\$1.6 Million Set For Floyd School

State Gives OK on Work At Eastern

December Bidding Seen On Rt. Beaver School; Meade Bids Approved

The State Department of Education's Division of Finance and the Division of Buildings and Grounds last Wednesday did more than approve contracts for the construction of the Betsy Layne gym and an addition to the Stumbo elementary school.

The state agencies gave the Floyd County Board of Education the go-ahead on the proposed Right Beaver school center at Eastern, with the spending ceiling for that project set at \$1.6 million.

Both Supt. Charles F. Clark and George Lee Shannon, architect, immediately predicted that a contract will be let on the school at Eastern by Dec. 1. Though admitting unforeseen circumstances could delay the work, Clark said, "There is a possibility we can beat that time schedule."

The contract must be awarded by February in order to benefit from \$300,000 of Title I funds expected to go into the big undertaking. Of this total, \$200,000 remains from last year. This year's apportionment is only \$100,000 of the retrenchment in federal spending. The remaining \$1.3 million will be financed by the sale of bonds. The Division of Finance anticipates no financing difficulties.

Prater's Camper Gains Interest of Motor Firm

Charles Prater, of Clewiston, Fla., ended a visit back home in Floyd county last week to go to Toledo, Ohio, to negotiate with manufacturers of the Jeep a contract for the motor firm to manufacture, and market a camper on which he has a patent pending.

Prater's camper has a Jeep as the integral part of the outfit which may be assembled in 13 minutes or disassembled in the same time to revert to a conventional four-wheel-drive vehicle.

The complete unit, which will sleep four adults and which includes a sink, gas stove, wash basin, folding table, seats, a small refrigerator, connections for an electric fan and room for a television or radio set, may sell for less than \$2,000, Prater said.

New Site for Span Spurned by State

When the bridge spanning the Big Sandy at Harold is built, it will be built on the site originally selected for it, a Department of Highways spokesman indicated at Frankfort, this week.

Discussing the bridge, he said: "A new location was suggested, and engineers made a survey, causing a delay in the state's original plans. Their study shows that the new location is not feasible."

The original site selected for the span, and on which a hearing was held, is practically alongside the present bridge. The other site suggested was downstream, approximately halfway between Harold and nearby Betsy Layne.

The bridge, which will cost more than \$500,000, is in the final stages of design. Bids are expected to be asked, sometime around the first of next year.

Meanwhile, the damaged span continues in use for one-way traffic. Despite load limitations, heavily loaded trucks use it. School buses transporting pupils from or to the Mud Creek area served by KY 979 will continue to unload at one end of the bridge, pass over unloaded, then reload at the other end.

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DEATH TAKES 4 IN FAMILY

Elder Wright Victim Here Only Few Weeks After Highway Tragedy

The death Saturday at the Prestonsburg General hospital of Elder Kane Wright, 64-year-old Prestonsburg barber, was the fourth in that tragedy-ridden family within the past two months.

He succumbed to a heart attack. His wife and two daughters, Mrs. Maggie Wright, Mrs. Brenda Crum and Teresa Kay Wright, were fatally injured in an auto accident, June 27.

Born June 10, 1904 at Water Gap, Mr. Wright was the son of Andrew Jackson and Martha Willis Wright.

Survivors include two sons, Gary and Ronald Wright, both of Water Gap, and five daughters, Peggy, Sharon and Mary Wright, all at home, Mrs. Coleen Griffith, of Allen, and Mrs. Sue Watson, of San Francisco, California.

Funeral rites were conducted at 1 p.m. Tuesday from the Irene Cole Memorial Baptist Church here, the pastor, the Rev. W. D. Jagers, officiating. Burial was made in the Wright cemetery at Water Gap under the direction of Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

COURT VOTES REPAIR WORK

Air-Conditioning Job, Court Term In Race; County To File Action

A Lexington firm began a battle against time here Wednesday as it started repair work on the heat pump at the Floyd county courthouse in an attempt to get air-conditioning back into the building in time for the opening of the circuit court term, September 3.

The courthouse has been without air-conditioning and with 90-degree temperatures in some of its offices since a motor in the cooling system burned out during the power failure here, Aug. 6. If the repair work is not completed in time, the court opening will in all probability be delayed.

The fiscal court at its meeting Tuesday contracted with the K-Service, Lexington, to do the repair job at a cost not to exceed, \$5,500. In other action the court authorized County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill to file suit for judgment against the River City Construction Co., Inc., for damages to streets and roads resulting from laying of water lines for the Sandy Valley Water District in the upper section of the county.

The court voted a \$50-a-month salary for Sam Henry Fitzpatrick, new county road foreman, bringing his pay to \$475 a month. A \$25 increase voted at the same meeting brought the salary of Opal Conn, bookkeeper for the road department, to \$225 a month.

DEWEY GETS FIFTH 'DOSE'

Last '68 Fertilizing Completed Tuesday; 39-Ton Total Added

Personnel of the Division of Fish and Game made Tuesday the fifth and last application of fertilizer for Dewey Lake for the year. It was the second consecutive year of fertilization of the impoundment, largest in the state ever to be so treated.

Tuesday's application made a total of 78,500 pounds of fertilizer added to the lake this year. The overall cost was \$4,992. Bernard Carter, director of the Division of Fish and Game, headed the work at the lake.

Fishermen report a marked improvement in fishing, and they credit the addition of fertilizer to the impoundment with better catches of black and white bass and crappie. Trolling for white bass has been especially productive in the last two weeks, and some good catches of black bass have been reported.

A move to induce the U. S. Corps of Engineers to hold the lake through the winter at its present conservation level was reported this week, and it was (See Story No. 7, Page 4)

Immunization Clinic Scheduled at Bypro

The Floyd County Health Department and the Floyd County Comprehensive Health Services Program will jointly sponsor an immunization clinic at Bypro, next Monday.

The clinic will be held in the health trailer at the Osborne elementary school from 10 a.m. till noon.

A nurse from the health department will give shots to babies and children who have not started or completed their immunizations, and to adults who would like to get their tetanus or smallpox shots. Children under 12 years of age may also receive their free measles shots.

6 Floyd Road Jobs Go To Adams Firm On Bid of \$136,500

Commissioner of Highways William B. Hazelrigg announced last week that a contract for bituminous surfacing on a group of projects in Floyd county has been awarded to the Adams Construction Corp., Pikeville.

The projects include 1.4 miles of the Tinker Fork road, 2.9 miles of the Arkansas Creek road, two miles of the Martin-Prestonsburg road, 1.8 miles of the Hen Pen Branch road, 2.3 miles of the Stevens Branch road, and 1.5 miles of KY 1929.

Adams submitted the low bid of \$136,500.35.

Floyd Group Files Action At Pikeville

Suit Claims County Is Unequally Divided, Calls for Mandamus

A suit seeking a mandamus to require redistricting of Floyd county's five educational divisions was filed in U. S. district court at Pikeville Tuesday by 38 residents of the county.

The federal court action was a sequel to the unsuccessful move for redistricting made recently before the State Board of Education by J. M. (Toodles) Wells, former Prestonsburg high school faculty member.

Under attack is the redistricting job done 10 years, or more, ago. The suit asks a new division of educational districts to comply with the One-Man, One-Vote decision made by the U. S. Supreme Court. It claims that the unequal distribution of voters extends to magisterial districts and was reflected in the November, 1967 election in this way:

In Magisterial District No. 1, 4,412 votes were cast, while the highest vote cast in any other district was 2,700, with the average for the three remaining districts standing at 2,600.

City, Paid on Loss, Studies Bldg. Plan

The City of Prestonsburg last week settled its suit to collect insurance on its fire-ravaged city hall and officials now are considering a more central location for a new building which may house all city offices and departments.

The suit against the Insurance Company of North America was dismissed upon payment of \$55,000—\$54,000 for the face value of the policy and \$1,000 for loss of rentals in the old structure.

City Council voted last Thursday to hold in escrow the insurance money against the time when a municipal building can be erected on a new site, Mayor George P. Archer said several sites will be considered. Meanwhile, city offices are temporarily housed in the Ford building.

HORSE SHOW PLANS TOLD

Aug. 31 Event's Purse To Total \$700; Classes Listed for Park Show

National Bar Examiners Name Francis Chm.-Elect

Floyd Plans Fight On Blanket Raise

County officials reacted quickly this week to the decision of the State Revenue Department to impose a blanket assessment increase on two types of property, and they plan a last-ditch fight against the raise.

The revenue department set the raises at 20 percent on farm and residential rural non-farm properties, and 10 percent on all other real estate, excluding oil rights.

"We're going to appeal to the revenue department, and if that fails we will take our case to the Franklin circuit court," County Judge Henry Stumbo said.

County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill was authorized by the fiscal court in a special meeting called Tuesday by Judge Stumbo to head the legal fight for the county. "We will fight this with every legal means we can muster," Sturgill commented.

Both Stumbo and Sturgill pointed out that a blanket raise, even though the tax rate will have to be adjusted so that there will be no overall increase in tax receipts over last year's total, will work an injustice on taxpayers who have given in a fair assessment of their holdings. These, it was pointed out,

will be assessed at more than 100 percent fair cash value, while those assessed too low will still not be assessed enough if the Department of Revenue increase stands unchanged.

Said Judge Stumbo: "I feel that the Tax Commissioner did not do a good job in this assessment. I advised him several months ago about what might happen."

Stumbo said the Department of Revenue credited the county with exonerations made. "It was the reductions made on assessments that caused the situation," he added.

"It's true," the County Attorney said, "there will be no increase in the tax dollar returns to the county or the state, but the ordered blanket raise will penalize honest people who have registered their property at its 100 percent evaluation while others have not."

Before ordering the blanket raise, the Department of Revenue reviewed the 1968 assessment and compared it with records of property sales over a two-year period in an effort to effect equalization at fair cash value as required by the state constitution and the 1965 ruling of the Court of Appeals. At first, the department proposed raises of 25 percent on farm and residential rural non-farm property and 15 percent on other real estate.

The reduction to 20 percent and 10 percent was credited to arguments presented by Floyd officials at a hearing held July 18 at Frankfort. They pointed out that Floyd county has had three tax commissioners in a period of three years and that the present commissioner has not had time to do his job properly. 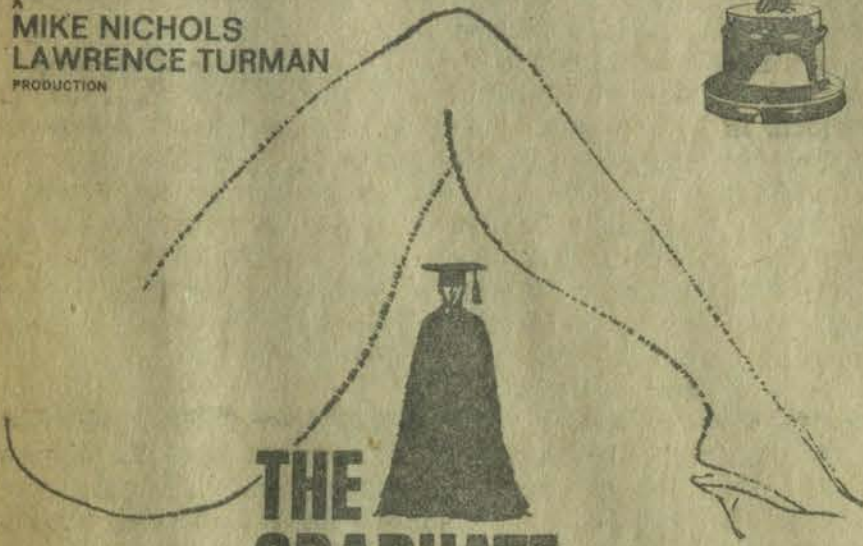

Columbus Smith astride his white mare Bess is the last of the pony expressmen of the Kentucky hills, the indomitable horseback mail carrier who through rain and sun, snow and sleet, uphill and down, made his daily ride (except Sunday) to deliver the mail.

Had anything exciting ever happened to him as he made his rides?

"I've heard a few shots, but never come close, and I've had two horses killed under me when they fell through wood bridges, but I didn't get scratched. I come near dying last winter, though. Bess fell on ice above the barn as we were coming in. Cracked my shin bone."

Smith guesses he has delivered many letters bringing sad news to his mail patrons, for he began carrying the mail during World War I when he helped his brother, Oscar Smith, who had the mail contract.

But the way he looks at it, there has been more joy inside the envelopes than sorrow. Sometimes in the long winter months when the countryside was sealed in by ice and snow, he feels he was a welcome sight riding along the mail route.

"Back when I first started carrying the mail," offered

Smith, "I got \$25 or \$30 a month. Now I get \$122.10 every four weeks."

Smith and his mare have become well-known since it was learned he still carried the mail on horseback. As proof of what comes first with this dedicated American, a crew from Wolper Productions, Inc., Hollywood, Calif., assigned to film Columbus Smith on a daily ride, stopped en route to Jephtha for some filming in Grand Canyon.

Finding themselves in the canyon just hours before they were due to start the 8 a.m. ride with Smith in Kentucky, they telephoned Smith they might be a little bit late, but, since they could be at Jephtha only the day scheduled, asked if he would wait. "Guess you'll have to make it some other time, then," said Smith, "for I start at eight o'clock in the morning." They made it.

After the film was shown on television, Smith found he and Bess had almost daily visitors. But he doesn't mind at all. "Why, just last week folks from Minnesota came in a two-room house trailer and stayed three days, following me all over the place taking movies."

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A CIGARETTE PACK AND A WHISKEY BOTTLE

Take a cigarette pack and a whiskey bottle — both preferably empty. Read. The cigarette pack bears this statement: "Caution: Cigarette smoking may be hazardous to your health." The warning was placed there, because the law requires it. But what of the whiskey label? It tells the brand, proof, and, usually, adds some reference to its "outstanding" quality, mellowness, blabla.

One wonders why the whiskey bottle escaped the responsibility of stating what the contents might do for the consumer. Minor items such as beating your wife, starving your children, killing your best friend, committing blind, mass murder with your automobile. The distiller might be permitted to forget delirium tremens and other ailments the drinker might incur, but it would seem reasonable to think these other matters should be listed for the protection of all concerned. Lawmakers have talked legislation which would ban cigarette advertising. Which is all right with us. But what of alcoholic beverages—continue to try to convince young America that the most beautiful women and the most handsome, urbane men get that way by soaking themselves to the gills? We are fully aware of the fact that neither advertising nor warnings nor all our inveighing will stop either cigarette smoking or drinking. It's merely the reasoning or the motives back of the handling of these products that inveigle our interest.

But what can you expect when a large percentage of the parents in this country introduce their children to social drinking at an early age on the premise that they can be taught to drink with moderation—as little ladies and gentlemen? This is little short of playing the Americanized form of Russian roulette—you don't use a gun, just human beings, and leave it to blind chance as to which will die an alcoholic.

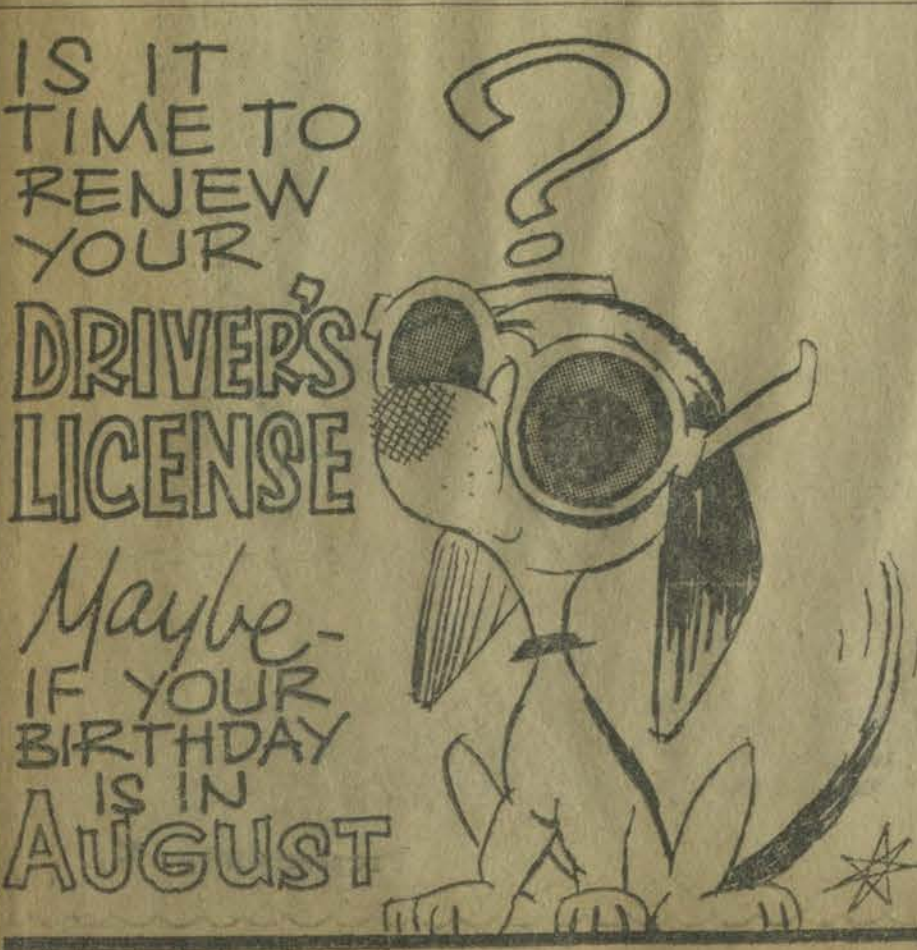
Or what can you expect when a heavy part of the population contends that alcoholic drinks should be made available to all, prettily packaged, legalized and dispensed to every Tom, Dick and Harry who may, or may not, beat his wife, starve his children, kill his best friend, and on down, down the line?

KUAC DOESN'T GET EVEN THE FIRST CHANCE

How the Kentucky Un-American Activities Committee could have earned the bad name certain groups and individuals have pinned onto it remains something of a mystery to us, for the simple reason that the committee has done nothing yet to merit either censure or praise. Some call it Nunn's committee. We hold no brief for Governor Nunn, but he did not create KUAC. He is providing the funds for its operation, but that is to be expected, since the General Assembly, composed of both Democrats and Republicans, created the commission for the express purpose of investigating activities in Kentucky which may be destructive, seditious and un-American. It is true, the governor named members of the committee, but surely the legislators knew he would have that privilege when they authorized KUAC. Others give it advance billing, labelling it "a witch hunt." Members of the committee have been very explicit in their statements to the effect that this is not the purpose of KUAC and that such underhand tactics are foreign to their plans. Some of those who decry the committee most loudly and argue that it is not needed are not unlike the guilty who flee when no man pursueth. This newspaper does not see a Communist behind every hedgerow, and it is still naive enough to have a good deal of confidence in the people of Kentucky and America as a whole. But it cannot escape the feeling that something is wrong if a plain, unvarnished, unprejudiced look into critical situations and trouble spots cannot be tolerated in Kentucky.

With a minimum of chest-thumping and view-ing with alarm, we insist that rioting, arson, destruction of public and private property and the murder of innocents are un-American. We maintain that defiance of law and order is un-American; that contempt for one's own country is un-American. Surely church-burning is not typically American. Kentucky is not pure and above reproach on several counts. We hope the KUAC will get down to business, let the chips fall where they may, and do an honest, American job of delving into un-American activities.

DISCUSSES COUNTY CONVENTION

EDITOR, The Times:
The recent Democratic county convention was a valuable experience in the democratic processes for the McCarthy-for-President participants, mostly young novices. Several disappointments were evident, however. The first was the fact that a local attorney gathered all the McCarthy supporters' signatures, but purposely failed to collect the signatures of the Humphrey supporters — even after this was requested three times. At the credentials committee hearing in Louisville, it was indicated that McCarthy signatures were collected because "there were Appalachian Volunteers among them."

The second disappointment came when officers of the law marched in prisoners from the third-floor jail and ordered them to sit down in the last available seats, which happened to be the jurors' chairs. Some would have liked to have had their signatures to check in the registration book.

The third disappointment came when the attorney elected chairman ignored standard procedures of the Democratic county conventions. McCarthy supporters would, of course, much have preferred the more neutral Alex Spradlin, secretary of the Floyd county Democratic party. Even from the point of view of party regulars, there was no need to ignore outlined procedure since the regulars were dominant, three to one. The outdoor caucus of McCarthy supporters remained the only form of protest of violation of procedure.

Many county residents were called by phone and asked to come and "stand up" for this or that person now in office in the county. Voting in the county convention ought to be more on the basis of the issues and not on loyalty to a cousin in office or to someone who might be able to swing a bit of patronage at some time.

McCarthy supporters here chose to carry out their pre-convention campaign openly — as should be the case in a democratic republic. In Scott county, for example, a McCarthy group appeared without fanfare at the county convention, and, since almost no one attends the county conventions, they were able to capture the county delegation through unit rule with only a handful. With the unit rule in effect, it was, of course, meaningless for the party regulars in Floyd county to offer the McCarthy supporters 10 delegates to the state convention. We did not wish to emulate the Scott county type of strategy, however, even though it may have worked.

This venture into politics by the young is hardly a form of agitation and even less is it "Communist-inspired." It bodes well for our community when the young are interested and involved in the decisions that effect our future. Increasingly, we shall see more of them at elections on all levels.

(July 21, 1938)

Declaring that "today Floyd county is the bloodiest soil for its size on the western hemisphere," and that it is impossible to procure for Floyd county slayers the death penalties they deserve, Commonwealth's Attorney O. C. Hall said Monday that he is preparing to seek a change of venue in six murder cases which he terms "the worst in the county's history." While officials here were still seeking relief for Floyd farmers who suffered heavy damage by flood late last month, swollen streams, augmented by heavy windstorms last week again wrought havoc throughout the county. Prestonsburg's street lights will be turned on within five minutes after the city's debt for the past two months is paid, it was said by R. E. Hodges, manager of Kentucky-West Virginia Power Company's Pikeville office. Prestonsburg's first community playground will make its opening tomorrow (Friday) at 10 a.m. on the high school grounds here, according to Mrs. Grace Burke, supervisor of W.P.A., recreation for Floyd county. Widows of Confederate veterans residents of Kentucky will receive \$30 to \$50 a month under a new act passed by the last session of the legislature of Kentucky. There died: Albert W. Twenty Years Ago (July 15, 1948)

The school plant at Eastern was originally planned to be done in two phases—first, the classroom building proper, then the auditorium and gymnasium. With the spending of \$1.6 million approved, it is possible that the construction can be done in a single operation, in which case the entire project would be let to contract at one time.

The plan as developed by Shannon followed discussions he and Supt. Clark had with teachers and administrators, seeking a building that, above all, will be functional.

The unusual design has the library at the center of a group of "clusters" housing classrooms, departments and other functions of the school. The 2,000-seat gymnasium is to front on KY 80, and it will be separated from the main structure. At the front of the main building, it is planned, will be the auditorium and music department, then the lobby and administrative offices, the cafeteria, kitchen and lockers, and back of these 12 regular classrooms, plus the language, art, home economics, chemistry and physics, biology and general science departments. These classrooms and departments almost encircle the library to which entrance is provided from every side. Every unit of the building will be hexagonal.

County Supt. Charles F. Clark said recently that redistricting will be done but contended that the approach of a new election is not the time; and, besides, that there was insufficient time for redistricting to be effected and still permit citizens to vote in new divisions.

Told of the federal court action Tuesday, Supt. Clark said of the redistricting work:

"We're still doing research, and this entails a tremendous amount of time and responsibility." He cited as an example a precinct which is now split between one division and another. "We're having to go back and determine who lives where."

The State Board of Education has directed that redistricting be done after the November election, also that names of precincts in each educational division of all counties be published prior to the election. Supt. Clark said Floyd county expects to comply fully with these directives.

"I would welcome," Clark added, "a good, representative group of patrons to serve on a committee to assist us in outlining any adjustments that might seem necessary if an imbalance is discovered."

District Judge OK's Store Disqualification

A United States district judge has sustained the action by the U. S. Department of Agriculture disqualifying a Chicago retail store from participating in the Food Stamp Program for 30 days, ruling that "a corporation is responsible for the acts of its agents even though the acts are committed without the knowledge of the corporation."

The disqualification of "The Market Basket" grew out of an investigation by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, working through its Office of the Inspector General. It is the first time a case involving disqualification of a grocer for violations of the Food Stamp has been judicially reviewed.

claim that there had been a "considerable shifting of property from real estate to tangible personal," and that a large number of exonerations had been made from the 1967 assessment because taxpayers had not been given notice of assessment increases.

The proposed raise on farm property would jump the county assessment from \$19,159,768 to \$22,991,722 and raise residential-non-farm property assessments from \$3,217,770 to \$3,861,324.

The 10 percent increase on residential lots would raise that assessment from \$22,704,501 to \$24,974,951.

NOTICE OF SALE OF ELECTRIC FRANCHISE

On the 3rd day of August, 1968, the Board of Trustees of the City of Wayland, Kentucky, adopted a resolution directing the sale at public outcry of a city electric power franchise. This resolution is in words and figures as follows:

WHEREAS, the existing franchise held by Kentucky Power Company for the distribution of electric power in the City of Wayland, Kentucky, will expire on September 28, 1968, and

WHEREAS, there is a continuing public necessity for adequate service of electric power and energy to the citizens of the City of Wayland, Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, it appears that it is in the interest of the public that a franchise be advertised and sold granting and entitling the grantee to use the public streets, thoroughfares and other public places for the erection and maintenance of lines for the transmission and distribution of electric power.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the City of Wayland, Kentucky:

Section 1.
That there be sold at public auction to the highest and best bidder, the right, privilege and authority to acquire, maintain, construct and operate in, above, under, across and along the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places (as the same now exist or may hereafter be laid out) of the City of Wayland, Floyd county, Kentucky, lines, poles and equipment for the distribution of electric energy either by means of overhead or underground conductors, with all the necessary or desirable appurtenances for the purpose of supplying electric energy to said City and the inhabitants thereof and persons and corporations beyond the limits thereof for light, heat, power and any other purpose or purposes for which electric energy is now or may hereafter be used, and for the transmission of the same within, through or across said City.

Said lines and appurtenances shall be constructed so as to interfere as little as possible with the traveling public in its use of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places. The location of all poles or conduits shall be made under the supervision of the proper board or committee of the city government.

Section 2.
The right, privilege and franchise shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of the passage of the ordinance granting it.

Section 3.
The grantee of this franchise shall save the City harmless from any and all liability arising in any way from negligence in the erection, maintenance or operation of said lines and appurtenances.

Section 4.
Whenever the grantee of this franchise shall begin the erection of any lines or other equipment, it shall promptly and diligently prosecute the work to completion and leave the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places where such work is done in as good condition of repair as before such work was commenced.

Section 5.
Wherever in this franchise, either the City of Wayland or the grantee thereof is referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors and assigns of either, and all rights, privileges and obligations contained in this franchise shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective

The consideration paid by the successful bidder for the franchise, privilege and right provided for herein shall be complete compensation and consideration for said franchise, privileges and right and for the use and occupancy of the streets, avenues, alleys, to bid on such franchise unless the prospective bidder shall deposit with the Clerk before the commencement of the bidding a certified check for the sum of \$1,500.00, pursuant to KRS 96.020. Said franchise shall be sold to the highest and best bidder and the deposit above referred to may be forfeited upon failure of the successful bidder to meet the other requirements of said statute.

Section 9.
The Clerk will report his acts, together with all bids received by him for such franchise to the Board of Trustees at their next regular or adjourned or called meeting held next after such sale.

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SALARY SCHEDULE DELAY DISTURBS KEA ASSEMBLY

Disturbed by the absence of salary schedules for the coming school year in a number of Kentucky school systems, the Kentucky Education Association (KEA) Delegate Assembly has called for use of the organization's full resources to correct the matter and prevent its future recurrence.

At the root of the problem, according to KEA, is "the failure of local tax assessors to properly submit local property assessment data" to the state department of revenue.

Without such data from the revenue department the state superintendent of public instruction cannot comply with the law requiring that local school tax rates be set by June 1 of each year. Thus, school systems without such information do not know how much money they will have and are unable to adopt salary schedules.

KEA's Delegate Assembly, meeting in special session at Eastern Kentucky University here, went on record "with the strongest voice possible calling for all local and state officials with property-assessment and tax-setting responsibilities to provide the effective school-tax rate for 1968-69 for every local board of education no later than August 14, 1968."

A resolution passed by the Delegate Assembly, KEA's policy-making body, said KEA "believes strongly that all local boards of education should have this tax-rate information at the prescribed time in order to operate within legal limitations in an efficient manner and to establish the proper salary schedule on or before the beginning of the fiscal year (July 1)."

The delegates noted that "many Kentucky teachers and administrators are required to sign contracts or letters of intent to continue employment in their school system before the fiscal year begins and before the school system salary schedule is adopted."

Requests to recommend graduating students at the University of Kentucky to more than 75,000 teaching jobs throughout the country come into the UK Placement Service.

UK CAMPUSES EXPECT ENROLLMENT OF 26,000

More than 26,000 students are expected to enroll at the several University of Kentucky campuses for the 1968 fall semester.

The figure includes 15,670 students on the Lexington campus, 8,500 in the 15 community colleges, and 2,000 in the extension and evening class programs.

The UK Community College System has grown by five campuses during the 1967-68 academic year. New colleges have opened in Louisville (Jan. 1), and Paducah (July 1). This fall, UK will begin receiving students at the Madisonville, Maysville and Hazard colleges.

Larry Stanley, research assistant on the community college administrative staff, predicts that the five new colleges will bring an additional 4,200

students into the University enrollment picture.

A breakdown of the figure shows 1,200 students at Paducah; 300 at Madisonville; 200 at Maysville; 300 at Hazard, and 2,200 at Jefferson in Louisville. The additional students will nearly double last year's enrollment in the community colleges, which was 5,730.

Keller Dunn, UK assistant dean of admissions, predicts that enrollment on the Lexington campus will be up six percent over last year's 14,783. "UK follows the national trends in enrollment increases and decreases," he explained. "I expect the new draft ruling for graduate students to affect the number of graduate students who plan to attend UK."

The 1968 fall semester officially opens Aug. 26 at the Lexington campus and at all community college campuses. Classes begin August 27.

Social Security Cites Need for Early Filing By Those Near Age 65

Every person in Floyd county who is within three months of reaching age 65 should file an application for benefits with Social Security, even though they may plan to continue working.

There are two good reasons for making application at that time, Social Security points out. First, it is necessary to file a claim to receive benefits under the Medicare Program. The fact that one continues to work does not keep him from receiving benefits from medicare in case of an illness that requires hospitalization or treatment by a doctor. Second, even though one may continue to work, there is a possibility that he may be due a check for one or more months of the year. Recent changes in the Social Security Law have made it possible to get some checks, even though one continues to work. The number of checks one may receive depends upon how much he earns over \$1,680 in the year.

Filing a claim with Social Security three months before his birthday will make a person eligible for medicare benefits, effective with the month he reaches 65. Filing early also gives the Social Security Administration more time to process the claim in case an unexpected delay is encountered.

An early contact with the Social Security office will also assist the individual in getting all of the necessary papers which will be needed to complete his claim.

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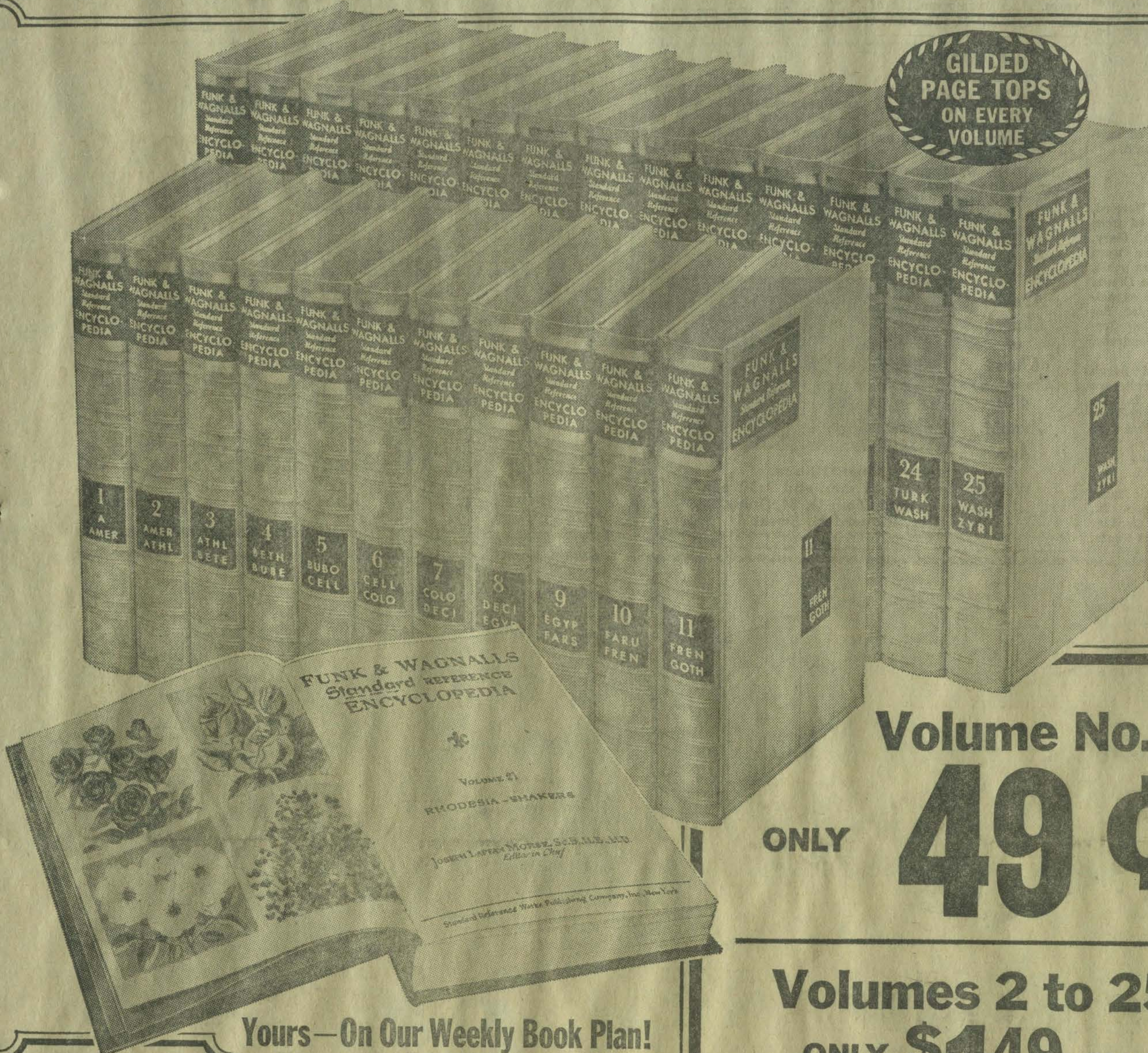

Speaking of the Weather . . .

IT WAS A TYPICAL JULY

July was a typical July, weatherwise, according to Allen B. Elam, Jr., ESSA Weather Bureau state climatologist, at the University of Kentucky. "Only four days were rain-free, from the 4th through the 7th, during the month," Elam reports. "Most of the month was warm and humid with spotty showers daily somewhere in the state."

Temperatures averaged slightly below the seasonal norm — usually one to two de-

grees, Elam said this was "due to temperatures much below normal from the 2nd through the 7th, 19th and 30th."

Record minimum lows were reached on July 4 and 5 when early morning temperatures fell to the upper 40's and 50's over much of the Commonwealth.

"Rainfall totals ranged from light to heavy because of the spotty nature of the showers," he said. "Totals varied from 2½ inches below average at Paducah to four inches or more above average at Mayfield, Henderson, Covington, Williamstown and Flemingsburg."

Four deaths were reported in the state as a result of lightning or high wind. On July 22, three boys were reported to have been killed in southeast Kentucky because of high wind. At least eight people were injured by lightning on July 2, 10, 12 and 15, Elam reported.

Crop and/or property damage due to hail, wind and lightning, was reported at scattered locations throughout the month.

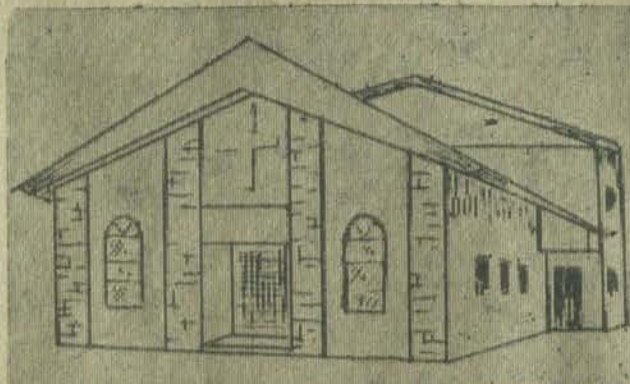

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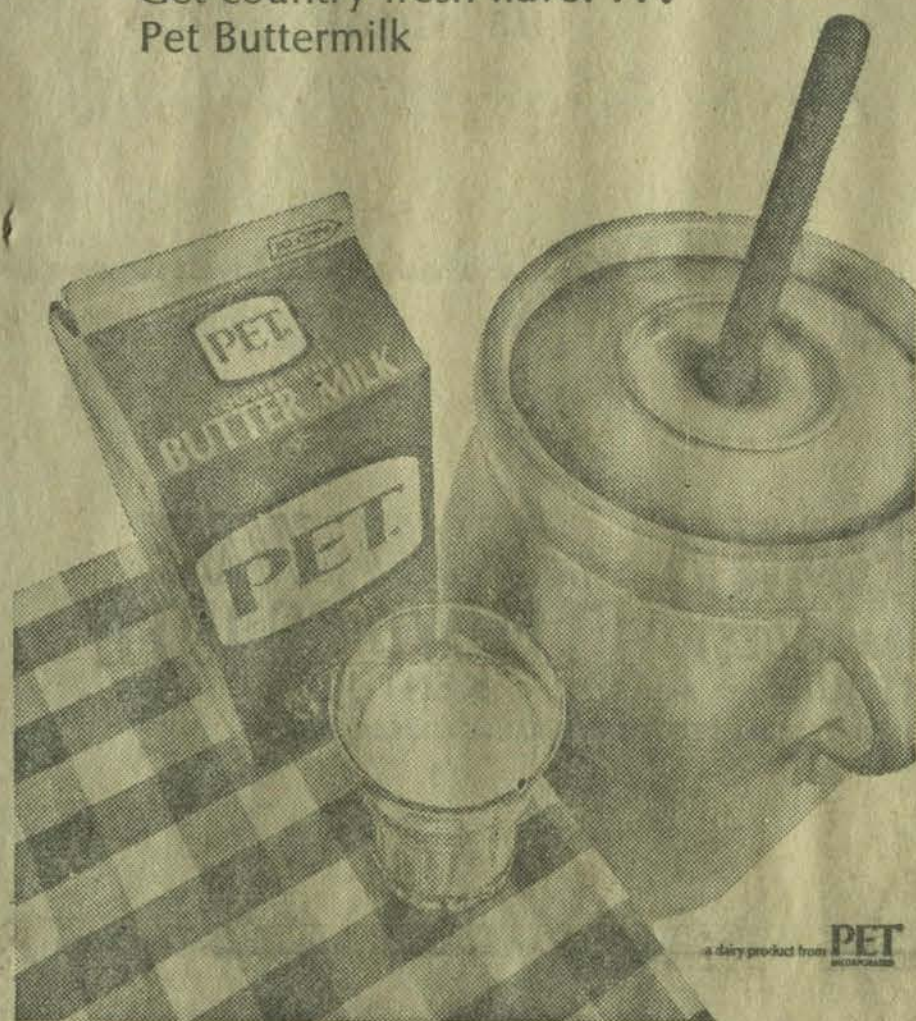

Knott County Tax Situation

(As reported by Slim Manns) Since 1967 there has been a movement under way to establish a public library district in Knott county to be financed by a special ad valorem tax of five cents per \$100.00 of assessed property value. This movement is sponsored by a select few individuals. This came to my attention approximately seven or eight months ago. Since this came to my attention, I have opposed it for the following reasons:

1. It is excessive in that the tax to finance or support the public health center is only three and two-tenths cents per \$100.00 of assessed property value.
2. Each consolidated school in the county has an excellent library administered by competent people.
3. Even though the public library district for Knott county has not been officially and legally established and is presently in litigation, T. B. Bowling and Hazel Bowling granted to the Knott County Public Library on Jan. 25, 1968 an option to

purchase one room (18' x 65') of a certain building for the sum of \$80,000. Ben Adams signed this instrument for the public library as chairman. It is the opinion of people acquainted with this property that the entire building is worth only a fraction of the above amount.

On the property tax bills for 1966 and 1967 there appeared for the first time a special tax of 5.4 cents per \$100.00 of assessed property value, which was 2.2 cents more than the special tax for the public health center. Prior to July 3, 1968, this tax was removed by a majority of the fiscal court. However, on July 3, 1968, this tax was re-adopted by the fiscal court. At the July 3 meeting of the fiscal court there were only four members present, including the judge, and the vote on this issue was two in favor and two opposed to re-adoption of this tax. Then the judge contended he was entitled to another vote in order to break the tie. Then on Aug. 1, 1968, the fiscal court voted unanimously to abolish this tax and five-tenths of one cent per \$100.00 of assessed property value of the tax covering fire protection. The court took this action after an opinion from the Office of the Attorney General stated that the judge had no authority to break the tie referred to above.

As a result of my (Slim Manns) opposing the taxes mentioned heretofore, I have received several telephone calls threatening my life unless I keep my nose out of other people's business. As a matter of public record, I wish to state that I have no intention of withdrawing my opposition to the above mentioned taxes or any new taxes which I feel are illegal or unjust. (Adv.)

These practices have been staked and designed by USDA's Soil Conservation Service technicians.

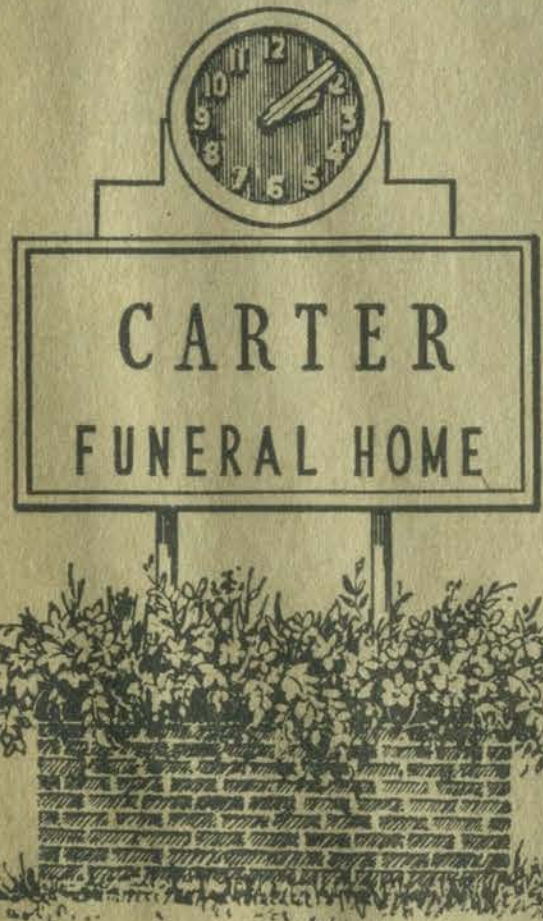
