Congressman Carl D. Perkins announced last week that a \$43,313 Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) grant has been made for a new child-care demonstration center in this county.

The grant will serve to expedite services of the center which will be especially designed for children in isolated rural areas. The Times was unable to contact either Harry Green, executive director of the day-care program, or Edward E. Ellis, project director, about specific plans for the work under the new grant.

Congressman Perkins said, however, that the center will expand its facilities to accommodate more visitors and parents and a larger staff as part of the demonstration program. The grant, he said, will also serve to improve the transportation system operated for child-care.

"Finally," Mr. Perkins said, "a child development and management course will be added to the curriculum to train parents with an employable skill."

Location of the new center was not known here. Child-care centers are already in operation at Auxier and McDowell.

Floyd Countian Abducted, Slain

Magoffin Man Who Shot Self Is Jailed Here

A Magoffin county man who reportedly shot himself as he drew on a Kentucky state trooper late Saturday was jailed here Saturday night after his wound had been treated at the Prestonsburg General

The accused man, Elmer McKenzie, 27, was accused of attempting to shoot State Trooper Roger Castle when the officer sought to arrest him and others. Castle said he had arrested three of six men in the Rockcastle section of Magoffin and that the others fled in a car. He pursued them and the auto occupied by the three wrecked. He said that McKenzie drew a revolver and somehow shot himself. The bullet entered the upper thigh, emerging above the knee, but caused only a flesh wound. McKenzie was returned Sunday to Magoffin county.

The trooper said McKenzie fired at him after accidentally shooting himself and that one of his companions pointed a shotgun at him. Castle and state troopers called to his assistance arrested five of the six men and are seeking the sixth. McKenzie was jailed here by Sgt. Flora and Trooper Bailey.

In this county the holiday week-end was unmarred by violence, although 34 were jailed from last Thursday to Monday noon. Most arrests were for drunkenness and traffic offenses.

It is theorized that he at that point was forced into the auto at gunpoint or that the door was opened and he was asked to attend to something inside the car, then was jerked inside. The bookkeeper, who watched his movements through a two-way mirror could not say how the abduction was done, nor could be give any description of the car except to say that it was brown. 



A Bridge That Is Needed-And Two That Aren't

Aside from the service it would provide for a community and its citizens and the potential economic benefits that may be derived from resultant industrial development, the old suspension-type Emma bridge should go and be replaced by a safe, modern span.

Every bridge of that type should go, or be closed to vehicle traffic. The bridge at Emma, more than 40 years ago, collapsed beneath the weight of a wagon and team. Such a bridge across the Big Sandy at Knotley Hollow, near here, later broke under the weight of an automobile. Four persons were killed in the two incidents.

The Knotley Hollow bridge was replaced with a new span of the same suspension type, to link the Goble-Roberts Addition area with US 23, and as long as it is used for vehicle traffic it stands as a constant threat to public safety.

It may fall. Its weaknesses are hidden, and they will not be visible until it's too late.

Moreover, even if the bridge stands forever, it is a threat. Traffic on US 23 must suddenly stop for a vehicle to make the sharp turn off the highway onto the bridge, or must stop for traffic emerging from the bridge onto the highway. Numerous pileups have resulted. Only by sheer luck have fatal wrecks been avoided.

This Goble-Roberts bridge can be eliminated without damage to the community. No new construction is necessary. Nearby is the new bridge crossing the river to the Bull Creek road.

At Emma a new bridge is an imperative, and The Times hopes the Department of Highways recognizes that fact and does something about the situation.

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Small-Mine Operators Attack Safety Act Constitutionality The constitutionality of the federal Coal

The legal action was filed at Pikeville against Secretary of the Interior Rogers C.

Robert Holcomb, a spokesman for the small operators, said the basic contentions of his colleagues are that the 1969 federal

nothing to mine safety. "I speak for the small, independent, underground operators of Eastern Kentucky, Southern West Virginia, Virginia and Tennessee who in 1970 accounted for 65 per cent of all the coal produced in these fields," Holcomb said.

He is president of Coal Operators and Associates Inc. at Pikeville and has been touring the coal areas, denouncing the federal act and contending it has doomed the coal industry of Eastern Kentucky "within six months or a year."

The small operators assert the act is so for a stroke. unreasonable in many provisions and applications that they cannot obey it, but Harmon, Tuesday. that larger operators have no trouble in doing so because of greater resources.

Their suit seeks a temporary injunction against enforcement of the safety law provisons, then a trial by a three-judge U. S. district court on the merits of the case.

"Essentially, we are testing a federal law which calls for punishment of people by fines or imprisonment for legislative infractions where there are no objective standards," Holcomb said.

Court of Appeals Rules Rollback Law Constitutional

session of the legislature after the Court of prohibits any local school tax not approved Appeals ruled that all property must be by popular vote, with a 'grandfather assessed at 100 percent of fair cash value, as provided in the state constitution. At that time, assessment ratios varied from 10 to 46 percent, with an average ratio of about 30 percent.

In response to public concern that school and other property taxes could conceivably be tripled as a result of the 100 percent assessment ruling, the legislature met in special session and passed the rollback law. The law provided that school districts and other local governmental units could levy property tax rates no higher than those necessary to return the same amount of revenue as was collected in 1965.

The only exceptions permitted 10 percent increases in revenue collected in 1966 and 1967, and that revenue from new property could be collected above that returned in 1965. But no additional revenue could be collected as a result of increased assessments on existing property. This meant that school districts generally have had to gradually lower their property tax rates over the years to balance out the increased value of property, especially real estate. This latter problem was corrected by a recently passed law effective January 1 of this year.

The decision upholding the rollback law was issued last Friday, June 18. Some months ago, the Louisville Board of Education requested a school property tax rate that exceeded-by 10 cents per each \$100 of assessed valuation—the rate permitted by the rollback law. When the Louisville Board of Aldermen refused to levy the higher rate, the school board brought suit against the aldermen, asking that the rollback law be declared unconstitutional.

The suit contended the tax freeze constituted special legislation and also violated the U.S. Constitution's equal protection clause. It also asserted the 1965 freeze merely perpetuated existing inequities. The appellate court said, however, that taxes must be uniform only "within the territorial limits of the authority levying the tax," but that the amount of the tax need not be the same among different districts. As for protection, it said, the rollback's purpose was to protect taxpayers "against sudden substantial increases in their tax burdens by action of

Retailers Required To File Applications As Stamp Handlers

The Food and Nutrition Service is asking the cooperation and assistance of retail merchants participating in the Food Stamp Program in updating the records and changing to automatic processing of redemption certificates.

All authroized retailers are required to submit new applications for reauthorization in accordance with the authority contained in the Food Stamp regulations. On June 1 all authorized retailers were sent a new application and instruction on preparing the application. On July 1, a second application was mailed to the merchants who had not responded to the first application.

All authorized merchants must be assigned new authorization numbers to participate in the Food Stamp Program after September 5.



Relatives said officers investigating the kidnapping-murder admit they have no clues to the identity. Authorities said he had been dead about 36 hours when found.







United Fuel, 3 Other Companies Losing Identities

Three Charleston-based Columbia Gas System companies with operations in West Virginia, Kentucky, Virginia and Maryland are losing their corporate identities in merging into Columbia Gas Transmission Corporation.

The companies are United Fuel Gas Company, Kentucky Gas Transmission Corporation and Atlantic Seaboard Corporation. All have had a single management in Charleston for many years and will continue as an operating unit under the new company.

However, names that have been familiar to those closely identified with the gas industry in the four states will fade from use as, in fact, their corporate identities

In the final step of the System's 16-year realignment program, Columbia Gas Transmission Corporation will consolidate the operations of seven subsidiaries. The company will function as the sole System pipeline company to transport and sell interstate gas to Columbia's retail affiliates and non-affiliated wholesale customers.

Ohio Fuel Gas Company, with headquarters in Columbus, and the Manufacturers Light and Heat Company, Cumberland and Allegheny Gas Company and Home Gas Company, all with headquarters in Pittsburgh, also are merged into the new company.

Columbia Gulf Transmission Company, which operates the System's large diameter lines from the Southwest, is not involved in the consolidation.

The merger of seven gas companies into one represents the last and largest step in Columbia's realignment program begun in 1955. The purpose of the latest move is to simplify Columbia's organization so that all Appalachian wholesale operations subject to the jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission will be handled through a single company, rather than through seven

Most of the gas the company transports will come from the Southwest, but Columbia Gas Transmission will operate 5,600 production wells of its own in the Ap-

A decade later, on Oct. 1, while her husband was away with a load of ginseng, Jenny Wiley busied herself at her loom, trying to finish a piece of cloth before taking her four children and young brother to the cabin of her sister, Elizabeth Borders, to spend the night.

Jenny was still weaving when a band of Indians broke through the cabin door and before her eyes scalped the three younger children and her brother, taking Jenny and her baby captive.

The story of the next few months in the life of Jenny Wiley is one of cruelty, torture, endurance and horror beyond the scope of fiction. But the story is not without its gentleness in the romance of Tom and Jenny and in kindnesses of one of her

Condemns Water Ruling

The League of Women Voters of Kentucky has long supported measures that would improve the quality of water in our state. Therefore, we deplore the action taken by the Kentucky Water Pollution Control Commission at their June 21st meeting. In a letter to James S. Shropshire, chairman, we have expressed our concern over standards being adopted that are considered by their own legal staff to be unenforceable. The problem is that there are varying standards for waterways that have to be classified according to their use. This, obviously, could result in confusion.

More uniform standards were contained in the form designated as WP 4-2. The League regrets that the Commission did not act on the suggestion of John Sawyer, one of the commissioners, to consider modification of these standards to conform with the requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency. The important step of adopting water quality standards for the state certainly merited a full and complete discussion of all the possibilities.

The League fears that the hasty action of the Commission will not hasten the process

of cleaning up our water.

Study of School Funding Begins

Frankfort, Ky .- A long-range study of the state's Minimum Foundation Program is under way to evaluate the program through which the state finances its public schools.

The study by the state Department of Education will be conducted over the next three years by 17 different subcommittees. Each will study one facet of the 15-year-old program. Each subcommittee is composed of 11 educators, plus one Department of Education staff member to furnish technical data.

James Melton, assistant state superintendent of public instruction in charge of finance and administration, and Joe Alsip, director of the Education Department's finance division, are cochairmen of the study. Study coordinator is James Sandlin, of Frankfort.

Melton said the study's recommendations will be ready for the 1974 General Assembly.

He said that after the subcommittees complete their work, their recommendations will be evaluated by citizens advisory committee which is yet to be

In addition, University of Kentucky consultants will study regional differences in school support and necessary local ef-

The 17 areas to be studied are: capital outlay, compensatory education, current expense, differential staffing, exceptional children, extended school year, growth factor, incentive programs, kindergarten, merit pay for teachers, para-professional support, pupil-teacher ratio, pupil transportation, teacher certification, urban needs, vocational education and special instruction service units.

Colleges Must Rule Campuses, Governor Says

The responsibility of writing campus regulations and seeing that they are obeyed rests with administrators of America's colleges, Governor Nunn declared recently.

Speaking at conference in Louisville of the National Association of College and University Attorneys, the governor said the American university system "is going to be destroyed" unless administrators exercise a firm hand in dealing with potential disturbances.

Nunn said some colleges have lost sight of their duty to educate and have become centers of lawlessness and forums for irresponsible opinions.

However, he said he believes this trend is passing because of the influence of mature students on the campus.

The right of the majority of students to get an education must be protected, he

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


