

## Osborne Elected League President

### Convention Draws Big Attendance

#### Nunn Tells Sportsmen He Opposes Gun Law, Cites State Support

Kentucky's 39,019-member strong League of Sportsmen concluded Sunday its 33rd annual convention year at Jenny Wiley State Park. This year's convention drew a near-record gathering of delegates representing the state's 309 fish and game clubs.

Redmond Payne, the League's secretary-treasurer, said the convention was attended by approximately 600 persons. The Dewey Lake Fish & Game Club played host to the three-day event.

John Osborne, of Russell Springs, Ky., a former Floyd county teacher, was elected League president. He defeated Forrest Adams, of Bowling Green, and his election on Saturday followed by a day the 37th wedding anniversary of Osborne and his wife, Anna. Mr. Osborne is a native of Letcher county and for two years taught in the Melvin vicinity. He has a half-brother, William Osborne, who lives at Melvin, and is a second cousin of Ted Osborne, unsuccessful candidate for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator. He has been vice-president of the Ninth district, League of Kentucky Sportsmen, for seven years, and for 31 years has been supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration.

Gov. Louie B. Nunn flew to Prestonsburg Friday to present conservation awards at Friday night's opening session of the League.

Because the airport is unlighted, he was obliged to leave before dark but he got his message across—that conservation is the prime hope of wildlife.

The recipients of the awards were Joe Pell, of Lewisport, Conservationist of the Year; Ed Thompson, of Louisville, Wildlife Conservationist; W. F. Hook, of Kevil, Forest Conservationist; Henry Spalding, of Hazard, Water Conservationist, and The Glasgow Times, Conservation Communications.

The Fish and Wildlife Commission met during the afternoon and approved hunting dates and conditions for wildlife management areas and military reservations. (See Story No. 1, Page 6)

## LAFFERTY IS VICTIM

### Native of Maytown, Veteran of WW II, Drowns in Elliott

Hobart Lafferty, 44-year-old Ashland man who recently drowned in the Little Fork of Little Sandy River in Elliott county, was a native of Langley, this county.

He stepped from a ledge into about 12 feet of water while hunting frogs, late at night, with friends, John Jurick, of Ashland, Donald Gamble and Thomas Kouns, both of Flatwoods. The tragedy occurred, a mile from Stephens, Kentucky.

Jurick, a brother-in-law of Lafferty, attempted to reach the victim, but was unsuccessful.

The body was located by the sheriff about three hours later.

The victim was born July 4, 1923, a son of James M. Lafferty, of Ashland, and the late Mrs. Elizabeth Allen Lafferty.

He was a veteran of World War II, serving with the U. S. (See Story No. 2, Page 6)

## Two Airport Land Cases Are Decided

A jury in U. S. district court at Pikeville last Thursday handed down a verdict awarding the Williams heirs, residents of Virginia, \$46,600 for land taken by the Prestonsburg-Pointsville Airport Board, and the following day the Court of Appeals threw out as excessive an award of \$253,500 made in Johnson circuit court to five Kentucky owners of 22.7 acres of land taken by the board.

The federal court hearing was the third held in the Williams suit against the board. In the first they were awarded about \$52,000. The second trial of the case brought \$63,000. Federal Judge Moynihan held the judgment excessive and ordered the third hearing, which was held by Judge Mac Swinford.

The Court of Appeals 4-2 decision, with Justices John Palmore and James Milliken dissenting, reversed the ruling of the Johnson circuit court.

Dan Jack Combs, of Pikeville, attorney for the five landowners involved, said that he had not seen the full opinion of the Court of Appeals, but added that he would petition for a rehearing. He has 30 days from last Friday in which to do so.

The original award for the property was \$25,125, by a set of commissioners-appraisers. This was appealed by the landowners to Johnson circuit court, which resulted in a five-day jury trial.

Combs—who termed the \$25,125 award "an abomination"—said that during the circuit court trial the land in question was looked over by the jury, which returned the \$253,500 award in favor of the landowners as the amount the Prestonsburg-Pointsville Airport Board should pay.

It was this award the Airport Board appealed to the Court of Appeals as excessive, and the Court of Appeals threw out Friday.

The high court rejected the landowners' argument that the value of their property had just been greatly increased because US 23 was then being relocated to adjoin it at the time the Airport Board took the land. Before the relocation of the highway, the five tracts were extremely inaccessible.

Judge Earl Osborne, in writing the majority opinion, said the jury's verdict in the case "clearly (was) based upon the value of the land for subdivision purposes" and therefore was excessive.

In his dissent, Palmore asserted: "There can be no question of the right of the landowners . . . to be paid on the basis of the enhanced value" since the land for the highway was taken by the state before the action by the Airport Board.

Palmore noted "Highly qualified expert witnesses testified that immediately prior" to the time the land was taken over for the airport, "all of this property was adaptable to and salable for purposes of residential subdivision, with a market value from \$3,000 to \$4,000 per acre."

## Fire Destroys Home, Contents Near Here Early Last Sunday

The five-room, ranch-type home of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Mullins on old KY 114, near here, was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin early Sunday morning.

The loss included house, furniture and the family clothing. The Mullins family was visiting Mr. Mullins' parents at Weeksbury at the time of the blaze.

The fire was discovered by Mrs. Mullins' mother, Mrs. Russell Sizemore, who lives nearby. Fire Chief John Perry, of Prestonsburg, said the roof was caving in when he and other firemen arrived at the scene.

He added that the fire apparently started in the section of the home where larger appliances and a water heater were located.

No official estimate of the loss was available.

## Beaver Cr. System Decision Is Near

"Now it's the people's turn—it's up to them to show if they want a modern water system to serve their homes and businesses and develop their area," said J. C. Wells, of Estill, leader in the move for a centralized water distribution system for Beaver Creek and its tributaries.

Wells said Tuesday that a minimum of 600 applicants for water service is necessary to get final federal approval of the big project. There is a potential of 2,000 customers, he said, but time is running short. The end of June is the latest date expected to remain open for filing of applications for the service.

"We've gone as far as we can," he pointed out. "Trips to Washington have been made, Congressman Perkins, Judge Stumbo, County Attorney Sturgill and Supt. Charles F. Clark have worked with us faithfully. But it all goes for nothing if the people don't want it."

With 600 customers, the system would be able to offer an average monthly water rate per customer of about \$6 for 3,000 gallons consumed. As the number grows, the rate would decrease.

Wells said the \$75 tap-on fee has almost been eliminated. Applicants will be permitted to sign notes, and the application provides that the fee will be refunded when connection is made or if the system fails to reach the applicant.

Approximately 300 applications for service have already been signed. Community meetings at which the project and its benefits will be explained will (See Story No. 3, Page 3)

## WORK DELAY AT COLLEGE TEMPORARY

### Dr. Campbell Expects Bids To Be Asked Soon; PCC Gets \$57,600 Grant

Construction on the Prestonsburg Community College campus has been delayed by a freeze of funds but the delay is only temporary, Dr. Henry A. Campbell, director of the college, said this week.

Work on two college structures was originally scheduled to begin this spring. Now, it is expected that the bid date will be set next month.

The construction project was approved 10 days ago by the Health, Education and Welfare regional office, Charlottesville, Va., and now awaits HEW approval in Washington.

The proposed construction is part of a long-range development program at the college here.

Dr. Campbell announced Wednesday receipt of a grant of \$57,600 in federal funds for the addition of equipment at the college. The grant is earmarked, primarily, for the sciences and will help the two-year technical program there. Arts and crafts also will benefit, and the grant includes funds for addition of a concert grand piano to the music department.

## Floyd Marks 7th Food Stamp Year

June 1 marked the seventh anniversary of Floyd county's food stamp program for low-income families.

Carl R. Horn, officer-in-charge of the Consumer and Marketing Service's food stamp office here, said that Floyd county has issued \$4,005,613 worth of coupons during the seven-year period. Needy families exchanged \$1,073,943.25 of their own money for the coupons and then received an additional \$2,931,669.75 worth of free, bonus coupons to help them buy a greater variety of foods at local food stores.

The Department of Economic Security is responsible for interviewing and certifying eligible families for food stamp aid and for issuing coupons to certified families.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service handles authorization of retail and wholesale grocers to accept the coupons from the recipients in exchange for food, and is the federal agency with over-all supervision of the program. There are currently 214 authorized retailers in Floyd county where food stamp recipients can spend their food stamp coupons.

A total of 4,980 persons in the county took part in the food stamp program last month.

"It is pretty obvious what the food stamp program means to this area," Horn said. "We've seen it improve the diets of low-income families, increase food sales and expand farm markets for food items. It stimulates the whole economy of the communities in which it is operating."

Among other benefits of the food stamp program to the community and to the individual teachers have noticed improved learning power and changes in attitude among students whose families are now receiving food stamps. Grocers have commented not only on their increased sales but the fact that many of their customers no longer have to buy on credit.

Another area where the food stamp program has shown its value is among the elderly, as evidenced by this statement: "Food stamps is the best thing that could have happened to me and my 91-year-old wife. We buy mostly milk, juices and soft foods."

But perhaps the program's value can best be summed up by the comment of a mother who receives food stamps. When a grocery clerk noticed tears running down her cheeks and asked if something was wrong, she replied, "Oh, no! I'm just so happy because this is the first time that I have had enough food in my house at one time to properly feed my family."

Harges Wallen, 72, of West Prestonsburg, was dead on arrival at the Prestonsburg General hospital, Saturday, shortly after suffering a heart attack.

Mr. Wallen, a retired miner, was born March 27, 1896 in Floyd county, the son of the late Alex and Thursa Wright Wallen. His wife, Gladys Hyden Wallen, survives.

Survivors other than his widow, include three sons, Leo Wallen, Ashland, and Billy and Jackie Wallen, both of West Prestonsburg; a stepson, Doug Hyden, of Prestonsburg; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Lois Ann May, West Prestonsburg, and two sisters, Mrs. Josie Elliott, Water Gap, and Mrs. Attie Wright, West Prestonsburg.

Funeral rites were held Monday at 11 a.m. at the Assembly of God Church of West Prestonsburg, the Rev. Lorie Vannucci officiating. Burial was made in the Sally Stephens cemetery, West Prestonsburg, under direction of the Floyd Funeral Home. 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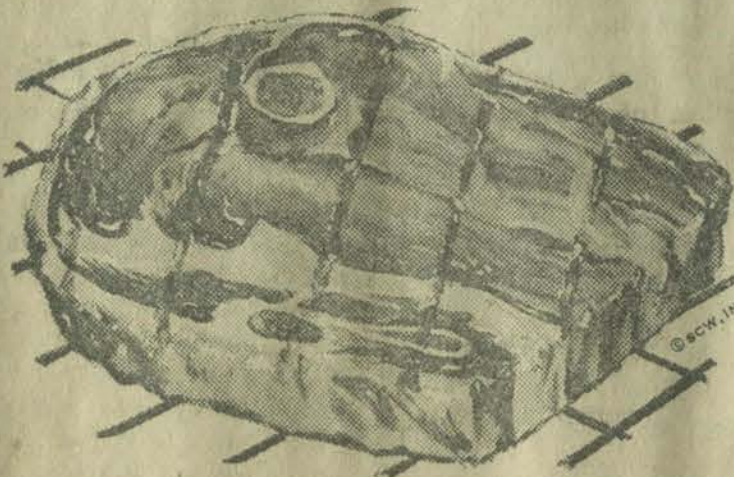

Larger schools of the area to be served have already signed for the water service.

The water system, which will cost in excess of \$2 million, will begin at the plant at Allen and extend up Right Beaver Creek to the Floyd-Knot line and up Left Beaver to include the Clear Creek section.

The town of Martin has given the proposed system a letter of intent which, if it becomes final, would make that community a customer, eliminating the cost of operating and maintaining its water plant. The same action has been considered by the town of Allen.

Originally, construction of a reservoir on Turkey Creek, near Maytown, was planned to provide the water supply. At least 1,200 applications for service would be needed, however, to get sufficient funds for this. So current plans call for the Big Sandy river to be used as the source of supply, with the water plant located at Allen.

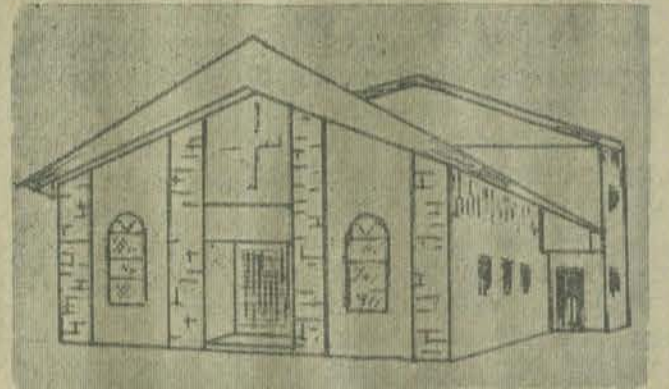

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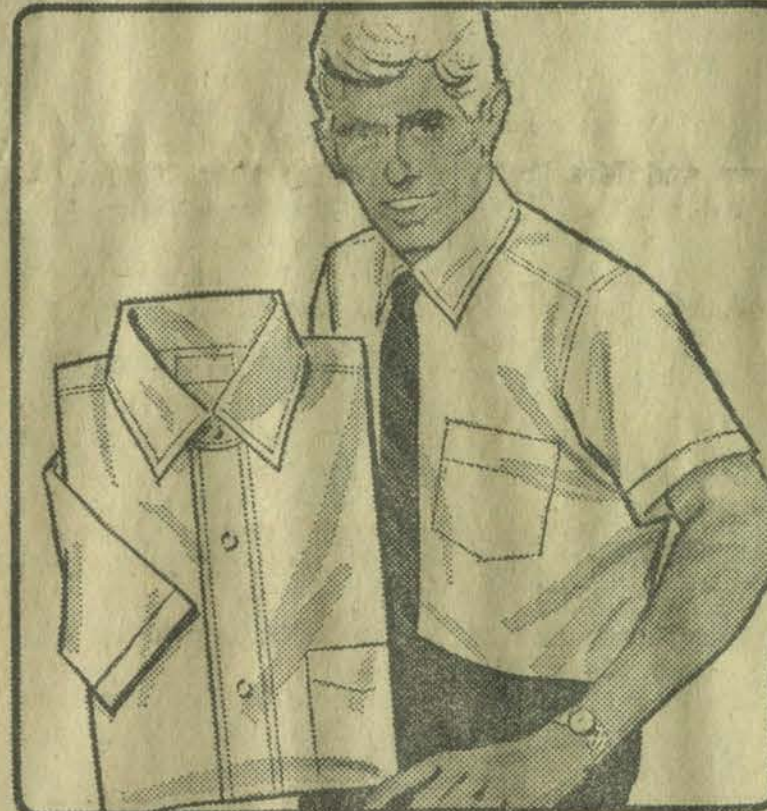

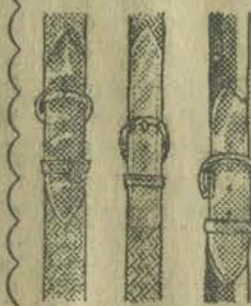

Gov. Nunn told the League that he opposed the proposed firearms law even to the extent of facing criticism of the President of the United States. He said the law was like a "Band Aid on a cancer."

He urged the preservation of human resources by standing up and being counted for law and order in the present days of lawlessness.

The Governor said proposals to purchase \$200,000 of land each year for the next two years for water fowl and duckland-game hunting were also included in the two-year planning of the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Continued improvement in conservation in the state school system and the program of stocking of largemouth bass, bluegill, rock-fish and other in the planning which was cited species throughout the state was by the state's chief executive.

He said, when he was campaigning, he made a pledge to work with the league for the expansion of fish and wildlife programs in the state.

"I think we have kept faith with that pledge and I want to reaffirm that pledge tonight. This administration stands firm in the wholehearted support of the League and the preservation of fish and wildlife resources."

More than 300 attended the Governor's Awards Night banquet, Friday evening.

At the concluding Sportsmen's Banquet Saturday evening Fleece Heath, of Somerset, became the 18th person to receive the League's Sportsman of the Year award. The presentation was made by Dr. Robert Webb, of Grayson, substituting for Ex-Governor Edward T. Breathitt, who was unable to be present.

Dr. C. L. Allen, of Langley, now a member of the Kentucky Fish & Wildlife Commission, is one of the 18 Kentuckians who have received this honor.

Thomas C. Kimball, executive director of the National Wildlife Federation, Washington, D. C., was the speaker at the Saturday morning session. He called on sportsmen to take the lead in all phases of conservation.

Minor Clark, commissioner of Fish & Wildlife Resources, urged convention delegates to endorse the gun control section of the "Safe Street and Crime Control Act" pending in Congress.

"It is my feeling," he said, "that if we don't come out with something constructive like this bill, we may find ourselves bound later by some very restrictive legislation."

Ray Harm, noted Kentucky artist-naturalist, pleaded for members to give their support to the lower of two sites surveyed for a dam on Red River as a means of saving the picturesque Red River Gorge. Henry Willenbrink, of Louisville, later made a motion that the League reconsider its original stand in favor of damming the gorge, but the motion died for want of a second.

**AUTOMOBILE EPIDEMIC KILLS 53,000 A YEAR**

Frankfort, Ky.—State health commissioner Russell E. Teague M.D. reports Kentuckians should act immediately to protect themselves against a disease which kills 53,000 Americans annually. "The disease is a modern one, known as the automobile accident," said Teague. "With so many lives lost in traffic accidents each year, it is clear improper use of the automobile is an epidemic of national proportions."

The commissioner urged Kentuckians to "immunize" against fatal traffic accidents by using seat belts whenever driving or riding in an automobile. "An immense amount of scientific research proves the seat belt is the most effective single item of protective equipment presently available to reduce the toll of traffic injuries and deaths," Teague said.

Use of seat belts can reduce the severity of injuries sustained by hundreds of thousands of persons and can prevent more than 5,500 traffic deaths every year, according to the U. S. Public Health Service.

Because accidents rank fourth as a cause of death in the United States, and because traffic accidents cause about one-half of these accidental deaths, the U. S. Public Health Service, American Medical Association and many other public health agencies are emphasizing the importance of seat belts.

On the state level, the Kentucky Medical Association recently established an award to be presented to any organization in Kentucky that achieves 100 percent seat belt installation in all passenger vehicles operated by members or employees.

According to Teague, a seat

belt serves useful purposes all the time it is worn. Health benefits include prevention of fatigue caused by a slouching position, reduction in muscular stress and prevention of backaches. Seat belts can make driving more relaxing, he added, because they provide greater comfort and confidence.

"Seat belts can offer all of these benefits, and a longer life as well," stated Teague. "I urge all Kentuckians to use seat belts: not only during vacation trips: not only during vacation trips: not only during vacation trips to the market or downtown. It's a good health practice."

**UK Moves Toward Natural Resource School Founding**

Lexington, Ky.—The University of Kentucky College of Agriculture is moving swiftly to start a School of Natural Resources approved on May 7 by the University Board of Trustees.

Dr. William A. Seay, dean of the college, said that a selection and screening committee to choose a dean-director for the new school has been picked. Dr. B. J. Parker, acting head of the forestry department, was named chairman.

High school students may enroll in the new school this September for the beginning work

that leads to a degree in forestry.

"Course work for the first two years of this degree is already available in basic sciences, agricultural sciences and general studies. By September, 1970, when this year's freshmen become juniors, the professional courses in forestry will be offered."

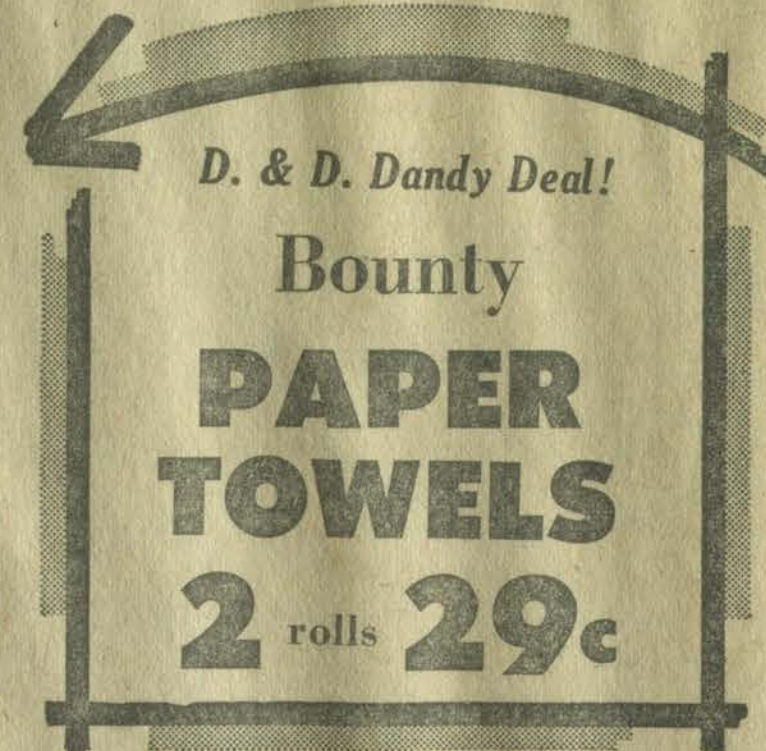

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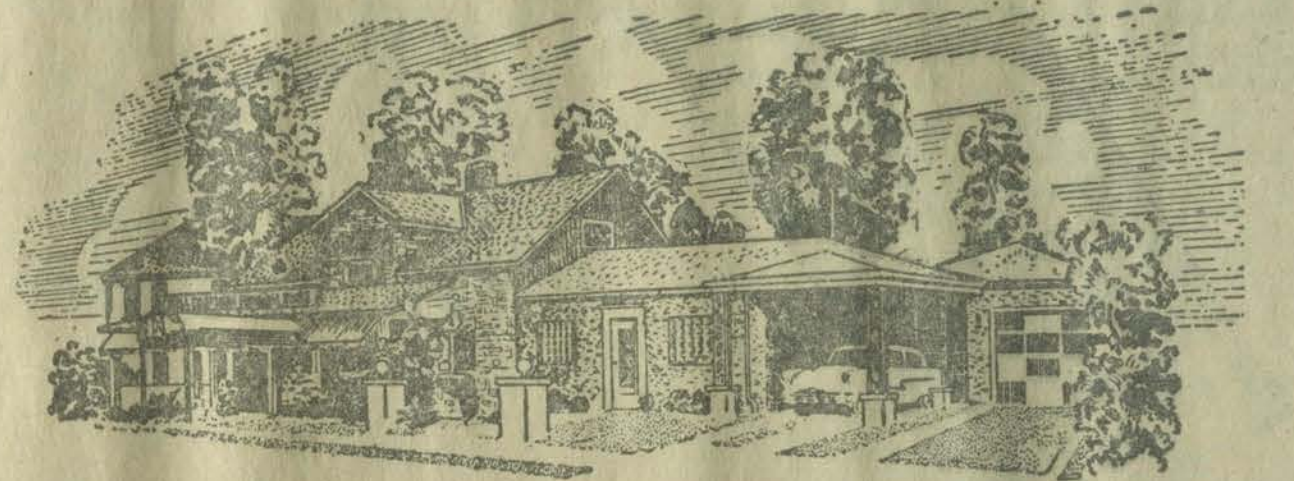

## Nature Trails By RUFUS M. REED

Man's Wanton Abuse of Planet Earth

It is the abuse and not the proper use of the planet earth that is such a shocking tragedy today. In places, men are literally skinning the earth alive!

Our planet has a skin that works in much the same way as the skin of humans. This consists of a thin layer of topsoil which produces grass, trees, all kinds of vegetation to keep the earth moist, alive and active. The earth's skin has pores much like the skin of humans; these let the air into the soil and keep it alive and productive. When the earth's soil and plants are skinned away, the subsoil is left bare and hard. It becomes hot and feverish and all life on it soon dies.

The ancients believed that the earth was a sensitive being and that it could feel the shocks and abuses man made on its surface, and that it often reacted violently to these. This seems to hold true even today. When men clear away the trees, strip-mine the surface of the hills and disturb the earth's protective layer, we have violent floods, landslides, dust storms and other serious disasters.

The earth is the producer and sustainer of life. It is the mother of all living things, including man. In Genesis we read: "And the earth brought forth grass, and herbs yielding seed, and the fruit trees yielding fruit." We also read that man is of the earth, earthy, comes from the earth and returns to it after death.

When we destroy the earth's topsoil, her protective mantle of vegetation and her trees, we render her sterile, unable to produce and sustain life. Much of the earth's surface is going back to desert, where there are no living things. The total acres of the earth is 30 billion, and of this area nearly nine billion acres have already been turned into sterile desert lands. The earth's outer layer of soil and green vegetation act as insulating agents against weathering, erosion, violent winds, washing

by heavy rains; and when this is removed, the earth becomes dry, feverish, hot, just as a human body would if it lost its insulating skin. The skin cools the body in summer and regulates the temperature. If the body should lose more than one-third of its skin, death would surely follow. Similarly, if a tree loses one-third of its bark, it will surely die, and if a tree is "belted," that is, if the bark is peeled off all the way around the trunk, the tree will die. This is because the circulation of life-giving elements cut off by the removal of the bark.

If the time should ever come when our earth loses one-third or more of its protective layer of vegetation and topsoil, the underground water table will sink so low it can never be replenished, and all life will be in danger of extinction. Green trees and plants conserve and preserve the moisture, and when the land is cleared and fully exposed to the hot sun, then the water evaporates too fast, the water table sinks too low and the earth becomes hot and sterile.

Today we are fast destroying the earth's capacity to get air into the pores of the soil, to produce green vegetation. We are doing this on an ever-increasing scale by laying down multiplied thousands of miles of concrete, stopping all life permanently, filling up the pores of the soil and making a dead, dry earth beneath. No water can get into the earth where the many miles of concrete are laid.

We are also destroying the surface of the earth by many unwise practices, such as strip-mining, tearing away the protective outer layer of soil and leaving a barren, rock-strewn earth, subject to the caprices of the elements and violent washing in heavy rains.

We are also rendering the earth sterile and unproductive by the continuous and widespread cutting and removal of the trees on a scale unpre-

cedented in our earth's history. When the trees are cut and removed from the hillsides, the springs and mountain brooks dry up fast, the water table drops and the earth becomes barren and sterile.

If the present rate of destruction continues, our planet will become a vast Sahara desert, without life of any kind.

The only hope for the future preservation of this good earth and its life on it is to cover all barren lands with grasses and to set out trees on a large scale. We are setting out many thousands of trees each year but we need to set out many times more if we are to keep the earth cool, moist and able to sustain life.

There is also a dire need to stop tearing away the earth's surface by strip-mining and logging operations, which leave the hills scarred and bruised by bulldozers.

Our good planet earth was made for the wise use of man and it has many kinds of valuable resources to help man live. But when he abuses the earth and destroys her resources through wilful waste or greed, he is not true to his heritage.

### Lower Lake Cumberland Hasn't Slowed Fishing

Frankfort, Ky. — When the public was informed last month Lake Cumberland would be lowered to correct an "adverse drainage condition" in the earth portion of the dam, public reaction ranged from indifference to alarm.

Fishermen were worried over possible effects on fishing conditions this summer and future fish population, since the lowering of the water level has taken place when the lake normally is stabilized for spawning.

Actual results have been surprising. Fishing has been excellent during the drawdown. Catches, on the average, have been greater than those made earlier when the lake was at its seasonal level. Past experience at the Tennessee River Basin, when its lakes were lowered, has demonstrated to fish experts that aeration of the lakeshore and exposure to sun permitted veg-

estation to grow down to the lower lake edge, creating additional food and even better fishing conditions.

According to Minor Clark, commissioner of Fish and Wildlife Resources, "We have been informed by Col. Jesse L. Fishback, district engineer, that the drainage would taper off and hold at 680 feet, seven feet above minimum power pool. At this level, the lake has 37,680 acres — or nearly 59 square miles of surface.

"Lake Cumberland has been lower than this before," he said, "it's just that such levels were at a different time of the year."

"Even at the bottom of the power pool, with elevation at 673 feet, there would be more than 35,000 acres of water surface, which is greater than Dale Hollow," he said.

Morehead, Ky. — As of May 21, a total of 996 Kentuckians have been admitted for the fall semester at Morehead State University, Dr. John R. Duncan, director of admissions at the University, has announced.

The fall semester at the University opens Saturday, Sept. 14, with registration of part-time students for night and Saturday classes.

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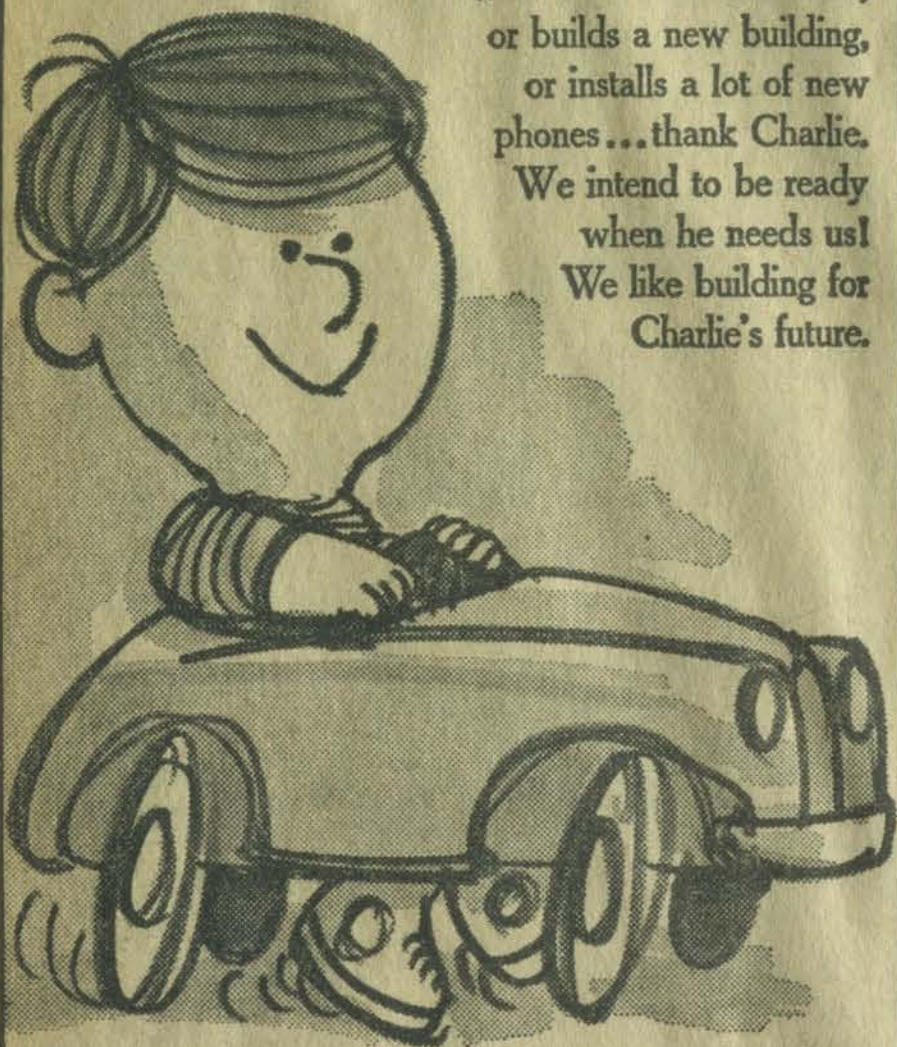
