

#### WHO WILL PROFIT FROM A NEW HOSPITAL?

Some of the opposition to the founding by the Highlands Hospital Corporation of a regional hospital between Prestonsburg and Paintsville is selfcondemnatory.

This is the opposition based on the argument that the building and staffing of a new and modern hospital outside Paintsville will adversely affect the economy of that progressive county-seat town. That is the sort of argument heard more and more often, these days, to the discredit of those who propound it, for it asks, in effect:

"What's in it for us?" This argument that a new hospital will hurt Paintsville or Prestonsburg, or help either or both, may be hard-headed and practical and even typical of modern-day thinking. But it also is hard-

It occurs to The Times that the question should not be asked if this community or that will profit financially from the new hospital; rather, that the all-important question is, "Will sick children, the elderly, all who need hospitalization, surgery, expert treatment, the most modern facilities for their treatment and care—will such as these ben-

The Times happens to be among those who think a new hospital and the specialists it will attract, plus the most modern facilities for treatment and dare, will profit those who need help in time of greatest need. And we are not going to measure the distance from the proposed hospital site to Prestonsburg and Paintsville and guess at which community will haul in the greatest number of dollars, because we happen to subscribe to the theory that the very best in hospitals is not too good for our people, or any people. We support the venture without hazarding a guess at the future of municipal balance sheets or cash register totals.
