Lessee May Buy Water, Gas System

Rentals of \$18,000 A Year To Be Paid On Bonds, Interest

The water and gas system owned by Floyd county and serving five of its communities has been leased to Ohio-Kentcky Utilities, Inc., a Prestons-

The system has in recent years been operated under re-

Bond payments in arrears include \$42,000 which became due prior to June 1, last year, \$9,-000 which were due on that date, and \$138,000 yet to become SIX at Convention 000 which were due on that due. John Allen, of Prestonsburg, has operated the properties for some time as receiver.

The lease and purchase agreement lifts the receivership. Allen is president of Ohio-Kentuc-

The company agrees to complete the purchase of the system by May 20, 1976 by paying all outstanding bonds and interest, if these are not previously paid. It also agrees not to issue any additional bonds or to encumber the system in any way. Another provision of the agreement is that the company will (See Story No. 9, Page 3)




