

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



Among Moran's top Centre players were three official All-America team performers quarterback Alvin "Bo" McMillin, now deceased; fullback-end James "Red" Roberts, of Somerset, also deceased; and end James "Red" Weaver, who now resides in Mayfield. Weaver, who was formerly manager of Dewey Reservoir, Floyd county, for the U. S. Corps, Army Engineers, kicked 99 consecutive extra points after touchdowns to set an all-time record which has not been equalled.

Weaver was among former Moran players who attended Saturday's marker dedication here. Others to attend included Norris Armstrong, of Danville, captain of the 1921 team; J. P. "Hump" Tanner, Owensboro; Dr. George McClure, Jr., Danville: Col. George Chinn, Harrodsburg, director of the Kentucky State Historical Society; Howard VanAntwerp, Jr., Ashland: Col. Clarence L. Jones, Louisville; Ed Kubale, Sr., Danville; and Tom Bartlett, Owens-

Moran was born in Nashville, Tenn. in 1879 but grew up in Horse Cave. His first football coaching job was at the old Bethel College in Russellville. He coached at Texas A. & M. from 1908 to 1913 and coached the famous Carlisle Indians, Carlisle. Pa. in 1914-'15.

An alumnus of the University of Tennessee, he played pro baseball and played on one of the first pro football teams, the Massillon, Ohio Tigers. He died in 1949 and was buried in the

Though the attack on the forests has been It greatly reduced, largely, I fear, because there are few forests to attack, occasionally, even in 1968. I have seen excellent tracts of growing timber cut down and the space bulldozed as if for a super-market. Maybe I am a little bit selfish in noticing this belated clearing of forests, especially since there are thousands of unused acres lying around everywhere, some of them capable of producing even more than the recently-cleared newgrounds. You see, every time a forest is cut down, particularly one that bordered farm lands and was a natural home for the farm birds, there is effected a change in bird life. Though many birds can adjust to changed conditions, some of our rare ones find it impossible to maintain their former numbers when forests are cleared or

> even when old fields are again brought into cultivation. In the more than a half century that I have studied birds I have seen hundreds of changes in bird life, a few of them for the best, but generally with the birds as vic-

> For a good many years I have had the satisfaction of knowing that many people are interested in attracting all the common songbirds around their farms, One large land-owner, on whose farms I have walked for a large portion of my mature years, was at first slightly suspicious of my regular trips to inspect his acres-and his birds. Long before he died of old age, however, he would laughingly scold me il I failed to appear several times a year to see HIS birds. Every time I go across those samt ing interest in just commor birds, how he planted several shrubs to be sure that they would be around his house and could find food in season, how he radiated friendliness to us bird students when we wanted o see his farm. He summarized a whole period in our American growth in knowledge of nature and our concern with guaranteeing its safety for future genera-

> "Old Fields" could have been a suitable name for much of the area around my childhood home. Though the Jackson Purchase had not been opened for settlement until 1819, by the time I arrived, sixty-nine years later, thousands of acres had been so ruined by the methods of farming then in vogue that they had been relired from cultivation. As a small boy I used to play in some of the gullies within a few loven yards of our own house, gullies so deep that we boys could stage a sort of Cops and Robbers game of dodging the LAW in the gullies and their numerous branches, gullies so deep that we could stand straight up without being seen by our pursuers, who might be in some branch of our gully system. To crown it all, just south of Fidelity itself was one of the largest gullies I have ever seen, in a ong life of watching how man treats his surroundings. This monster gully grew from a road that climbed a fairly large hill, and finally became so large that the entire village of Fidelity could have been stored in it without dismantling any of the houses. When I have told this tragedy many times, I have been doubted. Three years ago I repeated it before a forestry meeting and had the satisfaction of having in the audience a member of the state conservation department, who authenticated my statement about the size of the gully. Fortunately, this same officer of the conservation group assured me that my original county is away out front in the number of pine plantings; I personally have rejoiced to see some excellent pine groves in areas that were so eroded when I was a boy that practically nothing could grow. I rejoice to have lived to see a more sensible attitude toward nature and man's responsibility. The big gully cannot be filled, but it can be rendered less a menace to forests and cultirated fields farther down the valley.
