### WANTED-YOU GUESS WHAT

Now comes another threatened government directive which revives memory of the old Quaker who, his confidence shaken in the sanity of the world about him, confided to his wife that it appeared everybody was crazy "except thee and me and sometimes I'm not so sure about thee."

We refer to the order issued by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission forbidding mention of preference for a man or woman in help wanted ads. An appeal has been filed from this order by the American Newspaper Publishers Association, and so its enforcement has been delayed, at least temporarily. But suppose it goes into effect

Don Robinson comments on the situation in THE AMERICAN PRESS with tongue in cheek and yet with more deference than such bureaucratic insanity deserves:

". . . presuming the order will be carried out, newspapers will no longer be permitted to have columns headed 'Female Help Wanted' or 'Male Help Wanted.' They must be integrated.

"The order would presumably prohibit the use of the word Salesman or Saleswoman, since these words specify sex. In this case I suppose the word Salesperson could be used. But others present greater difficulties.

Take 'waiter' or 'waitress.' What sexless word is there for someone who waits on tables? Should we coin a word like 'waitrix'?

"I suppose such an ad could begin with 'waiter' or 'waitress', but people object to paying for extra words and would also object to having to pay to add waiter when what they really want is a waitress. "And with some job names there doesn't seem

to be a word for each sex. Take Steeplejack for instance. Would the female be Steeplejackie? Or Watchman. Would it be Watchwoman? "Cthers which will cause problems include:

Handyman, Brakeman, Businessman, Cameraman, Chambermaid, Counterman and Doorman.

"The order does say that sex may be mentioned when the job could only be reasonably handled by one sex. But even that would require some difficult decision-making in a land where Rosie the Riveter was the name of a popular song.'



was reminiscent of the school bus tragedy of 1958 when 26 school children and the school bus driver lost their lives in the Big Sandy, near Knotley Hollow, about two miles from the site of Saturday's tragedy. Several hundred persons lined the highway while the search was made.

There was no eyewitness of the wreck except the boy who survived. He told Graham Burchett, captain of the rescue squad, he felt the impact as the auto hit the post and that he rolled down the window on his side as the car was careening toward the river. The boy recalled that he saw his mother leaving the car on the driver's side. He said he held onto one of his sisters for a time but was forced to release her.

The lone survivor of the accident clambered up the steep bank in the darkness to the highway, was picked up there by an unidentified Michigan motorist and taken to the nearby home of John Burchett where he told of what had happened.

At the time of his arrival there, when the door of the home was opened, the screams of the mother could be heard as she floated downriver.

Shortly after 9 a.m., the body of Tammy was removed by rescue squad members from the river at Knotley Hollow, approximately 21/2 miles downstream from the accident scene and within sight of the spot where the school bus tragedy occurred. The child's body, apparently buoyed by an air pocket in her clothing, floated on the surface. Forty-five minutes later, at the same spot, the body of the mother also was sighted on the surface and recovered.

Rescue squad members succeeded in removing the car from the river at 10:50 a.m. Hope that the second child's body might be in the vehicle were dashed. Only two dolls and a comic book floated out of the car and were swept downriver as the auto was pulled ashore.

The car had drifted from above the bridge to a point approximately 100 feet below it. It was located quickly, in midstream, but tedious, patient work in the muddy water was required before a firm hold on the auto could be effected with a grappling hook.

The search of the river for the missing body began immediately, and by Sunday searchers from three rescue squads -Floyd, Left Beaver and Pike county-had ranged as far downstream as Auxier.

Although Floyd Rescue Squad members are employed during the week, one boat was expected to resume patrol of the river Wednesday, and a full-fledged search will be resumed through Saturday and Sunday by all three squads.

Mrs. Akers was a native of Craynor, the daughter of the late Anthony Howell. She was first married to Dennis Akers, and later to Robert Joseph Pierce. Surviving, besides her husband and mother, are her son, Phillip, and one brother, Ronnie Howell, of Craynor.

Her daughter is survived by her father, her brother and her paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Sie Akers, of Grethel.

Joint funeral rites for the mother and daughter were held at 11 a.m. Tuesday from the home of Mrs. Pierce's mother, the Revs. Dee Ratliff, Butler Howell, Milford Adams, Chester Newsome and Orville Hamilton officiating. Burial was made in the Long Point cemetery at Craynor under direction of the Carter Funeral Home.
