> DISEASE PROBLEM IN GARDENS

A number of diseases seem to be causing more than the formal amount of problems in nome gardens. The weather conditions have been favorable for the growth of many disease organisms this spring.

It is extremely important that gardeners do a good job of spraying or dusting for the control of both diseases and in-

Diseases are a concern when omatoes, potatoes, cucumbers, melons, beans and sweet corn powder, at two tablespoons per

cucumbers, melons and sweet corn is largely dependent on the control of flea beetles and cucumber beetles, which carry the disease from plant to plant. Use sevin or lindane on cucumbers and melons. Special dust containing on percent lindane for insects and seven percent vines begin to flower. For corn, ise DDT to control the flea beetles, and select sweet corn varieties resistant to bacterial

The DDT will also control the corn earworm if started when silks first appear and used every other day until silks wilt and turn brown. Spray or dust directly on the silks.

Beans are often infected by Rhizoctonia root and stem rot. First symptoms are wrinkling stem may turn dark and rot. At and dies. The only control is to rotate beans-do not plant them in the same area of the garden more often than every third year. 



The scientific name of the goatsuckers is taken from their big mouth, meaning literally, "cave mouth," and the whippoorwill's name of vociferous means "strong voice." The voice of the whippoorwill carries far over the silent night woods and echoes for nearly a mile along

shadowed mountains. One reason the song of this bird is so widely known, it has a habit of swooping down at dusk to the farmyard or the garden to put on its nightly show, which is equal to that of a prima donna, as the bird often circles, dances and bows while singing. A fleeting glimpse of the chuckwill and the whippoorwill is often caught at night in the glare of a car's headlights; their eyes shine in the glare like the eyes of a cat. The eyes of the whippoorwill gleam in the glare like two red coals.

The whippoorwill is also the most persistent singer of the three; it has been known to repeat its song over 1,500 times

at a single performance. The chuckwill is the "whippoorwill of the south." It is also called, "the big bat," and "chuck-will's widow," from its supposed repetition of the call. The poets say the bird is calling for "the wife of poor Willie."

The chuckwill is more man 12 inches long and its twice the bulk of the common whippoorwill. Its big mouth is more than two inches wide and it has been known to swallow sparrows, hummingbirds and other small

There is a great difference of opinion among writers and observers, too, as to what the chuckwill's song really says. The song, or call, is often heard about dusk in the southern states. It rings out loud and echoes for almost a mile over the still countryside. Most book writers and naturalists interpret the song as saying, "Chuckwill's Widow," with accent on wid."

But, there are many people in the south, as well as some writers, who declare the bird's call repeats over and over this phrase: "Chip fell outa white oak!" These claim the bird's call invariably ends with the words, "white oak." So the argument goes on. Some even claim the bird says, "Twixt hell and white oak!" But the majority of observers are agreed on the bird's call as saying, "Chuckwill's widow."
