Contracts To Be Let On Big Water System

Bids Opened Here Within Range, Said

Bids on construction of the Beaver-Elkhorn Water District's huge water system to cover a sizeable portion of the county are apparently within engineers' estimates, and contracts are expected to be awarded, it was said here Tuesday afternoon after bids of more than a dozen contractors on various portions of the work had been opened.

The apparent low bidder on divisions of the project could not be announced immediately after the reading of bids, since deductible alternates remained to be calculated.

On the face of base bids Continental Fremont, Fremont, O., was low with its bid of \$115,023 for water tanks—one of 400,000 gallons, two of 200,000-gallon capacity, one of 100,000 gallons and a fifth of 60,000

Apparent low bidder on the water treatment plant, concrete tank foundations and various structures was the Frye Construction Co., Winchester, Ky., with a base bid of \$79,150

On construction of approximately 80 miles of water lines from the water treatment plant at Allen to Martin and from there up each of the Beaver Creeks the low base bid was offered by CFW Construction Co., Fayetteville, Tenn., which asked a total of \$1,641,197.

Combs Is Candidate, Cooper Not in Race

Floyd countians joined delegations from almost every Kentucky county to overflow the Flag Room of the Kentucky Hotel Louisville, last Saturday to cheer Former Governor Bert T. Combs on as he announced that he will again seek the governorship. The gathering which spilled out into adjoining rooms and space ranged, according to estimates, from 2,500 to 3,500.

The announcement pits Combs and his former ally, Lt. Gov. Wendell Ford, against each other in the 1971 Democratic primary. Ex-Governor A. B. Chandler is an independent candidate for the office, and this week Secretary of State Thelma Stovall was polling Louisville sentiment and considering entering the Democratic race herself for the office.

Flood Control For Beaver Cr. Gets New Funds

A joint announcement was made last Thursday by Senators John Sherman Cooper and Marlowe Cook and Congressman Carl D. Perkins that the House Committee on Appropriations has made available an additional \$150,000 for the Martin stream improvement project.

This amount is in addition to unexpended funds appropriated earlier. The last appropriation was made last November when \$150,000 was voted for the work.

Before the five-mile stream improvement project is completed, appropriations will total \$3.2 million, it is estimated by the U.S. Corps of Engineers. The work proposed will be the clearing, deepening and widening of Beaver Creek from a point near the confluence of Right and Left Beaver Creeks, a short distance above Martin, downstream to Clark Branch, west of Allen.

The stream project is designed to reduce flood damage which in Martin alone has totalled in a series of floods \$10 million, it is he definitely will not be a candidate for

At his Louisville press conference Former Governor Combs explained why he resigned the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals post he held to enter politics. He explained that as a U. S. judge he had for the last three years sat "in isolation and silence while the problems of this state have multiplied with traumatic force."

He ticked off a list of his concerns, including pollution, urban decay, teachers' salaries, student revolt and "war which no one will admit to starting, and which no one knows how to stop.

"All these problems coming together have created a crisis in this country and in our state unparalleled in our time," Combs said. He added, "A federal judge can do little or nothing about these problems. He cannot even express a public opinion about

Combs said he decided he "was not content to sit in comfortable isolation. . . removed from the trials of my state. In times like these all of us have an obligation to make our services available.

"So I shall run for governor of this state. I will run as hard and as fairly as I can, and I will give to the governorship four years of hard, dedicated service."

Combs, who was governor from 1959 to 1963, pledged to establish four new arms of state government if elected in 1971:

"... In order to stop the waste of our natural resources and to halt the pollution of our air and water, I shall appoint a commissioner for environmental control, with cabinet level status.

"I will appoint an advisory youth cabinet to give our young people practical experience in the operation of government, and I will expand the program for employing young people to work in state government.

"I will establish, with legislative approval, a department of urban affairs, directed by a commissioner with the knowledge and authority to help our cities meet their growing problems."

In addition to pledging a department of urban affairs, Combs said he would also 'ask the legislature to give cities the authority to solve their own problems without having to come to Frankfort for permission to handle their own business." ~~~~~~~~~

Private Firm Will Conduct New Program

The Floyd county school system is expected to be included in a program sponsored by the Office of Economic Opportunity which will have private educational technology companies conducting an experiment in teaching reading and mathematics on a performance incentive contract basis.

Six companies will participate in the experiment, which is an effort designed to assess the effectiveness of remedial teaching and implementation of performance. OEO will contract with the school system, which, in term, will subcontract with one of six selected companies. OEO will then monitor the performance of the company.

The program in this county, as elsewhere, will involve about 100 students in grades 1 through 9 who have achieved below-grade levels. The required pretesting and post-testing of pupils will be done by a separate contracting firm.

Decade Gain For P'burg **Only 156**

"Were You Counted?"

The U.S. Census Bureau is interested in knowing if you were, or weren't, before the 1970 census figures are accepted as final and a lot of cities, towns and counties which had on the face of early census returns suffered dismaying population losses or only small gains are even more interested.

The preliminary count, for instance, shows that Prestonsburg has gained in the last 10 years only 156 in population: 3133 in 1960, 3289 in 1970.

Mayor George P. Archer said Tuesday that City Hall has received a limited number of forms supplied by the Census Bureau for persons to use in reporting if they were not counted in the current census, and he urged all Prestonsburg residents who did not receive a census form or whose census form was not picked up by the census-taker after it was filled out to get one of these new forms immediately.

Besides the affront to community pride, the biggest effect an erroneously low population figure would have, it is pointed out, would be a possible loss of help in federal programs based on population. The city of Huntington, W. Va., faced with a 10,000 census loss if the preliminary totals stand unchanged, is taking its own census in an effort to repudiate the census figures accumulated this year.

While Prestonsburg showed, according to preliminary figures, a small gain the city of Pikeville has a population loss of 363-from 4,754 in 1960 to 4,391 this year. Figures for (See Story No. 2, Page 10)

Preliminary figures based on the new 1970 census show that Floyd county has within the last 10 years suffered a population loss of 6,891.

This early census review shows that the county's population dropped from 41,642 in 1960 to 34,751 this year.

> Biggest population loss reflected by the new census was Perry county's; where the population dropped 10,588-from 34,961 in 1960 to 24,373 this year. Pike county was close behind in the lost column with a drop of 9,388-68,264 in 1960 to 58,876. Letcher county's loss was 7,512.

On the encouraging side of the ledger, Newman's daughter, who was called as a Greenup county showed a population gain over the decade of 3,962, and Rowan county was up by 3,566. The report did not note if Morehead State University students were



The Leslie County Plan

Leslie County Judge Wooton and others with qualities of leadership apparently have decided that their county's future lies in being a place where people live in a deeper, truer sense rather than where people live only till the place is "worked out."

These leaders may be drawing toward a sound and sensible solution of problems that are not too great at the moment but which, if neglected, could become insurmountable. They are building up a defense not only against surface mining but also against other industrial practices that will, if uncontrolled, destroy the happy environment of wooded mountains, clean air and clear streams in that

The defense is countywide zoning—a thoughtfully planned means of developing the county and of preserving its beauty and liveability

now and for the future.

rugged area.

The right of a county to plan and zone for proper land use has survived a variety of legal tests. So it is that Leslie county has reasonable hope of not only controlling strip and auger mining but also of eliminating unsightly and damaging features of deep mining, of restricting objectionable types of construction, even of making road-building more than a hit-and-miss undertaking.

Prestonsburg and Martin are the only Floyd county communities that now have zoning commissions. The incorporated towns of Allen, Wayland and Wheelwright could have them. Perhaps these municipalities should get busy now in a move to stem the tide while a Floyd County Zoning Commission is being formed to do a thoughtful, long-range job of development planning and to do things which neither state nor federal governments appear willing to do.

Prestonsburg's zoning commission a few years ago stopped a building development near Dewey Lake because the project was considered inimical to the lake areas and the development plan that had been evolved. At that time its zoning commission had

jurisdiction for a distance of five air miles.

With such a range, zoning commissions for five towns in this county might, with the proper view of needs, and given a considerable amount of intestinal fortitude, be the answer to some of the county's most pressing problems. Local zoning commissions might be able to keep a finger in the dike till a more comprehensive county commission is formed to come to the rescue.

This is the result of the evaluation of the survey conducted April 13 by a field representative of the Joint Commissions.


The letter of approval read in part: "The Joint Commission wishes to commend you for maintaining standards deserving of accreditation and for your continuing effort to improve the quality patient care."

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





New Food Stamp Rules Benefit 6,686 Persons in Floyd County

Food stamps have more meaning than \$112,259.50 boost in just one month, through ever before for low-income families.

That's the opinion of Floyd county welfare administrator, Ronald J. Wright, who reports that participation in the program continues to show a significant increase following inauguration of important rule changes last February.

Mr. Wright noted that during February participation in the program in this county increased by more than 400 persons as compared with the previous month.

"This increase is due almost entirely to the fact that the new food stamp rules make the program of significantly greater value to low-income families who need help in improving their diets," Wright said.

Generally the rule changes involved reducing the purchase requirement and increasing the amount of free food coupons many eligible families receive.

Wright urged local volunteer groups, civic clubs and other organizations to offer their services to help families getting food stamp aid.

"Many food stamp families have no regular transportation, either to the food stamp issuance office or to the grocery store," Wright noted. "By volunteering to provide this transportation, as well as helping instruct families in wise buying practices and other activities, local organizations in Floyd county will be making a valuable contribution to the community," he said.

During May, 1970, officials of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service reports, a total of 6,686 persons in Floyd county paid \$51,740.50 of their own money for \$164,000 worth of food coupons



REPORT ON A "DODDER-IN"

The following "spoof" of the Protest Movement first appeared in the Hollenbeck (Long Island) News, then was adapted by The Methodist Home Herald which is published twice-a-month for the Methodist Home for the Aged in Topeka, Kansas: RIOT AT HOME FOR AGED?

Topeka, Kans.—Police were called today to help restore order at Methodist Home for the Aged, scene of a week-long revolt. Three militant octogenarians were arrested after a scuffle in the north parlor. They were identified as leaders of an activist group that seized control of the parlor three days ago and locked Mrs. Norma Sunderland, matron, in the closet.

George Whitlock, 84-year-old spokesman for the "Activists" told reporters the demonstration was staged to enforce demands that the old folks be given more role in management.

"We have a bunch of whipper snappers running things around here," he said, waving his cane indignantly. "We don't trust anybody under 65," he added, proudly displaying his "Senility Power" button pinned on his shawl.

Two officers suffered minor injuries during the disturbance. One was hit by a runaway wheelchair and the other was jabbed by a knitting needle.

The revolt began last week when a small group of hardnose superannuaters held a "Dodder-in" at which some burned their Social Security cards.

Although peaceable in early phases, the protest movement took a violent turn when someone hit Emery Dains, home administrator, with a bottle of Geritol. Mr. Dains blamed the trouble on a misunderstanding caused by difficulties in communicating with the militants.

"Some turn off their hearing aids when administrative personnel seek to explain policies, etc.," he explained.

available because of mixup of report forms

when sent from the Census Bureau. The town of Allen had the biggest increase in Floyd county, rising from 314 in 1960 to 714 this year for a gain of 344

Lackey had a population gain of 74-221 in 1960 to 295 in 1970. All other towns reported to date lost population. Biggest losers were the mining towns of

Wayland and Wheelwright. The former dropped from 1340 in 1960 to 365 for a minus of 975, and Wheelwright lost 797-from the 1960 figure of 1518 to 721. Martin lost 220 population-from 992 to 772, and Burton faded from 504 10 years ago to only 46.

Prestonsburg officials said they are unable to reconcile the Census Bureau figures with the true population total. They pointed to the fact that three large housing complexes have been built here since 1960, that all are full, that a large number of homes have been built and that one of the problems here has been to find housing for families wishing to move here.

Plugging of Oil, Gas Wells To Be Done in Cave Run Area

Division, Department of Mines and Minerals, is planning to assist in plugging some 60 oil and gas wells at Cave Run Reservoir, now under construction near Morehad.

The wells would be under water when the reservoir is filled and would pollute the reservoir with salt water and oil if left unplugged.

The division surpervised plugging of about 300 wells at Barren River Reservoir to prevent pollution there and is working with other state agencies to protect our environment.

While surface pollution is in the news today, underground pollution could be even more serious, according to Frank H. Walker, division director.

"Oil dumped into a river will wash away with the first heavy rains," Walker says. "But contaminate the underground water W L supply, and there is no way to remove the

The division fights underground pollution by careful inspection of operating wells and supervising the plugging of abandoned

When a well is abandoned and the casing removed, oil and salt water can rise along the shaft and pollute the fresh water near the surface according to Walker. By properly plugging the shaft with cement the danger can be removed.

The division's 10 inspectors check operating wells for adequate equipment

There are approximately 14,000 producing oil wells and 6000 producing gas

wells in Kentucky. Plugging of old wells not only prevents pollution but protects remaining oil underground for future use. According to Walker, today's methods recover only about 60 per cent of the oil. Some day, new techniques will enable man to recover millions of barrels of oil from wells now dead for all practical purposes.




Heart Seizure Fatal To Mrs. Anna Workman; **Funeral Held Wednesday**

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
Funeral Rites Held At Dwale for Child
