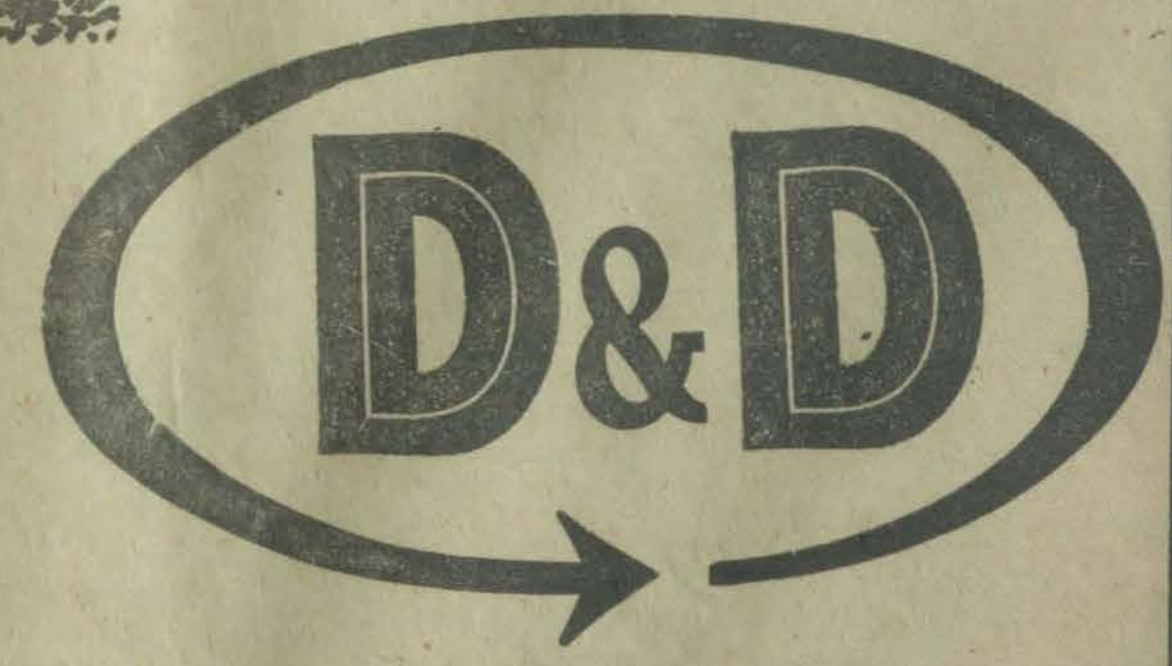

Sept. 6th, Last Day For Voter Registration

The deadline to register to vote at the November election is Sept. 6.

Kentuckians this year will elect a state auditor, 100 state representatives, 19 of 38 state senators, county and city officials, circuit judges and other local candidates.

Two proposed amendments to the state Constitution will be on the ballot.

One would provide for annual instead of biennial meetings of the Legislature. The other would assess agricultural and horticultural land according to its value for such uses.

To be eligible to register to vote, one must be 18 or older by election day, and must have lived in the state one year, the county six months and the precinct 60 days.

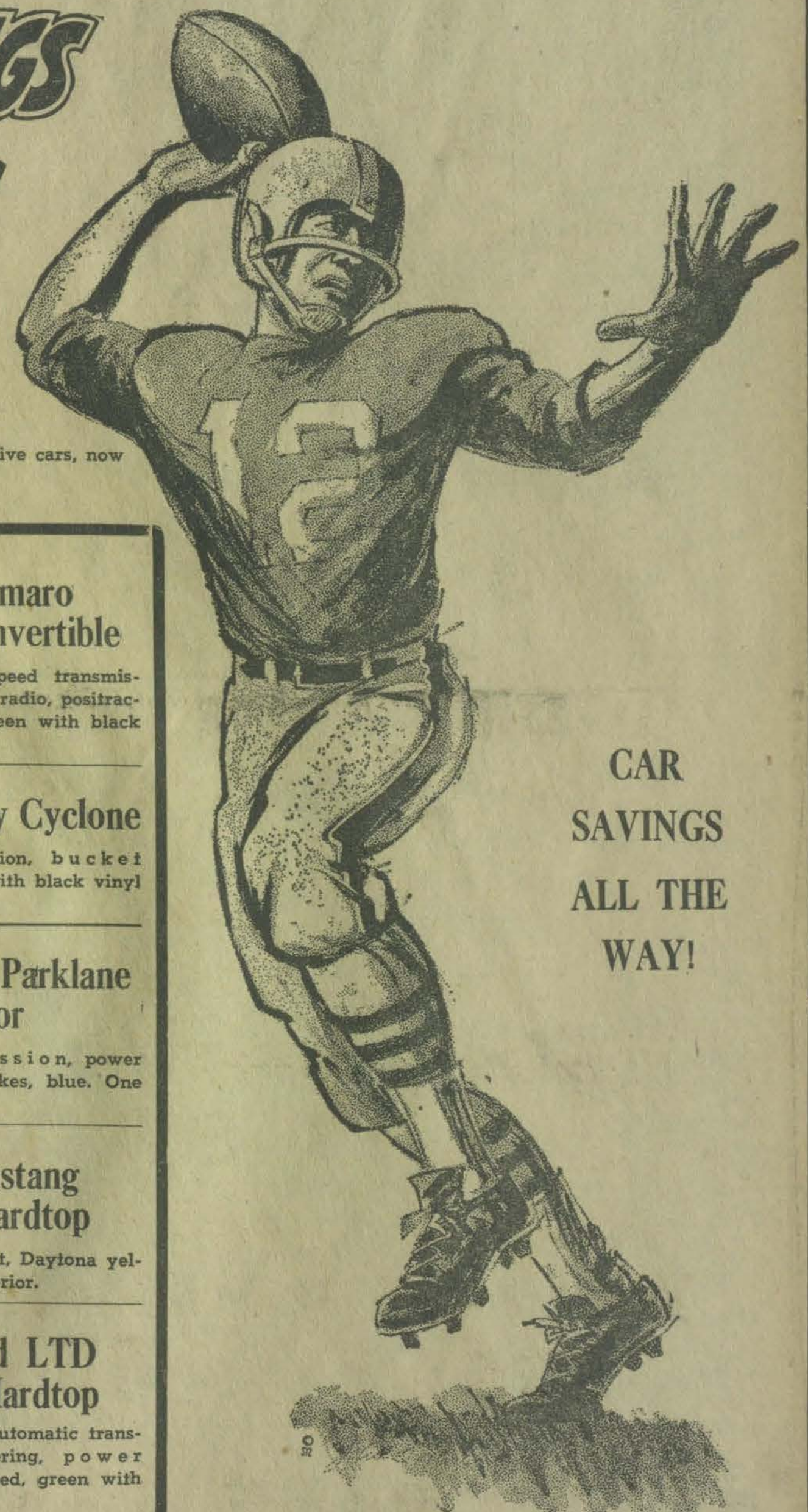

**Health Department
Job Openings Told**

Openings for two jobs with the local health department have been announced this week by the Merit System Council of the Kentucky State Department of Health, Frankfort.

The positions, both with a salary range from \$5,760 to \$8,520, are that of Senior County Sanitarian and Educationist. Senior County Sanitarian's duties include seeing that sanitary regulations are carried out; making sanitary inspections of dairies, meat packing plants, foods and milk plants, hotels, tourist courts, swimming pools, summer camps, sewage disposal systems; making sanitation recommendations for improvements and related work as required.

To qualify for this position the applicant must be a graduate of a college or university of recognized standing with courses in one of the biological or physical sciences.

Duties of the Educationist, who works under the direction of a health officer and the technical supervision of the division of public health education of the state Department of Health, include assisting in carrying out public health programs for the local health department and related work as required. Examples of this work may be planning and writing press releases, pamphlets, radio scripts, other educational literature; helping in community organization work preparatory to visits of mobile health units such as x-ray, dental and cancer control; assisting in conducting community health surveys and organizing community health councils.

Qualifications for this position require that the applicant be a graduate of a recognized college or university with a degree in one of the natural sciences, social science, English, journalism, teacher education, art or a related field. The applicant must have the ability to interpret programs and activities verbally and in writing, to prepare and give talks.

Examinations for both these positions are written.

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**New Mines in Pike
In Company Plans**

Bethlehem Steel Corporation, and many other steel companies, have coal mining operations in Eastern Kentucky because the coal found there is a low-sulphur, low-ash, high-volatile grade essential to the production of metallurgical-grade coke. Coke, iron ore, and limestone are charged into blast furnaces to produce iron for steel-making; approximately two-thirds of a ton of coal is required for each ton of steel produced. Although coal is mined in 26 states, metallurgical-grade coking coal is a much rarer commodity and Eastern Kentucky is a prime source of this type of coal.

Bethlehem Steel has a long-term economic interest in Eastern Kentucky. In Letcher, Pike, Knott, and Floyd counties, Bethlehem owns substantial acres of land and mineral rights. Remaining reserves in the Elkhorn division are sufficient for mining operations well into the next century.

A multimillion-dollar program to expand the coal production facilities of Bethlehem Steel's subsidiary, Beth-Elkhorn Corporation, located in Eastern Kentucky, was announced at Frankfort Monday by E. P. Leach, Bethlehem vice-president, in charge of mining.

Within the next few years, the Elkhorn division, headquartered in Jenkins, plans to develop two new underground mines in the immediate area and begin surface mining operations in Pike and Letcher counties. These new operations are expected to increase the division's coal production approximately 50 percent above the current level and provide jobs for several hundred men.

Mr. Leach said that a substantial increase in the tonnage of coal produced by the Elkhorn division is essential for two reasons — to produce the coke required by the new steelmaking facilities going into production at Bethlehem's Burns Harbor, Ind., plant and, also, to replace coal production from Bethlehem mines in Kentucky and West Virginia that will soon be worked out.

At one of these mines, Elkhorn No. 27 in Letcher county, coal production will come to an end sometime next year when the underground deposit is exhausted. However, in the coal seam outcrops on the perimeter of this deposit, there are still 10 million tons of metallurgical-grade coking coal, obtainable only through surface mining methods.

To recover this coal, the Elkhorn division will shortly let contracts for surface mining operations in Letcher and Pike. The amount of coal provided by this surface mining operation in the Jenkins area will equal the tonnage produced by Mine 27 and will enable the Jenkins cleaning plant, which serves Mine 27, to continue operation.

Reclamation of the new surface mined land will conform, it was said, with the requirements of the new Kentucky surface mining reclamation law, which is considered to be a model law.

Bethlehem intends that the area to be surfaced mined will be reclaimed promptly and effectively.

One of the new underground mines is planned for the Damron Fork area of Pike county. Raw coal from this mine will be shipped by rail to the Jenkins cleaning plant, enabling it to run at full capacity for the first time in several years. This plan will require the addition of 15 employees to the present 35-man work force at the Jenkins cleaning plant and make jobs available for the underground employees of Mine 27 as that mine works out.

The second new under-

ground mine will be developed near the site of the Elkhorn division's Mine 26, also in Pike county. Coal from this new mine and from surface mining operations to be begun in Pike county will bring the coal cleaning plant at Mine 26 up to its designed capacity.

The Elkhorn division's third facility currently producing coal in Eastern Kentucky is underground Mine 22 and its cleaning plant in Letcher county. The tonnage of raw coal from Mine 22 utilizes the full capacity of the cleaning plant and production is expected to remain at this capacity level. Bethlehem's reserves of metallurgical-grade coking coal in Eastern Kentucky are sufficient to keep underground mines 22 and 26 operating at current levels into the next century.

Chronic coughs — and jagged rhythmic sounds produced by the cold viruses — are all around us.

Sneezes and coughs, except in song, are nothing to laugh about. Respiratory infections are the major cause of time lost from school and work in America. People consult doctors for acute respiratory disease more often than for any other group of acute ailments.

And sneezes and coughs spread plenty of germs, including the TB germ.

This kind of music nobody wants to hear — in real life. And your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association is doing everything it can to help rub out the sounds of respiratory disease. Check with them for more information to keep down the din.

Warning of Danger Of Eclipse Sounded

A partial eclipse of the sun will be visible September 11 in all parts of the country except the northeastern U.S. Dr. C. Dwight Townes, medical advisory chairman of the Kentucky Society for the Prevention of Blindness, on the basis of eye-damage reports following previous eclipses, warns that "many persons are either unaware of the danger of looking at an eclipse, or can't resist sneaking a peek anyway."

The Society reminds would-be viewers that even though the dazzling visible rays of the sun are blocked, the sun is emitting invisible infra-red rays which can cause damaging burns to the retina of the eye. "Because the retina is not sensitive to pain," said Townes, the victim often does not realize his eyes have been harmed." Retina burns are incurable, and cause a blank spot in the victim's field of vision, where the burn has scarred the retina. The danger of the September 11 eclipse will be greater in the southwestern states, where the portion of the sun "blocked" will be largest, and the duration of the eclipse longest. It is in these areas that unknowing viewers may attempt to watch the eclipse, since the glaring rays are sufficiently blocked to allow "comfortable" viewing.

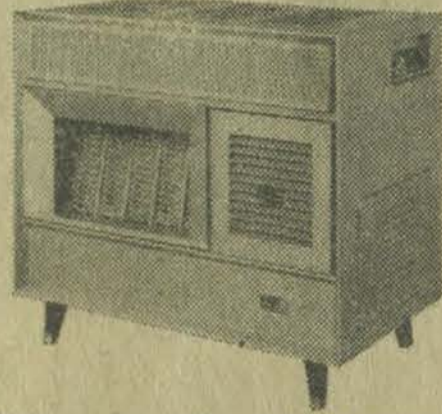

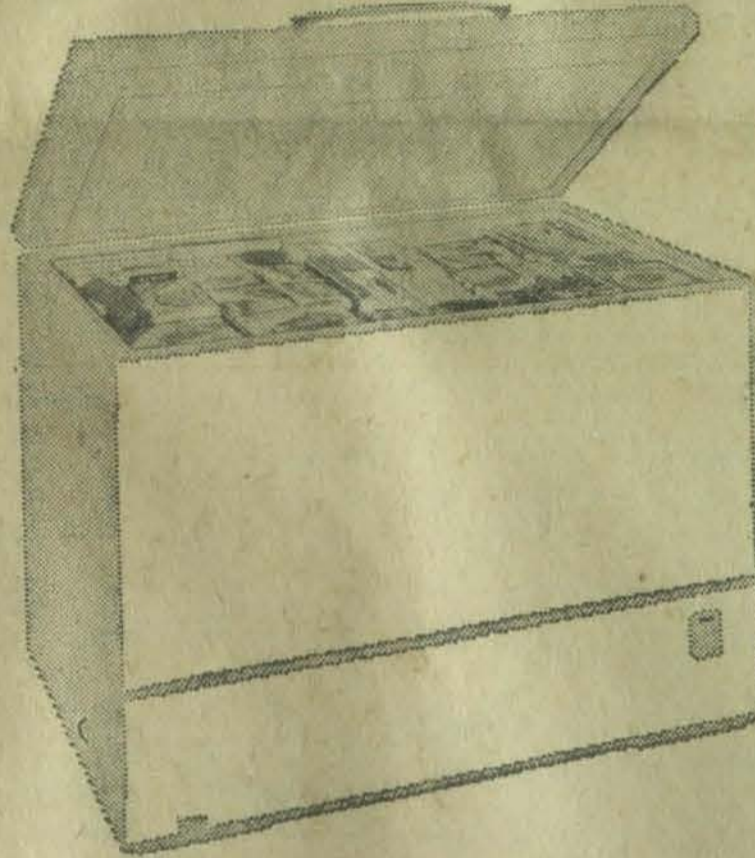

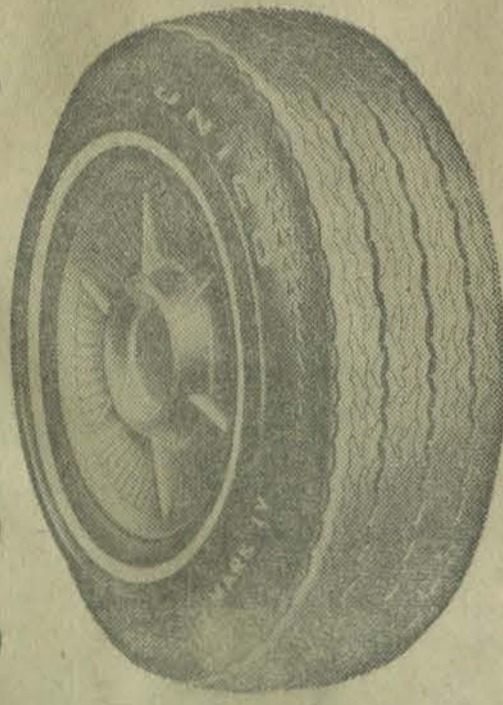
