The PPC ruled that such action 'violated commission regulations and the code of ethics of the teaching profession."

Another charge brought against the educators by 49 other Kentucky educators whose investment in the company has diminished in value was dismissed by the PPC. That charge was that the accused educators "wrongfully used pictures, names, and KEA (Kentucky Education Association Journal to sell stock and solicit loans in Educators Investment Finance Corporation.

The PPC reasoned that the magazine advertisement required a prospective purchaser of stock in the industrial loan corporation to get in touch with the company prior to any stock solicitation. But teachers were personally confronted by company salesmen with the brochure and faced with making an immediate decision.

The censure by the PPC, a state agency that is the Kentucky education profession's self-disciplining body, was against the following school administrators, all of whom were members of the corporation's board of directors:

Mitchell Davis, executive vice president of EIFC and former Barren County school superintendent; Harlan County superintendlent James Cawood; Bardstown superintendent Ted Crosthwait; former Christian County superintendent T. W. Stewart; Hazard superintendent Roy Eversole; efferson County assistant superntiendent Jack Dawson, EIFC's president; Russell Williamson, former principal of Inez high school; Montgomery County superintendent E. G. Jones, and Franklin County superintendent V. Koy Bondurant.

Charges against McCracken County superintendent Leon Smith and W. H. Harnison of Eastview were dismissed by the PPC because "no evidence was presented at the hearing against these two respondents," who also were board members of the corpora-

EIFC last year became a subsidiary of TSI, Inc., which controls Teachers Life Insurance Company American Pyramid Corporation more recently acquined control of TSI.

The PPC, whose chairman is Rodney Herrold of Paducah, principal of McCracken county's Reidland elementary school, assented in its ruling that educators have the same right as do other citizens to engage n private busi-

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

#### Ivyton Quadrangle In New Geologic Map

Two new geologic maps, prepared under the coperative mapping program of the Kentucky and U. S. geological surveys, have just been printed, according to Dr. Wallace W. Hagan, state geologist, at the University of Kentucky.

The new maps are:

Geologic map of the Ivyton Quadrangle, by C. L. Rice, covering parts of Floyd, Johnson, and Magoffin counties. Coal has been mined throughout the quadrangle from as many as 10 coal beds, primarily for domestic use. The area also is in the Big Sandy gas field.

Geologic map of the Rock Haven Quadrangle and part of the Laconia Quadrangle, by C. F. Withington and E. G. Sable, covering part of Meade county. Otter Creek Park recreation area and parts of the Doe Run and Muldraugh gas storage fields lie within the

mapped area.

mined. Less than three months after reinstatement of his license, he was back in court again. And the charge? Again it was driving while intoxicated and again it was amended to reckless driving. Soon after that incident, the Public Safety Department hit him with a license revocation followjursdiction.

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




