'Black Lung' Meet Set at Wheelwright

Meeting Aim To Educate The Public

Dr. Rasmussen, Others Slate Meeting Sunday; Case Rehearing Sought

The crusade against miners' "black lung" which has been centered in West Virginia will shift to this county Sunday when a meeting is scheduled at 2 p.m. at Wheelwright high school.

Scheduled to appear at the meeting are Dr. Donald Rasmussen, Beckley, W. Va., secretary of the Physicians Committee for Miners' Health and Safety; Dr. I. E. Buff, Charleston heart specialist and chairman of the committee, and Dr. Hawley Wells, Johnstown, Pa., committee coordinator.

Dr. Rasmussen said the Floyd meeting and another to be held at Hazard, April 13, are to be educational in nature, designed to acquaint the public as well as miners with the dangers of black lung. He said one of the big problems for Kentucky mine cases is medical diagnosis. Kentucky law does not set forth any real requirement to classify the disease and establish recognized differences between black lung and other industry-related respiratory ailments, he added.

Meanwhile, Dan Jack Combs, Pikeville, counsel for Earl Dale, whose claim for compensation was allowed by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley but later disallowed by the Court of Appeals, announced that he will file a petition with the Appellate Court for a rehearing. The high court in its ruling said that, although "the weight of evidence" favored Dale, it felt that the Compensation Board had not acted arbitrarily. (See Story No. 6, Page 6)

WORK NEARS COMPLETION

But Street Repair Job Must Wait Till Apr. 15, U.S. Regulation Holds

Mayor George P. Archer said this week that the work of extending the Prestonsburg water system and installation of new and larger mains within the corporate limits is 90% complete but that streets damaged by the work cannot be repaired till mid-April.

The project involved federal funds and backstop resurfacing is not permitted under federal regulations earlier in the year than April 15, he explained. Streets were damaged mainly by the laying of water lines paralleling them and also across the thoroughfares to property-owners' boundary lines.

The extension of the water system south to the vicinity of the United Fuel Gas Company's pipeyard, between Sugar Loaf and Emma, and north to the location of the proposed regional hospital, near Auxier, was completed last fall. While this work was being done several river crossings were made to afford service to areas downstream from Prestonsburg but on the opposite side of the Big Sandy, and a second reservoir was built on the hill overlooking Prestonsburg Community College.

Magoffin Official Slain in His Home

Magoffin County Attorney Arnet Mann, 47, was shot and killed at his Salyersville home Tuesday night but authorities are hesitant about saying who fired the fatal shot.

The scant official statement issued as of Wednesday morning was that of Coroner Ishmael Caudill, who said the investigation of the slaying made by State Detectives Chester D. Potter and B. J. Music tended to rule out suicide.

Mann died of a .22-caliber pistol wound near his heart. Coroner Caudill said the official's wife called Salyersville attorney, Marcus Mann, a brother

John Shrewsberry, 79-year-old retired miner, formerly of Wheelwright, died last Thursday at his home at South Point, O., after a nine-month illness.

A former machine operator for the Island Steel Corp. at Wheelwright, Mr. Shrewsberry was a resident of that section for 40 years, moving to South Point about three years ago. He was a member of the Seventh-Day Adventists and of the UMWA, Local Union 5899.

Born Sept. 13, 1889 at Odd, W. Va., he was a son of Edward and Mary Elizabeth Anderson Shrewsberry.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Myrtle Shrewsberry; three sons, Shurl Shrewsberry, of Detroit, Mich., Kelzo Shrewsberry, of Hillsboro, N. Y., and Blane Shrewsberry, of South Point; a daughter, Mrs. Bobby Johnson, South Point, and three brothers, Larkin Shrewsberry, of Baltimore, Md., C. L. Shrewsberry, of Weeksbury, and Winton Shrewsberry, of Helen, West Virginia.

He also leaves ten grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. at the Hall Brothers Funeral Home, Martin, with Elder Cline officiating. Burial was made in Davidson Memorial Gardens at Ivel.

Contracts Signed On Road, Bridges

Contracts for construction of the Lancer-Water Gap road and bridge and the Harold bridge were officially awarded to the low bidders, it was announced in Frankfort Tuesday by Commissioners of Highways Eugene Goss.

The Lancer highway and bridge, a distance of 2.6 miles, will be built by the Kentucky Road Oiling Co., Georgetown, which offered the low bid of \$1,790,048.45 on the project. The contract calls for grade, drain and bituminous surfacing of the highway.

The Harold work, awarded to the R. R. Dawson Bridge Co., Bloomfield, Ky., will involve construction of a bridge across the Big Sandy, with approaches. The low bid of the Bloomfield firm was \$514,740.55.

VanHoose Dies Friday In Little Paint Wreck Near Home of Fiancee

A Johnson county man died almost instantly Friday morning in the wreckage of an automobile as he approached the home on Little Paint Creek of the girl to whom he was to have been married, a few days later.

The victim, 22-year-old Henry Cecil VanHoose, of Thealka, was giving the auto of his fiancee, Miss Linda Richardson, toward her home when the wreck occurred on KY 1100, a short distance from its juncture with old US 23. State Trooper Michael Angel said the vehicle dropped into a ditch, then ran off the surfaced portion of the road and hit the truck of Mrs. Stewart Horne which was parked in front of her home. The impact knocked the truck approximately 50 feet into a ravine, the auto following it.

VanHoose was an Air Force veteran and had served in Vietnam. He was a son of Archie and Jessie Ratliff VanHoose. Besides his parents, he is survived by three brothers and three sisters. (See Story No. 5, Page 6)

Arson Probe Seen In Left Beaver Fire

Raymond Turner, of Drift, said this week an investigation of the possibility of arson in the burning early Tuesday night of a tenant-house owned by him at East McDowell will be made. The house had been vacated, the day or the fire.

Tom Adams, whose home is near the scene of the blaze, credited the Left Beaver Civil Defense with saving his home, that of Bart Meade and possibly others. He said the Betsy Layne Fire Department made a run to the scene, arriving within 30 minutes after a call for help was made.

Fire last week destroyed the new home on Middle Creek of Charlie Arnett. All family belongings were lost, it was said.

Frank Mullins, Age 58, Dies of Heart Seizure At Hi Hat Residence

Frank Mullins, 58, retired Hi Hat miner, died Sunday at his home a short time after suffering a heart attack.

A former employee of the Conn Coal Co., he was born Aug. 30, 1910, a son of the late Harlan and Martha Hall Mullins. His wife, Mrs. Orna Jones Mullins, survives.

Besides his widow, he leaves three sons, Charles Edward Mullins, of Lexington, Ky., Danny Lee Mullins, of Richmond, Ky., and Frank Ronald Mullins, Ft. Knox; three daughters, Mrs. Jettie Houser and Miss Joyce Aileen Mullins, both of Lima, O., and Mrs. Delores DeLong, of Wapakoneta, O.; two half-brothers, Charley Newman and Milton Little, both of Hi Hat; two half-sisters, Mrs. Frona Johnson, of Hi Hat, and Mrs. Lona Johnson, of Ashland, Ky., and four grandchildren.

Funeral rites were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at the Clear Creek United Baptist Church at Hi Hat. Burial in the Newman cemetery at Hi Hat was directed by Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

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New Motion Stays Pollution Decision

A decision in the water pollution claim filed by residents of Martin in opposition to construction of a high school at Eastern on Right Beaver Creek, may have been reached Tuesday at a meeting of the Kentucky Water Pollution Commission in Frankfort, but a new move by Paul E. Hayes, attorney for the protesting group, delayed any official action or announcement.

Hayes filed a motion for oral argument of the case to be heard by the Commission, and the motion was upheld. The arguments are expected to be held, April 7.

Hayes had already filed a memorandum brief in the case. The brief included these points: The sewage system to serve the new school was referred by George Lee Shannon, architect, to a Mr. Dillehay, Lexington mechanical engineer, for design, and the only data supplied Dillehay was the capacity of the proposed school — 700 pupils and 25 to 30 faculty members. Dillehay designed the sewage treatment plant on a maximum per capita use of 15 gallons of sewage per day, which would require a plant of 11,000 gallons maximum daily capacity. Hayes quoted from a textbook authority who puts the maximum per capita use at 25 gallons a day, which would require a plant of 17,000 gallons capacity.

The brief quoted Dillehay as saying he had no stream flow information and that he had taken no soil or percolation tests in the area of the school — in fact, that he had never been on Right Beaver Creek.

It also was claimed that water flow records at Eastern were provided the protesting group by F. F. Schrader, of Water Resources, Department of Interior, Louisville, and the brief cited the flow on two dates: Sept. 25, 1968, 0.0 cubic feet per second; Nov. 7, 1968, 0.29 cubic feet. At Martin the flow on these dates was 6.66 and 7.26 cubic feet, respectively.

Hayes also quoted Dr. J. D. Adams as ascribing hepatitis outbreaks in this county, in part to low sanitary standards in the schools. Dr. Adams also was quoted as saying he knew of no sewage treatment adequate to eliminate completely such viruses as polio and hepatitis.

W. W. Burchett, attorney for the Floyd County Board of Education, said he filed no brief, since the case as developed at the hearing before an examiner for the Water Pollution Commission clearly upheld adequacy of the sewage treatment system planned for the school.

BOONE HALL VICTIM HERE

Educator 42 Years Succumbs Saturday After Heart Attack

Boone Hall, veteran Floyd educator and supervisor for the Floyd County Board of Education, died at 1 a.m. Saturday at Prestonsburg General Hospital, five days after suffering a heart attack. He was 61.

Mr. Hall was stricken, shortly after noon the preceding Monday while at work in his office here.

A son of the late Greenbury and Frances Hamilton Hall, he was born in Knott county Dec. 29, 1907. His parents moved to Frasurs Creek, near McDowell, shortly afterward. Mr. Hall was graduated from what is now Alice Lloyd College at Pippa Passes and received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Kentucky. He had served in the educational field as teacher, principal and supervisor for 42 years. He was principal of Wayland schools 10 years until he entered the U. S. Navy in World War II. On his return to civilian life he became principal of Wheelwright high school where he served 13 years until he transferred to the board of education. (See Story No. 4, Page 6)

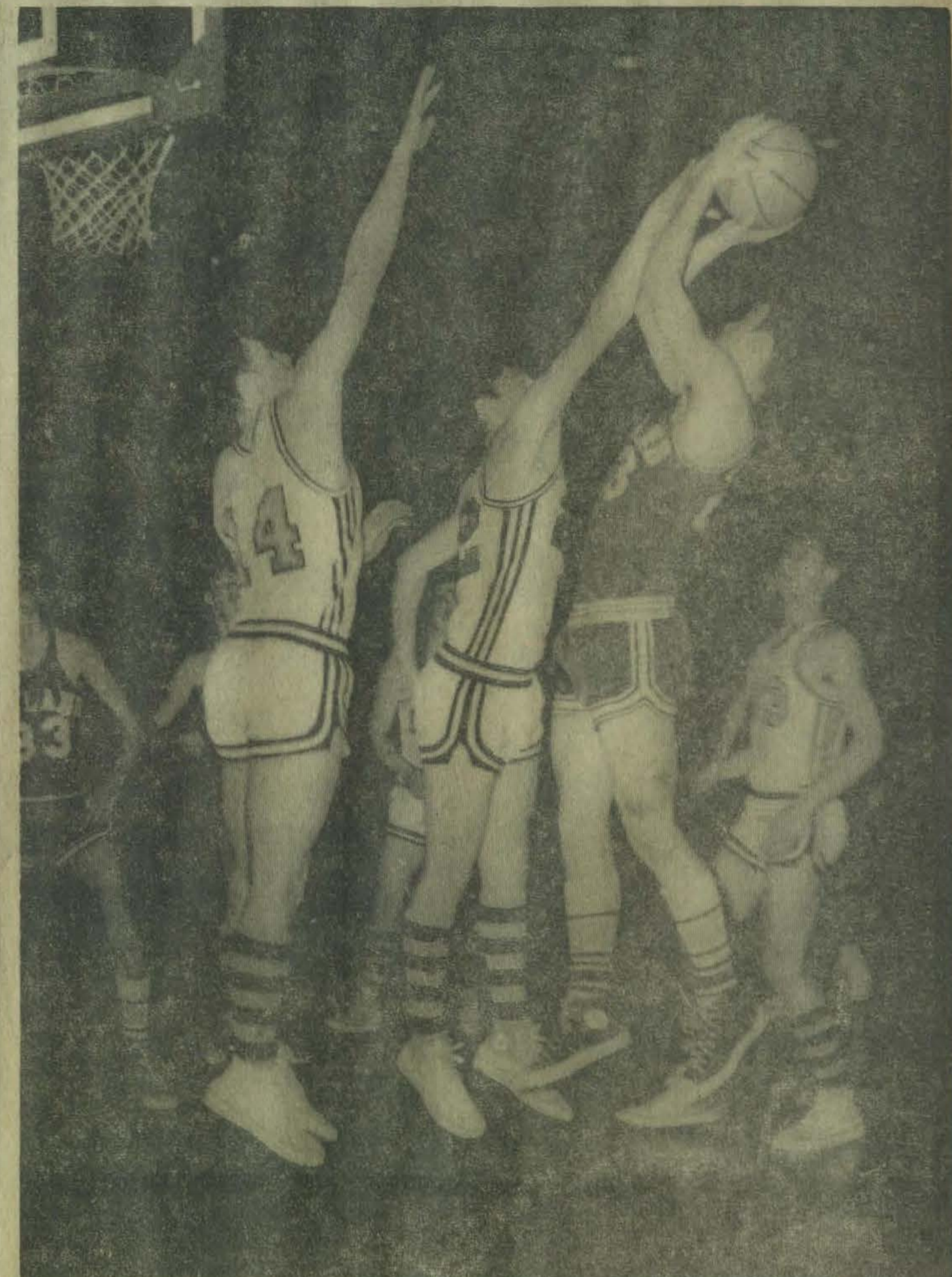
Vanover's body was found by his wife, Mrs. Hazel Tackett Vanover, when she returned home from work. Coroner Carter said there was evidence he had been mentally depressed. The shot entered Vanover's chest.

Others investigating the tragedy were Sheriff Joe W. Lewis and Deputy Sheriff John Reed.

A native of Letcher county, the victim was a son of the late Daniel and Emmaline Potter Vanover. He had resided in the Weeksbury area the last 35 years.

Surviving, besides his widow, are a daughter, Mrs. Irene Spivey, Lincoln Park, Mich.; a brother, W. S. Vanover, of Weeksbury, and two grandchildren.

Floyd Fives In Regional Final Tilt

Wayland High Ousts Johnson County Host In Semi-Final Thriller

Maytown high school's Wildcats have won for the second time in three years the right to represent the 15th region in the state basketball tournament at Freedom Hall, Louisville.

Friday night, the Maytown delegation was rooting for Wayland, the other Floyd County entry in the tourney held at Johnson Central high school, Paintsville, as the Wasps were downing feared Johnson Central in the semi-finals. That victory made it an all-Floyd county match for the championship as Maytown easily downed Mullins in the other semi-final encounter, 73 to 57.

But Saturday night saw the Maytown five forced to draw on all its resources to edge the same team they had so vociferously backed, the evening before. The winners held a one-point edge at halftime, came on strong in the third quarter to lead Wayland by six points but saw that margin melt as the Wasps rallied to tie the score with six minutes left. Pat Tallent, sophomore guard whose play was in the finest tradition of his elder brothers, Bob and Mike, connected for three field goals to lead Maytown to a narrow, 63-60 win.

It was Maytown's 33rd victory in its last 35 games. Wayland, a team that has come on strong, ran its season record to 26 and 4. The Wasps' victory over host Johnson Central was as sensational as their losing effort in the finals. Although Wayland connected for an amazing 29 field goals out of 48 attempts, it still needed two last-second free throws by Larry Patton to eliminate the strong Johnson county five.

On the way to the semi-finals Wayland had no trouble till it met Johnson Central. Maytown easily outclassed all opposition in the final encounter with Wayland.

Island Cr. Plans For Year Outlined

Island Creek Coal Company announced plans today (Thursday) calling for an investment this year of approximately \$1 million dollars in new capital improvements, including new equipment, in its mines in this area.

In the three years since Island Creek purchased the mines from Island Steel and Evans Elkhorn Coal Company, an annual capital investment of about \$1 million has been maintained, according to Raymond Bradbury, newly appointed manager of the company's Elkhorn Division. Projected investment for 1969 will continue at this level.

Mr. Bradbury, successor to A. S. Pack who has become general manager of the Island Creek Division, said production has been at the steady rate of about 3 million tons a year.

"The initial investment in the plants, coal and reserves of the Wheelwright, Price and Spurlock mines amounted to many millions of dollars," Bradbury said. "At our present rate of production, we can look forward to more than 20 years of productive life, and additional known reserves in the Wheelwright area can add many more years

of productivity. Obviously, we are here to stay."

"This favorable outlook is supported," Bradbury declared, "by the fact that Island Creek is getting a growing share of the expanding coal market."

"Contracts for the major part of the current production of our mines now run for five years or more, and we also have other, longer term contracts under negotiation," Bradbury said. "Island Creek has a sales force second to none," he continued, "and we are getting, and will continue to get, our full share of the constantly expanding coal market. We look forward to excellent progress in this area."

"I am also pleased to see Island Creek's optimism for a bright future reflected in positive actions by the citizens of Wheelwright," he said.

"The city of Wheelwright was sold to Mountain Investment, Inc., a private corporation, about two years ago. After the sale the Elkhorn Division moved its general offices there.

Col. Gibson, Floyd Native, Assumes New Vietnam Post

Cu Chi, Vietnam (25th Infantry Division 10)—Lieut. Colonel Edward C. Gibson, a Floyd county, Ky. native who served as company commander and operations officer with the 65th Engineer Battalion in Korea and Hawaii, has assumed command of the battalion here at Tropic Lightning's Cu Chi base camp.

Col. Gibson, 42, succeeded Lieut. Col. James Argo, of Rolla, Mo., as commanding officer. Major Martin Carson is the new executive officer.

This is Col. Gibson's second tour in Vietnam. During his first tour in 1965-1966, he was assigned to the Military Assistance Command, Vietnam (MACV) in Saigon.

Nunn said. Profit to the change, guests were required to pay cash for these items at time of purchase or when they checked out.

Parks Commissioner Robert Gable said the new service "will strengthen Kentucky's reputation for having the leading state park system in America."

"Keeping pace with changes in the nation's spending habits, ours is the first state park system to adopt a credit plan and I feel that others are certain to follow Kentucky's lead," Gable said.

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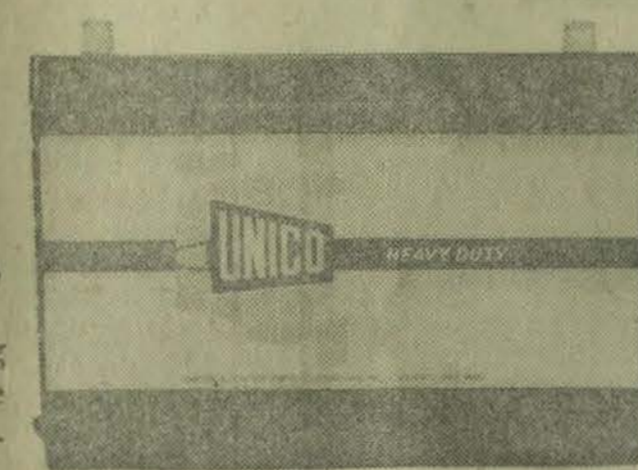
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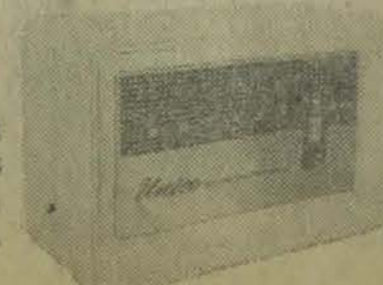

Why Not A Community Chest?

Floyd county is so beset by drives for this cause or another that, along about this time of year, every year, the most cheerful giver becomes just a bit saddle-sore.

All these causes are good. They deserve the full support of the public. The Scouting movement for both boys and girls is one of the most important contributions to the physical, moral and mental development and well-being of the nation's youth. The Red Cross, Christmas Seals, Easter Seals, American Cancer Society, National Foundation — all these have made notable contributions to humanity facing adversity and suffering. (The reader will forgive us if we have missed one of these deserving groups, since the list is so long that it is difficult to recall them all.)

But, after that, we should all demand that these needs be pooled under one heading and this seemingly endless round of solicitation ended.

trarily in denying the worker's claim. Combs said that Section 14 of the state constitution gives the Court of Appeals the right and the vested power to reverse the Compensation Board and that he will use this in his petition for rehearing.

Dale, a resident of Hager Hill, was employed by the Inland Steel Company and its successor, Island Creek Coal Company. Doctors agreed Dale had a pulmonary ailment but did not agree as to its origin. Three doctors supported Dale's claim that his pulmonary condition was caused by the use of rock-dust in the mines where he worked. Two rejected this claim, contending he has emphysema, a disease not necessarily connected with mining, and a sixth, appointed by the compensation board, admitted that Dale's exposure to dust in the mines was "the most likely cause" of his lung problem. Yet, he said, he found no evidence of silicosis and described the miner's ailment as pulmonary emphysema and bronchitis.

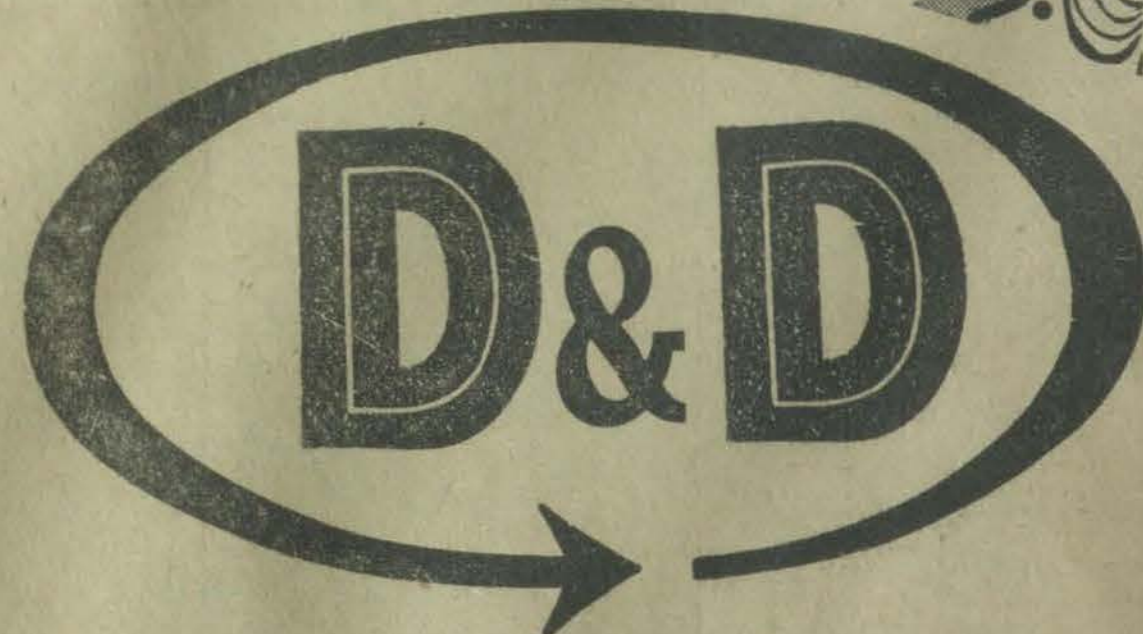

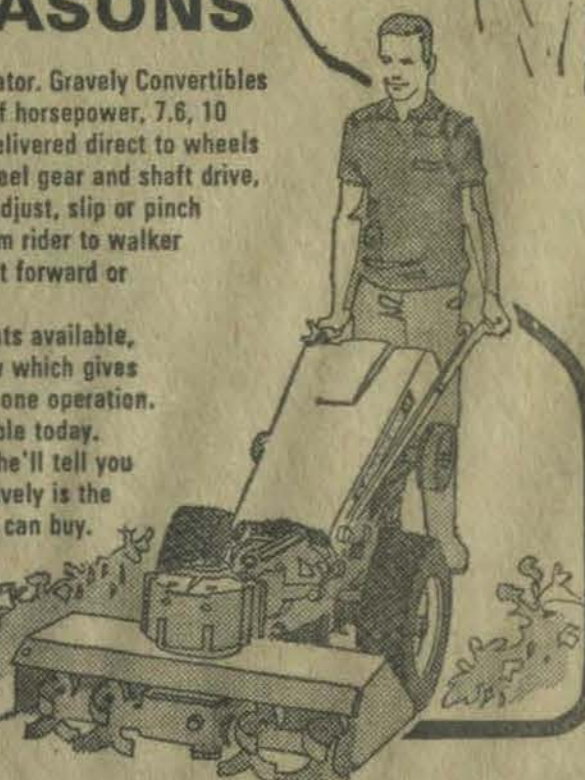

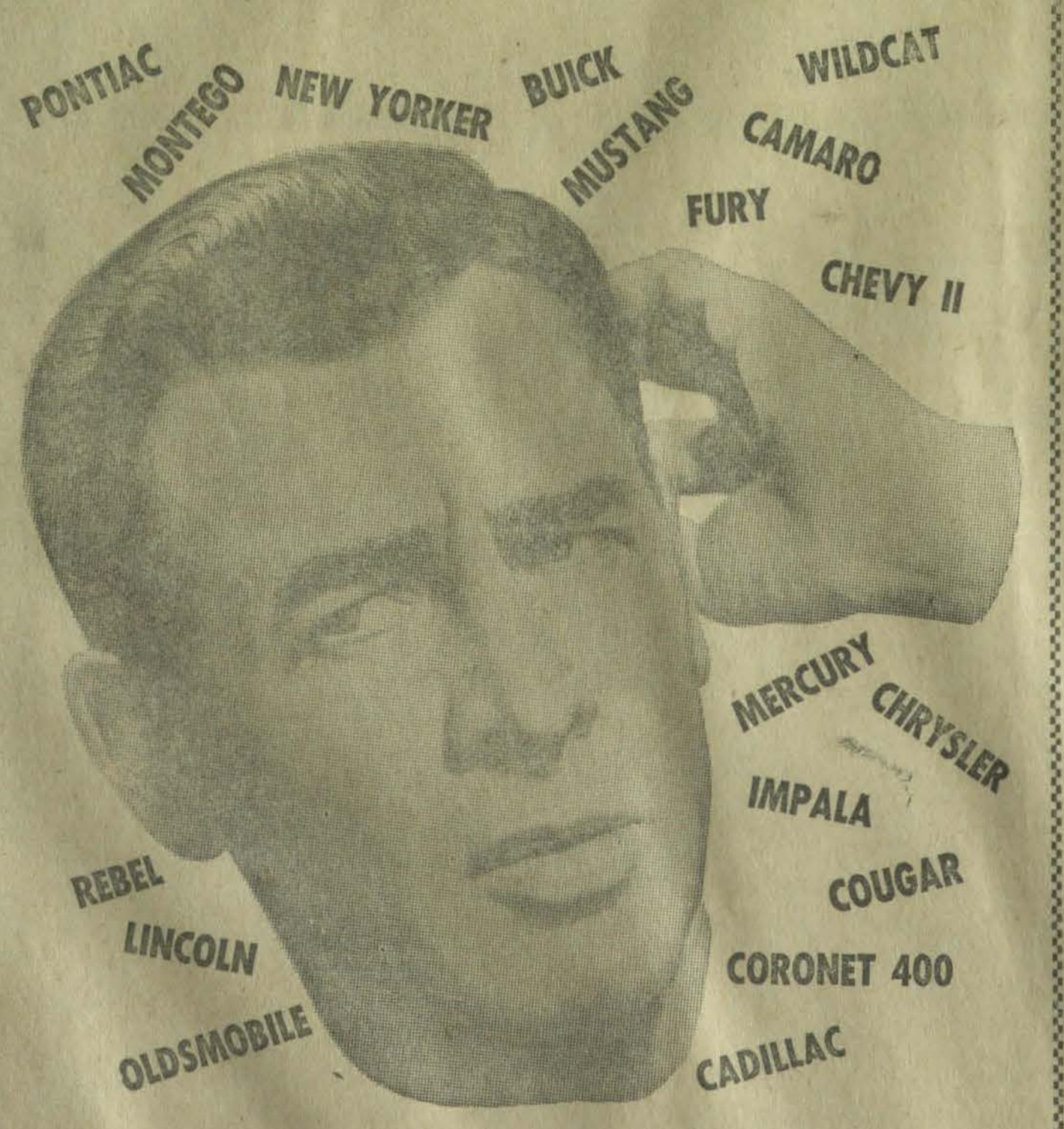

Jenkins Doctor's Suit in U.S. Court

PIKEVILLE, Ky.—Hearing of testimony in the \$2 million damage suit filed in federal court by Arthur J. Nash of Jenkins against Appalachian Regional Hospitals Inc. and several ARH physicians and personnel, has been moved back to Lexington after two days of session here.

The suit entered its fourth day of hearing at 9 a.m. March 10 before Judge Bernard T. Moynehan Jr. The two days here saw Dr. Nash on the witness stand two days in his plea for a temporary injunction against banning his use of the Whitesburg hospital facilities and pending final disposition of the damage claims.

Dr. Nash was followed by Dr. E.E. Musgrave of Jenkins, medical director of the Jenkins, Clinic, where Dr. Nash, a surgeon and general practitioner, has been connected since his severance from the Whitesburg ARH unit. Dr. Musgrave testified in behalf of Dr. Nash.

The Pikeville sessions consisted of introductory testimony and cross examinations of the two witnesses. Both sides produced case records to charge Dr. Nash and the defendant physicians with mishandling patients and inadequate or neglective medical attention in some cases. All charges were denied by both sides.

The suit was filed by Dr. Nash after the hospital organization, headquartered at Lexington, discontinued his service after he had been a staff surgeon at the Whitesburg hospital for about seven years.

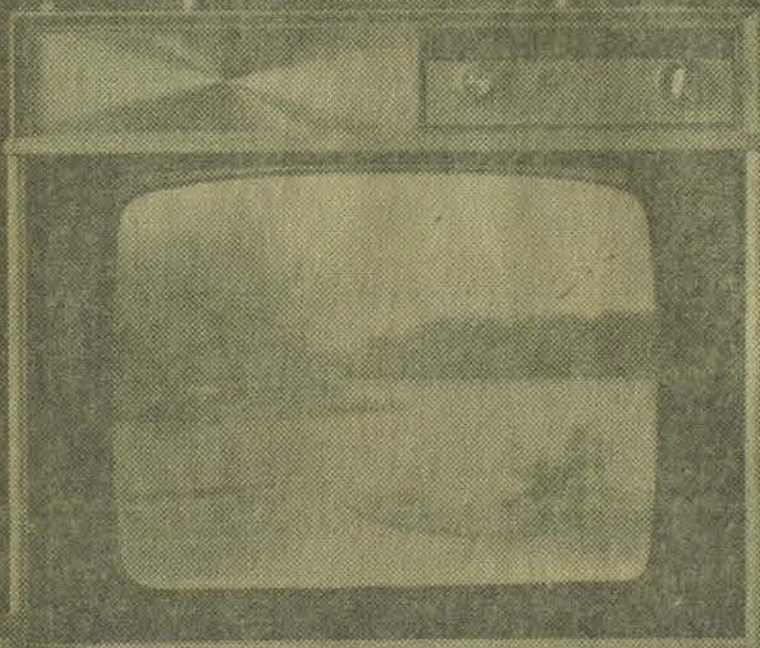

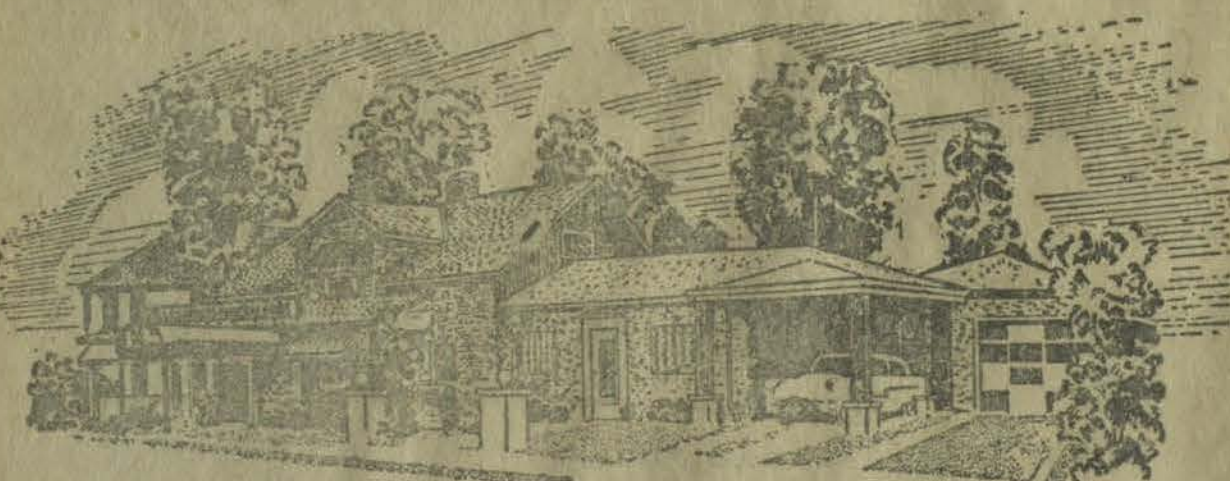

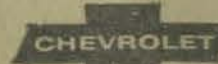

County History

It is true that many changes are taking place throughout the world in this day and age. I have heard some people make the remark that they disliked Floyd County, and many have moved away. There is nothing wrong with Floyd County and, if there is, who is responsible?—none other than the voters and officials who operate the county in its affairs. I was born and reared in Floyd County on the waters of Middle Creek and I expect to live and die and be buried here.



Floyd County was named in 1799 for Colonel John Floyd, who was born at Amherst, Virginia in the year 1750. He led a party to survey the land that is now Kentucky in the year 1774 with George Rogers Clark's Indian expedition. Floyd returned to Virginia and joined the colonial Navy and was captured and taken to England. He escaped and returned and built Floyd's Station, in 1779 or 1780, near what is now Louisville. He was killed in an Indian ambush in 1783.

Many people do not know that Floyd County has had three courthouses here in Prestons-

burg. The first was a log building where the First National Bank was built in 1907. In this first courthouse was where Gus Finley was tried and sentenced to death by hanging. He was hanged near the mouth of Trimble Branch here in Prestonsburg. R. W. Harris was sheriff at the time but declined to carry out the execution, resigned his office, and another man was appointed. Finley was intoxicated and had some sort of difficulty with another man, and a young boy got in the line of fire and was killed accidentally. The same kind of a crime of killing another accidentally in this day would most probably receive a sentence, not exceeding twenty-one years. Only one other Floyd countian, a man named Scott, was executed and his death was by electrocution.

Many people are now living in what was formerly Fincastle County, Virginia. Floyd County at one time was a very large county from which have been taken twelve or fifteen counties, Pike County being the largest in area, and that county today produces more coal than any other county in the United States.

I am writing this article, since I believe many people now living here know little or nothing about the history of Floyd County. I say hurrah for Floyd County, as I think we have made great progress in the last fifty years.

Administration Proposes Coal Mine Safety Bill

Secretary of the Interior Walter J. Hinkel appeared last week before House and Senate labor subcommittees in support of a Nixon Administration coal mine safety bill that closely resembles the bill President Johnson offered last January.

John F. O'Leary, director of the Bureau of Mines, joined Mr. Hinkel in describing the Administration bill as the strongest of the mine safety proposals before Congress.

Mr. Hinkel said the single most important feature of the new bill (S 1300) is the provision that would require the Secretary of the Interior to develop mandatory health and safety standards for all mines, surface as well as underground.

Specifically, the bill would set an interim standard for coal dust in mines of 4.5 milligrams per cubic meter of air, and calls on the Secretary to lower the standard to 3 milligrams as soon as possible. During the House labor subcommittee hearings, Chairman John Dent (D-Pa.) indicated he saw no evidence that reasonable dust standards could be set. Mr. Hinkel said the 4.5 milligram standard was feasible, but experts don't know yet how to attain the 3 milligram level recommended by the Public Health Service and called for in some other bills. He pointed out the Administration bill calls for annual chest X-rays for miners, as the "only practical method of detecting the 'black lung' disease."

The Nixon Administration bill would also eliminate the distinction in present law between gassy and nongassy mines; call for every underground mine to be inspected at least three times a year; and set up a broad federal program of research, education and training in coal mine safety. Hinkel stressed the

Administration's recommendation for one bill covering health and safety, rather than separate measures.

Unlike the Johnson Administration bill, which would impose civil penalties for violation of standards on both mine operators and miners, the Nixon bill would penalize only the operators.

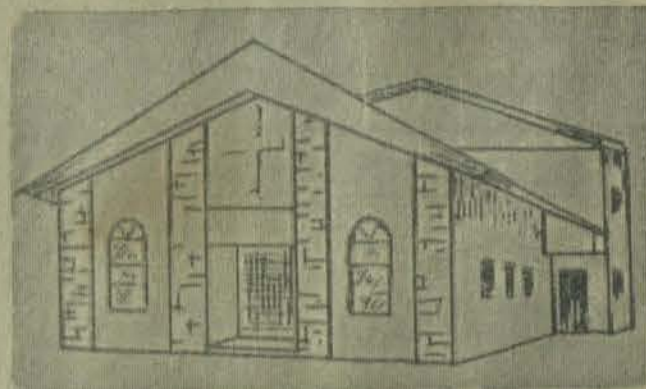
A panel of coal industry experts is tentatively scheduled to testify this week and next at Senate and House subcommittee hearings.

VETERANS' QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.—I have just completed three years of Army service and plan to enter college under the G.I. Bill this coming fall. If I work while attending college, will the amount of money I earn be deducted from my G.I. Bill allowance?

A.—No. The amount of G.I. Bill education allowance paid by the Veterans Administration is determined only by the amount of schooling you receive (i.e. full-time, half-time or quarter-time training), plus the number of your dependents.

Whether you work or have other income does not affect your VA allowance.

However, an outside job could affect your school schedule—that is whether or not you will be allowed to carry a full-time course.

Q.—My pension from the Veterans Administration was increased the first year. Was this an automatic cost-of-living increase and will the pension be raised again next year if living costs continue to rise?

A.—The increase in your AV pension was not automatic. It resulted from a law passed by Congress last year restructuring the AV pension program and providing for increases depending upon the amount of the recipient's income. Since it is not automatic, any future increases in pension amounts must be legislated by Congress.

Q.—When I was discharged from the Army a couple of months ago, I converted my \$10,000 Servicemen's Group Life Insurance policy to a permanent policy. I have recently been advised by the Veterans Administration that I can apply for up to \$10,000 government life insurance since I have a service-connected disability. Can I obtain this insurance and keep my converted SGLI policy also,

A.—Yes. SGLI is not issued by VA but by private insurance companies. National Service Life Insurance is issued and administered by the VA and is also available to veterans with a service-connected disability who were separated from service on or after April 25, 1951.

You must apply within one year from the date VA determines your disability to be service-connected.

\$10,000 is the maximum amount of Government life insurance any veteran may have, but this is in addition to the SGLI.

Nobody is going broke on Medicaid — unless it's the federal program itself.

High payments for services under the program were discussed recently by Eugene Goss, then commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Economic Security. He learned that Kentucky's share of the cost of the program during fiscal 1968-'69 will be about \$48 million, and that is only 19.9% of the total bill. The federal government will pay for the remaining 71.1%.

Goss, who is the state's new commissioner of highways, said his department is not accusing anybody, but he wonders, "You can't blame a doctor," he said, "for he is bound by his professional oath to see people who bring their medical problem to him, whether real or imagined."

He expressed the view that a doctor's office often is a place where people who feel they're neglected get attention.

Records in the Economic Security Department show that 12 doctors drew over \$50,000 from Medicaid payments during calendar 1968. The highest was Dr. B. L. Atkins at Sandy Hook with \$119,768.36. Others are Dr. A. Stacey Jr., Pineville, \$97,565.84; Morgan Drug Store, Pineville, \$127,657.84; L.V. Lee Drug Co., Harlan, \$100,021.55; Don Peeler Pharmacy, Madisonville, \$94,147.35; Big Sandy Drug, \$120,610.23; Herndon Drug Co., \$125,287.94; Wolfenbarger Pharmacy \$118,433.61; Burgess Drug, \$110,602.99; Clark's Pharmacy, Jenkins, \$125,950.19; and Campbell Drug, Hyden, \$127,517.87.

Some of these may be running a clinic and billing for two or more doctors under one billing number. Dr. Stacey said he has two partners and payments are made to all three under the same number.

Dr. Maddox is the only doctor in Wolfe county and goes 16 and 20 hours a day.

Several doctors across the state submit very small bills, having little if any Medicaid patients.

Doctors receive, the Economic Security Department says, \$8 for the first call in each illness and \$4 for each subsequent call for the same illness.

Drug bills also run high in the area. One of the highest

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Engineer Says Water To Attract Industry

Joseph L. Tucker, deputy director and staff planner for the Kentucky Division of Water in Frankfort, says that, because of critical water shortages in other sections of the nation, "it may well be that all we will have to say in the future -- to both vacationers and to industry -- is, 'COME TO KENTUCKY--WE HAVE WATER'."

Writing in "The Kentucky Engineer," a publication of the University of Kentucky College of Engineering, Tucker lists broad goals of the Water Resources Authority of Kentucky and its operating arm, the Division of Water, as follows:

"To eliminate, in the 12 river basins in the state, all harmful flooding.

"To provide low-flow augmentation sufficient for year-round water supply.

"Pollution control. "Navigation where feasible. "Recreation."

It will be necessary, Tucker adds, to develop state water resources commensurate with the needs of the population and industrial growth and to provide sufficient water for the anticipated increase in irrigation.

The author notes that with large reservoirs constructed or under construction, Kentucky will have water supply and recreation areas within 30 miles of any point in the state.

Additional water resources are being provided by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service in constructing retarding structures and by the Kentucky program to construct small lakes.

"In all good faith," Tucker concludes, "I must report the outlook, in my opinion, is most optimistic. Water in Kentucky has come a long way in the last several years and the program is still gathering momentum. Of course, like every one else, we have problems. Problems of finance (who hasn't?), problems of conflicting interests and problems of almost any other nature that can be linked to water resources development.

"Most important, industry is coming to Kentucky (partly because of water) and through the Appalachian program, industry will be coming to Eastern Kentucky. With industry will come jobs and, with jobs, economic independence and dignity."

As to the national water situation, Tucker says it is generally accepted that demands for water will increase five-fold by the year 2,000, while the population doubles.

The population increase will not be spread evenly across the country, however, and a proportionate share of the increased population cannot go to "the water-short and water-polluted northeast."

"The same is more or less true of the area west of Pittsburgh -- out to the Mississippi and north to the Ohio."

"From just west of the Mississippi, and from Canada to Texas, lies the high plains

area, already water-short. The same is much more true from the western foothills of the Rockies to the Sierra Nevada. The water-short situation in southern California is nationwide knowledge.

"This leaves the Pacific northwest, Appalachia, and the Old South (including the Arkansas river basin) as the only major areas in the U. S. with largely underdeveloped native water resources where a doubled or tripled or even quadrupled population can be supported."

This summary of water problems in other areas led Tucker to his opinion that Kentucky's future invitation to vacationers and industry can be based simply on the fact that "we have water."

The current issue of the "Kentucky Engineer" also has two other articles dealing with water -- one by W. W. Smither, assistant executive director of the Kentucky Water Pollution Control Commission, and one by Mike Flynn, secretary of the Kentucky Section, Sierra Club, and a member of several natural science-oriented organizations."

Smither, writing on Kentucky's water pollution control program, observes that the Commonwealth rapidly is becoming an industrial state and adds that "all of us, especially engineers, have a responsibility for maintaining a proper environment for Kentucky people. The use of sound engineering principle will maintain water quality for future generations."

Flynn urged engineers to increase their familiarity with other disciplines including the life sciences. He adds that "the key solution to pollution control is "to permit multiple re-use of the same water as it flows from municipality to municipality and from industrial complex to industrial complex." It is fortunate, he continues, that the federal Water Pollution Control Administration is evaluating some 30 waste treatment processes aimed at augmenting the supply of re-usable water. He adds:

"Since renovation and disposal have associated economic costs, the temptation will continue for some classes of water users to practice abuses or to 'get away with all they can.'"

"While continuing education serves a good purpose, for recalcitrant offenders, a more militant approach to combating infringements is advocated. Enforcement of anti-pollution statutes, it is felt by environmental planners, has been too lax in the past."

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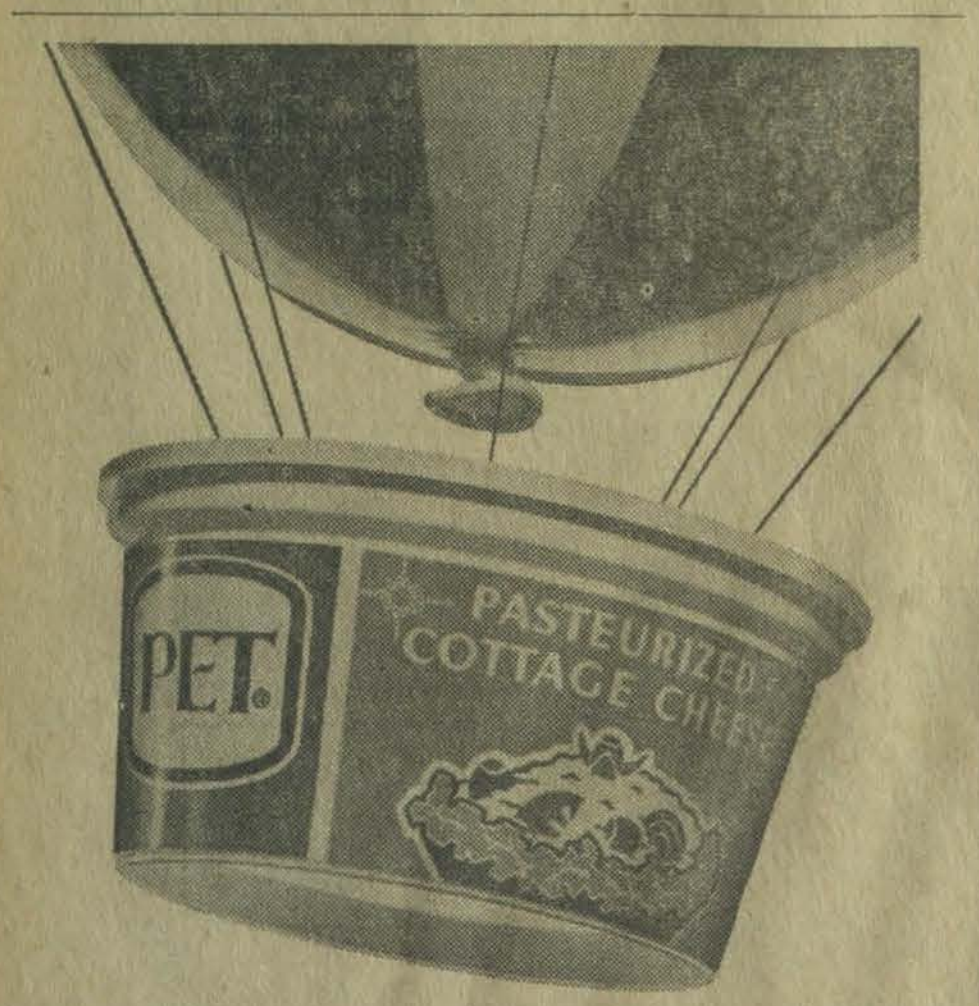
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
