

Condemnation Action Views Expanded PCC

Suit Would Add Five-Acre Tract To PCC Campus

Trustees of the University of Kentucky last Thursday filed for UK's Prestonsburg Community College suits in Floyd quarterly court to acquire by condemnation proceedings approximately five acres of land which, it is claimed, the college needs for its campus.

The land, all of which lies at the western end of the present campus, is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Graham Porter and Mrs. Susan P. Elliott, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Absher and James D. Hopson.

Three separate condemnation actions were filed. Mrs. Elliott is a resident of Huntington, W. Va., and Mr. Hopson resides at Paintsville. All other defendants are Prestonsburg residents.

From the Porters and Mrs. Elliott a tract of 3.49 acres is sought. The Abshers' tract comprises 1.5 acres, and Hopson's 2 acre. County Judge Henry Stumbo later named three appraisers to set an evaluation of the three tracts.

Acquisition of the property has been hanging fire for the last two years. The college contends that the additional acreage is necessary to planned development of its campus and that the trustees have been unable to contract with the owners for acquisition of the property.

Idle David Mines May Reopen In Early August, Official Says

The Patsy Development Company, Inc. closed its two mines at David June 16, but Ralph T. Huffman, Falls Branch, Tenn., president of the company, is hopeful that operation can be resumed early in August. The layoff of employees idled 64 men. Twenty-four others were scheduled to be laid off at the end of last week, reducing the company payroll to only supervisory employees.

Patsy Development, which began operation of the David mines in the fall of 1968 after Princess Coals had suspended work there, is dependent upon domestic coal sales, with a large part of its market centered in the Chicago area. Air-pollution control measures adopted there include limitations set on the sulphur content of coal shipped into Chicago or used there, and this has affected the market.

Mr. Huffman said that in the past his company has been able to stockpile coal at David during the summer months when the market was dull and then sold at a profit during the winter. "This is not the case this year, with a declining market and other circumstances beyond our control," he added.

"After reviewing the long-range sales picture, it appears," Huffman said, "and it is our present plan, that we can again resume operations about August 7."

Operation of the company's tippie continued last week, but it also is expected to be idle.

Courage of Crippled Daughter Spurs Mother To Resume Study

A 34-year-old Stanville mother of six and two of her daughters received their grade school diplomas at Betsy Layne recently—all on the same day.

But the story of the advance in education for these three involves much more than the mere awarding or receiving of certificates.

Mrs. Jarrell dropped out of school at age 15 when she married Raymond Jarrell, a miner. Her daughter, Lovada Lee, now 17, had polio when she was 30 months old. She has undergone 11 corrective operations, the latest last Thursday at Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington. She will face surgery three times more. She has been confined to a wheel-chair 15 years.

Yet the plucky youngster was determined to have an education. She earned her grade school certificate as a homebound student of Dorothy Hall.

Seeing the determination of her crippled daughter to get an education, even if all her study must be at home, the mother enrolled in an adult education class taught by Mrs. Norah J. Scaif who had been her teacher when she first entered school as a child. Meanwhile, Mrs. Jarrell's other daughter, Ramonia Kay, was earning her eighth grade diploma as a regular student at the Betsy Layne elementary school.

The mother and her daughters are resolved to continue study in college. But, says Mrs. Jarrell:

"As much as I want to further my own education, I want, most of all, to see Lovada walk again, at least with the aid of crutches. It may be that she will after the three remaining operations that are scheduled for her."

Strip-Mine Work Halts When 200 Protest Danger

A Tinker Fork of Mud Creek strip-mine operation operated by a Pike county man was closed down Monday when a reported 200 persons from the area joined in a demonstration.

It was claimed that the demonstration followed a buildup of fear among residents of the area that the operation, said to be owned by Paul Justice, of Pikeville, was creating a silt basin to what was described as "the danger point."

Nick Frasure, who was listed as one of the demonstration leaders, said:

"Chester Newsome, of the UMW local at Ligon, walked up to one of the bulldozer operators and told him the people were there to stop the job. When he kept on running the dozer the people walked up an joined Newsome. The operator tuned his engine off, got down and said he wouldn't operate it again. Newsome told the foreman that if it was started again, everybody in the valley (Mud Creek) would come back the next time."

Ingram Allays Last of Doubts On Emma Span

Rural Highway Commissioner Otto Ingram issued a statement Monday designed to allay any doubt surrounding the future of the bridge proposed for construction across the Big Sandy river at Emma.

Said Judge Ingram: "We intend to build the Emma bridge. The simple fact is this: The Levisa Fork (Big Sandy river) is considered a navigable stream, and approval by the Coast Guard must be given on design and plans for any bridge that crosses it. We have taken a calculated risk in that we have proceeded with design of the bridge, although we do not know what the Coast Guard will demand. We did this to cut the time of waiting for actual work by eight or nine months. The \$40,000 to \$50,000 cost of design comes from the emergency fund, not from the Floyd county apportionment."

"We are hopeful and emphasize that word, 'hopeful'—that by January 1, 1973 the design and plans will have been completed and accepted by the Department of Highways and the Coast Guard, and then we will immediately put the machinery in action to get to work on the bridge," the commissioner added.

Dept. Gives Over Lease At German Corps of Engineers Begins Improvement Of Camp Facilities

The Kentucky Department of Parks surrendered its lease on the German Bridge camp area, effective June 16, and the U. S. Corps of Engineers immediately began work to provide camping facilities there in more attractive surroundings. The state department had held the lease on the area since the early 1950's.

First of all, the Corps of Engineers, with the help of college students involved in a work-study program and three Mainstream workers, cut the grass and weeds and burned down the two old pit-type privies in use there, replacing these with four fibre-glass toilets, with six more to be installed later. Registration control was instituted, so that now every person entering the area must register, although there is no charge for use of facilities. The registration building at the site is manned 24 hours a day. Seventy-five new picnic tables have been ordered for early installation. Twenty-five refuse cans have been placed in the area, and perhaps 40 others will be made available soon. Railing has been installed to prevent driving over the area, and the boat launching site has been roped off to permit launching without interference from persons not using it.

A water system is scheduled for activation within a few weeks. This will include a storage tank and chlorination of the water supply. The access road to the area is now being given a gravel surface, and the area is well-lighted.

Dean Murray, Dewey Reservoir manager, said the Corps hopes to blacktop the area road next year and to provide more shade trees for campers and picnickers. In the planning is a complete new unit with showers, restrooms and laundrette.

"We will try, too, to provide electricity for campers, possibly using coin-operated receptacles," Murray said.

The camping area involves approximately eight acres of land, and the proposed improvements will involve the expenditure of an estimated \$400,000.

Mr. Murray said the improvement already made at the camping area would have been impossible without the help of the students working there and the Mainstream employees who have been helping.

County Water, Sewer Funding Await Planning

Floyd county communities have filed with federal agencies applications for grants and loans totaling \$6.5 million for the financing of water and sewer projects, but until an overall plan for the county is completed little, if any federal money, will be made available.

But for action taken by the General Assembly at its recent session, the situation could be darker. Until new legislation was enacted, both planning and zoning at the county level was required. This long process—Pike county planning required 18 months—threatened long delay, and the General Assembly's new act permits planning at the area level, and a deadline of June 30, 1973 was set for all areas of the state. The act leaves zoning to be done later in a separate action.

Explaining the situation, Robert Tidwell, area planner, said here last week that it is hoped a contract with a consulting firm to

Columbia Officials Say Shortage Forces Sales Limits for Gas

Columbia Gas System officials maintain that they cannot get enough gas to serve new residential or business customers in Kentucky.

The officials testified last week at a Public Service Commission hearing on the firm's request to approve its announced policy designed to cut off any requests for new or expanded gas service in Kentucky.

They attributed the problem to a nationwide energy shortage that hit natural gas especially hard because it is sold for less than the others and is more desirable as well because of environmental factors.

Under the company's new policy, no applications would be approved for new industrial or commercial customers or for any increase in such sales to existing customers. No new private homes would be hooked up for gas service after Sept. 1.

Columbia Gas now serves 113,000 customers in Floyd and 50 other Kentucky counties.

The commission set another hearing for July 25 for opponents of the plan to bring their witnesses.

PSC Chairman William Logan directed Columbia Gas of Kentucky in the meantime to try to obtain sources of gas other than its parent firm and to report back to the commission on the progress of that effort within 30 days.

Opposing the new policy at the hearing were representatives of homebuilders in Lexington and several industrial users of natural gas, especially in the Ashland area. They maintained Columbia Gas did not advise its customers of the impending gas shortage far enough in advance, even though the firm saw it coming more than a year ago. The industries affected, also said

they had valid contracts allowing them to get additional gas.

The first notice of the firm's policy to refuse to serve new customers came when Columbia files its current request with the PSC April 1.

Under questioning by Harry Miller, attorney for the Lexington homebuilders, one official acknowledged the company was promoting increased usage of gas through 1971, with bonuses and advertising.

That acknowledgement came from Robert Bennett, an official in the firm's Charleston office who is responsible for estimating gas needs and supplies in Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia. Bennett said the firm's promotion program had been winding down gradually from the spring of 1970 to last April.

William Howard, a vice president for operations and planning in the Charleston office, said none of the system's affiliates, including Columbia Gas of Kentucky, could get more gas next year than it is now.

Those Losing Jobs By Flood Offered Employment Help

Governor Wendell H. Ford announced last week that funds are available for persons in 10 Kentucky counties left jobless as a result of damage done by flooding during the period April 12 through April 21.

Ford designated the Department of Economic Security as the agency responsible for taking claims and making payments of unemployment assistance available under the National Disaster Relief Act of 1970.

President Nixon declared the 10 counties a major disaster area on May 15. A contract with the U. S. Department of Labor had been signed for disbursement of these funds to those who became unemployed as a result of the disaster.

Counties to receive assistance include Floyd, Breathitt, Bullitt, Franklin, Knott, Letcher, Lincoln, Madison, Pike and Wayne.

In order to be eligible, individuals must have been employed or a resident of one of the specified counties and must have lost employment or have been prevented from securing employment as a result of the disaster.

Claims will be taken by Employment Security personnel at all offices and itinerant points throughout the state.

The Governor stated that eligible unemployed individuals must file their applications for disaster unemployment assistance within 30 days.

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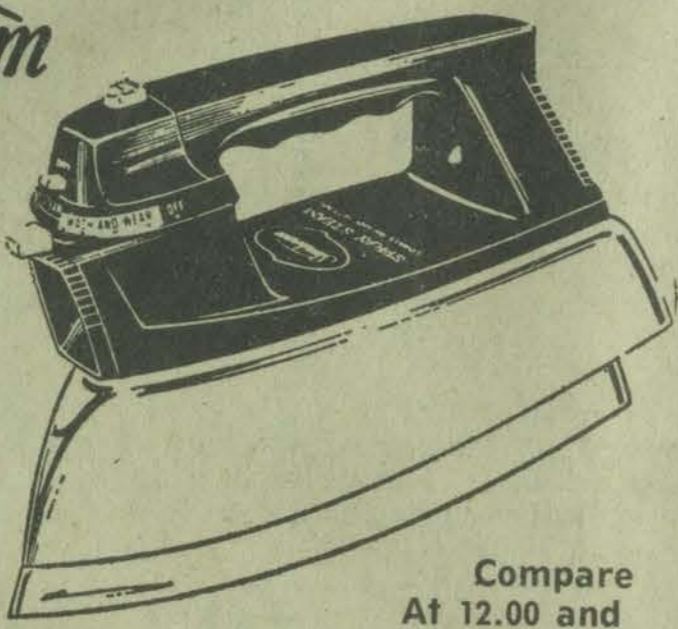

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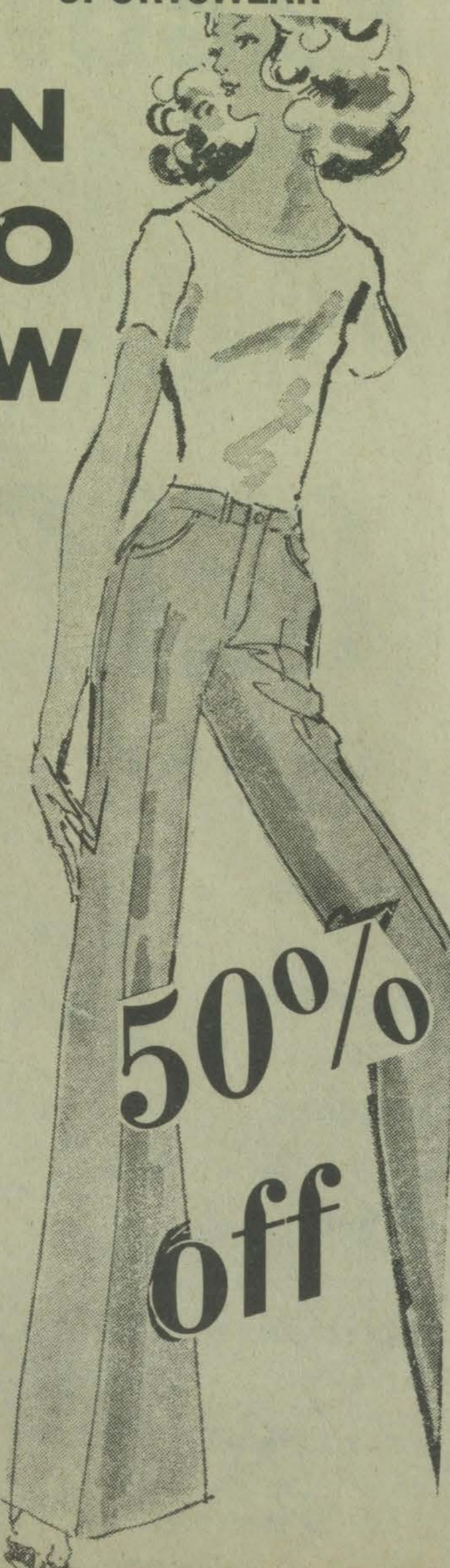

Floyd Road Fund For Fiscal Year Set at \$137,240

Governor Wendell H. Ford and Highway Commissioner Charles Pryor, Jr. last week announced the 1972-73 county road aid program for Floyd county. It is based on an allotment of \$137,240 for the coming fiscal year.

The program provides maintenance for 166.4 miles of county roads and five bridges. The mileage listed includes 66.3 miles of blacktop and 100.1 miles of traffic bound surface.

The maintenance activities authorized will be accomplished by the Floyd county road department with the Department of Highways furnishing the materials.

The county road aid program began in 1936 when the General Assembly selected this means of helping the various counties of the Commonwealth meet their responsibilities for local roads. It is supported by an annual appropriation from the general road fund.

The appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1 is \$13 million. This sum is distributed among the 120 counties according to the terms of a formula chosen by the General Assembly in 1964.

The program is selected annually after consultation between the Department of Highways and the Fiscal Court. A formal agreement has been signed by officials acting for the department and the court. It lists the roads to be maintained and the work to be done.

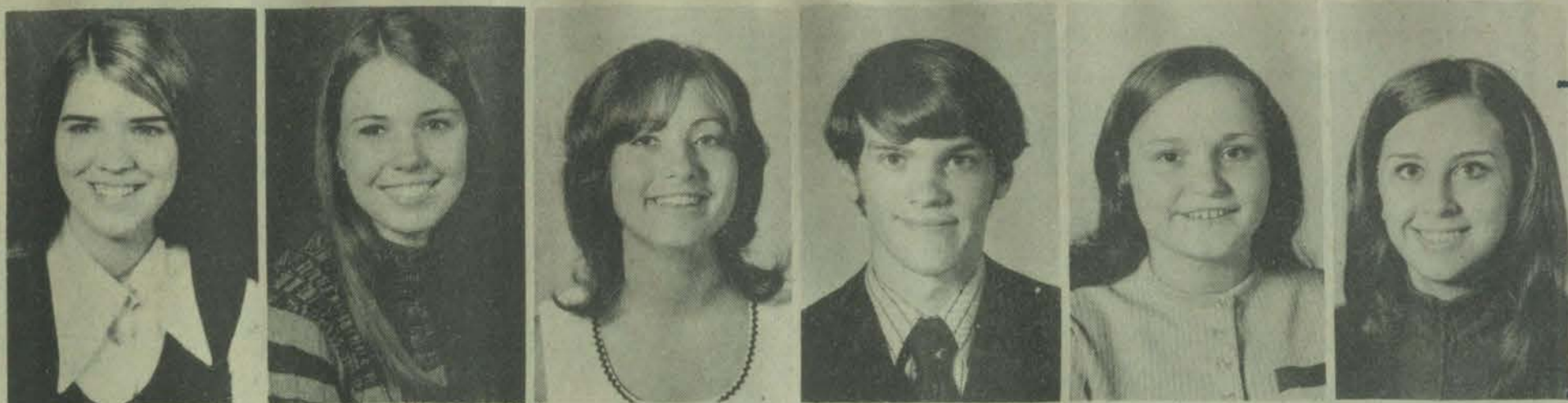

Frasure also was quoted as saying that those living below the silt dam has "become nervous wrecks, scared that the dam would break and wash them away, like Buffalo Creek."

Homer Hamilton, chairman of the Appalachian Group To Save the Land and the People, said a written complaint about the strip operation were sent to Governor Nunn before his term expired and another about six weeks ago to Governor Ford. There has been no action from Frankfort, he added.

The demonstration was staged on the same day that a joint federal-state effort was begun to weed out dangerous coal-slag dams in this part of Kentucky. The U. S. Bureau of Mines office here recently said a complete inspection tour of the entire area showed no dangerous dams in this county.

One such dam in Hale's Branch, Knott county, near Carr Creek, has been considered dangerous and a potential threat to 30-40 families below it. Another dam, which was created by construction of a roadway to a cemetery, is a mile west of Jenkins. Three families live below this dam, which is scheduled for removal.

136 Water Deaths in Kentucky, Preventable Says Health Dept.

Ninety-six drownings and 40 accidental deaths by water transport were recorded in Kentucky in 1970, according to the latest vital statistics report published by the State Department of Health.

Those deaths were preventable, says Dr. R. L. Hall, of the Floyd County Health Department. Safe Boating Week, July 2-8, has been designated a time to re-emphasize that safe boating is no accident, he says.

The Federal Boat Safety Act of 1971 requires all sailors—canoeists and just about everyone else afloat—to carry approved lifesaving devices for each passenger. There's a reason for such a requirement. In an auto accident, if you survive the first minute, you are probably going to be all right. In a boating accident, when you find yourself in the water, your troubles have just begun. Not only having a lifesaving device at hand—but wearing that device—could save a very important life—yours.

Going boating without the proper equipment is against the law. On federal waters, craft up to 16 feet long must carry proper lights and a fire extinguisher if of closed construction. Craft from 16 to 26 feet long must carry, in addition, a hand whistle or horn audible for at least one-half mile. Larger pleasure craft, up to 65 feet long, require a hand or power operated whistle audible at least for one mile, and a bell.

Boaters are advised: If your boat should capsize, don't attempt to swim to shore. Stay with the boat. Most pleasure craft will stay afloat even when capsized or filled with water. Hang on and wait for help to arrive.

In bad weather, stay in port. If you're caught out on the water in bad weather, however, don't lifesaving devices and head for the nearest sheltered shore. If the weather is very choppy, seat your passengers on the lowest part of the vessel, keeping them as close to the centerline as possible, and head into the waves at reduced speed.

If your motor fails, or the water gets so rough you can't make headway, attach a sea anchor from the bow to keep the boat headed into the wind—a bucket or a shirt with the sleeves knotted together attached to a line will do the job in an emergency. Keep calm. Panic spreads easily, and a

well-constructed small boat is capable of surviving nicely in bad weather if handled calmly and correctly.

Carry a fluorescent orange distress flag. It's the perfect daytime distress signal because it lasts all day long, unlike a flare, which is spent in only minutes.

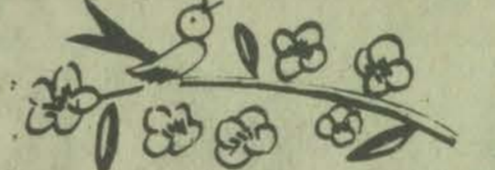

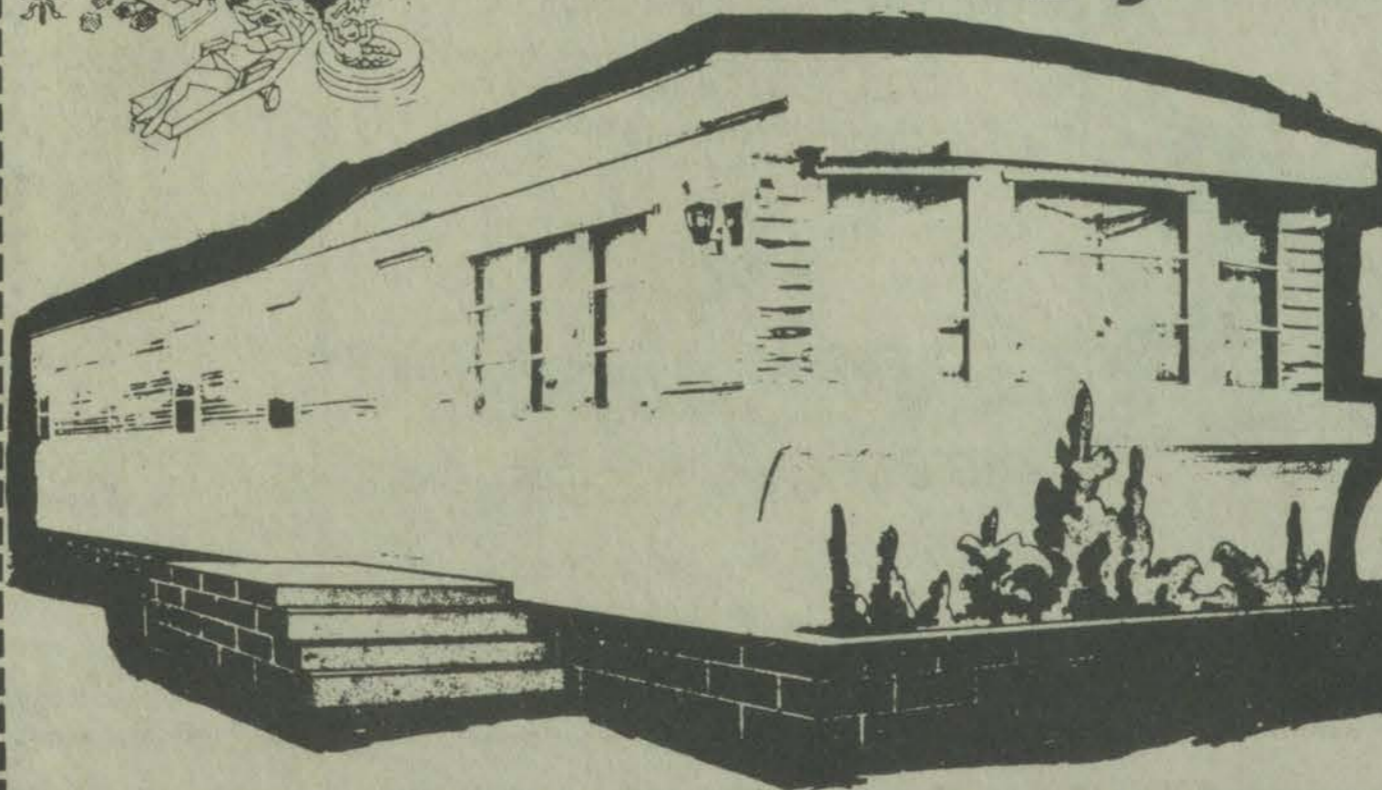

New Medical Clinic For Knott

"It has been a long hard pull," commented Knott County Extension Agent Bill Francis who, along with County Judge Sid Williams, served as fund-raising chairman and co-chairman, "but the results have well justified all the effort."

Francis was speaking of the June Buchanan Medical Clinic now under construction at Hindman. On a non-profit basis, the clinic will provide medical care, dental care, child care, and other medical and clinical services to the people of Knott county—services that, heretofore, they had been unable to obtain without first traveling long distances.

Containing more than 11,000 square feet of floor space and costing in the neighborhood of three-quarters of a million dollars, this "peoples' project," not only seems to represent community development in its highest form, but also adds validity to the oft-repeated statement that whatever man can conceive, he can achieve. Although it is being financed in the major part by a federal grant, to bring the dream of this medical facility into reality required the cooperation of all the people. This cooperation was secured and more than that; they put up \$153,000 as their share of the cost—not a small amount of money for an isolated mountain county with little industry.

In speaking of the fund-raising effort, County Agent Francis said this money came from small property owners, coal operators, and others. No business gave less than \$300 and sizeable donations came from at least two banks outside the county. And Mrs. June Buchanan, of Alice Lloyd College, donated the land for the clinic.

"Just about everybody that could," he said, "gave something, and those that couldn't, gave moral support which, too, was important in getting the job done."

This new facility is within the city limits of Hindman and will be complete with laboratories, X-ray machines,—in fact, all the necessary and modern equipment found in up-to-date clinics located elsewhere. It

will have offices and facilities for visiting medical teams and specialists, nine beds for emergency patients, and will be staffed by registered nurses and four doctors.

Hindman already has two of these doctors, Francis said, and when the clinic is complete, they will be joined by two other physicians who recently graduated from medical school.

WHAT DO YOU BUY AT THE GROCERY?

After your next trip to the supermarket, check through the items you bring home and see how much of your "grocery money" went for non-food products. Last year, a typical supermarket stocked 8,500 different items. Over 3,200, or 38 percent, of these were non-foods. About one third were health and beauty aids and the rest were household supplies of various sorts, housewares, and pet products, according to UK Extension home economists.

WIPE OFF CAN TOPS.

Wipe the tops of canned goods with a damp sponge before opening to help prevent dust from contaminating the food. This tip comes from Extension nutritionists at the University of Kentucky. And, for baby food and other jars with vacuum-held tops, wash around the outside of the jar with hot, soapy water. Otherwise, the rush of air going into the jar when you break the vacuum seal could bring contamination from the outside of the jar with it.

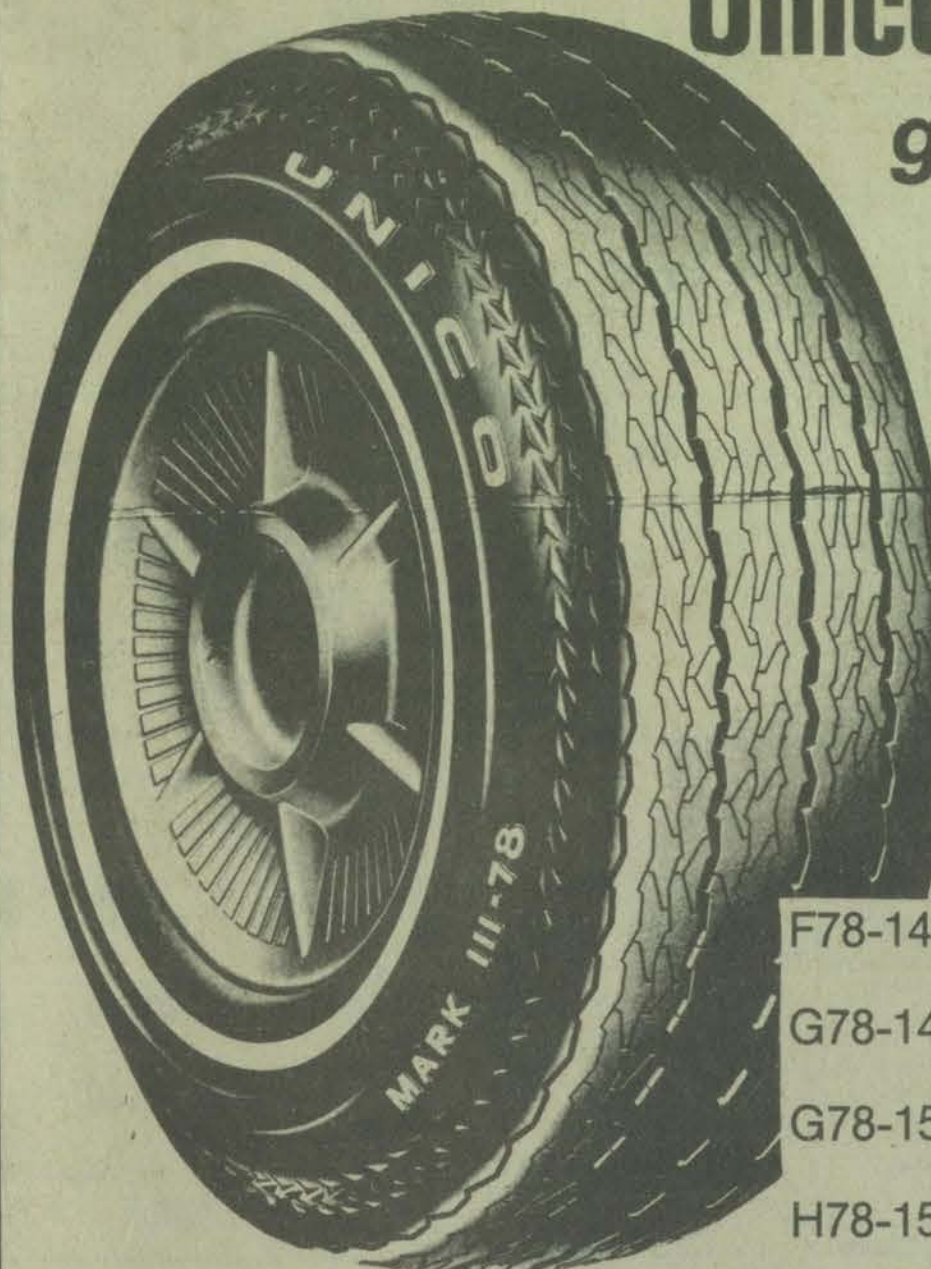

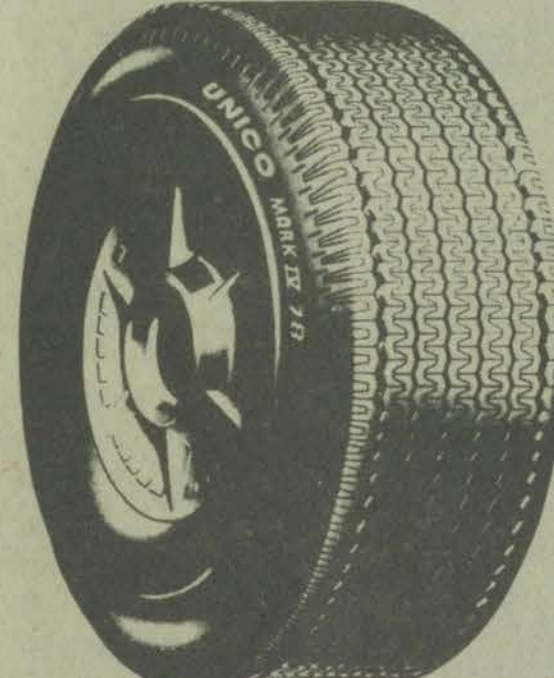

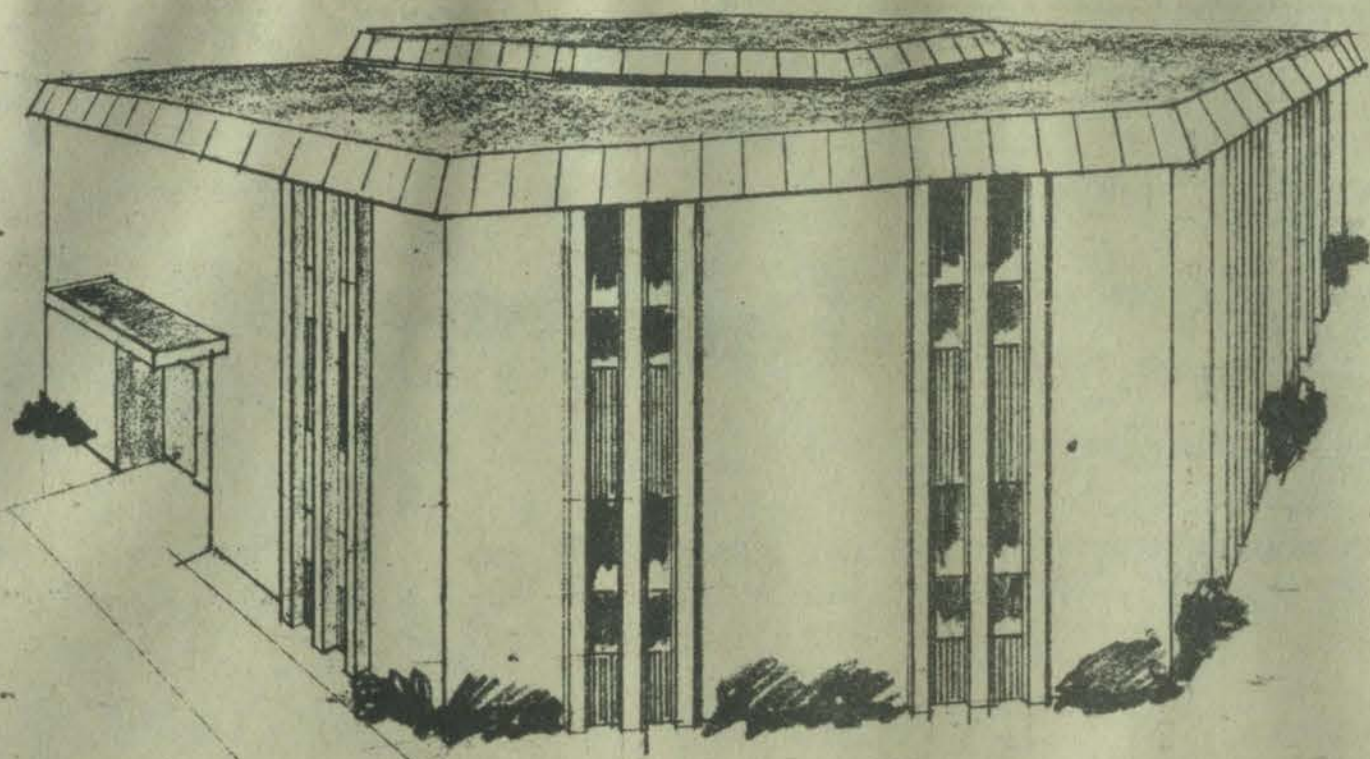

Mines Commissioner Urges Special Care

Commissioner H. N. Kirkpatrick said records show that large numbers of mine injuries occur when men return to work after vacation. Some result from conditions which develop when a mine is idle for a short time, but most happen because workers naturally take a while to fall back into safe work routines.

"Most of our miners have their vacations during the last of June and the first of July, and it seems to require a few days for them to get back into the proper groove," Kirkpatrick said. "We urge all miners to be especially careful during the first two or three days back on the job."

Kirkpatrick especially cautioned underground miners to make a thorough examination of the roof in their working place, when they enter the mine and at frequent intervals throughout their shift.

do the water-sewer planning for this county will be executed by August.

The state has from various sources approximately \$500,000, he said, to finance planning in 17 development districts of the state. The other four already have their plans completed.

Joe McCauley, executive director of the Big Sandy Area Development District, said area planning will be rushed and every effort made to get work on the projects in this and other counties under way as quickly as possible.

Although planning at the area level is possible, the Floyd fiscal court was told last Wednesday by Mr. McCauley and Mr. Tidwell that it is important that planning at the county level also be made. Tidwell explained that planning would involve land use, land use analysis and community facilities. Mr. Tidwell explained:

If an improvement were considered necessary and federal funds were needed, the chance of getting such help would be vastly better if county planning were done. The Housing and Urban Development Administration (HUD), for instance, he said, scores communities on a points system. If Floyd county wanted to develop a county park, say, and went before HUD with its county planning program complete, points would score in its favor. "The things you've done, the more points you pile up, and the better you compare with other counties or communities which at the same time are competing for HUD funds. When your point total compares favorably with others, you're in line for help—otherwise, you're not," he told court members.

Pike county has its comprehensive planning done. Magoffin county has its Planning Commission appointed, Mr. McCauley told the court.

"We don't want to be last," County Judge Henry Stumbo commented.

The fiscal court some months ago invited mayors and other officials of the county's five incorporated communities to meet with it on a comprehensive planning organization. Some communities have expressed an interest, but none of their representatives have attended a court meeting.

Although the court is ready for county planning, it prefers to delay an attempt at zoning until a wider and more thorough understanding of what zoning means is acquired by the public.

It was explained by McCauley and Tidwell at the court meeting that zoning in rural areas would affect residents so little that it would not be evident. But as development continues, houses are built and businesses established, it was pointed out, zoning will become a necessity to protect the people.

In the discussion of protection this instance was cited:

A property-owner in a Floyd town called the health department to report that his neighbor had installed a septic tank and that its lateral field was within 20 feet of his well. Zoning, it was pointed out, would prevent such a situation.

Ford Announces Crackdown On Traffic Law Violators

Frankfort, Ky.—Gov. Wendell H. Ford last week announced a new, stepped up program of traffic enforcement for Kentucky highways.

According to the governor, State Police Director Larry G. Boucher earlier in the week issued an order directing all of Kentucky's 16 state police post commanders to launch concentrated patrols on every road in the state where past accident and traffic violation frequency experience has shown the threat to motorist and pedestrian safety to be the greatest.

Each post commander was instructed to begin organizing a special unit of about four to six troopers who, working together in a team effort, will move from county to county in a coordinated, statewide drive to arrest traffic offenders.

In announcing the new get-tough policy, the governor referred to an earlier and highly-published campaign by state police

over last Memorial Day weekend which saw troopers across the state donning black armbands as part of a "We Care" program to focus motorist attention on the spiraling death toll in Kentucky.

It was to kick off that campaign that Governor Ford held seven fly-in press conferences at airports across Kentucky to issue a personal plea for safer driving.

While that campaign was considered a success for its significant reduction of Memorial Day weekend fatalities (from 17 in 1971 to seven for the 1972 holiday period), it was described as only the beginning of a comprehensive effort. The next step will emphasize a different approach to traffic surveillance and enforcement, the governor said.

The new statewide patrol effort, scheduled to begin in about one week, is to be headed by Maj. R. F. Norsworthy, state police field commander.

Contacted for details about the new program, Norsworthy said that all post commanders and trooper public information officers are being called to Frankfort for a briefing before the patrols get underway.

Each of the troopers selected to take part in the patrol effort will be assigned a vehicle equipped with radar or VASCAR speed timing devices, he said. In addition, they will be backed up by the state police air patrol.

Both roadblocks and moving traffic surveillance techniques will be used. Norsworthy also said that he hoped local police and sheriffs' offices would act to back up the special units within their own jurisdictions.

"Our people from each post will be talking with local officials about the program in the near future," he said.

In addition, Norsworthy said that each post's trooper public information officer would keep the local news media advised in advance of the enforcement teams' general location on a regular basis, both to alert the public about their presence in a particular county and to permit on-the-spot news coverage of their activities.

The first statewide evaluation of the teams' impact on the traffic accident rate is expected to be delivered to the governor's office about 45 days after the teams begin operating.

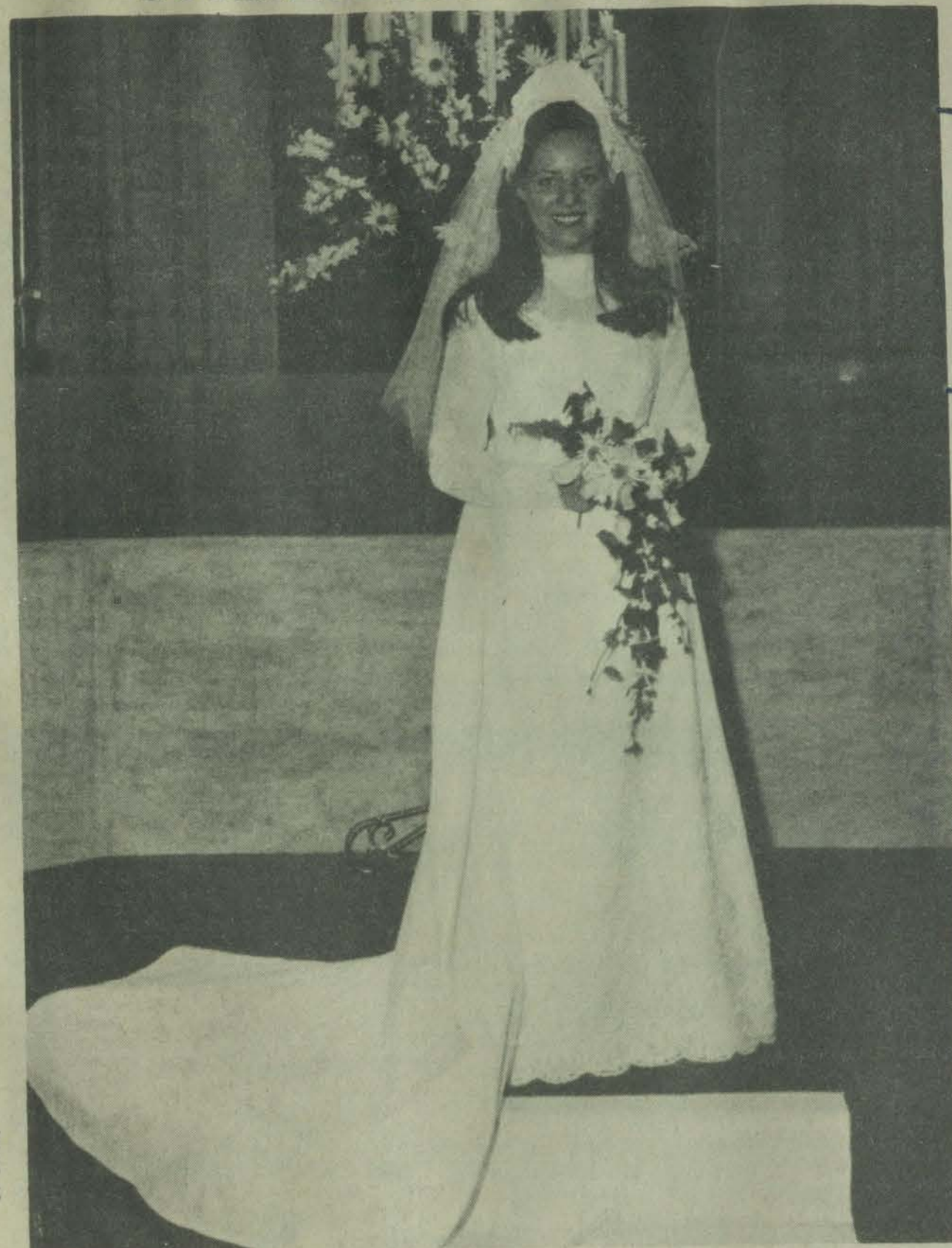

Campsite Contract Called Invalid

The State says a controversial contract for private development of campsites at Kentucky Dam Village State Resort Park, Gilbertsville, is and always has been invalid.

The contract was signed during the final week of the Nunn administration and has drawn heavy criticism since then.

The state Property and Buildings Commission has unanimously recommended that the Parks Department notify the contract holder, Holiday Campgrounds, Inc., that the contract is null and void.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Charles Runyan suggested that approach, on grounds that the original contract lacked essential information concerning the development and accompanying sewage treatment facilities.

Runyan said there are many legal opinions to the effect that a contract must

spell out all aspects of an agreement in order to be valid.

Because the campsite development contract lacked such essential information, Runyan said, Atty. Gen. Ed Hancock felt it was invalid from the beginning.

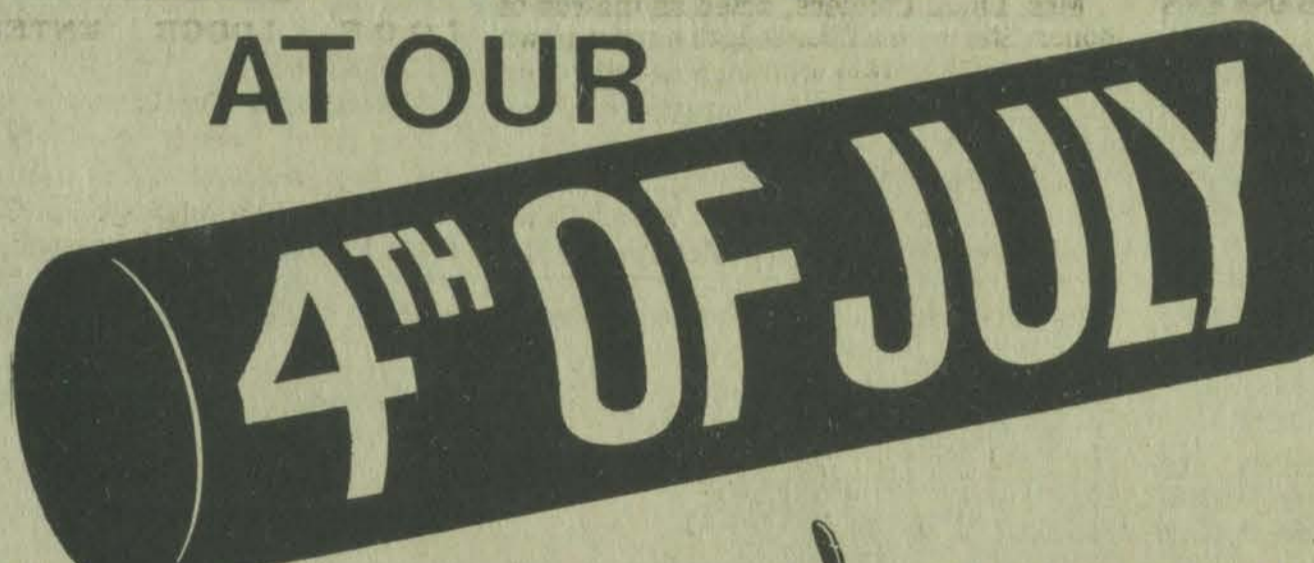
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"Green Thumb"—Work for Oldsters

Frankfort, Ky.—"Green Thumb is the best job I ever had," said 81-year-old Elijah Moore, of Lee county.

Green Thumb is a program designed to give older persons

rewarding work as well as extra income.

The program, which began in Kentucky in July, 1968 with authority to give work to 70 persons, presently employs 119. The average age of a Green Thumb is 66.

Green Thumb is sponsored by the National Farmers Union and operates under a grant from the U. S. Department of Labor as a part of its "Mainstream" program, authorized under the Economic Opportunity Act.

A variety of sponsors have cooperated with the program, including city and county governments, state agencies, school systems, community organizations and civic clubs.

Project workers are placed in areas needing conservation, beautification, and community betterment efforts. The program is designed to meet the needs of both the workers and their communities.

During the past three months two seven-man crews have been doing light maintenance and beautification tasks at Natural Bridge State Resort Park. The men cleaned off building sites, replaced wooden structures along the trails and reconstructed and painted bleachers at Hoedown Island, a square dancing area.

"I couldn't have got the park into such good shape without them," said Bill Means, maintenance superintendent at Natural Bridge.

The Green Thumb workers, in addition to their special projects, helped the regular employees with weekly park clean-up and special assignments. They also spent several days participating in flood clean-up at Natural Bridge and Fort Boonesborough State Parks.

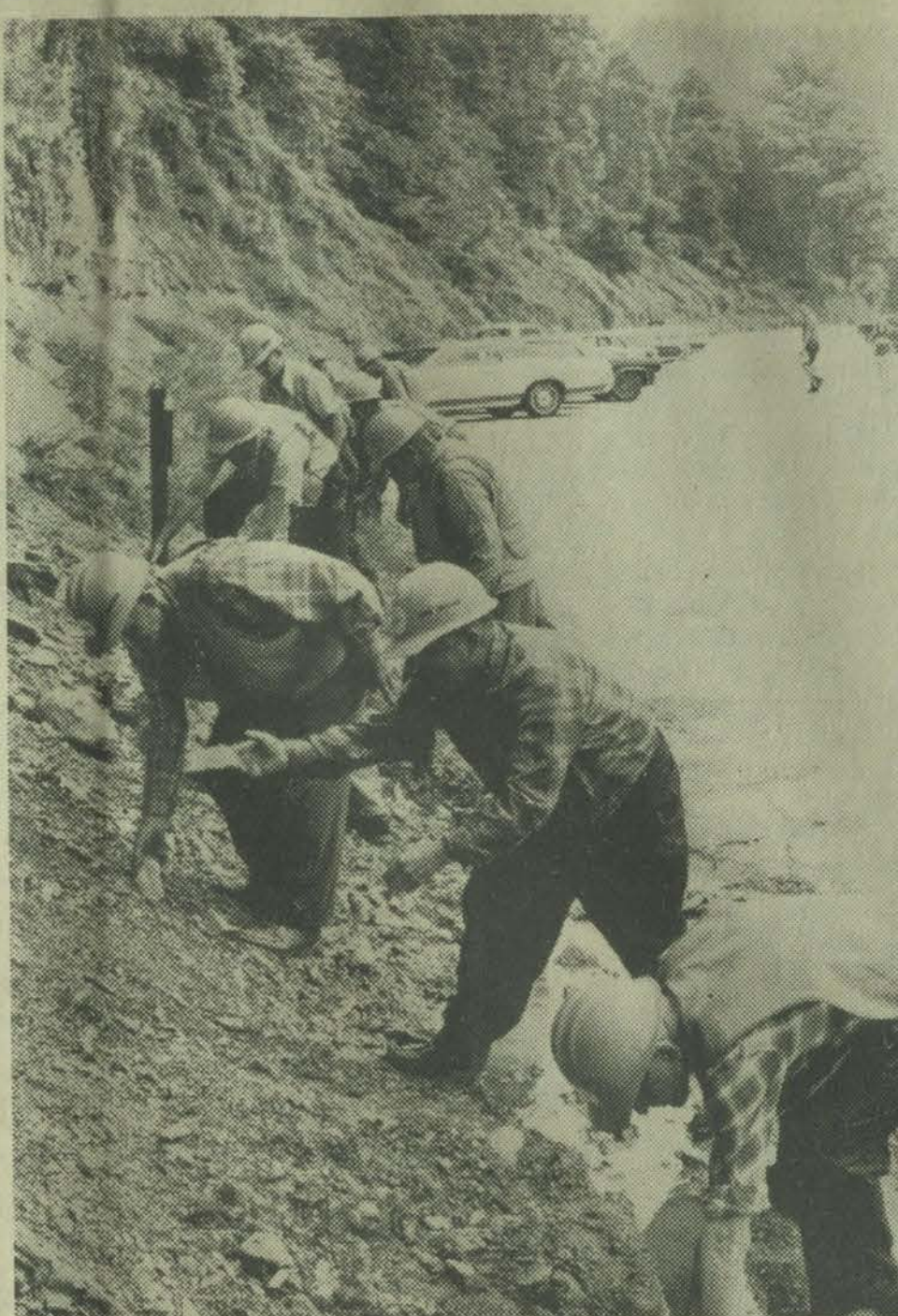
"I don't make as much money as I used to, but it's the best job I ever had," said Grover Spencer, foreman of the Lee county work crew.

"I like being out-of-doors and working in different places. I like the people I work with, too. We all get along real well. We've never had any trouble or accidents in my crew."

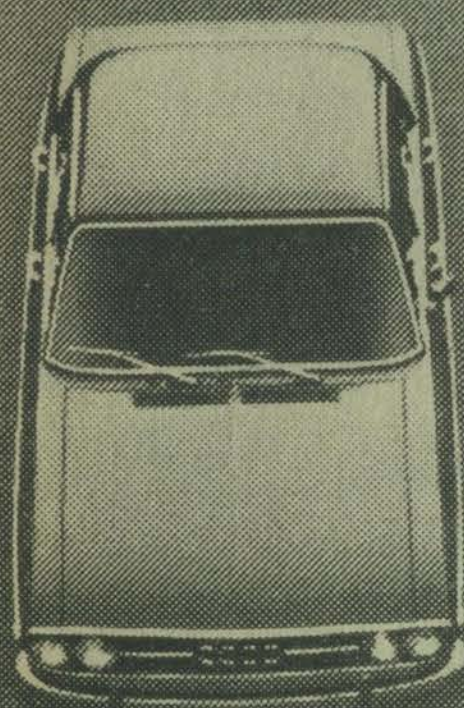
Bill Hollon, foreman of the Wolfe county work crew, feels that Green Thumb "helps a lot of fellows get Social Security or increase their benefits."

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Mental Health Personnel Alerted to Drink Problems

Frankfort, Ky.—Alcohol abuse and alcoholism were the subjects of a six-session seminar recently completed by almost 3,000 employees of the Kentucky Department of Mental Health.

The instruction was for all members of the department. Included were staff associates from four psychiatric hospitals, three mental retardation facilities, the Children's Treatment Services, Forensic Psychiatry and other supportive agencies of the department.

The alcohol seminar was presented through Kentucky Educational Television's closed-circuit system, linking state mental health facilities. The series was also available to local comprehensive care center staffs and interested individuals at state universities and community colleges which are also in the TV system.

Four of the sessions featured televised presentations by leading national and state alcohol authorities. The remaining two meetings were set aside for group discussion and reaction.

The complete series was repeated three times over a six-week period, enabling hospital workers to view the entire seminar. Broadcast schedules were arranged to reach morning and afternoon shifts.

Mental Health Commissioner Dr. Dale H. Farabee explained that his department is the state agency responsible for alcohol treatment and education in Kentucky.

"Whether or not the staff member deals directly with alcohol programs," said Dr. Farabee, "he is an integral part of the entire system. Because of greatly enhanced and expanded treatment and education techniques, it is necessary for all department personnel to develop a full understanding of the nature and scope of the problem and for each to examine his own attitude toward its resolution."

Dr. Stanley Hammons, director of Mental Health's Office of Staff Development and Training, said the seminar was designed to present basic points about the alcohol problems.

Dr. Hammons listed these as explaining the national scope of the alcohol problem; explaining that most alcoholics are not of the "skid row" variety, but everyday citizens in varying

degrees of functional disability; detailing the process of psychological and physical alcohol addiction, and exploring the multi-disciplined approach used by the Mental Health Department in offering treatment.

The televised alcohol seminar is one of a number of training programs in alcoholism and other fields conducted by the department, which will co-sponsor the second annual Kentucky School for Alcohol Studies at the University of Kentucky, July 9-14. Lay and professional persons with an interest in alcohol problems are being urged to attend the week-long school, featuring some of the best-known alcohol treatment authorities in the nation.

Attendance can be arranged by contacting the Office of Alcoholism, Kentucky Department of Mental Health, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.

Lawyers Study 'No-Fault' Law In Divorce Cases

Beginning last Friday, Kentucky's no-fault divorce law was in effect, and all such cases remaining on the court docket as well as new cases are under the provisions of the new legislation which was enacted at the 1972 session of the General Assembly.

Attorneys questioned here about the new law reported they were studying it. One of the intentions of the law was to ease the lawyer's job, but almost 200 attorneys attending a Louisville conference on the matter weren't sure it has.

It's such a departure from Kentucky's current law that Judge Roy Vance, commissioner of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, suggested that many of the questions that weren't answered will have to be answered in court tests.

The new law makes "irretrievable breakdown of the marriage relationship" the sole reason for granting a divorce. Under the new law, neither party is blamed for the breakdown. Presently, there are 10 legal grounds for divorce in Kentucky.

But it isn't quite that simple. The new law has changed property settlement, alimony (to be known as maintenance), child support, child custody, and attorney's fees.

In the child support clause, a complicating factor is that the obligation of the parent to support a child may not end with that parent's death. For instance, if a remarried father paying child support dies, the situation can be complicated if he has left his estate to his present wife and not to the mother of his children.

Property division under the new law depends on such factors as the contribution of each party to the property, duration of the marriage and the circumstances of each partner.

The new maintenance clause, which Vance called "a radical departure" from the alimony system, can require either party to pay—not just the husband, as has been common practice. The court, Vance said, will determine the need of each partner and assign "maintenance."

Guidelines to assign child custody are "pretty broad" and still leave custody awards pretty much to the judge. Some of the factors influencing the judge's decision, he said, are the parents' wishes, the children's wishes, the interaction between the children, parents, and the social and educational environment.

State Sen. William L. Sullivan, D-Henderson, who sponsored SB 133, replied to some criticism of the new law and said that the climate in divorce proceedings will be lightened.

"You won't have to sit there hour after hour in a name-calling contest," he said. He added that such time can be better spent trying to reconcile a marriage. The law has "a few rough edges," he said, but "I believe there's a chance to save marriages."

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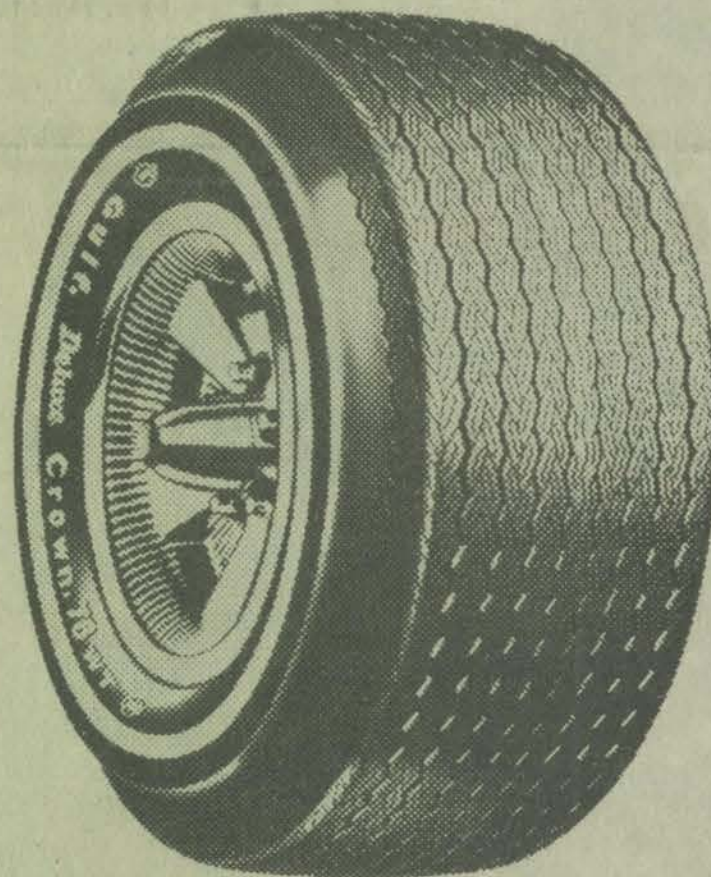

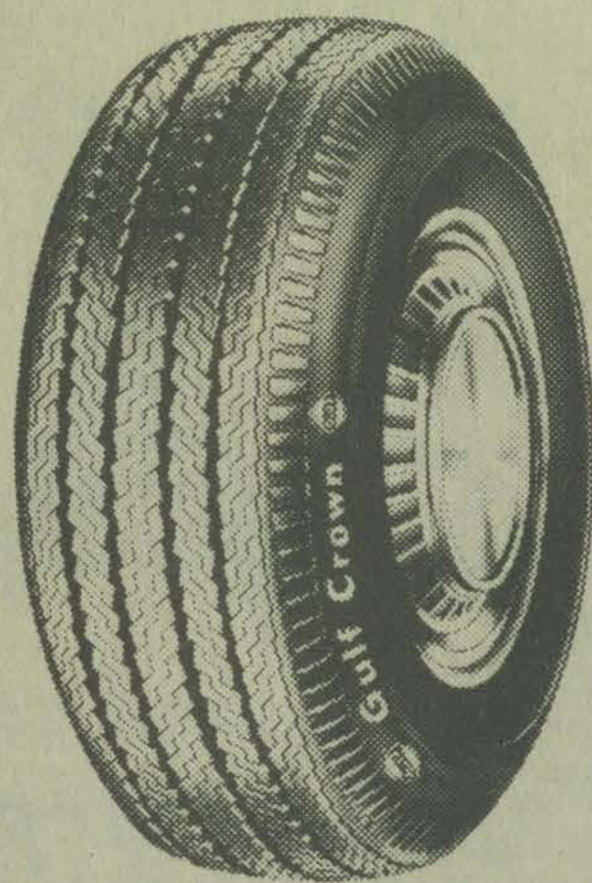

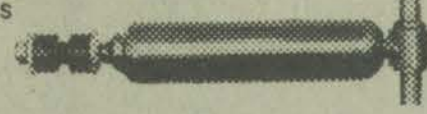

1972 Law Found Impossible to Obey

It appears the 1972 General Assembly passed a law which will be impossible for the state's savings and loan associations to obey.

Lt. Governor Julian Carroll announced he had discovered the law puts an impossible burden on the industry by requiring state savings and loan associations to have federal insurance by June 18, or stop making two types of loans. Those are second mortgage and direct reduction loans.

Lt. Governor Carroll said it would be impossible for firms which do not have such insurance to meet the deadline, since it takes up to two years to get coverage.

He suggested that an interim legislative committee decide whether the law should be changed during the special legislative session this month.

The Legislative Research Committee agreed, and also formally asked Governor Ford to include legislative redistricting in his call for the session. That would be to correct recently discovered errors in Jefferson County districts.

Registration of Nursing Students Slated To Begin in August at PCC

For the two-year associate degree nursing program approved for Prestonsburg Community College, nursing students will be admitted for the 1972 fall semester which will begin in August, but all credentials of applicants must be complete and on file in the Admissions Office of the college not later than July 1. Nursing candidates for the 1972-73 academic year will not be considered for admissions after that date.

A total of 30-40 students will be admitted in the first nursing class at the college. All students who do not have a previous background in chemistry and nursing will take a one-week workshop from August 7 to August 11, to prepare them for the integrated science course that will be taught during the Semester.

In order to be considered for the nursing program, each student must have the following items on file in the Admissions Office prior to being considered for the program:

- (1) An application, (2) American College Test score, (3) High school transcript, and (4) Health form. After these items are on file, the candidate will have an interview by the nursing faculty and will be required to complete a special health form before the first class in August. In addition to these items, it would strengthen an applicant's request for admission if she is recommended by her high school principal, has a grade point average of 2.5 or better, and is in the upper half of her graduating class. Final admission to the nursing program will be determined by an admissions committee, and the student will be notified as to the action of that committee.

Red Cross Offers First Aid Training

Floyd Chapter of the American Red Cross is providing first aid training, which meets the standards set by the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, to local business and industrial firms. John G. Heinze, Chapter Chairman, reported this week.

The act, which assures safe and healthful working conditions for workers, stipulates that first aid-trained personnel must be on the work site if no infirmary, clinic or hospital is in near proximity. The law holds the employer responsible for providing these services.

The Department of Labor specifically designated the Red Cross as a source to employers for first aid instruction through a statement of understanding recently signed by Secretary of Labor, James D. Hodgson and George M. Elsey, president of the American Red Cross.

Although the Red Cross offers several types of first aid courses, the local ARC chapter chairman is recommending the multi-media standard course as best adapted for business and industry. 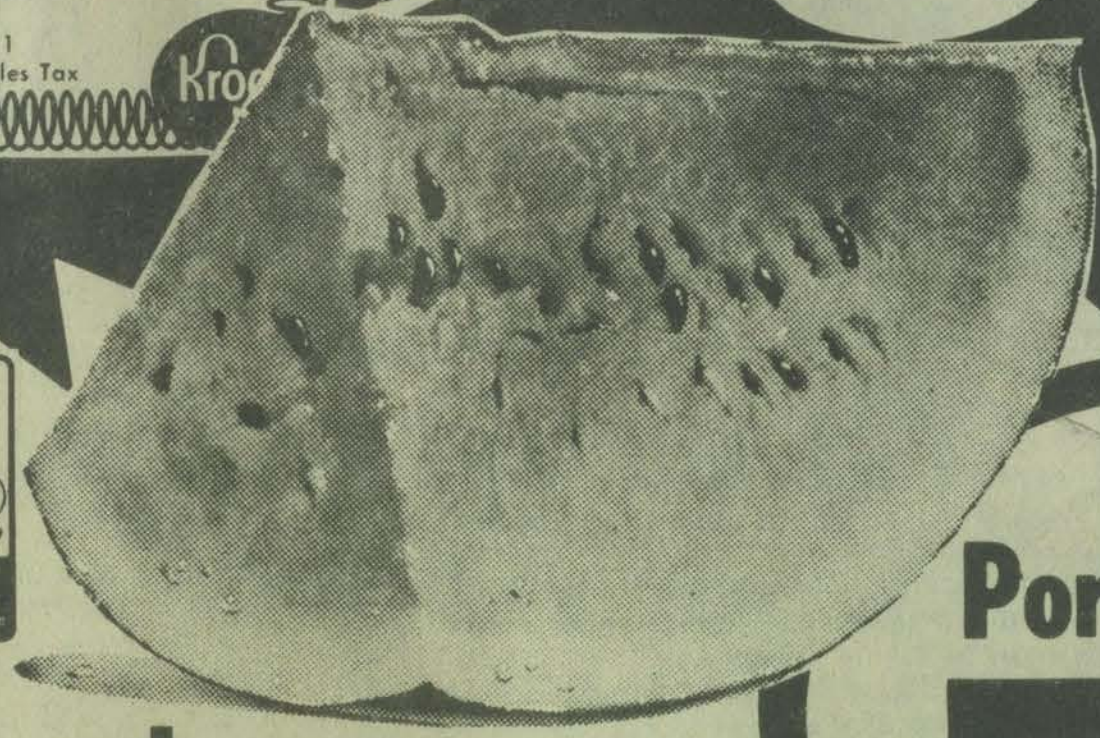

Ford's Condition Reported 'Good'
Gov. Wendell H. Ford was reported in good condition Monday after undergoing surgery at Methodist Hospital, Houston, Texas for the correction of an aneurysm (a ballooning) in an abdominal artery.

The operation was performed after the arterial abnormality was discovered while the governor was undergoing X-ray examination last week for a back injury. In an operation performed within an hour a 10-man surgical team removed the thin-walled section of the artery which carries blood to the heart and grafted a Dacron tube in the place of the three-inch segment that had been removed. The governor's appendix also was removed as normal procedure in such cases.

Tommy Preston, Ford's press secretary, said the aneurysm was moderate in size but thin-walled and dangerous, posing the possibility of a fatal rupture of the artery. Gov. Ford is expected to remain in the hospital till sometime next week. He is expected to be able to attend the Democratic convention which will convene in Miami, July 10.

Big Sandy River-Bed Coal Mining Profitable Sideline for Sand Co.

When the Mare Creek Sandy Company began its operations several years ago in the Big Sandy river, near Allen, it was, as its name indicates out for sand. But it was getting a heavy admixture of coal with the sand sucked up from the river-bed, and that posed a problem.

It's a problem no longer. As the coal was separated from the sand, it became evident that this was going to be a continuing operation, getting the black stuff out. The piles of coal grew—and so the Mare Creek Sand Company went into the coal business, too.

David May, who operates the sand company, sells coal by the carload. A few months ago, he told a newspaperman:

"I guess that on the average we get around 30 tons of coal a day, and a good day it could run as high as 100 tons."

The coal is sold to steam plants. Separation of the sand and coal also results in the filtering out of a variety of other items—beer and soft drink cans, rocks, bottles and the like. Often there are big lumps of coal.

"We used to throw all of that away, but we found a company up in Connecticut that wanted to buy the lumps of coal so we hired two men to shovel it up and put it in 25-

pound bags," May said. Every two weeks, the men produce about 3,500 bags of coal.

Where does all the coal come from? "I'd really like to know that myself," May said. Hundreds of small mines operate upstream from May's company. Presumably, the coal is just spilled into the river a little at a time.

"You can tell that it has come from different places," May said, displaying 'small pieces, some of which had been ground into perfectly round balls and others that were jagged.

One indication of how far some of the coal could have traveled in the river comes from the trash pile. There, May offers finds golf balls and the nearest course is 15 miles upstream.

He also finds false teeth, eye glasses and an occasional snake.

"But it's a funny thing, we've never taken in that first fish," he said. "I kinda thought we'd catch some, but we never have."

Most likely, fish are frightened away from May's barge that plies the river by an agitator that stirs up the silt on the river bottom before water is pumped to the separating device on shore.

Then, too, his suction pipe is only six inches in diameter and doesn't generate enough power to land a fish who wants to get out of the way until the barge passes.

Ralph Pickard, executive director of the Kentucky Water Pollution Authority, said operations like May's do cause some minor pollution, "but the good that is done far outweighs the bad.

"There is some temporary pollution caused by stirring up the silt on the bottom of the river, but that disappears and the removal of the coal and other pollution is more lasting," he said.

May has been operating in the same place for 13 years. The barge moves only about 1,000 feet up and down the river, and from one side of the stream to the other.

By the time it has completed a trip upstream, enough sand has drifted into the area so that it can go back to the beginning and start all over again.

'Punch Mining' Rules Promised

State Reclamation Director Buddy A. Beach says his division soon will begin drafting new regulations to bring the so-called "punch mining" technique and other in between mining operations under Kentucky's new reclamation law.

That law, which originated as House Bill 47 in the 1972 General Assembly, expands the definition of strip mining to include all surface operations, including access roads, at any mine, making them subject to the environmental provisions of the 1966 strip mine law.

Punch mining involves the use of deep-mining equipment to remove coal from an already stripped surface seam. Since coal is removed from shallow shafts cut into the highwall, the process legally is considered deep mining and therefore not subject to the strip mine law.

The Reclamation Division now is legally unable to move against such punch mine operations, despite any environmental damage they may cause.

In addition to such combination mining operations, strip mines have been operated under other guises, such as a Perry county site which was officially listed as a "housing project."

Beach said the new regulations, when approved, will help assure that no coal is stripped under the guise of punch mining, deep mining or any of several other operations that may circumvent surface mining laws.

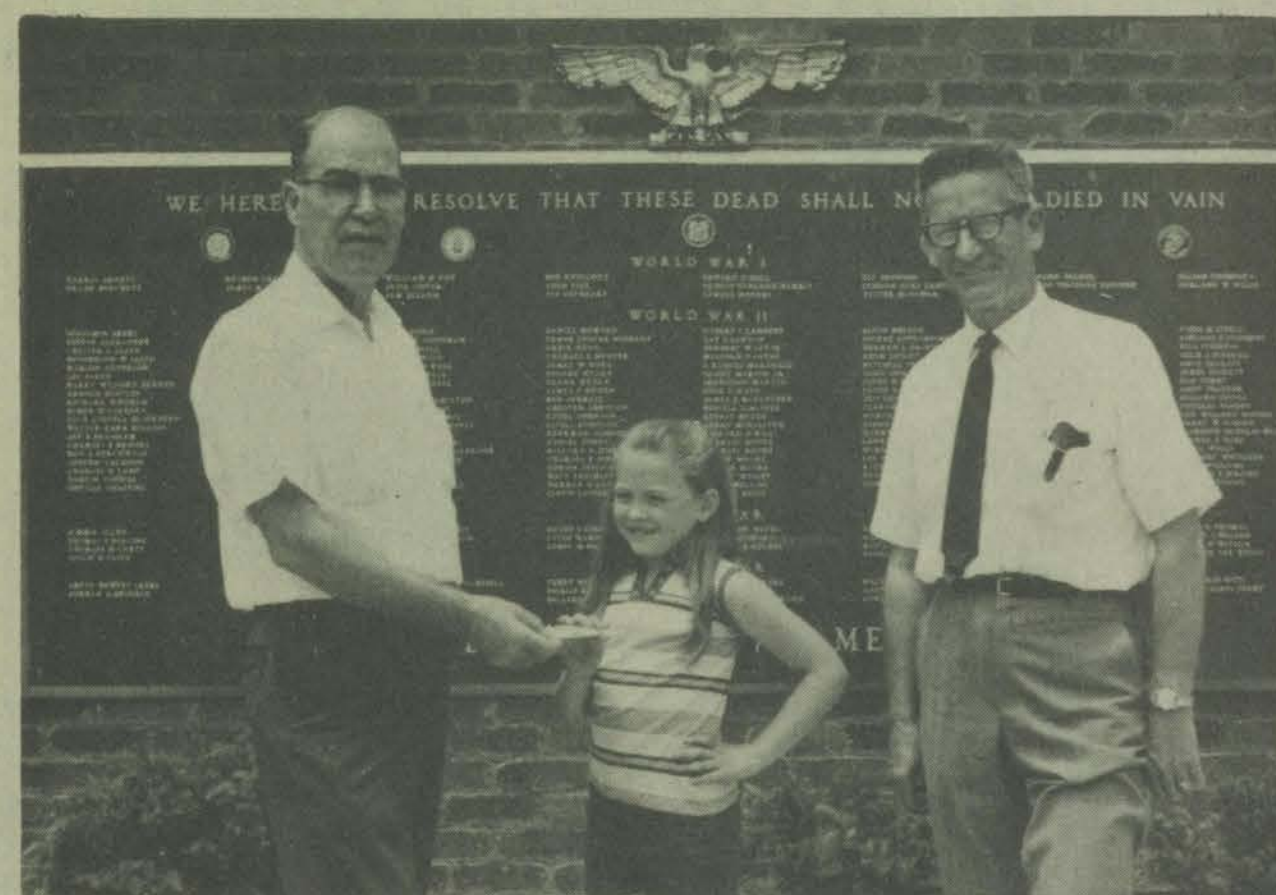

Inspectors Get More Time To Study Strip Mine Sites

Buddy A. Beach, acting state Reclamation director, has told his field inspectors to "take all the time they need" to determine if proposed strip mine sites can be properly reclaimed with minimum environmental damage.

Such inspections are required before the Reclamation Division can approve a strip mine permit application, but Beach indicated some shortcuts have been used in the past.

In a television interview, he said the inspectors now are free of political pressures and that the practice of "walking through" permit applications has been

ended.

Beach said it is merely "being realistic" to recognize that political maneuvers have been used in the past.

"It's a fact of life, I suppose," he said. "It's hard to fault a mine operator for not exhausting every move to get a permit."

Last March, Governor Ford ordered a three-week moratorium on new permits to allow time to study the situation and any changes needed. Beach said the conclusion was to use the full 20 days available to study each application and inspect each proposed mine site.
