

# Jury Panel

A "first" in Floyd county judicial history was recorded Monday when names of 35 residents were drawn from a jury "drum" to provide a quarterly court jury panel.

The drawing of jurors' names from the "wheel" or "drum," as is customary in circuit court, was adopted as standard procedure in quarterly court after three liquor defendants had filed suit to require this selection method.

County Judge Henry Stumbo acceded to the request for drawing of jurors' names, but he and other officials said no funds have been provided for payment of jurors. He said recently that any defendant demanding jury trial in quarterly court will be required to post pay for the jury in advance of trial. The pay of a quarterly court jury is restricted to \$1.50 per case heard, and not to exceed \$3 a day.

#### Protest by Mayor, Others Wins P'burg Spot in Study Plan

Prestonsburg has been designated one of four Eastern Kentucky cities to be recommended as urban growth centers in a 20-year growth projection study after Mayor George P. Archer and other officials objected to an apparent oversight which had resulted in Prestonsburg being omitted from the list.

The official objection pointed out that Prestonsburg traffic and population is comparable to the three cities-Paintsville, Pikeville and South Williamson-that had already been nominated for the study.

The growth projection study, to be conducted by the Kentucky Department of Highways, will view current and future road planning needs.

# Court Here Coal Firm Here Hit Names First From Two Quarters

The Prestonsburg-based Terry Elkhorn Coal Company was under attack from two quarters in Johnson county last week. First, it and its president, Charles E.

Hovatter, were named by the Johnson circuit court grand jury in an indictment charging them with destroying property.

Then the court action was followed last Thursday by a demonstration by citizens of the Daniels Creek, Van Lear and Johns Creek sections in an attempt to stop heavily loaded coal trucks from traveling KY 3 and KY 1107. The demonstration was puctuated by sniper fire which flattened eight coal truck tires.

The indictment was made after the grand jury was told a slide had pushed down from a mined area on Brushy Fork, near the home of Dovie Collins.

Demonstrators claimed loaded coal trucks weighing between 26,000 and 36,000 pounds were traveling the two state routes which have a load limit of 12 tons and that the dust created by the trucks creates a serious problem.

Senator Wendell VanHoose who had been asked to transmit the petition to Frankfort in protest against the situation.

The firing on the coal trucks took place about two miles from the junction of the two state routes.

Rose claimed residents along the route followed by the trucks have difficulty breathing when the trucks pass their homes and that the vibration created by the vehicles has cracked house foundations. He added that a blacktop road that was new three years ago is now reduced to "red dog

One source said the retaliatory measures against the company and truckers may stem in part from labor union animosity based on the claim the coal is not being mined at union wage scale.

A Department of Highways spokesman said Mr. Hovatter had bought asphalt which road personnel began spreading on KY 3 last Thursday night. More asphalt was added to KY 1107, the following day.

Terry Elkhorn coal is hauled from a strip J. B. Rose, of Van Lear, said a petition or auger operation near the Floyd-Martin bearing 350 names had been given to State county line to a tipple at Van Lear.

# Liquor Cache Grows As New Hauls Made

The courthouse liquor cache, the vault of the sheriff's office, was stacked higher than ever this week after week-end raids added 46 cases of beer and 149 half-pints of whiskey to the store of contraband.

Sheriff Frank Leslie said a third-offense charge will be lodged against Ballard Yates, of Mud Creek, from whose premises 24 half-pints of whiskey were taken Claude Flanery, Hawley Hall, Paul Stilton and Otto Fannin. Forfeiture of his \$500 peace bond, result of a previous case, also

will be sought. The sheriff indicated motions to forfeit peace bonds of those arrested after the bonds have been executed will be standard procedure.

Biggest of the week-end raids was made on James McKinney, on Harold Hill Sunday, by Deputy Sheriffs Dester Hamilton and Bill Hall and State Trooper Don Thornsberry. The haul included 39 cases of beer and 80 half-pints of whiskey.

A second raid Saturday netted 45 halfpints of whiskey and seven cases of beer from the premises of Irvin Hamilton, of

Beaver. Billy See Johnson was arrested at Bypro with two cans of beer. Prestonsburg policemen, Bill Potter, Sam Hale and "Hack" Thornsberry, confiscated 15 cases of beer Saturday af-

ternoon from an automobile parked outside the VFW Club at Lancer. The driver fled before the officers arrived. The car, a 1968 Buick, bore Magoffin county plates and was registered in the name of Bertha Caldwell. The car and its contents are held by Prestonsburg police court.

#### Timber Mishap Kills Athlete

A 20-year-old Floyd countian, who was a member of the Pikeville College basketball team the last two years, was instantly killed in a logging accident on Daniels Creek, near Banner, last Thursday. He had completed his sophomore year at the college, only a few days earlier.

The victim, DuRan Newsome, was killed the second day of employment by the Cline Mitchell Lumber Company. It was said that a tree was felled, knocking a heavy limb from another tree onto young Newsome. He suffered head and internal injuries.

A son of William and Martha Hamilton Newsome, he was born at Grethel. Survivors, in addition to his parents, include his widow, Mrs. Claudette Stumbo Newsome, and daughter, Meldie Renee; five brothers, Andy and Billy Ray Newsome, both of Grethel, Tolva and Dock Newsome, both of Marion, O., William Newsome, Jr., of Harold; six sisters, Mrs. Fanny Hall, Peebles, O., Mrs. Merl Clark, of Harold, Mrs. Melvina Akers, Mrs. Pauline Parsons, Mrs. Emmogene Kidd, Mrs. Sola Akers, all of Grethel; two halfbrothers, Charles Newsome, Waverly, O., and Anthony Newsome, of Detroit; four half-sisters, Mrs. Mina Newman, of Waverly, Mrs. Martha Newsome, of East McDowell, Mrs. Goldie Tackett, of Craynor, and Mrs. Cora Moore, of Grethel.

#### Students Report On UK Blaze; Dorm Damaged

Five Floyd county girls were in their rooms in Blazer Hall, UK women's dorm, when the adjacent R. O. T. C. building at the University of Kentucky burned Tuesday night, last week, and all were losers.

All missed their chance of formal graduation from the university because of campus disorders. Three-Zella Faye Wallace, Janie Bickford and Teresa Honson-lost the "honors" recognition that would accrue to them as top UK students. And Miss Bickford was the biggest loser of all all her clothing, save a few items stowed in a dresser drawer, was burned. Her loss in clothing and school supplies was placed at \$1885.

The girls said the R. O. T. C. building next door, was up in flames after three distinct explosions. Terrified occupants of Blazer Hall fled as the heat, followed by flames, swept into rooms. Five rooms were burned out. Fifteen were boarded up because of damage.

Lexington firemen were quoted as saying many occupants of Blazer Hall would have suffocated, had the fire occurred while they were asleep.

The trial of Reecie Combs, who is accused of the shotgun slaying on Rock Fork, Knott county, of Claude Conley, has been transferred for trial to circuit court here, since Conley died at a Floyd county hospital. But the accused man cannot be indicted till the grand jury convenes in

September. Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo said the investigation of the baffling murder of James Chaffins on Arkansas Creek May 4, 1969 is continuing, and that he and State Detective Chester D. Potter hope to get the "break" during the summer that will enable them to take the case to the September grand jury.

#### Vietnam Victim Is Buried Here

Funeral rites, with graveside military honors, were conducted Tuesday morning from the Allen Baptist Church for Sp-4 Ancel James Terry, 19, who died April 29 of wounds sustained in Vietnam.

The soldier was wounded 17 days before his death, and he succumbed while aboard a hospital ship. He served with the 139th Artillery, had been in Vietnam since last September and in the armed forces about two and a half years. Prior to military service, he attended Prestonsburg high

# Doran in Speech At Lodge Says He's Optimistic

Dr. Adron Doran, president of Morehead State University, told a gathering of 175 MSU alumni and friends at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park, last Friday evening of the unrest on the Morehead campus and the long, gruelling hours of meeting the situation, and when he had completed his address his hearers gave him a standing ovation.

"I believe we've won the battle, I have confidence in the youth at Morehead," Dr. Doran said. "Come Monday, classes will be in session, art students will be painting, and within three weeks the term will end and we will not have to waive exams and mail diplomas to our graduates."

He said the week had been the "roughest" he had experienced at Morehead. Doran detailed recurring crises and how confrontations had been met. He explained that Morehead State is not bowing to the will of a small minority, yet is leaving the door open always to hear students, counsel with them and lead the way toward peaceful solutions of problems.

The unrest at MSU, "is not the work of 'outside long-hairs,' " Dr. Doran told the alumni. "The ringleader is a graduate of Breckinridge Training School. The boy who stood on the floor and read 21 demands is from Louisville, and his backup man is from Lexington."

He told of one student suggesting at a large gathering of students that they should burn down every building on the campus. Doran said this was followed by the (See Story No. 2, Page 10)

A Martin delegation, accompanied by Burl Spurlock, Prestonsburg banker, called on Congressional committees last week to increase to \$300,000 the \$150,000 budgeted for flood control work on Beaver Creek through the town of Martin to a point near

Mr. Spurlock, spokesman for the group, pointed out that freezing of funds for the long-planned Martin project has already increased the cost of the work from less than \$2 million to \$4,470,000. Mayor E. P. Grigsby, of Martin, placed the flood damage suffered there since 1957 at \$10 to \$12 million.

Congresman Carl D. Perkins early last week called on Congress to speed approval of funds needed to harness streams and reduce flood damage to his native Eastern Kentucky.



### The Situation Becomes Complicated

Some say that Governor Nunn sent militia onto the University of Kentucky campus last week as a political ploy, entering upon a Conservative field which he deemed ripe for the political harvest.

We do not presume to be able to read the governor's motives. Generally speaking, we do not defend his actions. But in this case we simply view the results and decide he did the right thing.

The situation at UK was much the same as had developed on other campuses where property was destroyed, even lives lost. A minority of the student-body, guided or prodded by activists who are expert in the business of promoting unrest and violence, was on the move. One building was burned, windows had been broken; the lives of students in a nearby structure were endangered. Appeals for a return to order and peaceful protest had failed. Dr. Singletary, the university president, had called on Lexington and Fayette county police for help. State troopers were summoned.

Then Governor Nunn ordered the troops into Lexington.

Whatever the motives that may be ascribed to his decision, it must be remembered that the tragedy of Kent University was fresh in his mind and that the wild disorders that had swept college campuses across the nation could not be dismissed with an airy "it-can'thappen-here."

So he acted—quickly, and not too late. And the results make poor reporting for the sensation-mongers. Not another fire, not another building damaged. Not one life lost.

Had Governor Nunn delayed, had he sent only a token force, unarmed, into this situation—ask yourself, What might have happened? And if the governor had vacillated and let matters run their course, as some apparently would prefer he had—what might have been the story, not only on the University of Kentucky campus but on other campuses across the state?

If we must assess the motivation in this case, we are willing to give the governor every benefit of doubt. When we look on the happy result of his action, and superimpose over that a mental picture of what might have taken place at UK, we give the man our unqualified praise for a job well done.



WHEN OTHERS' CARS ATTRACT

FRANKFORT, KY.-Motor vehicles belonging to others appear mostly irresistible to 15-and 16-year-olds in Kentucky, according to 1969 auto-theft figures compiled by Kentucky State Police.

Col. Charles B. Crutchfield, director of State Police said those two age groups come just before and just after one is eligible at 16 to obtain a driver's license. It may be the 15-year-old can't wait until he is 16 and gets a driver's license, and it may be the 16-year-old with a license can't wait until he gets a car, he said.

Crutchfield said stolen cars accounted for nearly half the \$4.2 million in property losses reported to State Police in Kentucky

More than half the teenagers arrested for auto thefts during the year-318-were 15 or 16. Equal numbers-109-came from each age group. Of the 509 auto-theft arrests during the year, 16 were girls. Three of these were 15, six were 16, three were 17, two were 18 and two were 19.

WINTER DAMAGE WORST

State Highway Commissioner Eugene Goss believes damage to state roads by last winter's severe weather was "the worst in recorded history."

This was the reason, he said, the highway department was forced to raise its budget for primary-road resurfacing this summer to \$4,176,000 from an estimated \$2.2 million. Another record, of a different kind, was also set when the highway department opened bids April 24 for a one-day total of about \$33.8 million in road projects.

The previous record high in openings on a single day, Goss said, was \$22 million on Feb. 16, 1968.

Some \$1 million worth of improvements at Buckhorn Lake State Park were announced at an area luncheon at the Eastern Kentucky resort by W. James Host, commissioner of Parks.

The improvements include a 12-room addition to the lodge, a swimming pool, new lodge furnishings, new boat slips, horseback riding facilities, a fishing pier and camping facilities.

The project is to be financed with a \$774,000 grant from the federal Economic Development Administration and from supplemented state funds.


RECOGNIZED BY GOVERNOR







Perkins called upon the subcommittee to disregard fiscal 1971 budget recommendations and approve additional funds to get work done on the flood protection project on Beaver Creek.

He also asked approval of \$900,000 to start construction on the Paintsville Reservoir on Paint Creek in Johnson county. The Corps of Engineers has completed advance engineering and design on the project, but the Bureau of the Budget did not include it in the budget for construction money. Perkins insisted that the project should go forward anyway to eliminate certain future flood damage and potential loss of life.

Perkins endorsed budget recommendations of \$200,000 for Kehoe Reservoir on Tygarts Creek; \$75,000 for Yatesville Reservoir on Big Blaine Creek; \$5,250,000 to continue construction on Carr Fork Reservoir; \$6,425,000 to continue work on Cave Run Reservoir, and all other Kentucky stream projects in the budget.



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

AGENCIES UNITE IN FIGHT

Six state agencies, at the request of Natural Resources Commissioner James Shropshire, are preparing a consensus report on Kentucky's environmental problems for use in a common attack on pollution.

Referring to a recent Eastern Kentucky tour by the agencies' representatives, Kenes Bowling, assistant to Shropshire, said "we wanted to find out what kind of problems exist and determine which agency is best designed to meet them."

Three divisions of Natural Resources represented were Forestry, Water and Strip-Mine Reclamation. Other agencies were Fish and Wildlife, Mines and Minerals, and the Air and Water Pollution Commissions of the Health Department. U. S. AID ASKED FOR NEW ROADS

Governor Nunn announced plans to seek some \$356 million from the Appalachian Regional Commission to build five new twolane highways which would speed northsouth travel on routes totaling 555 miles in Eastern and Central Kentucky.

The longest, from Pineville to near Maysville, would cost an estimated \$160 million. The others: from Burkesville to south of Hodgenville, \$47 million; Allen to Hazard, \$68 million; Grayson to Salyersville, \$50 million; from Hyden to Harlan,

# Newman Cites Improved Road Death Outlook

on the way toward realizing a reduction in its traffic death tolls.

by William O. Newman, commissioner of Public Safety, who said a recent State Police study shows that traffic fatalities in 1969—though up about six per cent over 1967, deaths per 100 million miles traveled were down about eight per cent in the same

Behind the decline is a 14 per cent increase in the number of miles driven on Kentucky's highways-from 16.6 billion in 1967 to an estimated 19 billion by the end of

Although optimistic about the results, Newman declined to predict a significant drop in the number of fatalities over the next two years.

"We're moving in the right direction, the study shows that," he said. "But, all of the old hazards are still there. And, whether or

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FRANKFORT, KY.-Kentucky may be not the current trend continues long enough to cause a reduction in death rates depends on how strongly the public demands That "cautious" conclusion was voiced stepped-up law enforcement, stiffer court penalties and broader programs of traffic safety education."

Last year's official death count was 1085 with an additional 15,099 persons injured,

Juvenile involvement in both fatal and non-fatal accidents should be a particular cause for concern, Newman said. Nearly 19 per cent of the drivers found behind the wheel in accidents last year were under 20.

"And, amazingly enough, 141 of those drivers weren't even old enough to have licenses," he said.

The most alarming statistic to come out of the State Police study, he said, was the report that nearly 28 per cent of the deaths and 34 per cent of the injuries were suffered by drivers or passengers under 20.

Other highlights of the study singled out by Newman were:

Nearly 52 per cent of all fatal accidents occurred during daylight hours with 3 to 4 p.m. the most dangerous time of day.

About 71 per cent occurred on state or federal highways. The rest on county and rural roads.

Nearly 73 per cent of all fatal and nonfatal accidents involved drivers living near the accident scene.

Heading the list of circumstances cited as contributing factors in order of frequency were: inattentiveness, speeding and driving under the influence of intoxicants. Fewer than 14 per cent of the drivers in fatal accidents were female. Nearly 72 per cent of the victims were male.

# Sports Afield

The white bass can sock a lure with more impact, ounce for ounce, than any fish in fresh water. Others put up a better fight, yes, but none outsock the white.

Although the concentrated range is recognized as the Mississippi River and its drainage system, the white bass is growing in number and popularity throughout the

"Sounder" lures like these provided hot days of white-bass fishing. They look like minnows and their distinguishing feature is the fact that they have no lip on the head to motivate them. Delicate body balance causes them to vibrate violently when retrieved rapidly. White bass usually want a lure that moves at a very fast clip.

You can see them splashing, throwing up water spray, for great distances as they tear through a school of threadfin shad.

For this situation, here are a few tips to remember. Don't approach the feeding school upwind, for two reasons. One, if you drift into them they'll dive out of sight. And two, the sound of your approach will be more audible and spook them.

Come into them from the downwind side, and stay a long cast away. It's tougher to cast into the wind, but it's worth it. Use "wind lures"—those with concentrated weight, metal spoons or spinners, which you can drive.

When there's no wind to contend with, you've got to be even more cautious in not getting too close to the feeding school. And, they sometimes take some solving to determine just what kind of lure they will

Maybe they'll want small surface lures. And, when you first get into them they want that lure worked fast and furious, almost as rapid as you can retrieve it. They'll slash into it like a pack of piscartorial wolves.

Then, they suddenly ignore it. Now is when you start thinking like a white bass fisherman. Throw out the same lure, but let is soak. Don't move it for a minute or so. Then, just barely twitch it. Many times a burly bass is waiting just below it, watching for a sign of life. When that bass strikes, you'll be surprised at the sheer power unless you're a veteran of this action.

That bass will catapult itself into the air with the lure in his mouth, and if you don't get the hook pronto, all you have is the memory of a lovely leap.

If they pay no attention to surface lures, then perhaps they're feeding down. How far down is the question. Try a spoon or spinner, and let it sink for a count of five before starting your retrieve. Keep making a longer count until you find fish.

When you catch one, remember the count and let your next cast sink to the same level. It can be that simple.

But when you can't locate them at any level, try these two "search and find" tactics that work for Homer Circle, SPORTS AFIELD Magazine's Angling Editor. One is to go "bottom scrounging." Homer selects a fast-sinking metal, or weighted plastic, lure and makes as long a cast as he can pound out.

Let the lure sink until a slack line tells you it's on the bottom. Reel the slack out of your line and lower your rod tip until it touches the water. Then, jerk the lure off the bottom and keep it buzzing all the way

The other tactic is to look for white bass back in the boondocks, the timbered areas, or in quiet bays where no fishermen have disturbed the waters.

DRINKING DRIVERS DISMISSED

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

# **Tidbits** Kentucky **Folklore**

When I was yonger, I spoke English, a language that just about everybody understood, even when I sometimes violated the most ordinary so-called rules of the language. My vocabulary was understandable. And the people who spoke to me also used my language, so that we could carry on a conversation of some length without using some word that had to be explained before we could go along with our

Now my language is still English, but it has had so many words added to it that it hardly is recognizable by the side of the one I used to know and use freely. The sentence structure is still the same, the pronouns remain, and a good many of the verbs are understood by even the youngest children. But my nouns are in a frightful turmoil. In order not to appear ignorant or even idiotic, I have to stop often to translate my older words into the ones that the younger generation can understand. And that usually takes so much time and thinking that it sometimes seems hardly worth the effort.

Go with me to a farm and watch my ignorance. The farms I once knew were small and had only a minimum amount of machinery, so few such articles that I could name on my two hands all the likely ones, and I still might have several fingers to spare. One-horse plow, two-horse plow, newground plow, corn drill, hayrake, grubbing hoe, wagon, pitchfork, chopping ax-that would almost exhaust the machinery or tools that we had when I could first remember. I must have been fifteen before I ever saw wheat cut by a binder; a good many of my older neighbors swore it just would not work, but it did, and our eyes fairly bugged out. Our own small farm certainly did not have even a corn drill until I was ten years old or so; I can still recall how I watched the contraption do its work and felt that surely the greatest sort of achievement had come. Finally, in my latest years on the farm, we owned a cultivator and could straddle a corn row and throw dirt toward the stalks or away from them. But I cannot recall having ever operated the machine; my memories cling to the one-horse plow, with its furrows to the middle when we were barring off the

Wheat-threshing was a great annual event or season, for we went from farm to farm to help when the threashing time came. The only power I saw until after I left home at eighteen consisted of four teams of horses or mules hitched to a contraption that connected with the thresher proper and furnished a job for a very much envied driver; the only other fellow who was in his class was the fellow who fed the grain into the thresher.

My knowledge of farm things would have to be translated to any young fellows whom I now know on farms around here. A few oldsters would think back and know what I was talking about. And I am not skilled enough in words and gestures to make myself understood by the very young ones, who have never followed a plow, have never double-shoveled out the middles when corn is being laid by, have never helped haul in hundreds of bundles of wheat to the thresher, have not even seen corn being planted by hand. And none of them ever saw a log barn raised or a new gound cleared, at least in the old-fashioned way; they have never attended a log-rolling and learned a new stock of jokes. Why, they are as ignorant in most ways as I am! If present methods of raising corn continue, and I see no reason why they should not, just imagine the words that will be lost, words relating to planting, cultivating, and harvesting corn! Young fellows do not know now about taking the down row, they have never seen a corn-shucking (husking bee, to the literary-minded), and have forgotten or are forgetting such old terms as barring off, laying by, splitting the

In one way I am better off than they, for I have had to learn the new as well as the old vocabularies, not only about farming but about dozens of other things. In general, I do not have to look up in a dictionary or set of notes the most ordinary things mentioned in poetry of a hundred or two hundred years ago. Those poets spoke my language.
