The Prestonsburg Ministerial Association has been told by a Federal Housing Authority official that its plan for 75 rentsupplement housing units here is feasible, and it is possible that construction will begin this sum- since last September.

The housing program is being sponsored by the ministers as a non-profit group to relieve the acute housing shortage here.

CONSTITUTIONAL

Reported favorably in the Senate was HB 423 and in the House SB 173, both of which propose amendments to Kentucky's Constitution. Only two proposals to amend the State Constitution can be forwarded to the voters by the Legislature when it meets in regular session every two years. HB 423 would provide for annual instead of biennial legislative sessions and a later start in the year following the election of a governor. SB 173 would require farm property to be assessed for tax purposes at its
