Spread of Rabies To Wildlife Found

Rabid Opossum Found In Floyd Thought First Of Species Affected

The fear that hydrophobia may be so widespread among wild animals in this county that an imminent danger to the public health has developed was expressed this week health doctor.

This fear was intensified when a report was received Monday from the state Department of Health laboratories This Town . . that an opossum killed in the Maytown vicinity was rabid. Dr. Hall said a search of records failed to disclose that





SNYDER HAS A GOOD IDEA

Congressman Gene Snyder, of Louisville, has a sound idea for federal legislation which would remove the valid objection that a severance tax on coal and other minerals, or natural resources, would be unfair if it did not apply to all states from which such resources are extracted.

Snyder's proposed bill would set a federal tax on these resources, and that tax could be avoided by any state through tax legislation of its own on

the products.

Certainly it would be unfair to Kentucky industry if a severance tax were levied in this state while competing states had none. Snyder's bill

apparently is the answer. But when, and if, a severance tax law is enacted, it should not be designed to enrich the state treasury. Most of the revenues such legislation would yield should go to the counties from which the resources are taken. They do not belong in the state's general fund for expenditure in counties which have lost no such resources.

The Times does not advocate such a tax to burden coal operators and others. But it holds that, if made general to these industries, the tax would not be harmful to industry. And it would take those counties which are rich in natural resources





Women teachers cite the same factors but they reverse the order of rank, giving much greater weight to cooperation of their principals and fellow-

teachers; helpful co-workers.

On the discouraging side, the men teachers say their biggest complaint is "inadequate salaries; lack of summer employment."

"I am discouraged because I cannot provide adequately for my family at my present salary," one man wrote. Another asked, "What kind of job can I do in supporting my wife and child on the earnings I am receiving? I have to coach work on my master's degree extra expense.

Women teachers say "lack of equipment and supplies" keeps them from doing their best teaching. The same item gets the second highest listing by men teachers.

Women teachers cite as their second greatest hindrance 'lack of support on the part of parents and community; interference by parents," which men teachers put in third

Third on the women's list of discouragements is "poor facilities (school plant)" but running a close fourth is "poor working conditions; low morale; school atmosphere; no planning period; supervision of pupils at lunch period; not free to teach as I wish."

Many teachers set down a number of responses to each question, such as the woman who said she was discouraged because of "money, supplies, equipment in classroom, and low salary— high cost of edu-

"I am considered no different from common labor," she continued, "and yet I spend my money for an education and get paid less and the cost of living going up and my paycheck going down. "So many things-many of teaching function-are demanded of the teacher that frustration frequently outweighs the sense of professional accomplishment," Wha-

ley writes. "Too often an additional toll is taken by other crippling conditions - overcrowded classrooms, inadequate equipment and instructional materials, rigorous schedules that allow no time for planning lessons or for rest breaks, parents and communities that attach little or no value to education or the heavy responsibility placed on teachers.

"Yet despite the almost overpowering handicaps and frustrations, including low pay for work that demands highquality performance and preparation, teachers persevere and frequently triumph.

"The thing that bolsters them even in the most trying circumstances is their sense of fulfillment in helping children learn and lead useful, successful lives. They are dedicated to the children. And this very dedication is at the root of today's teacher demands for improved salaries, better working conditions, and a voice in what happens in eduMAYTOWN




