Hearing for Woman In Husband's Slaying Scheduled April 26

The two murder cases docketed for the current term of circuit court will probably be brought to trial next week, court officials said Wednesday.

Trial of Granville Crittendon, Chicagoan who is accused in the en route from Chicago to this county, is set for trial next Tuesday. An earlier trial of the case was continued when the deendant pleaded that he was unable to employ an attorney. Marshall Davidson was designated to represent Crittendon and the case was continued till his month, giving the new counsel time to prepare his case.

The second murder trial is that of Mary Lou Flannery, who is charged with the revolver slaying at Marin of her ex-husband, Merlin Flannery. Mrs. Flannery was indicted at the current court term and an early trial was set because she has been unable to execute \$15,000 bond. Her trial is docketed for Friday of next week.

Use of the milk produced by the cow presents no threat of rabies, it was said at the health department, but persons handling the cow may need anti-rabies treatment.

Report To Public Sales Last Year Were \$1,525,555

Kentucky Appalachian Industries, Inc., the "homegrown product" which is the pioneer among Floyd county manufacturing plants, told a story of progress last week through newspaper advertising and at a dinner at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State

Park, last Thursday evening. With sales of \$1,525,555 last year KAI had a gross profit for the year of \$93,656. L. E. Danielson, vice-president and general manager, said KAI now is working on a tent contract for the armed forces which will keep the West Prestonsburg plant working till the spring of 1969.

Beginning its operation here in October, 1965, KAI has paid approximately \$850,000 in salaries and wages; trained almost 300 persons who were paid an additional \$60,000 in more than \$300,000 for equipmore than 270,000 items of



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

Spending To Jump Next Fiscal Year To Over \$1 Million

Frankfort, Ky .- Airport development and expansion of other aeronautical lacilities for the state have been given a boost by the 1968-'70 executive budget. Robert W. Moore, commissioner of aeronautics, announces appropriations for the biennium are the largest for the department in its history.

The appropriations are in the sum of \$475,000 for fiscal year 1958-'69, and \$1,250,000 for the year 1969-'70.

Included for the first time since the 1950's is the earmarking of funds for airport development. Previously, the department received funds for airport development through the capital construction fund of the general oudget, Moore said.

The \$475,000 granted for the first year of the biennum includes construction of a new airport for the Lebanon-Springheld area and expansion of runways at London-Corbin, Owensrequirements.

Republication Ordinance No. 110

An Ordinance prohibiting the sweeping of trash, dumping or throwing cans or littering the Highway through the City of

SECTION 1. BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Martin, Ky., that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to dump trash, garbage, tin cans, paper or any other refuse on any public street or private or public property within the corporate limits of the City; or to burn any type of refuse at any point within the City without first taking all approved incinerators, isolated spots, absence of combustible materials that might cause fire to spread, proper weather conditions as to moisture and winds, and remaining in attendance with the fire until it is extinguished.

SECTION 2. Any person, firm or corporation convicted of violation of any provision of this Ordinance, shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 or imprisoned in the City jail for not less than five days nor more than thirty days or
