Lake Route Damage Laid To Truckers

Overweight Trucks, Stripmining Draw Sharp Criticism

As stripmining and overloaded coal trucks have come under attack from various quarters within the week damage to the highway skirting Dewey Lake from Hager Gap to Dewey Dam was reported among others.

The lake road, a part of the road connecting Martin and Floyd counties, is showing damage in the lane travelled by coal trucks while loaded. The other lane shows little or any adverse effect from normal traffic and unloaded coal trucks.

The same route was so severely damaged four years ago by coal trucks that its reconstruction was necessary at a cost of

In the West Van Lear-Daniels Creek section, where the truck issue is hottest, citizens plan to resort to federal court where they hope to procee an injunction against overloaded trucks. To help finance the proceeding, they staged a square dance last Saturday night.

From one source it was learned that 900 or more citations have been issued in the last two years to coal truckers but that their effect has been negligible, especially in Johnson county. The source, who asked that his identity not be revealed, said that enforcement in Floyd county is better than in any other Eastern Kentucky county, although far from perfect here.

Congressman Carl D. Perkins voiced strong criticism of stripmining during a speech delivered at Jackson last Friday. The same day, Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss and Attorney General John B. Breckinridge, two who are opposite ends of the political spectrum, got into the act. Said Congressman Perkins:

One Seriously Hurt In Wreck Near Here; 6 2 Pinned in Wreckage

One of two women who were pinned for 30 minutes last Wednesday morning in the wreckage of their autos on the Mountain Parkway, three miles from here, remains

in serious condition. (The wreck already has resulted in a \$105,795 damage suit. See seperate story.) The injured woman, Mrs. Rosemary Greer, 33, of Paintsville, suffered fractures of the pelvis, arms, shoulder and ribs, and is now receiving treatment in a Lexington

The other woman pinned in the wreckage of her car, Mrs. Jean Elizabeth Matney, 23, her husband, Ernest Matney, 25, and their three-year-old daughter, all of Holly, Mich., have been released from the Prestonsburg General Hospital. Mrs. Janis Kimbler, of Paintsville, an expectant mother who was a passenger in the Greer auto, was taken to the Paintsville Hospital. Her five-year-old daughter and three of the Matney children of the area to be afforded city water service were only slightly injured.

State troopers were quoted as saying Mrs. Matney apparently fell asleep at the wheel of her car, crossed the center of the road and struck the approaching Greer car.

Bank Announces Plans To Build Branch



New Branch Bank To Look Like This

The Bank Josephine this week announced that it will begin construction next month of a branch bank in Prestonsburg as an expansion of its services to the public.

The branch will be the second to be placed into operation by the bank in the county. The first established by the Bank Josephine was the Allen branch bank.

Approval of the Prestonsburg branch was granted last week by the State Department of Banking and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), and the structure is expected to be ready for occupancy by the end of August

The building will be 36 by 40 feet, of structural steel, built on a lot facing 175 feet on South Lake Drive (US 23 and 460), between Patton street and the property of Otis Cooley. A lot fronting on South Lake Drive 75 feet, between the Cooley property and the Pelphrey Car Wash, will be used for employee parking.

Porta-Branch has custom facade, with exterior colors and accent interior panels meeting individual bank preferences. The Prestonsburg structure will have four tellers' windows, vault, lobby, employees' lounge, one drive-in window and a tube station which will permit a customer to deposit or withdraw money without going to a teller's window. A night depository will also be provided.

Materials for the building are scheduled for shipment August 12. The branch bank can be erected within six days, its sectional components being complete with wiring, plumbing and other adjuncts. The "package" materials shipment will also include lighting fixtures, air-conditioning and heating equipment, carpeting, draperies, furniture and some desks.

Foundation work for the branch bank will be done by Ervin Akers.

Bids Are Asked On Five Sectors In Floyd County

Contractors' bids on five new sectors of US 23 construction, grade, drain and bituminous concrete, between New Allen and the Pike county line were asked this week by the Department of Highways. Date of opening of bids was set for 10 a.m.,

The five sectors cover a distance of approximately 10 miles. Bids opened earlier asked more than \$9 million for the same type of construction on approximately five miles of other sectors of the same highway.

The new bids are sought on these projects:

From near New Allen, southeast to Dawson Branch, a distance of 3,030 miles: from Dawson Branch to a point near Tram, 2.246 miles; from Tram to Mare Creek, 1.287 miles; from Mare Creek to Cold Water Branch, 2.206 miles; Cold Water Branch to the Pike-Floyd line, 1.36 miles.

Court Accepts Role As Sale Of Bonds Set

The Floyd fiscal court last Friday accepted the role of fiscal agent for the Floyd County Board of Education in the financing of the proposed high school at Eastern through the sale of a \$650,000 bond issue to cover the local share of the cost of the structure.

The bonds are being advertised for sale on Aug. 13, it was said.

The fiscal court meeting followed a special meeting of the board of education last Thursday when the board adopted required legislation and called on the court for the action by which the court acts as a holding agent, renting the school property The murder charge against the third man to the board over the 15-year period for annual rentals sufficient to retire principal and interest.

If the bonds are sold, the first payment for the period ending Feb. 1, 1972 would be \$49,375. Thereafter, annual payments would range between a low of \$74,625 and a

high of \$79,125.

3 Damage Suits Seek \$165,795

Three suits filed within the week in Floyd circuit court ask a total of \$165,795 damages.

Heaviest of the three is the suit filed by Rosemary Greer against Ernest and Jean Matney as an aftermath of an auto wreck on the Mountain Parkway, near here, July 15, in which Mrs. Greer was severely injured. She claims the Matney car, driven by Mrs. Matney at high speed, crossed the center line and struck her car. The suit lists among her injuries fractures of the pelvis, shoulder and arm. The suit asks \$80,000 for injuries, \$15,000 for medical expenses, \$10,000 for pain and mental anguish and \$795 for loss of her car.

First of the suits filed was that of A. L. Tuttle, who seeks to recover from Arnold (See Story No. 4, Page 12)

Central Camp Areas Viewed As Solution

Vandalism and thievery which have beset campers and others in parks across the country have become a problem at Jenny Wiley State Park, and officers who attempt to patrol the park itself and 20mile-long Dewey Lake where camping is heavy are beginning to see the need for specific camping areas which can be more effectively policed.

Sheriff Frank Leslie this week told of depredations committed in the German area, far up the lake. In that area Sunday a young West Virginian ripped a hole in his boat when it struck a submerged object. He left the boat tied up at the shore, and went for help. When he returned the boat was drifting out in the lake and his motor was missing.

Two weeks earlier, seven propellers were stolen in a single evening.

Down-lake, in the May Lodge vicinity, the top of a convertible was cut out, one night, and the interior of the car was slashed. Farther down, in the vicinity of the riding stables, a tent was slashed to pieces.

Two park policemen and one or more state troopers have been assigned to the park. But many spots along the lake are inaccessible except by boat, and the patrol from the lodge to Dewey Dam by land covers winding roads and shorelines which extend a distance of seven to ten miles.

The Department of Parks has had under consideration for at least two years a central camping area to be located in the Goble Branch section. All property rights, except for one tract, had been acquired early this year and Camp Chatterawha, the former Girl Scout camp, was purchased as a part of the proposed installation. The camp was planned as a state installation, with the U.S. Corps of Engineers leasing the site to the state.

But construction by the state may never be undertaken.

The State Property and Buildings Commission is scheduled to act soon on a Kentucky parks proposal for private development which would increase modern camping facilities in five Eastern Kentucky state parks from 182 to a 525 minimum and up to a 1,375 maximum to meet demands.

Parks Commissioner James Host said the five parks were part of 28 sites selected in the state where private money would lease park property up to 20 years and build the camp grounds to meet certain specifications.

The idea came from a study made by Spindletop Research of Lexington, on state park development to meet public needs. Under the plan the state would receive a share of the income which would be determined by competitive bidding.

Eastern Kentucky parks listed were Jenny Wiley State Park, to receive 150 to 375 sites; Carter Caves, which has 82 camping sites would receive 75-150 in one location and 50-200 in another location; Greenbo Lake with 74 sites would add 75-100; Grayson Reservoir would get a maximum of 350 sites, and Buckhorn, with 26 camp sites would receive 50-200 sites.

Ray is a veteran of World War II, having served with the Navy Seabees in the Pacific. He is a member of the Unity Baptist Church, Ashland, National Management Association, American Association of Petroleum Geologists, Appalachian Geological Society, Society of Petroleum Engineers of AIME, Kentucky Geological Society, Kentucky Oil and Gas Association, and BPOE Lodge No. 350.

"We're running steamshovels and bulldozers around a lot of these hills where

they shouldn't be running," Perkins said. "It was never intended under these old deeds that they operate in such a way as to violate the rights of the surface owner, under deeds made hundreds and hundreds of years ago," he added.

"It's going to require prudence on the part of everybody involved" to find a solution, Perkins told the group.

Goss, a Republican, asked Atty. Gen. Breckinridge, a Democrat, to seek injunctive action as soon as possible to prohibit further such damage to the roads.

Breckinridge, responding to a newsman's question, said he was certain he never would have heard from Goss on the matter if Breckinridge had not recently completed a fact-finding trip on the subject. That trip, to Eastern and Western Kentucky, concerned strip-mining operations as well as the overweight truck problem.

Goss asked Breckinridge for "an early decision" on overweight trucks, "so that the Department of Highways may act independently in the event you are not inclined to do so."

Breckinridge commented that he was "delighted" to see that Goss now was interested in enforcing state laws on the subject and said any action by the Highway Department was "long overdue."

He also noted that the Highway Department had a legal staff twice as large as the attorney general's office had.

And although state law says the attorney general nominates assistants to work in the different departments, Breckinridge said it apparently is the policy of the Nunn administration to reject his nominees.

If Goss would accept his nominations for assistant attorneys general in the Highway Department, Breckinridge asserted, he would make sure action was taken on the matter immediately. As it was, he commented, he would reply to Goss in due time.

Complaints by Eastern Kentuckians are generally aimed at the newer coal trucks that cost up to \$35,000 each. They weigh more than 30,000 pounds empty and can haul more than 50,000 pounds of coal.

The 80,000-pound gross weight often travels over mountain roads and bridges with 18,000 to 32,000-pound limits. Almost all of the trucks are registered in county clerks' offices as having 44,000-poound gross-weight limits.

Goss had told Breckinridge that records A Middle Creek woman and her son are in the highway and motor transportation departments "will indicate the situs of each unreasonable use" of the roads.

"The hundreds of citations that have been issued by the Department of Motor Transportation to overweight vehicles," Goss said, "Have failed to solve the problem or to alleviate the destruction of our roads.

"I feel that this problem has reached such proportions," he continued, "that other solutions must be found in the public interest, not only because of the public outcry, but also because of the burden placed upon road funds as a result of the damages."

"Because of your expressed interest in this problem," Goss said, "I request that you consider action to protect the department's proprietary interest in th

"Because of your expressed interest in this problem," Goss said, "I request that you consider action to protect the department's proprietary interest in these highways by injunction, wherever such unreasonable use of our state-maintained highways occurs.'

UF To Replace Old Gas Lines

Three sections of a natural gas production line which was installed in 1935 will be replaced by United Fuel Gas Company at a cost of \$131,000, J. B. Lauffer, Prestonsburg, production division superintendent, said last week. Work is now starting by the H. B. Ranier Construction Co., Prestonsburg contractor.

One of the sections is in Knott county and two sections are in Floyd county. Mr. Lauffer said that 11,740 feet of 18-inch diameter pipeline will be replaced with

The condition of the soil is such that corrosion to the company's line has been higher than normal. This in turn has resulted in high maintenance cost. The line delivers gas produced by numerous wells in the two counties.

Lauffer said the new pipeline sections will be coated and wrapped with protective materials to retard corrosion in the future. Pipe retired will be salvaged and utilized for future road casing. Such casing is often used when pipelines cross under highways.







Copies Being Made Of State's Oldest Land Grant Books

FRANKFORT, Ky.—The Kentucky Historical Society has begun copying the state Land Office's old land-grant books and survey plats as the first step in saving the historic records for posterity, says Mary R. Galvez, assistant secretary of state

A committee of concerned citizens and government officials, organized by Mrs. Galvez to find ways of preserving the records, recommended the copies be made so that the slowly crumbling originals can be stored and retired from use.

Some 454 books and thousands of survey plats are being copied. The documents date back to the 1770's and some bear the rames of Washington, Jefferson, Boone and other famous Americans. Doubly valuable as history and as records of original land owners, the books are literally falling apart from age.

"The books are so fragile we run the risk of damaging them each time they are opened," Mrs. Galvez says. "When the copies are made we can store the originals where they will be safe from harm. These old books should never be touched."

The Historical Society is cooperating in the restoration by providing the necessary equipment and trained personnel to copy the books. The Society already has copied many of the survey plats using a special process which produces copies actually clearer than the original.

"We can make the copies readily available to students and researchers which we cannot do now because of the danger to the originals," Mrs. Galvez says. Once the copying is completed the original books will be rebound, the crumbling pages laminated in plastic, the books stored and retired from use.

The project was begun some months ago by Secretary of State Elmer Begley, but was interrupted because of his illness. Mrs. Galvez hopes to finish the project during Begley's term of office.

Although the 1970 General Assembly provided \$20,000 over the next two years for restoring the books, more funds are needed. Complete restoration will cost about \$152,000.

Mrs. Galvez now is seeking funds from schools, foundations, bar associations, and historical groups.

First donations came from Woodford County junior high students who pledged \$100, and from an unknown visitor who saw the crumbling books and left a donation for their restoration.

"We're in a race against time," Mrs. Galvez says. "The books are deteriorating and if something isn't done soon, Kentucky's historical documents will be lost forever."

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

Good Detectives Read Fine Print

FRANKFORT, Ky.-State Police Detective Benjamin J. Music is a man who gets a lot more out of his morning newspaper than most people.

And Albert Wallace Grades, a safe burglar who just began serving a five-year term in Kentucky's State Reformatory, probably has more reason than anyone to wish that the sharp-eyed detective slept

The way the Pikeville-based Music handled a very ordinary crime just came to light. Detective Capt. Algin S. Roberts, commander of the Kentucky State Police Bureau of Investigation, told the story over early morning coffee when someone asked what makes the difference between a good detective and a mediocre one?

"Music," said Roberts, blowing steam over the chipped rim of a scalding-hot coffee mug, "Let me tell you about Ben Music."

Someone broke into Arnold Meade's farm supply store at Paintsville, peeled two safes, and slipped away with some \$95 in currency and about \$110 in merchandise, he

"Nothing particularly unusual about that," Roberts said. "We get safe burlaries all the time." And, no one was too surprised when a check of the store didn't turn up anything very enlightening, either. About all Music did find was a faint, dusty footprint on a loose piece of plywood.

"Now, any detective worth his salt is going to call that a clue and keep it as evidence," Roberts said.

Which is exactly what Music did. But who's going to run all over Eastern Kentucky looking at the bottom of peoples' shoes? "As a matter of fact," said Roberts, "I wouldn't criticize any detective who let it drop right there."

But Ben Music isn't just any detective. He notices things that other people, policemen included, sometimes miss. And in this case that "thing" happened to be a small item in a Huntington, W. Va., newspaper recounting the capture of three erstwhile gentlemen of the night caught peeling a safe at Jackson, Ohio.

"A lot of darn good investigators might have been inclined to read that article and forget it... if they saw it at all," said Roberts. "After all, safe burglaries do

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happen every day all over the country, and Jackson is a long way from Paintsville."

But to Music, a methodically patient man with a careful eye for small details, the article had a familiar note to it. The tools taken from the three thieves sounded very much like the ones used to burgle the

Paintsville store. Never one to ignore a fact caught staring him in the face, Music put through a hurried telephone call to Jackson Police Chief Elba Ross, who confirmed what Music already suspected. One of the burglars-Albert Wallace Grades, of Huntington-was wearing a pair of shoes which seemed to jibe with the footprint found in Meade's store.

The rest was pure routine. A comparison of Grades' shoe with the footprint, KSP identification expert Frank Anastasio told the Johnson circuit court, clearly established that Grades had indeed been inside the Paintsville store.

"And that," said Roberts, "is the difference between a good detective and a just mediocre one."



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
