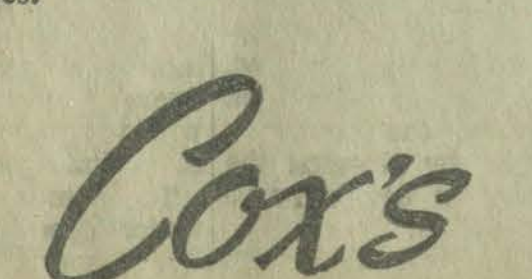

person or to his chief agent by the Department . . . be removed or relocated by such person at his own expense."

Judge Conley held that the "such road" referred to in the statute could not be extended to include a new highway which was only in the planning stage.

He held that plaintiffs are entitled to a permit to cross US 23 as it now exists or as it may subsequently be constructed and that the failure of the Department of Highways to issue a construction permit has been in violation of plaintiffs' rights and has placed on them a substantial burden for which they are entitled to be compensated.

The compensation, if any is asked, would be determined in a separate suit.

Grouse or native pheasant, Dec. 1-Feb. 28.

Mink, skunk, muskrat, beaver and red fox, opens third Thursday in November, closes Jan. 31.

Quail (Bobwhite), bag limit 10; possession limit 20.

Rabbits, bag limit 6; possession limit 12.

Grouse or native pheasant, bag limit 4; possession limit 8.

Grouse season to be closed in recently stocked Pennyrile Forest, Butler county and Fort Knox Military Reservation.

There is no bag limit on mink, skunk, muskrat, beaver or red fox.

Dewey Lake Wildlife Management Area, located in Pike and Floyd counties: (Except that portion of the Dewey Lake Refuge located in Floyd county leased by Boy Scouts of America consisting of 138.4 acres, including tracts 315, 326, 352 and portions of tract 323, and bounded on the north by Dewey Lake, on the south by Dewey Lake and on the east by Dewey Lake, on the west by yellow "No Hunting" signs.) was moving into the house. Its cause has not been definitely determined, but one report received here said an attempt to light a gas furnace had been made.

Fire Chief Hunter Thomas, of Wheelwright, said there was little trace of fire in the ruins of the home. Force of the explosion was such that only the floor and foundations of the one-story frame building remained. Some timbers were hurled a distance of 40 feet. Thomas said the only evidence of fire visible was in a ventilator, but he could not say that that was caused by direct flame.

The child's body apparently was hurled from the house. Her mother, who was not inside the building at the time of the explosion, was unhurt.

The family had moved to Wheelwright from the Lick Creek section of Pike county. The victim of the blast is survived by her parents, a brother, Randy, and a sister, Teresa.

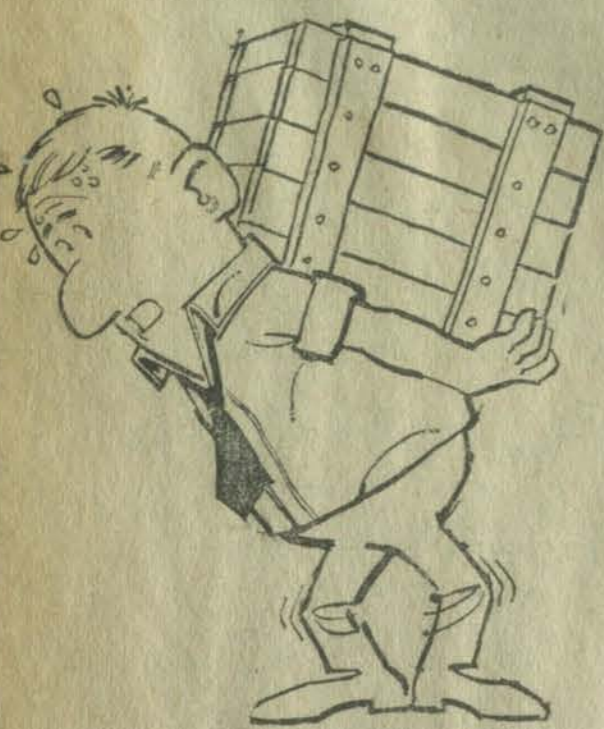

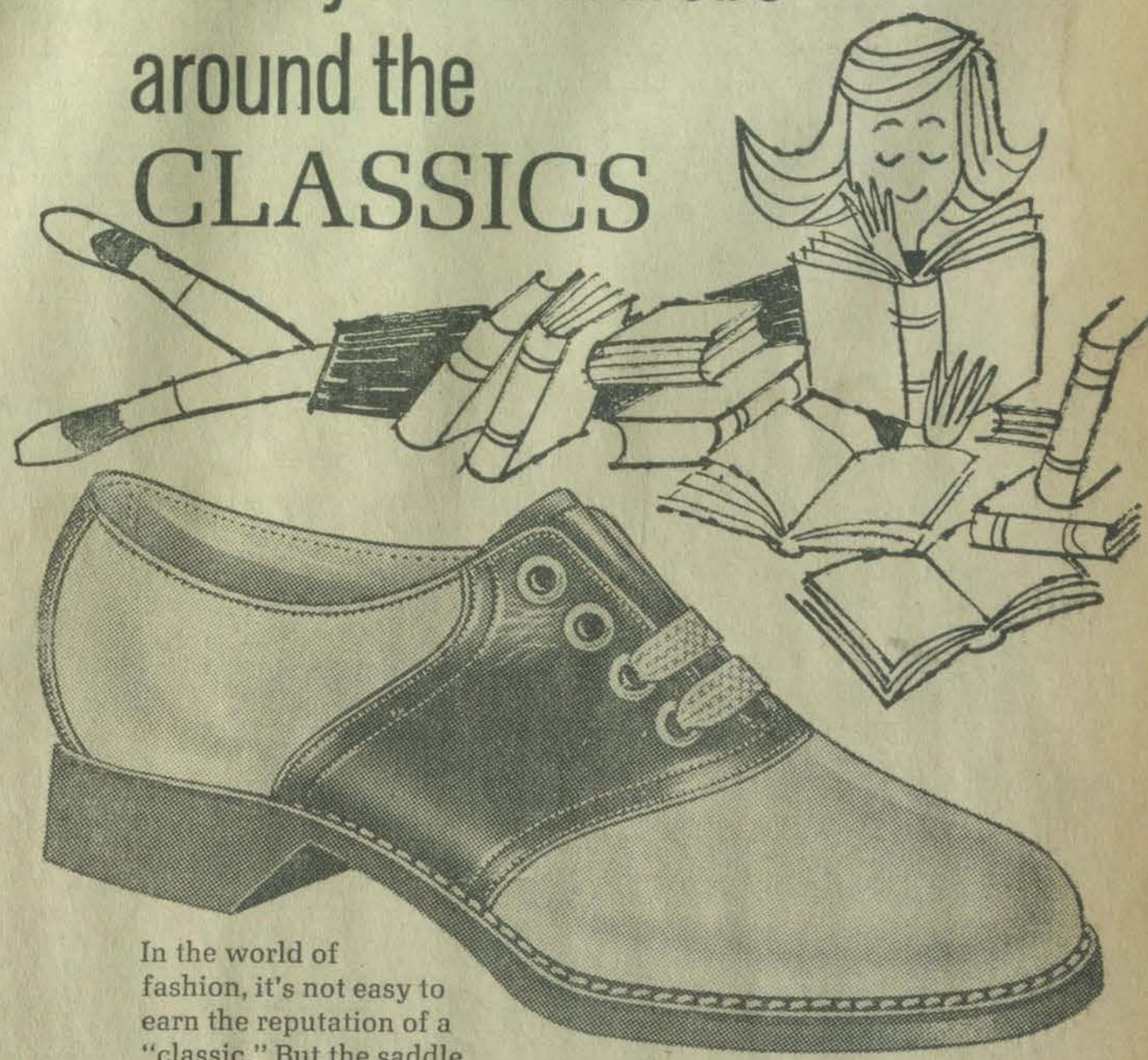

Landowners To Get Notice of Strip-Mine Application Filing

Frankfort, Ky.—A new policy of notifying individual landowners of applications filed here by coal operators to strip mine on the landowners' property, has been initiated by the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources.
 Requested by Gov. Edward T. Breathitt, the policy calls for notification by registered letter to the property owner that a strip mining request is pending. In addition, a public notice will be placed at the courthouse of the county where the land is located. The policy goes into effect September 15.
 Breathitt noted that in many cases, the first knowledge by a landowner that his land is about to be disturbed "was when the bulldozer arrived to begin work."
 Breathitt said he felt strongly that any property owner has the right to know in advance that his land is about to be stripped. "With systematic advance warning, the property owner will have better opportunity to file legal objections if he so desires, to inspect the application proceedings or to prepare his surface property where necessary for the stripping," Breathitt said.

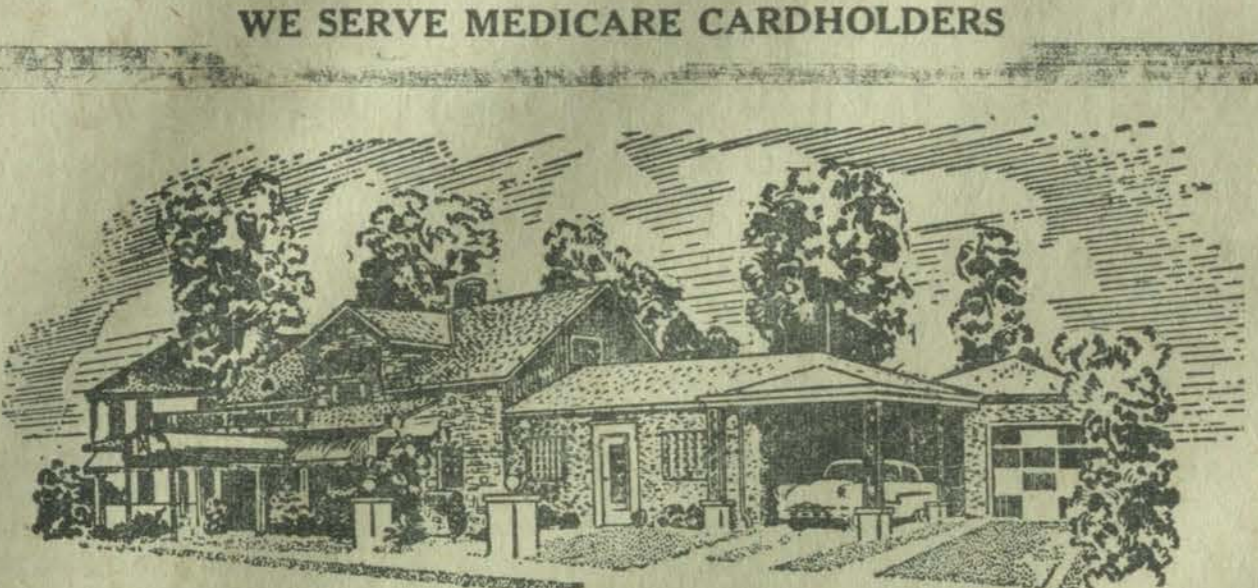

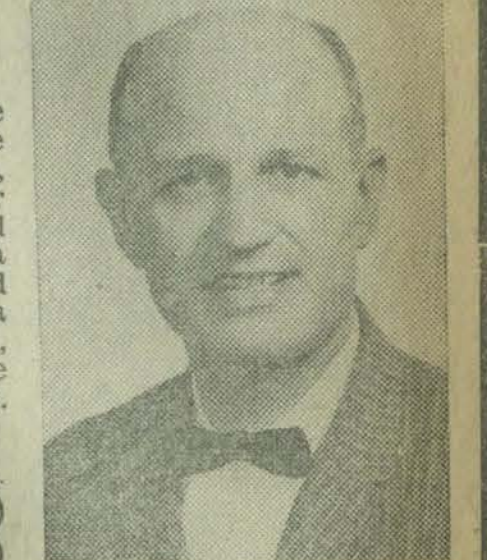

'COUNTRY HAM' PROCESS HASTENED THRU RESEARCH

When University of Kentucky researchers began their study of the curing of hams about 12 years ago, they didn't know it would mark the beginning of a multi-million dollar industry in the state.
Dr. James Kemp, UK professor of animal science, began his research with the idea of speeding up the curing process of "old country" ham. Traditionally, a rule-of-thumb was that hams take a year of curing and aging.
"No ham is worth its salt unless it has gone through the June sweat," was the feelings of 99 percent of Kentucky ham-eaters, he said.
"The idea that hams could be cured in a matter of months was suggested to me by Sam Guard, of Louisville, a former editor of the 'Breeder's Gazette,'" Dr. Kemp recalled. "We applied for a grant and got it."
"Old sayings and adages are often more truth than fiction," said Dr. Kemp as he and his associates discussed the necessity of the "June sweat" for a tender, moist ham. They questioned the fact that it had to be that particular month.
"Changes in the quality of the meat are brought about by enzymes—organic compounds which act upon proteins and fat in the meat, creating a change," Dr. Kemp explained. By injecting the ham with additional enzymes, the researchers found they could bring about changes more quickly.
Enzymes go into action during higher temperatures, he added. After killing the hogs in the fall of the year, the traditional process was to cure the meat with a mixture of salt, sugar and salt-peter. Often, molasses, pepper, and other seasonings were added.
Winter weather was ideal for keeping the pork fresh and allowing the salt to penetrate the meat. Then with the arrival of warm, humid weather, the ham would "sweat" and shrink.
"A ham has to lose moisture before the best quality of taste is reached," Dr. Kemp said. "A 20 pound ham will shrink to about 15 pounds before it has completed the aging process."
The UK scientist has found that using a 75-degree heat throughout the entire aging process and 38 to 40 degrees in the curing process generally produces the best results. By controlling the heat in the aging room, the process is speeded up by four to five months with less chances of sourness, saltiness or general spoilage.
These findings have been reported to the University's extension workers and outlines of the quicker "country-style" process are now available.
"Kentucky has approximately a dozen country ham processors currently in operation—a three million dollar industry," Dr. Kemp said. We predict this figure will double in size in the next few years.
One Western Kentucky producer, who now markets around 35,000 hams a year, is expanding his operations to produce 75,000 hams each year.
The price of old country hams always has been high, Dr. Kemp added, but the mass production of country-styled hams will lower the price per pound.
"Country-styled hams are slightly milder in taste than old country hams," the UK professor said, "but most young people and 'city' people prefer the milder taste."
The fourth annual Kentucky Country Ham Show was a feature this year of the state fair in Louisville, and all hams entered in the competition were cured and aged in Kentucky by residents of the state.
The Kentucky Department of Agriculture has a special stamp or label for hams they consider "best" in quality. Minimum

Onion and a Carrot For Viewing, Not Eating, Pay Morehead Printer

Frankfort, Ky.—What can one do with an ordinary onion and a carrot, except eat them?

William Hough, a Morehead printer, pondered that question for several weeks as he looked at two paintings, one of a carrot and one of an onion, done by Mrs. Arla Alexander, a Grayson housewife.

Besides being good paintings, Hough thought, they should have greater possibilities. There began a success story which has State Area Development officials pleasantly surprised.

According to Cliff Gordon, of the Governor's Office of Area Development, this is what developed.

Hough, who owns a four-color press, began experimenting with reproductions of the paintings, and finally successfully reproduced them on laminated wood.

He brought the finished product to officials in the Area Development Office, who, along with representatives from the State Department of Commerce, directed him to marketing consultants and distributors of such crafts in New York.

Given the go-ahead, Hough reproduced the paintings on plaques for kitchens, using laminated wood he obtained from a wood-use center at Quicksand, Kentucky.

The plaques, which sell for \$1.50 and \$2, caught on.

The first national sales in June totaled 600. In July sales climbed to 2,500 and in August they were 5,600. Sales are expected to go 10,000 this month.

Also ready to go into production are plaques for children's rooms. They will be illustrations of nursery songs.

A display of both types of plaques is on exhibit in the State Capitol rotunda in cases facing the front entrance. They join several other Kentucky produced craft items shown there.

The plaques are also being sold at four state parks: Natural Bridge near Slade; Kentucky Dam Village at Gilbertsville; Jenny Wiley near Prestonsburg and Pine Mountain at Pineville.

Hough also plans, according to Gordon, to build a shop to produce his own laminated wood. This, Gordon estimates, will employ about eight people.
