



Mrs. Hall, herself an aide to Highway Commissioner W. B. Hazelrigg, labelled Ford as 'petty, dictatorial, self-serving and self-seeking." She also alleged that Ford had used his elected position to gain business for his Owensboro insurance

This was denied promptly and emphatically by Ford, who said the "false figures and false allegations" are a rehash of the same used by Casper Gardner, whom he defeated in a Democratic race for the state Senate. Gardner now is a Republican.

Mrs. Hall released a list of 35 performance bond policies written by Ford's firm for contractors working for the Highway Department.

Ford said "these policies are not purchased by the state" but, if a road project is involved, by the contractor.

"On the day before I took office as a state senator every smidgen of business which our agency had with the state was canceled at my request," the lieutenant governor said.

Mrs. Hall, also a Democrat, has supported former Gov. A. B. Chandler, who left his party last fall to back Gov. Louie B.

She said she was risking her \$710-a-month job by holding the news conference without the knowledge of Hazelrigg and Nunn, but said being fired would be a small price to pay for exposing Ford's true char-

Ford had said in canceling the two personal service contracts of G. B. Hall that a district highway engineer had described Hall's equipment as being in fair condition when the pact called for it to be in good

But Mrs. Hall said the engineer told her "he never inspects equipment used by contractors just checks 'fair.' "

She added that some contracts she looked over "don't even have the condition of the equipment marked." A major question, Mrs. Hall

said, is why Ford really canceled her husband's contracts. "The big reason stated was that it was not compatible for the relative of a state employee to enter into a contract with

the state," shesaid. This sounds commendable at first glance, she said, but:

"Insofar as the people of Kentucky are concerned, Mr. Ford has never shown any distaste for, nor has he canceled, any contracts with Brighton Engineering (a Frankfort firm headed by William H. May) although the owners and managers of that organization have several relatives that are employed by the state.

"On the same list of contracts as the one under discussion was one between the state and Sallie Clay . . . maiden name of Sallie Thompson, wife of a longterm (Democratic) state employee."

The list could go on and on, Mrs. Hall said, but indicates that "the only real reason . . Ford canceled this contract . . was a vindictive attempt to penalize, punish and persecute me for my failure to support him in his recent campaign."

Ford's reply was that he canceled for these four reasons: 1. The Hall equipment was at

best in "fair" condition and the contract requires "good" mechanical shape. 2. The contracts are pur-

ported to be signed by a state legal officer who has not worked for the state since April,

3. The so-called district request, part of one contract, is not signed by the district engineer as required.

4. The second contract carries no request at all from the district engineer "and both contracts were actually originated in the highway commissioner' office."





SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

The following is a sampling of some of the questions asked most frequently at the Social Security Office at Second and Division Streets, in Pikeville, according to Ronald J. King, social security field representative for Floyd, Magoftin and Johnson counties.

Q. I had a heart attack and don't believe that I will be able to return to work. I have a wife and two children. If I start drawing disability benefits will my family draw, too?

A. Yes. Your wife and children could qualify for benefits under the same conditions as if you had reached retirement

Q. I contracted an incurable disease last summer. I am 35 years of age. How many work credits will I need to qualify for disability benetits?

A. You need 20 quarters of coverage (roughly five years) which you must have earned during the 10-year period just before you became disabled. For example, if you were disabled in 1966 your five years of work credits must have been earned during the 10-year perod of 1956-1966.

Q. My husband had a stroke ast month and will not be able to return to work. When should he apply for disability benefits? A. He should file an application now. By filing early he can help us get a prompt decision

Q. I started drawing retirement benefits last year when I reached 65. I am now disabled Can I get disability payments? A. No. Disability payments are not made to a person who s 65 or over. Retirement payments are made instead.

Q. I have been drawing dis-

ability benefits for the past two years. My condition has improved and I plan to return to work. If my condition gets worse and I have to quit my job, do I have to wait six months before my disability benefits can be started back? A. No. Disability benefits are stopped when your condition has improved or you are able to return to work. Should you again become too disabled to work your disability benefits can start with the month you meet the disability requirements and the six-month waiting perod is not required.

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

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
