Grand Jury Probe Said 'Confusing' **25 Witnesses Heard** In Death of Archer; **Probe in 6th Day**

In the fifth day of its probe into the slaving here July 12 of Dr. George P. Archer, Prestonsbury mayor, the Floyd circuit court's grand jury Tuesday was described as "more confused than ever."


The jury will continue its work at least through today (Wednesday) in the hope of reaching a more definite conclusion and of clearing the circumstances surrounding the murder.

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley said the jury will be given additional time for its investigation if request is made for an extension of the usual six-day grand jury session.

As of Monday, upwards of 25 persons had been questioned by the jury. A tight lid was kept on what took place inside the grand jury room, but it was indicated the investigation to date has been inconclusive.

The jury is expected at adjournment to file with Judge Conley a comprehensive statement as to its findings in the Archer case and others investigated since its empanelling, Sept. 4.

Relatives and friends of Dr. Archer and of Mrs Judith Archer, who died of a gunshot wound a week later, were among those questioned this week. Others quizzed included Sheriff Frank Leslie, County Judge Henry Stumbo and persons who reportedly saw a car driven by a woman in the vicinity of the slaying scene.

Perkins was introduced by 95th district Representative W. J. Reynolds who eulogized the slain city leader saying, "He wanted to make Prestonsburg and Floyd county the best in the state for our people." Dr. Archer was shot July 12 in the clinic parking lot, and investigating law officers have yet to make an arrest in the murder, which is currently under study by the Floyd county grand jury.

Surface Mining Within 2 Miles **Of Lake Itself**

Groups and individuals interested in Dewey Lake and Jenny Wiley State Park were disturbed this week by a report that 52 applications for surface mining permits have been filed this year by companies seeking mining rights in the lake watershed.

Some of these permits have been granted, some are under study. It is not known how many, if any, have been denied. Such applications are considered, first, by the U.S. Corps of Engineers, then by the State Department of Resources and Environmental Protection.

Fourteen surface mine permits are known to have been granted last year. One of these permitted mining within two miles of the lake, another is within six miles and a third is seven miles away. Of the six granted in 1971, one is within five miles of the lake.

The deep mine nearest the lake is 17 miles upstream, but there are 38 active deep mines in the Pike county headwaters of Johns Creek which feeds the lake.

Thomas O. Harris, commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, told The Times Tuesday that he was not aware that so many surface mining permits have been filed for future operations in the lake watershed. He stressed the point that his department works in cooperation with the Corps of Engineers, and that the Corps first considers applications to mine, then sends its findings to his department. "Our policy," he said, "is that if any mining is shown to be harmful to any impoundment or any national forest, to be very, very hesitant about approving a permit.' The following information, however, has been received by the state Legislative Research Commission from the Corps of Engineers:

Conn Wins Acquittal In Bribe Case Trial

A jury of the Floyd circuit court required less than 20 minutes Tuesday morning to reach a verdict of not guilty in the trial of Former Deputy Sheriff Virgil Conn on a charge of nonfeasancemalfeasance in office 9.

The indictment against Conn, who now is policeman at Allen, was made at the same time Sheriff Frank Leslie and Roy Branham were indicted in connection with alleged violations in the handling of bootlegging in the county. Branham's trial is scheduled next week.

Testifying in his own behalf, Conn denied that he had ever accepted money in exchange for protection of a bootlegger, and his attorney, Thomas Pace, in his argument contended the charge against his client was supported by the testimony of an angry bootlegger.

Mrs. Betty Lykins had testified that she paid Conn for protection in the whiskey business, and Buddy Ward, a former deputy sheriff testified he had collected money from the woman and had given it to Conn. One witness told the jury that Conn had had part in a raid on him in which his truck was stopped and his beer taken with the information from the former deputy that he had got his beer "from the wrong place."

Fourth District Constable Gillis Conn testified that he and Conn had raided Mrs. Lykins in 1971. But she later told the jury that they took beer from her but lodged no complaint. Defense testimony claimed, however, that the case was placed in magistrate court and that the

officers were later told the case had been settled and their appearance was not necessary.

Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo in his argument told the jury that if it acquitted Conn all bootlegging cases "may as well be thrown away."


Willard Kidd entered a plea of guilty last Friday to a hit-run driving charge and was fined \$100 and sentenced to three months in jail.



Clerk Calls In All Cards Used In Registration

Voters have until Sept. 24 to re-register in order to be eligible to a ballot at the November general election, but County Clerk C. "Ollie" Robinson said Monday all registration cards in the hands of persons who have undertaken to assist in the re-registration effort must be in his office not later than Saturday of this week.

"No registration cards will be accepted from anybody after Saturday," Mr. Robinson emphasized.

Meanwhile, clerk's office personnel will remain busy with re-registration, a task which has claimed much of their attention for weeks.

The county clerk said approximately 15,000 voters have already re-registered, leaving fewer than 3,000 yet to register.

County Clerk Robinson reiterated his fear that the new state election law has opened the way to mass fraud because of its laxity in the provisions for absentee voting. He pointed out that the fears previously expressed by him and other county clerks on this score were voiced this week by Secretary of State Thelma Stovall.

Secretary of State Stovall recently said, "I'm really afraid of that absentee voter law. It's the worst part of the new act. It's wide open to fraud."

Ignorance of the law by many county clerks, the local officials responsible for processing the applications and ballots for absentee voters presents a problem. For instance, though the new law states clearly that absentee ballots are to be mailed to voters from the clerk's office, Meade County Clerk Perry Lusk allowed people to pick them up in person and in a few instances permitted candidates to pick up ballots for absentee voters.

"It was my fault, I just didn't read the law," Lusk said. "I was so busy it kinda slipped up on me."

Lusk's error is especially ironic because he was the County Clerks Association's representative to the Legislative Research Commission committee considering changes in the law.

PCC Enrollment Up for 3rd Year As 522 Register

At the conclusion of student registration last Wednesday Prestonsburg Community College had a student body for the current term of 522-an increase of 75 students over last year's enrollment.

Mrs. Carolyn H. Francis, admissions and financial aid officer at the college, said the new total marks the third consecutive year in which an enrollment gain has been recorded. The upward trend began with 408 students in the fall of 1971, 457 last fall and now the highest enrollment figure in the history of the college.

Dr. Henry A. Campbell, Jr., director of the college, attributed the student body growth and the sharp gain this year, in particular, to near-completion of US 23 between Prestonsburg and Pikeville. Other growth factors were listed as the increased cost of attending regional universities and the addition of the associate degree nursing program at PCC.

Across the state there have been charges that candidates in the primary took fistfuls of absentee applications to nursing homes, obtained the signatures of feeble persons, varified the disability themselves, and then even "helped" vote their ballots.

Fraud may also occur in obtaining absentee ballots, an abuse stemming from removal of the requirement that applications and the ballots themselves must be notarized.

"It's so darn easy to forget an application now," Mrs. Stovall said. "At least under the old law someone had to go before the notary and swear the application was correct."

In some counties last spring, voters went to the polls election day and were told they had already voted absentee. Some have sworn to affidavits that they didn't vote absentee, that someone must have forged their name to get a blank ballot.

17 PIKE LAND CASES SETTLED



"Activity which disturbs the surface of the ground has increased greatly in the Dewey Lake watershed in the last few years. Sedimentation was visible in the form of bars last year following drawdown (of the lake) to winter pool ... particularly near the German camping area. The entire lake becomes muddy following heavy rains and associated runoff, and remains roily for an extended period of time."

The Times asked Dean Murray Dewey reservoir manager, about this report of sedimentation. His main comment was to say that a complete sedimentation survey is now being made at the lake by the Corps of Engineers and that the U.S. Geological Survey is to make in-depth studies of sedimentation at both Dewey and Fishtrap lakes over a period of perhaps three years.

The Blue Bird Colliery Company is operating within two miles of the lake. The operations 6-7 miles away are those of Kingdom Come Coal Company and the Jo Ann Coal Company. Construction of dams to restrain flow of runoff and reclamation practices are prescribed by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection.
