

## Four Penned, Others Fined During Term Slaying Defendant In Mental Hospital; 3 Indictments Added

Four defendants in circuit court here have drawn pen and jail sentences since the beginning of the term, and three others have been fined.

Franklin VanHoose, Johnson countian who was one of four who escaped jail here recently after slugging a jailer's assistant, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of escaping custody and was given a six-month jail term on each of two counts. Albert Chaffins, of Wayland, who was charged with aiding in the escape, also pleaded guilty and was penned for one year.

Ronald Gearhart, another of the escapees, who was not indicted for the break, was convicted on an auto theft charge and sentenced to a one-year pen term. He also pleaded guilty. The same charge against Pink Akers was dismissed.

Howard Chaffins, who was given a one-year pen term after he had entered a plea of guilty to the charge of obtaining money under false pretense, has filed motion for new trial.

One of the murder defendants indicted at the current court session, Reciee B. Combs, has been committed to a state mental hospital for observation by agreement of both the defense and the Commonwealth. He is charged with the slaying on Rock Fork Creek, near Garrett, of Claude Conley. The shooting occurred in Knott county but Conley died in a Floyd hospital and the Floyd court was given jurisdiction for the trial.

Three indictments omitted from the list reported at the conclusion of the grand jury session were added last week on Commonwealth's Attorney complaint, since minutes of the jury showed it had voted the indictments. Those named were Paul Tackett, third offense liquor possession; his wife, Zella Mae Tackett, selling alcoholic beverages; and Bill Hagans, possession.

Those fined included:

Arvie M. Burchett, drunk driving, \$100; Curtis Elkins, reckless use of a deadly weapon, \$50; Rafe Lafferty and Dock Blanton, assault and battery, \$25 each; Carl David Johnson, carrying a concealed deadly weapon, \$50.

The jury in the trial of William Riley Wells on a third-offense liquor possession charge failed to agree. The charge of knowingly receiving stolen property against Sammie Hall was dismissed after all testimony had been heard.

## Hall Is Accused Of Firing Shots Into Two Homes

Randy Hall, about 25, of the Mud Creek section, was jailed here Monday morning by Sgt. Ellis Ross and Trooper Gary Rose, of the Kentucky State Police, on two charges of shooting into an occupied dwelling house.

The charges grew out of the recent shooting into the homes of Magistrate Denzil Ray Hall and Deputy Sheriff Dester Hamilton, of Mud Creek.

Hall also was charged with resisting arrest.

The only liquor raid reported within the week was made Sgt. Ross and Trooper Rose, who arrested Sam Roberts, of Harold, and booked him on a charge of illegal possession of alcoholic beverages. The haul was 194 cans of beer.

October, according to the poet, is marked by "bright, blue weather." Pure poesy, sheer fantasy, you'll say after I get this fishing trip under way.

### THE ECHO IS STILL THERE

I was wondering, the other day, if there's an echo around, any more. Personally, I wouldn't know. Time was when I heard one, almost every day.

Back then, with atmospheric conditions just right and with a hillside convenient to bounce your voice against, you could get the most fascinating—for a boy—conversations going back and forth. (I recall here that another idea I had has come to naught. I always wanted to find me a boy who stuttered and get him to start the vocal ball bouncing. But, as has been the case with many other high ambitions of mine, I never carried out this high-born idea.)

Back to my wondering if the echo is yet extant. I'm sure it is. I think I know the very spot where one could be roused, but it is up a hollow, and there's a hill to be climbed to reach this place where you could always get one going, loud and clear. But I don't take to hills with any great degree of alacrity or enthusiasm, any more.

The echo is still there—just waiting for somebody to speak first. Anybody who thinks it isn't is in the same fix as the fellow who says God is dead.

### THEN AND NOW

When I visited last Sunday afternoon with a boyhood friend whom I hadn't seen in more than 30 years, I recalled the time when he was taken to task with some briskness by our teacher for an infraction which wasn't apparent to me at the time.

I take it that you will decide this all happened some years ago when I tell you that he and I were being permitted to play outside in the schoolyard while older pupils remained in what amounted to durance vile. We had one of the most potent weapons in boydom of that day, which was nothing more than a sharpened stick. You stuck the tip of this stick into the "eye" of a buckeye, whipped the stick forward, and—whooosh!—said buckeye would take off screaming like a good No. 2 wood shot.

Out ahead of us was an open field. Not a soul out there to hit, not an animal, or house—nothing, not even polluted air. So my friend "loaded up" and went into action. But he made the mistake of putting too much whip into his backswing, and the result was, the buckeye went flying to the rear—smash, into the side of the schoolhouse, greatly alarming those budding savants inside.

## Martin's P.-T.A. Calls For Spl. Jury Probe

In one of two resolutions adopted at its meeting last Thursday the Parent-Teacher Association of the Martin school district called on Circuit Judge Hollie Conley "to forthwith" empanel a special grand jury to investigate conditions heretofore reported by the state Department of Health and the state fire marshal after inspection of the Martin school and others in the county.

Judge Conley said Monday afternoon that he had not received the letter—possibly because he had been out of Prestonsburg over the week-end and had not received his mail that day—but that he doubted the wisdom of empaneling a special grand jury. He pointed out that a grand jury report would not bring immediate improvement of conditions, which are not restricted to the Martin school, and that the opportunity existed only two or three weeks ago for the matter to be investigated when the regular grand jury was in session.

## Dr. Singletary Says Colleges Adapted for 'Era of Change'

Dedicating two new buildings on the Prestonsburg Community College campus last Thursday afternoon, Dr. Otis A. Singletary, president of the University of Kentucky, told a gathering which crowded the auditorium of one of the new structures, the Pike Technology Building, that "the character of this college and others of its kind is marked by the spirit of innovation, flexibility and experiment."

This characterization of the community colleges of the state followed Dr. Singletary's discussion of the "great era of change" which began with the second half of the century. To this change, he said, "Kentucky responded with the Act of 1962, creating the Community College System. He listed the new functions of these colleges as including guidance and counseling, initiation of programs for the educationally handicapped, the vocations and others, as well as the standard college curriculum.

Dr. Singletary pointed to the changing picture in the lives of workers. For instance, he said, in the 1930's more than 40 per cent were unskilled. In those earlier days, he added, a man thought what he was

then doing was his life's work. Now, he may change jobs five or six times, and these changes often take the individual back to school.

Dr. Henry A. Campbell, director of the college, acted as master of ceremonies, which included the University Chorists directed by James Ratcliff; greetings from Bobby Curtis Akers, PCC Student Congress president, Mrs. Rose Price, president of the PCC Alumni Association, James Funkhouser, chairman of the Faculty Assembly, and R. V. May, chairman of the PCC Advisory Board; recognition of officials and guests by Dr. Campbell; presentation of plaques from Johnson, Magoffin, Martin and Pike counties, the four counties for which campus structures have been named; introduction of Dr. Singletary by Dr. Stanley Wall, UK vice-president for Community Colleges; invocation and benediction by Gus Kalos, chairman of the Fine Arts Division of Prestonsburg Community College.

Open house was held at the two new structures, the Pike Technology and the Martin Student Center buildings, the Johnson Administration building and the Magoffin complex. A hospitality hour at May Lodge followed the dedication.

## Confiscation Deadline Set October 15th

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley announced last Friday that the power of the court will step into the breach as the liquor traffic in this county has apparently "got out of hand."

He said that he will ask Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo to file suit to confiscate and sell each piece of property housing illegal intoxicants upon conviction of the owner or occupant.

This action, he added, will be taken on all such convictions after October 15, 1970.

"I think this should be fair warning given well enough in advance," he said. If, after that date, somebody finds himself facing loss of his property through court action, he need not come crying to me."

Judge Conley said he had discussed with Commonwealth's Attorney Stumbo the request he proposed to make of him and that Stumbo had promised his full cooperation.

The decision to act followed the receipt by Judge Conley of several letters, some anonymous, naming names of violators and complaining of the situation. Some of the letters have been placed in the hands of Sheriff Leslie, Judge Conley said.

## Auxier Seen As New P'burg Water Buyer

Prestonsburg's municipal water system may have acquired one of its best customers last week, it was indicated Monday after the water system serving the town of Auxier had begun using water supplied by the system here.

Forrest Music, owner of the Auxier Water Co., has not signed a formal contract to buy water from the Prestonsburg system, but a temporary connection with the system here was made last Wednesday after a reported water shortage in Auxier. Dick Davis, superintendent of the Prestonsburg system, said he understood that the hookup is to be permanent.

The Auxier system is now using 65-75,000 gallons of water a day. The system will serve the new regional hospital now under construction near Auxier, and the hospital plans a reservoir of 150,000 to 200,000-gallon capacity. The water it uses will be supplied by the Auxier company.

Mr. Davis said a two-inch meter has been installed for the Auxier water supply. This,

## Meigs' Decision Seen Wednesday In School Case

Judge Henry Meigs, of the Franklin circuit court, was expected to hand down a decision Wednesday in a legal action instituted by three Martin men which may have a telling effect on the finality of the \$650,000 bond sale made here recently to finance construction of the proposed consolidated high school at Eastern.

Also awaited from the Court of Appeals is a ruling on a motion for a writ of prohibition filed by Martin defendants who are threatened by a contempt of court action from Special Judge James D. Stephenson, Pikeville, if they do not withdraw their suit which is in Franklin circuit court. Judge Stephenson in one of two decisions handed down last week directed that Everett Akers, L. B. Kiser and Frank Salisbury dismiss their suit or face contempt action. The motion before the appellate court is intended to prevent such action by the special judge.

In the Franklin court suit the three Martin men ask the State Department of Education, the State Board of Education and State Supt. Wendell Butler to withhold Minimum Foundation funds from the proposed school. They also ask that they comply with regulations requiring an enrollment of at least 500 for a new school and withdraw their approval of the Eastern project.

Unless litigation can be eliminated from the school picture within a period of about 10 days, the bond sale will be nulled.

## \$4 Million Suit Brings Reports Of Bribe Offer

The twice-advertised three sectors of new US 23 between Mare Creek and the Floyd-Pike line apparently are headed for a third advertising for bids, it was indicated last week as controversy about the handling of the original bidding raged in early stages of a \$4 million damage suit growing out of the rejection of the first bids.

The bid offered by Greer Brothers and Young, London, Ky., on the second advertising of the work was \$316,480 less than the price asked for the work by the original low bidder, Barter Construction Company, an Illinois firm, and Mattingly Bridge Co., Louisville, and the state Highway Department's awards committee recommended it be accepted. The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, balked, however, on the grounds that the second bidding did not represent an acceptable level of competition. It recommended a third advertising of the Floyd projects. No bid on the approximately four miles of road has ever dropped below \$9 million.

Charges of free-wheeling manipulations on the part of Kentucky contractors to satisfy Barter Construction Company, the original low bidder, and to persuade it—allegedly by a \$300,000 offer of cash—not to contest rejection of its bid were heard last week in depositions of James C. Watson, executive assistant to Governor Nunn.

## Group Demands Health Program Effect Changes

Representatives of three Mud Creek groups presented to Glenn Hentschell, acting director of the Floyd County Comprehensive Health Program, last Wednesday afternoon a list of grievances and in some instances demanded that changes in the personnel composition of the program in Mud Creek be changed.

Represented were the East Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization, the 979 Community Action Council and the local Comprehensive Health committee. Among the demands made were these:

1. That Helen Wells be removed immediately. The demand was accompanied by a threat that the Mud Creek outpost would be picketed until she is transferred.
2. That Eula Hall be recognized instead of Troy Branham as representative from the 979 area to the program's advisory board.
3. That Lovell Hall and Oliver Hall be removed immediately from the advisory council on the grounds that a conflict of interest exists because Lovell Hall is bookkeeper for the Community Action Program and Oliver Hall is supervisor of the Mainstream project.

The complaint was heard that some aides aren't trained and that people from the low-income group on Mud Creek should be hired. Mr. Hentschell replied that if those eligible for the program can fill the jobs, only they will be employed. He excerpted doctors, dentists, nurses and technicians.

One complainant about aides said, "They treat people like animals." Another said, "We want to be treated with respect. The program is designed for poor people, and it should serve them."

Mr. Hentschell explained that if aides are not trained, they will be and that the program will be generally improved. One such improvement is envisioned in a plan to

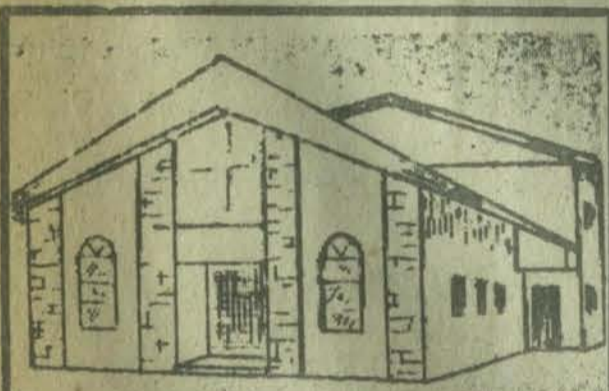

## NOTICE AS TO THE FILING OF A PETITION FOR THE CREATION OF A WATER DISTRICT TO BE KNOWN AS DAVID WATER DISTRICT AND NOTICE OF HEARING AS TO SAME

Notice is hereby given by the Floyd County Court, of the filing of a Petition in such Court for the formation of a Water District pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 74 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, asking that said proposed Water District be known as the David Water District.

Said Petition states that there is a small privately owned waterworks system in the District, consisting of a water reservoir, water treatment plant, water storage facility and water distribution facilities, serving between 70 and 80 customers, which existing waterworks system is owned and operated by David Properties, Inc. Said Petition states (a) that with the exception of the customers served by said existing system, the only water available for use by the residents of said District is that which may be pumped from wells or cisterns or carried from springs, which water supply is inadequate for the use of the residents of said District; (b) that the existing system is dilapidated and in bad need of repairs, and the cost of repairing said existing system would be more than the cost of the project which the citizens of the District desire to undertake; (c) that it is contemplated that the proposed District will purchase the existing system, will run lines from said system to Prestonsburg, will purchase water from Prestonsburg and will supply water to additional customers located on the lines to be laid between the District and Prestonsburg, thus reducing the cost per capita; (d) that the District will contemplate purchasing water from Prestonsburg and will not have need of the treatment facilities of said existing waterworks system in the District; (e) that the District proposes to serve customers located between the point where the District begins (approximately 2-1/2 miles west of Prestonsburg) and the point where the existing system is located, which distance is approximately 5 miles in length; (f) that the District will need to purchase the existing system in order to acquire the existing distribution facilities of that system; (g) that the convenience, comfort, health and safety of the public, because of lack of adequate fire protection, are in grave danger, and subject to extreme hazards; (h) that it is desperately urgent and necessary to create the new Water District in order to correct such undesirable conditions; (i) that no cities, districts or other municipal corporations, or any parts thereof, are located within the boundaries of the territory of said proposed District; and (j) that prior to the filing of said Petition, said Petitioners obtained an Order of the Public Service Commission of Kentucky, dated September 22, 1970, granting said Petitioners the right to Petition the County Court for the establishment of a Water District, pursuant to KRS 74.015, a copy of which Order was filed as an exhibit with said Petition.

Said Petition is signed by not less than 25 resident freeholders of the proposed District, states that no incorporated City or part of an incorporated City is located within the boundaries of said District, is accompanied by preliminary approval of the Public Service Commission of Kentucky, and describes the territory intended to be included in the District, as follows:

DESCRIPTION OF AREA COVERED BY DAVID WATER DISTRICT.

Lying on the waters of Left Fork of Middle Creek, Middle Creek being a tributary to the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River, situated in the County of Floyd, State of Kentucky, being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of (forks) Left Fork of Middle Creek and Middle Creek; thence in a southeasterly direction across the bottom and up the defined center of the point to the top of a knob between Spurlock Creek and Left Fork of Middle Creek; thence in a southerly direction up the defined meanders of the ridge to the gap between Caney Creek of Left Fork of Middle Creek and Stephens Branch of the Right Fork of Beaver Creek; thence in a southwesterly direction along the defined meanders of the ridge between Caney Creek of Left Fork of Middle Creek and Wilson and Brush Creeks of Right Fork of Beaver Creek to the Gap between Left Fork of Middle Creek and Brush Creek, through which Ky. 850 passes; thence with the said defined ridge a northwesterly direction to the Magoffin County line; thence in a northerly direction along the Magoffin County line to a point on top of the ridge between Mill Branch of Middle Creek and Rough and Tough Creek and Buckeye Branch of the Left Fork of Middle Creek; thence in a northeasterly direction down the defined ridge (away from the Magoffin County line) between said tributaries and between Middle Creek and the Left Fork of Middle Creek to the place of beginning. This was the first deposition taken in Barter's \$4 million suit against Jack Ruth, president of the Kentucky Association of Highway Contractors, Victor E. Comley, the association's executive director, the Department of Highways and its former commissioner, Eugene Goss. In much of his depositions Watson related what Gobel Mattingly allegedly told him.  
Watson testified Mattingly told him that an offer of \$300,000 was made to him by a group of contractors through Harold Kelley, chairman of the Public Service Commission, if he would not object to rejection of the Barter-Mattingly bid.  
One of the highway contractors named in connection with the alleged \$300,000 payoff attempt, Stuart Adams, of Pikeville, Friday denied any knowledge of such a deal.  
"I have no knowledge of it whatsoever," Adams said Friday.  
Adams said he was "never in any meeting with Mr. Kelley or anyone else" at which the Floyd county contracts or any offer were discussed.  
Adams, a paving subcontractor, said he quoted paving prices to all the prime contractors who bid June 26, except Barter, whom, Adams said, he "could not find" before the bidding. After bids were opened, Adams said he approached Barter about the paving work, but Barter "gave me the impression he was not interested in my prices."  
Barter and Mattingly had planned to set up their own asphalt plant for the three projects rather than buying from a local contractor, Mattingly has said.

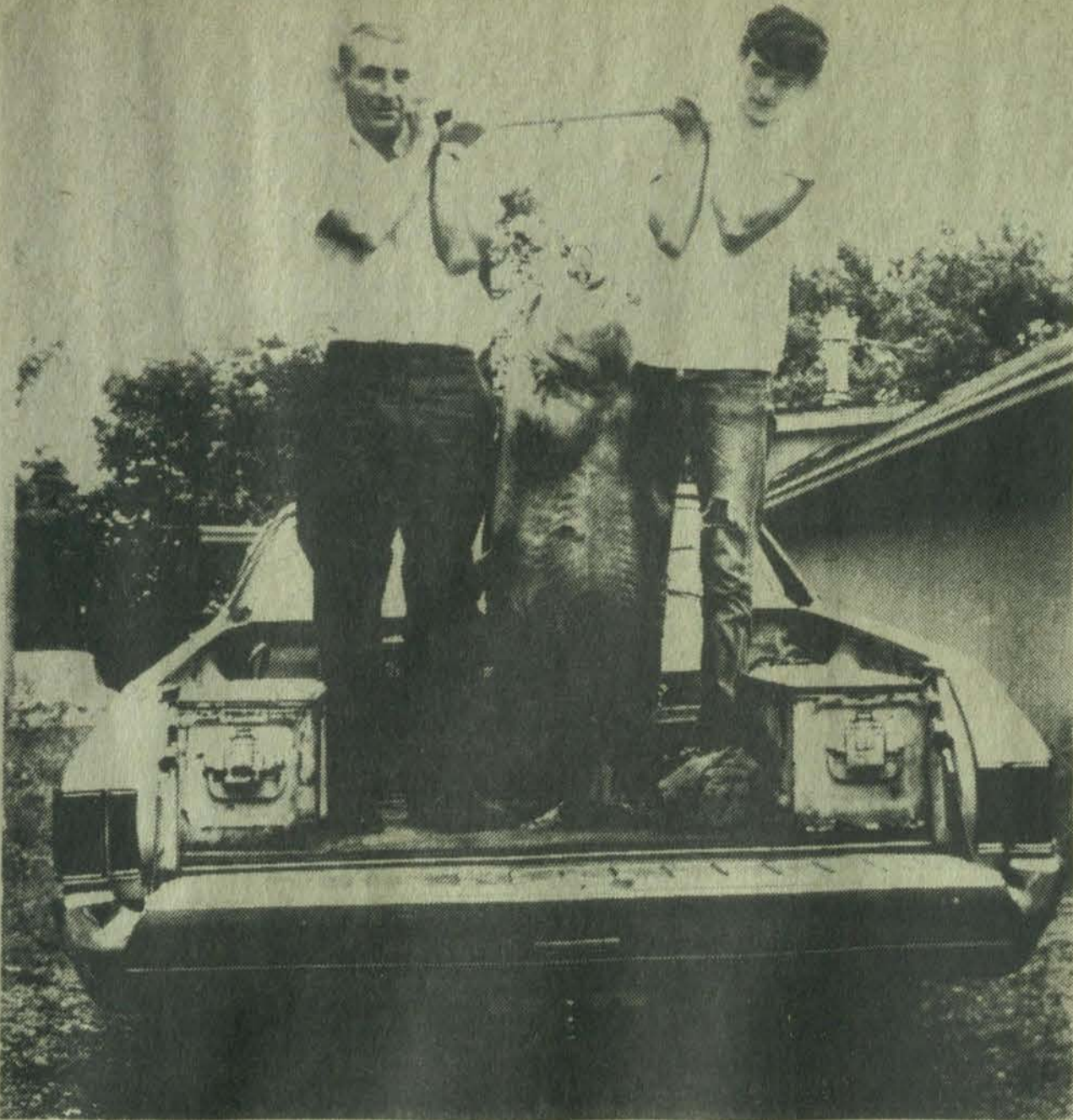

Agriculture Dept. Outlines New School Lunch Regulations

Final revisions and amendments to federal regulations governing the operation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's national school lunch program have been announced by the regional office of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, Atlanta, Georgia. "These regulations implement Public Law 91-248 which broadened and improved the National School Lunch and Child Nutrition Acts," said Russell H. James, southeastern regional director for the Food and Nutrition Service. "We believe the final regulations represent a substantial improvement over the proposed regulations because of the suggestion and comments received," Assistant Secretary Lyng said.

Under the new final regulations, local school lunch authorities continue to have their previous obligations to serve free and reduced price lunches to children they determine to be unable to pay the full price of the lunch. Such officials now will have to include the criteria they will use in making such determinations in standards of eligibility which must be approved by the state educational agency and be publicly announced in the community, according to James.

The FNS official said these standards of eligibility must take into account three mandatory criteria—family income, family size and the number of children in the family attending school or pre-school daycare centers.

Additionally, on and after Jan. 1, 1971, any school children from a family whose annual income is at or less than the "income poverty guidelines" prescribed by the Secretary of Agriculture must be served a free or reduced price lunch, he said.

The income poverty guidelines for the 1970-'71 school year were announced by the Food and Nutrition Service on Aug. 4. For example, a family of four members, the income poverty guideline is \$3,720 a year in income.

The new regulations spell out how local school officials shall publicly announce their standards of eligibility for a free or for a reduced price lunch.

Information must be sent to parents, by letter or notice, as the school year begins and the same information must be made available to informational media in the community. The letter or notice to parents must be accompanied by a form which families can use to make application for free or reduced price lunches for their children.

The final regulations provide that a school must offer free or reduced price lunches to children from families whose application indicates that the family meet the announced standards of eligibility.

When school officials wish to challenge the continued eligibility of a child, they must do so under a hearing procedure which gives a family advance notice of the information that indicates its children may no longer meet the school's eligibility standards. However, the child will continue to get free lunches while the challenge is under consideration, James explained.

For the first time, as required by Public Law 91-248, the regulations establish certain performance standards for schools which receive only USDA donated foods for their nonprofit lunch programs, the Food and Nutrition Service says.

Called "commodity only schools" in the regulations, these schools must now accept the same obligations with respect to the service of free or reduced price lunches to needy children as schools that receive federal cash assistance from the Food and

## Home Gardening—Another Way To Alleviate the Food Crisis

By BILL SACKETT  
FRANKFORT, KY.—The Emergency Food and Medical program, financed by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO), subsidizes food stamps—but isn't the only way the money can be spent.

For example, in the Licking Valley Community Action Agency, headquartered in Flemingsburg, the distributors of E. F. and M. vouchers aren't always waiting for a crisis before acting. Some of the money was used to buy \$1700 worth of potential food in a manner that will reduce the possibility of a hunger crisis ever arising.

The Licking Valley CAA, which is conducting part of OEO's war on poverty, purchased wholesale 15 different types of seeds and young plants. Naturally they were bought in bulk quantity; for example, more than 30,000 tomato plants and 26,000 cabbage plants were distributed.

"We figure that more than 450 families were helped by this effort," said Martin Wisecup, Licking Valley Director.

Wisecup estimates that of the families eligible to receive the materials, less than one per cent actually didn't benefit. The Licking Valley CAA serves eight counties in northeastern Kentucky, Bracken,

Robertson, Fleming, Mason, Nicholas, Montgomery, Menifee and Bath.

The cost was estimated to be less than \$4.00 per family.

The project has been successful. "The people already know how to garden," explained Wisecup. "The older people particularly seemed to take a great deal of pride in their gardens. Some of them brought in samples of their produce for us to see."

Next year, the project will relate to a cannery that is being built in Frenchburg, the Menifee county seat.

In 1971 Wisecup will encourage cooperative gardening efforts. The extension of the vegetable project, coupled with the cannery, will mean that more people will be fed adequately than ever before in that area.

## New NYC Grant To Benefit 210 Floyd Students

A Neighborhood Youth Corps grant of \$84,760, approved last week, will afford employment this school year for 210 Floyd county students who are 14 years of age or older.

Seven other school districts shared in the overall \$480,020 grant which will afford work for more than 1200 youngsters of the area while they are attending school.

The beneficiaries of the program will be of low-income families. They will be paid \$1.45 an hour for up to 10 hours' work a week and will serve as teacher assistants and secretarial aides and in other capacities.

The grant provided this help to other counties of the area:

- Pike, 265 students, \$101,570; Johnson, 90, \$35,550; Martin, 155, \$63,200; Knott, 150, \$59,490; Letcher, 160, \$65,180; Breathitt, 132, \$46,510; Paintsville city schools, 60, \$23,710.

The break at Allen was into the Phillips 66 station.

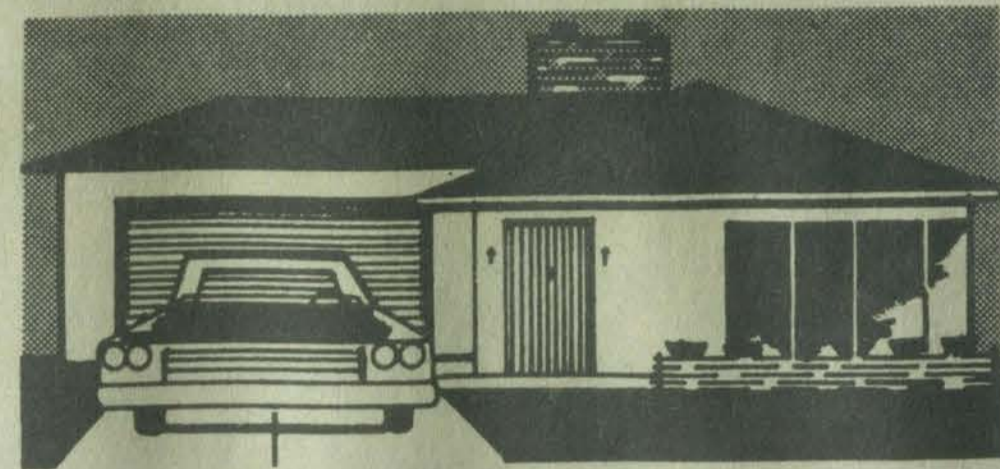

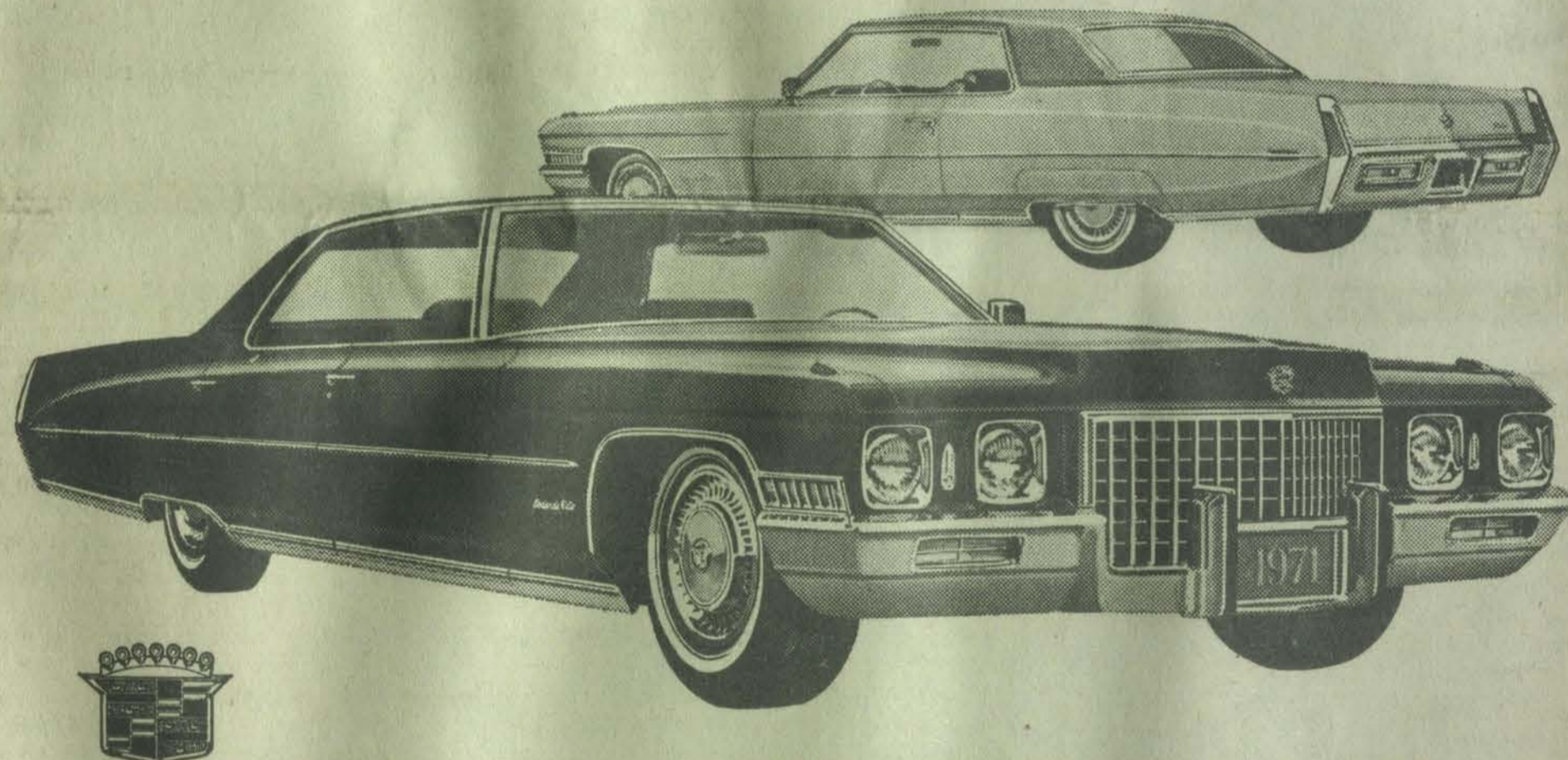

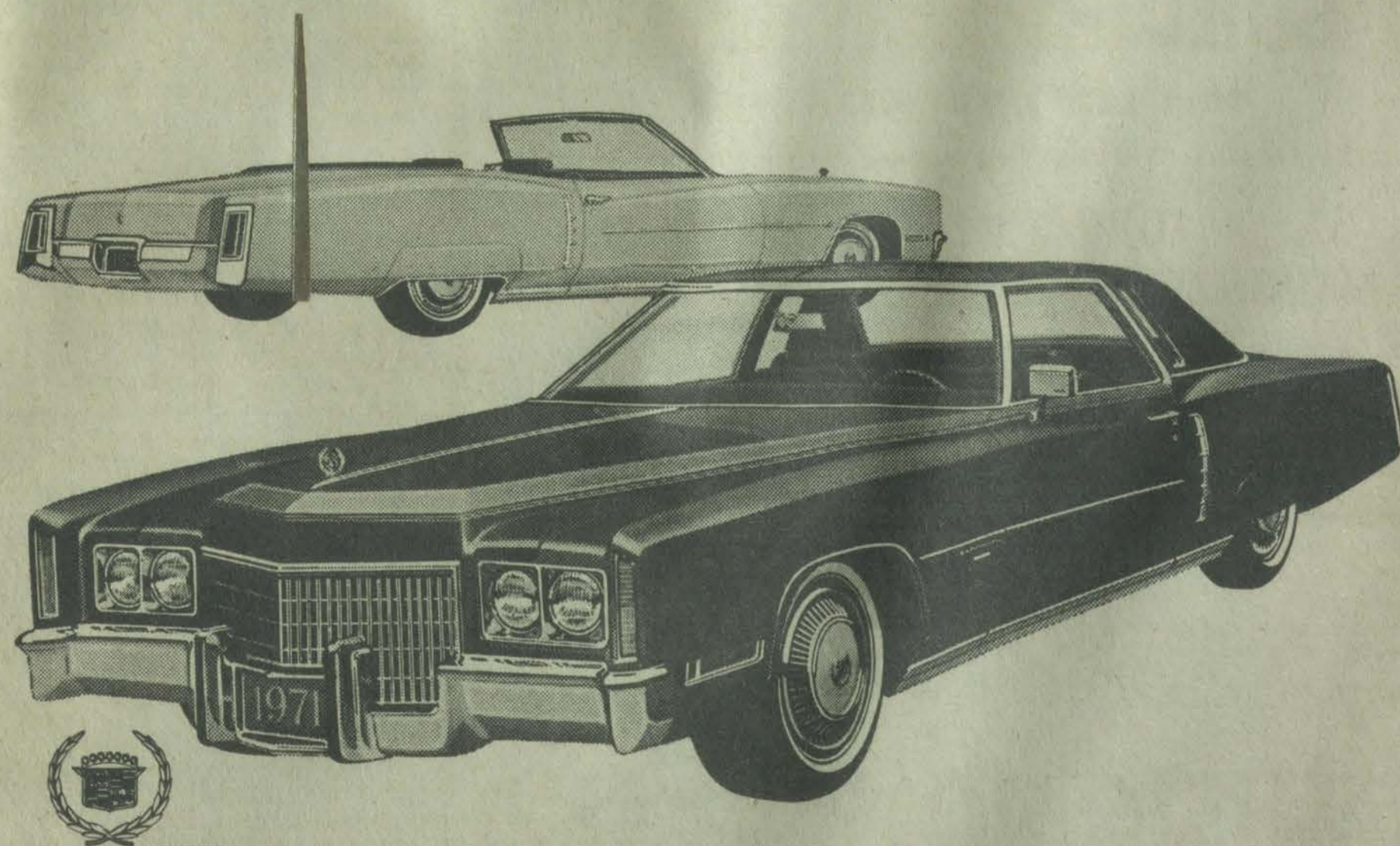
