snowman. The lines of battle have been drawn-on one side the Outdoor types, who have nearly all insisted there is Something Up There; and the Indoor types (or scientists) who insist there is not.

One of the strongest points in favor of the Yeti is that the Sherpas who have seen the Yeti, though simple people, are neither fools nor subject to hallucinations. Their reliability and intelligence are equal to those of a Montana shepherd or a Highland game keeper.
