



\$150,000, A SMALL PRICE

Business and professional people and citizens of the area are being asked to subscribe a total of \$150,000, payable over the next three years, in order to qualify the region for a hospital which will cost in excess of five million dollars. Except for this local contribution, the entire cost will be financed by federal grants and loan.

A local contribution of \$150,000 is not too much

This new hospital was conceived, is being plan-

ned and will be built not to serve only those now living and in need of modern hospital facilities. It belongs to the future of this area as truly as it does to the present.

It will be dedicated to, and serve, all who need modern hospital services in the area of diagnosis, medical treatment, surgery and hospital care. Its modern facilities and capacity for service will attract specialists such as may now be consulted by our people only after travel to distant cities.

The hospital will stand as a memorial to the progressiveness of the area and to the compassionate interest the people have for others—those who suffer now and those who will be born to suffer. It will not represent any individual or group.

Medical men here will be heavy financial contributors to this fund-raising campaign. They will do this, not to enhance their own professional incomes, but because they, better than any of us, know the needs of the area. No doctor needs a new hospital as a base for his practice. If they had no interest other than that of making their profession profitable, they could better practice from an old hospital and let their unattractive surroundings discourage other doctors from coming here, thus leaving the field to themselves.

But they are convinced the people of the region deserve the best in hospital care, and that that best should be within the reach of all who need it. Existing hospitals have served well, within the limits of their capabilities, but their facilities not only fall short of modern-day standards but are also such as to discourage specialists and many other topflight medical people from coming to this area of Kentucky.

If we want a modern hospital facility, we will be given the opportunity, very shortly now, to express that desire by committing ourselves as financial partners in a great undertaking.

MORE TROUBLE FOR COAL

The fact that "black lung" is a comparatively new disease ascribed to conditions in the nation's coal mines does not mitigate its seriousness or the urgency for action to meet this deadly threat to the lives of many thousands of workers. It is no more unreasonable for this action to be demanded now than it is for roof-bolting or any other measure designed to protect human life to be an urgent

The coal industry, by its very nature, is one beset by problems. Air pollution, stream pollution, spoilation of the land are laid at its door. Another human ailment, silicosis, results from the use of rock-dust. Mechanization was given great impetus by increasing wages, with machines taking over from manpower, and this same mechanization has increased the coal dust that has become a bane of the industry. The round of problems is endless. Millions are made in coal, and millions have been lost; it is a "feast or starvation" industry.

So it is that the coal business, a vital one to the country, is not one simply to be condemned. Its endless round of problems should earn for it some

degree of public sympathy.

But coal has no monopoly on trouble. The individual has his share of the same, and so does every other type of business. So it is that, in the last analysis of the situation, the industry must be required to face up to the things that plague it, particularly when they affect the lives of others.

"Black lung" may be as deadly as the more dramatic roof cave-in or mine explosion. Those who have contracted it deserve compensation without being subjected to great expense and trouble to get it. Those who yet are working and facing this danger must be given protection against it.

Whatever that protective measure is-and surely a country with the scientific know-how that the United States has can find one-whatever it is, it must be taken.
