Teacher-Students at Pikeville Lose Their Guide of Nine Years

The summer term which ended Aug. 20 at Pikeville College brought mixed emotions to Charles and Helen Persinger, blind students who have been working toward elementary teaching requirements at the college.

The day meant a well-deserved end to summer classroom work for the Hellier couple, but with it came a note of sadness. Persinger's 11-year-old pilot guide dog, Crown, a shiny-black, female Labrador retriever, was retired that day after nine years' service as Persinger's companion.

Mrs. Persinger's pilot guide dog, Carmel, an 11-year-old female boxer, was retired only recently. Both Crown and Carmel were replaced Aug. 20 with two German shepherds. The pilot guide dogs are supplied free of charge to those who need them by Pilot Dogs, Inc., Columbus, Ohio.

Crown and Carmel have been returned to Pilot Dogs and will spend their retirement years on a farm, Persinger said.

The Persingers hold B. A. degrees from Georgetown College, and both have been employed by the Pike County Board of Education for the past three years as kindergarten teachers at the Lookout elementary school. Persinger is believed to be the only man employed as a kindergarten instructor in Kentucky.

Each of the Persingers has accumulated 22 semester hour's credit at Pikeville College in summer months in the past three years, and each needs three additional hours for an elementary teacher's certificate from the college.

Mrs. Persinger's sight was partially restored by an operation a few years ago, so that she now has limited vision. Her task was made easier this summer, she said, by two of her Pikeville College teachers, Mrs. Gertrude Ison and Miss Louisa Plummer. The two prepared large-print outlines of three "modern math" books for her, a favor which Mrs. Persinger called "a laborious task requiring hours."

Both Persingers were commissioned Kentucky Colonels by Governor Nunn for community service in connection with the Marrowbone Creek Water District project, aimed at providing water for a rural section of Pike county.

WEST LIBERTY, KY.—The state of Kentucky has so many interesting things happening in art that artists and art lovers need a special calendar.

The Kentucky Governors Art Show and Sale coming up Sept. 11-12 at the famous Red Mile in Lexington puts working artists on location. While artists are exhibiting their works for sale, they can arrange their palletes, set up easels or get out sketch pads and record the Red Mile Museum or other buildings on the grounds.

James Young, of Lexington, president of the Bluegrass Artists Assn., thinks Gov. Louie B. Nunn and Mrs. Nunn might attend the show. Recently while a guest in the Governor's Mansion in Frankfort I spent much of my time viewing the many beautiful paintings hanging in the various rooms. I admired particularly the watercolors of Paul Sawyer and the oils of Robert Burns Wilson.

The Sawyer works fascinate me completely. I had mentioned them in articles and when a letter came July 26 with the phrase, "I think I have one of his river scenes," I became excited.

The letter was from Mrs. Ruth Preston of Ypsilanti, Mich. "I am a regular reader of your column," she wrote, "also a former Kentuckian. I was born near Paintsville, so naturally I am always interested in Kentucky History. In your column July 24 you mentioned the great Kentucky artist Paul Sawyer and his watercolors in the Old State House at Frankfort. I think I have one of his river scenes. I would like to have more information on him and his works. Who can I contact for an evaluation of the painting?"

The article she read was about my visit a year ago to the Old State House in Frankfort where I saw a number of Sawyer originals.

A year or so ago the Kentucky Historical Society had reproductions made of some of the works to be sold to society members.

Remembering this, I told Mrs. Preston about the reproductions in case her print might not be an original.

Born in Madison County, Ohio, in 1865, Sawyer's parents soon returned to their native Kentucky. When Paul was a young bachelor he devoted many days to boat trips on streams near Frankfort, painting in both oils and watercolors. When he needed money he sold his paintings for as little as \$10 and \$15.

Sawyer had to be a gentle person who saw the world through a gossamer veil, for his works exude softness—softness in tint and shade and in texture. For this reason he probably was a poor bookkeeper, detesting

the hour when he had to get out a ledger even to record sales, let alone putting down in figures what he owed.

In looking at the artist's rain and snow scenes, it is almost as if one is being wrapped in a comforting cloak or cover; his sunny-day paintings, though carefully rendered as to light and shadow, retain dreamlike gentleness as do his portraits.

In my letter to Mrs. Preston I asked her to send photos of the painting she thought was a Sawyer. She had bought it at a rummage sale because she liked the frame.

Mrs. Preston is the eldest daughter of Joe Stambaugh of River, Ky., and the late Mintie Stambaugh. She is a former postmistress at River and she and her husband owned and operated a general store from 1934 till 1944 when they moved to Michigan.

Mr. Preston was born at Thealka and taught in Johnson County schools 13 years, last in Mayo Business College.

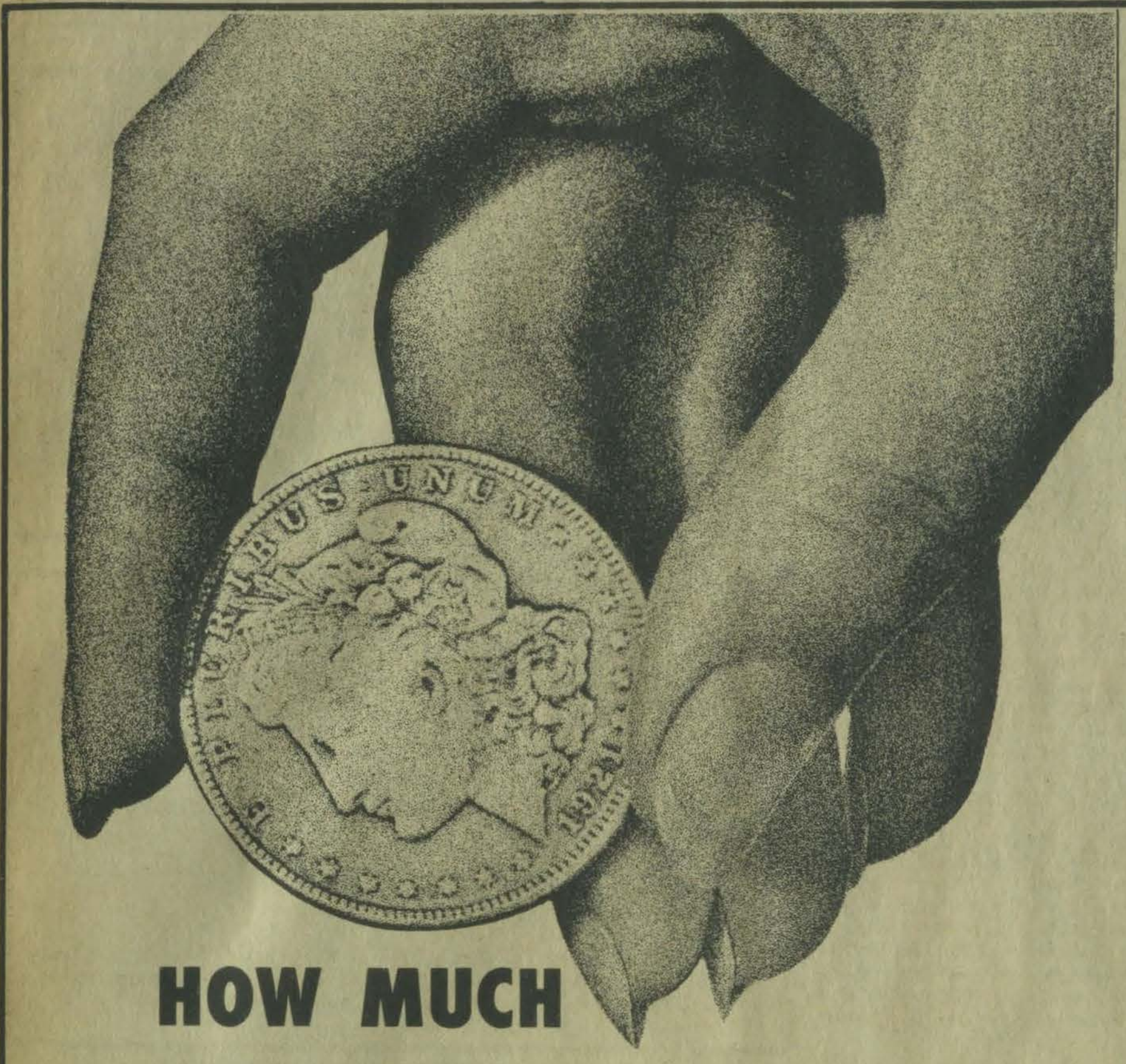
When Mrs. Preston came home from the rummage sale a few years ago with a watercolor under her arm, saying she had bought it for the frame, he jokingly took an encyclopedia from a bookcase and, as if reading from the book, made up several sentences about a great artist named Paul Sawyer. It was a good joke, he thought.

But as it turns out, his wife bought a Sawyer original for a few cents at the rummage sale. When I received another letter from Mrs. Preston with pictures of the painting, it was not necessary to look at the familiar signature to know it was the artist's work. There was no mistaking the signature of the sensitive painter, however—the heavy dash in front of the "P" that was elongated and the long, trailing "S."

The painting can be separated into four triangles: the triangle of sky going up from near the center; the triangle of stream starting near the same point and spreading to both lower corners; the triangle of foliage and grass extends from the same point to the left and features trees along the stream bank. The right triangle shows sheer cliffs rising from the water's edge, topped by trees supporting dangling vines and foliage.

As to an evaluation of her painting, that will have to come from the Kentucky Historical Society or someone who is an authority on Sawyer and his works.

Whatever the value in dollars, Mrs. Preston has done what every art lover dreams of doing—going to a junk shop or secondhand store and buying a painting because the frame is pretty, then learning that she has an original work of an important artist.

Gov. Louie B. Nunn announced that all horses in Kentucky will be vaccinated against sleeping sickness. The program set to begin Sept. 1, should take about three or four weeks to complete. Horse, pony and mule owners can have their animals immunized free-of-charge at vaccination points to be established in each county.

U. S. Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans told a Lexington news conference "The business community of the country has lined up almost 100 per cent in support of the President's control of wages and prices. It would be my hope that the labor leaders will display that same statesmanship."

Consulting engineers for the Kentucky Turnpike, the state's most profitable toll road, have recommended an additional \$328,000 be allocated for maintenance and operations in fiscal 1972. They also called for doubling the road's maintenance reserve fund to nearly \$6 million.

State Health Commissioner William McElwain has recommended a limit of two meals of Kentucky Lake fish per week for people who eat the fish year-round. But McElwain said the ban, due to mercury above safe levels, did not apply to vacationers or other occasional consumers.

Louisville and Jefferson County may soon join New York, New Orleans, San Francisco and five other U. S. cities as a foreign trade zone, according to the Kentucky Department of Commerce. The designation would allow foreign goods to be shipped in, processed and reshipped to foreign markets without paying duty or going through customs as is now required.

Kentucky may not have to develop a statewide motor vehicle emission control program by next year after recent revisions of federal guidelines, the state Air Pollution Control Commission has learned. A U. S. Environmental Protection Agency official told the state commission it should find the contribution that autos make to air pollution in Kentucky to determine if a control program is justified.

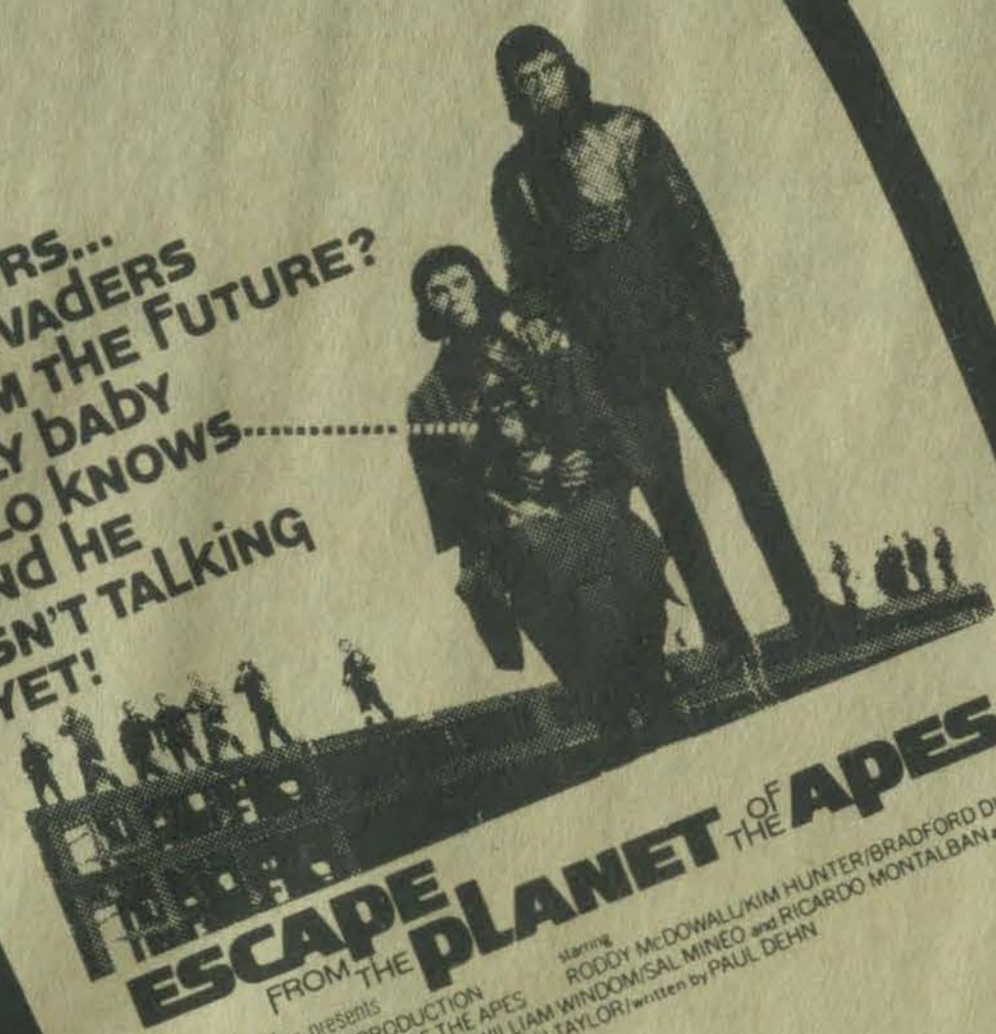

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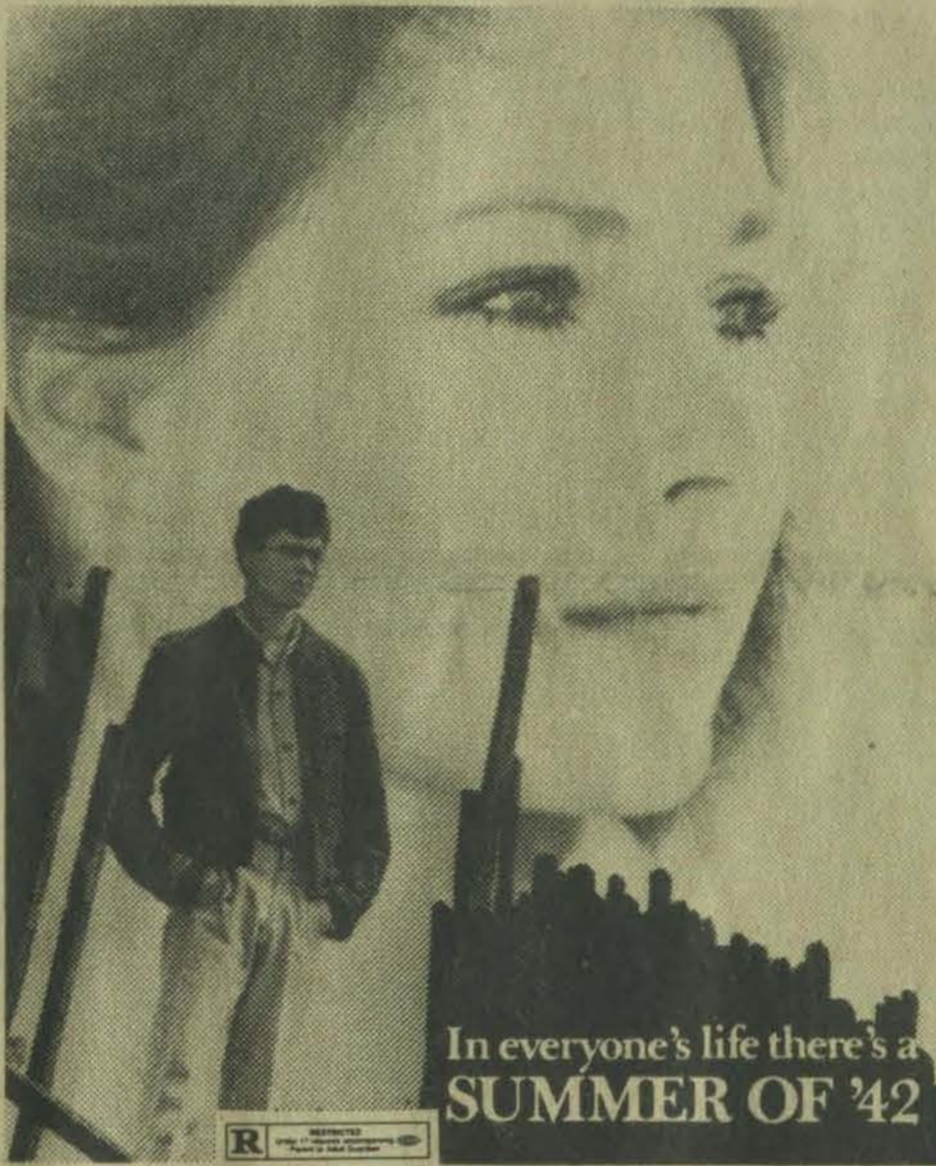

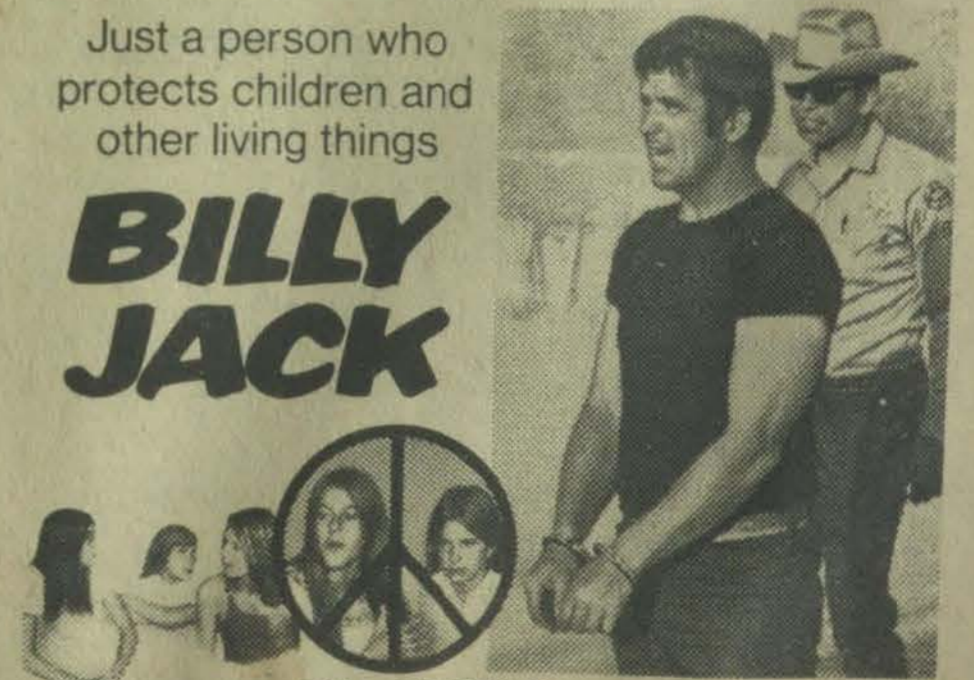

Ask ASCS Offices for Information About President's Economic Moves

Want official answers to specific questions about the recent economic stabilization actions, such as the wage-price "freeze," taken by President Nixon? Then ask the nearest county office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

For all locations except highly urbanized areas, ASCS county offices have been designated as information centers regarding the stabilization of prices, rents, wages, and salaries, according to Paul L. Fugua, chairman of the Kentucky State ASC Committee. "These county offices will provide information only," he said. "I want to emphasize they are not authorized to handle complaints nor to help resolve them, other than to provide the address and phone number of the nearest office of the Internal Revenue Service which will handle complaints as well as provide information."

"Information from ASCS county offices is official," Mr. Fugua said. "When governmental determinations are made on details of the executive order concerning economic stabilization, questions and answers are prepared and sent immediately to each ASCS county office which uses them to answer questions from the public."

"Questions are answered only if an official answer to that question has been received. Otherwise, no answer—and no guess or interpretation—is given. However, the ASCS county office will forward, when requested, questions to the IRS district office to obtain answers," Mr. Fugua said. He pointed out that the county offices will deal directly with IRS in relaying questions. "While our state ASCS Office is being kept informed, it is not directly involved in this information effort. Persons with questions are directed to their ASCS county office for the correct answers," he said.

The ASCS Committee chairman said selection of ASCS county offices as information centers in addition to urban area IRS offices, means that all Americans, regardless of where they live, have ready access to official information on President Nixon's move to stem inflation and strengthen the economy.

"ASCS welcomes this opportunity to cooperate by providing information service to all citizens on economic stabilization for as long as the service is needed," he said.

"Almost all farmers are well acquainted with their ASCS county office," he said, "since it administers USDA farm action programs on the local level, dealing directly with farmers. This service to farmers will continue at the same time the added information service is being provided for all persons."

Floyd Represented At Sex Education Meet at Lexington

"Sex Education-A Community-wide Effort" was the theme of the Helen B. Fraser Maternal and Child Health Conference in Lexington, August 4-6. 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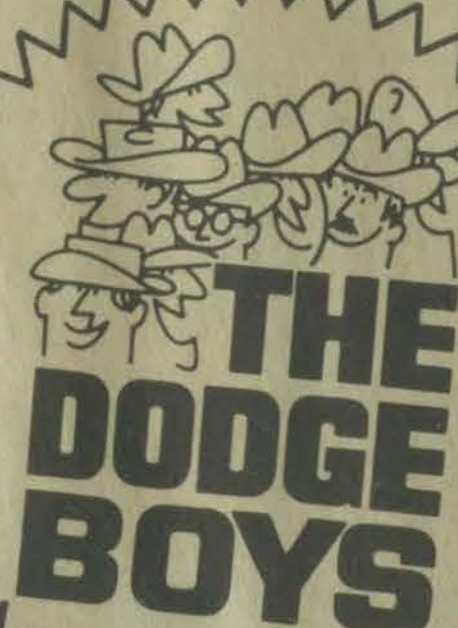

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Nature Trails

Odd Nestbuilding Ways of Birds

The kingfishers, those grayish-blue birds with the white collar and the fish-spear bill, are the oldest tunnel-makers on earth. These birds dig a tunnel in the side of a bank along some stream and they never stop digging until they have made a tunnel that may be from 10 to 15 feet deep. At the end of this tunnel they prepare the nest for rearing their family.

Mother kingfisher often saves fish scales and bones to use as a sort of weird decoration for the nest. Usually five or six eggs are laid on the bare ground at the end of the tunnel. These industrious birds often meet with tragedy in constructing their tunnel. The top of it may cave in for several feet, trapping the birds, which seem unable to tunnel to the outside before being suffocated in the closed-in tunnel.

The female of this species is more flashily dressed than the male; she wears a glowing band of chestnut red on her lower chest. The male has a single band on the breast and is called the "belted kingfisher." Kingfishers are also called "the feathered Ike Waltons of the bird kingdom." Their "song," if such it can be called, consists of a loud, wild rattle, which is given while flying. The fish these birds capture for food are mostly small, consisting of chubs, chokes, hogfish and others of small value to the fisherman.

The Water Ouzels, Called Dippers

These birds mostly range in the wild, turbulent streams of the west and are the only members of their family. These are about the size of a robin. The body of one of these birds consists of soft, thick feathers that sheds water like a duck's back, so that the bird keeps dry even while ranging about a tumbling waterfall. They always build their nest near the water of a plunging stream, so that the spray can keep the nest dampened. If the nest material gets too dry, the birds carry water to dampen it. The nest is made of soft, green moss that always looks fresh and green from being constantly dampened. The nest is arched with green leaves and has a small, round

doorway for entrance. It is often placed behind a raging waterfall, so that the birds have to fly through the water to reach the nest. They are born to love the foaming waters of mountain streams. Four or five white eggs are laid in the nest.

The dippers are noted for singing the whole year around, and their song is often loud and bubbling like that of the Carolina wren. It is also said to suggest the wild song of the mockingbird. Oddly enough, these birds get their name, "dipper," from their habit of constantly dipping up and down, even when standing still. Their actions somewhat resemble those of another water-loving bird, the Louisiana water-thrush, common in our mountain brooks. The dippers are also known to walk under water and enjoy diving through a plunging waterfall. These birds are also noted for having white eyelids, which they wink constantly. Some writers on birds report that the dippers can really fly under water as well as walking under it. They seem to love cold water and have been known to dive under the ice and come out at some distant airhole. It is said that if one is near a stream where the dippers live, he can toss a pan of water high in the air and these birds will quickly fly through the falling water as if they enjoyed a shower bath.

Robins, The Nest-Plasterers

The robins build their nests mostly out of mud, which they re-enforce with twigs and leaves. The nest is shaped like a small bowl and before the mud dries hard, the female robin gets in it and turns 'round and 'round, molding the nest to fit her breast. If the robins are building during the dry season, when no mud is handy, they make their own mud by taking dry dirt in their mouth and mixing it with water in some still water hole or sometimes in the bird bath. Sometimes a family of robins meet with disaster when rains soak the nest and soften it, causing it to fall apart; windstorms also often blow the nest out of trees, sometimes destroying the young ones. The eggs of robins are light blue, with no markings, giving rise to the expression, "robin's egg blue," to describe a color.

The adult robins have red breasts but the young have the spotted breasts of the thrushes, to which they belong. The robins are the first birds to wake up and sing on fine spring mornings and their songs have long been regarded as a token of good cheer; the song actually seems to sing: "Cheerily, cheerily, cheer up, cheer up. Forbush says of the song of the robins: "On every fine spring morning a wave of Robin songs rises on the Atlantic coast to hail the coming day and so preceding the rising of the sun, roll on and on across the land until at last it breaks and fades away on the distant shore of the Pacific ocean."

The White-Eyed Vireo

This noisy little vireo with the cotton-white eyes and the two prominent wing-bars of white, set off by "yellow spectacles," is called the "politician bird," as it searches diligently for pieces of newspapers to use in nestbuilding. The nest is a hanging structure constructed of strips of bark and grass and decorated with rags or pieces of paper. The white-eyed vireo is a bird of fence rows and thickets and its peculiar call is commonly heard all through spring and summer days. The call invariably ends with a "chick" sound and often goes like: chick-a-poor-wee-o-chick! The bird is a staunch guardian of its domain and orders intruders away with peremptory commands of, "Beat it! Get out, chick!"

The Red-Eyed Vireo

This bird displays all the skill of an expert basket-maker in its nestbuilding. The nest is placed in the forks of some tree or bush and is expertly woven of plant fibers and strips of bark, fastened neatly with spiders' silk. The bird often displays its artistic ability by decorating the nest with the cocoons of moths or abandoned nests of the paper wasp. The red-eyed vireo's nest ranks next to that of the Baltimore oriole in

its beauty of form and structure. This bird is sometimes called "the preacher bird," as it "preaches" or orates its slow, deliberate phrases over and over all during a summer's day. It is a handsome, sleek bird with a black stripe over the eye bordered by a white one, the only vireo with such eye-markings. It is said that this vireo sings more songs in any season than any other bird known.

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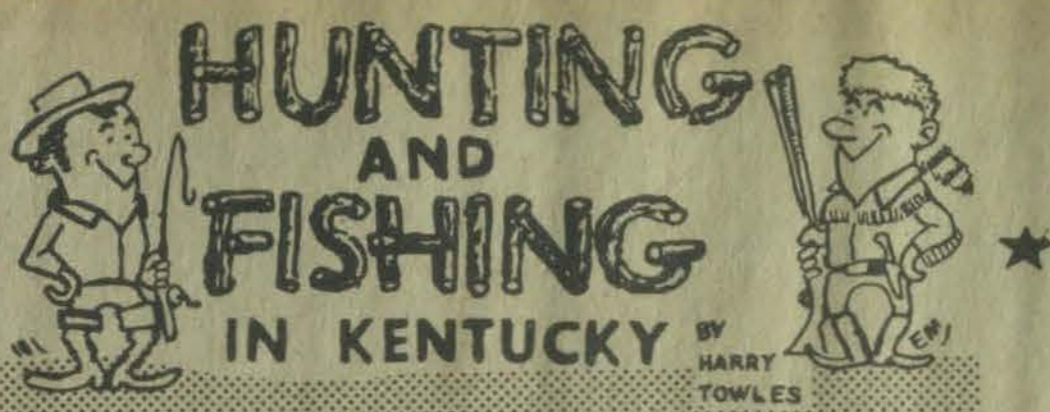
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FRANKFORT, Ky.—In the past two or three weeks there have been many bad days for fishing, due mainly to high water levels resulting from unusually heavy rains.

Most often in the midsummer season there is too little water in the impoundments — too little and too hot to offer real good fishing. This year there is too much water. Although the water temperatures have been much lower than average this summer, this great influx has caused the lakes to rise and fall like a yo-yo.

There are those who will tell you that fish will not bite on rising or falling water, claiming that the changes in water levels cause the fish to become frightened, seeking the deeper water out of reach of the fisherman's lure.

There are many views on the effect of this rising and falling action. Some say that on a rise the fish will hit vigorously; that they'll not hit in falling water. Some say just the opposite. Others claim they'll hit neither on a rise nor a fall, and there are those who claim water fluctuation makes little difference. So take your pick.

But you may be able to pay some heed to the trotline fishermen who make their very best catches during a mild water rise. When it's falling they might as well take out their lines, they say.

Having dispensed with all the variables, we can go on to more tangible results. It's a fact that Lake Cumberland, for instance, has had its waters lapping at or above the timberline for the past few days. That is unusual to say the least. Usually at this time of year this lake's waters may be from 15 to 25 feet below the timberline and these shallower waters make the beds of the tributaries more accessible to fishermen.

Dale Hollow Lake water level has been most unusual this summer. It is also at the timberline, and this is almost unheard of at this period of the summer for Dale.

And so it goes with other lakes — all having abundant water, sometimes murky, sometimes muddy, sometimes clear, but rising and falling by the dictates of the extremely heavy rainfall.

Again, we say this fluctuation has had an effect on fishing, and it's for the worse.

But on the other hand, there is a plus sign as a result of the "monsoon" season in Kentucky. The water temperature at one foot below the surface is much lower this August than it was for the same period last year. And with the cooler water, fish should bite better.

According to the readings taken by conservation officers, the average temperature for the first nine days of August this summer is almost three degrees lower than it was for the same period last year, and three degrees to a fish is a lot.

In speaking "for" the fish let us hasten to point out we are guided by their actions. For instance, when the white bass are ready to run, they'll hang back at 59 degrees, but when three degrees are added, they'll start their move into the shallow waters. This is at least partial proof that three degrees can make a whale of a difference to fish action.

Nevertheless, let's remember that Kentucky is a good fishing state, one of the best, and we are due a bad year occasionally. It's just like the farmer, who can expect an inferior tobacco crop every once in a while.

Ky. Health Chief On Lake Mercury

State Health Commissioner Dr. William McElwain has issued a statement urging fishermen not to regularly eat fish taken from Kentucky Lake.

However, Dr. McElwain said he did not "see any cause for alarm" in the mercury contamination in the lake at this time.

He stressed the ban on lake fish applies mainly to families who "eat fish 52 weeks out of the year."

He did say, however, pregnant women should not eat fish from the lake at all.

Tidbits of Kentucky Folklore

"TREATS"

Some of the institutions that have passed have left adequate successors, but no successor has yet been found for the old-time treat. Boys and girls of our time, who are used to having apples, oranges, and candy whenever they wish, can never know the rare and wonderful joy we experienced when the last day of school came and the teacher gave a treat. There were a few indications, even in those remote days, that the institution was passing, for some teachers in districts adjoining ours were said to be failing in their duty toward their pupils. We of our school frankly suggested that such teachers should not be allowed to keep school any longer.

No matter how bad the weather, every child appeared on the last day of school and was fully able to eat, though he may have been kept at home for a week or two previously on account of illness. Sometimes the parents and the younger brothers and sisters appeared on the last day. Usually there was a sort of closing exercise, such as the saying of pieces, but nobody paid any attention to pieces, for the whole school was consumed with hunger. While some of the Friday-afternoon classics were being given, the teacher gave a knowing wink to two of the larger boys, who forthwith disappeared out the door, while children and visitors craned their necks after them and left the poor little boy who was saying his piece to butcher Mary's little lamb or take some of the twinkling out of the equally famous little star. By the time the last piece was said, the boys returned with a candy bucket or a box or a sack or two. Wiggling youngsters could hardly wait until the packages were unwrapped. As I remember it now, there were three time-honored things in a treat: stick candy, candy in small bits, and apples. Not all appeared at any onetime, but one of these had to be present to keep up the tradition. The candy was passed around by two boys, who had previously been instructed how many sticks or pieces each pupil might have. Peppermint was the commonest flavor of the stick candy. The small bits were of many varieties: gumdrops, mint hearts with sayings and verses stamped in red on them, peppermint chunks, caramels, and kisses wrapped up in oiled paper and containing a small slip of paper with a very exquisite verse on it. Candy kisses deserve a whole essay or even a whole volume, for they were remembered long after the treat was eaten up: the little verses were kept in the front room and often helped in the Sunday-afternoon entertainment of Sister's beau. The sentiments were as sweet as the kisses themselves, the very best one being, of course:

"The rose is red,
The violet blue,
Sugar's sweet,
And so are you."

The apples, to come back once more to the treat, were small and knotty, judged by present standards, but no ambrosial food served on Mount Olympus to grace a gathering of Greek gods ever tasted as they did to us. My, how those gumdrops stuck to a fellow's teeth! And how easily the candy crunched! And how I wanted to murder the rowdy boys who took more than their share of the treat! The happiest faces present were those of small children who were not old enough to come to school. No doubt many of these youngsters right then and there resolved on a like of learning if its course were to be punctuated with treats like this.

After the treat had been served, and while belated ones were munching their last apple cores, it was the conventional thing for the teacher to make a brief speech of goodbye, telling how much she hated to give up the children, how good they had been, and how it was highly probable that some of them might become President or Governor. We pupils, still smacking our mouths over the treat and also still as starved as when we came to school, believed every word and forgot the whippings and the stayings-in and the standings-up, which had all been so poignant the day or even the hour before. However, though we shed a few furtive tears when the teacher's voice trembled, probably because it seldom did in the regular days at school, that did not keep us from yelling like Indians the minute the school was dismissed, for we all pretended that we were glad the school was over.

Since those days I have tasted all sorts of candy: home-made, store-bought, and other sorts, but nothing has ever had the flavor of stick candy, and kisses, and gumdrops. Other candy melts in the mouth; good old gumdrops, or "tooth-pullers," as we called them, had a way of staying put for long time. And I have eaten bushels of Grimes's Golden and Stark's Delicious apples, but apples of all sorts are tasteless beside those knotty ones we used to get on the last day of school.

Appalachian Education Workshop Draws 11-State Representation

Pippa Passes, Ky.—The second annual workshop on Creative Education for Appalachian uplift which ended last Friday was "rich in understanding of regional history, politics, religion, education, and culture," said Dr. Peter Barnett of Alice Lloyd College, which hosted the group, on its campus here.

More than 50 participants and 27 instructors or lecturers met "to prepare new members of college and university faculties to face the challenges of living and teaching in the Appalachian South," according to Dr. Barnett, director of the program.

Students and faculty from 11 states, ranging from New York to Texas, came to the workshop sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education under the Education Professions Development Act.

Alice Lloyd College Dean William R. Hughes said the workshop was the largest

and most productive conference held at the college in recent years. Most of the participants were given academic graduate credit at the University of Kentucky or undergraduate credit at Alice Lloyd College.

Dr. Edwin Vaughn, a West Virginia native recently appointed professor of sociology at the University of Missouri, wrote the original proposal for funding the workshop, taught in the program last year, and returned this summer to give professional guidance. "It was very encouraging," he said last Friday, "that the students this year were able to be involved with local people in such matters as welfare, strip mining, public health and other vital concerns. Also, greater insights into mountain art and literature were gained this year."

Speakers in the program came generally from the Southern Appalachian region. They included Dr. Harold Doster, chief executive officer of Potomac State College, Keyser, W. Va., and former academic dean at Alice Lloyd College; Congressman Carl D. Perkins, of the Seventh Kentucky district, Billy Best and Ilyal Jones, of the Berea College Appalachian Institute and Studies Program, and Harry Caudill, attorney and author, Whitesburg.

Prof. Lawrence Baldrige, Alice Lloyd College sociologist, gave a sharply focused examination of some problems facing mountain communities. Bennie R. Bailey, also a sociology instructor at the college, discussed the potential of social service programs for the Appalachian Region. Participants were given a close-up view of mountain life-styles by Appalachian authors Jack Weller, Hazard, James Still, Hindman, and Lee Pennington, Jefferson Community College, Louisville.

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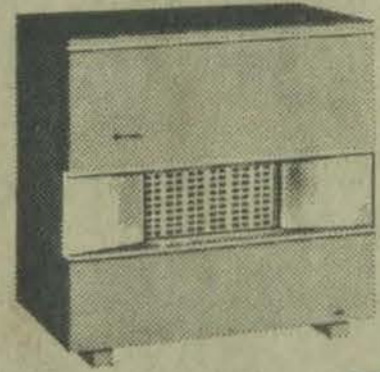

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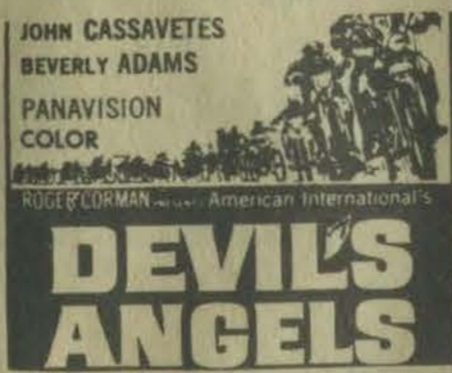

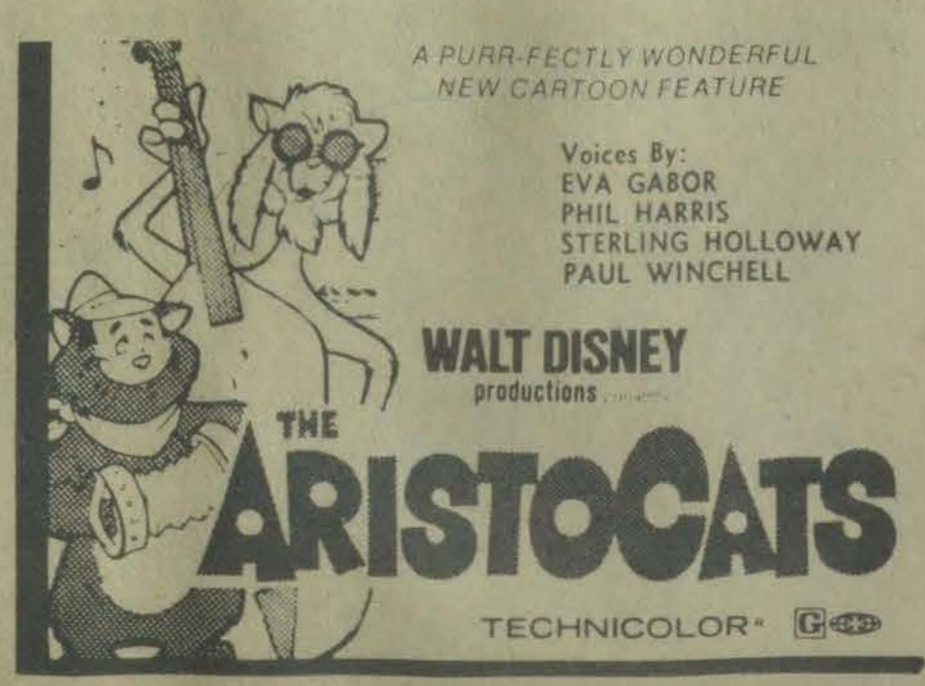

Horse Vaccination Set for September

Beginning around Sept. 1, all horses in Kentucky will be vaccinated against sleeping sickness and lifted an embargo on horses entering the state.

The embargo has been in effect since Aug. 9 to prevent the spread of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE) into Kentucky. The disease has killed hundreds of horses in several southwestern states this summer.

All equine animals, including horses, ponies and mules, will be included in the vaccination program. The cost of the program, expected to reach between \$1 and \$1.5 million, will be borne by the federal government.

Governor Nunn said the vaccination will not be compulsory as long as the horse industry cooperates with the program. State Veterinarian L. G. Northington said the state would set up from one to six vaccination points in each county, depending on the size of the horse population.

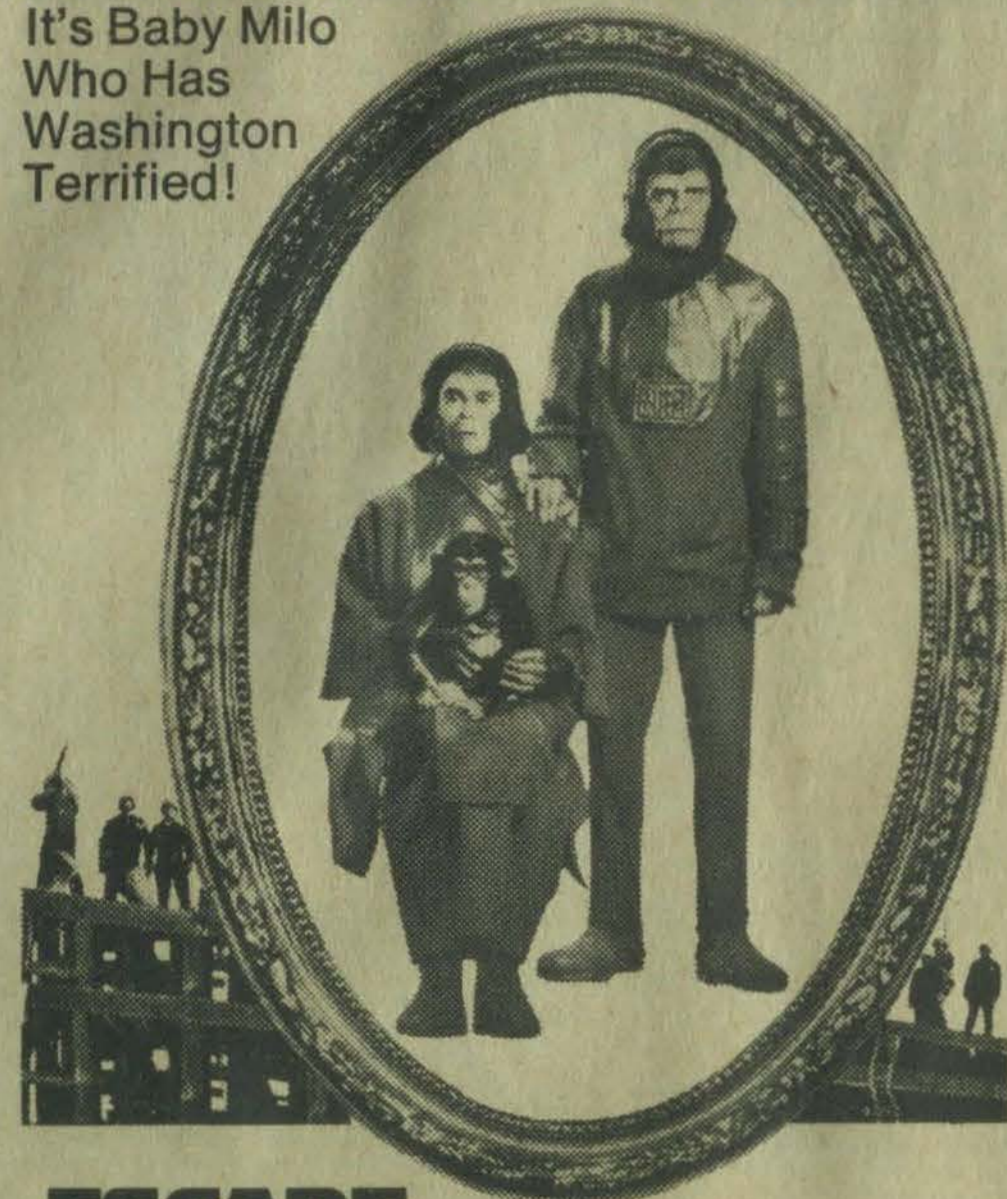

Radio Station WLKS In Morgan Enjoined In Wage Violation

Secretary of Labor James D. Hodgson has obtained a court order in the U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky, permanently enjoining Morgan County Industries, Inc., which operates radio station WLKS in West Liberty, from violating the minimum wage and record-keeping provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The order, approved by United States District Judge Bernard T. Moynahan, Jr., also provides for payment by the defendant of \$650 in back wages to be distributed by the Department of Labor to four employees of radio station WLKS.

The complaint filed in this case resulted from an investigation conducted under the supervision of Area Director Ernest C. Orr, U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division, Lexington.

According to the complaint filed by the Secretary of Labor the Fair Labor Standards Act is applicable to the defendant and its employees because they are engaged in commerce or in the production of goods for commerce within the meaning of the Act.

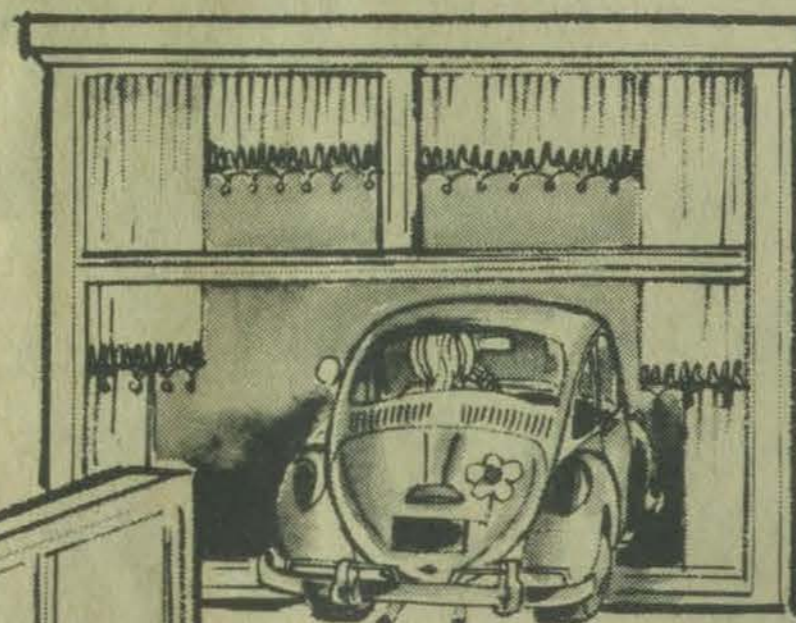

Stans Discusses the Environment, Says Controls May Be Continued

LEXINGTON, KY.—U. S. Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans told the American Accounting Assn. that members of that profession today must be educated and trained not only in the traditional concepts of accounting but to grasp a wide range of social and economic issues that face both government and business.

Stans addressed the group's annual meeting and held a news conference afterwards on the University of Kentucky campus.

The secretary touched on the environment, consumerism and long-range planning procedures by government and businesses.

The Council on Environmental Quality has said the nation will need to spend more than \$100 billion in the next five years to clean the environment up.

"Ultimately, every cent of this cost will be translated into higher taxes or higher prices for consumer goods," Stans noted.

He said the nation is rapidly developing a patchwork of laws and regulations enforced by new agencies at various levels of government. "What we need is to clean up the environment in an orderly way, at a reasonable cost," he said. "We must set out orderly courses for local governments to follow, for agriculture to follow in halting pollution and for achieving progress by the public and others equal to the progress demanded of industry."

Because of some of the criticisms of American enterprise, relations have become strained recently between buyer and seller, the customer and business, industry and public, Stans said.

"There is just no arguer over the central theme of consumerism," he said.

State To Train Providers Of Emergency Medical Care

The state departments of Health and Public Safety are launching a series of advanced courses in emergency medical care in 15 Kentucky cities.

The program, funded with a federal grant from the Comprehensive Medical Emergency Service Project in the U. S. Department of Transportation, will run for the next seven months.

Plans for the program were developed by a special project planning staff with the help of the state's 16 Comprehensive Health Planning Councils.

The course will cover all aspects of emergency medical care and transportation of the sick and injured.
