

Shots Hit Auto, Home Of Official Deputy Hamilton's Home Target, Also; Probe Under Way

State and county officers this week were seeking the identity of the person or persons who last Friday blasted the auto of Magistrate Denizil Ray Hall, of Grethel, with a shotgun charge, and fired shotgun and revolver shots into the Hall residence and the home of Deputy Sheriff Dester Hamilton, near Teaberry.

Sheriff Frank Leslie and State Police Detective Chester D. Potter declined to discuss their findings. They also were noncommittal about the motive for the separate shooting incidents.

Windows of the magistrate's compact-type auto were shattered by shotgun fire, around 1 a. m., Friday morning, and at least two shots were fired into his home.

Less than half an hour later, the home of Deputy Sheriff Hamilton, about three miles farther up Mud Creek, was the target. At least three shots were fired there. One bullet passed through the front door, and shotgun pellets peppered the roof.

Deputy Sheriff Hamilton chased an auto which left the vicinity of his home, immediately after the shooting, it was said. Nobody was injured.

Insurance Rates For City Addition Sharply Reduced

Property-owners in the Goble-Roberts Addition to Prestonsburg will benefit from a sharp cut in fire insurance premium costs as a result of the new bridge connecting it with other sections of Prestonsburg and other improvements.

Joe D. Smith, manager of the Kentucky Inspection Bureau, has notified Mayor George P. Archer that the bureau was as of Aug. 31 changing the classification of that area from Class 10 to Class 7.

The rate reduction applies, it was said, only to that part of the Goble-Roberts Addition which is within the corporate limits of Prestonsburg.

Mayor Archer commented that the change will mean a saving of more than \$5000 a year to the Prestonsburg Ministerial Association alone in insurance premiums. The association has its rent-supplement housing complex in Goble-Roberts Addition.

The inspection bureau manager pointed out that reclassification was one upon receiving from Prestonsburg Fire Chief Perry a letter advising that access to the Goble-Roberts Addition is now possible via a new bridge, that bids are to be accepted this month on a new 1000-gallon-per-minute pumper and that construction has been begun in the Lancer section on a second fire station.

There also is hope of another insurance break. Smith wrote that Perry had indicated significant progress is being made toward completion of the Kentucky Inspection Bureau's recommendations to the city in its hope of winning a sixth-class fire protection grading. "If you will advise us when all these recommendations have been completed, we will arrange for a reinspection of fire protection facilities," Smith wrote Mayor Archer.

Two more water lines are needed, and Prestonsburg will be ready for an inspection leading to a sixth-class rating, Dr. Archer said.

Second Break of the Week . . . Schools Close Thursday, Friday For Teachers To Visit in Homes

Floyd county school pupils will get their second break of the week today (Thursday) and Friday when teacher visitation days will be held as an in-service experiment by the county school system.

This is the first year for the visitation concept to be given a trial in the schools of the county, although it has been very successfully employed in other school systems, County Supt. Charles Clark said. A committee composed of teachers decides each year how the two in-service days of the school year shall be used, and it chose this year to send the teachers into the homes of their pupils.

It is hoped, the superintendent said, that during these two days every home represented by a child in school will be visited by the child's teacher. He added that in some instances more than one child from a single home is enrolled and that some might receive visits from more than one teacher but that he hopes this can be avoided.

Purpose of teacher visitation is to acquaint the teachers with the parents of the children who attend their classes and with their pupils' home life and en-

Six Hurt, 3 Critically, in Wreck Of Camper at Lancer, Labor Day

Three Pike county children are in a Lexington hospital, one in critical condition, and two other members of their family are hospitalized here after the camper in which they were passengers left US 23 on a curve at Lancer, Labor Day morning, and crashed into a tree.

The accident occurred, state police said, when the driver, Olen Justice, 48, of Pikeville, apparently fell asleep. The truck struck the tree at a relatively high rate of speed, and there were no tire marks on the pavement to indicate that the driver saw his danger, State Trooper Phillip Tucker said.

Suffering a skull fracture as well as other fractures, five-year-old Raymond Cavins, stepson of Mr. Justice, is believed to be in

critical condition. He and his sister, Teresa Cavins, 7, and his half-brother, David Justice, 15, were all taken to Lexington for treatment. Teresa and David were said to have suffered multiple fractures.

The driver escaped with only slight hurts. His wife, Mrs. Linda Justice, 28, is in Prestonsburg General Hospital, suffering a back injury and a broken leg and foot. Eleven-year-old Karen Justice also is in the hospital here. Her condition is not regarded as serious.

Mr. and Mrs. Justice and children were en route home from a camping-hunting trip in Central Kentucky when the accident occurred. The camper was nigh-demolished. But for the tree, it would have rammed into a home at the lower side of the highway, it was said.

High Court Refuses Part in School Suit

The petition filed last Tuesday by the Floyd County Board of Education and others asking the Court of Appeals to intercede in a pending court action which might jeopardize the bond issue sold for financing of a new high school at Eastern got action three days later—and it lost.

The high court's refusal to take jurisdiction apparently leaves the bond issue in danger of being voided, since a "no-litigation" assurance is required by bond attorneys and an appeal from the judgment in the case at issue might keep the bond issue under the cloud of litigation beyond the 40 days permitted by law for the sale of bonds to be cleared.

The Floyd Board of Education was joined in the petition to the Court of Appeals by the State Department of Education, County Supt. Charles Clark and State Supt. Wendell P. Butler. It named as defendants the three Martin men whose suit in Franklin circuit court threatens the bond issue—Former State Representative Everett Akers, J. R. Key and Frank Salisbury.

Ray Corns, an attorney for the state Department of Education, asked for the intercession, and contended further delay in the action might jeopardize delivery of school bonds already sold for construction of the school.

Corns argued that legal precedent permitted the appeals court to assume original jurisdiction in certain instances, but the judges' ruling failed to support this view.

Corns said the suit filed in Franklin circuit court Aug. 17, had not been heard because Circuit Judge Henry Meigs has been on vacation. He also charged the action, filed by former state Rep. Everett

Akers and others, was the latest in a series of legal steps to block construction of the new school.

Previous actions by Akers and others, added Corns, have not been upheld by the courts or the state Board of Education.

The latest suit filed by Akers and others asked that state approval be withdrawn for construction of any high school in Floyd county that does not comply with the state's own "rules and regulations"—namely, that such a new school must have an enrollment of 500 pupils.

The suit also asked that the state be enjoined from allocating any state Minimum Foundation capital outlay funds for the high school, which would be designed to serve students from the Martin Consolidated School District.

The suit alleged that the Floyd County Board of Education could not bring 500 students to the proposed high school at Eastern without being in contempt of a 1939 Floyd circuit court judgment which requires the local board to maintain a school at Martin.

Draft Ceiling Number Is 160 For September

Floyd county's Selective Service local boards, Nos. 25 and 166, announced last week they have received their calls for the month of September, 1970 and have been advised that the September ceiling number is 160. Neither Local Board will order any registrant with a number greater than 160 for this month.

Local Board 25 reported that the highest random selection number reached thus far in ordering men for induction has been 155. Local Board 166 has reached number 148.

The executive secretaries of the two boards request that all young men seeking information concerning the lottery method of selection, and their liability, should contact their local boards. The boards are open from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

"Based on the projected calls released August 6 by the national director for the remainder of the calendar year 1970 (39,000 men for the period September through December), we do not anticipate any difficulty in meeting Kentucky's pro-rated share," Col. Taylor L. Davidson, state Selective Service director said. "Neither do we anticipate any difficulty providing the necessary manpower within the national sequence number of 195. In fact, with the present trend, Kentucky will be able to meet its quota with a figure less than the announced sequence number," Colonel Davidson said.

A ceiling on random sequence numbers for any given month means an individual local board cannot exceed the random ceiling number for that month. It does not necessarily mean all registrants available

Quotes Reports That Floyd Co. Is 'Wide Open'

A discussion of the whiskey situation in this county featured Circuit Judge Hollie Conley's instructions to the grand jury at the opening of the September criminal court term Monday morning.

Judge Conley commented that "evidently whiskey in our county is back where it at one time was—pretty wide-open."

He called on the jury to make a thorough investigation.

"I am not trying to throw blame on anybody—perhaps some of it belongs to me, some to others," he said. I hear talk of a 'sell-out' . . . I want you to investigate. Bring these people before you and let them tell what they know. . . And if you feel that somebody is trying to do a whitewash job, don't be backward. Report it and ask for help. Even outside help can be made available."

Judge Conley added that Floyd county at the last local option election voted dry by an overwhelming margin and that it is the duty of officials to make it as nearly so as possible.

He also told the jury that it has four murder cases to investigate and added that this is the largest number of such cases before a grand jury since he took office as circuit judge. One of the four, however, pertains to a Knott county shooting, after which the victim died in a Floyd hospital.

The judge said he had dozens of calls from persons summoned to appear before the grand jury, asking to be excused. "I might tell the Commonwealth's Attorney and the County Attorney now that I have excused none of them," he said.

A number of those summoned for jury service failed to appear. "You who are here are wondering, no doubt, why you should be present and these permitted to be absent. Unless they have a legitimate excuse, they will be dealt with."

The crowd for the court opening was small.

Greer & Young Low in Bidding On Road Sectors

Although Greer and Young, London, Ky. contractors are the apparent low bidders on three sectors of new US 23 between Stanville and the Floyd-Pike line, and the bids offered by the firm are \$317,576 less than those submitted when bids were first received on the three segments, a contract has not been awarded.

The new bids total \$9,494,637 for the 4.8 miles of the new four-lane highway.

The original low bids on the three sectors of road were submitted by J. D. Barter Construction Co., Harrisburg, Ill., but were later rejected because they were \$877,110 above the Department of Highways' estimates. The bids of Greer and Young are still \$576,311 over those estimates.

After the original bids were rejected, the Illinois contractor and its subcontractor, Mattingly Bridge Co., Louisville, filed suit (See Story No. 4, Page 16)

Whitten Wins Plea For a Fourth Cab

Alex McIntyre, Jr., commissioner of the Department of Motor Transportation, has issued an order authorizing Denzil Whitten, of Prestonsburg, to operate an additional taxicab here, bringing to four the total number of cabs he may operate.

Mr. Whitten filed his application last Jan. 26, the application was protested by other cab-owners and on July 15 an examiner for the Department of Motor Transportation concluded that the applicant had failed to establish a prima facie case showing the inadequacy of cab service then existing. Mr. Whitten's exceptions to this ruling were filed last July 22, no reply to them was filed within the time permitted by law, and Commissioner McIntyre overruled the examiner's report, Aug. 27, and ordered the issuance of the certificate.

Trio Arrested Last Saturday In Liquor Raids

Pre-holiday raids on three places in the county by county and state officers netted three prisoners, 233 cans of beer, six half-pints and five pints of whiskey, vodka and gin.

All three raids were staged Saturday. In the first Sheriff Frank Leslie, an ABC agent and Deputy Sheriffs Bert N. Porter and Claude Flanery arrested James Witten, of Van Lear, as operator of the Jenny Wiley Drive-In (formerly the Dew Drop Inn), below Dewey Dam, where 202 cans of beer and six half-pints of whiskey, gin and vodka were confiscated. They also impounded an automobile, ownership of which Witten disclaimed.

At the Arkansas curve on KY 80, below Martin, Sheriff Leslie, Deputy Sheriff Porter, the ABC agent and Allen Policeman Bentley arrested Orville Crum and confiscated 31 cans of beer found in his residence.

Meanwhile, Deputy Sheriffs Flanery, Grady Skeans and Virgil Conn were raiding the premises of Bill Slone on Stephens Branch, confiscating five pints of whiskey, vodka and gin. Slone also was arrested on a possession charge.

All three men were booked to Magistrate Bill Wells' court.

George Akers was jailed here Saturday by State Trooper Leeman Bevins on a charge of transporting alcoholic beverages. He was arrested after his car had struck a mobile home near Grethel, and 354 cans of beer were found in his vehicle.

Mineowner Killed At Labor Day Job

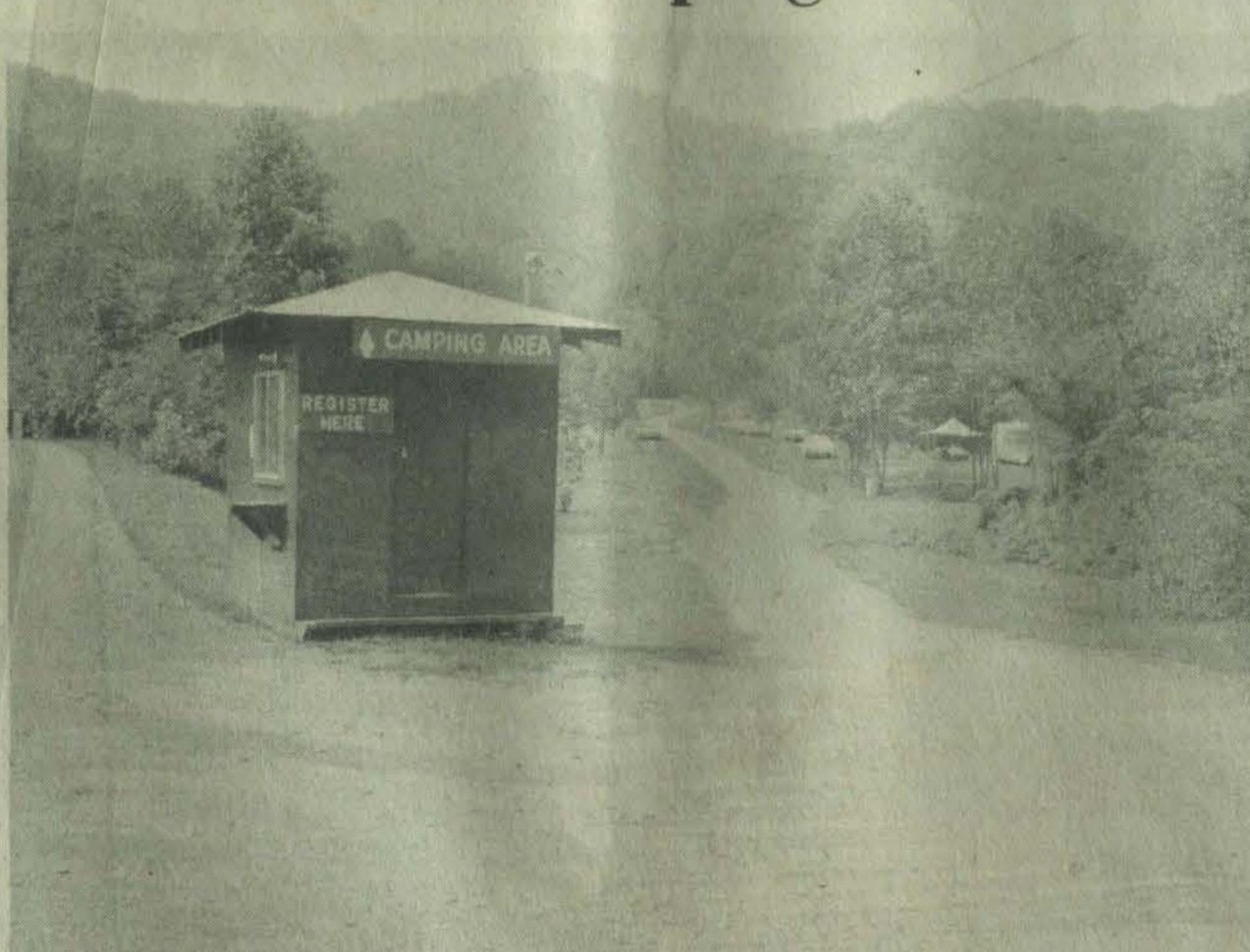

Goble Branch Camping Gets a Start

The Goble Branch area of Dewey Lake, which has been considered for the last five or six years as a central recreation-camping center, was opened three weeks ago as a designated camping area, although its facilities at this time are for "primitive" camping.

The area was cleared, water was run to campsites, the terrain levelled, picnic tables built and pit-type toilets installed in a joint effort of the Kentucky Department of Parks and the U. S. Corps of Engineers. A registration building at the entrance to the area was completed a week ago.

This beginning looks toward a fullfledged camping and recreation center by next

season, it was said this week.

The Department of Parks is scheduled to have soon in the hands of the U. S. Corps of Engineers' district office, Huntington, W. Va., its master recreation plan for Goble Branch. Unofficially, it was said this plan will call for construction of 250 campsites with showers, restrooms and possibly a launderette. The state has acquired all land in the area, including the nearby property that was formerly the Girl Scouts' Camp Chatterawha. The main building on the Girl Scout property may be used as a maintenance and supply center. A water treatment and sewage disposal system may also be located there.

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Another Study on the Way

Governor Nunn's announcement that the Appalachian Regional Commission will soon make a grant of \$550,000 to finance a three-year Eastern Kentucky strip-mine research project leaves us real cold. We could not be less enthusiastic.

Spend \$550,000 and study this area and its mining over a period of three years — why? This part of Kentucky already has been studied and surveyed to death. The federal government, for instance, began its annual study of the Big Sandy River after the great flood of the 1860's. It has been at it, ever since, the Congress appropriating money, the Corps of Engineers driving stakes and making meticulous entries in its records. And the river has become dirtier, more polluted and more clogged with sedimentation, debris and garbage, every year since.

We think the state of Kentucky is not justified in spending \$75,000 of state funds in order to get this three-year delaying tactic under way. We think these people, federal and state, already know what is wrong about this strip-mine business and what to do about it.

If the patient is sick and his doctor knows he will die unless something is done, the doctor goes with the medicine at hand; he does not wait three years for a research lab to come up with a new cure.

When he announced this ARC grant as being on its way, Governor Nunn said, "Our current regulations have gone as far as they can under present law . . . We should not permit further growth that brings undesirable conditions."

We remind the governor that existing strip-mine regulations prohibit mining on hillsides steeper than 28 degrees. And we ask — How honestly is this regulation being enforced?

A little of this much-studied Big Sandy River sand in a few official crawls will do more to get down to brass tacks on this unhappy situation than all the ARC money and panels and researchers will get done in three years or thirty years.

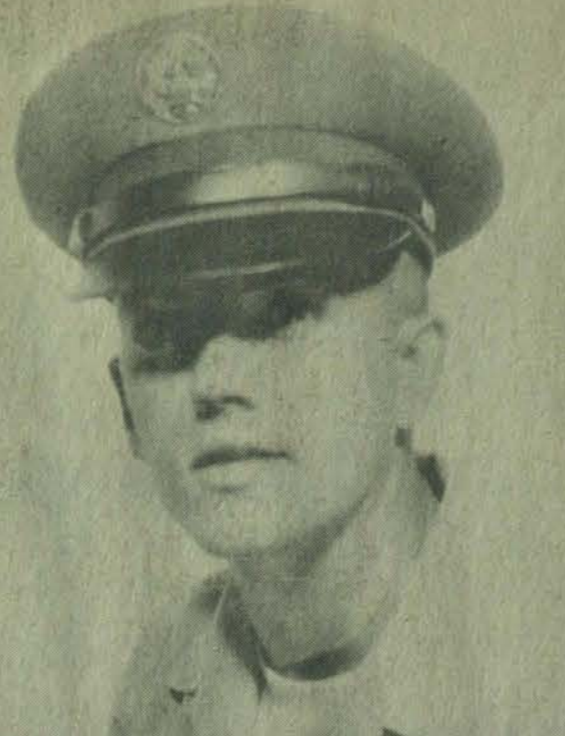

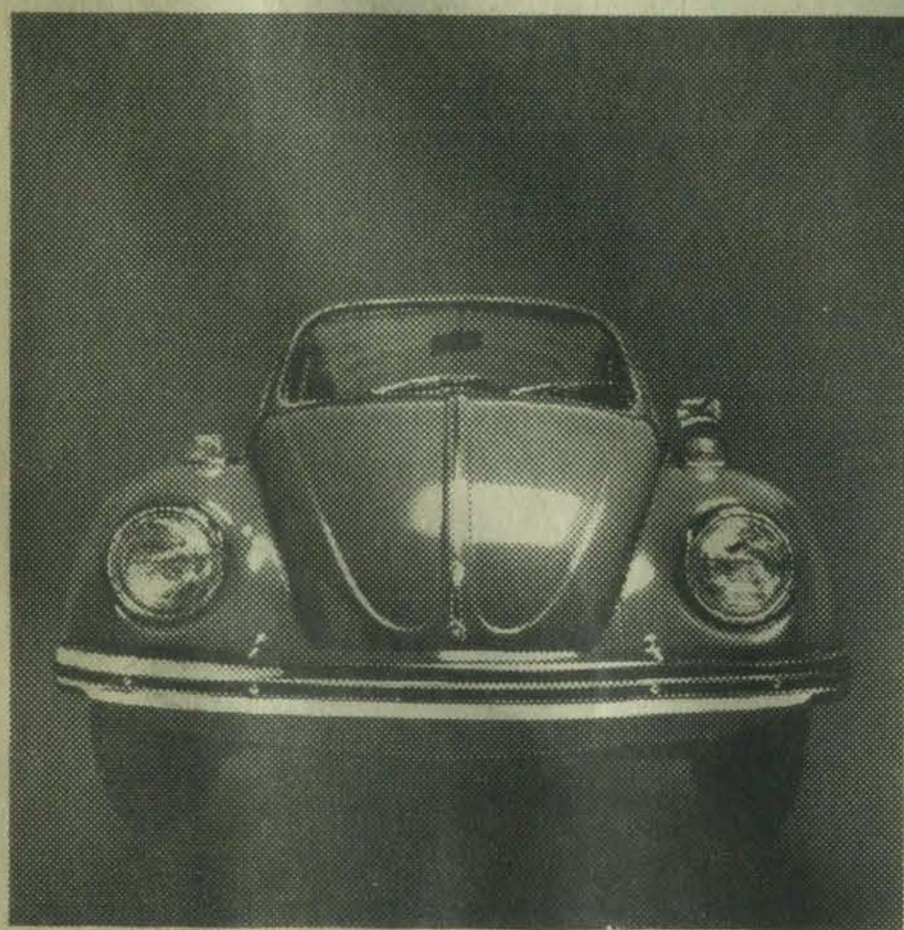

Jack-in-the-Pulpit—arrangement suitable for church or other special occasion.

Bachelor Button—arrangement by a man; men may compete in any other class.

Lady's Slipper—accessories must be used in this class.

Purple Plum—any purple flowers.

Greengage—arrangement using foliage, or green flowers.

Forget-Me-Not—miniature arrangement, using any flower or flowers; container and arrangement must not exceed 5 1/2 inches.

Strawflowers—use of dried materials.

Life Everlasting—use any artificial material (plastic, paper, metal, etc.)

Holly—arrangement suitable for any holiday.

II. Professional—arrangement by a florist.

III. Living plant arrangement:

1. Dishgarden—arrangement must include three or more kinds of growing plants; 2. Any single variety of growing plant in any container.

IV. Table Settings—the theme for this year is "Holidays." To be judged on individual merit.

V. Hobbies, crafts, antiques, paintings, collections. Any exhibit will be displayed. Contact chairman for space.

VI. Horticulture specimen section—not more than three flowers in a clear bottle which shows stem and leaves.

Regulations:

Entries received from 7 to 9:30 a.m.; all exhibits must remain until 5 p.m.; each

entry will be judged on individual merit and first, second, and third-place ribbons will be awarded. Engraved plaques will be awarded the Best in Show and Sweepstakes winner.

Points for judging: Color combination, relationship of materials and container, suitability of materials, originality and distinction of design, condition of materials.

Moon Rock, Apollo To Be at Capital

The command ship that carried the first astronauts to land on the surface of the Moon and one of the rocks they brought back from that historic journey will be on display Sept. 11-14 in the Capitol at Frankfort.

To be exhibited from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. each day of its Kentucky stay, the "Columbia" and the lunar rock will arrive aboard a 14-foot-wide van which, opened and expanded, serves as the showcase for the six-ton Apollo space module and the Moon rock sample.

Visitors will have an opportunity to view close-up the vehicle in which astronauts Neil A. Armstrong, Michael Collins and Edwin E. Aldrin, Jr., hurtled into lunar orbit last July and from which Armstrong and Aldrin detached themselves July 20 in the lunar module, "Eagle," to become the first men from Earth to set foot on another celestial body.

206 To Be Trained In Shoe Factories

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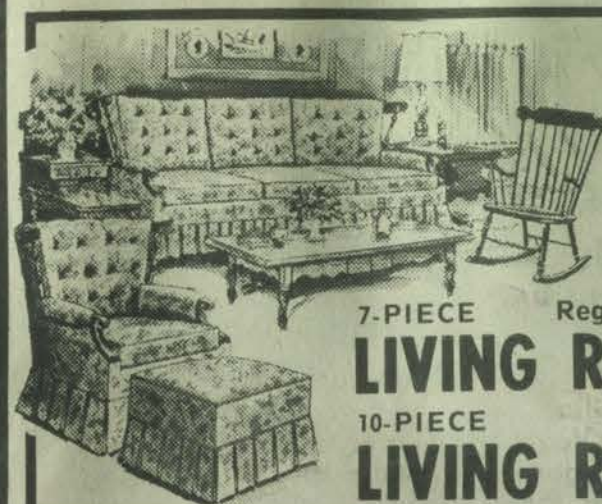

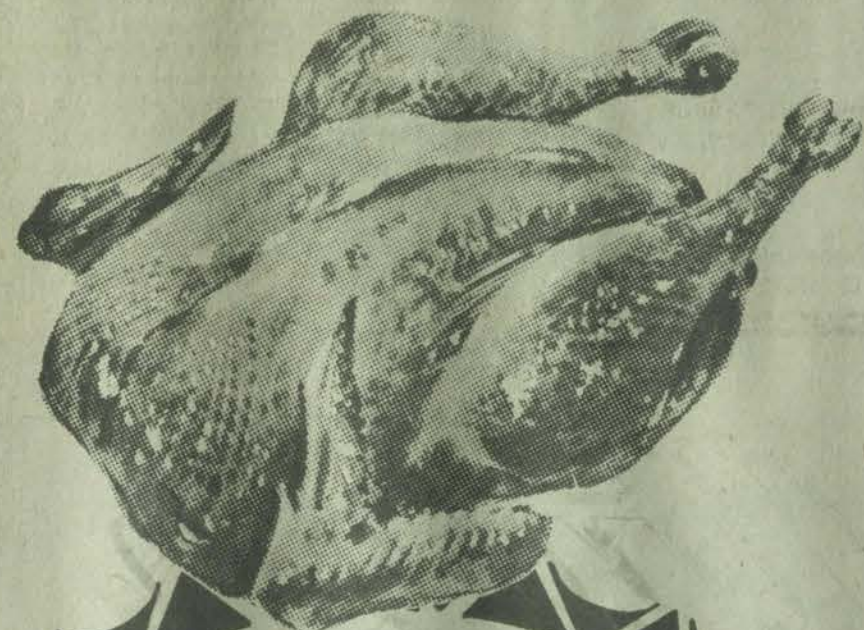
