Legislature Updates Mental Health Laws

The legislation, which incorporates many recommendations in the American Psychiatric and American Bar Associations model laws, ranges from a revised, modernized definition of mental retardation to a measure designed to keep emotionally disturbed people out of jail, the Department said. It gave this review of the bills:

The legislation separates the legal question of incompetency from the medical question of need for treatment. Patients often had been simultaneously declared incompetent to handle their affairs when they were admitted to hospitals involuntarily under the old law.

The legislation also: Assures that persons hospitalfor mental retardation have the same rights as those hospitalized for emotional illness. Eliminates such archaic terms

as "pauper idiot" and "feeble-

minded."

Enables courts to use regional mental health facilities for observation and treatment, allowing for services at the nearest possible point to the patient. HB 533 was sponsored by Reps. 

NO DEATH-WATCH NEEDED

The people of Pike county are, naturally, interested in the announcement that Fishtrap Dam will be dedicated on April 27. Residents of the entire flood-tortured Big Sandy valley hail the fact that this dam is near completion and almost ready to join Dewey, John Flannagan and Pound Reservoirs in the big job of flood control.

Yet, despite all the enthusiasm in Pike county about this major impoundment and what it may mean not only to that county but to all other downstream counties, there is a strange apathy about what lies ahead for the lake that Fishtrap Dam will create.

The dedication is being held before actual completion of work on the dam, it is explained, to emphasize "the need to add several thousand acres to the Reservoir in order to have one of the best recreational complexes in the area.'

But if anybody, in any capacity, is seeking a way of keeping Fishtrap from being a black body of water laden with coal dust and sludge, the search has been made in deep silence. Washings from Virginia mines have for years blackened the river. These black waters with their load of sludge flow directly into what is to be Fishtrap Lake. Inevitably, the lake will lose. Water in its natural state has a powerful attraction. Black water repels.

Kentucky, it is true, is powerless to control another state. But, surely, if an earnest effort is made by officials from the local level to Frankfort and even on to Washington, reciprocal cooperation could be effected between Kentucky and Virginia.

How to get such an effort made is a baffling problem. Kentucky has failed to control a situation arising within its own borders which threatens Dewey Lake with black water from mines in the upper reaches of Johns Creek. We haven't been silent about this situation, but the continued failure of the state to act to prevent destruction of a mecca for tourists, vacationists and thousands of others is frustrating.

"We are keeping an eye on the situation," those who have argued the existence of a mortal danger to Dewey Lake have been told.

Neither Dewey nor Fishtrap needs an eye kept on them. No death-watch is needed. The only solution lies in positive action.



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
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

Among these was Senate Bill 252 which would repeal mandatory annual safety inspection of motor vehicles and require only that when changing ownership they must have passed such an inspection within the previous year.

Another was the first statewide open housing bill enacted by a state south of the Ohio River. Generally, this measure would prohibit racial, ethnic or religious discrimination in the sale of property.

House Bill 499 would require mandatory inspection and regulation of all the state's slaughterhouses and meat processing plants. The bill is nearly identical to a model meat inspection law drafted by the U.S. Depart-

ment of Agriculture. A "truth - in - lending" bill would exempt pawn brokers but would require loan companies to provide customers with a statement of the amount of credit charges in dollars and the amount of simple annual interest charg-

ed. By passage of House Bill 392, the legislators voted to increase their own between sessions expense allowance from \$150 to \$300 a month. This came in an amendment to the bill providing substantial raises for most Kentucky

judges. Another bill sent to the governor would allow nighttime thoroughbred horse racing in Kentucky. The law now on the books prohibits racing after sunset. The new measure would allow the running of races until midnight.



After moving to Missouri to practice law, Vest became a senator in the Confederate Congress during the Civil War and later U. S. Senator for 25 years. Famous and respected as he was, he achieved immortality for something quite apart from his statesmanship, however.

In 1870 Senator Vest had a client named Charles Burden whose favorite hound, Old Drum, had been shot by a neighbor. Leonides Hornsby, allegedy for killing sheep. Burden sued Hornsby for damages. 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


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
