

## McCarthy Backers Leave Convention

### 'Regulars' Hold Wide Vote Edge Youth-Led Group In 'Rump' Session At Caucus Here

A political rumpus that led to a rump session of Senator McCarthy supporters featured the Floyd county Democratic convention held here Saturday afternoon to name 38 delegates from this county to the state convention in Louisville next Saturday.

Organization forces held a 3-1, or better, edge in the voting, but there is a possibility the minority group will carry their protest to the state credentials committee. Both factions named a full slate of delegates.

When James (Red) Conley, county party chairman, was unable to attend the convention Alex H. Spradlin, secretary, was designated under party rules to preside as temporary chairman. Followed the first vote to name a permanent chairman, and Woodrow W. Burchett won over Jonathan Moore, a McCarthy backer, by a reported 147-51 count. Mrs. Mary Irene Spears, of the regular organization forces, was elected permanent secretary on a second head count. When the vote for delegates was held, those for the regular slate of delegates were asked to stand, then those favoring the McCarthy delegates stood. No actual count was made, and that brought on more protest and finally the walkout to the courthouse lawn where McCarthy forces held their rump session.

John Cahill, of Drift, led the floor fight inside the courthouse, and he presided as temporary chairman at the rump session. Douglas Osborne was elected permanent chairman of the group. The organization forces sent their delegates unopposed to Louisville but bound by the unit rule. Chairman Burchett said there was no intention of ignoring the youngsters supporting McCarthy, adding that the regular forces had intended to give them 10 delegates to the state convention. Later, when young Cahill was told they still might send delegates the offer was not accepted when he was reminded that the delegation would vote as a unit as directed by the convention.

Cahill said his group first objected when they were required (See Story No. 3, Page 4)

## County-State Road Pact Clears Year's Program

Any troubles existing between Floyd county and Kentucky Department of Highways over a new rural road contract for the fiscal year which began July 1 disappeared with the acceptance last week by the department of the road supervisor named by the fiscal court and the approval by all concerned of a new agreement.

Sam Henry Fitzpatrick, of Middle Creek, who had been employed as supervisor by the fiscal court, passed the Department of Highways examination, and the department approved his appointment and the road contract last Thursday. The fiscal court gave its approval of the new contract at its Tuesday meeting.

Floyd county's apportionment of funds under the contract, after providing for administration, emergencies and contingencies, is \$128,647.90. The new pact covers 119 separate road projects of 132.4 miles and five bridges. It provides for 15.3 miles of bituminous surfacing.

Also included in the negotiations just concluded is the new machinery rental agreement similar to that under which state and county have cooperated since early days of the Combs administration.

## MINE MISHAP CLAIMS KIDD

### Machine Operator Dies in Slatfall Wednesday Morning

Willie Lee Kidd, 30-year-old Honaker miner, was killed early Wednesday morning when he was caught beneath a block of slate while at work in the Conn Coal Company mine on Mud Creek.

According to Emmitt Conn, owner of the mine, the tragedy occurred while Kidd was operating a spinner-loader machine, with which he was "cleaning up" a new cut of coal. The slate fell from the mine roof onto Kidd, pinning him to the machine.

Two other miners, Millard Kidd and Edesel Case, who were working near Kidd at the time of the accident, and who were not injured, made an attempt to lift the slab of slate from him, but failed.

The slate lay across Kidd's shoulder and it was believed he died of suffocation, rather than of internal injuries.

An employee of the Conn company for 12 years, Kidd was born Oct. 27, 1937 at Honaker, a son of Alex and Sarah Parsons Kidd, of Honaker. His wife, Mrs. Velma Meade Kidd, also survives.

Survivors, other than his parents and widow, are one brother, Edgar Kidd, of Toledo, Ohio, and six sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Boyd, of Rush, Ky., Mrs. Alta Case and Mrs. Lois Adkins, both of Collins, Ohio, Mrs. Betty Jo Elliott, of Eastern, Mrs. Sophia Elliott, of Honaker, and Mrs. Inez Rogers, of Osborne.

Funeral services will be conducted Saturday at 10 a.m. from the residence of the victim's parents, ministers of the Church of Christ officiating. Burial will be in the family cemetery at Honaker under the direction of Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

## HEROISM IN VIETNAM WINS CALHOUN THE BRONZE STAR

For heroism in the face of enemy fire in Vietnam last Feb. 27 Sp/4 Burklin Calhoun, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Calhoun, of the Auxler road, near here, has been awarded the Bronze Star with "V" device.

The citation issued the Floyd county by Col. Charles R. Sniffin recounts the circumstances under which Calhoun distinguished himself. A rifleman with Co. C, 2nd Battalion, 35th Infantry, his company "made sudden contact with a large enemy force in the heavily vegetated Central Highlands. Disregarding his own safety, Calhoun left the relative security of the perimeter to engage the enemy more closely. He spotted a Viet Cong approaching his platoon sergeant's position and immediately exposed himself to the hostile fire to neutralize the threat."

During the encounter Calhoun was wounded, but, Col. Sniffin's citation recalls, "he remained in his precarious position till he had eliminated the hostile soldier."



In a letter to his mother, Calhoun later told her he has carried the Bible she gave him wherever he has gone and that the prayer in it "has given me courage."

### WOMAN REPORTS BEAR IS VISITOR, WARNS RESIDENTS

She watched the animal go around her house, later called Sheriff Joe W. Lewis and notified neighbors.

Mrs. Allen said she had previously heard of a bear having been seen in the Brandy Keg section.

## Companion, Car-Owner, Draws Fines

### Manslaughter Cases Vs. Wilburn Voided In Highway Deaths

Harry Howard, 27-year-old Greenup construction worker, who has admitted he was the driver of the car which crashed into another near here the night of June 27, fatally injuring three women and injuring a fourth, was arraigned here Wednesday morning and at the conclusion of the preliminary hearing was held to \$15,000 bond on each of three manslaughter counts. The \$45,000 bond total was unchanged from the bond asked when examining trial was postponed, July 1.

His companion and owner of the auto which Howard was driving, John Wilburn, of Lynn, Ky., was fined \$400 and costs on a plea of guilty to permitting an illegal driver to operate his car, \$100 and costs for drunkenness, and was held under \$500 bond as a material witness against Howard.

The three manslaughter charges against Wilburn were dismissed.

The examining trial had been delayed because Howard had pleaded his financial inability to employ counsel. The court appointed Paul E. Hayes and Clifford B. Latta to represent him.

Testimony of three witnesses was heard here Wednesday.

Miss Peggy Wright, 21, driver of the car in which her mother, Mrs. Elder Wright, and her sisters, Mrs. Brenda Crum and Miss Teresa Wright, were fatally injured, said the Greenup auto approached her, in the wrong lane, that she veered to her left in an effort to avoid a collision. She added that she saw no effort made by the driver of the other car to swing back into his lane.

State Police Detective Chester D. Potter told of the three separate interrogations of Howard and of the care taken by Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo to appraise Howard of his rights. Over defense objections Judge Stumbo permitted Potter to tell the contents of Howard's statement to the effect that he was the driver of the death-car. He also was permitted to quote Howard as saying he was drinking at the time of the tragedy.

The third witness, Jailer Lawrence Hale, testified that Howard was drunk when brought to the county jail on the night of the crash.

The case will go to the next session of the grand jury.

## Officers Disarmed, Martin Man Held

Randall Frasure, 23-year-old Martin man, is in jail here facing a flock of charges after he allegedly held three officers at gunpoint Sunday, relieved two of the three of their guns and threatened to kill them.

Arrested at 6 a.m., next day as he approached the home on Buck's Branch of his father, Curt Frasure, the accused man will be charged here, County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill said, on six counts—two for armed robbery, resisting arrest, assault, threatening an officer and carrying a concealed deadly weapon.

The officers—Martin Policeman A. J. Reed, Deputy Sheriff Claude A. Flanery and State Trooper John Brenner—went to the Frasure home to serve warrants issued for Frasure by the Martin police court, charging him with destroying public property and reckless use of a deadly weapon. Trooper Brenner reported:

When the officers knocked at the door, Frasure asked him to wait a minute before he turned on the porch light. Chief of Police Reed read the warrants to

him, advised him of his rights and asked Frasure to go with them. At that juncture Frasure slammed the storm door, lunged out with a .38-calibre revolver pointed at Reed and ordered the three not to move. Reed attempted to get at his own revolver but stumbled and failed to get it clear of the holster.

Frasure, this story continues, took the weapons of Reed and Flanery and told Brenner he could keep his "if you don't use it," at the same time advising the trooper he would kill him if he did attempt to bring his gun into play. He then cursed Reed and Flanery, threatening to kill both. Brenner said he asked Frasure if he would permit them to leave. Frasure then struck at Reed, threatening repeatedly to kill him, forced the three officers in front of the State Police cruiser headlights, hands up, then searched the cruiser and permenited them to leave.

Frasure was captured by State Police Capt. Lykins, Troopers Brenner and Elmo Allen and Police Chief Reed next (See Story No. 2, Page 4)

## Post Office Service Cut Effective Here Saturday

All major post offices, including Prestonsburg's, will feel the effects, beginning Saturday, of the employment cutback required by the new federal tax bill.

Jack Stumbo, postmaster here, said all Saturday window service will be discontinued. This includes sale of money orders, stamps, acceptance of parcels for mailing, General Delivery service and other normal postal services.

The postmaster said all Saturday mail collection service will be adjusted to conform to existing Sunday collection service, except that letter carriers will continue to collect mail on

Saturdays from boxes on their routes.

Mail will continue to be received at 4:30, 4:45, 7:40 and 8:30 a.m., and dispatched at 2, 5:15 and 6 p.m.

Post office patrons here are being encouraged to deposit mail early so that postal employees can make the dispatch of mails on schedule.

All postmasters across the nation must submit plans to eliminate Saturday residential deliveries to the Post Office Department by September 1.

In Louisville and other larger cities windows will be open for two hours Saturday mornings to serve business firms calling for mail on a regular basis.

## 'Whatsoever Things'

By DONALD E. WILDMON

While not overly disturbed, I am perturbed about all the furor and some of the imbecilic mouthings over gun control legislation, and all the disquieting arguments don't come from one side.

Both sides are guilty of frantic and frenetic theories that go beyond the nimbus of reason.

Critics have jumped on today's time consumer and escape valve—television—over so much violence in their programs and peppered the medium with all sorts of sulphurous adjectives in broad accusations that the tube is educating children to be killers and practitioners of mayhem.

The anti-gun control people say guns don't kill people, but people kill people. Well, no one to my knowledge has ever tried to convey the idea that lethal weapons have humanistic powers. This is just one illustration as to how silly the arguments can get. Putting guns in wrong hands make a powerful destructive combination.

On the other side, there are those who would outlaw all guns, even toy pistols for children.

Fortunately there is that middle-ground reasoning element that sees some value in reasonable gun control, and their chief aim is that all guns should be registered, and that none could be shipped by mail. Eliminating the mail order route would prevent guns from getting into hands of deranged people and others who possibly would not be able to buy one over the

counter from a responsible merchant, even today.

I read a story the other day by a Newspaper Enterprise Association reporter who had surveyed doctors, toy merchants, psychiatrists and child specialists about the effects of toy guns and war toys. The conclusion of all the doctors and specialists in this field was that explosive type toys would no more make a criminal out of a child than toy churches would make a saint out of him.

If all children followed their first inclinations, there would be more firemen and policemen today than the cities would have jobs for when they mature. Hospitals wouldn't have to look for nurses, and the women would have more beauty parlors to choose from than could operate successfully.

The middle-ground is the area that must be found.

Some of the gun-control extremists would purge our history writings, and a lot of basic history of this country from the bookshelves and our children would grow up believing this country was a product of the psychiatrist and the rabid religionist.

I grew up in my native Oklahoma at a time when it had recently changed from territorial status to statehood, and playing cowboy and Indian was as natural as a child playing with a chemistry set today, or trying to build some electrical device.

The legend of Daniel Boone would be dull without the historical explanation of the rifle and its use to man at that time. George Washington probably would not be famous for chopping down the cherry tree alone without any mention being made of the winter at Valley Forge.

Twice in my lifetime this government has been dedicated to indoctrinating its young men to kill in two major wars and several minor ones, including the police action in Korea.

Now, all of a sudden one rabid element wants to erase all of this from mind and indoctrinate a nation by the simple method of violence from the printed and spoken word. In reality, education for peace and proper respect for others is the logical theme. Respect for the law ought not to be overlooked.

Responsibility is about the best word that fits all situations. The middle-ground of reason should prevail.

The University of Kentucky community colleges provide continuing educational opportunities for citizens in their immediate areas.

**Ky. Coal Production Up For '67, Nunn Reports**

Frankfort — Gov. Louie B. Nunn has announced that production of coal in Kentucky in 1967 increased 6.86 per cent over the 1966 total.

"This significant increase in production," Nunn noted, "reflects the solid growth of the coal industry and its importance to the economic growth of the Commonwealth. Kentucky's top mineral resource and the key attraction for new industry is our abundant supply of coal, with mine production and our share of the export market growing every year."

Kentucky's mines produced 100,106,241 tons in 1967. The 1966 coal production was 93,204,675 tons, the highest in Kentucky's history. The production increase makes Kentucky the nation's second largest producer of bituminous coal.

The state's increase in coal production since 1947 has brought the coal industry's contribution to the economy of the Commonwealth to a point over \$400 million annually, making coal the number one industry of the state.

Fatal mining accidents in 1967 totaled 50 as compared to 40 in 1966, and was the eighth smallest number in mining history. Roof falls were responsible for 50 per cent of the accidents.

Last year was the third consecutive year during which more than two million tons per fatal accident were produced and the fifteenth consecutive year when more than one million tons of coal were produced per fatal mining accident, and only the seventeenth such year in the 88-year history of the Department of Mines and Minerals.

The 1967 record of 2,000,124 tons per fatality was the fourth best in Kentucky history. The best year was in 1963 when 2,367,850 tons of coal were mined for each of 33 fatal accidents occurring.

It was the second year in history when more than four million tons of coal were mined per fatal roof fall accident.

During 1967, 1,870 Kentucky coal mines were licensed.

Clay production increased 3.71 per cent from 612,103 tons in 1966 to 635 tons in 1967. Forty-eight clay mines were licensed for operation in Kentucky in 1967.

## AFL-CIO Resolution Asks Special Session To Repeal Sales Tax

The executive board of the Kentucky State AFL-CIO passed a resolution at its July 19 meeting requesting Gov. Louie B. Nunn to call a special session of the General Assembly and repeal the five percent retail sales tax that became effective April 1. The resolution stated that much of the increased revenue from the tax was going to cronies of A. B. "Happy" Chandler in the form of state jobs and absurd equipment rentals which are inconsistent with Gov. Nunn's professed philosophy favoring government efficiency and economy.

"The promised pay raises for state hospital employees has been a farce. Some of these employees with 11 to 19 years of service are receiving wage increases of less than \$1.70 a week. Now, they must pay the highest retail sales tax in the nation out of that," the resolution complains.

The name, "Kentucky," is from the Wyandotte Indian word "Kah-ten-tah-teh" meaning "Land where we will live tomorrow" or "Land of Tomorrow."
