98 Teachers Out of Jobs In Floyd Co.

Surplus Is Typical Of National Picture With Fewer Pupils

The nationwide surplus of teachers is reflected in the Floyd county teaching situation, County Superintendent of Schools Charles Clark said this week.

Ninety-eight persons, he said, have applied for teaching positions in this county, and there is no place to put them.

The over-supply of classroom teachers here and elsewhere is in sharp contrast to the situation a few years ago when many states-Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and others-were recruiting teachers from this and other Kentucky counties.

Floyd county's surplus, Supt. Clark said, results from a loss of pupils. The same may be the story over the country. Last year, 167 was lost in attendance, and this county will be employing five fewer teachers this year.

The "war baby boom" is over, and that accounts for the marked decline in pupil attendance-that and family planning. In the last 10 years Floyd county's pupil total has dropped from between 10-11,000 to 9,600 last year. A steady drop has been recorded, seven years in a row. Ten years ago, for example, Prestonsburg high school had an enrollment of about 1,000. Now it has 775. And Prestonsburg elementary has gained only a few pupils, although 17 rural schools in this end of the county have been closed and are sending their pupils here.

There is one shortage in the schools, Clark said. Capable high school principals are wanted in other counties of Kentucky and in other states. He said he has recently received telephone calls from Pike and Mogan counties and one from Ohio, all wanting principals.

One Arrested In Park Fray; 2 Raids Made

A shooting incident in which one Prestonsburg man was wounded by another resulted in an arrest, early Sunday morning at Jenny Wiley State Park, but authorities later said the wounded man has indicated he may not prosecute.

William (Red) Rowe was wounded in the chest and arm, but was not seriously hurt. Everett E. Bradley was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Orville Nelson on a charge of shooting and wounding with intent to kill. He waived the case to the grand jury and was released Sunday on \$1,000 bail.

State Troopers Rose and Williamson staged two liquor raids in widely separated sections of the county last Tuesday, confiscating a sizeable quantity of beer and making two arrests.

In a raid on the premises of Joe Lykins, near Harold, the officers confiscated 1,212 cans and bottles of beer and three pints of wine. On Salt Lick Creek, the same day, they arrested James Jacobs in whose trailer they found 219 cans of beer and two half-pints of whiskey. Both men were booked at the jail here on liquor possession

Named by County Judge Henry Stumbo to carry on negotiations for a federal grant and other affairs of the district were Francis H. Callopy, Richmond Slone and Royald H. Frasure.

The district is planned to serve the entire Left Fork of Middle Creek watershed, including the town of David. It would buy water from the Prestonsburg municipal system which already is extended to the Clark elementary school.

Formation of water districts for the Abbott Creek and Bull Creek sections also is planned.

One water system which serves upper Floyd and northern Pike county is already in operation, the Mud Creek system is almost complete, and work is under way on a third in the county. This last project is the Beaver Elkhorn Water District's system to serve the Right and Left Beaver Creek valleys.

Cost of Travel For Witnesses Given as Reason

The hearing set by the Office of Health Affairs on the proposed termination of the Floyd County Comprehensive Health Services Program will not be held, it was indicated Monday by County Judge Henry Stumbo, chairman of the board of directors of the Big Sandy Community Action Program and vice-chairman of the health services board.

The health board recently requested such a hearing but asked that it be held here because of the difficulty and expense involved in getting witnesses to Washington. Health Affairs granted the hearing but denied the request for it to be held here, setting the date at 10 a.m., Aug. 10, and the place as Washington, D. C.

Tuesday afternoon, Judge Stumbo addressed the following telegram to Dr. Carl A. Smith, acting director of the Office of Health Affairs, sending copies to President Nixon, various members of Congress and federal officials:

"Since you have ignored our request of July 10, 1971, to hold the hearing in Floyd county, we do not plan to attend the Washington hearing scheduled for August 10, 1971.

"Your office has been perfectly willing to hear evidence from outsiders who have given their viewpoints on the Floyd County Comprehensive Health Program. We feel that it is our constitutional right to have the opportunity of letting our consumers, board members, and interested citizens testify and give to you their judgments on the effectiveness of this program. This cannot be done at a Washington hearing, since we cannot provide travel for these individuals. The desires and needs of the great majority of our citizens are being ignored by your

Meanwhile, OEO representatives were in the county early this week, digging for evidence to be submitted at the hearing in Washington and possibly to subpoena some witnesses for the hearing.

Judge Stumbo said he understood OEO has three persons in the county for this purpose. "They could have sent two or three more and had enough for the hearing, right here where everybody involved could have had a chance to testify," he com-

mented. Stumbo added:

"We haven't been treated right. They told us to submit a program for the period after the first of August, and while this was being prepared they decided to terminate the whole program.

The "Decentralized Health Program" proposed for this county by the Eastern Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization has not received any action-largely because, it is explained, an interim board of directors cannot be named for the program and put to work until the present board resigns or their tenure is otherwise terminated.

Dr. Arnold Schecter, former director of the pilot health program in this county, told The Times last week that he planned to attend the Washington hearing. He said he proposes to ask that the program not be terminated but placed, instead, under the control of a new board of directors.

Dr. Schecter emphasized the point that this request would not be an effort to regain the directorship of the program for himself. "I will not be with any OEO program in this county," he said. "I will be in private practise in this county, or, perhaps, elsewhere, where I have tentative proposals.'

Schecter added that if the people of the county will urge leaders on the board of directors to turn the program over to OEO, a health program for Floyd county will be possible. About 17 persons remain on the board, several members having resigned.

He dismissed the whole concept of reclamation as "a fiction, a grand lie," and called the state division charged with the task of regulating strip-mining with being

"a public-relations arm of the strippers." Larry Greathouse, of Lt. Gov. Wendell H. Ford's staff, was not so vitriolic, however. He reaffirmed Ford's position on the industry, saying strip-mining should be stopped where reclamation cannot be done. Ford's Republican opponent for the governorship, Tom Emberton, who had been invited to the Hindman meeting, was not represented.

Branscome lashed out at Elmore Grim, director of the Division of Reclamation, and added:

"It is a sad day when private citizens must band together as a lobby group to get their government to recognize the imminence of its own destruction."

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

to forestry preservation in the next decade. manufacturing. Deans of forestry from 24 southern colleges and universities visited the commonwealth to investigate new forestry problems arising from conflicting needs in conservation, recreation, mining and F SH FRY natural resource development.

The tour was sponsored by the U.S. Forestry Service.

The educators expressed most concern over the millions of picnickers, hikers and tourists who pour into national forests and parks each weekend.

Dr. John Gray, dean of forestry at the University of Florida, noted that Ocala National Forest, near Orlando, now has some 900,000 visitors each year. He said the rate soon may reach more than 6 million annually with the opening of Disney World.

"Some areas of the Daniel Boone National Forest here in Kentucky are facing similar problems," Dr. Gray said. "We are concerned that these forests literally will be trampled into the ground by such a tremendous influx of people."

Other deans on the tour agreed overcrowding of forests also is developing in their respective states.

The annual tour was begun in the late 1950's by the federal Forestry Service to improve communication and cooperation between the service and the nation's forestry schools. This is the tour's first visit to Kentucky.

Dr. Thomas Hansbrough, dean of forestry at the University of Kentucky, noted the people problem is perhaps the most complex ever to face administrators. "Trees don't give us that much trouble,"

he said. "Trees don't talk back to you and they don't move around. People get into more trouble and impose more difficult management decisions on forestry personnel."

Hansbrough noted that forestry education must meet this need by focusing

visiting Kentucky July 12-16 identified "In education we must train our "people problems" as the biggest challenge professional foresters to be more cognizant of the people aspects of forest management," he said.

> While noting the importance of new problems, Dr. Loyd Blackwell, dean of forestry at Louisiana State University, stressed that more traditional needs also must be met.

> "We still must produce enough timber for the nation's tremendous demands," he said. "We must provide adequate wildlife habitats, a base for clean air and water and adequate forage for our domestic

> To meet all those demands the deans said strict regulation of people flow into the forests will be necessary, including restricting some areas.

> "People and forests can live together," Dr. Blackwell said. "They not only can they must. This will require an adjustment on both parts - especially the public."

Spindletop Says Some Small Banks **Invest Too Little in Community**

A pair of Spindletop Research reports have indicated some of Kentucky's smalltown banks may not be effectively meeting their areas' financial needs.

The reports suggested as a possible remedy a change in state law to allow banks to operate across county lines. The two studies, one prepared last year and one in the current year, went to state banking officials.

The more recent report says that Kentucky needs some way to move bank funds around the state, and cites as evidence regional shortages of capital for business loans to spur the state's economy.

The earlier study says many of the small banks have aging management, lack the push of competition and give poorer support for the local community than do larger

Of the 265 state banks in Kentucky in 1969, the report says that 76 per cent had less than \$10 million in assets—a level deemed

necessary for full efficiency. Small banks have tended to go to extremes in putting their money into loans or other investments, according to the recent

It notes a tendency of many conservative banks to put money into treasury notes instead of making loans to bolster the local

An additional \$250 million a year could flow into the state's economy if Kentucky banks were up to the national average in their ratio of loans to assets, the report

Jenny Wiley!—The Story and the Musical

One of the most colorful adventure stories of frontier America comes to life as the Jenny Wiley Summer Music Theatre presents a new musical, JENNY WILEY!, Thursdays-Sundays, August 5-22.

Captivity by the Indians was a common occurrence in frontier America and the literature of the times is full of the colorful tales of Indian captives. The story of Jenny Wiley's captivity and escape from Indians has been handed down in the households of the Big Sandy valley for generations. On October 1, 1789, Jenny Wiley's home was attacked by a small Indian band while her husband, Tom, was at a nearby trading post. Jenny's younger brother and four of her children were murdered, and she and her baby were carried into the forest. Eleven months later, Jenny escaped and made her way back to the new settlement of Harman's Station, which was near what is now the Prestonsburg-Paintsville airport. Since those early days the location of Harman's Station has been known as Blockhouse Bottom.

opens in Walkers Creek, Virginia, as Tice Harman and his men prepare to leave on a scouting mission to Kentucky. Tom Wiley woos Jenny Sellards. When Tom finally agrees to romance Jenny in the moonlight, they are married and start a family. While exploring Kentucky, Tice kills the son of Cap John, a Cherokee chief. Cap John,

seeking revenge, attacks the Wiley cabin. Although her brother and children are murdered, Jenny is spared by an old Shawnee chief, Black Wolf. Black Wolf wishes to adopt Jenny as his daughter and protects her life. As the Indians flee from the settlers, Jenny marks the trail. In the months that follow, Jenny's plans for escape fail. When Cap John meets Black Wolf in battle and wins Jenny from the old Shawnee, Black Wolf helps Jenny escape. Her journey through the wild forests of Kentucky provides an exciting climax to the musical.

The Play and the Music . . .

How It Came About The idea of a musical version of the story of Jenny Wiley originated with the general manager of the Jenny Wiley Summer Music Theatre, Mitch Douglas, two years ago. Douglas had come to Prestonsburg in 1968 as an actor after working with the Hunter Hills Music Theatre, the American Choreographers Ballet Company, Centennial Theatre, Guignol Theatre, and Baltimore's Spotlight Theatre. As a writer, Douglas had written promotion for numerous theatres, had authored "The Fine Arts" column for the Lexington Herald-Leader, and had served as associate editor for Accent magazine. He had also authored the plays, "Colonel Taddie," about Abraham Lincoln's son; "Changes" and "The Sin of Sister Maggie."

In preparing the script for JENNY WILEY! Douglas tried to avoid producing a pageant play or outdoor drama. "After all," he said, "we've based our reputation on being a musical theatre. I wanted the songs in JENNY WILEY! to contribute to the action rather than interrupt it." As a result, the musical avoids the folk songs and traditional square dances of outdoor drama. The next problem was to find a

Benjamin Keaton had come to Jenny Wiley last summer as a musical director. Keaton, a member of the music faculty of North Carolina Central University, had composed music for numerous productions, including "The Liberty Tree" and the off-Broadway production, "Amen to a Mantis." He had spent more than 10 years with "The Lost Colony" and had arranged music for Paul Green's "Sing All the Green Willow." He, too, favored an integrated

The resulting score ranges from patter songs to waltzes to ballads to Indian dances. The show opens with the rousing "Hooray and Hallelujah Day," followed by a novelty duet, "No One in Particular," and Tom's ballads, "Always Jenny" and "Let the Passing Years Fall Softly on My Love." The challenging task of recreating the story of Jenny Wiley on stage has fallen to the director, Randolph Umberger, choreographer Shirley Lightbody, set designer Peter Clemens, and costumer Kathryn Stuntz.

'There's No Such Thing As Reclamation'.—Harm


MIDDLESBORO, Ky .- Wildlife artist Ray Harm yesterday called for abolition of strip-mining, saying, "There really is no such thing as reclamation. . .

"You've been duped by the coal industry," Harm told a seminar at Union College's Environmental Education Center at Cumberland Gap National Park.

"You can plant all the trees you want, but you'll still get acid and silt (from stripmining)", the artist said. "How can you sit here and not be fighting to keep our mountains alive.'

He predicted a problem-solving economic revolution if strip-mining is abolished.

In the past, there has been some friction when the animal exhibits were brought in concerning health papers. There has always been some question as to the requirements for health papers. In order that the fair can be fun for everyone we are going to try to solve this problem before fair time this year.

The Division of Livestock Sanitation of the State Department of Agriculture requires that all animals shown in Kentucky, except Kentucky horses be accompanied by approved health papers. This includes dogs and cats as well as farm

The requirements vary for each species, and the list of regulations is too long to list here. Therefore, we are going to try to send a copy of the regulations to all past exhibitors. It is possible, however, that your name may not appear on our list, even though you may want to exhibit some livestock. So, if you want to enter an animal in the fair, and you don't receive a copy of the requirements for a health certificate, contact the County Extension office in the Prestonsburg Post Office Building (Phone 886-2668) before August 10 and pick up a
