

## Stumbo Says He Will Ask Clubs Probe Spread Over County Of Private Clubs To Prompt Action

The spread of private clubs through the county has led Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo to a decision to direct a grand jury investigation of all such places at the September session of circuit court.

Two clubs in the Prestonsburg area are under closing orders from circuit court. But others are operating, and Stumbo said that it is not fair to close one club and permit others to operate if they are in violation of liquor and other laws.

The court term is viewed as one which will be the busiest in several years — particularly for the grand jury. Four homicides are slated for investigation. In recent years, such investigations have been limited to one or two as the murder rate dropped.

One of the cases to be investigated is of long standing, and another originated in neighboring Knott county. The old murder case up for further probing is the mystery-slipping on Arkansas Creek of James Chaffins, Louisville man, while he was en route to Garrett for a visit with relatives.

The Knott county slaying to be investigated is that of Claude Conley. The case came under Floyd court jurisdiction (See Story No. 4, Page 16)

## Saturday Raids Net Big Haul, 4 Arrested

County and state officers joined in raids Saturday which resulted in four arrests and the confiscation of a heavy haul of whiskey, vodka and beer.

Arrested on possession charges were Lon Neeley, of the Auxier road, Mack Hunt, of Tram, and James McKinney, of Harold Gap. Donald Tackett, also of Harold Gap, was arrested on a warrant alleging that he sold a case of beer for \$12 to an unknown man.

The raid on Neeley, made by Sheriff Frank Leslie, State Police Sgt. Flora and Deputy Sheriffs Grady Skeans and Tom James, netted 64 pints of whiskey, 17 pints of vodka and 635 cans of beer, all of which was brought to the Sheriff's office here. Seventy-eight cans of beer which had been

chilled also were taken during the raid and were destroyed.

Neeley said a search of his store uncovered no intoxicants and that the premises where the haul was found was operated by Estill Hayden under a lease contract executed June 1, 1969. He contended the search of Hayden's premises was made without search warrant, but the Sheriff's office pointed out that both places were under the same roof. Hayden was not arrested.

The same afternoon at Tram, State Police Sgt. Ellis Ross and Deputy Sheriff Claude Flanery confiscated 22 cases of beer and 14 half-pints of whiskey in a search of the Mack Hunt premises.

Almost simultaneously, State Police Lt. Lykins, Deputy Sheriffs Silas DeRossett and Otto Fannin were raiding the James McKinney premises at Harold Gap, where they reported finding 28 cases of beer and 59 half-pints of whiskey.

## Bid of \$19,900 Offered by Firm On Fire Station

The \$19,900 bid submitted by Prestonsburg Building Supply, Inc. for construction of a second fire station here was tentatively accepted by the City Council at its special meeting Monday night.

It was the only bid offered. The contract provides for a 50 by 50-foot steel building, complete with wiring, plumbing and heating.

Construction of the second fire station, which will serve the Lancer section of Prestonsburg, is one of a series of improvements necessary to earn the city a fire insurance classification which will result in reduced insurance rates.

Other steps yet to be taken include the purchase of another fire truck and the laying of larger water lines in the Trimble Branch and Court street sections. These were discussed at last week's regular council meeting.

The new fire station will be erected on city-owned property between US 23 and the water plant. Site preparation will be done while building materials are awaited. It is expected that the station will be completed within the next six weeks.

## Allen-Pikeville Detour To Open First of Week

The detour around construction on US 23 between Prestonsburg and Pikeville will be opened Monday, the Kentucky Department of Highways announced this week.

North-south traffic will be routed over KY 122 near Virgie through Melvin and Burton to KY 80 south of Martin to Allen where KY 80 and US 23 meet. Length of the detour is 40 miles.

East-west detour will also follow KY 80 and KY 122 from Allen to Shelbyana, a distance of 50 miles.

The detour will not carry trucks over 30,000 pounds, which means heavier trucks must use an alternate route or travel over KY 80-US 23 despite lengthy delays.

With the help of Appalachian funds, the route has been resurfaced and upgraded for the detour traffic.

## Coal Prices Soaring As Industry Booms

### Mobile X-Ray Unit Visit Set Aug. 6th

The mobile X-ray unit donated by the Kentucky Elk Lodges will be at the Floyd County Health Department Thursday, August 6, from 10 to 12 noon and from 1 to 3 p.m.

Dr. Russell L. Hall, Floyd county health officer, is urging all teachers, foodhandlers, known contacts of tuberculosis cases and citizens living in the Prestonsburg area to take advantage of this free service and have chest X-rays made.

Any individual who has received a letter requesting a larger chest picture made should bring the letter and present it to the technician on duty at the trailer.

### Price for Coal Up to \$12 a Ton And Still Rising

The federal Mine Safety Act has not driven coal operators out of business, as was predicted when the legislation was first enacted — instead, it has driven the price of coal up.

And the coal business, historically a "feast or famine" industry, apparently is booming in Floyd and all coal-producing counties of the state.

That means that while many other parts of the nation are in the economic doldrums, economically depressed Eastern Kentucky is prospering along with other coal-producing areas.

Coal that two years ago was bringing \$2.50-\$4 a ton is now selling at \$9 to \$12 at the railroad. "You could paint a rock black and sell it," one operator said. The big fear is that coal will go so high that it will price itself out of the fuel market.

Biggest beneficiaries of the boom are the strip-mine operators, and their numbers are increasing almost daily. Despite the inferior grade of their coal, as compared with that of the deep-mine producer, it's black, and it brings top prices. And these are the fellows whom the safety act almost missed — they are not required to buy costly machinery in order to comply with provisions against "gassy" mines.

In this county deep mining is restricted mainly to the operations of the Island Creek Coal Company, and its production has been reduced with the closing of several Left Beaver Creek openings. A huge deep-mine operation on Right Beaver Creek, in the Caney Creek area, is under development by George E. Evans, Jr., but a railroad must first be built and actual loading of coal is months away.

Two Hueysville residents were jailed over the week-end on arson charges after a home under construction on nearby Salt Lick Creek was destroyed by fire last Friday night.

Jailed by Deputy Sheriffs Albert Salyer and Sollie Holbrook were Clyde Vanderpool and Phillip Neeley. Warrants alleging arson have been issued for Tivis and Marvin Neeley.

The building that was burned was a residence being erected by John Jude, operator of a sawmill near the scene of the blaze.

Dan Kidd and Isaac Howell were released from jail under bond last week after it had been determined that Italy Spears, 55, of the Harold vicinity, will survive a beating administered him, a few days earlier. Spears was brought to the Prestonsburg General Hospital.

A Magoffin countian, Wilson Buck Shepherd, was jailed here Friday as an alleged parole violator and is being held for return to LaGrange prison. It was said at the jail that Shepherd had served a part of a pen term for manslaughter and arrived home on parole last week. Soon thereafter, this report says, he attempted an attack upon his wife and his brother.

## Goss Plans Repair Of BL-Justell Span

State Senator Clifford B. Latta has been assured by Commissioner of Highways Eugene Goss that work will be initiated soon to restore the Betsy-Layne-Justell bridge spanning the Big Sandy to a safe, usable condition. Mr. Goss has referred the project to the Pikeville district highway office.

Guardrails and flooring of the bridge are in a sad state of disrepair and certain structural weaknesses exist, Senator Latta said. The bridge, a one-lane span paralleling the old railroad bridge at Betsy Layne, is the only highway link for Justell with US 23.

## It's Hot — and Dry — But County Not Hit As Hard As Some Areas

Floyd county may be more fortunate than other areas of the state as the July sun dries things up and as rainfall becomes spottier and less frequent.

Gene Ball, of the Extension Department, said this week that gardens and crops over the county are good. He added that the rainfall this year has been more than adequate in comparison with four years ago when the rainfall from March to March was only 18 inches. The average annual rainfall here is 42 inches.

The Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said 43 per cent of its reporters over the state termed the soil moisture short, while roughly half said it is adequate.

The shortage is most pronounced in the western part of the state, the service said. The Paducah area has had only one-third of

an inch of rain in the last 26 days. Campbellsville, in the central part of the state, by contrast, received 3.2 inches of rain last week.

The service said that corn, in the driest areas, has begun to tassel. Late planted corn is beginning to "fire"—turn brown before it has matured. Soybeans average only 16 inches high, six inches shorter than at this time a year ago.

Tobacco growth has been evening up, the service said, with one-fourth of the plants averaging more than three feet in height; one-half from two to three feet and one-fourth one to two feet, all shorter than at this time a year earlier.

Ironically, the service said Tuesday and Wednesday of last week were the coolest July days in more than 80 years.

**Oil Firm Official Is Kiwanis Speaker, Urges Tax Incentive**

The recent discovery of oil on the North Slope of Alaska has "great significance for every American, because North Slope oil may play a major role in helping to supply our energy needs for the remainder of this century," according to a spokesman for the Kentucky Petroleum Council.

Speaking at a meeting of the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club, Clifford N. Goff, assistant marketing manager, Ashland Petroleum Co., Inc., said that "without the tax incentive of the percentage depletion allowance and the import quota system, no oil company would have undertaken the financial risk of searching for oil on the North Slope."

Goff said the largest previous domestic oil was East Texas with five billion barrels. Estimates of North Slope oil reserves range from five to 10 billion barrels with some speculation that overall reserves might run to 50 billion barrels.

Goff said that the "total demand for oil during the remainder of this century will be 230 billion barrels—more than twice as much as has been used since the first well was drilled in 1818 in McCreary county, Kentucky."

**Governor Proposes River-Grant Colleges**

Establishment of a system of river-grant colleges, to help America develop areas in which rivers are located, was proposed by Governor Nunn.

Speaking in Fort Walton Beach, Fla., at a meeting of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Authority, of which he is chairman, Nunn said it is time for Congress "to consider a new proposal for enlightened, planned utilization of America's rivers and streams."

The need to gain more knowledge and seek better uses of America's inland waterways "naturally encourages us to turn to our colleges and universities for help," the governor said.

Nunn reminded his audience that Kentucky has more miles of natural navigable waterways than any other state.

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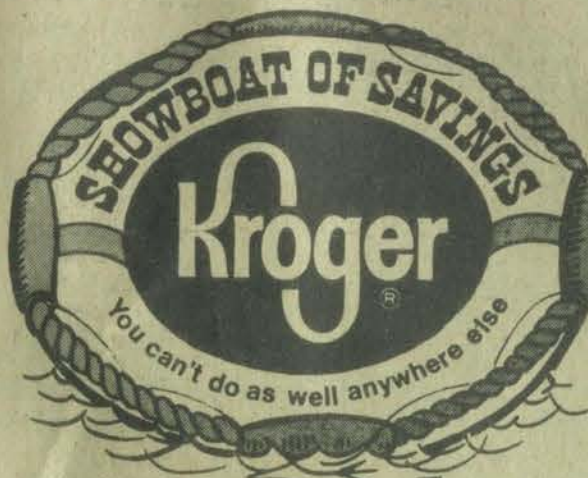

## The Danger Could Be Reduced

The detour from Allen to Pikeville, made necessary by construction of new US 23 between the two points, is not only twice as long as the original route but it also is twice as dangerous.

Too narrow for the great number of cars and trucks that now will be forced to travel it, the road up Left Beaver Creek, across Abner mountain and down Indian Creek to join US 23 again at Shalbiana is twisting, winding, an uphill-and-down course that has more than its share of sharp curves — all inviting disaster for the motorist.

But, on top of all that, is the failure of the State Highway Department to include in its plans for improvement of the route the filling of the berm, or gravelled shoulder of the road next to the surfaced portion, so as to make it more nearly level with the roadway itself. The road has been resurfaced and, at least for the present, is smooth. But that blacktop stands up in places half a foot or more above the berm — and it requires no great imagination for one to realize what will happen to the driver whose wheel drops from the surfacing down, straight down, onto that lower edge. Mountainsides drop on down from there; the driver will instinctively veer sharply away from that, and the result can be skidding, capsized cars and trucks, themselves wrecked and possibly causing following or approaching traffic to share the tragic experience.

It is too late for the Highway Department to widen and straighten the detour. But it isn't too late for it to fill in that margin of the roadway to approximate the level of the surfaced portion. If it doesn't, driving that detour will be a 60-mile tightrope act for many thousands of drivers during the months to come, some of which will add sleet, ice and snow to a road that is never safe under the most ideal weather conditions.

# Winston Coleman To Edit Kentucky Pictorial History

A pictorial history of Kentucky featuring approximately 1,000 illustrations (140 in full color) will be published in October of 1971 by the University Press of Kentucky.

J. Winston Coleman Jr., noted Kentucky historian and bibliophile, will be senior editor, with Lawrence S. Thompson, professor of classics in the University of Kentucky as associate editor. Seventy-five other Kentucky historians, authors, librarians, and journalists will assist in the preparations of the volume.

Based on an outline by historian Thomas D. Clark, the history of the Commonwealth will be traced pictorially from the prehistoric era to the present.

The illustrated history is expected to be one of the most significant and colorful works of its kind ever done, according to Dr. Coleman, who points to "the rich and varied history of Kentucky, the distinction of the contributors, and the fortunate existence of large photographic and other illustrative resources on Kentucky history." Mr. Coleman's own extensive photographic collection will be exploited for the book.

Aid from the Kentucky Department of Public Information in providing illustrations and color sections will permit the price of the pictorial history to be within the range of students, tourists and others interested in living or investing in Kentucky.

Helping organize the project and providing assistance are former Commissioner of Public Information James Host (now parks commissioner), his successor Kenneth Harper, and Robert Goldsborough, deputy commissioner.

### Magoffin Woman's Conviction Is Cited

"Violations of the Social Security Act will be vigorously prosecuted," Daryl E. Ratliff, district manager of the Social Security Administration, warned last week.

Mr. Ratliff said he had just learned that Mrs. Alice Pinks, a housewife, of Fredville, Magoffin county, was convicted recently in U.S. district court, Pikeville, of violations of the Social Security Act. Mrs. Pinks was convicted on the count of knowingly withholding knowledge of marriage of a dependent child to qualify for Social Security Benefits.

"A fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment of one year, or both, is provided in the Social Security Act as punishment for such conviction," Ratliff said. He added that the defendant was committed to the custody of the attorney general or his authorized representative for imprisonment for a period of one year. Execution of the sentence was suspended and Mrs. Pinks was placed on probation for a period of three years.

He stressed the importance of getting correct information from the nearest social security district office concerning these regulations which govern the proper and timely reporting of events which terminate entitlement to Social Security Benefits. The conviction of Mrs. Pinks for violation involving failure to report an event which would end Social Security payments should serve as a warning to all persons, Mr. Ratliff pointed out. When intending to cause Social Security payments to be made where none are authorized, a conviction of each such violation can mean as much as \$1,000 fine, or imprisonment of one year, or both, he advised. Any suspected irregularities of this nature are fully investigated by the Social Security Administration.

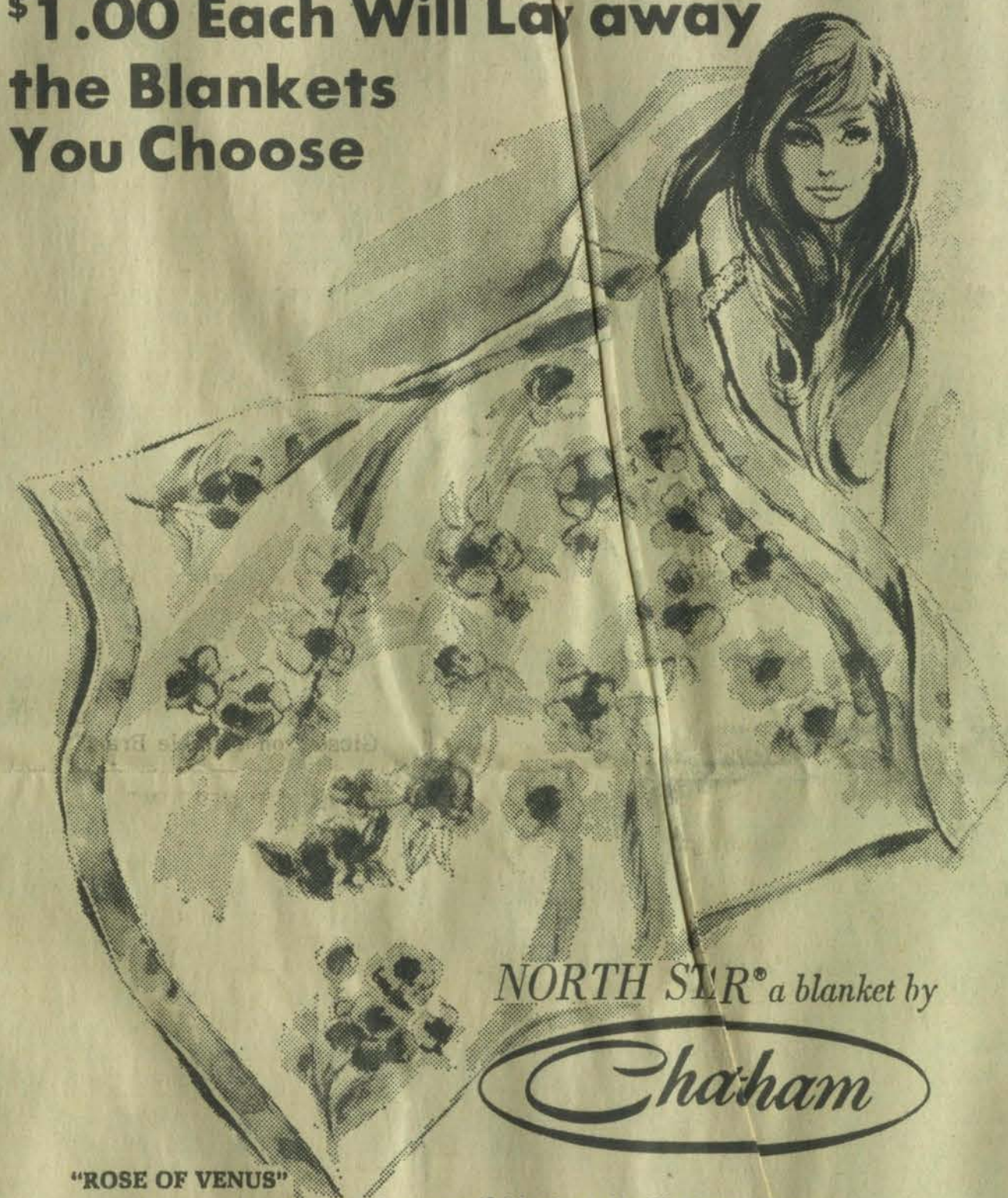

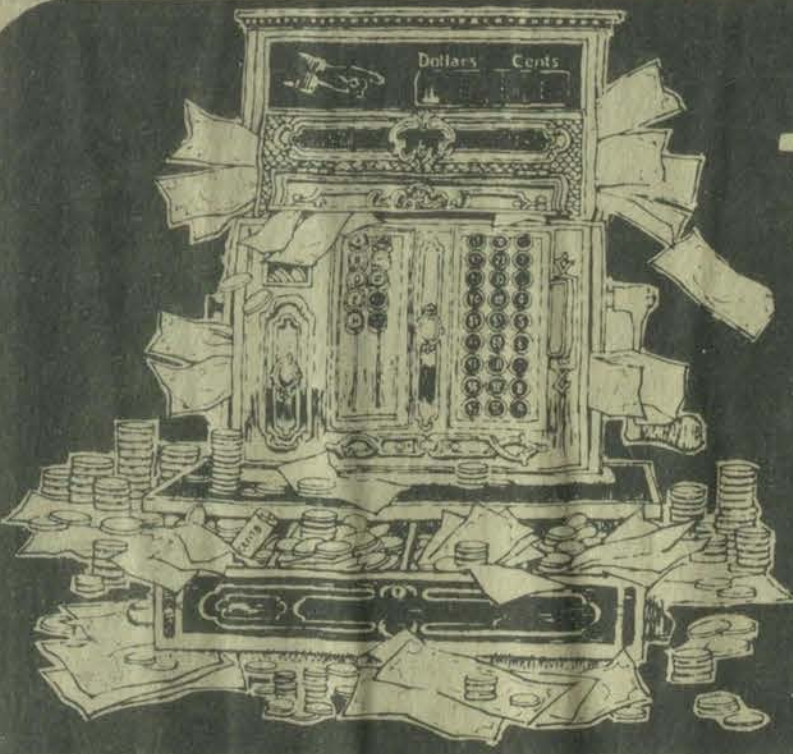

### Community College Students Are Rated Even with Others

A study by a doctoral student at the University of Kentucky on the performance of community college transfer students compared to students who took all their academic work on the central UK campus reveals no difference in the performance of the two groups.

Dr. Ronnie N. Sutton, a native of Brodhead in Rockcastle county and presently director of admissions at Western Kentucky University, concluded in his doctoral thesis that "there is no disadvantage, in terms of the factors considered in this study, for the student who chooses to attend a local community college for the first two years of a baccalaureate program."

He used a matched-pair design with the rationale that there might be a significant difference in the community college students as a group and the "native" students as a group, selecting 140 pairs of students and matching them on the basis of the following six characteristics:

The region of the state served by a community college, sex, high school grades, college entrance scores, college major, and the high school attended. Academic performance in college was measured in terms of grade-point averages.

The respective grade-point averages for the transfer students and the native

students were: 2.83 and 2.64, cumulative at graduation; 2.88 and 2.54, cumulative in the lower division; 2.78 and 2.73, cumulative in the upper division. A comparison within each year revealed transfer student averages of 2.76, 2.98, 2.61, and 2.88 and native student averages of 2.51, 2.58, 2.57, and 2.83 for the first, second, third and fourth years, respectively.

Dr. Sutton said a community college graduate who is able to persist to graduation at UK may expect to receive grades in his local college that will average 0.3 of a letter grade higher than grades he would receive in the lower division on the central campus.

The student may expect his grades to fall in the first semester after transfer to a point equal to what he would have earned if he had attended central campus classes in his lower division work. Also, Dr. Sutton revealed, he may expect his cumulative academic record to be higher — due to higher grades in the lower division — than it would have been if he had attended the central campus for all his course work.

"He may expect to complete his degree with an equal number of hours attempted and in the same amount of time that would be required if he had completed all requirements for graduation on the central campus," Dr. Sutton concluded.

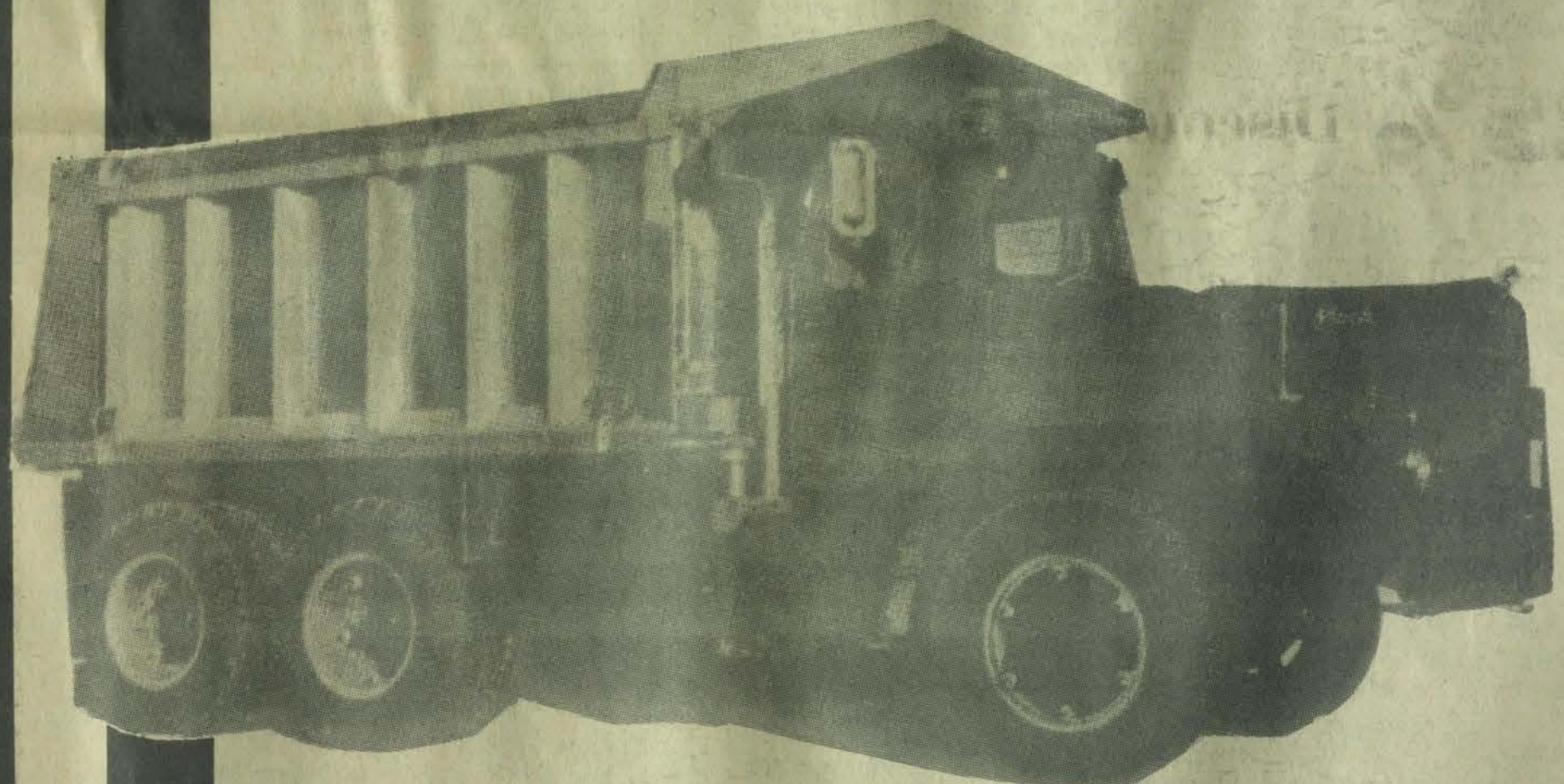

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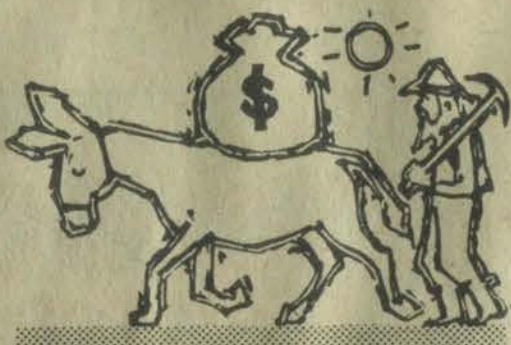

**Cites Ky. Statute Setting Fee at \$7**

asked Bruce Stephens, Jr., Kentucky River Coal Corp. executive, and others the reasons behind the boom. He wrote in the Louisville newspaper of his findings:  
Stephens and others credit the price spurt to a combination of factors, mainly the new Mining Health and Safety Act, which requires expensive new equipment in underground mines.  
A shortage of railroad hoppers and low estimates of coal needs by some utilities helped with the trend. And strikes in four mining states, including Kentucky, have taken their bite out of production.  
"The safety law hasn't done anything for safety, but it sure has hit the consumer in the eye," said Cloyd McDowell, secretary of the Harlan County Coal Operators Assn. "The consumer is paying for something foolish that Congress did last winter."  
"The prosperity you hear about isn't as big as it might seem," he said, "because you don't put \$1 million worth of equipment that you don't need in a mine without hurting in the pocketbook."  
McDowell said Harlan operators nevertheless are raising miners' pay \$2 to \$4 a day to hold their workers.  
Blue Diamond Coal Co. at Leatherwood, Perry county, recently raised miners' pay voluntarily by 90 cents an hour even though it had a contract in force with the Southern Labor Union.  
The demand for coal and the resulting industry-wide price rise have created some problems, too, especially for mountain operators. Reports were heard in most of the coal counties that recruiters from high-paying Western Kentucky operations have succeeded in hiring men in Eastern Kentucky.  
Of all problems, however, operators are growling loudest over a continuing shortage of rail hoppers to ship their coal.  
"If we could get the hoppers, you'd see some real prosperity," McDowell said. "We could ship 30 per cent more coal. The operators would make more, and I'd say the miners could make 40 per cent more than they're making now."  
Today there are fewer hopper cars than there were in 1960, according to the Association of American Railroads.  
The continued rise in exports is adding to the problem. A spokesman for the Louisville & Nashville Railroad said exports tie up hopper cars twice as long as do domestic shipments.  
And while coal is in short supply now, new technical developments are expected to push demand even higher.  
One development is pollution control systems that will make it possible to burn coal and still meet low sulphur emission restrictions.
