CAP Directors Vote VISTA Program Out

Nearly Unanimous Vote Is Recorded Vs. Poverty Groups

The VISTA program in Floyd county faces a quick death if action taken Monday by the poard of directors of the Big Sandy Community Action Program stands unchanged.

The board voted almost unanimously—there was one dissenting vote-to end its association with VISTA. Big Sandy CAP is the sponsoring agency representing the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) in the conduct of the VISTA work, which is financed by OEO. Thus, it appears that VISTA, which has its main concentration in the Mud Creek section of this county, will be without funds, since it has no OEO-connected sponsorship.

County Judge Henry Stumbo, vice-chairman of the Big Sandy CAP directors, presided in the absence of Chairman George L. Ramey. Sheldon Clark, of Martin county, made the motion designed to end VISTA work in the area, and Mrs. Evelyn Gardner, of Tram, seconded the action. Not all the directors present voted on the issue, but only one, Dr. W. C. Hambley, Pikeville mayor, voted against the motion.

At that, the hottest issue before the directors wasn't VISTA. The longest and most heated discussion came when the Pike County Board of Education applied for CAP's approval of its program, which needs OEO funding. Harry Eastburn, director of the Big Sandy Community Action Program, pointed out that the board of education had fired employees in ertain OEO-sponsored programs there without first preferring charges and giving the workers a hearing and that until this is done approval will not be given.

The request for permission to move the Dwale outpost of the Comprehensive Health Program to the vicinity of Prestonsburg was denied. CAP directors suggested that the move should await further development of proposed road construction which, the health program feared, would isolate the Dwale station and make its work ineffective.

Science-A-Process' In Floyd Schools Receiving Acclaim

The new "Science-A-Process Approach" program in the Floyd county schools is gradually becoming one of the models for statewide acclaim, according to County Superintendent Charles Clark.

"We have had approximately 125 visitors superintendents, principals, teachers and college students-visit our schools since the program was initiated in 1967 in cooperation with Morehead State University," Mr. Clark

"Only last week, we had 25 college science students from the University of Louisville spend a day in Floyd county studying the underlying principles of this new innovative program," he added.

At present Floyd county has 18 schools, consisting of 134 teachers and 4,500 students engaged in this new method of science instruction in which the subject is taught as a procedure of inquiry and not merely as a collection of facts. The essential item of Science-A-Process Approach is that instead of ust having demonstrations in science, the child s actually involved in carrying out experiements himself.

School Principals, Dr. Edmonds Meet To Study Program

He said the meetings have been scheduled in the hope that school principals will be more receptive to innovative ideas.

U. S. Shoe To Build Second Plant in East Kentucky

U. S. Shoe Corporation has decided to establish a second plant in Eastern Kentucky. The first U. S. Shoe operation is located across the Big Sandy from Lancer. The second

will be at Jackson, Breathitt county.

Announcement by Robert D. Stix, U. S. Shoe vice-president, of his company's plans marks a further step in the varied industrialization of Eastern Kentucky.

Floyd county was the pioneer in the region for new industry with the coming of Kentucky Appalachian Industries to West Prestonsburg, Princess Manufacturing Co., to Auxier and U. S. Shoe to the Lancer vicinity.

Opening of the big American Standard plant at the Kenwood site, near Paintsville, is

scheduled for January. In the Kentucky River valley Control Data Corp., a computer assembly plant at Campton, already is in operation, and only recently Tandy Industries. Inc., Tandy, Okla., announced it will locate in Letcher county, near Whitesburg.

U. S. Shoe will build a 65,000-square-foot steel structure along Panbowl Lake at Jackson. The plant, which is planned to employ 400-450 persons, mostly women, will produce women's shoes and cold-weather boots.

The outstanding success U. S. Shoe has had with its Floyd county plant is said to have convinced company officials of the opportunity in Eastern Kentucky.

Senate Backs OK by House For Martin Stream Work

The \$150,000 earlier approved by the House Committee on Rivers and Harbors for beginning of construction on the \$3.2 million Martin stream improvement project was voted last week by the Senate Appropriatons Committee, and because both branches of the Congress have agreed on the appropriation it cannot be changed in later conference between the two

This information was supplied The Times and others in the county by Senators John Sherman Cooper and Marlowe W. Cook, immediately after the Senate committee action.

The Martin project is designed to prevent a recurrence of the floods which have, according to Mayor E. P. Grigsby, caused damage there

in excess of \$10 million. The work will involve straightening, widening and deepening of the channel of Beaver Creek from a point near the confluence of Right and Left Beaver Creeks to the vicinity of Clark Branch, between Martin and Allen—a distance of about five miles. Senator Cook also advised Mayor Grigsby

and Ray R. Allen, executive director of the Martin Housing Commission, that bids on the proposed five-story housing project there have been rejected as excessive. City-USDA Contract Provides For Soil, Water Information

Dr. George P. Archer, mayor of Prestons- planning and development programs dealing burg, acting upon behalf of the city, has entered with soil, water and related land uses. into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Floyd County Soil and Water Conservation District and the USDA Soil Conservation

The memorandum has been approved and was returned to him at a meeting at Jenny Wiley State Park on October 28,

This memorandum allows the Soil Conservation District (SCD) and the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) to furnish technical data to the city to aid its planning commission.

Such cooperation allows joint effort in the solution of problems relating to the planning and development of soil and water resources in Floyd county.

SCS agrees to interpret available soil surveys; analyze water disposal, drainage, erosion and sediment problems and make recommendations as to solutions; provide design criteria and check adequacy of designs for soil and water conservation measures; assist in conducting inventories of natural resources; counsel with the Planning Commission and planning consultants on the commission's objectives for long range development; assist in reviewing development plans and make recommendations concerning the wise use of the land in relation to soil, water, and related resources.

The Commission is committed to observing the principles of sound soil and water conservation. Jackson Acquitted In Brown Slaying; **Akers Trial Next**

The first of three murder trials docketed for the current term of circuit court ended Monday in the acquittal of Charles Jackson, 22-year-old Garrett man who was charged with the slaying last January of his brother-in-law, Tommy Brown, Jr., 43. The jury deliberated almost three hours before reaching a verdict.

The case for the Commonwealth was weakened by the appearance of Brown's widow and one of his two former wives to testify for Jackson. Defense testimony concurred in the claim that Jackson fired in defense of his younger brother, Millard Jackson. These witnesses said Brown was pointing a shotgun at the younger Jackson and threatening him when the defendant fired.

The victim's son, Tommy, gave the Commonwealth its strongest point. He testified that his father told him to go into the house and get his shotgun and that when he handed the weapon to his father Jackson fired. The shooting took place last Jan. 21, on Turkey

Trial of David Akers, who is charged with the Mud Creek slaying of Charles Hall, was scheduled to begin Wednesday. The third such trial will be that of Orville MMoore, charged with the slaying of his son-in-law, Don Gayheart. His trial is scheduled for Dec. 1.

Bystander Is Shot In Restaurant Row Early Last Sunday

James Raymond Crisp, former Prestonsburg radio announcer, a bystander during an altercation at an Allen restaurant, was seriously wounded early Sunday by a .38calibre revolver bullet which reportedly was accidentally fired.

Crisp was struck below the left eye, and the bullet ranged downward into his neck. He was taken to a Lexington hospital, where he later was said to be recovering.

A warrant charging William Kilgore Woods, of Allen, with assault and battery with a deadly weapon was sworn out by State Trooper Elmo Allen. The trooper said the shooting took place at Ann's Barbecue, shortly after 2 a. m.,

\$410,151 Okayed For Varied Work Next 12 Months

Floyd, Lawrence, Martin, Magoffin, Johnson and Pike counties have received a federal grant of \$410,151 for a four part, 12-month community action program, it was announced last week by W. Astor Kirk, director, Middle Atlantic Region, OEO.

The applicant agency is the Big Sandy Area Community Action Program, Inc. The local share of the grant is \$61,843. Of the total federal figure, \$30,500 are unexpended funds from previously approved programs. Harry Eastburn is the executive director with offices located at the Johnson county court-House,

Community Action Agency Administration (funded at \$150,067 and staffed with eight professionals and seven non-professionals) enables the CAA to continue its on-going program and initiate new ones.

The second component, CAA Planning (funded at \$26,986 and staffed by one professional and four non-professionals), provides staff for involving poor people in the Pikeville Model Cities program. The third component, Community

Organization (funded at \$59,248 and staffed with 12 non-professionals) provides outreach workers who make contact with the area poor The final component, an Emergency Food

and Medical Services program (funded at \$173,850 and staffed with 13 non-professionals), provides needed emergency food and medical services to five of the six counties in the Big Sandy Area, Lawrence County not qualifying.

Suit for \$100,000 **Names Power Firm** In Death of Youth

Suit asking \$100,000 damages of the Kentucky Power Company was filed in circuit court last week by Eugene Rister, administrator of the estate of Larry Andrew Rister, the youth who was electrocuted at Wayland last September.

The complaint alleges that the power company left three "live" wires, uninsulated and unguarded by fencing, at the location formerly

occupied by a machine shop. Rister contends the place vacated when the machine shop was moved to Left Beaver Creek was enticing to youngsters and that the fencing which once had enclosed the danger spot had been permitted to fall into disrepair.

Young Rister was elctrocuted when he climbed upon the framework upon which the wires were located.

An action filed in circuit court by the city of Prestonsburg seeks the annexation of 156 acres of land to the city. This acreage lies in the vicinity of Cliff and was acquired as a prospective industrial site.

Service Publishes Area Soils Report

Muin Kalla, professional planner working with the city of Prestonsburg, said recently that soils information and needed interpretations are basic ingredients which he must have to develop a realistic land use plan.

The soils report for Prestonsburg and adjacent areas was published last month by the USDA Soil Conservation Service. The purpose of the report was to furnish information about the soils in the Prestonsburg area for planning purposes. The soil map shows the location of different soils and the report contains information about the characteristics, limitations and suitability for different uses.

The area covered by the soils report is approximately 2,000 acres. Included is most of the land in the valley along the Big Sandy river from Auxier to Dwale. Portions of Middle Creek and Bull Creek are included. Areas not included in the report may be available at the USDA Soil Conservation Service office here.

Many uses can be made of the soils report. By using the report comprehensive planning can tatcher instructs classes in European be made very effectively. Individuals can also use the soils report for locating septic fields, homesites, driveways and lawn and landscaping problems.

The report indicates the degree of limitation that a particular soil has for these uses as well as for other uses. It also indicates whether campsites, picnic areas, athletic fields and other recreational uses are adapted to the particular soil.

Engineers can use the information for permeability or percolation tests. They can classify the soils based on its physical and chemical properties.

This information and other needed interpretations for non-farm uses can be obtained, free of charge, by contacting the USDA will make on-site investigations to make other

In this new program children are taught various methods of measurement and the instruments of science; the value of experimentation; the evaluation of information obtained through observation and experimentation and how to reach conclusions based on the evaluation of information.

Virtually all of the equipment needed to teach Science-A-Process Apporach is available in kits designed by the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"There are 130 kits (average cost of each is \$300.00) in our schools and these are shifted from school to school as needed by various grade levels," Clark said.

Frank Stewart, county science consultant, and Dr. Crayton Jackson, Morehead State University science co-ordinator, supervised the training of 70 teachers and principals in the Science-A-Process-Approach through two summer workshops on the Morehead campus. During the past spring and summer approximately 100 additional teachers were trained for a period of a week.

Saturday morning on the Morehead campus a conference on Science-A-Process-Approach will be conducted, with four Floyd county people serving as speakers and demonstrators.

Hartford Hits Takeover Of Community Colleges

The University of Kentucky Community dergraduat degree; College System is carrying out the assignment given to it by the people, but it will be subject to a reversal if any major relignment is at-

This was the assertion of Dr. Ellis F. Hartford, dean of the system, in his recent "State of the System" report at the annual faculty

conference at Lexington. "Community colleges in Kentucky occupy a unique position, with University membership on the one hand and community orientation on the other." Dean Hartford said. "Each college is an integral part of the University, with the same standards of admission and operation as the parent institution. Each college, through its

local advisory board and other ties, relates itself to the needs of the community.' The chief administrative officer of the UK system said that if the colleges are not allowed to do their job, new institutions will have to be

created for that purpose "The state should keep faith with the people of several areas who gave money in order to get a community college established to serve their needs. These people and the bondholders have an equity in the system as it is currently

organized," he stated. Dean Hartford said the community colleges have been charged with at least four functions: -offering transfer curricula to students who wish to complete the first two years of an un-

propriate experiences."

-providing two-year associate degree programs designed to prepare the student for immediate employment on a technical or semiprofessional level;

-offering continuing educational opportunities for the citizens of the immediate areas, and

-assisting students through guidance and counseling services to define their capabilities

and make sound career chocies. These functions, he added, further imply provision for developmental courses "designed to meet needs of students who come into the open door colleges with educational deficiencies that can be repaired by ap-

The dean elaborated on 10 points which he called "arguments for the system" as it is now constituted.

"Any change or proposal that distracts the system from its role or which diminishes its facilities and resources for doing its job is clearly unjustifiable and runs counter to the public interest.

"This does not question the validity or the desirability of the programs of the four-year colleges; it merely shows that these two types of institutions have different sets of purposes, and that these intersect in only one phase of their respective programs."

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
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

Trustees of the University of Kentucky voted death in 1962. to ask the 1970 General Assembly to appropriate \$144,309,900 of a proposed budget that totals \$227,842,400 for the 1970-72 biennium, by far the largest amount ever sought by a Kentucky institution of higher learning.

To the state appropriation, roughly 63 per cent of UK's proposed income, would be added the university's income from fees, tuitions, "I think any lawyer would be interested in a gifts, restricted funds, federal grants and cafeterias and dormitories.

31 ELECTED

The Kentucky Commission on Human Rights released figures showing 31 Negroes won offices in Kentucky in the Nov. 4 election to join four holdovers and make the total 35, or 12 more than the 23 holding elective offices at the time.

Among those elected were Luska J. Twyman, Glasgow, the first Negro elected mayor of a Kentucky city, and Neville Tucker, Louisville, the state's first Negro Police Court judge.

Elected also were 21 city councilmen, three magistrates, three constables and two state representatives. Four, including Twyman, previously had been named to fill vacancies.

HIGH PRICE OF MEAT

Conservation officers attribute a rise in game-and-fish law violations throughout Kentucky to a larger supply of animals, a growing disregard for the law in general, and the high price of meat.

The State Fish and Wildlife Resources Department reported that while conservation officers made record number of 5,210 arrests last year, they expect the number to be greater for 1969.

FOR TB HOSPITALS

The Kentucky Thoracic Society, an organization of 109 physicians, recommended at a two-day meeting in Berea that the state's six tuberculosis hospitals be kept open. A spokesman said "we felt if the tuberculosis problem is tackled directly, there are enough TB cases in the state to fill these empty beds."

The society's reaction was to proposals in June that the state phase out its system of TB hospitals within two years. The report said the hospitals averaged only 55 per cent occupancy.



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



Sunday Closing Law Subject of Hearing

Kentucky's Sunday closing law will be the subject of a special public hearing planned by

an interim committee of the Legislature. The Legislature's Interim Committee on Cities will conduct the hearing at 10 a. m., November 17, in the auditorium of the Kentucky Department of Health. James T. Fleming, director of the Legislative Research Commission, said anyone wishing to present information or opinion about the subject should

contact the LRC. Kentucky's Sunday closing law or "Blue Law" and its applications, or lack of applications, have become increasingly controversial in recent months. Most courts believe solution to the problem is in new legislation but many legislators believe adequate legislation exists and questions of application should be resolved in the courts.

A special legislative subcommittee met on November 5 again, in its continuing study of the problems surrounding use of persistent pesticides. The subcommittee is studying the need for legislation regulating the use of persistent pesticides such as DDT and DDD.

In a public hearing held August 29, the subcommittee heard several environmental scientists and others in public health fields claim that persistent pesticides endanger all living plants and animals because of their long-

Other environmental scientists, and several persons interested in the manufacture, sale and use of the pesticides claimed dangerous effects have not been proved.

Strip-Mining Is Still A Threat

(An Editorial in The Herald-Advertiser, Huntington, W. Va.)

HE STATE of Kentucky has one of toughest strip mine reclamation in the nation. Now, however, Stahr Jr., president of the ional Audubon Society, has ned that even this law may not be ugh to protect the land.

a recent speech to Kentucky's annual Conservation Congress, a native Kentuckian himself, "a good law might be adequate" control strip mining in Western intucky, where the land is elatively level.

But, he cautioned, because of such roblems as erosion and the silting of treams, "coming generations would ess us if we put an end to it" in the astern Kentucky mountains.

Stahr, a former president of West Inginia University and secretary of he Army under the late President ennedy, said he was "disturbed" by wo recent developments relating to trip mining.

He noted that Bethlehem Steel Corp. plans to use its Beth-Elkhorn subsidiary to develop a major stripping operation in Letcher County.

"We had hoped," the conservationist said, "a company of Bethlehem's stature would have no part of such an operation."

"A still more disquieting case," Stahr charged, is one in which the state of Kentucky has granted the Peabody Coal Co. a series of delays in meeting requirements for grading and planting required to reclaim its River Queen mine in Western Kentucky's Muhlenberg county.

Stahr's warning is a timely one. Too often we think that because a law has been enacted a problem is solved and we give it no more thought. This would appear to be the case with strip mining. Despite the passage of laws to regulate such operations, they still remain-to use Stahr's phrase-"an ominous threat" to the land.
