Fifth Local Option Poll Set Saturday

Vote Is 3rd Countywide Since 1943

12 Hours of Voting To Decide Wet-Dry Status of County

The fifth local option election to be held in Floyd county since the repeal of Prohibition will be held between the hours of 6 a. m. and 6 p. m., Saturday.

The question at issue will be decided by simple "Yes" and "No" answers—"Yes," if you are wet; "No," if you are dry.

Voting machines which will be used at all of the county's voting precincts were checked Monday, and they will be moved out to the voting places Friday.

Newspaper and radio advertising were being used by both sides, and in waning days of the vote drive the dry forces, spearheaded by the Christian Dry League, conducted a series of district rallies at Martin, McDowell, Betsy Layne and Martin, with Charles Wesley Ewing, Royal Oaks, Mich. church leader, as the speaker.

Floyd county voted wet in the first local option election, May 15, 1943, 2,763 votes to 2,291. Three years later Sept. 30, 1946, the county voted dry, 6,304 to 4,669, and it has remained dry ever since. The last countywide test was on (See Story No. 4, Page 5)

Ranier, Month Ahead Of Schedule on Work In Mud Creek Section

Construction of the water distribution system to serve Mud Creek and its tributaries is a month ahead of schedule, it was said here this week by a spokesman for the Ranier Construction Company, contractor on the project.

The work on Toler Creek has been completed. In all, 15 miles of eight-inch main has been laid, and five miles of three-inch line work also has been completed. The big project involves the laying of approximately 65 miles of line.

About 30 residents of the area are at work on the project, and it was emphasized that the shooting of a night-watcher there had no connection with the construction undertaking itself.

Other contractors have completed 10 tank sites, with two more to be built. The contractor moved into the area Monday to begin work on pump station sites.

VIETNAM VET IS WOUNDED

Father of Reynolds Admits Shooting, Says Son Threatened Him

Sgt. Bobby Ray Reynolds, 20-year-old veteran of Vietnam, was shot and seriously wounded Monday night by his father, Ray D. Reynolds, 42, at the Reynolds home on the Corn Fork of Brandy Keg, near Lancer.

The soldier, home on furlough prior to a second assignment in Vietnam, was shot in his left chest with a .22-calibre rifle.

His father admitted the shooting, but no charge has been lodged against him. The elder Reynolds was quoted by authorities as saying his son was advancing upon him, armed with a dagger, a souvenir brought home from Vietnam, when the shot was fired.

Reynold's condition, when he was first taken to the Prestonsburg General hospital, was considered critical, but was improved Wednesday. He was transferred to the Army hospital at Fort Knox. His father is a former Floyd deputy sheriff and school bus driver.

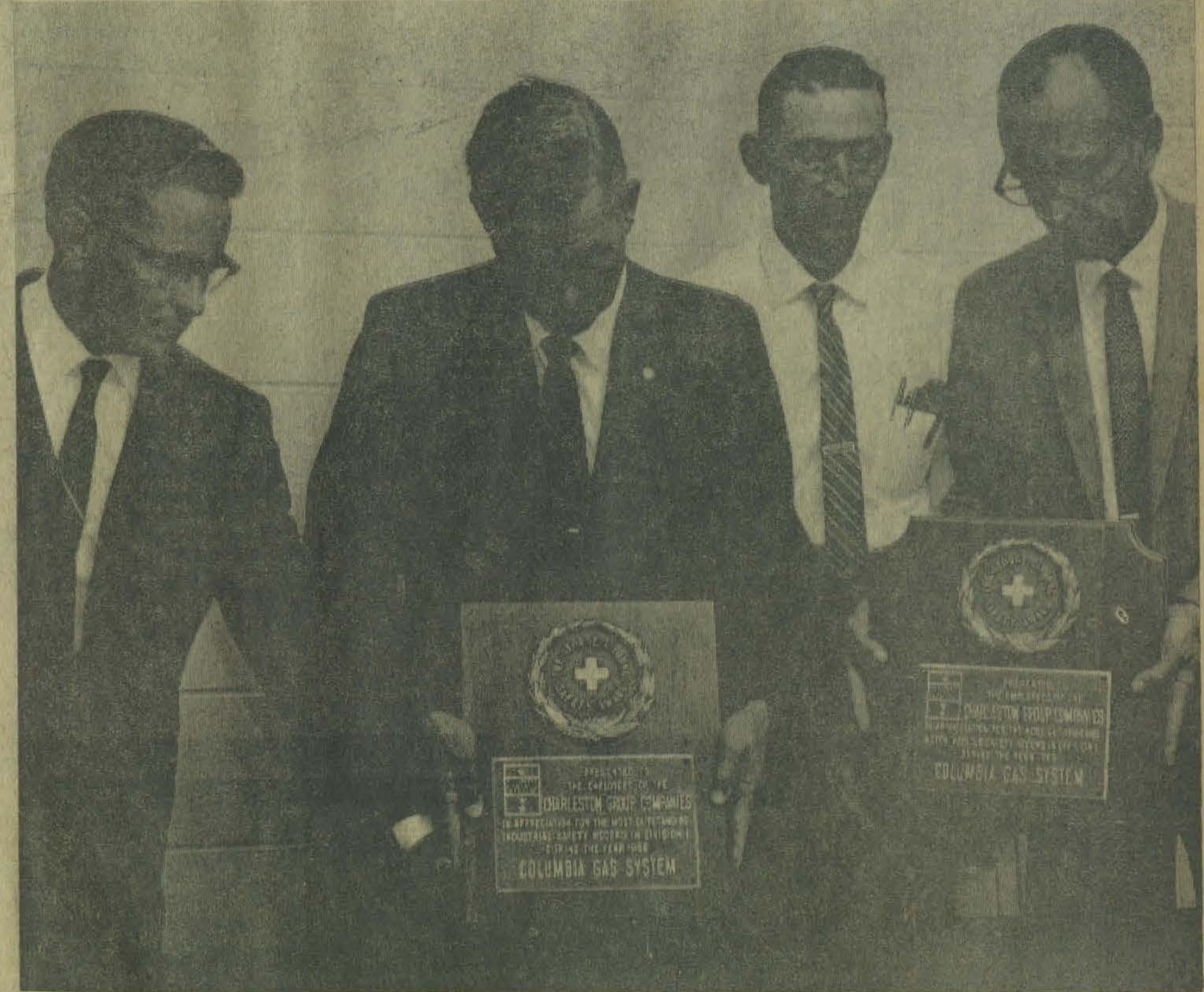
Archer and Perkins Among Kentuckians To Get Medallions

Youth Repudiates Story of Slaying

Bond of \$3,000 was asked Tuesday afternoon by County Judge Henry Stumbo for the release till the September grand jury convenes of David Akers, 19, who was accused of the gunshot slaying, early last Thursday, of Charlie Hall, 31, on Mud Creek.

The bond was set at the conclusion of Akers' examining trial. No defense testimony was heard. The Commonwealth quickly ran into trouble in presenting its case when 14-year-old Michael Ray Hall, who admitted he was with Akers on the night of the slaying, repudiated a statement made last Thursday.

His statement, taken a few hours after the shooting, said he, Akers and Harold Dean Mitchell, were siphoning gasoline from the tank of a truck used by the Ranier Construction Company on the Mud Creek water system project when Charlie and Willard Hall, nightwatchmen, appeared on the scene. This statement said Akers had a pistol in his belt and that young Hall heard one or two shots fired from the direction taken by Akers after the three who fled had separated.

But, testifying at the hearing, the youth denied any knowledge of the entire incident, claiming he had been asleep in the rear seat of a car since he and the others had taken a girl to Betsy Layne. He claimed he was awakened by Mitchell who told him he had been shot, and denied hearing any shots.

Young Hall admitted he had made the initial statement under oath but explained the statement was made because State Detective Chester D. Potter frightened him by telling he would go to the reform school for life if he did not tell the truth.

Detective Potter later was used as a witness, and he confirmed the original sworn statement. He testified that the Plymouth Valiant which was parked near the shooting scene was owned by David Akers. He also told of finding two broken gallon jugs from which gasoline had spilled along a line between the Ranier truck and car. The weapon used in the shooting of Hall has not been found, officers said. They added that Mitchell, who suffered a severe (See Story No. 2, Page 4)

The adult basic education classes in this county were brought to an end Monday, last week, when students finished testing at the Prestonsburg Community College. Teachers for the ensuing year's classes will meet at the County Superintendent's office Saturday for orientation for the new sessions. One hundred-two graduates have received high school equivalency diplomas, and an increased number is expected to complete courses this year, according to James Salisbury, director of the program. "The adult program has been in operation four years in this county," Salisbury said, "and during that time 520 persons have been issued high school equivalency certificates and 800 have received eighth grade diplomas, plus many others in special interest classes."

5 DOCTORS QUIT CLINIC

New Clinic Formed By McDowell Group As Rift Aftermath

Not one but five McDowell physicians have resigned, effective Saturday, from the Daniel Boone Clinic, Harlan, Ky., it was said this week.

One resignation, that of Dr. Mary A. Hall, was reported last week. Joining her in resignations effective August 23 are Drs. Susan J. Brenner, Romeo S. Berardi, William A. Pratt and Lowell F. Roberts. The five physicians announced they will continue their medical practice at McDowell as a group known as the Regional Medical Clinic.

Dr. Hall's action severing her connection with the clinic was followed by her filing of a suit in circuit court here to determine her rights, since a clause in the clinic by-laws provides that a doctor upon separating from the clinic may not practice within a radius of 50 miles of McDowell. The other four doctors are not affected by the clause, it was said this week.

Office hours of the new Regional Medical Clinic will be the same as already in effect—9 a. m.—5 p. m., Tuesday through Saturday. The doctors' new telephone number is 377-2492, and the organizational change is not expected to work any inconvenience for doctors' patients.

ASCS SLATES SEPT. VOTING

Farmers To Select Committee Members In Five Communities

Community committeemen from the five communities of the Floyd county ASCS organization met here Friday to prepare for the poll of farmers next month which will effect the new community and county ASCS organization.

A panel of six nominees for community committee men was prepared for each of the five communities. Other nominees may be added by petition signed by as many as six farmers, but only one name may be placed on each petition, and such petitions must reach the ASCS office not later than Monday, Aug. 25.

Then ballots will be mailed to every known eligible voter not later than Monday, Sept. 8. These must be returned to the ASCS office here in person or by mail, postmarked not later than Sept. 19. The ballots will be counted at the office here on Sept. 24.

After that, delegates elected from each of the five communities will meet at the county ASCS office Sept. 30 at 10 a. m., to elect the county committee for a three-year term. Positions of chairman, vice-chairman and regular members of the county committee will be filled at that time.

Harry T. Hill is the present chairman of the county committee. The five communities comprising the ASCS organization are Right Beaver Creek, Mud Creek, Middle Creek and Cow Creek.

Lawrence Keathley, of Martin, has been appointed campaign manager in Floyd county for the state Republican campaign this fall, it was announced this week. P'BURG SONGWRITING TEAM BEATS LONG ODDS, SCORES ON FIRST TRY AT NASHVILLE

Prestonsburg's Bobby Ranier and Mike Omerod were connected on what has been called a 10-million-to-1 shot—they have succeeded in Nashville, Tenn., country music capital of the world, on their first try!

The Ranier-Omerod team took their composition, "Ballad of the Little Red Truck," to Nashville last week, and within a day it had been accepted by Adam's Rib Publications and they had signed a contract covering royalties.

And "Down in Old Kentucky" was mailed last Thursday to the Nashville publishers to go with their ice-breaking opus, "Ballad of the Little Red Truck." Another song, "Fair Warning," has been written for a group of feminine recording stars. Re-

turning here from Nashville, the partners announced three other compositions of theirs have been bought. These are "Lonely Road," "The Clown" and "Sometimes in the Morning." Ranier and Omerod are represented by Jay Rainwater, agent. The two men have been working together for a year, and they finally decided to give Nashville a try. Neither has had any formal music education. Their songwriting headquarters has been the Confederate Gun Shop, which Ranier has operated here the last several months. The owner of the gunshop indicated last week that his business hereafter will run more to words and music than to shot and shell.

Abandon Church For School Use

Use of the First Baptist Church basement as temporary classroom space for Martin elementary students was discontinued this week because surface water had entered the rooms and ventilation was poor.

Announcing discontinuance of the use of the rooms, Superintendent of Schools Charles Clark said permission has been granted by the Division of Buildings and Grounds, State Department of Education, for the Floyd County Board of Education to enter into a lease-purchase agreement for relocatable classrooms. Three of these are being purchased and are expected to be in use on the Martin campus by the first week of September, he said. A fourth unit is being moved to Martin from the Stumbo elementary school, where the need is not so acute, and it will be in use immediately.

The superintendent said purchase of relocatable classrooms for the Martin school had remained pending because the Division of Buildings and Grounds did not want to buy them as long as space made available in the church was usable. He expressed his appreciation of the cooperation of the churches in making classroom space available after last year's loss of a building to fire.

Until the units are erected there, pupils will meet in the high school building in such space as can be made available—possibly the auditorium stage, a space similar to that used by the Prestonsburg elementary school.

The superintendent said two classrooms in each of three other buildings, the Methodist and Mormon churches and the Masonic building, will continue to be used by the elementary school at Martin.

Health Department Job Openings Told

Openings for two jobs with the local health department have been announced this week by the Merit System Council of the Kentucky State Department of Health, Frankfort.

The positions, both with a salary range from \$5,760 to \$8,520, are that of Senior County Sanitarian and Educator. Senior County Sanitarian's duties include seeing that sanitary regulations are carried out; making sanitary inspections of dairies, meat packing plants, food and milk plants, hotels, tourist courts, swimming pools, summer camps, sewage disposal systems; making sanitation recommendations for improvements and related work as required.

To qualify for this position the applicant must be a graduate of a college or university of recognized standing with courses in one of the biological or physical sciences.

Duties of the Educator, who works under the direction of a health officer and the technical supervision of the division of public health education of the state Department of Health, include assisting in carrying out public health programs for the local health department; and related work as required. Examples of this work may be planning and writing press releases, pamphlets, radio scripts, other educational literature; helping in community organization work preparatory to visits of mobile health units such as x-ray, dental and cancer control; assisting in conducting community health surveys and organizing community health councils.

Qualifications for this position require that the applicant be a graduate of a recognized college or university with a degree in one of the natural sciences, social science, english, journalism, teacher education, art or a related field. The applicant must have the ability to interpret programs and activities verbally and in writing, to prepare and give talks.

Examinations for both these positions are written. Application blanks and additional information may be secured from any county health department or from Merit System Office, Kentucky State Department of Health, 275 East Main Street, Frankfort, Ky.

A MATTER FOR THE GRAND JURY

THE TIMES has an idea the next grand jury can do Floyd county a great service by taking a long and searching look into a situation which, naturally, concerns a large part of the population.

This investigation, which should continue as long as necessary, should deal with reported dope-peddling, corruption of youth and inciting to violence.

This should not be a witch-hunt. It must not be. It should be an honest attempt to learn the truth, to pin down the guilt, if any, and to let the law take orderly action against any who may be guilty.

The FBI has valuable information that may be available. Many say they have specific facts at hand. All should be heard.

Such official action is needed to prevent a situation which invites action outside the law. It is also needed by those groups which are accused. They should be the first to demand it, if they have nothing to hide.

THE PICTURE THAT WOULD TELL THE SORDID STORY

We wish somebody had made and preserved on film the picture as it existed on Prestonsburg's infamous "Rat Row," 23 years ago and during the "wet" years that existed before that.

The picture might not do any great credit to the memory of some of our departed citizens or to the reputation of some who are still around, but it would be worth much to those younger people who find it difficult to believe oral descriptions given of those days here by their elders who were eyewitnesses.

There is no need for an attempt to be made now at a detailed description of the drunkenness, vulgarities, obscenities and outright crime that gave that part of town its name. It should suffice to say that from that street, which now seldom sees a drunk, order and decency had departed.

But, you say, Rat Row is gone, and in its stead is a block of modern business buildings. That, happily, is true, but there are a hundred sites waiting for new Rat Rows, and they will grow overnight, toadstool-like, once this county ever makes the mistake of forgetting the lessons of the past and of going back to that "wet" status of years ago.

School Enrollment Drop Seen as New Term Opens

Floyd county's schools opened their 1969-'70 term Monday morning, and at the end of the second day of school 9,517 pupils had been enrolled.

This was a decrease of 165 enrollment from the total recorded in the first two days of school last year, but the study directed by the Floyd County Board of Education to determine if the pupil loss would affect the number of teachers had not become definite enough to reach a decision, it was said Wednesday by Superintendent Charles Clark.

Opening of county schools put 50 school buses rolling, in addition to contract drivers who transport small numbers of pupils. The 50 buses transport almost 9,000 pupils and they travel a total of 3,816.6 miles a day. The 812.2 miles covered daily by contract drivers and special runs bring the total distance covered each day to 4,628.8 miles, it was said.

Various problems attended the resumption of classwork but most were of a routine nature. The worst situation arose at Martin where classwork in a church basement was discontinued.

Area Development Priorities Sought

Directors of the Big Sandy Development Council discussed at Prestonsburg Community College Monday evening various programs and areas of activity for the months ahead.

The meeting was followed by a request from Joseph L. McCauley, director of the development council, asking board members to make a choice of areas of activity on which emphasis should be placed. He suggested they mark their choices in the order of priority they would place each area of emphasis.

"It's possible the board will consider one of the major concerns of acquiring and developing industrial sites in the valley," Mr. McCauley said.

Also mentioned for consideration were:

1. A sales program to create within the Big Sandy area a demand for an adequate supply of quality water, adequate sewage disposal and a system of collection and disposal of solid waste.
2. A detailed study to determine the relative roles of the Mayo Vocational School, Prestonsburg Community College and Pikeville College.
3. Assessment and evaluation of the existing and potential work force.
4. An inventory of existing vocational education and capabilities and potential in the light of existing requirements and future needs.
5. Sponsorship of legislation to develop a viable housing industry within Appalachian Kentucky.
6. Assessment of zoning regulations against present conditions as they relate to probable future expansion.

7. Development of tourism complexes around existing lakes and those in the planning stage, including a continued drive for authorization of the Royalton Reservoir, continued planning in the case of the Paint Creek Reservoir, development of the Fishtrap area and adequate campsites for Jenny Wiley State Park.

The Big Sandy area was the first to become recognized as an Economic Development District, and now the Appalachian Regional Commission is asking the district to help at the local level in planning a five-year program for further development of the region. EDA has also called for the establishing of a Second Stage Overall Economic Program.

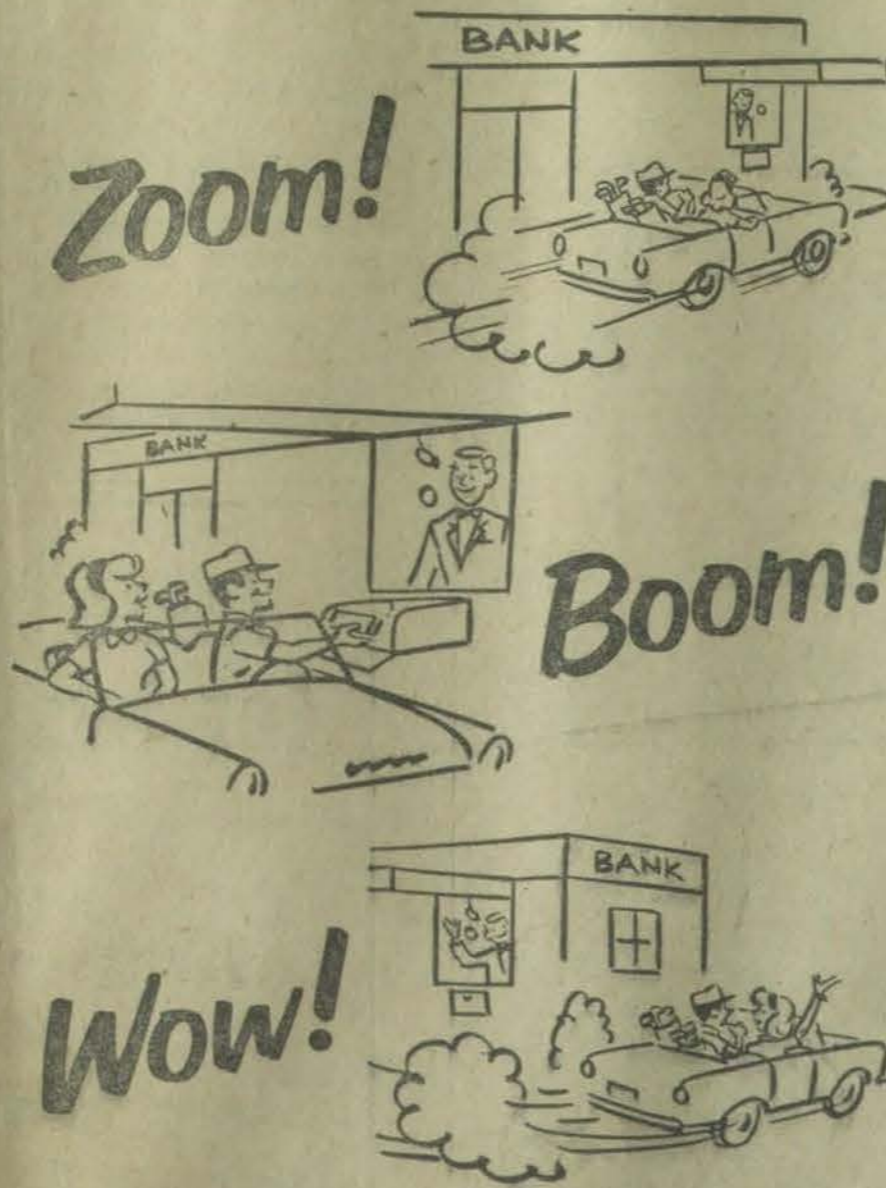

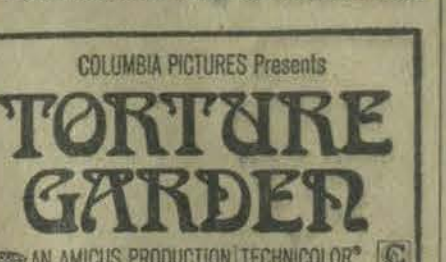

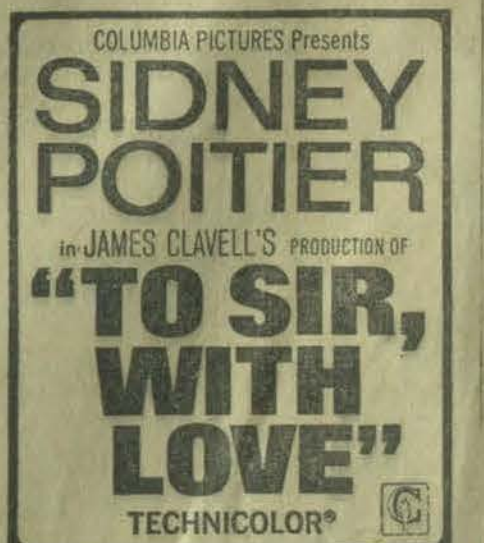

Sandy Community Action Program, said. "It does mean, however, that 'outside' VISTA's are not desired." In the future, the directors decided, all VISTA's to work in the valley will be screened and employed by the Big Sandy Community Action Program, as is the case with others hired by CAP.

Eastburn said that a director of the 979 Club, on which VISTA personnel have centered their attention in this county, remarked at Monday's meeting that the club recognizes that "outside" VISTA's are a source of trouble. Mr. Eastburn said that at the outset of the VISTA program, which is OEO-financed, it was understood no outside personnel would be employed but that a request for four or five people such as nurses or other technicians was later made. He added that at the outset it was agreed that minutes of meetings of the 979 Club would be kept and transmitted to the CAP area office at Paintsville and that the club would keep in contact with area headquarters so that John Burton, assistant CAP director, could attend meetings. Eastburn indicated these provisions have been neglected.

Teen-Ager Finds It's Easy To Buy Beer in Lebanon

Lebanon, Ky.—This small town, long known to underage drinkers as "the Fort Lauderdale of Central Kentucky," is still worthy of the name.

Despite a rash of unfavorable publicity brought on by the Aug. 11 resignation of all six members of the Lebanon City Council, nightclubs in the town were still selling beer to minors Saturday night.

The sprawling town of 5,000, seat of Marion county, is in a wet county, surrounded by dry counties. It has four sizable nightclubs — the Club 68, the Golden Horseshoe, the Jane Todd Inn and the Club Cherry — which feature music for dancing.

The Club 68 and Golden Horseshoe, which feature rock bands, cater to a teenage crowd.

A 19-year-old Louisville student visited Lebanon Saturday night to find out whether laws forbidding the sale of beer to minors were being enforced.

"They didn't ask any questions when I went in with my date," the Louisville student reported.

"They asked the couple behind us if they were 18, but didn't look at any identification cards.

"When I ordered some beer, it was promptly delivered to me — no questions asked.

"There was a sign over the bar which said, 'You must show identification card to buy beer,' but I didn't see them check any ages or turn anyone down while I was there — and some of the customers were obviously younger than I am," the 19-year-old youth added.

A check of license plates in the club's parking lot disclosed automobiles from the Kentucky counties of Marion, Mercer, Green, Adair, LaRue, Bullitt, Washington, Spencer, Warren, Ohio, Shelby, Anderson, Boyle, Taylor and Jefferson, and from the state of Ohio.

The ages of patrons apparently ranged from about 15 to 35, and a number were obviously under 18, supposedly the minimum age for admittance to the Club 68. Tables were cluttered with beer bottles and cans of malt liquor.

Some customers brought their own bottles of hard liquor, and displayed them unabashedly on the tables. Many persons were seen buying six or 12 bottles of beer at a time, returning to their tables to distribute them to friends obviously under 21.

Lebanon's mayor, Hyleme S. George, used to own the Club 68; and the operation of the nightclub has been a major issue in the mayor's incessant quarrels with his city council. All six members

As of July 1, Eastern Kentucky counties have been quarantined to control an insect which is called the Cereal Leaf Beetle. This beetle works on small grain, hay and other forage crops.

The law specifies that no individual can transport hay, corn, and other grain crops from a regulated area into a non-regulated area without proper fumigation and specified dates. These regulated dates are as follows: Barley, oats, wheat, and other forage grain from June 1 through November 30; ear corn from August 1 through March 31 (fresh market corn is regulated year-around); hay from June 1 through January 15; straw and marsh hay from July 1 through February 28.
