

Direct Dial Set Aug. 12 For County

Cost of Conversion Nearly \$4 Million, Bell Manager Says

Direct Distance Dialing came to South-Central-Bell telephone subscribers served by the Prestonsburg exchange ahead of schedule because of the recent strike, and DDT will become effective for other exchanges in the county Thursday, Aug. 12, at 8 a.m., it was announced this week by Bill Gibson, Bell manager at Paintsville.

The four exchanges to go to DDD at that time are Allen, Martin, McDowell and Wayland.

The overall conversion, affecting approximately 8,300 telephones in this county and an area including Floyd, Pike, Johnson, Martin and Lawrence counties, was made at a cost of \$3.8 million. Of this total expenditure, \$1.2 million is involved in the new telephone company building and its equipment at Paintsville.

When direct distance dialing becomes effective in other exchanges, Mr. Gibson said, the dialing procedure for subscribers there will be the same as in Prestonsburg: First of all, dial the digit 1, then the area code if the area code is not the same as the code used here, then the complete number consisting of seven digits.

To dial for directory assistance, anywhere in the United States, the subscriber need only dial 1, then the area code if it is different from the code used here, then 555-1212.

One of the advantages of direct distance dialing, it is pointed out, is the lower cost of making long-distance calls in this manner.

The telephone system in this area was nearing normal operation this week after the end of the strike last Tuesday. The new contract provides for a pay raise of approximately one-third over the next three years.

Bride Six Weeks, Mrs. Martin Dies In Motor Wreck

Mrs. Greta Faye Martin, of Printer, a bride of six weeks, was killed Friday night in a single-car accident on Sizemore mountain, approximately three miles east of Wayland on Ky. 1086.

Her husband, Neal Martin, 21, said to have been the driver of the car, was admitted to McDowell Appalachian Regional hospital, with multiple bruises and back lacerations. His condition was listed as fair early this week.

Mrs. Martin, a 1971 Wayland high school graduate, was dead on arrival at the hospital shortly after the accident which occurred about 8 p.m. when the car left the secondary road and plunged over a mountain about 150 yards. Death was attributed to a broken neck. It was reported here that steering mechanism of the car locked, causing it to leave the road.

Survivors, in addition to her husband, are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Ritchie, of Wayland; two brothers, Clarence Ray and Eddie Dean Ritchie, of Wayland; two sisters, Edna Mae and Geraldine Ritchie, both at home, and the maternal grandmother, Mrs. Rosie Stidham, of Wayland.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m., Monday, at the home of her parents by Regular Baptist ministers. Burial was made in the Cordell cemetery at Sizemore under direction of Merion Funeral Chapel.

King Says ARC Help Needed on Emma Job

Commissioner of Highways B. E. King was convinced last week, and he convinced himself, that the community of Emma needs a new bridge to span the Big Sandy and connect it with US 23. But a big "if" clouds the situation.

Mr. King admitted the need for the bridge and his personal interest in it but said that Appalachian Regional Commission participation in the work to the extent of 70 per cent of the cost will be necessary. That, he said, may be gained by showing through the Emma Industrial Foundation and the Kentucky Department of Commerce the developmental and economic potential of the area to be served. Such evidence is necessary, he explained, to justify ARC participation.

The commissioner was convinced by the crowd which jammed the Emma United Methodist Church for the hearing and the statements made by various individuals pointing up the need for the span.

He convinced himself by risking the drive across the ancient, creaky bridge from US 23 to the church.

Although construction of the bridge remains in the area of doubt, King promised to send state highway engineers to Emma to make a study of what is needed to make the present span safe while efforts are under way to get the new project started. He promised that this work will be done and that it is necessary, because, even though the new bridge were authorized now, its completion would be two years distant.

A suggestion that a road be built to connect with new US 23 instead of a bridge met solid opposition, almost all those making statements at the hearing insisting that the bridge is the community's need.

A road to connect with new US 23 on Bull Creek would cost an estimated \$5 million. A modern steel-and-concrete bridge would perhaps cost \$800,000.

Construction of a low-water bridge to serve temporarily was held too costly. District Highway Engineer Wendell H. Bays said upstream reservoirs now maintain a steady flow of water and that the river is kept at such a consistently high stage a low-water crossing would be unfeasible.

When Commissioner King mentioned the matter of a road for Emma after bridge construction became a reality, County Judge Henry Stumbo said, "Build us the

bridge—we'll build the road." He also promised to cooperate in acquisition of land for the proposed span.

Dr. George P. Archer, mayor of Prestonsburg, pointed out that the Prestonsburg Municipal Water and Gas Commission is making both city water and gas available to Emma and its potential industrial sites. He offered all possible cooperation with the community.

Various citizens of Emma and vicinity spoke the community needs. One of these, Elmer Morrison, of nearby Cow Creek, liked Emma and its isolation to colonial Virginia's Lost Colony.

The move for a new bridge has been spearheaded by Miss Fil Weddington, who was hostess to Commissioner King and others at a May Lodge luncheon prior to the hearing.

He was taken to the Methodist Hospital, Pikeville, where his condition was reported as favorable. The arm was severed above the elbow, and he suffered a severe head injury.

State Trooper Gary Rose said Garry Walls, of the Auxier road, driver of the auto, told him another car forced him off the road. The trooper said the car driven by Walls left the highway, struck the side of the hill and bounded back, turning turtle in the roadway.

West Virginia Mines Closing This Week; Negotiators Recess

Coal mining in Floyd and most other Eastern Kentucky counties continued unabated this week, despite a strike which has paralyzed four major railroads.

The C. and O. Railway remains in operation, and its continued service keeps the coal industry going in this section.

But C. and O. is due for a strike Friday morning, Aug. 6, unless the dispute over work rules is settled.

In the Williamson, W. Va. area, which is served by the strikebound N. and W., mines were closing this week for lack of coal cars.

If efforts to reach a settlement of differences fail, all mines in Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia and Ohio, will be forced to close. Shipment of foodstuffs and other materials would, in the event of an industry-wide strike, be dependent upon motor transportation.

Power companies have a coal stockpile which will keep their generating plants going for another 60 to 90 days.

W. J. Usery Jr., assistant secretary of labor, who is a government mediator in the talks, announced "with great reluctance" Monday afternoon that the negotiations were being recessed indefinitely, subject to call by either party or the mediators.

Usery said that the impasse had been created by an inability of the parties to agree on two work rules and on job

Computer Math Results Noted In Co. Schools

Results of the Computer Assisted Instruction (CAI) math program which has been in operation in three Floyd schools since March 18 indicate that the program has been highly successful.

According to Superintendent Charles Clark, the evaluation data indicates that 88 per cent of the elementary students involved increased their math skills. Floyd county had 179 children in the program at Prestonsburg, Stumbo, and Osborne elementary schools.

A total of 2,460 students participated in the program throughout Eastern Kentucky. The regional results indicate that CAI-math students averaged a five-month gain in math skills during a three-month period, when measured by a nationally standardized achievement test.

The computerized math program has also allowed students to gain an average of five months in reading skill during its three-month operation.

In the CAI approach to learning, each child is given work precisely suited to his ability, and he is allowed to progress at his own rate.

After the specially-trained teacher explains a math concept in the classroom, the student goes to a teletype terminal located in his school to drill and practice on that concept. The terminal is connected via telephone lines to a computer in Ashland, where the results are tabulated and sent to the teacher.

The attitudes of teachers, students and parents of students involved in CAI-math in Floyd county were overwhelmingly favorable toward the program, Clark said.

The CAI program is administered through the Eastern Kentucky Educational Development Corporation, a regional agency based in Ashland through which Eastern Kentucky school districts acquire federally-financed creative and innovative educational programs.

Computerized math will continue in the schools this fall.

Judge Stumbo Pays \$4,678 Excess Fees

County Judge Henry Stumbo has returned to the county treasurer \$4,678 in excess fees covering the period, Jan. 1, 1970 to Dec. 31, 1970.

His check to cover this amount was recently handed to W. J. May, county treasurer.

Ten Floyd Right-of-Way Suits Save State Total of \$78,225

The state has effected a saving of \$78,225 by going to court with 10 landowners from which its Department of Highways sought to buy right-of-way for new US 23 through this county, recent judgments rendered by juries in these cases show.

The total allowed in the 10 cases is \$214,100. The land has been appraised by court-appointed appraisers at \$292,325. In only two of the cases did jury awards exceed the appraised value.

The 10 cases included in these totals follow, the amount allowed by juries in the trial of the cases appearing first, followed by the values set by appraisers:

Ray and Ellen Campbell, \$29,000, \$33,500;

Elder Gary Wright, \$18,000, \$9,225; James Goble, et al, \$12,000, \$30,500; Chester and Jean Layne, \$17,500, \$24,600; Esta Mae Banks, \$15,000, \$30,000; Mary Roberts, \$14,000, \$16,000; Edna Grace and Thomas Kuss, \$20,100, \$12,500; Effert Reynolds, et al, \$16,000, \$48,500; Delmon W. and Myrtle Howard, \$30,000, \$36,000; Ann Scott, \$42,500, \$51,500.

In each right-of-way case which is not settled by agreement, the state deposits the amount of the appraised value of the land taken. Upon trial of the case the difference between the verdict and the appraisal is returned to the state if the appraised amount exceeds the judgment.

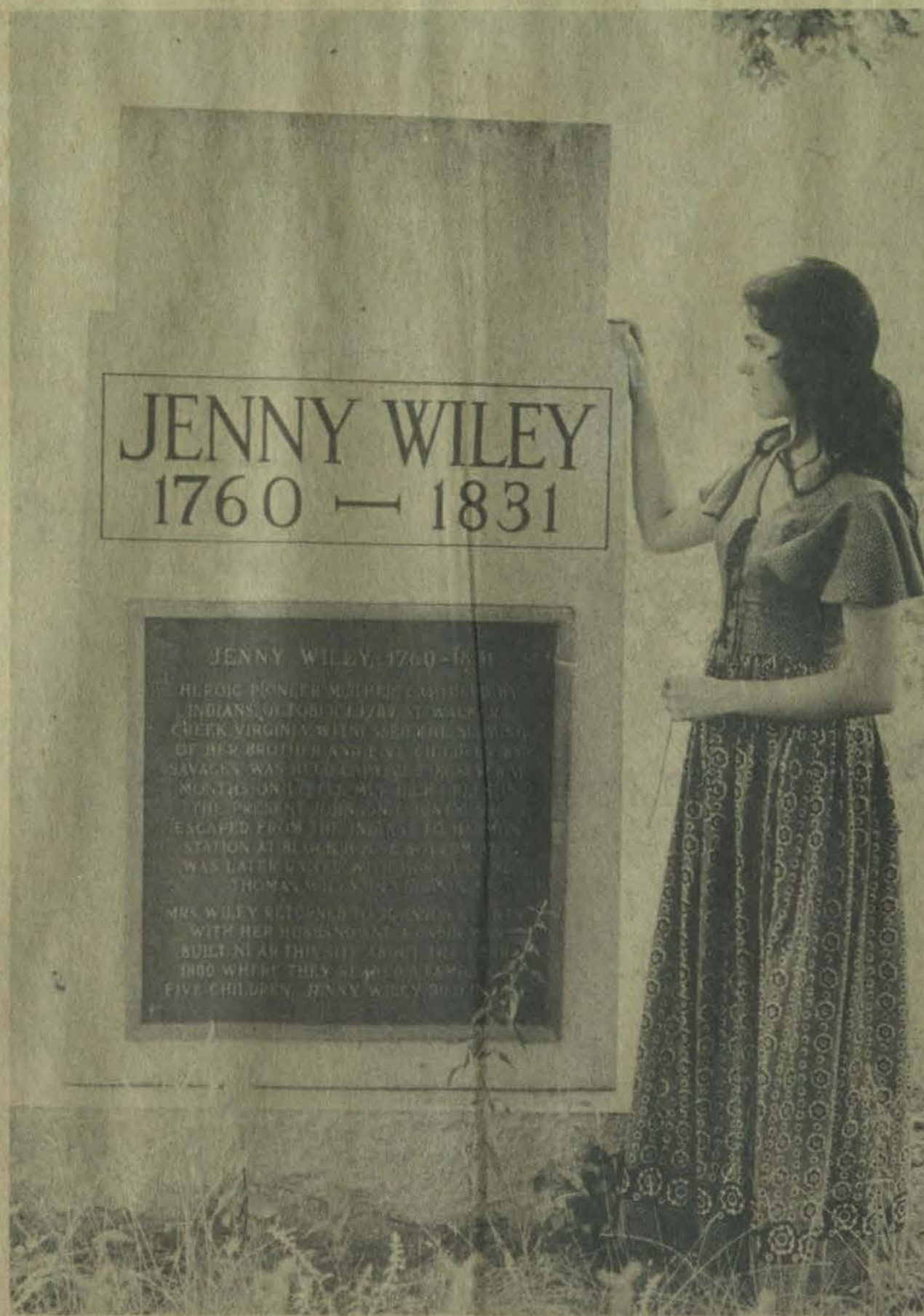
Stumbo Says Probe of Clubs Ahead; Cites Bootlegging Reports

Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo announced this week that he will begin immediately an investigation into clubs operating in this county. If his findings justify such action, he said, he will move to close them.

At the same time Stumbo said he is receiving telephone calls and letters from all parts of the county as citizens report an

alarming bootlegging situation. He said he has discussed the situation with Circuit Judge Hollie Conley but that no decision on what action is to be taken has yet been reached.

"Something must be done," he added. The prosecutor said the only clubs currently operating in the county are two here and two at Martin.

Mrs. Wiley returned to Johnson county with her husband, and a cabin was built near this site about the year 1800 where they reared a family of five children. Jenny Wiley died in 1831.

Court Suit Asks \$25,000 Damages Of Two Builders

The Floyd fiscal court last Friday filed suit in circuit court seeking the recovery of \$25,000 damages from two contracting firms, claiming the construction of the roof of the new courthouse here is defective both in materials and workmanship.

The suit named Akers and Akers Construction Co., prime contractor in the building of the courthouse, and the sub-contractor, Paintsville Heating and Roofing Co., as defendants. Although the suit pointed out that the sub-contractor contracted to supply materials, labor and construction on the roof of the building, the court claims the principal contractor shares responsibility. The fiscal court alleged that construction was done in "a negligent and poor workmanlike manner," that materials used were sub-standard and that the roof is leaking in several places.

The courthouse roof was bonded and insured for a period of 20 years, the petition also points out. In addition to damages, the suit asks that defendants be required to place the roof in good and usable condition, as provided by the contract.

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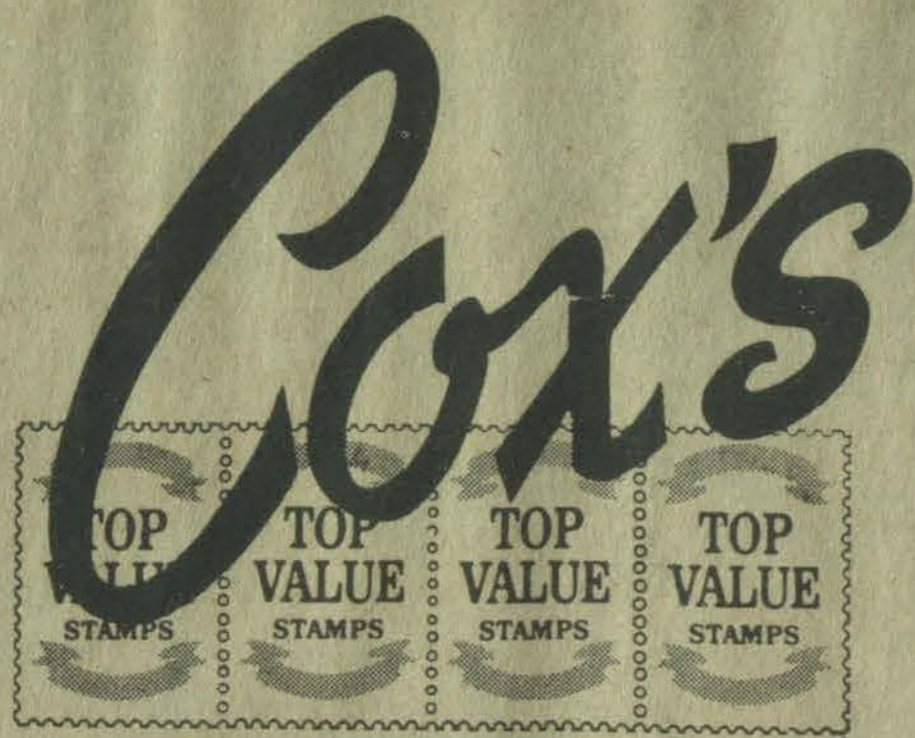

The community of Maytown (Langley postoffice) is perhaps unique in this area.

A group of its citizens—most of them women, perhaps—have a civic pride which puts to shame many larger towns. They are proud of their churches, their school and of those of their citizens who have worked and achieved something—and they let folks outside their own town limits know they are proud.

Maytown has its annual flower show, the first for Floyd county. Only last week-end it had its second annual homecoming, and the folks were back home again from several states to have a part in it.

Although it is one of the smaller communities, it is among the better publicized. Over a period of many years there have been few weeks when the comings and goings of its people and the life of Maytown have not been reported to this newspaper and through its news columns to many hundreds of ex-residents living in other states. There always is at least one woman at Maytown who cares enough about her community to take time to write this report, week after week.

And The Floyd County Times is happy to be a party to making Maytown one of the best-known little towns in Eastern Kentucky.

We aren't in the habit of passing out bouquets—mainly, because we aren't wise enough to know always where they belong—but we feel that we owe this recognition to the sustained effort and consistent achievement of one of our own communities.

A Chance To Practise the Preaching

Either the Department of Highways or the Department of Parks, or both, may be missing an opportunity to practise the "Keep Kentucky Beautiful" doctrine in their failure to make more attractive the entrance to Jenny Wiley State Park.

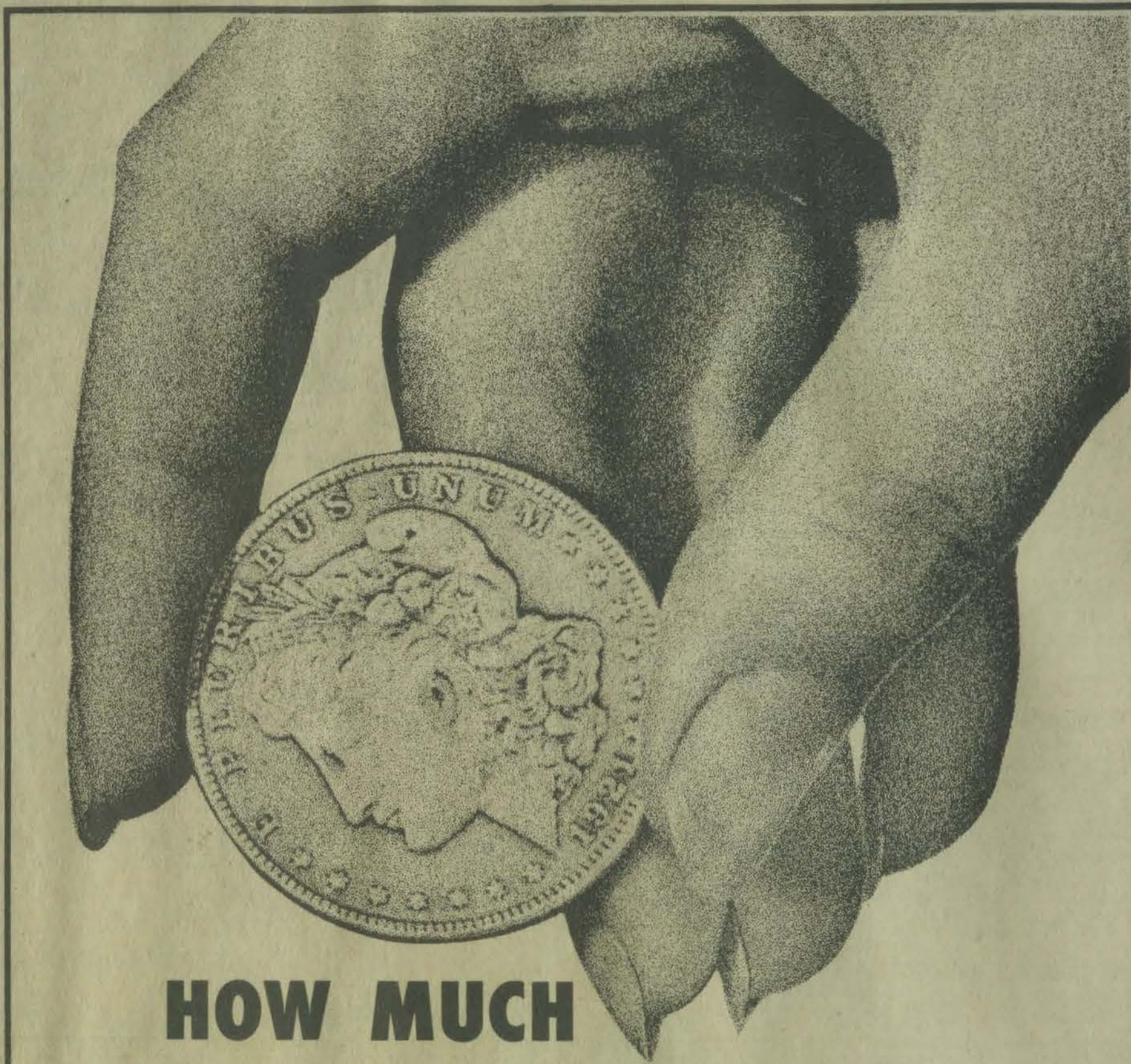

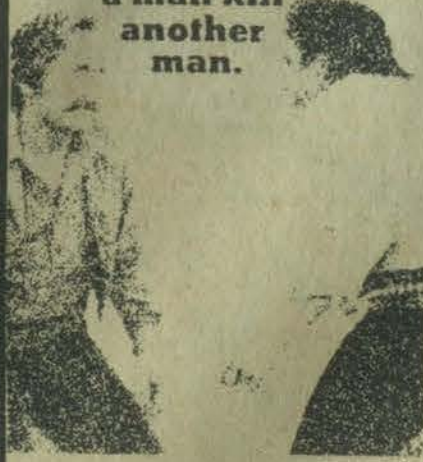

Toll-Free "Hot Line"

A new toll-free "hot line," which may be in use for consumers in about one month, will be a quick, inexpensive means of contacting the Citizens Commission on Consumer Protection.

The commission approves on July 14 the installation of the "hot line," designed to provide a quick remedy for persons who feel they have been shortchanged in the marketplace, either in goods or services.

Robert Caummisar, executive director of the commission, said, "Not only will citizens have a quicker, easier and more economical means of reaching us with complaints but we will gain a closer contact with the public for a better picture of their concerns."

In some cases the "hot line" will make it possible to register a complaint and receive an answer the same day.

"Letter writing has been the most frequent means of communication to date," said Caummisar, whose office opened in September, "but the consumer's problem wasn't received until maybe three days after being mailed and it took a longer time to be processed."

Consumers are asked to register the complaint first with the local firm or individual responsible for the problem. "If there is no satisfaction they should go to the parent company," he said, "and if still no satisfaction is received, that is the time to give us a ring."

The only other state to have a toll-free "hot line" for consumers is Georgia. Officials there have reported great success with its use.

Caummisar reminded consumers to have available the name and address of the firm being complained against when using the line. The consumer should also be able to quote the dates involved in the transaction, identification numbers of automobiles and appliances, account numbers in credit problems and copies of contracts or warranties involved.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Love Thy Neighbor

In half a dozen places, the Bible tells us to "love thy neighbor." But it may be difficult to apply this general rule to the specific people who live next door. To what extent does the law insist on a "good neighbor policy?"

Under traditional legal rules, a home owner owed very little regard for his neighbor's sensibilities. He could do almost anything he pleased, so long as he did not actually intrude upon his neighbor's property.

In one early case, a home owner dug such a deep excavation near the boundary line that his neighbor's house had to be abandoned as unsafe. Yet, even though he had acted with malice aforethought, a court held him not liable for ruining the neighbor's house.

And in another case, a court refused to condemn an enormous "spite fence," carefully designed to shut out light and air from the people next door. The judge said "it would be intolerable to allow a man's neighbors to question his motives."

But in recent years, as people began living closer together, the attitude of the law has changed. Today the right to excavate is limited by considerations of safety and fair play. Almost everywhere, the spite fence is forbidden. As one court put it:

"No one ought to have the legal right to make a malicious use of his property for no benefit to himself, but merely to injure his fellow man."

Of course, moderate annoyances—even if unneighborly—are still legal. A home owner may still be reasonably noisy, even if the neighbors like it quiet. He may still paint his house a color that the neighbors consider frightful.

In one case, a man turned a deaf ear to a neighbor's complaint about his four large maple trees. It seems the trees kept the neighbor's house in almost constant shade.

But after a court hearing, the judge ruled that the neighbor had no legal grounds for complaint. This was the kind of "wrong," said the judge, for which the law provides no remedy.

protection involving employes who would be affected by the rules.

The chief sticking points have been the railroads' insistence on and the union's rejection of a new work rule that would require train crews to make "interdivisional" daily train runs. A day's run for a train crew is now limited by traditional "seniority districts" that average about 100 miles.

One reason the union has dug in its heels to oppose this rule is that its implementation would require many of its members to move to new home areas when old terminals are eliminated by the longer runs.

The railroads have offered to pick up some of the relocation costs, but this concession was not enough to remove the union's objections.

The second "hangup," Usery said, was a work rule that would permit extended and more flexible service by yard crews and by road crews in the yards.

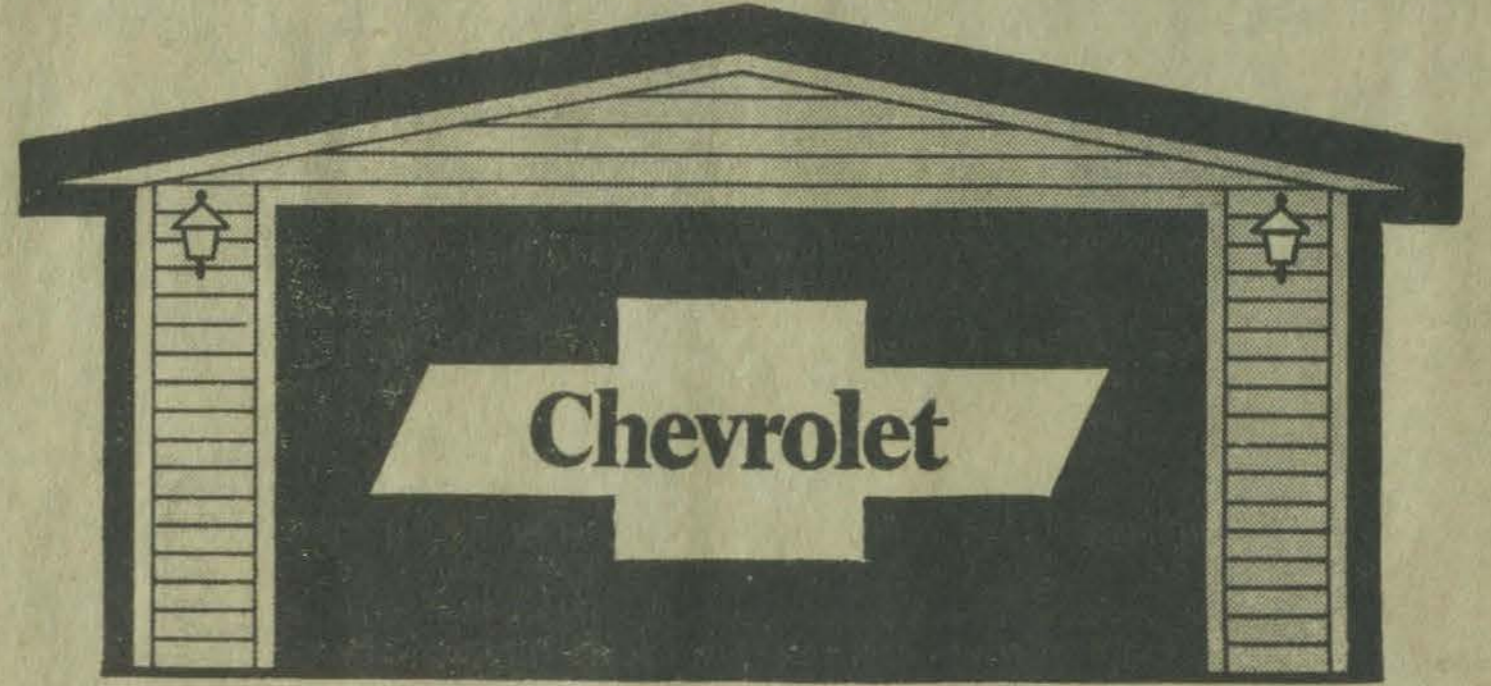

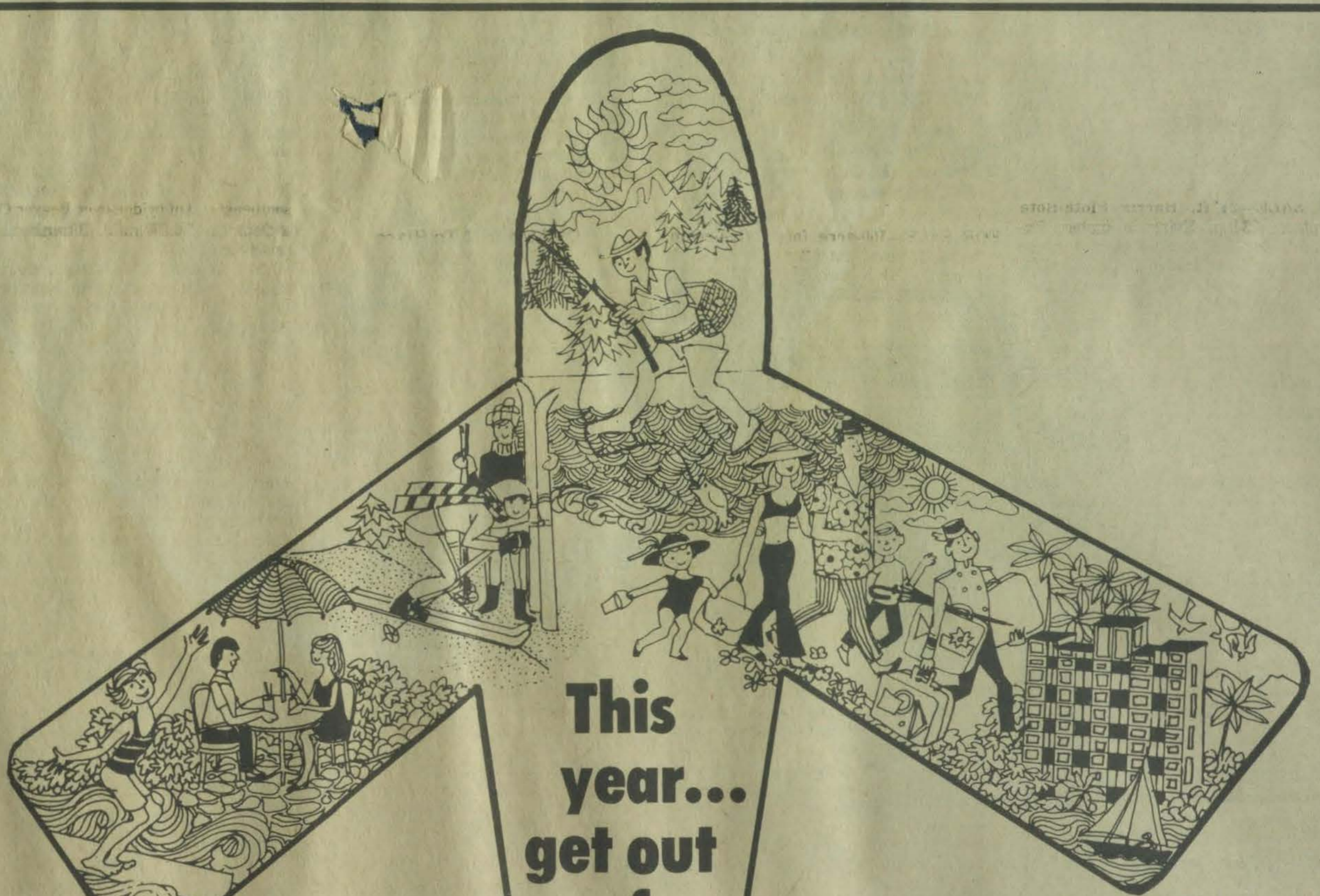

Thomas Edward Dimick

Thomas Edward Dimick, 90, who with his father pioneered oil development in Floyd and adjacent counties, died Tuesday in Dallas, Texas.

Born January 12, 1881, in Pennsylvania, he was a son of Ellen M. and George H. Dimick, Sr. He lived here for several years and was married here, September 7, 1904, to Josephine D. Hopkins, who died in 1966. He had lived in Huntington from 1909 until June, 1970 when he moved to Dallas where he lived with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Robinson, Jr.

In addition to developing oil fields in this section where, with his father and brothers, he drilled the first oil well in the county, he helped develop a large part of the Devonian shale gas field in this area. Mr. Dimick also figured in the development of the Big Injun gas field in Lincoln county, W. Va., under the name of George H. Dimick and Co. He held interests and served as general manager, director and other executive posts with the Yolanda Oil Co., Keystone Gas, New Domain and Midas Carbon Co. New Domain drilled the first oil well in Floyd county, and Keystone Gas and Midas Carbon developed an extensive gas field in eastern Kentucky. Midas Carbon built a large plant, near Hueysville, for production of carbon black and gasoline from natural gas for several years.

In the late 1920's, Mr. Dimick and his brother were oil and gas operators in western Kentucky. Their other operations extended into Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio as well as Kentucky. Mr. Dimick wrote a history in 1960 of his family's connection with oil and gas development over a period of 100 years.

He was graduated from Bryan Stratton College, Buffalo, N. Y., and was a member of First Presbyterian church in Huntington.

Widely known in this section for his oil and gas interests, Mr. Dimick was perhaps as widely acclaimed for his love of music and dancing. Two years ago, he appeared in the Jenny Wiley Folk Festival at the amphitheatre near here.

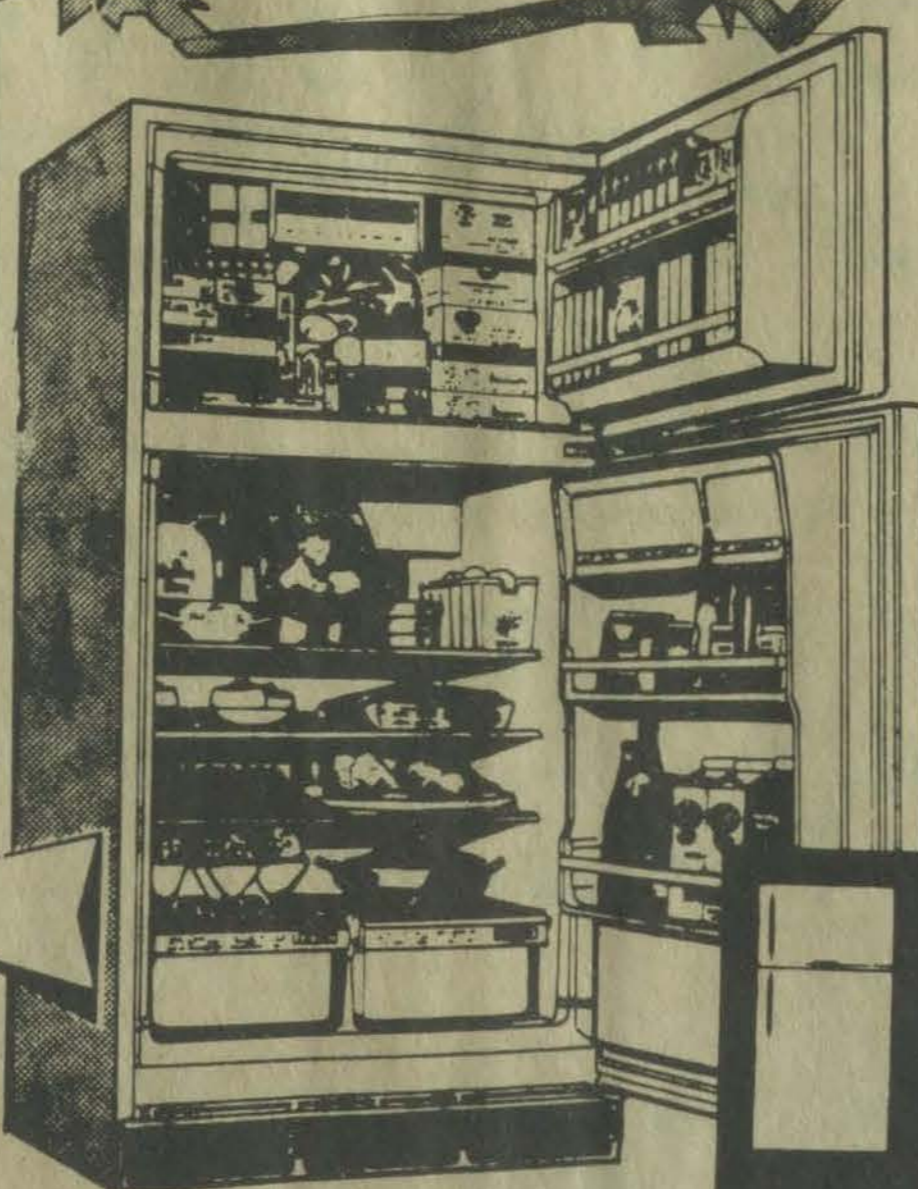

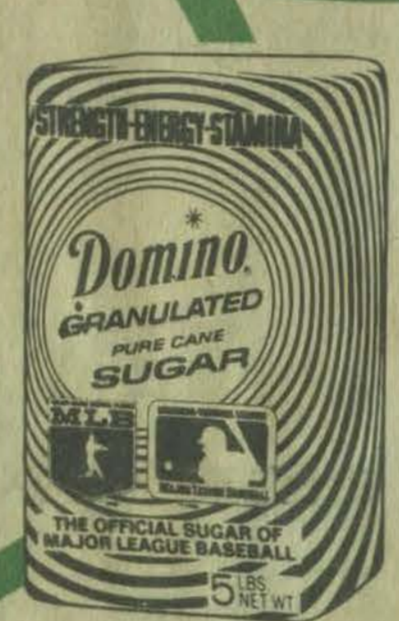
