



High School Work Next In County

Elementary Buildings Here Planned After Betsy Layne School

When a state Department of Education study of Floyd county school needs was made five years ago, reroofing of various schools was given No. 1 priority.

That improvement program well under way, and several roofing projects completed, the next two priorities are receiving consideration, Supt. Pete Grigsby, Jr. said this week in response to a question about planning for future projects.

The first of these is construction of a high school building for Betsy Layne. Preliminary plans for the school have been completed by Marvin Crider, Jr., architect for the school board.

"We hope to make a start on this building within a year, but there is really no fixed target date," Grigsby said Tuesday.

The school will be built on property acquired from the state at Stanville, approximately two miles outside Betsy Layne and removed from the threat of flooding. The elementary school will remain in Betsy Layne.

Present plans call for construction of a one-story school, but Mr. Grigsby was quick to point out that the end result "depends on our ability to match the plans and construction costs with money."

Once the Betsy Layne project is under way, the project assigned No. 3 priority—construction of a building to house the upper three grades of the Prestonsburg Elementary School—will be in line for work, the superintendent said.

Attempts by the board of education to acquire property across Highland Avenue from the present elementary school have failed, and the architect has determined that there is room on the present school campus for thenew

Weeksbury Man Facing Charges Alleging Arson

Curt Hall was jailed here last Thursday by State Trooper Don Weedman on two arson counts after as many dwellings had burned at Weeksbury.

First-degree arson was alleged in the burning of a house owned by Mack Little and occupied by Andy Newsome. A second degree arson charge was lodged against Hall because the blaze was permitted to spread to another nearby building. Hall also was charged with terroristic threatening.

Three Galveston men have been released under bond after having been jailed here on charges of first degree assault and wanton endangerment after shots allegedly were fired into the Branham's Creek home of Greg Hall and Harbit Hall had been hit by bullet or shot fragments. Bobby and Billy Hall, cousins, and Eugene Tackett were released under \$20,000 bond each, with the provision that the Halls "stay away from Harbit and Greg Hall." The accused men were arrested by Deputy Sheriffs Phillip Neeley and Bill Marsillett, State Trooper Joe West, Sgt. Gary Rose and Sgt. Asher, of the State Police.

Regional Strategies Committee Begins Study of Area Needs

A 15-month effort is under way to identify primary needs in the Big Sandy Area Development District and come up with strategies to deal with those needs.

The first step, appointment of a Regional Strategies committee, was taken recently, according to Joseph McCauley, executive director of Big Sandy ADD.

One of the key means for developing the strategies is the contribution of information and opinions from the public, and this committee will serve as the focus for citizen input.

A core committee has been established and will meet regularly—at least once every two months—with ADD staff working on Regional Strategies.

In this way, the committee will fill its important role as an information link between the general public and the ADD staff. Local citizens may express their ideas on local needs to the committee and the committee will relay these ideas to the staff.

P'burg Parents at Hearing On Learning-Disabled Tots

A once-silent constituency appears to be finding its voice as parents of learning-disabled children, backed by a new federal statute, describe the obstacles they say need to be overcome if the law is to be made to work.

The statute to which they appeal is the celebrated Public Law 94-142, guaranteeing a "free and appropriate education" to handicapped children who do not need institutional care but do need special classroom help if they are to keep up with their peers.

A leader of this emerging group of parents in Floyd county is Carolyn Ford, of Prestonsburg, whose autistic son spent four years in a private school before PL 94-142, ironically enough, forced her to turn to local resources for help. In making federal dollars available to public school districts, Mrs. Ford explained, the new law undercut the economic viability of the relatively few private schools for children with learning disabilities.

What the Fords have learned, Donald and Jewell Bayes, of the Goble Roberts Addition, say they are also discovering—namely, that local school districts must be made responsive if children with developmental problems are to have the education they need and are now entitled to by law.

Their 13-year-old son has been routinely promoted through eight grades, Mrs. Bayes said this week, even though a learning problem has severely restricted his ability to read.

While Floyd school administrators claim they are hampered by a statewide shortage of teachers trained to teach handicapped children, some parents believe the school officials are not trying hard enough to train and recruit teachers. Increasingly, the parents are finding allies in other agencies in their struggle to make the new law effective.

When local school officials proved reluctant to do the testing or design the remedial program her son needed, according to Jewell Bayes, she turned to

provide direction to staff members. Identification of regional needs will be based on more than the views of the public. A review of past ADD planning efforts will provide insight into the needs and a study of statistical data about the region will also play a part.

This means there will be judgments to make concerning what the actual needs are and which are most important. The committee, using plans, data and citizen input information, will work with staff in identifying primary regional needs to be recommended for inclusion in the program to the ADD Board of Directors.

Finally, the committee will also have the task of advising and directing the staff in developing action strategies that will be directly tied to identified needs and will be used by the district board and staff in developing action strategies for the future.

Board Approves Hospital's Bid To Add Services

After eight months of hearings, Highlands Regional Medical Center finally won approval last week for its proposed expansion.

The hospital was granted a certificate of need for the expansion at a meeting in Owensboro last Wednesday of the state Need and Licensure Board. The project had been previously approved unanimously by the state Comprehensive Health Planning Council.

Highlands Administrator Clarence Traum said after the decision was handed down: "It has been a long journey. We are extremely happy with the approval and anxious to get started as soon as possible."

Plans for the project call for an additional 47 beds and expanded ancillary services, including a new emergency room, laboratory, an intensive and cardiac care unit, and waiting areas for patients and their families. The original price tag of \$7.2 million has inevitably swollen somewhat by inflation during the lengthy review process.

It will be Highlands' first expansion since the hospital opened nearly seven years ago, and is seen by hospital officials as a step toward the development of Highlands into the regional referral center that was envisioned when construction of the hospital was approved in the late 1960's.

The hospital was located between Prestonsburg and Paintsville so that it could serve a multi-county area, and the original plan calls for an ultimate expansion to 250 beds, a hospital spokesman noted this week.

Construction of the new facility is expected to begin next spring.

ADD Directors Told Switch From Oil To Coal May Be Slow

Pike county Judge-Executive Wayne T. Rutherford's hopes for a rapid switch from oil- to coal-fired power plants are unduly optimistic, Paintsville businessman J. B. Wells told Monday's meeting of the Big Sandy Area Development District directors Monday.

Wells was reporting to the group on a meeting last month of the Appalachian Regional Commission in Binghamton, N.Y., which he had attended as Big Sandy ADD representative.

Citing the experience of the New York Power Authority, which he said has spent five years and \$27 million in an as-yet-unsuccessful attempt to build a coal generating plant on Long Island, Wells predicted that the timetable for switching from oil to coal would be "much more extended" than Rutherford had

suggested in earlier remarks to the board.

Many problems also attend the much-touted "synfuel" programs for the conversion of coal to gas, Wells noted.

The ARC urged the federal government to pick up the tab for the expensive switching and conversion programs, Wells said, and also to assist the states in building the new coal haul roads that will be necessary as the nation comes to rely more heavily on coal.

An estimated \$4.4 billion would be required to build the needed coal roads in Kentucky according to federal highway specifications, Wells said, adding that consideration should be given to building secondary coal roads to less exacting specifications.

At 80, Builder Rice "Thinks Young" and Keeps on Working

When John W. Rice turned 80 years old Monday, there was no special celebration, no family get-together or fancy cakes. But he celebrated, nonetheless, in his own way. He packed up his ladder, hammer, saws and other tools of the builder's trade, as he has for so many years—and went to work.

Informed of Mr. Rice's manner of "celebration" by a son who called from Michigan, a Times interviewer found Rice "hard at it," bent over a workbench sawing boards for a home he is currently involved in building with longtime work associate and friend, Clifford Baldrige, on Little Paint. Approaching quite unannounced, the reporter, bearing camera and notepad, would have been enough to have put most unsuspecting victims on guard at the very least—but not so Mr. Rice. Glancing up from his whirring power saw, Rice commented to the stranger, "Feller ought to be fishin' on a pretty day like this."

The first impression given by Rice, one of open friendliness, was confirmed throughout the conversation with the lifelong Little Paint resident.

John Rice displays a real enthusiasm for people and living in general, and work for him is a vital part of living. "I don't reckon hard work ever killed anybody," Rice said, and he should know. He spent more than 30 years as an underground coal miner at a time when conditions in the mines were at their worst. "I left the mines on Dec. 3, 1943 after the air got so bad in the hole where I was working that you couldn't breathe," he recalled.

The son of a carpenter, the late S. W.

(Shur-die) Rice, he decided to put to use the building experience he had gathered from his father and work, from that day forward, "in the light of day."

"Since then, I've done any part of the building business," Rice explained. "I build 'em, paint 'em, move 'em, whatever."

To understand how a day of sawing boards, driving nails, climbing up and down ladders and the like could suffice for the celebration of an 80th birthday, it's necessary to gain some appreciation for the enthusiasm and pride which Rice takes in his trade. Builder of houses, large and small, over a wide area since the 1940's, Rice proudly claims that his years of experience make him "hard to beat" as a builder and carpenter. "I try to do the same quality of work on other people's houses that I'd do on my own," he commented.

Although working as hard today as he ever has (and still able to drive a nail with no more than two or three blows of the hammer), Rice is fully capable of savoring his spare time. "I used to fish quite a bit," he said, "but here lately I've started following these softball games over in Prestonsburg, and I go down in the state to tournaments and everything. I'll stay two or three days at a time."

As Rice is quick to point out, he has taken no type of medication, "not even an aspirin," since 1949, and perhaps it is his zest for his work and life generally that has kept him vigorous.

To him, the secret to a long and active life, besides hard work, is to "think young."

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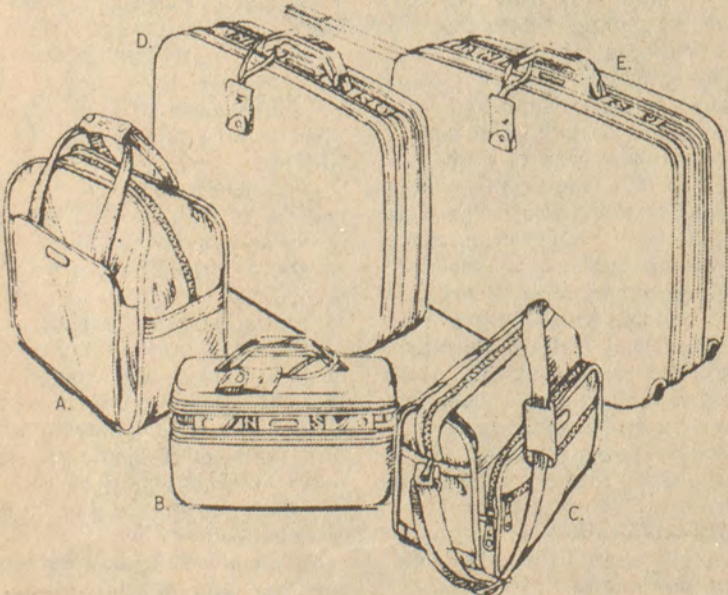
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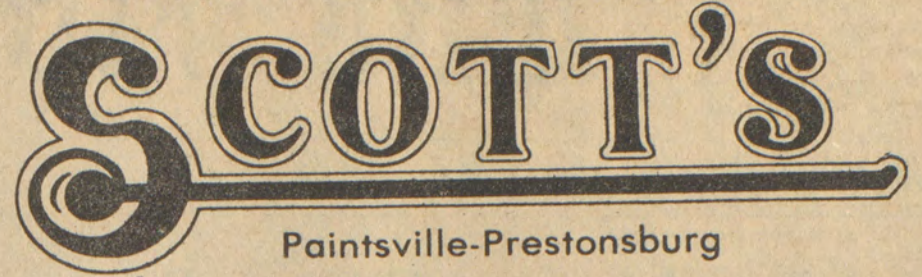
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Carroll Adds to Reward For Trooper's Murderer

Gov. Julian Carroll announced last week he is committing \$10,000 from his contingency fund to the reward being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person who killed Kentucky State Trooper Eddie Harris last week.

The governor's contribution raises the reward total to \$25,000. Already \$15,000 has been contributed toward the reward by residents of Laru, Hardin and Meade counties.

Harris was shot two weeks ago while on patrol. According to reports, he was killed when he stopped a man for speeding on US 31 E, about three miles northeast of Hodgenville.

Carroll, who attended Harris' funeral at Hodgenville said he was promoted to increase the reward by the "terrible brutality" of the officer's death "and the obvious need to do something now to make it clear to everyone that we just aren't going to stand for this sort of thing in our state anymore."

Harris is the second state policeman to be killed since last January. Three other county and local police officers have also been killed in the line of duty thus far this year.

State Offers Counties Help On Litter Control Programs

Kentucky took another step toward a cleaner, more beautiful environment last Friday as Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Secretary Frank Harscher announced the creation of three new litter control grants programs.

The announcement was made at the November meeting of the Kentucky

Association of Counties.

The new programs will be offered to local governments and non-profit organizations who wish to implement a beautification project in their area. While the three categories of grants overlap in their objectives of resource recovery, recycling, beautification and litter control, they are designed to let local governments to choose a program which most adequately adapts to their local problems, Harscher said.

Money for the new grant programs will come from funds allocated to the implementation of Kentucky's Resource Conservation, Recovery and Beautification Act, Harscher said.

One grant category is a Local Litter Control Program. The Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection will award up to \$20,000 to counties which wish to employ a litter control officer, Harscher said. On a countywide basis, a litter control officer would enforce local litter ordinances, work with schools and the media in public education efforts, promote clean-up and recycling activities among community groups and generally encourage proper solid waste management.

A second category, the Resources Recovery and Beautification Grant, will be awarded in amounts of up to \$5,000, Harscher said. This grant category is for projects which would enhance the aesthetic appeal of a building, lot or site which is used by the public or to facilitate some aspect of solid waste management, including resource recovery.

The third category, the local Summer Litter Youth Corps Grant, will be available to local governments in amounts of up to \$20,000 for the purpose of hiring teen-age workers and adult supervisors to pick up litter. This program is designed to be an eight-week summer effort, also encouraging recycling.

Those receiving one of the new grants from the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection will receive technical and logistic support from the Department's Litter Control and Beautification Section within the Division of Hazardous Materials and Waste Management.

Each grant will be awarded directly to qualifying organizations which meet minimum requirements. Eligible applicants are any city or county government or any non-profit organization located in a political subdivision which contains a permitted disposal site or an approved transfer station or which has made contractual agreements with another permitted site in the immediate area.

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"Measure for Measure"
On Educational Network

Shakespeare once again transcends the passage of time by addressing some of today's pertinent issues in "Measure for Measure," the latest in the series of "The Shakespeare Plays," Saturday, December 1, at 4 p.m. (ET), on KET.

Issues such as corruption and balance of power, sexual morality, the limits and confines of the law, and the age-old battle of church and state are cleverly raised in the hands of the master playwright.

The play opens in Vienna as young Claudio (Christopher Strauli), is sentenced to death for sexual indiscretion. He immediately sends for his sister, Isabella (Kate Nelligan), to plead his cause before the judge, Angelo (Tim Pigott-Smith), who sentenced him. The sister, a religious novice, is told her brother's life could be spared if she would yield to the judge. She refuses, and tragic death seems inevitable.

But comedy ensues, in Act III when the Duke of Vienna (Kenneth Colley), abruptly turns the tide of events.

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Survival Course Slated For Police Personnel

In response to the desires of Kentucky law enforcement officers, the state Department of Justice has established a police officer survival course, Justice Secretary John L. Smith announced today.

"The increasing number of attacks upon police officers—often resulting in death—shows the need for officers to be prepared to protect themselves in the event they are attacked," said Robert Clark Stone, commissioner of the department's Bureau of Training in Richmond.

"The recent wave of attacks upon police officers in Kentucky and nationwide has made the police survival course a very contemporary area of instruction. Police want it," said Bill Thomas, director of the bureau's division of law enforcement training.

Thomas said five police officers have been killed in the line of duty in Kentucky so far this year, including the death last week of State Trooper Eddie Harris near Hodgenville.

The 40-hour course, approved by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council, will begin January. Classes will be held at the Bureau of Training in Richmond and at regional training centers at the University of Louisville, Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green and at Northern Kentucky University in Highland Heights.

"The course is open to all Kentucky law enforcement officers, including sheriffs," Thomas said. "We plan to teach the course to 3,000 officers next year." Training will be conducted by certified police instructors.

The course will focus on stopping and approaching motor vehicles, robberies and burglaries in progress, building searches and ambush attacks. "A poll of all police departments in the state was conducted by the Bureau of Training, and the topic of survival was ranked as the most needed," Thomas said.

Church Dedication Slated Sunday



The Water Gap Independent Free Will Baptist Church will dedicate its new building on the Lancer-Water Gap road next Sunday with its first worship service in the new structure at 11 a.m. The Rev. Ted Greene, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Morehead, will deliver the dedicatory sermon.

Asked Monday when the building was completed, the pastor, the Rev. Paul E. Daniel, said, "We're just moving the furniture in today."

The building, which is 128 feet long by 40 feet in depth, includes a sanctuary with a seating capacity of 275, eight Sunday School classrooms and a 30x40-foot fellowship hall.

Although the new church has a membership of only about 70, its construction venture has been financed by the congregation without "outside help," the Rev. Daniel said.

Value of the structure and its site has been estimated at \$350,000.

Gas Prices Continue To Climb

The average price per gallon for gasoline in central and eastern Kentucky continues its rise in November. The cost increased one cent at full-service stations over the past month and almost two cents at self-service pumps.

According to the Blue Grass

Automobile Club's (AA) fuel gauge report, the average cost at full-service stations is \$1.03 per gallon for regular; \$1.06 for premium; \$1.07 for no-lead; and \$1.01 for diesel.

Self-service prices are 95.4 cents for regular; \$1.01 for premium; and \$1.05 for no-lead.

AAA spokesman Bob Owen said, "Gasoline availability continues to be good, and we don't foresee any immediate problems. The stations we contacted report no serious trouble in running short on allocations. None of them have had to limit sales or the amount of gasoline purchased."

Forty-three percent of the stations contacted are open past 8 p.m. on weekdays, and 67 percent are open past 6 p.m. on Saturday. Sunday operations increased slightly over October, with 29 percent remaining open.

About 40 percent of the stations surveyed will be open Thanksgiving Day.

Census Bureau Conducts Employment Survey Here

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census are conducting a survey of employment in this area this week.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 76,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation.

For example, in September the survey indicated that of the 103.5 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 97.5 percent, down from 6.0 percent in August.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical totals.

Package vacation tours can make travel to any spot on the globe more enjoyable.

Because of the convenience of package tours—transportation, hotel and sight-seeing accommodations are made for you in advance—all the vacationer has to do is sit back and enjoy the trip. There's no worry about being strangers in a particular area, you know when you leave what you will be doing and where.

Package tours can be most accommodating to the traveler, but there are several things you should do before committing yourself to the deal, so your vacation won't be a surprise package.

Be sure to compare a package tour with other tours before you buy. Also, compare the cost of the package tour to taking the trip on your own. Remember that because all arrangements are made in advance, you are purchasing them as a package. You may be buying services you don't particularly want.

Charter tour operators may not make any changes in schedules or accommodations other than those listed in the brochure. If they do make changes after you've signed up, you should have the option of canceling the trip and getting a refund.

Unfortunately, this rule does not apply to tours which use regularly scheduled commercial airline flights. There is usually a penalty for canceling a trip after you've signed up. Be sure to ask about this penalty before you commit yourself to one tour.

When inquiring about package tours, ask about the size of the tour group. Larger groups will spend more time making arrangements than small groups. And more time making arrangements means less time sight-seeing!

People who are traveling alone on a tour should ask if there are other singles willing to share accommodations. Those traveling alone are likely to pay more.

As always, make sure you completely understand a package tour contract before you sign it. Do not hesitate to ask

questions about the particulars of the tour. If you do not understand the contract, ask someone who does to tell you what it means.

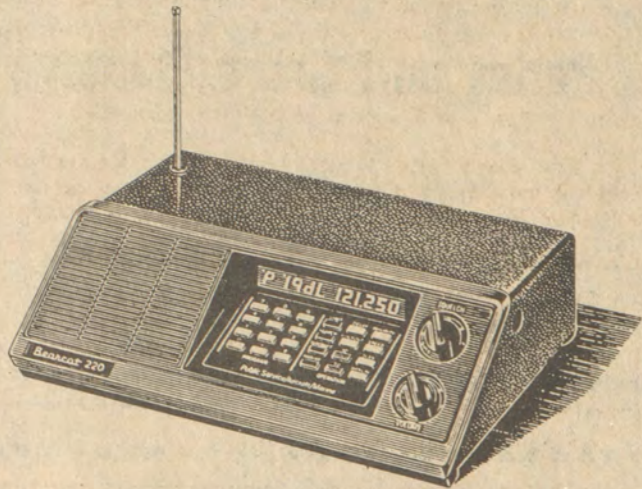

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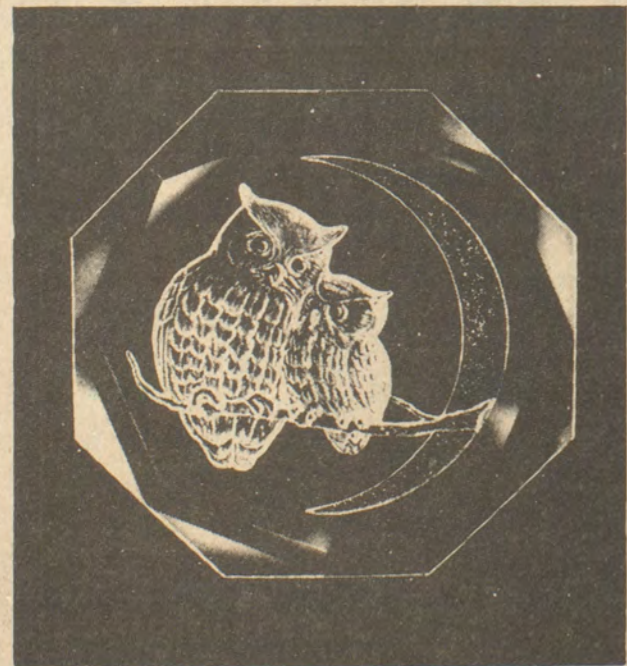

Group Presents Report On Asbestos in Schools

A preliminary report indicating the presence of asbestos in some Kentucky school buildings was presented last week to the Governor's Task Force on Asbestos in Schools.

According to Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Secretary Frank Harscher, who serves as chairman of the task force, the preliminary data is as yet unconfirmed. However, he said several Kentucky school districts will soon be retested to determine the extent of the problem.

The task force was established by Gov. Julian Carroll to look into the problem of asbestos in Kentucky school buildings. Harscher said the task force will meet again in approximately one month to evaluate more incoming data. The task force will eventually report its findings and recommendations to the governor.

Hamilton Faces Hearing on New Mine Operation

Even as the long-disputed application by Sterling Hamilton, of Teaberry, for a permit to strip mine a parcel of land on Tinker Fork of Mud Creek reached the state Court of Appeals last week, the controversial operator faced charges of irregularities at another mining site in the area.

Under consideration by the Appeals Court last Tuesday was a Franklin circuit court review of a 1977 decision by Robert D. Bell, then Secretary of the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, denying the re-issuance of permits to Hamilton for the stripmining of 58 acres of land on Andy Branch of Tinker Fork and for the construction of a hollow fill on an adjoining eight acres.

Last Friday, Hamilton faced a departmental hearing in relation to a deep mine near his Teaberry residence, for which the operator is also seeking a permit. A non-compliance order had previously been issued against T. and S. Coal Company for mining at the site without a permit, and a mine inspector's report of October 3 notes that "the operator has been moving coal since the non-compliance was issued."

At Friday's hearing, Hamilton reportedly agreed to shut down the operation until a permit was issued, to undertake certain remedial measures, and to pay a \$2500 fine.

In the case before the Appeals Court, Willard Johnson and Edgar Howell, who live below part of the acreage in question, objected in April, 1977 to re-issuance of permits for the Tinker Fork site, citing Hamilton's record at that time of more than 60 violations of the state stripmining statute and regulations, several contempt citations in related litigation in Floyd circuit court, and the danger which they claimed would be posed to their families and properties if the permits were re-issued.

Following a departmental hearing in June of that year, DNREP Secretary Bell denied re-issuance of the permits on the basis of Hamilton's repeated violations of the law and the probability that the proposed hollow fill would not be constructed in accordance with the law.

In a subsequent judicial review of Bell's decision, however, Judge Henry Meigs, of the Franklin circuit court, ruled that Hamilton had been denied due process in that the secretary made his decision before receiving a typed transcript of testimony taken at the departmental hearing, and remanded the case to DNREP for consideration by the secretary of a "new order consistent with whatever finding he shall make based on substantial evidence."

At issue before the Court of Appeals is the question of whether Hamilton was in fact denied due process by Bell's deciding the case without access to the typed hearing transcript. Attorneys for Johnson and Howell, denying that this was so, have asked for a reversal of the Franklin circuit court order and for a remand of the case to the circuit court for review of the issue as to whether there was substantial evidence to sustain the Secretary's original decision.

Arguing that Bell's ruling was arbitrary and capricious and denied Hamilton due process of law, Hamilton's attorney has asked the Court of Appeals to affirm the Franklin circuit court decision and to remand the case to the present DNREP Secretary, Frank Harscher, for a new order "based on due process and fair hearing."



Workers' Comp, Hearing Topic

Two Floyd countians were among the liaison committee members representing Black Lung Associations in the Appalachian states and Chicago who testified before a Department of Labor hearing in Washington last week on the administration of the Coal Mine Workers' Compensation Program.

The group, which included Laura Bowers, an attorney with the Appalachian Research and Defense Fund here, and Nick Frasure, a legal services' staffer specializing in black lung issues, conferred with Labor Secretary Ray Marshall last Tuesday in a meeting organized and presided over by Rep. Carl D. Perkins.

While the federal Black Lung Benefits Act which provides for medical assistance and support payments for black lung victims was considerably broadened in 1978, regulations governing administration of the statute have not been revised since 1974, and critics claim that serious inequities and inconsistencies still need to be ironed out.

The program, they say, is still dogged by confusion about the kinds of assistance available and who is eligible to receive it, excessive "red tape" and delay in reimbursing beneficiaries, doctors, pharmacists and hospitals, and ambiguities in the definition of black lung disease.

Continued confusion among doctors and pharmacists about the treatment and drugs that qualify for reimbursement under the program may lead to their loss of confidence in what is essentially a good program, Bowers and Frasure said last week.

Among the demands made of the Labor Department by the group at last week's hearing were a standard procedure for the black lung medical card program nationwide, a precise medical definition of the disease, a clarification of the drugs and equipment for which reimbursement is permitted, and an indefinite extension of the deadline for applying for medical cards.

The group also sought speedy updating of the regulations governing black lung clinics to bring them into conformity with the revised Act and representation of coal miners on the governing boards of clinics receiving federal black lung monies.

Meanwhile, Highlands Regional Medical Center here has recently been notified that it will receive \$420,000 to establish a network of black lung services in this area. Acknowledging charges that in the past some federally-funded respiratory clinics have provided poor services for their clients while claiming excessively high administrative costs, Highlands' Director of Fiscal Services Gary Hoefler said this week that the Highlands program includes provision for substantial representation of coal miners on the advisory boards of all clinics participating in the program and a commitment to "making sure the dollars get down to where they're needed—to the people who need the services."

Home Branch School Opens Under Guard

The Home Branch school at Endicott reopened last Thursday with a full schedule of classwork for the first time since it closed Oct. 18.

The school closed after gunfire damaged nearby cars and after the community had been terrorized by a series of incidents in which three persons were wounded and autos and homes peppered with rifle and shotgun fire. Frightened parents decided to keep their children home until order was restored.

The situation was brought under control when Sheriff Doug Lewis volunteered the services of a deputy as guard at the school, pending action by Governor Carroll in response to an official request from County Judge-Executive Bill Wells for state assistance. School continued this week without incident. Of the 59 pupils enrolled, 46 were in class last Thursday, 50 on Friday and 54 Monday.

Governor Carroll was out of the state last week, and no response from that source has been received. It was indicated, however, that whatever assistance is provided may come from a heavier concentration of state troopers in the school vicinity.

Superintendent Pete Grigsby, Jr. said this week that the Home Branch school calendar is being maintained separately from other schools of the county, and that relief from the school's lost-time status will be sought after it is determined how much additional time, if any, is lost to bad weather during the coming winter.

Carroll Asks \$18 Million From ARC for Area Projects

Gov. Carroll has presented the Appalachian Regional Commission with requests for funds totaling \$18 million in Kentucky's investment program for the 1980 fiscal year.

The program is a summary of projects recommended for funding because they are well-planned, supported by local government and private enterprise and conform to the Kentucky Appalachian Development Plan, said Development Secretary William Short.

The projects listed in the program are within the 49 Appalachian counties and deal with subjects such as health, child development, education, enterprise development and community facilities.

The Development Cabinet has ranked 48 proposals totaling \$12.2 million in the first priority and has listed 28 projects totaling \$5.8 million in the second priority.

Short said the ARC will determine which projects will receive a portion of the \$10.5 million allotted to Kentucky for the 1980 fiscal year.

The ARC will ask project sponsors to submit full applications in March, said Ralph Coldiron, executive director of the office of community and regional development in the Development Cabinet. Final approvals for funding will be made before October 1980, he added.

"The projects that have been submitted in the fiscal year 1980 ARC investment program reflect this state's continuing commitment to the overall community and economic development

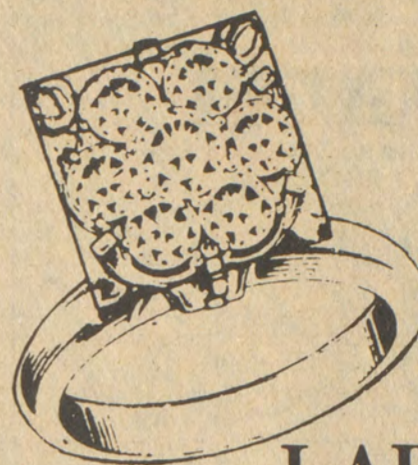
in the 49 Eastern Kentucky counties," Coldiron said.

Projects to be considered include continued funding of the flood warning system based in Pikeville; the Kentucky Appalachian Housing Program, which helps develop moderate- and low-income housing, and the Appalachian Development Council, a 23-member citizens' council that advises the governor and legislature on Eastern Kentucky development policies.

Examples of projects proposed for funding are a study to determine the feasibility of constructing a coal-conversion facility in Harlan and the Lake Cumberland Industrial Park in Somerset.

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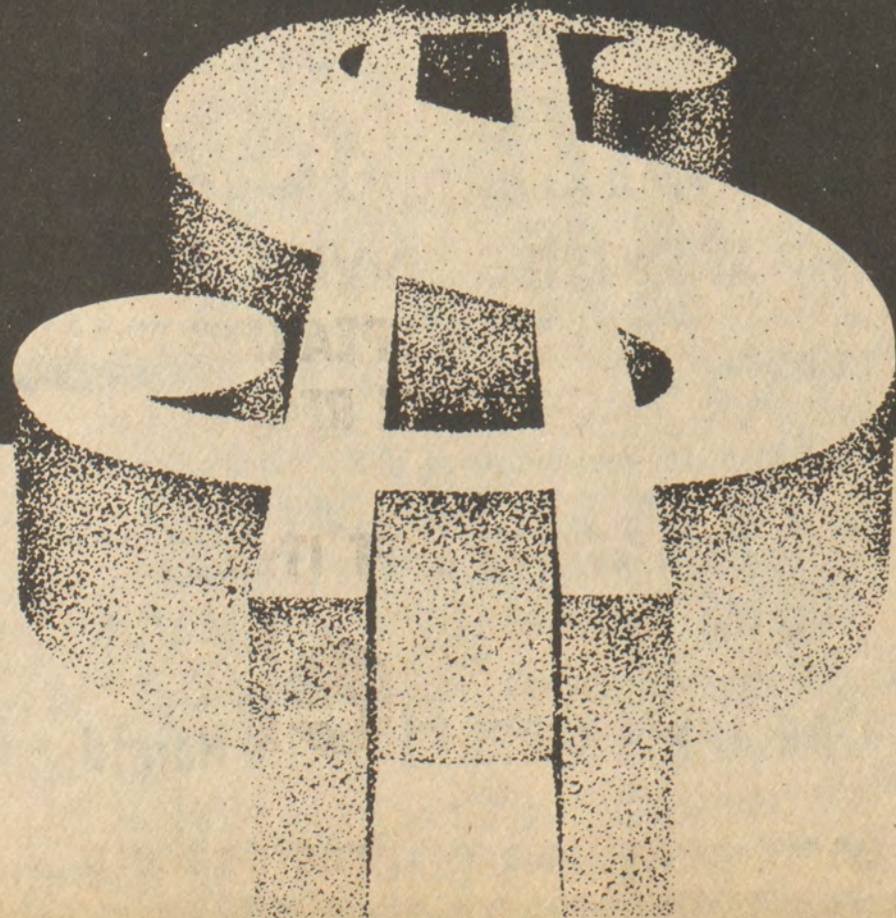
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Ford Hails Senate Vote Establishing Energy Board

After three days of extended debate, the U.S. Senate last Thursday passed legislation that, in the opinion of Senator Wendell Ford (D-Ky.), should have an immediate impact on stimulating domestic energy production.

The measure establishes for the first time ever a four-member Energy Mobilization Board, with authority to designate priority energy projects and then expedite them through the federal

regulatory maze. The concept for a board of this nature was first proposed in August by Energy Committee Chairman Sen. Henry Jackson (D-Wash.), with the support of Senator Ford and 17 other sponsors.

"Quite frankly, this board is the key to the success of future energy development in this country, whether it be from conventional or unconventional sources," Ford said. "Few people realize how many major non-nuclear projects have been cancelled, terminated or abandoned as a result of federal regulatory delays."

Ford said it was significant that the numerous attempts to weaken the board's power and reduce its authority all were rejected by the Senate.

"This indicates to me that a solid majority in the Senate is beginning to realize just how serious our energy problems are, and that the time is past due for strong, positive action," Ford said. "If we had watered down the legislation establishing this board, then our efforts to put this country back on the right track would have been mortally wounded."

Ford said that the Board would have power over all types of energy development projects, ranging from new oil refineries to synthetic fuel plants.

"The Energy Mobilization Board offers the best hope for the short term for substantially reducing our dependence on foreign imports," Ford said. "Powerplants that are now capable of burning coal and other vital projects that could be providing immediate relief have been hopelessly caught up in a mass of bureaucratic red tape."

As a member of the Energy Committee, Ford played an active role on the Senate floor in helping guide the bill to passage. After the bill was approved, Energy Committee Jackson singled out Ford for special praise.

"This bill will go down as one of the most far-reaching pieces of legislation as it pertains to our country as a whole," Jackson said. "I want to thank various members of the committee on both sides of the aisle and I want to especially thank, too, Senator Ford from Kentucky and the other members of the committee who were actively involved in the debate."

With the bill passed, Ford said the committee will now turn its attention to the remaining two sections of the current Congressional energy initiative—one part which provides for a national synthetic fuels program, the other which establishes major new conservation measures.

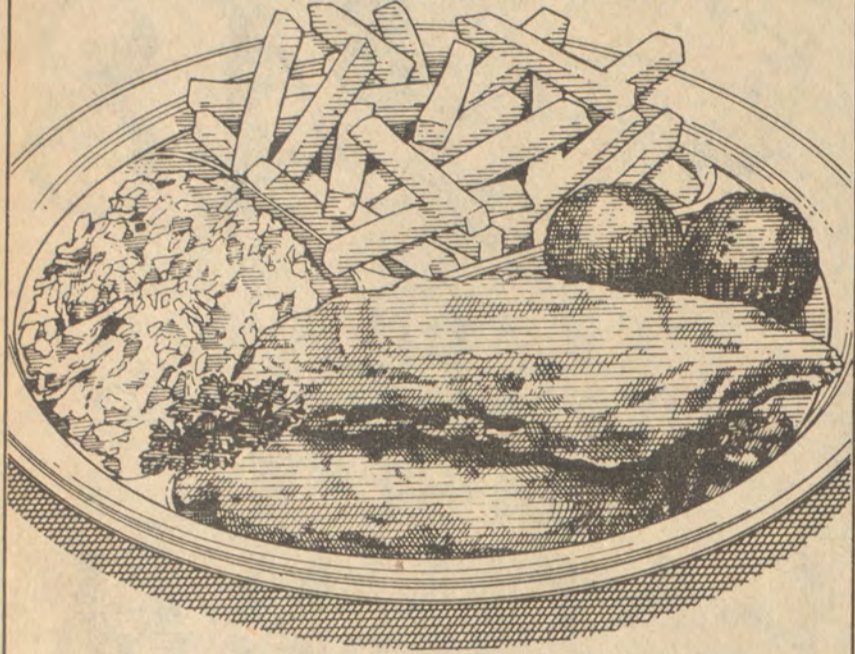

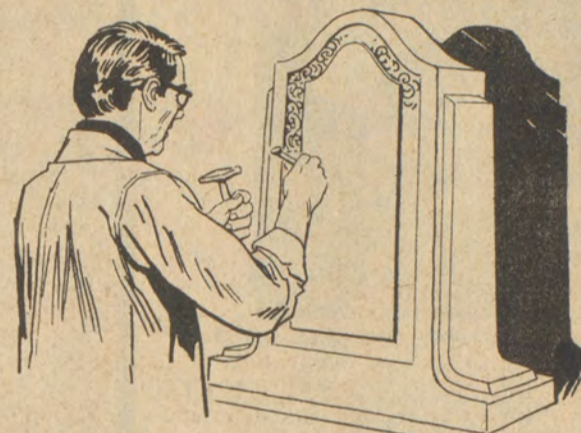

43,000 Americans Killed In Vietnam—240,000 Are Killed by Drunk Drivers

Are you aware that during the same period of time that the U.S. was fighting in Viet Nam that 240,000 Americans were killed by drunk drivers? We were kept constantly informed of the Viet Nam War, but the greatest war was not in Viet Nam but was going on here in the United States—the War Against Alcohol. This war still prevails, and no peace treaty has been signed. It still is responsible for half of all automobile accidents; more than half of our 12th graders drink alcohol at least once a week, and it is estimated that 1.3 million teenagers between 12 and 17 drink enough to have problems.

Not only has it not got better, but the war is worse for the average consumption by juvenile drinkers has doubled in the last 10 years. This war is not restrained to any particular class but is present in the lower, middle, and higher classes of our society. It is responsible for millions of dollars in loss

of work days, divorce, child abuse, accidents, and the rate of suicide among alcoholics in 58 times greater than the normal population.

The Prestonsburg area is not exempt from this epidemic. During 1978, there were 178 arrests for DWI (drinking while intoxicated) and 271 for public drunkenness.

Drugs taken by our youth has steadily risen and statistics taken in 1977 of area high schools revealed that 37 per cent were using drugs and 44 per cent of students in colleges were drug users.

Suicide has also risen to the point of being one of the leading causes of death among teenagers.

Are you concerned? Do our facts surprise you?

Are our youth receiving counseling in this area?

We at the Way of the Cross Outreach have taken preventive steps in these areas by means of a jail ministry providing counseling at the Floyd Co. Juvenile Detention Center. The door has been opened to provide assembly programs dealing with drug and alcohol in our schools. November 7, this year, over 3,000 students were reached by this means. An area crusade is planning on a yearly basis such as the David Wilkerson Crusade; 5,000 to 7,000 were in attendance during the two services and more than 200 decisions were made for Christ by our youth.

During the last year, six to eight boys have been given long-term housing, food and trained in the gospel. An additional 40 other individuals have been provided emergency shelter. The facility now used for housing will not be available after Jan. 1, 1980. However, a house has been located which would adequately provide a group home.

Your help is needed in order to continue. We who are true believers in Jesus Christ have the answer to these life-controlling problems while our society struggles to look for one. We must take the good news of Jesus Christ and not wait for them to come to us.

Short resides in Louisville and said he is resigning to accept a position there.

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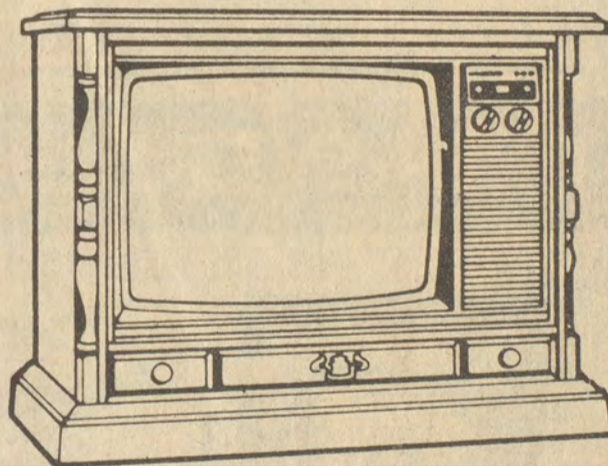
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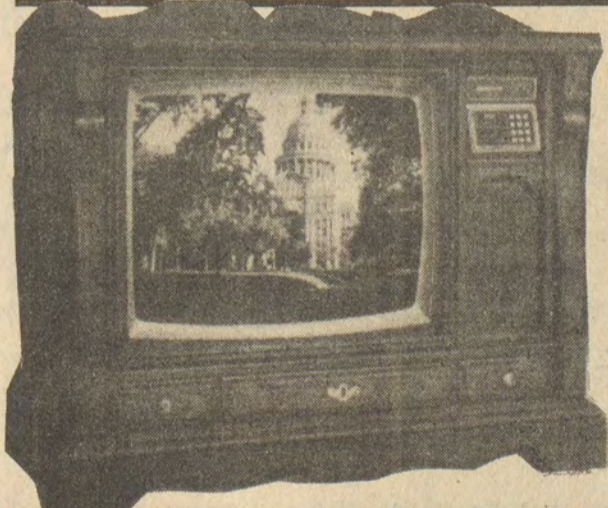
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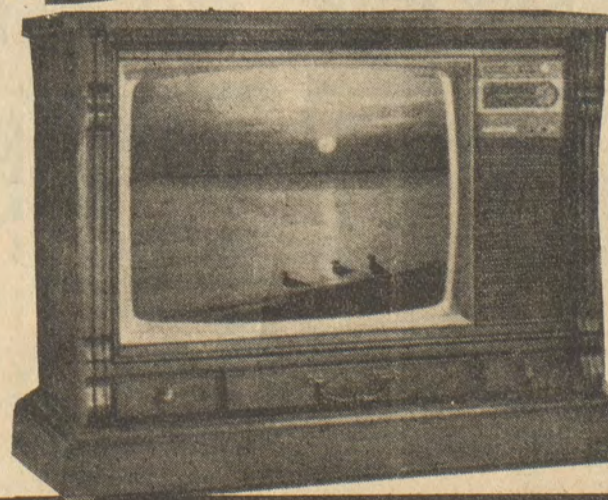
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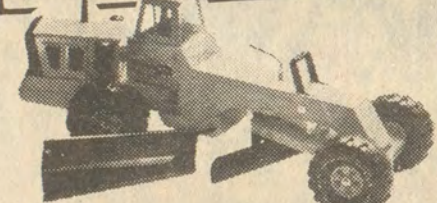
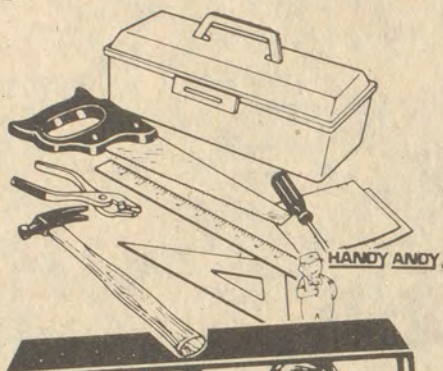
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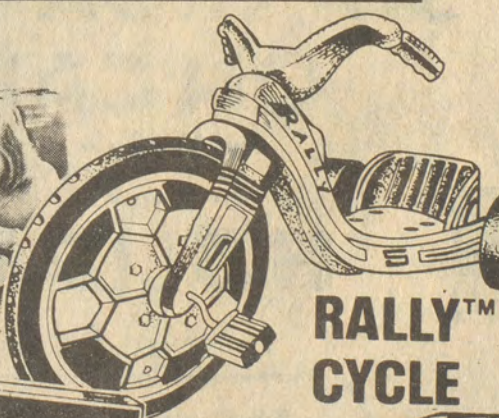
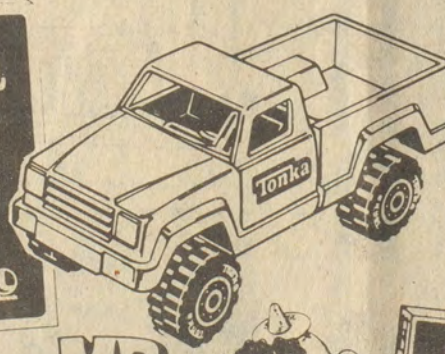
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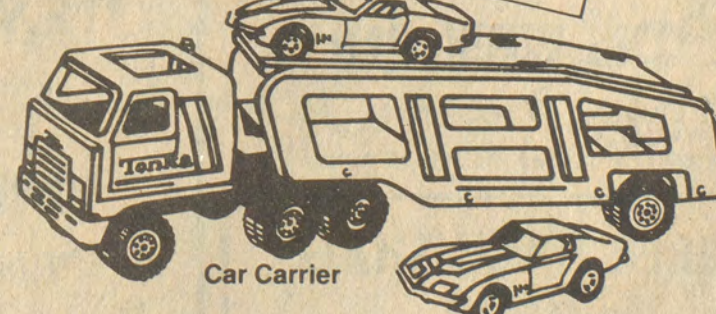
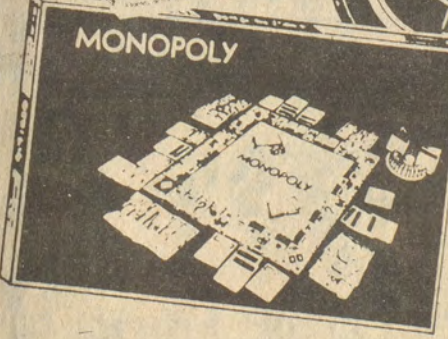
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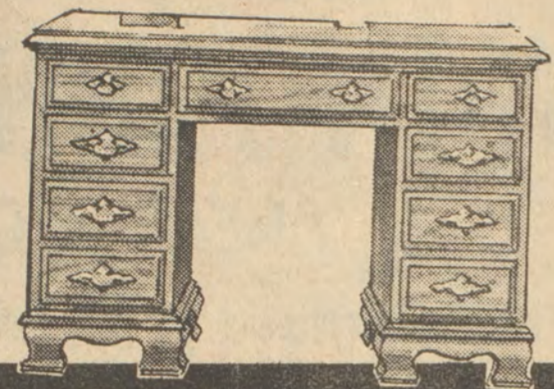
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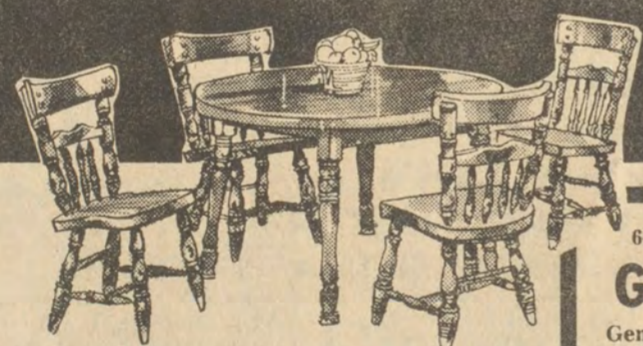
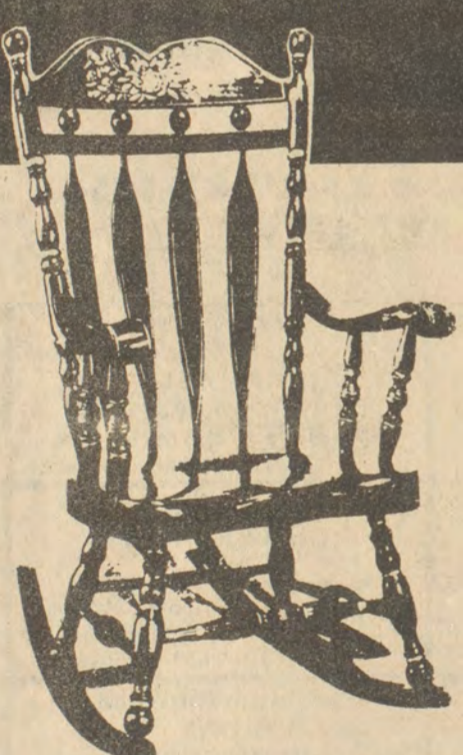
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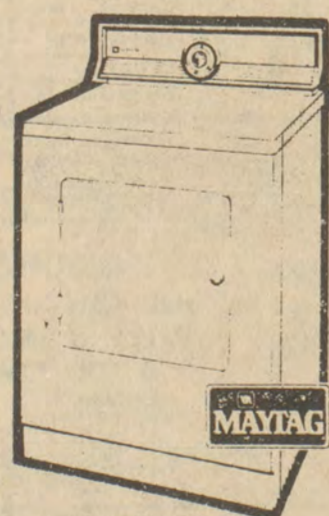
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Strip Job, Site of Bird Hunt

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Kentucky Writers Use Local U.S. Themes

"I have never gotten over the fact that I am from Hazard, Kentucky," said one of the writers attending the "Celebration of Kentucky Writing" held recently at the University of Kentucky.

Over and over, the theme of the sense of place appeared in the conversations and readings of the participants. "I think that the 'Kentucky' obsession is not exclusive to writers, it is the same with every Kentuckian. I think that it is because we are a commonwealth—because we hold in common such a wealth of story and legend," said writer Gurney Norman.

This common store of folklore, images and dialogue was found in the works of the poets and prose writers gathered for the three-day meeting. Many writers expressed their renewed sense of selfhood through community ties. "I discovered that I in fact am a 'Northern Kentuckian'—a person of the Ohio River Valley," said Ed McClanahan.

This renewal, suggested McClanahan, may be due to the increased affluence of Kentuckians, or may be due to increased mobility. "I found that my Kentucky accent got deeper and deeper the longer I stayed in California," he confessed.

Disliking the label "regional" or "local color," writer James Still said that he preferred to express it as "using place as subject." Still's subject is the Knott County community in which he has lived and which he has studied more than 30 years. Among Still's best known works are "River of Earth," "On Troublesome Creek" and a collection of Appalachian riddles and "rusties" called "Way Down Yonder on Troublesome Creek."

Another writer honored by the celebration, Harriette Arnow, has made the people and places of the Lake Cumberland area of Kentucky the subject of much of her work. Mrs. Arnow, who gave a special reading of her work at the meeting, is best known for her books, "The Dollmaker," "The Mountain Path" and "Flowering of the Cumberland," a work based on the stories she heard as a child in Wayne County.

The childhood of Rebecca Caudill, spent in Poor Fork, now Cumberland, provided material for her popular children's books "Up and Down the Stair," "A Certain Small Shepherd" and "A Pocketful of Cricket." Mrs. Caudill's use of her Kentucky experiences found many parallels in the works of other writers attending the meeting. Memories, rhythms and images common to Kentuckians appeared in the readings and discussions of works as diverse as the poems of Lillie Chaffin, the non-fiction work on "Jefferson's Nephews" by Boynton Merrill, the novels of Gurney Norman and the songs and folktales of Logan English.

Much of the conversation of forums, workshops and discussions centered on the interplay of place, language and myth found in the work of contemporary Kentucky writers. Many of those participating in the celebration were "adopted" Kentuckians, bringing with them in their work the images and cadences of Boston, New Orleans and San Antonio.

The countertheme of national concerns was found in the works of participants A. B. Guthrie and Cleanth Brooks. Guthrie, author of "The Big Sky" "The Way West" and "The Last Valley" writes of the American West—its people and its history. Guthrie also worked on the screenplays of "Shane" and "The

Kentuckian" which also dealt with the American frontier. Brooks, a man of letters whose interest and studies span the whole of English-language literature, was honored for his contribution to contemporary writing.

The rich and varied texture of contemporary literature was mirrored in the special readings given during the three-day conference. Historical fiction, poetry, drama, the works of black writers, the novel and children's literature were among the genre discussed and read. The wide array of writing proved, as organizers of the conference noted, "that 'Kentucky is a place hospitable to artists and to art."
