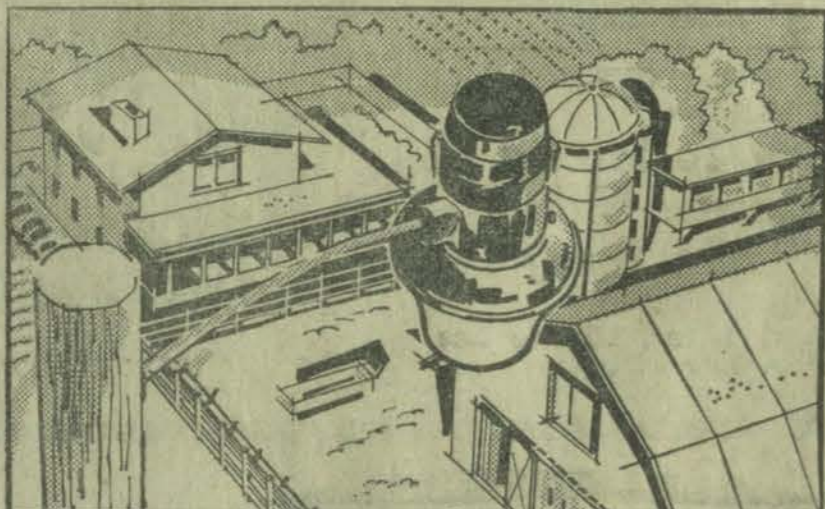

SATURDAY IS LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO VOTE

Frankfort, Ky.—Saturday, Sept. 9, is the last day for unregistered Kentuckians to register to vote in this year's Nov. 7 election of a governor and other state officials.

Unregistered persons are eligible to register and vote if they will be 18 or older by election day and if they have lived in the state one year, the county six months and the precinct 60 days.

Once you are registered, you do not have to re-register or notify your registration office unless you move, change your name by marriage or your name has been purged because of failure to vote for two consecutive years.

Eight statewide officials besides governor are to be elected

this year. They are lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, auditor, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, commissioner of agriculture, and clerk of the court of appeals.

Also up for election in November are 100 members of the state House of Representatives, 19 state senators, and an undetermined number of candidates for municipal boards, and to fill vacancies that have occurred in various offices throughout the state.

Another date to remember this year is Oct. 19. That is the last day to mail to the county clerk one's application for an absentee ballot for use if he is going to be away from his home county on election day.

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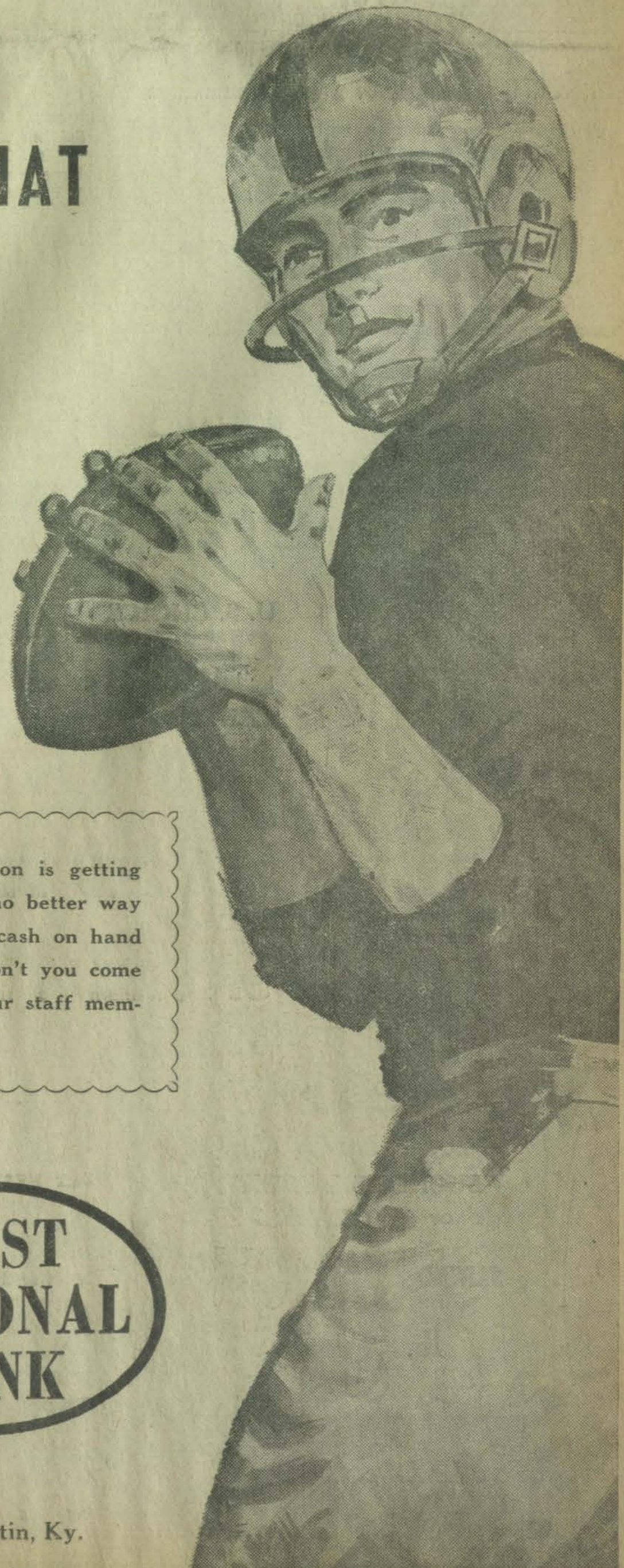

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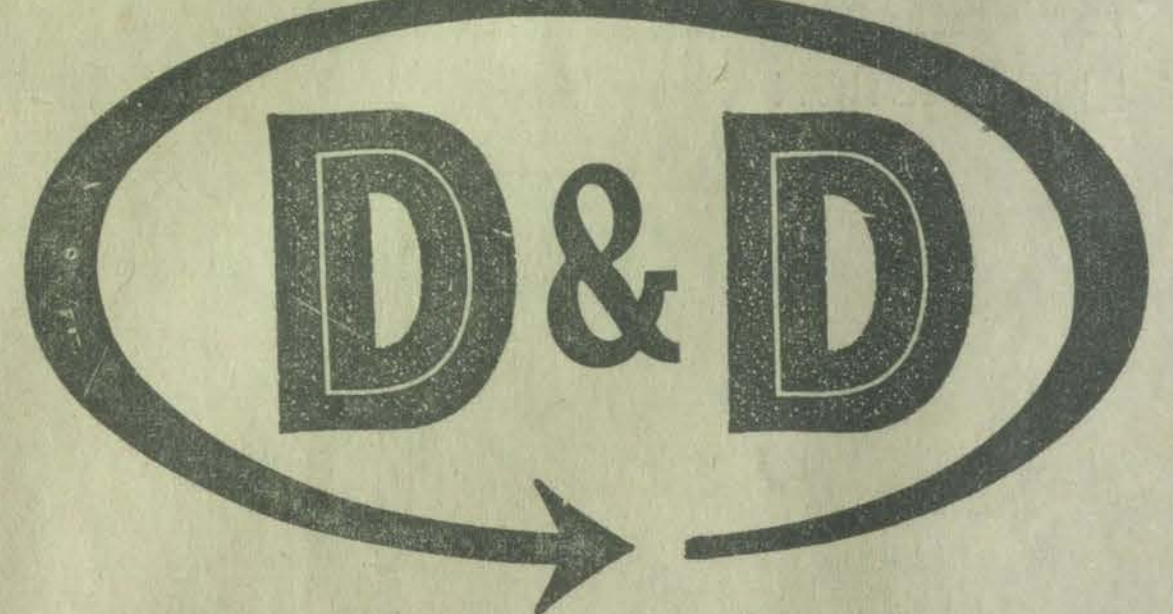

TEACHER WALKOUT LOOMS IN PIKE COUNTY SCHOOLS

Pikeville, Ky.—The possibility of a teachers walkout in Pike county schools toward the end of next month looms unless Pike County Education Association (PCEA) demands for pay increases are met.

Monday Glenn McDowell, president of the PCEA, said that the association has passed a resolution to the effect that the Pike county schools "will be closed" unless the PCEA salary requirements are met.

The county school board, meeting Aug. 10, agreed to grant pay increases averaging \$300 a year for the county's 615 teachers, providing the funds are available. But, said McDowell, the average raise wanted is about \$400.

McDowell, a vocational-agriculture teacher at Johns Creek high school, said the teachers are assured of their share of state Minimum Foundation funds. He said it is what the Pike County Board of Education does in regard to meeting its teachers pay allotment that will determine the PCEA's action regarding a walkout.

A resolution passed Aug. 24 by the PCEA, without any recorded dissenting votes, said: "We feel that each teacher should have already been notified of his or her salary for the coming year.

"Since this hasn't been done, we recommend that we teach the first month of school. At the end of the first month, if teachers pay raises aren't in line with foundation program's allotment for 1967-68, schools will be closed until the above salary requirements are met."

McDowell said the \$300-a-month average raise would require an additional expenditure of \$185,400 by the county school board, and that a total of \$251,151 would be needed to meet the \$400 average sought by the teachers.

He said the school board ended up \$112,526 "in the red" as of last June 1, and that this item

has priority over other school-board payments. This deficit, he added, resulted "from the failure of taxes to be collected for some reason or other."

The county itself wound up with a deficit of \$132,318, with the receipts budgeted from local real-estate and tangible-property taxes at \$627,134, whereas collections amounted only to \$494,815.

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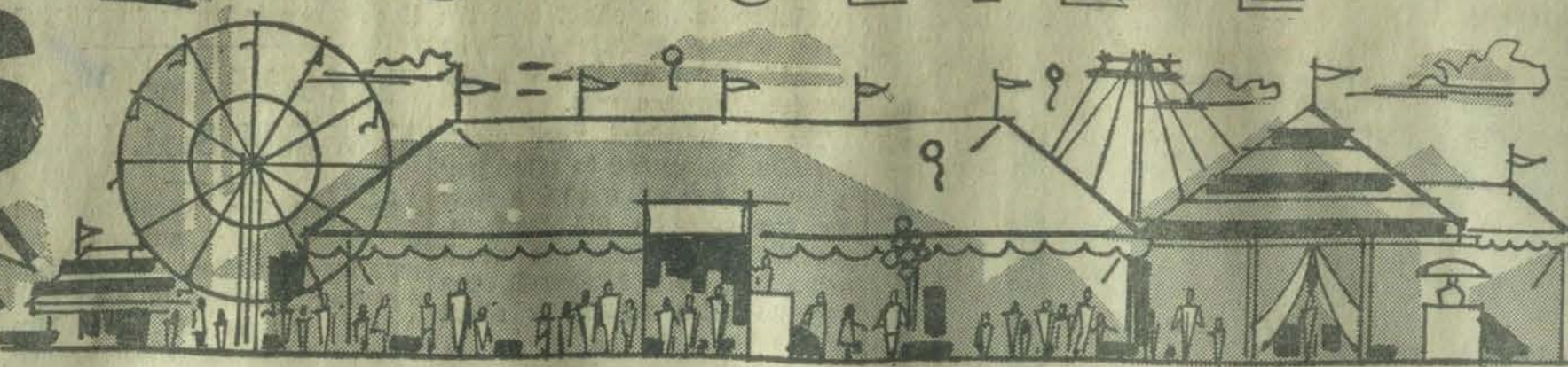

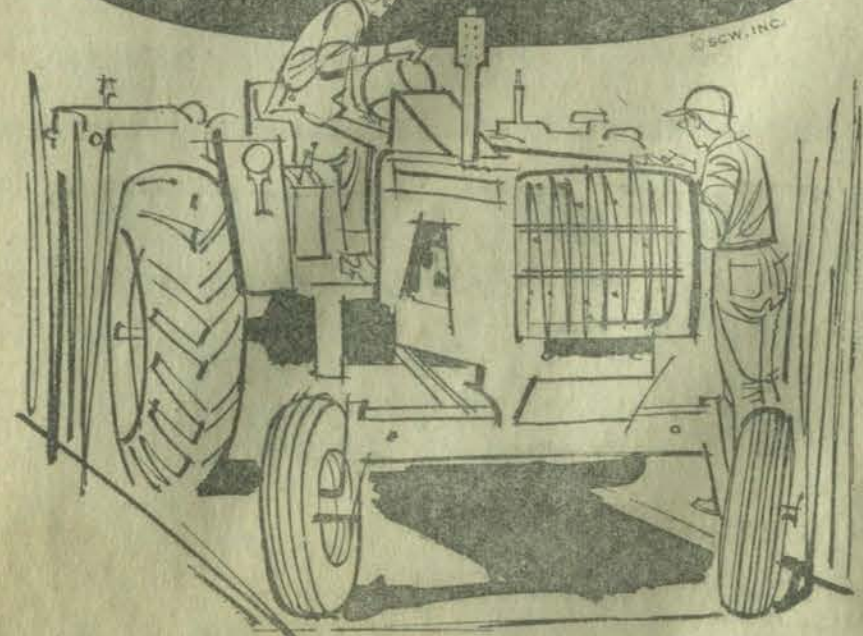

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KENTUCKY LEADS NATION IN HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Frankfort, Ky.—Kentucky led the nation in highway construction mileage during the first six months of 1967, according to the U. S. Department of Transportation.

Gov. Edward T. Breathitt said records of the federal agency show that from January through June the state awarded construction contracts for 2,395 miles of roads and streets—2,332 of state roads and 63 miles of interstate and other federal roads. This represents about 15 percent of the mileage put under construction by all the states, he said.

"Only Texas," the Governor said, "is even close to Kentucky's total." This state, according to the same official statistics, awarded contracts for 2,388 miles.

Breathitt termed the achievement "one of Kentucky's finest hours. I have been watching the month-by-month contract-dollar

volume and knew we were running ahead of last year when Kentucky awarded a record contract volume of \$194.5 million," the Governor said.

Kentucky expects to surpass the 1966 dollar volume record, he added.

"At the end of July contract awards had reached \$119,487,945. This was almost \$2 million more than for the same period last year," Breathitt said.

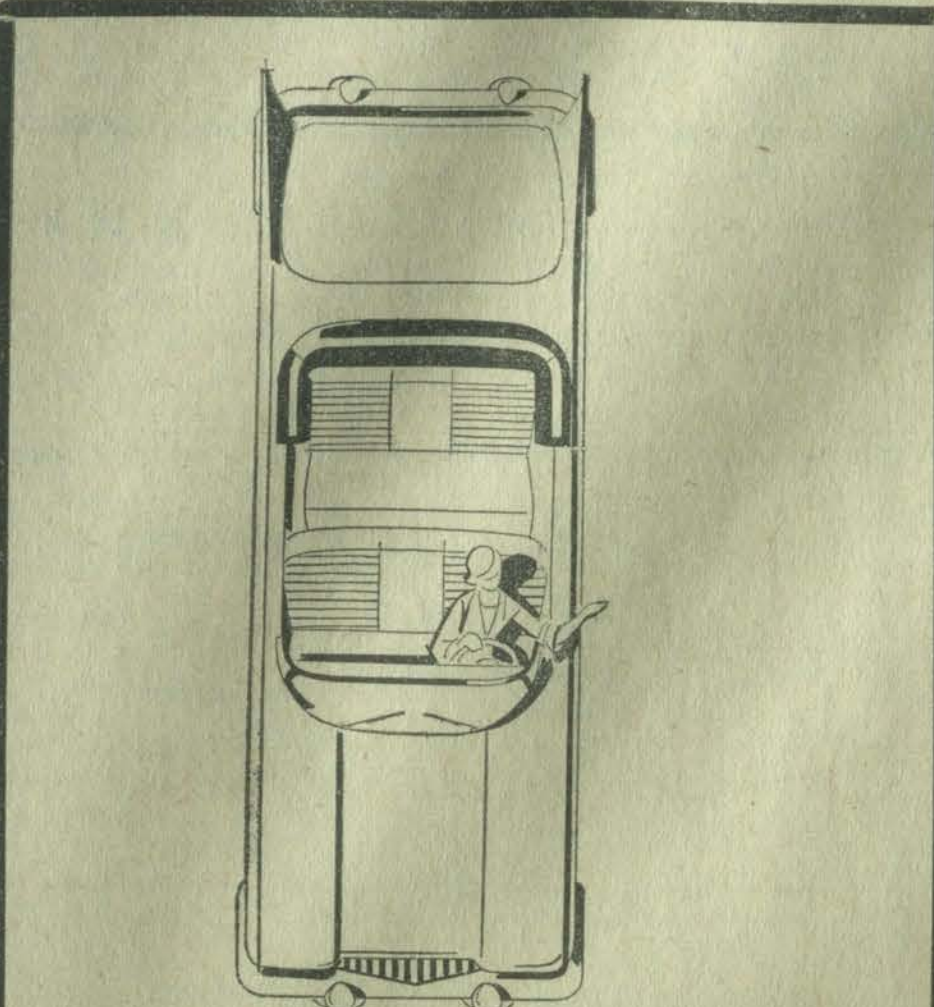

CLUB MOUNTS PROTEST AGAINST PROPOSED DAM

The Kentucky chapter of The Sierra Club is organizing a nationwide protest by conservationists against construction of the proposed Red River dam in Eastern Kentucky.

Letters to Kentucky Sens. Thurston B. Morton and John Sherman Cooper from W. G. Duncan, of Louisville, asked that funds for "this controversial dam project be held up until an impartial survey of the area can be made."

At a hearing two weeks ago at Stanton, the Army Corps of Engineers said land-buying for the dam will be started next March. Fred Morgan, chief of the real estate division for the corps of engineers, said the contract for the outlet works for the dam will be let next May. Completion of the dam is scheduled for the spring of 1972.

The dam, and the reservoir behind it, are designed for flood control, water storage for down-river cities, and recreation.

The proposed reservoir would be about 12 miles northeast of Stanton, Powell county. It would

extend upstream about seven miles from the dam.

The reservoir would extend into creekbeds in Powell, Menifee and Wolfe counties.

After its recent study The Sierra Club cited the "Destructive impact of the Red River reservoir" and said it would mean:

"1. The elimination of the land route along and through the scenic Red River Gorge. This is the most unique and beautiful area of its kind in the eastern United States.

"2. The elimination of most of the white water which is now being used by Kentuckians and those from adjoining states for canoe travel. This is the best of the few white water streams in Kentucky.

"3. The elimination of the beaver population. This is one of the few areas in Kentucky where a high beaver population exists without conflict with farming and access road flooding.

"4. Elimination of trout fishing in Swift Camp Creek and the Red River above the bridge.

"5. The elimination of a key wildlife habitat component in the form of cleared bottom land soils. This component can't be replaced anywhere in the area.

"6. The drastic reduction or elimination of the wild turkey population in the area. This is one of the best in Kentucky.

"7. The drastic reduction of squirrel, deer and grouse which now inhabit the area. The grouse and squirrel hunting in the area is very good.

"8. The elimination of what is potentially one of Kentucky's best fishing streams for walleye and muskie, with controlled siltation measures enforced.

"9. The elimination of one of the finest stretches of wild river left in Kentucky, and a future tourist attraction of far greater potential than any lake that could be built.

"10. The elimination of parts of the most scenic of the hiking trails and the land route to view the scenic Sky Bridge."

Social Security Deadlines Cited

With Medicare a part of the Social Security retirement picture, it is very important that each person nearing age 65 decide whether he wants the double payment for this part of Medicare, as there are deadlines that apply.

The initial enrollment period for the doctor bill insurance begins three months before his 65th birthday, and extends to three months after the month in which he reaches age 65.

In order for this medical insurance coverage to be effective with the first day of the month in which he reaches age 65, the individual must sign up in one of the three months just before the month in which he reaches this age.

If he applies for this doctor bill insurance in the month in which he reaches age 65, coverage is effective beginning with the first day of the following month. If he signs up for this coverage in the next month after the month in which he reaches age 65, his coverage starts two months later. If he files the application for this part of Medicare in the second or in the third month after the month in which he reaches age 65, his coverage begins three months later.

If an individual does not sign up for the medical insurance within the initial enrollment period, but later signs up in a general enrollment period—such as the last three months of 1967—coverage can begin no earlier than July 1 of the following year.

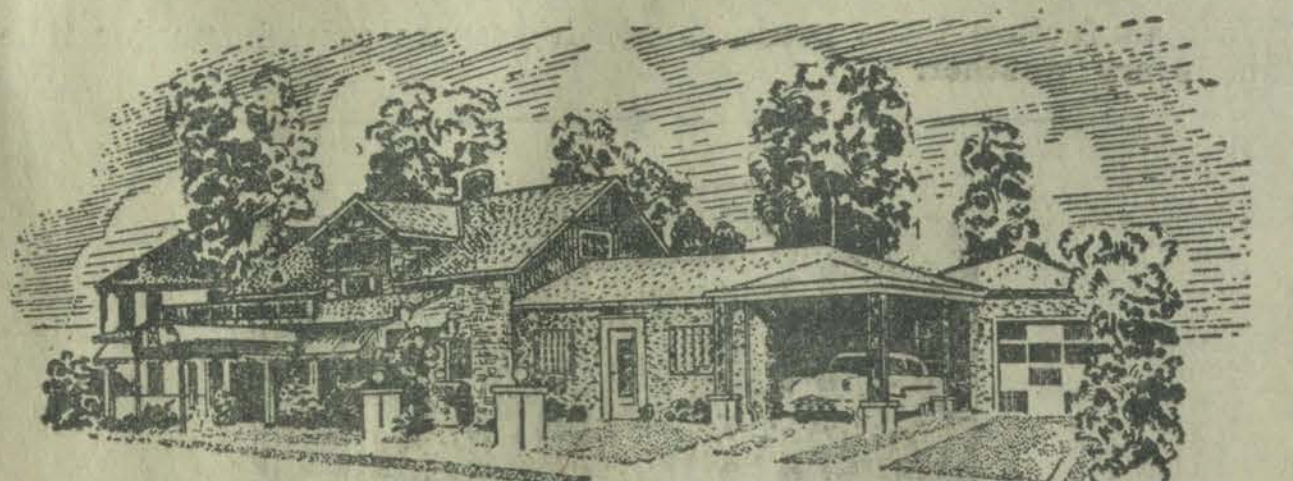

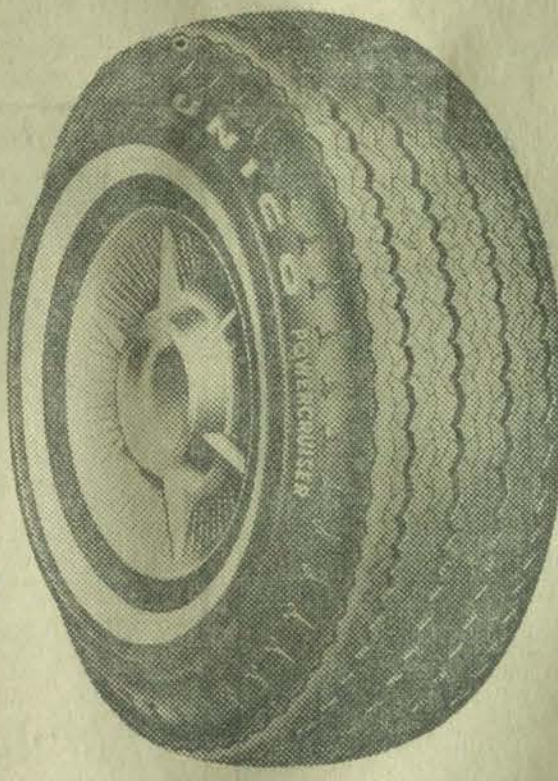

HEALTH CHECK-UP NEED FOR SCHOOL-AGERS TOLD

September and the sound of school bells should start parents thinking about a health check-up for the school-bound youngster, according to the Kentucky Heart Association.

An examination now may detect some minor problem that could have become troublesome later. It could insure that the child attends school in good health, and this, in turn, will allow the child to do his or her best work.

One of the special hazards is strep infection, which usually precedes rheumatic fever, which in turn can lead to rheumatic heart disease. A strep infection—such as strep sore throat or scarlet fever—is contagious, while rheumatic fever is not, the Heart Association points out.

Prompt and thorough treatment of strep infections usually can prevent rheumatic fever, so it is important that a physician gets to see the child early enough to control the infection before it can set off the rheumatic process.

Parents and teachers are urged to look for these danger signals: poor appetite, failure to gain weight, pallor and fatigue, frequent colds and sore throats, unexplained nosebleeds, pains in arms, legs and joints, unusual restlessness or irritability, behavior or personality changes, and a fall off in school work by a "good" student.

Careful observation is necessary for a few weeks after recovery from a strep infection, because there is a "silent" phase in the development of rheumatic fever, and one or more of the danger signals may reappear to warn of trouble.

The child who develops rheumatic fever does not necessarily suffer heart damage. Once recovered without heart damage, he will be placed on long-term medication that protects against repeated attacks, but he is not ill and should be permitted to take part in the normal school program, unless a physician orders a limit on activities.

Many children recover completely from rheumatic fever

with little or no heart damage. In those who are left with rheumatic heart disease, the injury usually is the result of inflammation of either or both valves on the left side of the heart. In the healing process, scar tissue develops which prevents the proper opening and closing of the valve, and interferes with the normal flow of blood through the heart.

In some cases, injury to the heart does not become apparent until adolescence or young adulthood. Therefore, the Association advises that children with a history of rheumatic fever be given regular physical examinations so that any developing heart disease can be detected.
