Fair-Aid Program

The 1962 state Legislature began the state fair-aid program for local and district with passage of the Local Fair Law. The law provided for a \$65,000 total allocation which was upped to \$72,500 last year and to \$75,000 for 1969. The original \$1,500 maximum allocation per fair has been increased to \$2,000 this year. The grant of stateaid funds made to any fair shall not exceed one-half the amount of premiums paid out for livestock shows and agricultural exhibits...
