

Lancer Span Bids Seen During Fall

Bull Creek Route Also Gets Action

Bridge to Shoe Plant, Housing Set for Bids, Hazelrigg Announces

State Senator Clifford B. Latta said Wednesday that Commissioner of Highways W. B. Hazelrigg has set Nov. 22 as the bidding date on the bridge and approaches at Lancer.

The Department of Highways was reported this week as moving rapidly to acquire rights-of-way for the approaches to the proposed bridge to span the Big Sandy at Lancer, and bids may be asked on the project by late fall.

At the same time the department began acquiring rights-of-way for the construction of a new road up Bull Creek from the proposed bridge to Water Gap where it will connect with new US 23, now in its late planning stages.

The bridge apparently will be located as originally planned and without change in design. Property acquisition at Lancer will be extensive because of the junction of highways and a proposed change in routing Brandy Creek to eliminate a bend in the stream as it approaches confluence with the Big Sandy.

The bridge will connect the new US Shoe plant and the site of the proposed rent-subsidy building complex with the present US 23. Approval of the rent-subsidy project planned by the Prestonsburg Ministerial Association was based on the bridge construction, and the shoe company plant was built across the river from Lancer on the promise that the bridge would be built.

Presently, access to the shoe company plant is via a narrow, suspension bridge at Knotley Hollow or by the winding road down Bull Creek.

The road from the bridge to Water Gap will have a 24-foot roadway. Comparatively straight, it will depart in many places from the present route and will cross Bull Creek at certain points.

So Short the Summer... School Starts Monday

Vacation and skylarking days will end for an estimated 10,000 young Floyd countians when the county's schools open next Monday morning.

Few, if any teaching staff vacancies, exist, and all schools of the county are expected to open on schedule, it was said this week at the offices here of the Floyd County Board of Education.

The schools will operate on Daylight Saving Time. Although the beginning of morning classwork at various schools will depend on bus schedules, most schools will open at 8:30 a.m.

Although the school opening is countywide, and no hitches expected, the doors of six schools will remain closed because they have been discontinued. Students of the Upper Cow Creek and Myrtle schools will come to Prestonsburg, and those of four others—Ivy Creek, head of Little Mud, Mink Branch and Tinker Fork—will be transported to the Stumbo elementary school at Grethel and to Betsy Layne.

And children crossing the bridge at Harold will continue to do so afoot.

YOUTH CORPS IS RENEWED

\$131,260 Federal Grant Finances Another Year; Enrollees Cut to 215

Announcement was made Monday that the Department of Labor is extending the Neighborhood Youth Corps program in Floyd county schools for another year—from Aug. 19 to next June 7.

Gross cost of this program will be \$147,820, with the federal government furnishing \$131,260. The remaining \$16,560 will be provided in services by the Floyd County Board of Education.

A cut in the national budget forced the Labor Department, under whose control the NYC program operates, to cut spending in this area. As a result, it has become necessary to reduce the present number of Floyd county enrollees from 300 to 215.

Estill Hall, NYC director for the board of education, expressed regret that 85 enrollees have been temporarily suspended. He said he hopes that it will be possible soon to restore these enrollees and others.

Selection is based on family income, attendance, use of money and progress.

There are approximately 500 eligible for the NYC program in this county, but only 215 can be accepted because of the cut in funds. A waiting list exists in most schools, County Supt. Charles F. Clark said.

County Supt. Clark expressed some concern about the cost of the two projects in the light of the \$750,000 bonding limit set for the Floyd school district, some time ago. Action of the 1968 General Assembly, however, resulted in an increase in the bond potential, and this offers some encouragement, he said.

If the potential were held at \$750,000, the two structures on which bids were accepted Saturday would leave less than \$174,000 for the giant Right Beaver school, center planned at Eastern.

Cost of the gymnasium, Clark said, was originally estimated at \$250,000 to \$300,000.

The new gymnasium at Betsy Layne is planned to afford a seating capacity of 2,500. It will have a pre-stressed concrete foundation, with prefabricated concrete slabs for walls and a geodesic dome roof.

The Stumbo school addition will be of brick. Its addition to the original structure, which was completed about six years ago, will result in the closing of all one-room and two-room schools in the entire Mud Creek watershed.

A graduate of Bristol high school, McClellan played in the defensive backfield for UK despite his lack of left in the

One Murder Trial Booked for Term

The Floyd circuit court will go to work, the day after Labor Day (Sept. 3), on a criminal docket which includes one murder case and two in which defendants are charged with manslaughter.

The murder trial expected to be held during the term is that of Ballard Cable, accused of the Mud Creek slaying of Howard Tackett. Cable remains in jail here, unable to execute bond.

One of the two charged with manslaughter is Larry Howard, Greenup countian who has admitted he was the driver of the auto which figured in the deaths of Mrs. Elder Wright and her two daughters in a wreck near here. He has not yet been indicted, but the case is expected to be one of the first to be considered by the grand jury.

The second manslaughter case is that of Clyde Sword, Jr., who is accused in the auto death of Elsie Moore at Harold.

But Bridge Across Big Sandy At Harold Runs into Delay

The bridge at Harold which links US 23 with the Mud Creek valley is the only Floyd county span numbered among the 185 bridges in the state listed by the Highway Department as in need of repair or replacement.

Yet the Floyd bridge apparently is months away from contract. This situation prevails, despite these facts:

1. The need of its replacement was recognized, immediately after a section of the span collapsed last year.

2. Both candidates for the office of governor—Henry Ward and Louie B. Nunn—promised its construction.

3. Plans were made and a hearing held on the proposed new span.

4. Sentiment for the bridge was unanimous, regardless of politics, especially so when school children were required to leave their school buses and walk across the bridge, then board buses again after the vehicles had crossed, unloaded.

But, with the bridge well on the way toward a contract, a move was initiated to get it relocated downstream from the site originally selected. That brought on a new engineering study, which is not yet complete. When it is complete, a second hearing will be required. Then the wait for a final decision, final plans and advertising.

Plans were made and a hearing held on the proposed new span.

The OEO grant is being made to the Big Sandy Community Council, with direction of the big project in the hands of Dr. Russell L. Hall, of Prestonsburg, Floyd county health officer.

Headquartered here in the Floyd County Health Department building, the program will soon increase the number of its outposts from two to six. It is through these outposts, strategically located, that needed health services are reached.

Each of the two existing outposts has, and the four new ones to be established will have, a staff consisting of a clerk and four home aides. Each will be visited periodically by specialists, and Dr. Joanna Maiden, medical consultant, will also visit the outposts to make decisions about the needs of individual patients for hospitalization or special treatment.

The program is devoted to the medical care of persons below the poverty level. Dr. Hall explained, adding, "And there are more of them than many think."

Arrangements are made with local private physicians and dentists to assure that continuous, comprehensive care is available to all low-income residents. Those needing hospital treatment are afforded it.

Jack Justice, 72-year-old retired railway worker, of Paintsville, native of Floyd county, died last Thursday at a Paintsville hospital.

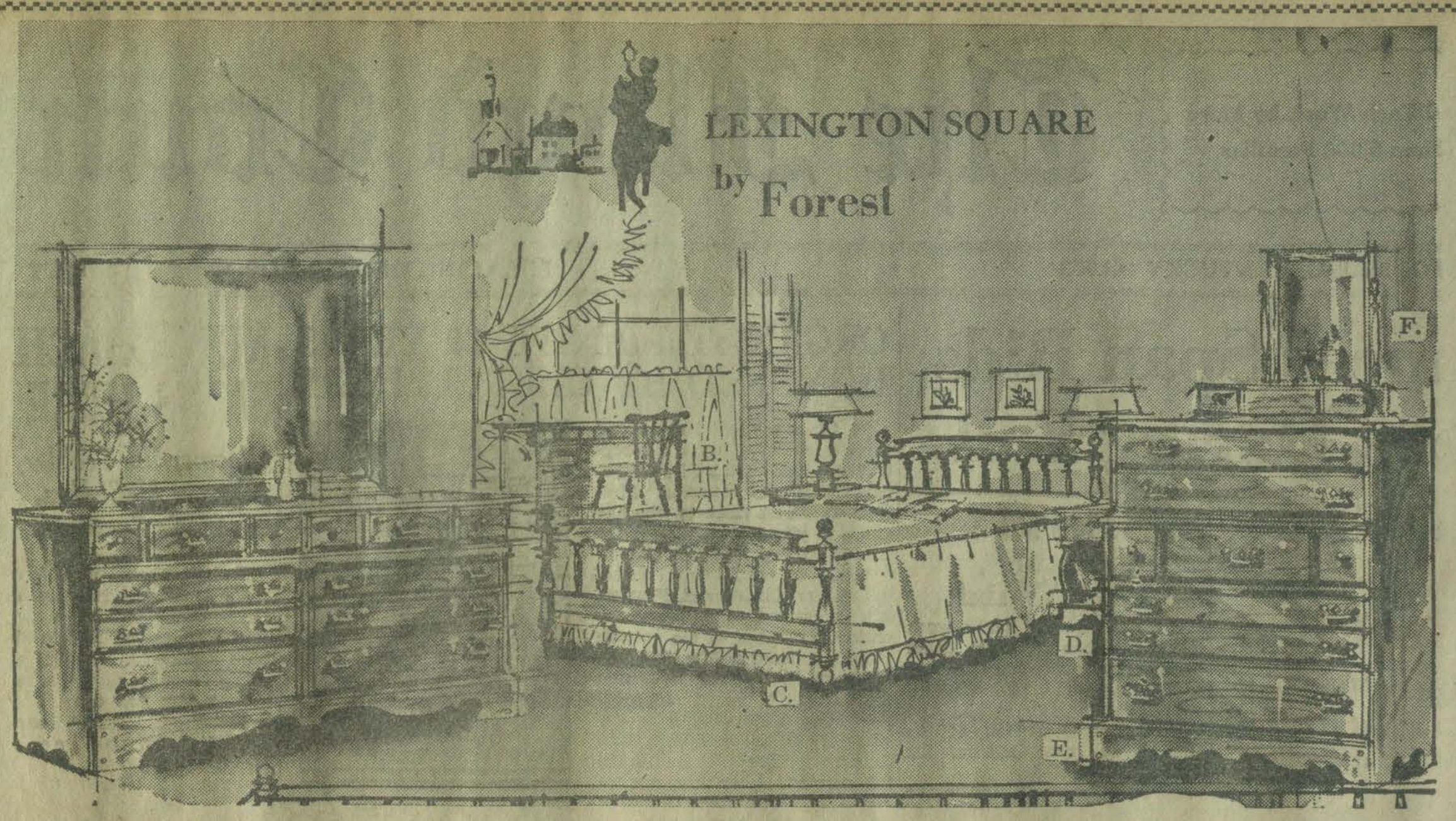

Estimated repair costs total \$5 million and replacement costs range from \$100,000 to \$1 million per bridge.

Money for such a repair and replacement program is not available but the Highway Department told Gov. Louie Nunn all the bridges are safe for travel at posted weight limits. None is in danger of collapsing, a department spokesman said, unless the posted weight limits are exceeded.

"It's seldom a bridge ever collapses from old age," the spokesman said. "The trouble comes when they (truckers and motorists) don't observe the weight limits."

The department's report to Nunn resulted from a statewide bridge inspection program undertaken on his orders after the collapse last December of a bridge over the Ohio River at Pt. Pleasant, W. Va., in which 46 persons died.

Subsequently, the Highway Department imposed new truck-spacing and load limits on all bridges over the Ohio River between Kentucky and its neighboring states.

Tighter controls in issuing permits for overweight and oversize vehicles on certain bridges also were put into effect and a program was launched to update data on bridge conditions.

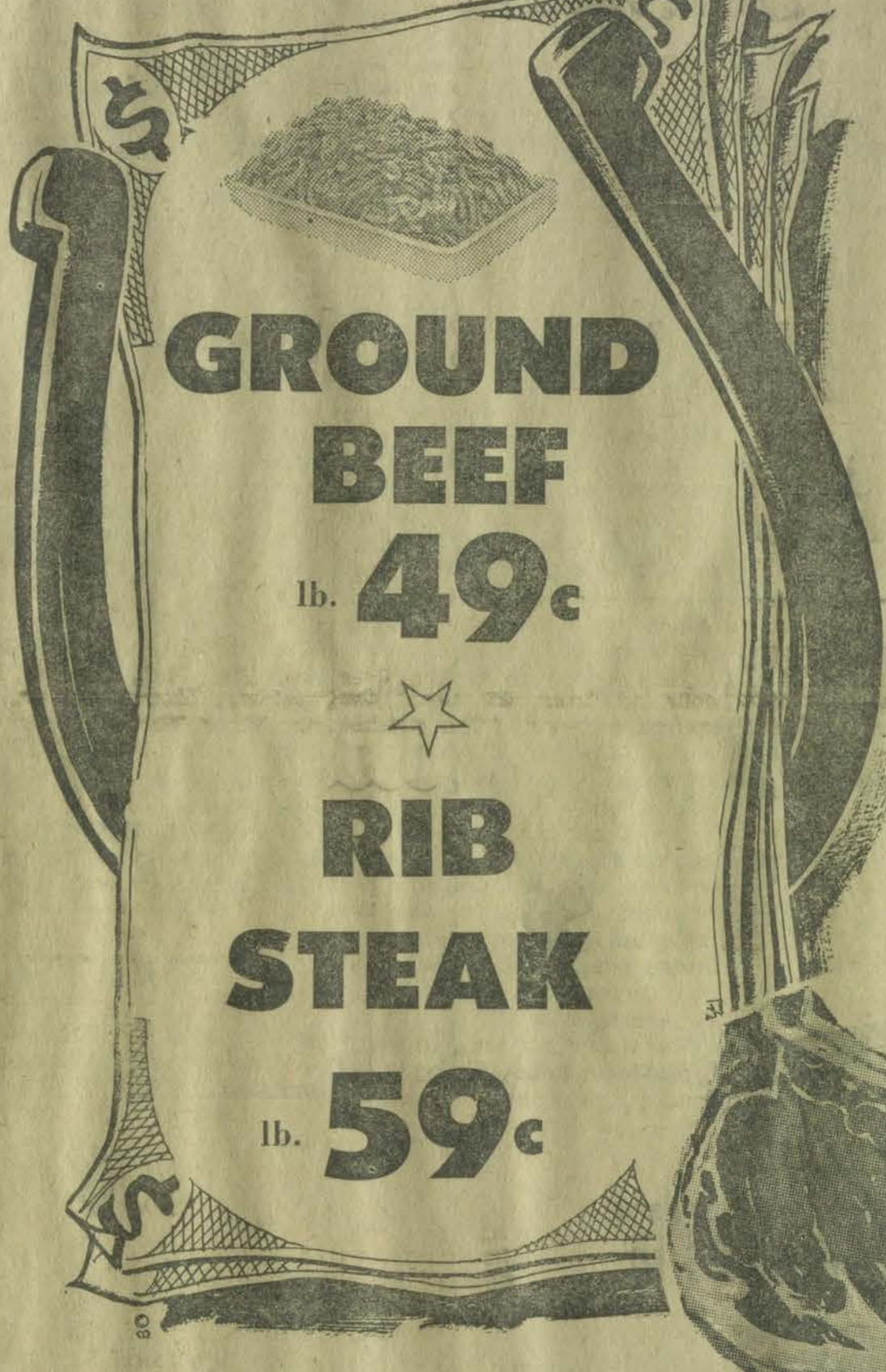

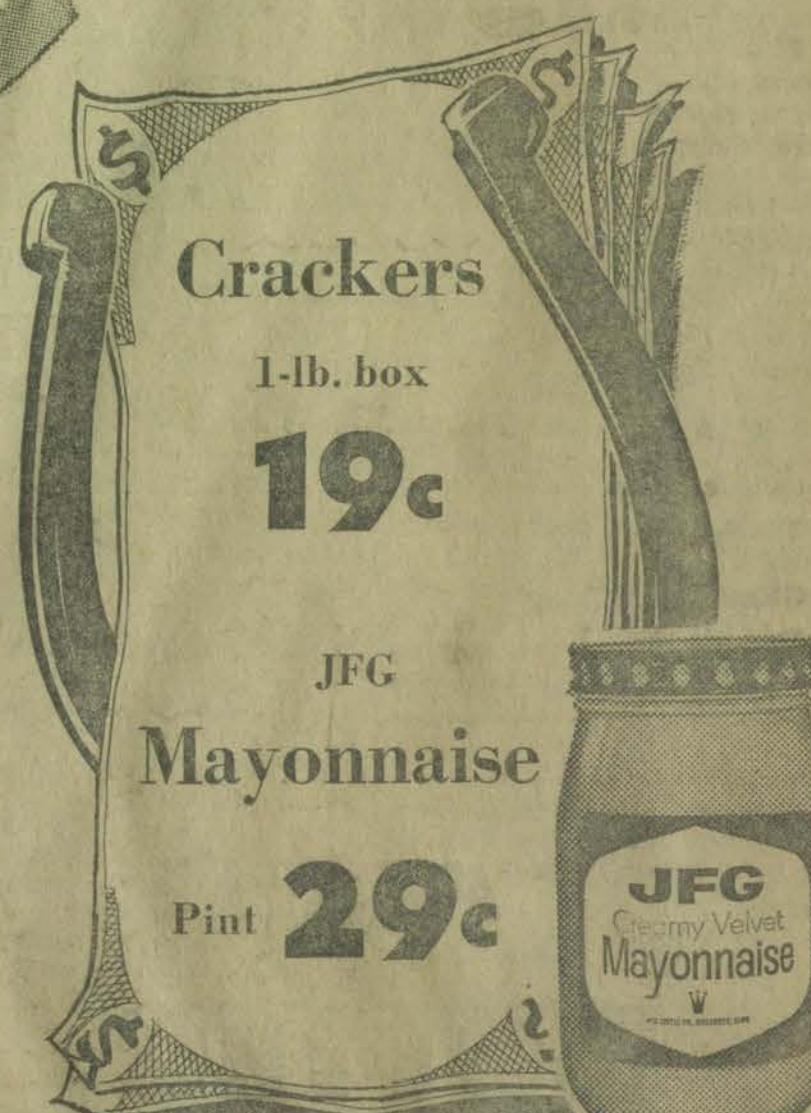

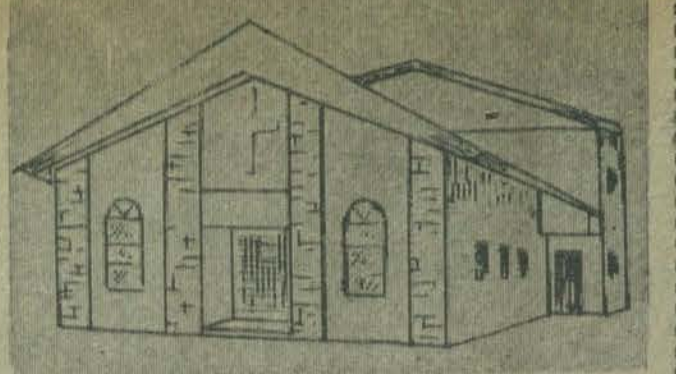
Paintsville To Get Grant of \$64,679 For Survey, Plans

Paintsville, Ky. (AP) — A federal grant to plan an urban renewal project here was announced Monday by Kentucky Congressman Carl Perkins.
 Perkins said in a telegram that the Department of Housing and Urban Renewal has approved \$64,679 for survey and planning of the Peach Street urban renewal project. The area to be cleared and redeveloped covers six to seven city blocks and contains 107 buildings.
 Funds for actual redevelopment have not been approved.

Development Office Asks \$242,424 for Alice Lloyd

The Kentucky Program Development Office last week requested the Appalachian Regional Commission's approval of a \$242,424 grant for Alice Lloyd College's proposed science building.
 Approval was also requested for three other ARC education grants: a Pikeville College science building request for \$380,172 and two applications of \$320,000 each for a vocational extension center at Tompkinsville in Monroe county and a vocational extension school at Liberty in Casey county.
 The Pippa Passes college presently holds \$272,166 in federal and foundation grants for the new science building. The Higher Education Financing Authority has granted the college \$116,166 under Title I while the Louis Calder and Winfield Baird Foundations have allotted \$156,000. All funds, however, are contingent upon the ARC's approval of partially matching funds.
 The new building will have "open" laboratories housing all scientific disciplines. Stock and preparation areas will be adjacent to the laboratory for easy access to supplies and equipment. Specialized areas will be provided for reading, study of radio-isotopes, and specially controlled experiments.
 Conference and seminar rooms will be designed for small groups to formally discuss laboratory work, present project results, and elaborate on laboratory content and methods. An auditorium will be used for lectures and audio-visual presentations. Offices for faculty will be made available.
 Kentucky Program Development officials expect "imminent approval" by the ARC for the Alice Lloyd College funding.

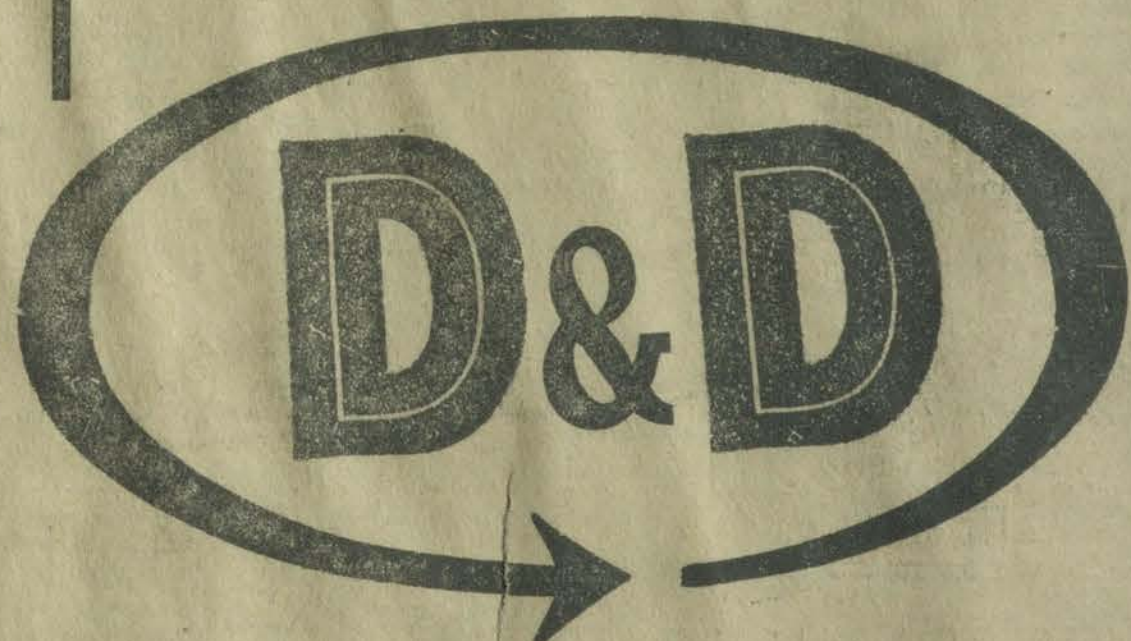

MRS. HALL SCORES LT. GOVERNOR FORD

Mrs. Ann B. Hall, former Floyd county woman, called a news conference at Frankfort recently to voice a highly critical commentary on the action

of Lt. Gov. Wendell Ford in cancelling her husband's \$91,600 highway equipment rental contract with the Kentucky Highway Department.

Mrs. Hall, herself an aide to Highway Commissioner W. B. Hazelrigg, labeled Ford as "petty, dictatorial, self-serving and self-seeking." She also alleged that Ford had used his elected position to gain business for his Owensboro insurance firm.

This was denied promptly and emphatically by Ford, who said the "false figures and false allegations" are a rehash of the same used by Casper Gardner, whom he defeated in a Democratic race for the state Senate. Gardner now is a Republican.

Mrs. Hall released a list of 35 performance bond policies written by Ford's firm for contractors working for the Highway Department.

Ford said "these policies are not purchased by the state" but, if a road project is involved, by the contractor.

"On the day before I took office as a state senator every smidgen of business which our agency had with the state was canceled at my request," the lieutenant governor said.

Mrs. Hall, also a Democrat, has supported former Gov. A. B. Chandler, who left his party last fall to back Gov. Louie B. Nunn.

She said she was risking her \$710-a-month job by holding the news conference without the knowledge of Hazelrigg and Nunn, but said being fired would be a small price to pay for exposing Ford's true character.

Ford had said in canceling the two personal service contracts of G. B. Hall that a district highway engineer had described Hall's equipment as being in fair condition when the pact called for it to be in good condition.

But Mrs. Hall said the engineer told her "he never inspects equipment used by contractors on highway jobs and always just checks 'fair.'"

She added that some contracts she looked over "don't even have the condition of the equipment marked."

A major question, Mrs. Hall said, is why Ford really canceled her husband's contracts. "The big reason stated was that it was not compatible for the relative of a state employee to enter into a contract with the state," she said.

This sounds commendable at first glance, she said, but:

"Insofar as the people of Kentucky are concerned, Mr. Ford has never shown any distaste for, nor has he canceled, any contracts with Brighton Engineering (a Frankfort firm headed by William H. May) although the owners and managers of that organization have several relatives that are employed by the state.

"On the same list of contracts as the one under discussion was one between the state and Sallie Clay... maiden name of Sallie Thompson, wife of a long-term (Democratic) state employee."

The list could go on and on, Mrs. Hall said, but indicates that "the only real reason... Ford canceled this contract... was a vindictive attempt to penalize, punish and persecute me for my failure to support him in his recent campaign."

Ford's reply was that he canceled for these four reasons:

1. The Hall equipment was at best in "fair" condition and the contract requires "good" mechanical shape.

2. The contracts are purported to be signed by a state legal officer who has not worked for the state since April, 1966.

3. The so-called district request, part of one contract, is not signed by the district engineer as required.

4. The second contract carries no request at all from the district engineer "and both contracts were actually originated in the highway commissioner's office."

Mrs. Hall said she endorses Nunn's view that if Ford has any evidence of wrongdoing, he must under his responsibilities prosecute.

"I believe this to be one example," she said, "where windy Wendell has three alternatives: (1) prosecute; (2) be prosecuted; (3) admit that he is wrong."

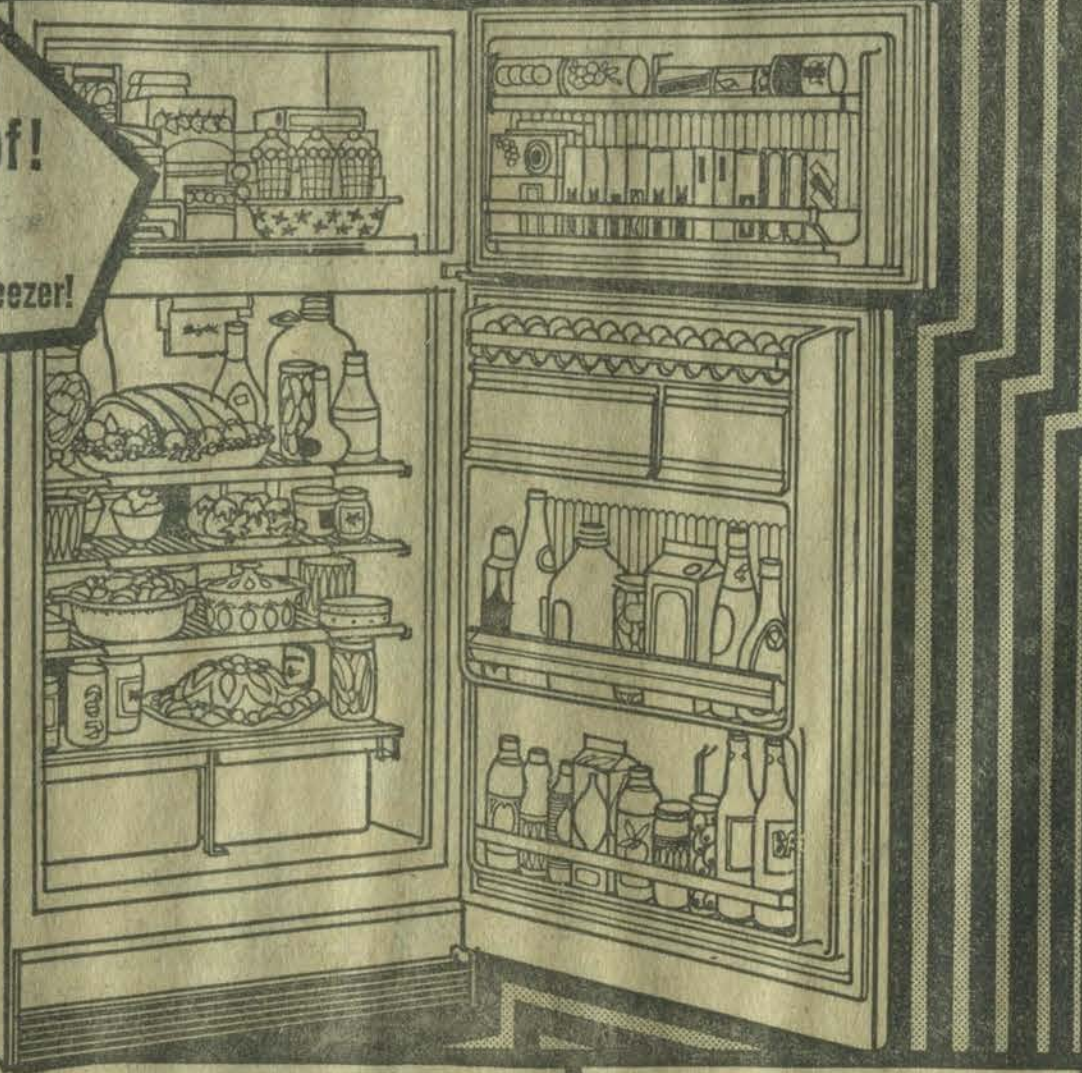

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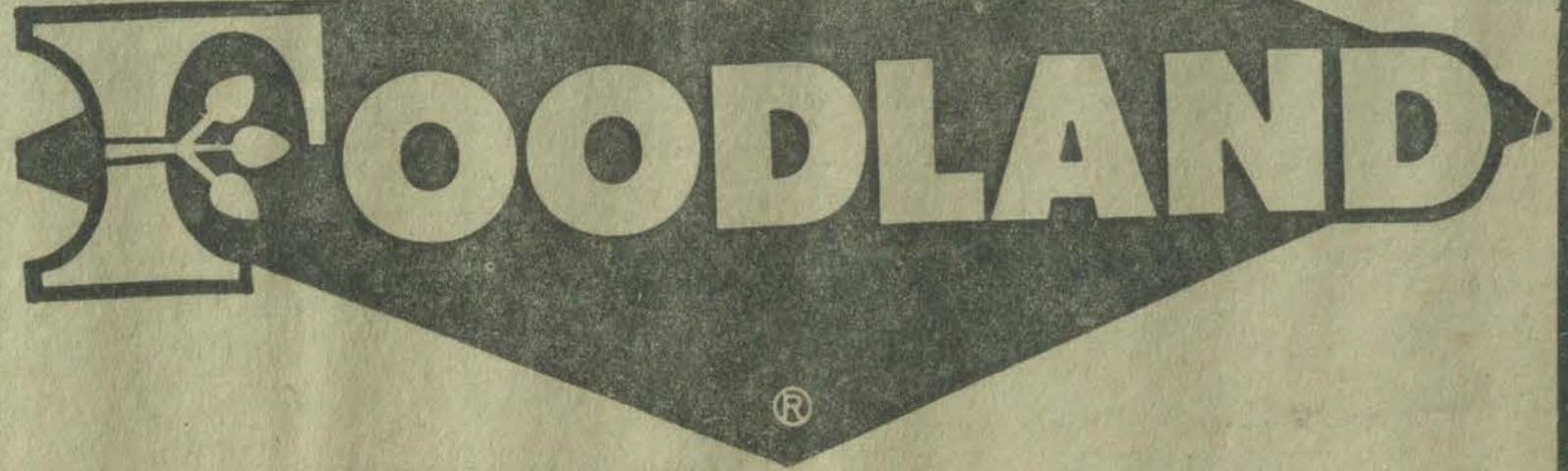

BOY SCOUT COUNCIL TELLS 2-PHASE, LONG-RANGE PLAN

A long-range plan adopted by Lonesome Pine Council, Boy Scouts of America, at a recent executive board meeting envisions increasing the number of boys served by Scouting in the 13-county council (10 in southeastern Kentucky and three in western Virginia) from less than 2,000 boys to more than 3,600 by 1973, and nearly 6,300 by 1978.

One phase of the plan calls for division of the Council into four districts and the employment of a district executive for each district. These men, along with the Council executive, will provide an executive staff of five men. At present there is a Council executive and two district executives. While there is no time limit on this phase, hopefully it will be completed by 1970. Phase two will begin as soon as phase one is completed. During the second phase the districts will be again realigned to provide for seven districts, each of which will have a district executive.

The plan was presented by J. M. Wood, of Pikeville, chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee. Other members of the committee are Odell Keene, Pikeville; Gary Osborne, Pikeville; Paul Price, Paintsville; H. R. Flanagan, Pikeville, and Dick Stal, Prestonsburg.

The basic need of the Lonesome Pine Council, according to Mr. Wood and his committee, is improved service and training to the districts and Scouting units (Cub Pack, Boy Scout Troop and Explorer Post). "But this cannot be accomplished without expanding the staff to the levels recommended in the long range plan," Wood said.

Other recommendations in the plan included improvements at Camp Shawnee, and updating office and training equipment. "This all costs money," Wood pointed out. The annual budget will increase from the

present \$50,000 annually to \$84,000 at the end of Phase One and \$180,000 by the end of Phase Two.

"While this seems like a lot of money," Wood said, "the real question is, are we interested enough in our children to see the boys of our area are provided a quality Scouting program. I think we can do it. I think we must."

The Southern Belles, of Paintsville, called off last week's game with Prestonsburg, and the Prestonsburg women are still hoping for a meeting with them.

Opening volleys of Kentucky's fall hunt were fired Monday when squirrels became legal targets in the longest season for any species of wildlife. This year, hunters will have 122 days in which to hunt the elusive bushytail which, the Department of Fish and Wildlife reports, has become more numerous in all sections of Kentucky, the past few years.

Biologists say this is due to an abundant food supply. Both the fox squirrel, sometimes erroneously called the red squirrel in Kentucky, and the grey squirrel will be targets of two different types of hunting this year. In the Blue Grass area, the supply of fox squirrels is good, especially where there are good den trees, wildlife authorities say, and note, "they'll probably be taken by a stalking hunter using a rifle."

The squirrel has become second only to rabbits as prey sought by hunters of the state. Wildlife biologists say surveys have projected harvests of over two million in recent years and this season should produce an equally good yield.

Because of heavy foliage biologists say hunting will be better later in the season than in the opening weeks.

The limits are six per day, with 12 in possession after two or more days of hunting. The possession limit does not mean a hunter may have a dozen squirrels in his possession while hunting. He may not have more than six, but he may transport a dozen legally.

The season will continue through September and October and then will be closed until No-

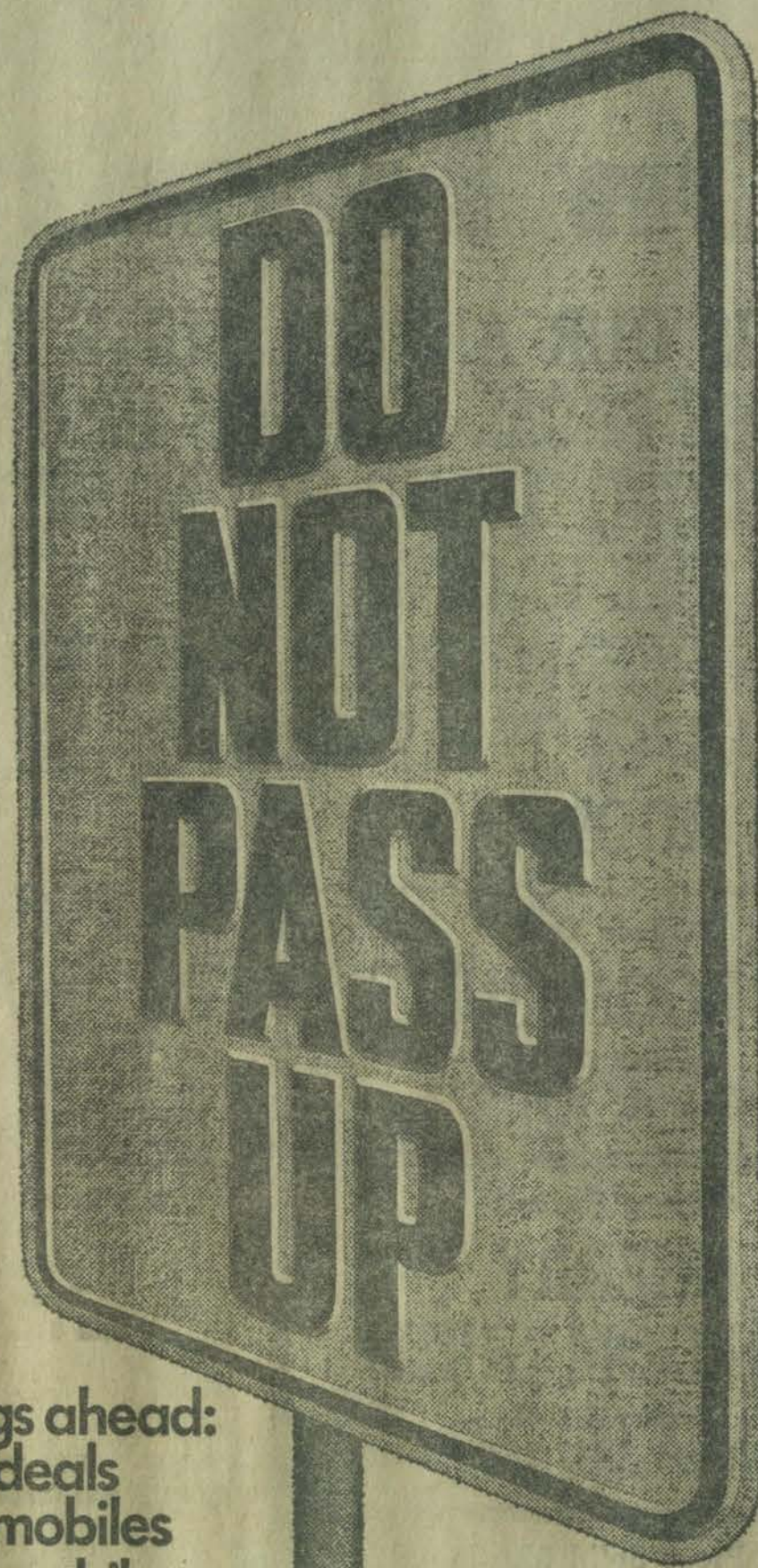

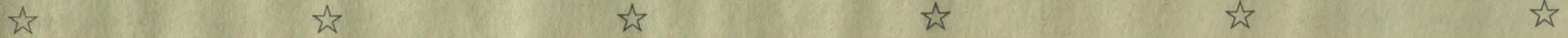

ROAD CHIEF TELLS RURAL ROAD PLANS

Announcing state rural road programs for Floyd county this week, Commissioner of Highways William B. Hazelrigg said the county has been apportioned \$292,245.15 for the new fiscal year.

These funds are under the Rural Secondary Program, which is financed with two cents of the seven-cents-a-gallon motor fuels tax.

The Floyd county program approved for this year by Hazelrigg includes:

Grade, drain and traffic-bound surfacing of 2.6 miles of KY 2030, 2.1 miles of KY 1100 and one mile of KY 306; grade, drain and bituminous surfacing of 1.5 miles of KY 1929, two miles of KY 122, three miles of the Hen Pen Branch road, one

mile of the Tinker Fork Road, three miles of the Arkansas Creek Road and two miles of the Stephens Branch Road; and maintenance of the 106.2 miles of Rural Secondary System roads in the county.

Under the County Road Aid Program, Floyd county has been apportioned \$128,647.90 for the 1968-'69 year. This money comes out of \$12 million appropriated by the General Assembly from the State Road Fund to help counties maintain their own roads.

According to the agreement for this year between the Department of Highways and the fiscal court, the department will furnish supervision, labor, materials and equipment for the maintenance of 132.4 miles and improvement of two miles of Floyd county roads. Five bridges will also be maintained during the fiscal year.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

The following is a sampling of some of the questions asked most frequently at the Social Security Office at Second and Division Streets, in Pikeville, according to Ronald J. King, social security field representative for Floyd, Magoffin and Johnson counties.

Q. I had a heart attack and don't believe that I will be able to return to work. I have a wife and two children. If I start drawing disability benefits will my family draw, too?

A. Yes. Your wife and children could qualify for benefits under the same conditions as if you had reached retirement age.

Q. I contracted an incurable disease last summer. I am 35 years of age. How many work credits will I need to qualify for disability benefits?

A. You need 20 quarters of coverage (roughly five years) which you must have earned during the 10-year period just before you became disabled. For example, if you were disabled in 1966 your five years of work credits must have been earned during the 10-year period of 1956-1966.

Q. My husband had a stroke last month and will not be able to return to work. When should he apply for disability benefits?

A. He should file an application now. By filing early he can help us get a prompt decision on his claim.

Q. I started drawing retirement benefits last year when I reached 65. I am now disabled. Can I get disability payments?

A. No. Disability payments are not made to a person who is 65 or over. Retirement payments are made instead.

Q. I have been drawing disability benefits for the past two years. My condition has improved and I plan to return to work. If my condition gets worse and I have to quit my job, do I have to wait six months before my disability benefits can be started back?

A. No. Disability benefits are stopped when your condition has improved or you are able to return to work. Should you again become too disabled to work your disability benefits can start with the month you meet the disability requirements and the six-month waiting period is not required.

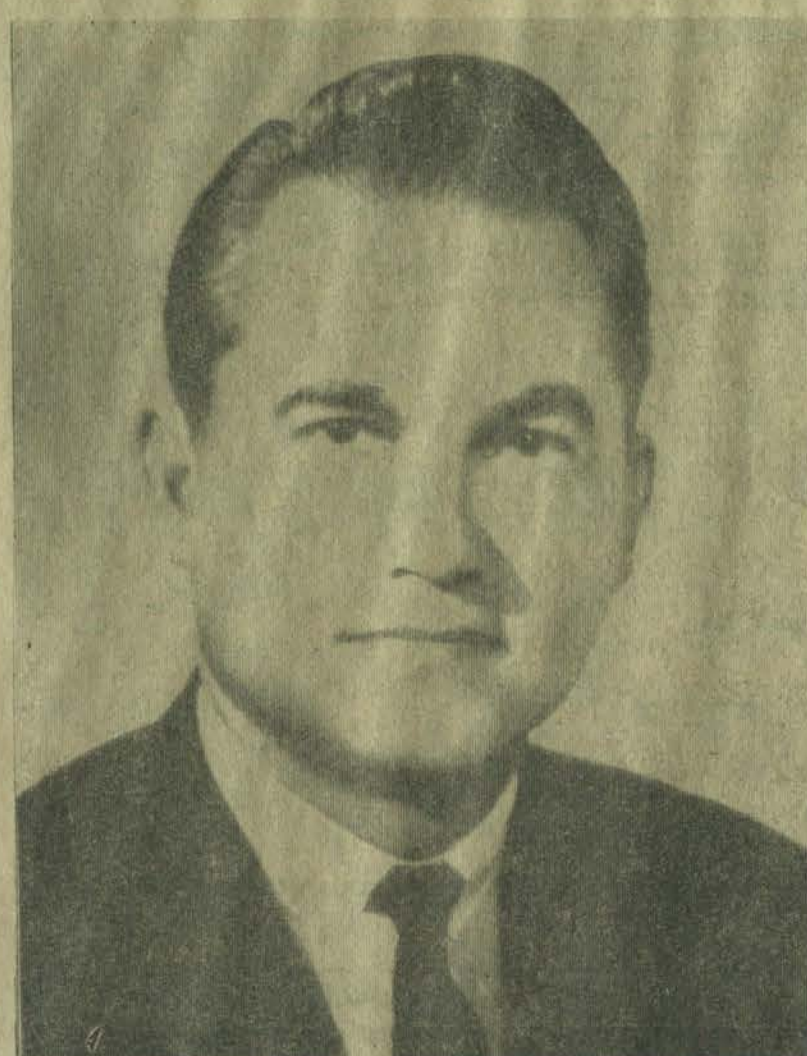

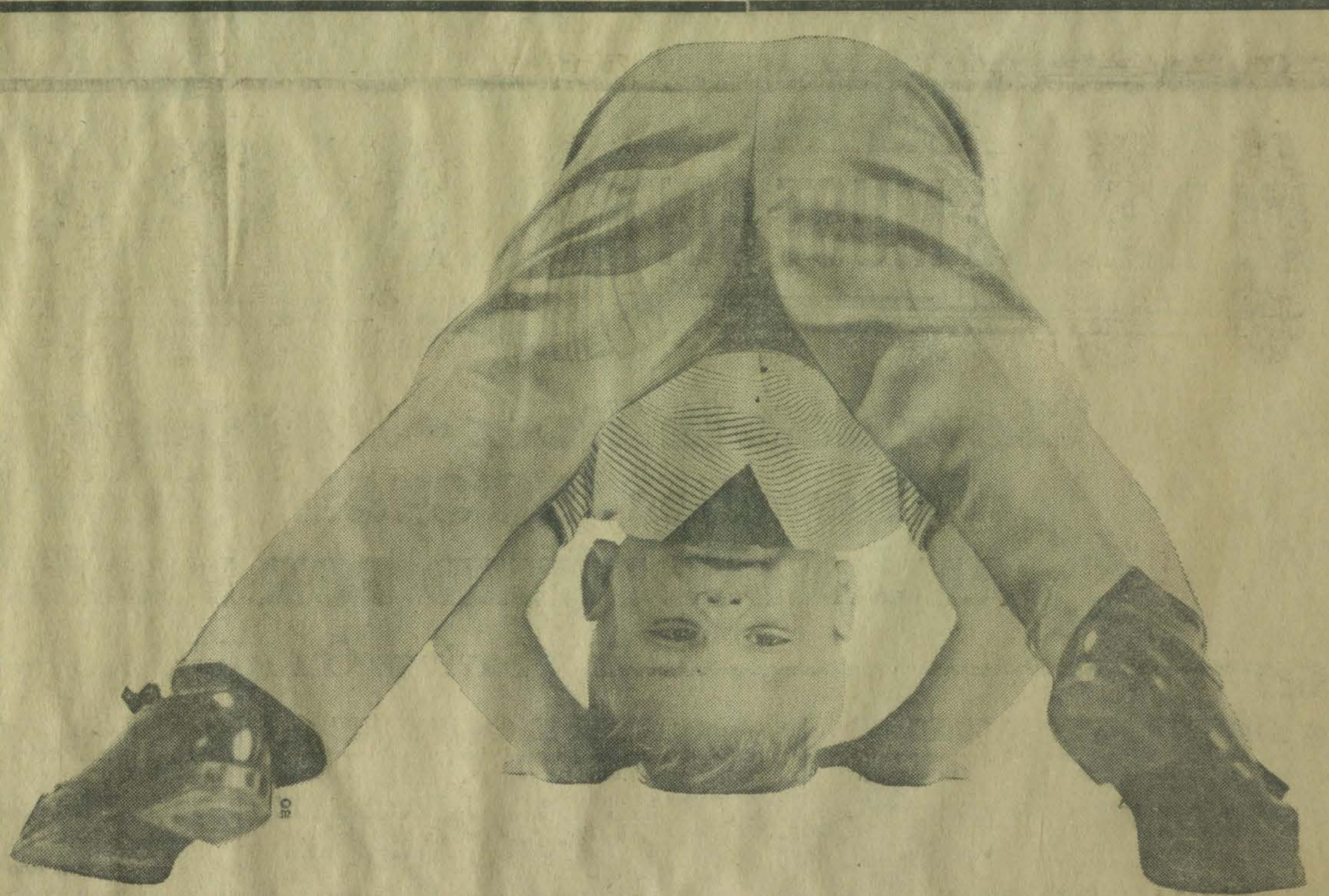
