EDA Okehs Bids On Water System

Ranier Gets Major Part Of Project

Mud Cr. Bids Total \$1,229,145; Contracts To Be Signed Monday

The Economic Development Administration (EDA) this week gave its approval to bids totaling \$1,229,145 for construction of the Mud Creek water system, and formal awarding of contracts to the four successful bidders is tentatively scheduled for next Monday.

The bids had been under review since their opening here Feb. 6, and all stood as offered except that clarification of the bid of the H.B. Ranier Construction Company, of Prestonsburg, provides that it is to do the work at the prices quoted, with no additional charge for fire hydrants and cut-off valves.

Ranier's two contracts cover laying of approximately 55 miles of water lines at a bid of \$905,577.60. Other contracts approved are:

Miles P. Brown Boiler Works, Franklin, Pa., \$115,516 for construction of reservoirs; L. & R. Construction Co., Hamlin, W. Va., \$139,542 for reservoir foundations and access roads; Claude Wilburn, Lynn, Ky., \$88,500 for five pump stations.

The work to be undertaken by the major contractor involves the laying of 96,000 feet of eight-inch mains, 93,000 feet of six-inch and 90,000 feet of three-inch line. All but the three-inch line, which will be of plastic pipe, will be of cement asbestos.

The contractors will have 360 working days in which to complete the system after a work order is issued.

Completion of the big project will provide the entire Mud (See Story No. 5, Page 3)

The elder Hawkins said he is pleased with the new organization, because it complements the operation of his family's existing wholesale grocery business, Elkhorn Wholesale, which was recently established at Elkhorn City.

8 COTTAGES VANDALIZED

Lake Property Owners Plan \$1,000 Reward, Ask State Protection

Gordon Moore, owner of one of eight Dewey Lake summer cottages which have been vandalized in recent weeks, said Tuesday that owners of the property will meet here Sunday to complete the posting of a \$1,000 reward for persons committing violations on the property, in the past or future.

The latest breaks into the cottages were made last month, Moore said his cottage was broken into in December, then again when the others were looted in February.

Damages will run into the thousands of dollars, one of the owners said. Furniture was smashed, the buildings were riddled with small rifle bullets, contents of the cottages carried away.

James W. Keyser, W. Va., owner of one cottage, appealed last week to Governor Nunn for state police help, claiming the property - owners "have received very little help from county officers." He told the governor all the cottages were "virtually demolished."

Keyser added that in the six years since he built his cottage "we have seen our structures virtually destroyed every winter by a group of Floyd county hoodlums living nearby."

One of the cottages broken into is owned by Dr. Thomas Johns, president of Pikeville College. Other owners, in addition to Moore, Keyser and Johns, were listed as Marvin Music, of Prestonsburg; Joseph Martin, Ashland; Doug Byrd, Huntington, W. Va.; Ballard Napier, Matewan, W. Va.

TWO JAILED IN ROBBERY

Indiana Claims Man Held Here; 4 Counts Lodged Against Moore

Indiana authorities said here Tuesday that two former Floyd countians are wanted in their state to answer charges connected with the beating and robbery of an elderly woman.

One of the two, Edward Varney, was arrested on Frazier's Creek, near McDowell, Saturday by Deputy Sheriffs Claude Flamery, and J. D. Martin and was released to Indiana officers Tuesday. The officers said they planned to pick up a man named Gayheart, also a former Frazier's Creek resident, who was jailed at Norwalk, O., as having had a part in the robbery.

A Frazier's Creek liquor raid Sunday resulted in the jailing here of Edd R. Moore on four counts — possession and sale of beer, contributing to juvenile delinquency and illegal possession of a mink. Sheriff Joe W. Lewis and Deputies Flamerly, Reed and Martin reported they confiscated 59 cans of beer found in Moore's home and in a nearby auto. Deputy Sheriffs John Reed and Caner Hunter swore out the search warrant, saying they bought beer from Moore last Saturday night. (See Story No. 3, Page 5)

FOUR DEER ARE KILLED

Poachers Kill One, Dogs Claim Second; Clubs Post Rewards

Floyd County's deer herd was reduced by four last week, Conservation Officer Dalton R. Conley reported.

One buck was killed by a poacher in the vicinity of Pyramid, and officers are still working on that case, hoping to make an arrest. The deer was killed by a .22-calibre rifle bullet.

A doe was killed by an automobile when it was chased onto the highway near Lancer by dogs. A buck was chased down by dogs in the Goble Branch section of Dewey Lake, and the carcass of a doe was removed from the lake, at Dewey Dam. This deer is believed to have been chased by dogs onto the sheet of ice which covered the impoundment, two weeks or more ago, and to have drowned when the ice broke beneath it.

The Floyd County Fish and Game Club has posted a \$100 reward for the arrest and conviction of any person guilty of killing a deer in this county out of season. The club paid one reward in that amount last year.

This year, the Pike County Protective Association has posted a \$100 reward for this offense committed anywhere in the Seventh conservation district.

RED CROSS DRIVE BEGINS

"One vital point we must realize. We lost the Red Cross blood bank in this county in 1951. Rev. Milton Skiff, co-chairman of the drive, Miss Ella Noel White, executive secretary, and I had a meeting with Darrell House, general field representative for the state of Kentucky, and Mr. House told us then that we can probably get the blood program back in this county if we show sufficient support for the Red Cross in our drive this year."

KY. AUDITOR DIES AT 49

Clyde Conley Victim At Frankfort Hospital After 2-Week Illness

Funeral of State Auditor Clyde Conley, who died Saturday at King's Daughters' Hospital, Frankfort, was held Tuesday afternoon at the Third Street Free Will Baptist Church, Paintsville.

Mr. Conley died after an illness of two weeks. He was 49. Governor Nunn ordered state flags flown at half-mast until after the funeral.

A native of Johnson county, he was elected auditor at the same time Governor Nunn swept into office with him other Republican state officials in 1967. He was circuit clerk of Johnson county from 1952 to 1958 and had served as master commissioner there for five years prior to his election to the state office. Mr. Conley was a veteran of World War II and at one time operated an insurance and real estate business in Paintsville.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Darlene Murphy Conley; one son, Thomas Conley, Morehead State University student; a sister, Mrs. Frank Auxier, of East Point, and a half-brother, William Blair, of Paintsville.

HIS SIDE OF THE STORY

I was much interested to read your paper yesterday and to learn what the ABC agents claimed that they found in a house owned by me at Drift, Ky. They broke into and entered the house when no one was there. I have searched court records and no where did they make any return stating that they took anything and they certainly did not turn in any beer or liquor or whiskey as the law requires officers to do when they find it.

I didn't mean to mention this, because anybody can make a mistake but on the 14th day of January this year I was found "not guilty" on a case that I had appeared from Floyd county court for a charge of violation of a liquor law but, although you mentioned all other cases tried that week, you did not mention that I won my case or mention it at all. Previously, I was acquitted of a similar charge in magistrate's court in District No. 4, and although you published a story of that raid, no mention was made of my acquittal.

As I have said, anyone can make a mistake, but when the time comes that a man has to hire a lawyer to find out what was supposed to have been confiscated, and neither the lawyer nor the magistrate can find out either, and then the man reads in the paper what no court has information on, a man begins to wonder whether ABC Agents are in their job for glory or for gain. If your information were correct, and it is not for I had no such amount of alcoholic beverages, then I'm inclined to think it was for gain of liquor and beer.

If it's news you want, you might be interested to know that at the time the house was entered some three hundred dollars worth of old coins disappeared. I intend to appear before the April term of the grand jury to seek an indictment against these persons for breaking and entering and grand larceny.

Out of five times they have searched my place, which is not occupied by me personally, I have had two acquittals, one conviction which I have appealed, no arrests were made twice. In an earlier case the circuit court dismissed the case. In the case about which you wrote, I certainly was not jailed. I was arrested and brought to the courthouse and immediately posted bond in the jailer's office. I was not locked up and if records reflect that I was they are false.

Things are rough all over and I would appreciate your telling my side of the story. The ABC Agents can tell theirs in court.

Ministers, Magistrates Told of Social Security Law Changes, Effects

Daryl E. Ratliff, district manager of the Pikeville district Social Security office, reminds justices of the peace and ministers of the recent changes in the law which affect their status under Social Security.

Income or fees derived from the office of justice of the peace will be automatically covered as self-employment income under social security as of Jan. 1, 1968 unless the officeholder files a statement with the Internal Revenue Service by April 15, this year that he does not wish to have Social Security coverage. He merely files a self-employment tax return for 1968. If he does not wish coverage under Social Security, he files a waiver or statement to that effect with the Internal Revenue Service at the same time he files his 1968 tax return. Once an election is made to be excluded from Social Security coverage, it is irrevocable and the official cannot have fees from his office covered thereafter.

In the past, ministers were covered by Social Security only if they waived their exemption from coverage. Under the 1967 amendments, beginning Jan. 1, 1968, income derived from the ministry is automatically covered as self-employment income unless the minister or clergyman files an application for exemption and a statement that for reasons of conscience or religious principles he is opposed to the acceptance of public insurance including Social Security benefits. Ministers who have questions regarding the deadline for filing the application and statements should contact either the nearest Internal Revenue Service or Social Security Office.

EDA Funds to Help Appalachian Area In Creating Jobs

Approval of a \$40,000 grant to help continue a program to create new jobs in a six-state area of the Appalachian region was announced recently by the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The Council of the Southern Mountains, which has offices in Berea, is the applicant for the federal funds.

The technical assistance project will concentrate on the establishment of job-generating enterprises in northeast Kentucky, east Tennessee, southwest Virginia, northeast Georgia, West Virginia and Alabama counties eligible for assistance from EDA because of high unemployment or low median family income.

Studies to be conducted by the applicant will help select products and enterprises for development, make site recommendations and help set up methods of financing new enterprises.

The council also will seek to develop closer liaison between job-training agencies and private enterprise, help consolidate job-creating efforts, assist management of new enterprises and help organize small business investment corporations.

The Appalachian Regional Commission will invest \$40,000 in the project and the applicant will complete the \$105,000 cost of the nine-month program with \$25,000 in council funds.

**ORDINANCE NO. 1-69
AMENDED RATE ORDINANCE**
Ordinance of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Amending the Existing Water, Sewer and Natural Gas Rate Ordinance of Said City.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, is in the process of arranging to finance extensions, additions and improvements to the existing municipal waterworks system portion of the combined and consolidated public water, sewer and natural gas project, including a new water storage tank, new water distribution lines and appurtenant facilities, as contemplated and recommended in a report of Howard K. Bell, Consulting Engineers, Inc., Lexington, Kentucky, now on file with the City Clerk of said City, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary in connection with said plan of financing that the existing water, sewer and natural gas rates of the City be increased,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the previous Water, Sewer and Natural Gas Rate Ordinance of the City, fixing the respective water, sewer and natural gas rates applicable to water, sewer and natural gas services furnished by the combined and consolidated municipal water, sewer and natural gas systems of the City, which Water, Sewer and Natural Gas Rate Ordinance was enacted on December 20, 1962, is hereby amended so as to increase the water, sewer and natural gas rates for services furnished by said combined and consolidated systems, as follows:

SECTION 2. NEW WATER, SEWER AND NATURAL GAS RATES.

That the rates and charges for water service, for sewer service and for natural gas service furnished by the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, are hereby fixed and established on a monthly basis as follows:

A. MINIMUM MONTHLY WATER RATES FOR DIFFERENT SIZE METERS. (Applicable inside the corporate limits of the City)

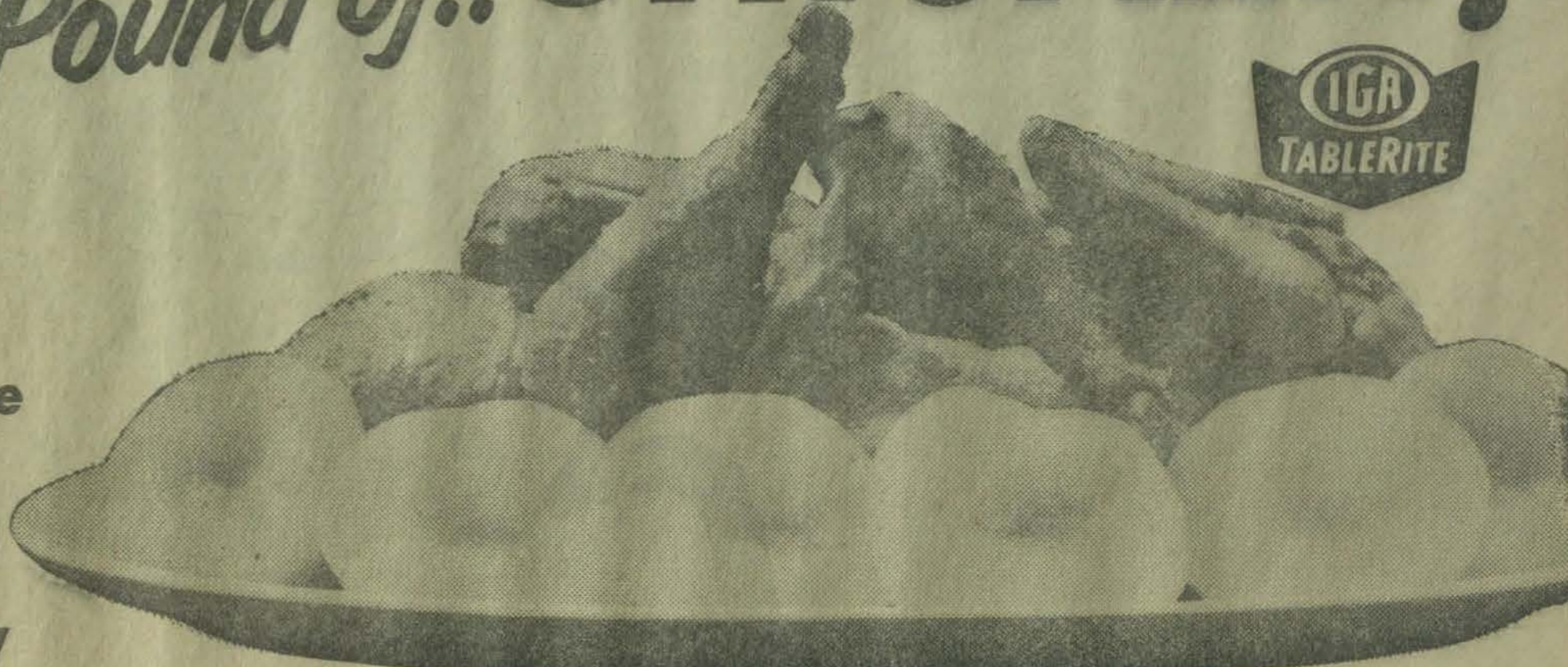

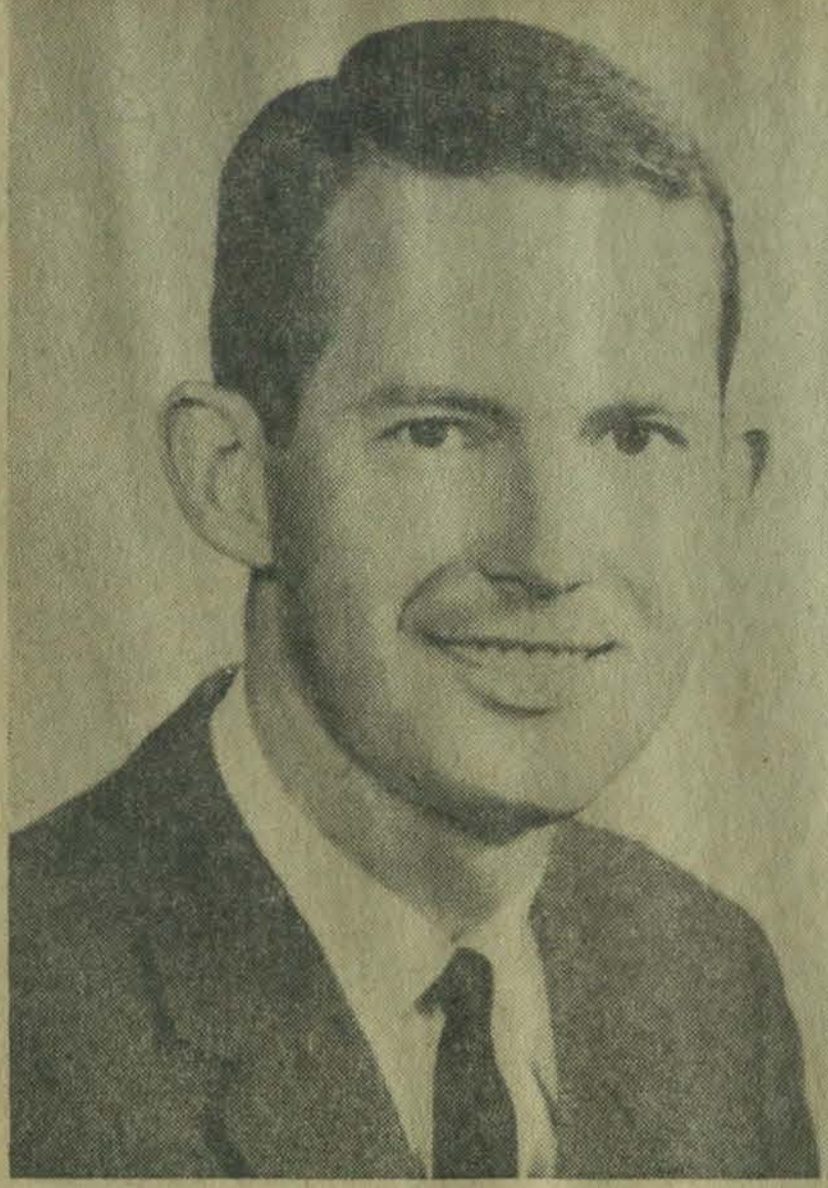

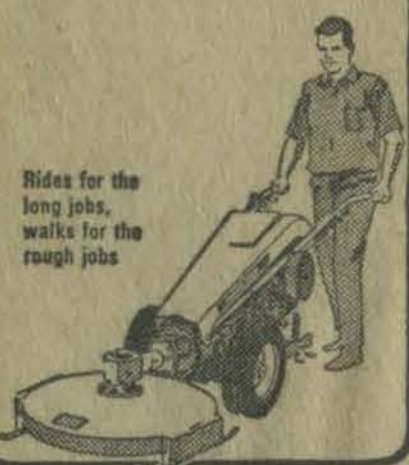

(Continued from Page One) drive into new coal but is working in areas where Princess left off when the closing order came.

At the time work ended at David last year Princess had upwards of 300 on the payroll. Company paychecks ran about \$2½ million a year, and during the 27 years of its operation Princess had paid workers \$53 million.

The payroll at David isn't so great now, but it's growing.

Between the day when the mines closed and the time when they began reopening under new management, the town of David passed to new ownership. The John Allen Company, of Prestonsburg, bought the 61 dwellings, the store, office building, theatre, water and sewerage plants, swimming pool and 837 acres of land.

But the coal wasn't sold — and, what's important, it's being mined again.

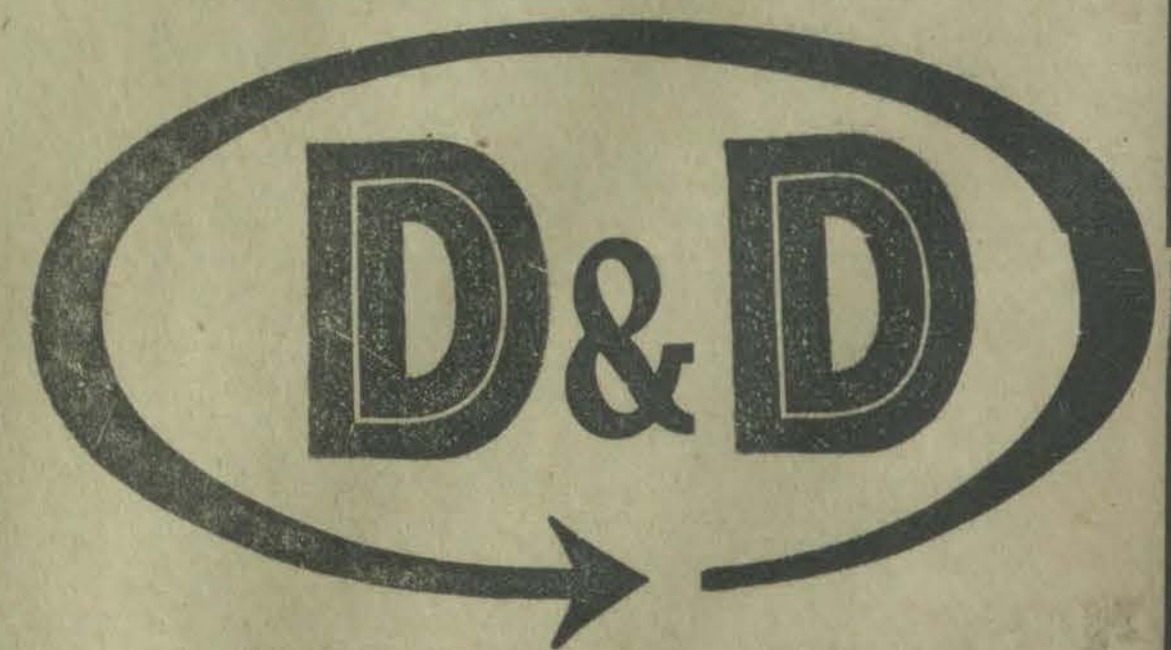

In this day and time we are certainly living in a changing world. I don't know how this is or why but I remember practically everything that has happened to me since I was six years old. I have traveled over this county, horseback, in practically every section of this county. I am well acquainted with many people and their family connections.

I well remember the days I served as Cashier and President of The First National Bank in Prestonsburg and the loans I approved for many people, men, women, boys and girls, many of whom were desirous of securing an education, some of whom desired to enter into business but not one of these loans remained unpaid and the bank never lost a cent.

This recalls to my mind a loan made to Pete Grigsby of \$300.00 who desired to go into business, and he has made a success and at this time I would assume that he is now worth a few hundred thousands of dollars and he is still going strong and I wish him success in all his undertakings.

Another young boy by the name of Harry B. Ranier came to me one day when he was about fifteen or sixteen years of age and requested a loan of sixteen dollars with which to buy a suit of clothes, but being under age, a legal loan could not be made, but he received the money which was repaid at the rate of a dollar per week.

I was a fair judge of nature and well knew his loan would be promptly paid and it was. Today, Mr. Ranier has deposited in the banks of Floyd county more money than any individual now living or dead to the amount of approximately thirty to fifty millions of dollars. I could tell from his disposition and the manner in which he approached me that he was determined to make his mark and to succeed by hard work or any other honest way. He has paid to his employees many millions of dollars, who might never have had a job. I well know that he had the determination and perseverance to go forward, and he did.

Harry, as I call him, has given hundreds of people work who might have gone hungry. When so many children were drowned in the school-bus wreck, he took the leading part with his equipment in recovering those who were lost. I now take this means to congratulate Harry upon his frugality, honesty and his determination to make a success of his life and he has done so by hard work and perseverance.



On another occasion a young boy by the name of Jarvis Allen came to me and requested a small loan with which to buy a suit of clothes, since he was determined to get an education. The loan was promptly made and there was something about this loan that has always amused me as he seemed to think he might not be able to negotiate the loan but after he was assured of the money, he then advised me that his brother Clyde also wanted a suit of clothes, as they desired to enter the Alice G. Lloyd College in Knott County. Both later graduated, taught school and are both now employed by the state of Kentucky, receiving good salaries, and I hope that they both succeed and lead happy, prosperous lives.

I recall two other young boys who desired a little financial assistance which they received. One of them, Lloyd Stumbo, who was graduated and is now principal of the McDowell high school, and the other, John Milton Stumbo, who has been with the Floyd County Health Department for many years. It gladdens my heart and makes me feel happy to feel that I have helped along life's way and perhaps made life a bit easier for them.

I hope I have not offended anyone by mentioning their names as specific cases. I will have more to come, which many people have forgotten, I have learned by experience when you help a young boy or girl to live a more secure and a wonderful life, they never forget.

I am pleased to think I have done many kindnesses to those who are living as well as to those who are dead.

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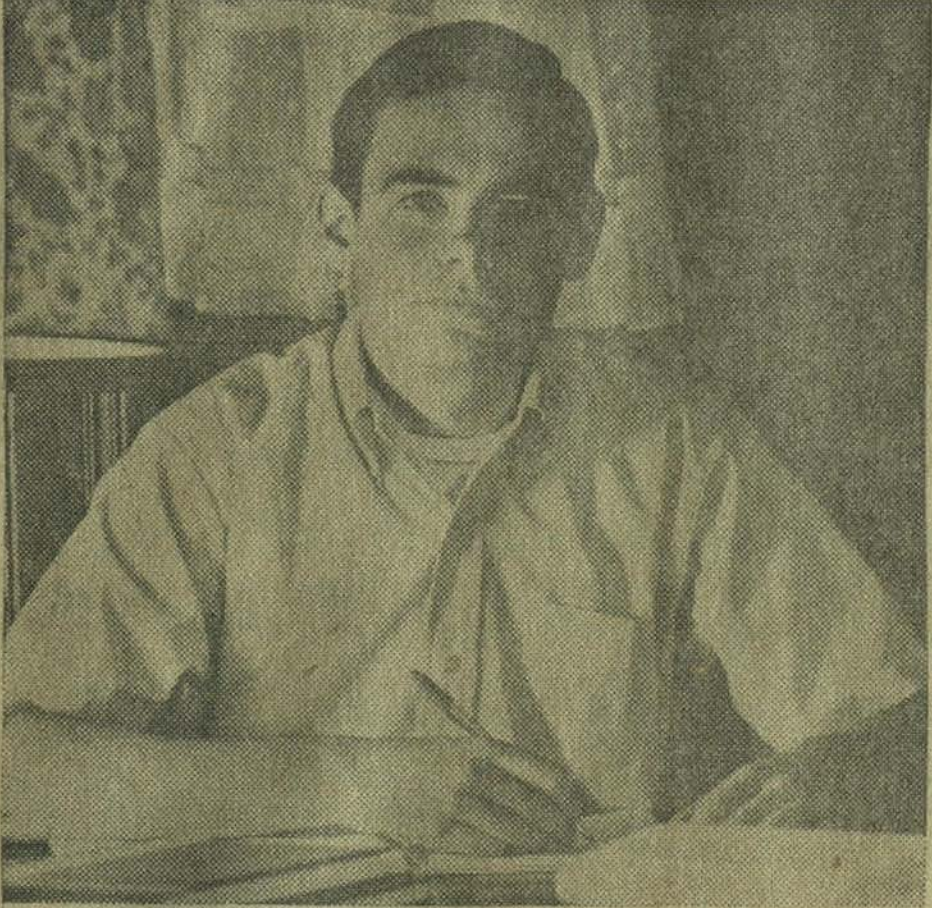

POISON OVERDOSE KILLS ALL FISH IN PARK LAKE

Frankfort, Ky.—If you're planning on visiting General Butler State Park this year, don't bother to take your fishing gear.

The fish died last Thursday, due to an overdose of chemicals administered inadvertently by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. The department is now restocking the 24-acre lake with bluegill and bass, but it will be the spring of 1970, "given a good growth," before they reach "keepers."

"It was one of those unfortunate things," explained Harry Towles, public information officer for the Fish and Wildlife Department.

Towles explained that the Fish and Wildlife Department was asked to thin out the rough fish in the lake. The department took

along enough chemicals to do the job with the lake at its normal level.

Meanwhile, he said, the lake had been lowered four feet without the knowledge of the fish and game employees and thus was half empty.

"Our workers didn't know when they administered the chemicals whether the office had figured on the low-water, or the high-water levels," Towles explained.

The overdose of chemicals killed not only the shad, a rough fish, but bass, bluegill and croppie.

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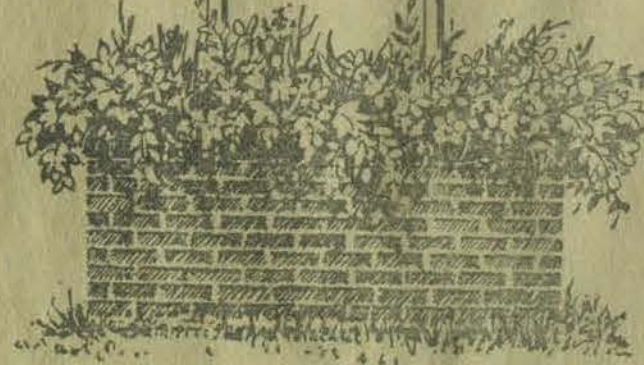

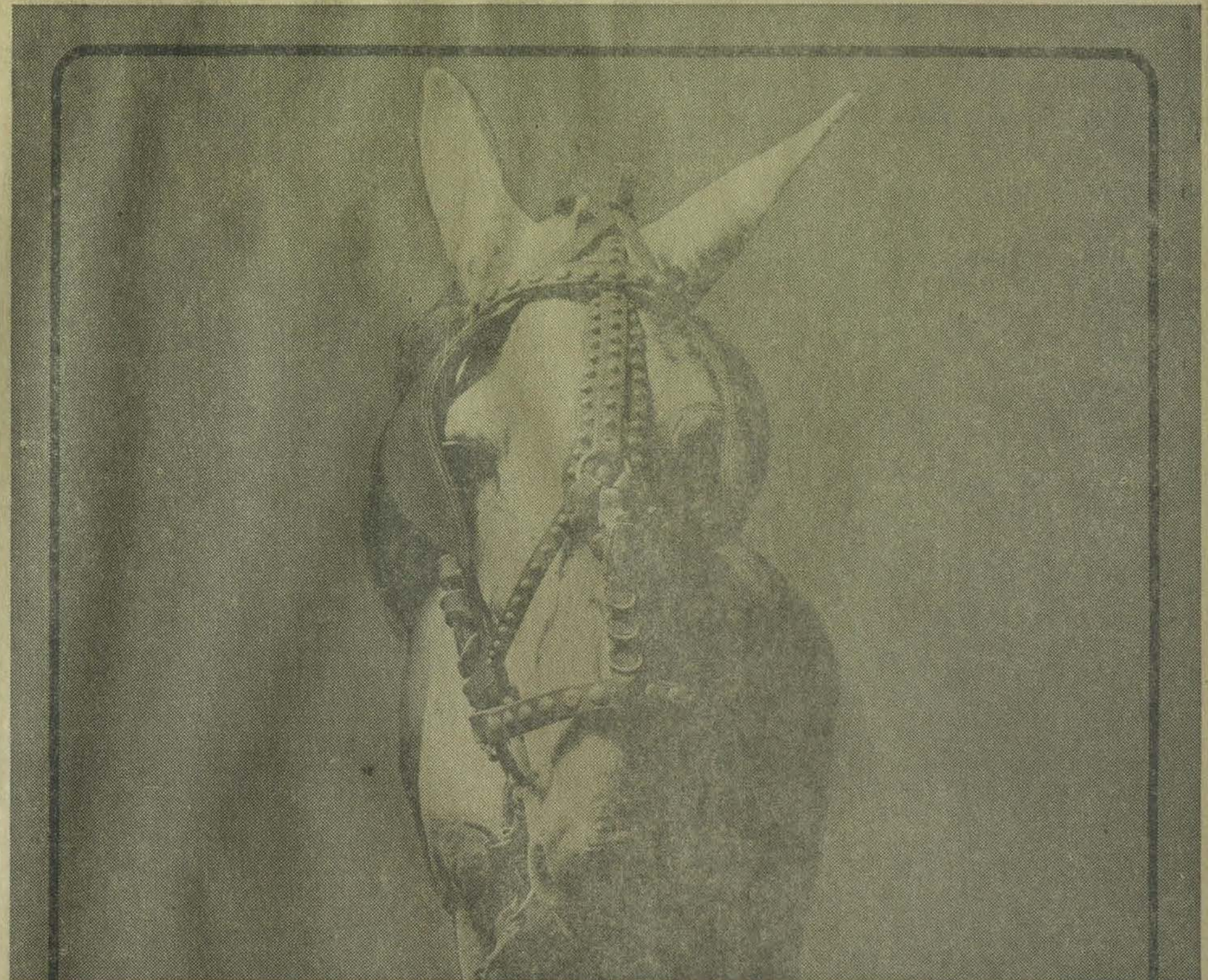

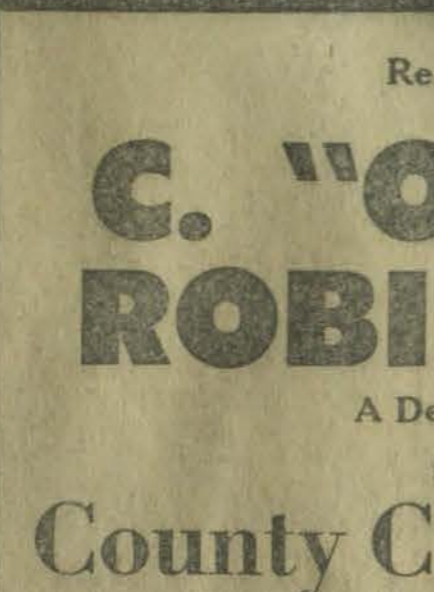

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FEWER FIRES IS '69 GOAL

Foresters To Patrol Area During Spring To Nab Violators

Last spring, Floyd county had 99 woodland fires during the March 1-May 15 fire season, and this year Division of Forestry personnel are hoping to improve on that record.

Employees of the forestry division will be patrolling the county in an effort to find all violators of state fire laws, it was said here this week. Upon conviction, violators are subject to both fine and imprisonment. They also will be held responsible for the cost of suppressing fires.

From March 1 until May 15 it is illegal to set any open fire within 150 feet of any woodland. If burning is done more than 150 feet from the woodland but capable of spreading to the woodland through grass or other flammable material, it is still a violation of the fire laws. If burning must be done, it is permissible between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 12 midnight, provided all reasonable precautions are taken. Reasonable precautions consist of cutting and piling flammable material and clearing around these materials to prevent spread of fire to woodland. The fire must be extinguished at midnight.

Setting of fires to capture any wildlife is prohibited by law. This statute includes the smoking of squirrels or other animals out of hollow trees, hollow stumps, or holes in the ground.

If it is absolutely necessary to burn anything, forestry personnel ask the person responsible to follow these suggestions:

1. Don't burn until after 4:30 p.m.
2. Stay with whatever you are burning until the fire is dead out.
3. Don't let your fire burn off your land onto the land of another. To do so might constitute a felony under statute No. 149.375.
4. Don't allow your children to do any burning for you.
5. Don't burn when the wind is blowing.
6. Don't fail to call your nearest forestry employee if the fire should get out of your control.

Harrington Assigned To Select SRAP Unit, Quick Reaction Force

AN KHE, VIETNAM—One of the newest concepts of the use of mechanized infantry in Vietnam is SRAP (pronounced "Sir-Wrap" and meaning Short Range Area Patrol.)

Army Sgt. 1/C Donald M. Harrington, son of Mrs. Julia Harrington, Prestonsburg, Ky., has been assigned to the SRAP Platoon of the 1st Battalion, 50th Infantry, 173rd Airborne Brigade. He is a platoon leader in the unit.

The SRAPs operate as a quick reaction force to search out areas where enemy movement has been spotted, but are hard to reach because of rugged terrain. They work near An Khe, about 250 miles north of Saigon at the base of the Central Highlands.

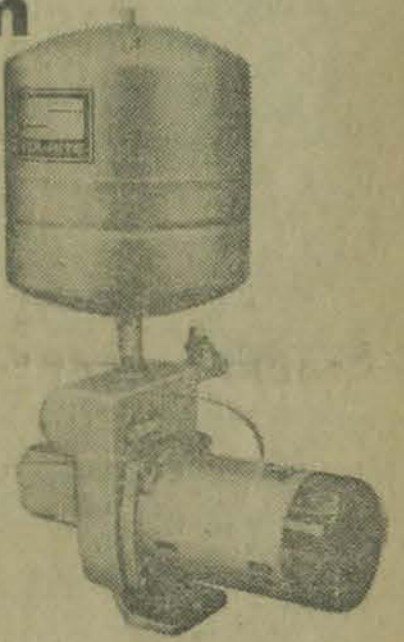

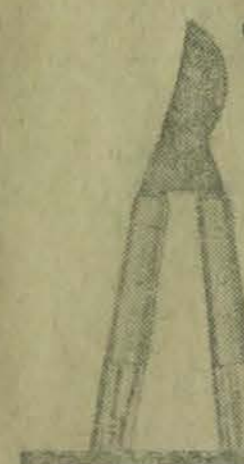

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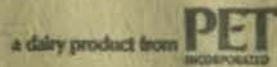
