

Second Man Is Charged In Slaying Adkins' Shot Could Have Killed Hall, Prosecutor Told

A second Wheelwright man has been charged with murder in the slaying there May 22 of Ernest Hall, 26.

Frank Lee Adkins, 31, was jailed here Saturday by State Detective Chester D. Potter and State Trooper Williamson on a murder warrant sworn out for his arrest, earlier in the day.

The warrant was issued for Adkins after X-ray examination had shown that a revolver bullet identified as of a .38-calibre had lodged near Hall's spine and that the bullet, which entered the victim's side, could have caused his death.

In fact, Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo said, doctors have held that either this bullet or the shotgun charge allegedly fired by Russell Slone, 23, into Hall's face, chest and stomach could have produced death.

One witness told the commonwealth's attorney he saw Adkins firing a revolver at Hall. A .38-calibre revolver from which three shots had been fired was found in the truck which Slone, his father and Adkins had driven to the shooting scene in Branham Hollow at Wheelwright. The weapon has been identified as that of Adkins, officers said. Adkins in a statement made to Mr. Stumbo claimed he had no gun.

Slone, the man originally charged with the slaying, waived examining trial here last Thursday and his bond was set at \$10,000. He and Adkins are brothers-in-law.

Both Adkins and Slone had earlier been charged with reckless use of a deadly weapon, and Adkins had been held for investigation. He was released under \$500 bond prior to the murder charge.

Told that either Slone's or Adkins' shot could have killed Hall, authorities here pondered this question:

Could both men be charged with murder? If not, would it be necessary to determine which shot was first fired?

The shooting followed trouble between the Slones and Ernest Hall and his brother, Bunker Bill Hall. The latter was hit by shotgun pellets which Russell Slone admitted firing but was not seriously hurt.

The Floyd county victim was fatally injured, shortly after 1 p.m. Sunday when, driving alone, his auto left KY 122 and overturned in a ditchline, throwing him from the vehicle, State Police said. His wife, Blanche Spears Moore, was a patient at the McDowell hospital at the time of his death.

The Richardson tragedy occurred, it was reported, when the car occupied by four men went out of control. Two other passengers, Matt Johnson, of Milo, and Joseph R. Fletcher, of Inez, were seriously injured.

Floyd Polls Biggest Majority for Combs

Bert Combs may have come to the end of the political trail, but not at the hands of Floyd county.

The former governor and onetime resident and official of Prestonsburg polled majorities in every Floyd voting precinct over the Democratic gubernatorial nominee, Wendell H. Ford, and his countywide majority was 5968—again, the state's heaviest for Combs.

Combs' running-mate, Julian M. Carroll, also fared well at Floyd voters' hands, polling a vote of 6,195 to 998 for John B. Breckinridge, Carroll's opponent for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant-governor. (McCracken, Carroll's home county, however, gave Ford 5,684 votes to 4,293 for Combs.)

In the Floyd voting Robert (Bob) Damron, of Ivel, led Nelson R. Allen, a native of Hueysville but now a resident of Russell, by 2461 to 1797 votes for railroad commissioner from the Third district. The Courier-Journal reported that with only seven of the 1097 precincts in the district untabulated Allen held a lead over Damron of 1332 votes. Grace Allen Damron, daughter-in-law of the Ivel man, said, however, that she had canvassed by telephone every county clerk's office in the district and that if the figures given her are correct, Mr. Damron won the nomination.

'71 Assessment At \$117,019,338 In First Recap

Floyd county's total tax assessment at the conclusion of the first recapitulation of figures by Tax Commissioner Harry Gordon Allen stands at \$117,019,338—roughly, \$6 million more than the first recap of the assessment last year.

The final recap of the assessment, expected to be completed this week, will see an increase in the total, it was said at the tax commissioner's office.

The real estate assessment this year, including mineral and timber rights, totals \$75,773,859. Of this amount, \$4,608,644 is the value of timber and mineral rights, which represents a drop in this evaluation from \$5,639,903 last year. Farm lands and improvements dropped from \$16,891,504 last year to \$16,377,398 in the current assessment. But commercial land and improvements rose from \$15,903,872 last year to \$17,439,677. Residential property was down from \$27,151,417 in 1970 to \$25,103,489 this year.

The real estate assessment for non-residents and corporations is \$15,370,148; for the city of Prestonsburg, \$17,521,907, and for Floyd county outside Prestonsburg, \$42,141,103.

The total assessment subject to the Prestonsburg gym tax is \$20,320,599.

Motor vehicles stand assessed at \$14,401,421; watercraft at \$140,400; merchants' inventories at \$5,243,516; drilling and mining equipment at \$1,298,600.

Intangibles are assessed at \$7,556,029.

In the Democratic race for state senator from the 29th district the incumbent, Clifford B. Latta, led the Floyd balloting with 2,908 votes to 1808 for John Chris Cornett, 1780 for Allen Slone, 408 for Pearl Strong (incumbent from Perry county), and 880 for Delmas Inmon.

Judge Cornett, however, polled a strong vote in both Perry and Knott counties to win the nomination. He will be opposed in November by Frank Stewart, of Langley, who was unopposed for the Republican nomination.

Poor Send Delegation For Capital Hearing

Tuesday's hearing in Washington on the future of the Floyd Comprehensive Health Services Program was originally scheduled for leaders of Big Sandy CAP and the health program to show cause why the program should not be terminated, but it appeared likely that representatives of the poor, or consumer group, were to have a part in it.

If directors of Big Sandy CAP and the health program cannot effectively answer a long list of charges made by the Office of Health Affairs, suspension of the program for a period of 21 days may result. After that, Health Affairs could move for final termination of the program.

Ford Lead In Primary Past 41,000

Former Floyd Man, Ex-Governor Says No More Politics

Unofficial returns show that Lieut. Gov. Wendell H. Ford defeated Former Governor Bert T. Combs for the Democratic nomination for governor by approximately 41,000 votes in the May 25 primary election.

Conceding his defeat at a comparatively early hour, around 9:30 election night, Combs in a brief television appearance said, "This is the end of the political road for me. This has been a long, hard campaign. . . However, my wife and I agreed to do our best and, regardless of the outcome, we would have no regrets."

Then he added: "I feared to win almost as much as I feared to lose. Therefore, I have no sympathy for myself."

The jubilant Ford, meanwhile, was pledging "to work my heart out to help bring a Democratic victory in Kentucky in November."

And his Republican counterpart, Tom Emberton, who coasted to the G. O. P. nomination, promised a strong, constructive platform for his race in the November finals.

he was temporarily in charge of the program. OEO's Office of Health Affairs has also alleged that the program is now at a virtual standstill. In reply Harry Eastburn, director of Big Sandy CAP, has cited statistics showing that in February, March and April of this year nearly 4000 persons visited the seven outposts maintained by the program and that 3,475 home visits were made by program personnel.

Eastburn said the boards of Big Sandy CAP and the health program have often been unaware of program changes initiated by the staff until after OEO had approved them.

When the health program board of directors and Big Sandy CAP directors met at Paintsville Friday to select representatives to attend the Washington hearing, a consumer group headed by members of the Eastern Kentucky Welfare Rights Organization was barred. Before the meeting convened the announcement was made that the session would be closed to the public because of the "sensitive" issues involved.

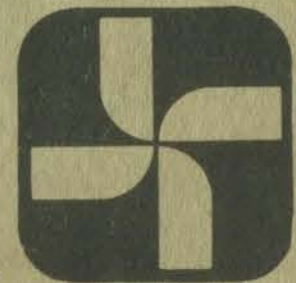

A Funny Statement Was Made at the Postmortem

Postmortems are in order, these post-election days. One of the more succinct comments made on the defeat of Bert Combs for the Democratic nomination for governor was this:

"What happened proves that there are more taxpayers than there are teachers."

Besides its pungency as a comment on the political campaign and its results, the quip emphasizes the gap that lies between the teaching profession and those who pay the bills.

It appears, now that we have the benefit of hindsight, that Ex-Governor Combs' strong espousal of the cause of education — more particularly, higher pay for teachers — and the ability of his opponent to seize upon this plank and its threat of higher taxes forced Combs onto the defensive and may have frightened away from him in the latter days of the campaign thousands of voters who otherwise might have supported him.

The fact that the teacher is the poorest paid of all professional people in Kentucky is well-known, but the teachers themselves have created an image which is not compatible with what taxpayers consider real education. Those who provide the payroll argue that more money hasn't meant more education for boys and girls; that the hours in school, at actual classwork, grow shorter; that the quality of teaching improves not at all. Those charged with administration and supervision draw a part of the blame.

There are, on the other hand, it is admitted, many fine, dedicated teachers, and Kentucky stands to lose these as well as the poorest and least deserving if the state remains pegged to one of the lowest salary scales in the United States. The taxpayer needs to know that the battle must continue, that young minds must develop and school doors must be kept open.

If the national and state education associations can get down to the plain business of thinking about better teaching and will reduce the problems to ordinary language and stress the plain business of teaching and learning, then perhaps the taxpayer will become truly interested and an empathy between the two groups will exist.

As matters now stand, everybody stands to lose — the teachers, their fight for a tolerable wage and educational needs; the taxpayer, his demand for value received and a bit of learning for his youngsters.

SCHOOLS—Six Kentucky high schools were upgraded in accreditation by the state Board of Education. 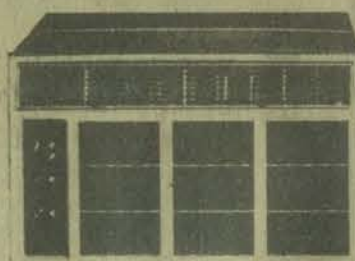

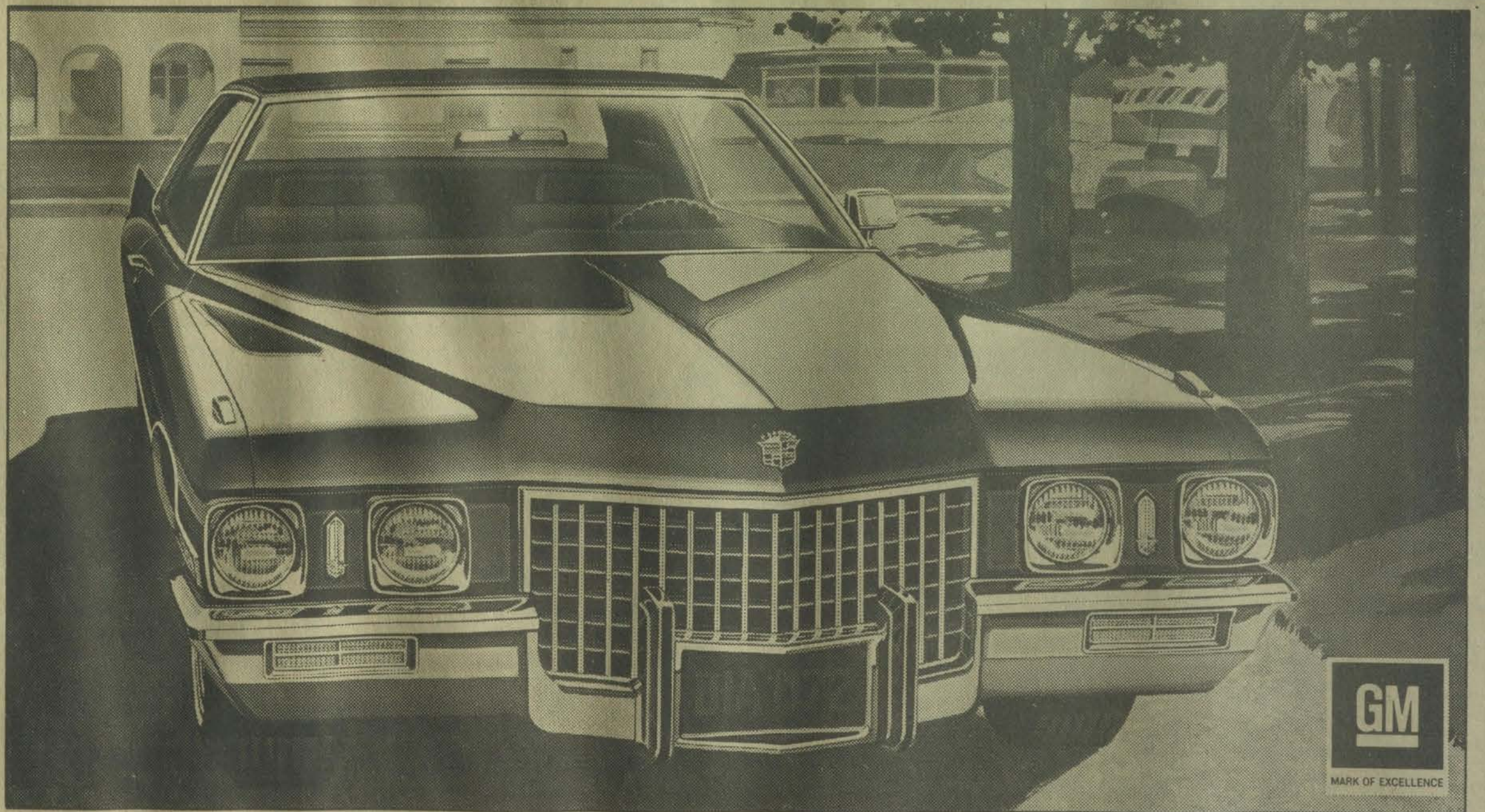

Here's How Mountain Family Benefitted by Self-Help Plan

For all Flo Swiney knows, her ancestors have owned the same parcel of land near Elkhorn City since the area was first settled.

She recalls that her father was reared there, as was for paternal grandfather. She cannot trace her family history beyond this point in time.

But for a while she was uprooted, living on different land across the highway from the old homestead. She and her husband, Perry Swiney, lived in an inadequate frame structure there for 16 years.

Inhabitable land is scarce in this section of mountainous Pike county, but the Swineys couldn't afford to build. "We wouldn't have been able to make the payments," said Mrs. Swiney, even though they already had the real estate.

However, during 1966, the Swineys heard about a cooperative self-help housing program which enables indigent people to build a home without financial hardship. It is sponsored by the Farmers Home Administration (FHA) under the Department of Agriculture.

The intermediary and catalyst was the Pike County Community Action Agency in Pikeville. It operates under the aegis of the Big Sandy Community Action Agency (CAA), which is headquartered in Paintsville.

Under the leadership of director Harry Eastburn, Big Sandy is attempting to eliminate poverty in Lawrence, Martin, Floyd and Magoffin, as well as in Johnson and Pike counties.

The Office of Economic Opportunity provides most of the funds for the six-county program.

Pikeville CAA officials and a FHA field representative explained to potential enrollees that the program includes no less than six and no more than twelve people or families.

Its principal advantages are: FHA pays the salary of a project supervisor; buying collectively, the enrollees can obtain materials more cheaply than if they bought individually; labor is free since the people provide it themselves, and monthly payments are inexpensive.

The Swineys wanted to be included in the project, but they were disappointed to discover at a meeting that no more applications were being accepted.

Still Perry Swiney asked to be placed on a waiting list; shortly thereafter they replaced a dropout.

Starting in the summer of 1966, the buildings—a total of seven in this project—were constructed simultaneously; this way the possibility that someone might quit after completion of his home was eliminated.

Although Swiney says he was never discouraged, he attests that the program was no picnic. "I operate a machine in a mine," he explained. "I went to work at three in the afternoon and got off at eleven. I got up at seven in the morning and worked a half day on the project, before going back to my job."

It was something of a challenge for all the families involved. One man, for example, was crippled, but he still was able to hand material and tools to the others.

Of the seven buildings that were completed by December 1967, four are still occupied by members of the original group: the Swineys, Ervin Coleman, Kenneth Childers and Mrs. Roy Childers.

A second project was also started in this same general area of Pike County. Nine homes were built and all nine original owners remain.

Almost to a man the homeowners are ecstatic about their property. "It's been a wonderful thing for us," said Mrs. Swiney. "We wanted a house, but we couldn't afford the payments."

"I couldn't have built a house any other way, and I have been offered three times as much as what I paid," said Mr. Coleman, who formerly lived with his wife and two children in the dingy basement of his small store.

The Coleman's payments amount to only \$36 a month.

Considering the equity gained, along with the cheap payments, experts consider it one of the better federal housing programs available to indigent people. Also they acquire a skill, such as carpentry, masonry, etc., which in some instances has provided enrollees with gainful employment.

Oddly enough, however, the program is not being utilized in Kentucky. While there have been 29 individual self-help housing loans in the state since the program's inception, there hasn't been one during fiscal years 1969 and 1970 (through Sept. 30, 1970). In the same years, California had 302 and 279 loans respectively, highest in the nation for both years.

That would be incomprehensible to Mrs. Coleman, who has observed some intangible as well as concrete benefits. She feels that some of the enrollees have developed a sense of personal pride that previously wasn't very evident.

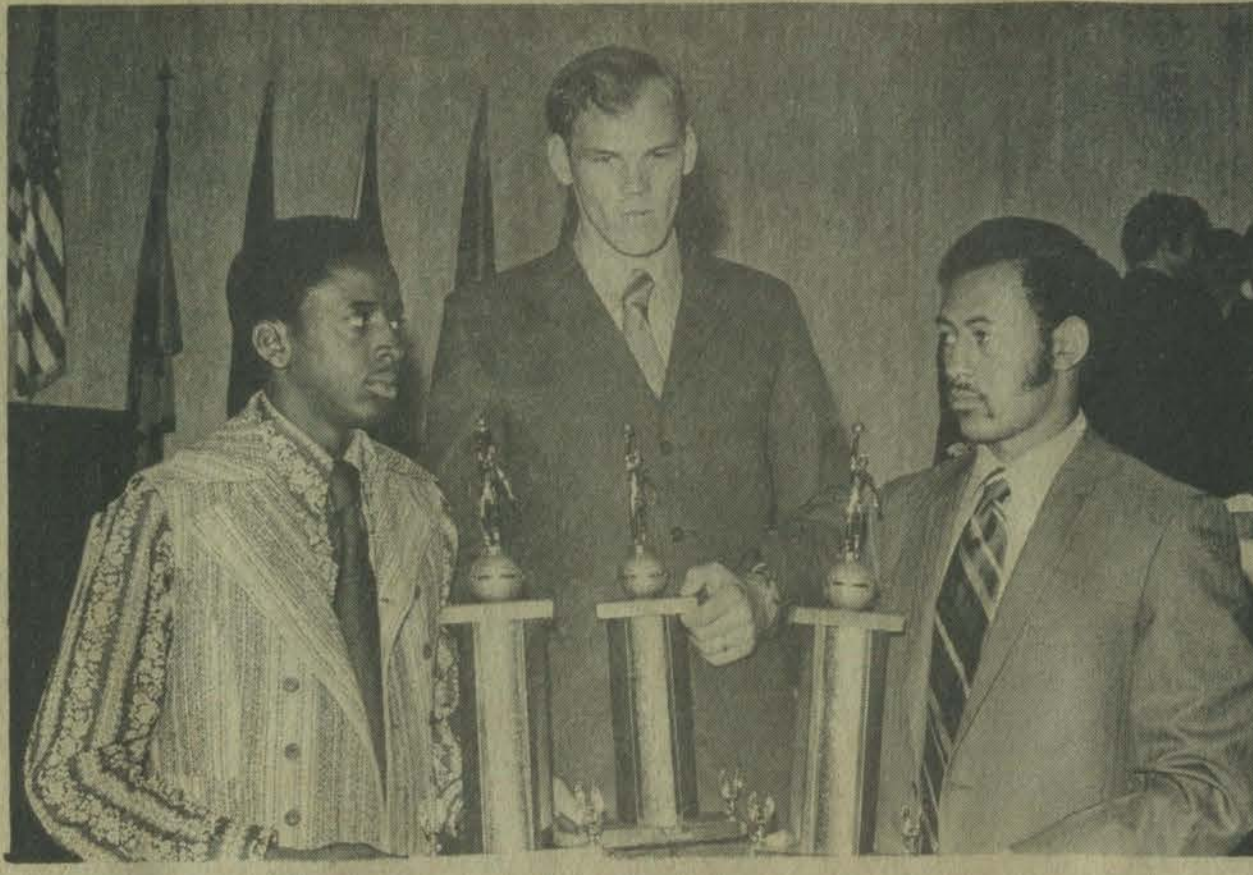

New Technique Used in Surgery

Raymond McGarey, formerly of the Martin-Maytown area, underwent open heart surgery recently at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas. The operation is a recently developed technique which promises new hope for many thousands of Americans now suffering from the most common of all heart diseases—arteriosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries. The procedure consists of removing sections of the saphenous veins from the upper part of the legs, grafting them onto the diseased arteries and bypassing the blocked areas of the coronary arteries. Hospitalization usually lasts from four to six weeks with variations, depending on condition of individual patients. Most patients return to limited activities within three to six months. Mr. McGarey returned to fulltime work in less than eight weeks after surgery. Mr. McGarey retired from the Air Force in 1964 after serving 21 years, and now resides in San Antonio, where he is employed at the Army Medical Aviation Branch as an electronics technician on Army medical evacuation helicopters. He recently described the operation as miraculous, and said he would appreciate hearing from some of his old area acquaintances, at 562 W. Wildwood, San Antonio, Texas 78212.

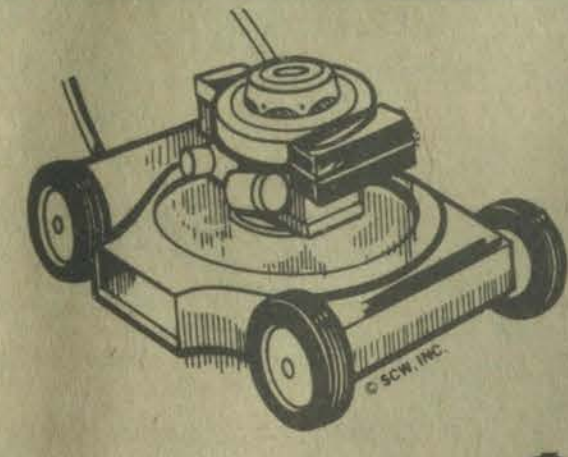

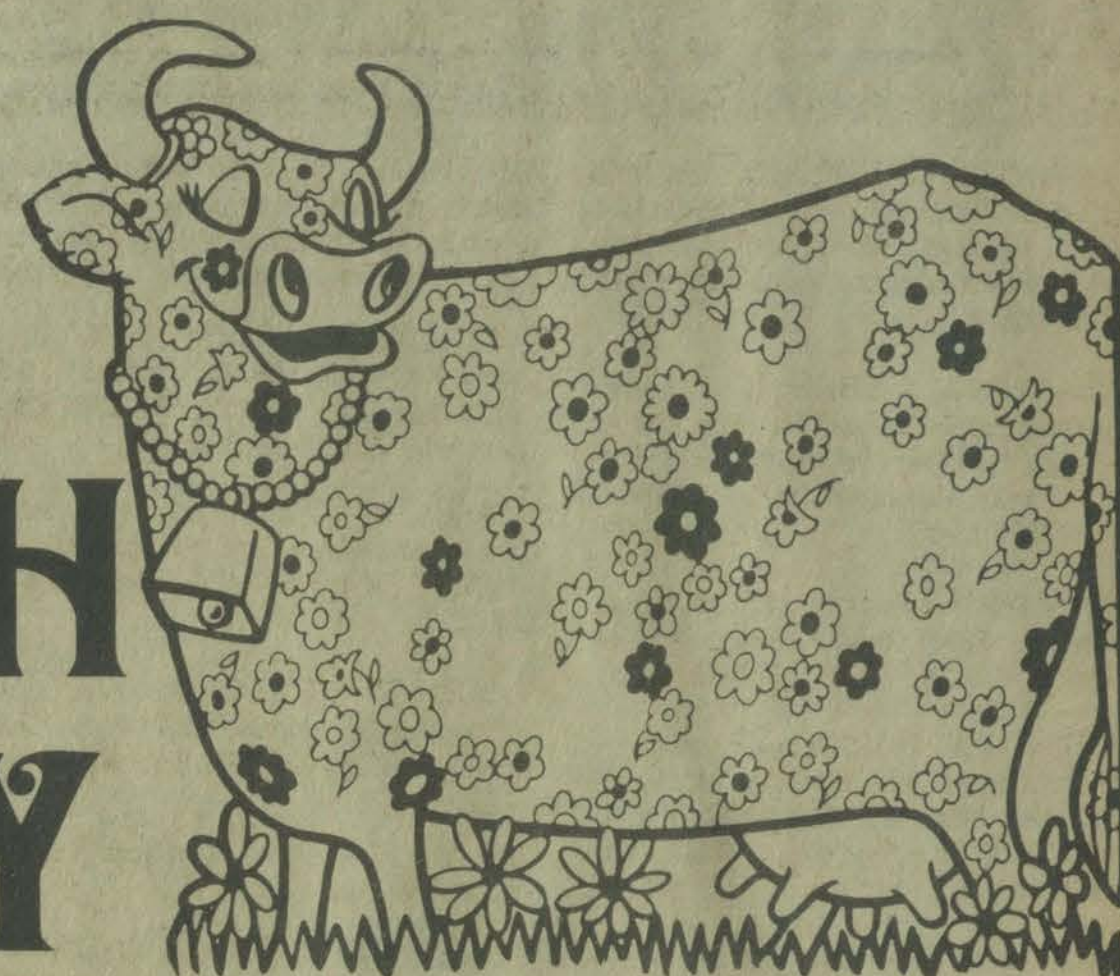

Wins Black Lung Claim



The Black Lung claim of Sam Fraley, of Wayland, has been approved upon reconsideration. Mr. Fraley had filed an appeal on his claim in January, 1971, after his original claim had been turned down.

Mr. Fraley was born in 1912 at Torchlight, Lawrence county. When he was 12 years old, his family moved to the mining camp of Glo, near Wayland. At the age of 16 he began working for the Glogora Coal Company. After working there for about seven years, he transferred to the Wells-Elkhorn Coal Company at Wayland, where he worked for about six years. His next 19 years of coal mining were in the Drift area. He has not been able to work since being injured in a rock fall in 1961.

Mr. Fraley attended school for only a few years. He first attended school at Van Lear, then later at Glo, and at Wayland. He came from a family of 15 children, and had to farm a lot to help with supporting the family.

Mr. Fraley and the former Phyllis Crawford were married at Drift, more than 30 years ago. They have had four children. They have nine grandchildren.

He signed up for Black Lung benefits in January, 1970, and his claim was turned down, the following December. "When my claim was turned down, I figured something was wrong, so I filed the appeal," he said.

At the reconsideration level, the denied Black Lung claim is reviewed by another

team of doctors and trained disability specialists. This team is different from the one that examined the claim the first time. All evidence, evidence previously submitted and evidence submitted in connection with the appeal, is considered. Arrangements are made for any additional examinations, if necessary. In Mr. Fraley's case, no additional examinations were required, however, a medical report—listed as available but not located in the file—was obtained. The revised decision considered the new evidence as well as that previously submitted.

(If your claim for Black Lung benefits is turned down, and you believe this action to be incorrect, you may want to dial Social Security at 886-6291 for additional explanation, and possibly to request a reconsideration of your claim. Full appeal rights apply regarding all Black Lung claims. There is a time limit for filing your appeal. Your request for reconsideration must be made within six months of the date your claim was disallowed. If your claim is denied at the reconsideration level, you may ask for a hearing before a hearings examiner. That request must be made within six months of the date of the reconsideration decision.)

(Whether you want to file an appeal, or to transact other Social Security business, a good starting point is to call Prestonsburg 886-6291.)

Louisa Attorney Is Found Guilty Of Tax Evasion

Mental Health System In State Ranked Tops

The National Institute of Mental Health said, "Kentucky has the best system of mental health care in the country," according to Mrs. Lillian Press, executive assistant to state Mental Health Commissioner Dale Farabee.

Speaking to the Frankfort Community Council recently, Mrs. Press also said two national publications—The New York

Times and Reader's Digest—have inquired into the state's mental health system and were impressed with the program.

The Department of Mental Health has existed as a separate entity only since 1952. Prior to then, it was part of the now defunct Department of Welfare.

Charged with the responsibility to investigate and form programs for mental retardation, alcoholism and drug abuse, in addition to other mental health problems, the department is dedicated to two basic principles:

People have the right to receive treatment when they go to a hospital.

People of the entire state must be able to receive help for their problems close to their homes.

To improve treatment in the state hospitals, patients are more carefully screened before admission. This eliminates unnecessary hospitalization and enables those who really need treatment to obtain the best possible, Mrs. Press added.

She also cited the state's growing program of community mental health centers. "The centers saw 35,000 patients last year while our hospitals processed 10,000,"—The state only paid out about \$1.5 million to the centers.

EDA Grant To Help Stimulate Growth In Perry County

Approval of a \$623,830 grant to help stimulate industrial and commercial growth in Perry county was announced last week by Robert A. Podesta, Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development.

Sanitation District No. 1, with headquarters at Hazard, is the applicant for the funds from the Economic Development Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The project involves installation of a sewer system in the district, which includes the Combs, Airport Gardens and Farmertown communities.

These are areas, local officials report, which possess strong potential for industrial development because of rail and highway access. The district also includes a number of industrial sites.

The sewer system will serve the Hazard Appalachian Regional Hospital, also sites of proposed low-income housing, an elementary school at Combs and a home for the aged.

The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency is making a \$98,170 grant for the Waste-treatment phase of the project. Sanitation District No. 1 will provide \$180,500 from other sources to complete the \$902,500 total cost of the project.

6000 Kentucky Employables Receiving Welfare Payments

Merritt S. Deitz, state Economic Security commissioner, has estimated that 6000 Kentuckians, mostly women, are receiving state welfare payments although they are able to work.

Deitz said there are 35,000 families on the program but "15 to 20 per cent are immediately employable without any added training."

The lack of job openings, transportation and day-care facilities for children were reasons given for the persons who cannot work.

The families-with-dependent-children caseload continues to grow monthly by 800 persons—40 per cent of these in Jefferson County.

Deitz also said the Medicaid program of free medical benefits for the needy is growing rapidly. He estimated that Medicaid, which is costing \$64 million in federal and state funds this year, will rise to \$129 million by 1975 under present federal guidelines.

"Any of the several national health insurance plans now before Congress would be preferable to Medicaid," Deitz commented.

He attributed most of the increasing caseloads to "broader knowledge of welfare benefits" and to work of outside organizations such as welfare rights groups, Appalachian Volunteers and Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA).

"One of the stated purposes of the national Welfare Rights Organization," said Deitz, "is to overload and harass the existing welfare system and make it so expensive it will collapse, to be replaced by a minimum-income system."

VA Loans Are Available To GIs on Mobile Homes

Veterans and servicemen can find answers to their questions about buying a mobile home with a GI guaranteed loan in a pamphlet now available at Veterans Administration offices. J. G. Ratliff, Director of the VA Regional Office in Louisville, said single copies of the pamphlet are available free of charge at the Contact Office of the VA in the Federal Building, Louisville, Kentucky 40202.

Ratliff said the brief pamphlet (No. 26-71-1), "Questions and Answers on Mobile Home Loans to Veterans," is designed to answer questions often asked about the program which was established in December. The VA pamphlet also provides answers to such questions as where a mobile home may be located, maximum loan amounts and terms, general specifications for mobile homes, interest rates and other questions about such housing.

Servicemen on active duty, veterans of World War II, Korean Conflict, and those who served after Jan. 31, 1955, are eligible for mobile home guaranteed loans if they retain entitlement to the VA's maximum \$12,500 conventional home loan guaranty.

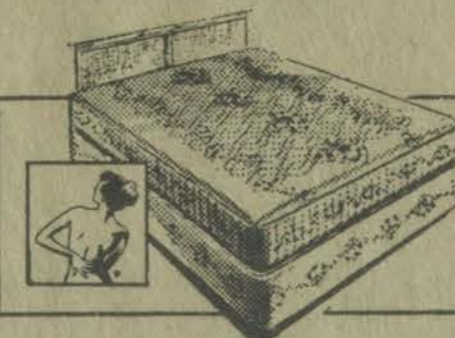

Training of 67 Kentucky Jobless To Cost \$120,476

Four Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA) programs have been approved by the Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare to provide classroom-type training to 67 jobless persons in as many areas of Kentucky.

The Labor Department's Regional Manpower Administrator William U. Norwood, of Atlanta, said that federal funds in the amount of \$120,476 have been approved for the projects which are:

Prestonsburg, where 20 persons will receive training as clerk-stenographers for a period of up to 35 weeks at the Mayo Area Vocational School. Federal cost of the project is \$49,191.

Winchester, where 20 persons will receive training as clerk-stenographers for a period of up to 34 weeks at the Central Kentucky Area Vocational School. Federal cost of the project is \$55,738.

Somerset, where 12 persons will receive training as nurses and orderlies for a period of up to 7 weeks at the Somerset Area Vocational School. Federal cost of the project is \$8,149.

Caldwell labor area where 15 persons will receive training for a period of up to 26 weeks at the Madisonville Area Vocational School located in Madisonville. Federal cost of the project is \$7,398.

The Kentucky State Employment Service determines the need for workers in the occupations in which training is to be provided; refers, tests and counsels applicants for training; administers the payment of training allowance and provides job placement and assistance to trainees upon completion of the course.

The training itself is usually conducted by the State Vocational Education system in public facilities.
