# **State's Largest Power Plant**

This aerial view of Kentucky Power Company's Big Sandy plant shows both units operating at the largest investor-owned generating station in Kentucky. The 800,000-kilowatt Unit 2 went into commercial operation October 1, boosting the plant's capability to 1,080,000 kilowatts. Readily visible are the concrete cooling towers that provide cool water for steam condensing purposes. The smaller hyperbolic-shaped tower at right was the first of its kind in the western hemisphere when built in 1962 to serve the first unit at the plant near Louisa. The \$100-million expansion program, under way for three years, will be completed later this year when the exhaust from Unit 1 is tied into the new concrete stack which towers 826 feet.
