VA Says No Dividends Paid on Lapsed Policies

Several different groups of individuals and organizations in Kentucky are now circulating what the VA calls "the old dividend hoax." It promises that veterans of World War II can collect a dividend based on their service, "even if they haven't kept their policies in force."

The VA has been plagued for years by an annual influx of queries about, and applications for, the non-existent dividends.

It is a hoax that has recurred annually since 1948. The hoax is fueled anew every few years by the mysterious distribution of official-looking application forms complete with an address where dividends are said to be available for the asking.

Ashland Coal Gets Permit To Construct Tower in Johnson Co.

The Kentucky Airport Zoning Commission last week approved three applications for permitted construction along state airways:

-A permit to construct an antenna tower 6.5 miles northeast of the Paintsville-Prestonsburg Airport near Van Lear in Johnson county. The tower, erected by Ashland Coal Inc., will be 200 feet high.

-A permit to construct an antenna tower seven miles southeast of Barkley Regional Airport near Paducah in McCracken county. The tower, 300 feet high, will be erected by National Tower Leasing Co.

-A permit to allow construction of numerous street light standards near the approach end of Bowling Green Airport's Runway 3 in Warren county.

Two permit applications submitted by Peabody Coal Co. for construction in Waverly (Union county) were set aside until more information could be obtained.

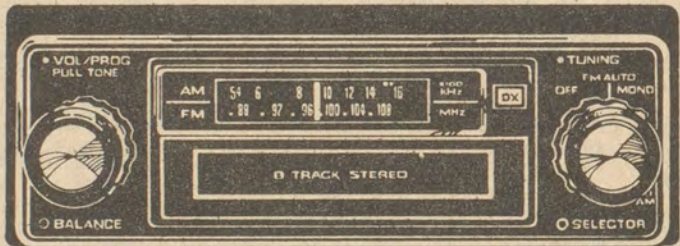

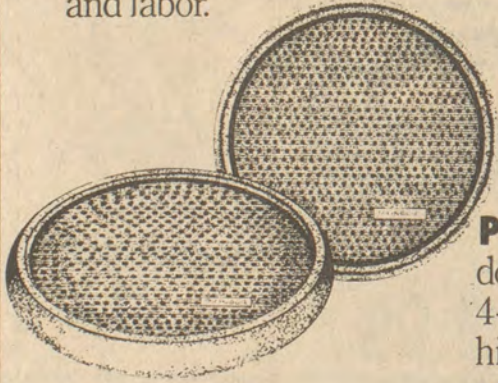

### Miners Meet UMW President

PIKEVILLE, KY.—Sam Church, new president of the United Mine Workers of America, visited Pike county last week in an attempt to restore harmony between coal miners and company officials at two union mines.

In doing so, he apparently also restored some harmony to the UMW in Kentucky.

"This is the cooperation that the rank and file has been begging for several years now," said J. B. Trout, who has been international executive board representative from District 30 in Pikeville since 1973.

"We've had better cooperation in the five days Sam Church has been in office than we've had in seven years."

Arnold Miller, UMW president for the past seven years, resigned his office while in a Charleston, W. Va., hospital recovering from a heart attack.

Trout claimed Miller had ignored Kentucky, perhaps because the state's three union districts failed to support him in the last union election.

Church, 43, a former miner from

Matewan, W. Va., who attended Berea College for a year, told a news conference in district headquarters here "unemployment is Kentucky's big problem now, a problem caused by a slump in the coal market."

To help remedy this, he said, the UMW is supporting government action to stimulate coal use. The union wants federal backing for development of plants to convert coal to synthetic fuels and for power plants switching from other fuels to coal.

"I see a large growth in the coal industry during the next 10 years because of the switch to synthetic fuels," he said. "The coal industry will boom and the mine worker should be part of the boom."

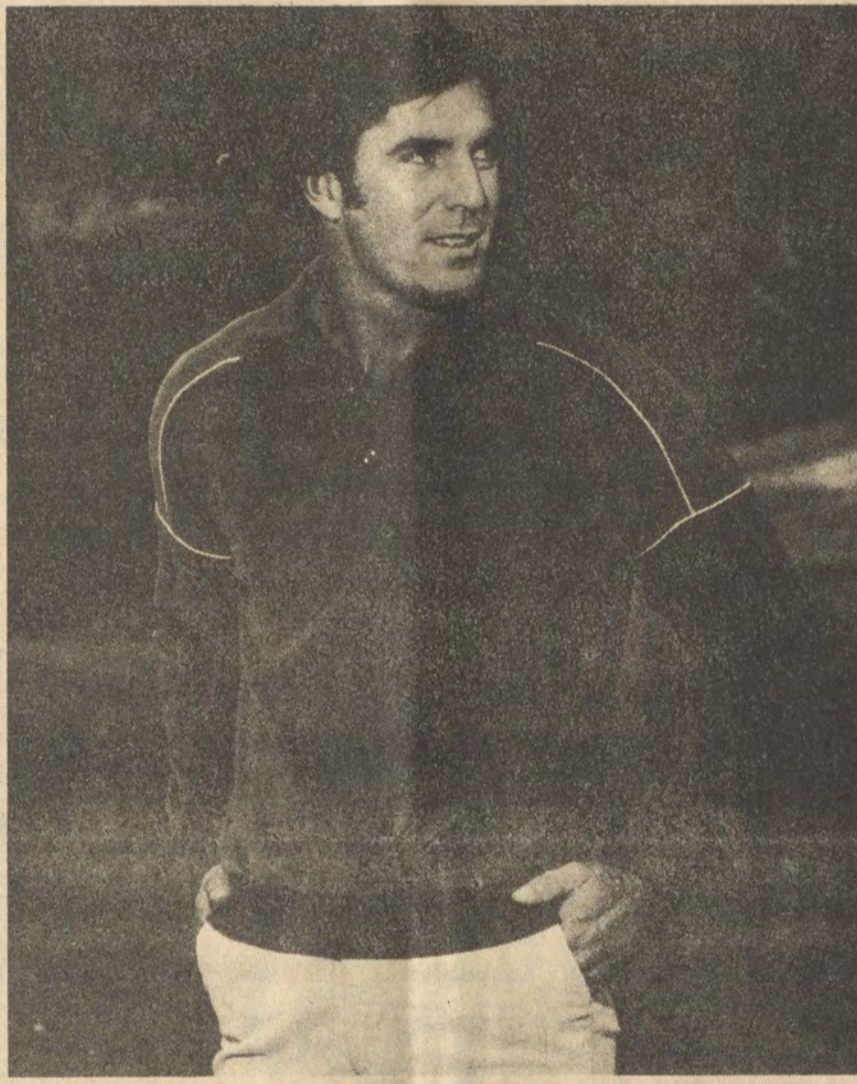

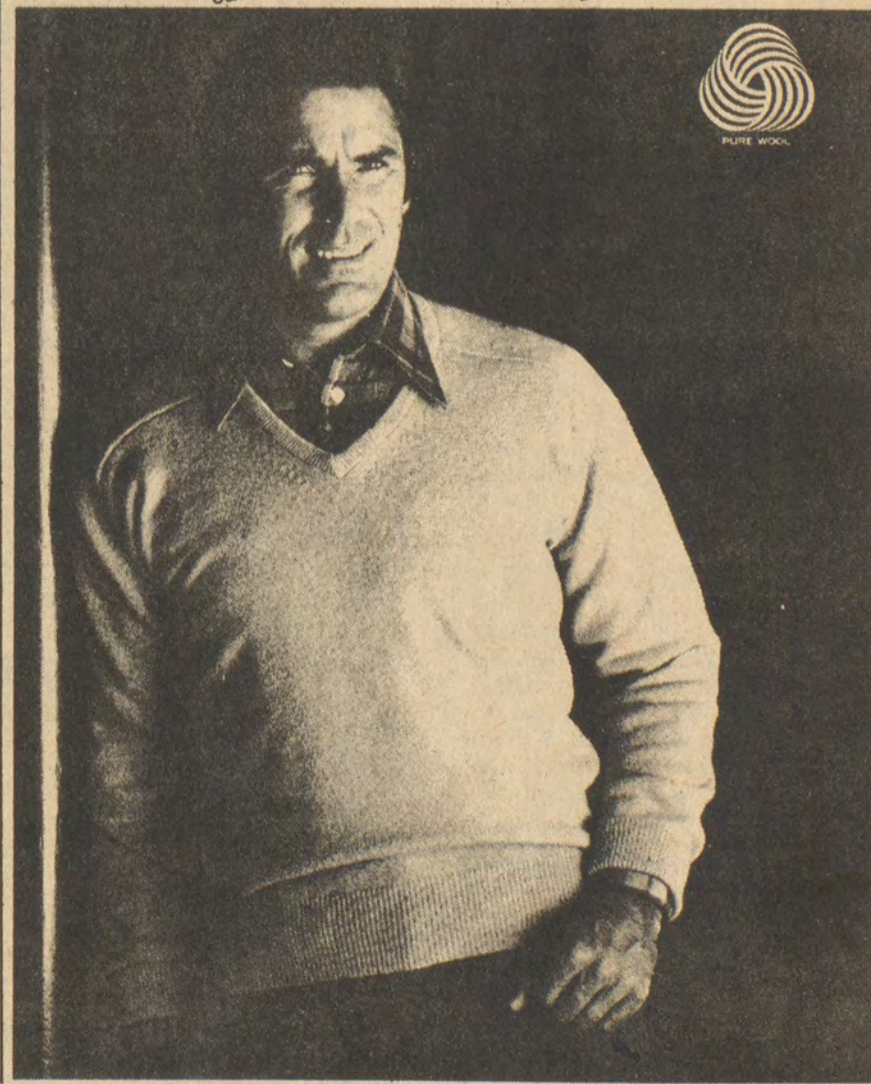

**Recommend Increase  
In Tax, Toll, Fees  
For State Road Fund**

Potential sources of revenue to bolster the state road fund were outlined in the Governor's Task Force on Transportation's report presented to Gov. Carroll here today.

Recommendations contained in the report included increasing the motor fuels tax by two cents per gallon effective immediately; removing the 5 percent sales tax exemption on motor fuels; transferring the debt service retirement for state toll roads from the road fund to the state general fund; doubling present fees on toll roads to keep up with inflation; and increasing registration fees on all vehicles from \$12.50 to \$25.

According to the report, the two-cent increase would raise the motor fuels tax from 9 cents to 11 cents for gasoline and 11 cents to 13 cents for diesel fuel.

Also, the report states an additional \$54 million would be available in the state road fund if the toll road debt service retirement was transferred to the state general fund.

Gov. Carroll said the main factors influencing funding decisions include "what transportation services do Kentuckians expect, what can they afford, what are they willing to pay for and how can these needs be financed?"

Carroll said the state should "build projects now," alluding to the task force report figures that show the cost of construction or reconstruction of a highway has nearly tripled since 1967.

"We should borrow money now and build instead of waiting for money to come in" when projects are more expensive, Carroll added.

"The strength of Kentucky's economy comes from a successful transportation program," he said, adding that governor-elect John Y. Brown supports this concept.

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### Jean Thomas, Now 98, Honored As Ashland Museum Dedicated

A long-cherished dream of folklorist Jean Thomas was realized Nov. 20 as a museum was dedicated in her honor at the new Appalachian Cultural Park, south of Ashland.

Some 150 persons attended a reception and party for Mrs. Thomas on her 98th birthday in the reconstructed museum home in "The House in the Woods" on McCullough Drive.

The Jean Thomas Museum represents the first phase of the Appalachian Cultural Park which is being developed by the Greater Ashland Cultural and Economic Development Foundation, Inc.

The brick cottage was expanded to include an art gallery and meeting room, an Appalachian gift shop, an archives area and a storage vault.

Funds for the museum and "The Gathering Place," a community center which will be built on an adjoining site, were provided from a \$1,259,600 grant from the state's local Convention and Community Centers Fund.

Mrs. Thomas, who is in a nursing home, was unable to attend her birthday party. Her niece, Sandy Crawford, said there was no need to make a wish as she cut the cake. "Speaking for Aunt Jenny (Jean Thomas), I think our wish has already come true," she said.

The three-tiered cake featured a model of an English cottage and a miniature "traipsin' woman" wearing Mrs. Thomas' familiar costume - a long, black dress with white ruffled collar and cuffs. Similar costumes were worn by the volunteer guides who showed visitors through the museum. The museum is filled with antiques, primitive musical instruments and other memorabilia.

Ashland banker G. B. Johnson Jr. paid tribute to members of the community, local officials, Gov. Julian Carroll and other state officials for their part in the successful completion of the project.

Charles Hall, chairman of the commission named by the Greater Ashland Foundation to manage the Appalachian Cultural Park, said plans for the park include an amphitheater, relocation of the one-room schoolhouse where Jesse Stuart once taught and the moving of a log school house from the Logan Street site where Jean Thomas' home formerly stood.

He said the park commission later plans to revive the folk song festival which Mrs. Thomas began in 1931 and which was discontinued in 1972 because of her declining health. A continuing drama may also be developed for presentation in the amphitheater, he added.

"We're excited about the whole thing," Hall said. "It's just the beginning of what we know will be a truly great thing for Eastern Kentucky. It will be the seed for many great things to come in this area."

The Appalachian Cultural Park is expected to become a major tourist attraction. It will also provide a center for scholars interested in studying traditional Appalachian music, folklore and history.

Fed. Program Aims at Providing Disadvantaged Adequate Heat

It happens every year about this time. Temperatures begin to drop, leaves start to turn and brisk winds announce the approach of winter weather.

And along with the change of season come higher heating bills.

The Kentucky Department for Human Resources is managing a \$4.5 million federal program aimed at keeping low-income, elderly and handicapped Kentuckians warmer this winter.

The program provides labor and materials to weatherize the homes of disadvantaged Kentuckians, at no charge to the residents. Improvements include window repairs, weather stripping, storm windows and attic insulation.

Weatherization improvements are made on owner-occupied single family dwellings. Rental property housing low-income persons may be weatherized providing the landlord agrees not to increase the rent for at least one year.

Up to \$1,000 per home can be spent on materials and program support costs including tools, transportation, equipment and on-site supervision, according to Mark Caines, coordinator of the project for the Human Resources Department's Bureau for Social Services. The U.S. Department of Energy, which provides funding for the project, allows Kentucky to waive the regulation that sets the regional limit at \$800 per dwelling. Kentucky is the northern-most state in the southeastern states region.

Human Resources is authorized this calendar year to allocate \$4.5 million to the local agencies administering the weatherization project, Caines said. Twenty-one community action agencies and four independent agencies manage the project on local levels through the state. Caines estimates that 5,000 Kentucky dwellings will be improved by the end of December.

The push to spend the federal money, Caines said, stems from President Carter's emphasis on assisting low-income persons faced with high utility bills due to improperly insulated homes. Federal officials hope to complete the majority of weatherization work by the end of this December before winter weather halts outside house repairs.

While 25 agencies manage the weatherization repairs on the local levels, the Department for Human Resources' Bureau for Manpower Services administers CETA funds from the U.S. Department of Labor to pay salaries of weatherization workers. Funds for materials, administration and other expenses are allocated to local agencies by the Human Resources Department's Bureau for Social Services.

Caines said each of the 25 local agencies has an outreach staff in every Kentucky county. Those staffs receive recommendations on persons potentially eligible for the home weatherization benefits. To qualify for weatherization, persons must receive annual income at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty guidelines. Special emphasis is

Caines said 2,546 homes were weatherized between April and December last year and an additional 2,867 homes were weatherized this year between January and June.

Kentucky has been involved in the federal project since its inception by the former Federal Energy Administration in 1977, Caines said. The state received its initial grant of \$603,000 for home weatherization in April, 1978. A second grant of \$1.5 million was awarded in October, 1978. Caines said the department received a third grant totalling \$4.5 million in September. The department has applied for an additional grant for the weatherization project, he said. If approved, that grant money should arrive in January.

B & H Denied Rate Hike

The Kentucky Energy Regulatory Commission has denied a natural gas rate increase sought by the B & H Gas Co. of Stanville.

The company's proposed rates would have produced additional annual revenues of more than \$27,500, an increase of 58.34 percent.

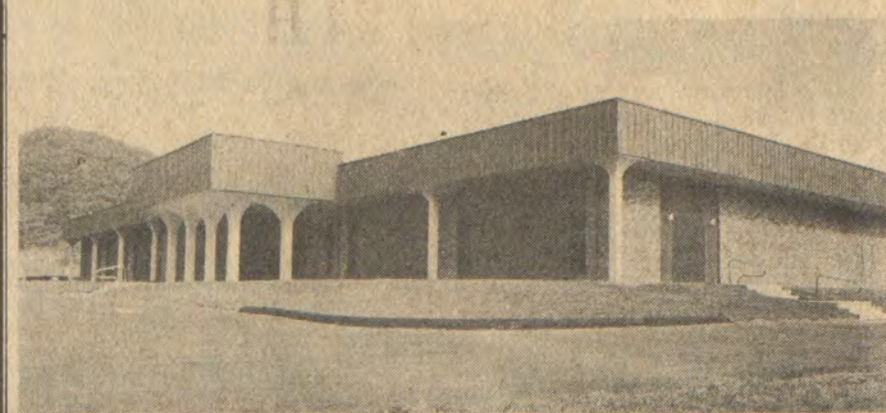
The company told the commission it needed the rate hike to cover increased operating expenses and to make system improvements required by the commission.

According to the commission's order, the present rates produce sufficient revenues to meet expenses and debt service requirements and provide a reasonable surplus.

The proposed rates, the commission said, "are unfair, unjust and unreasonable in that they produce annual revenues in excess of those found reasonable."

## Floyd Student Shares Record For Relay Run of 24 Hours

When four members of the Morehead State University track team started running last Tuesday morning their primary goal was to raise funds for a Special Olympics program to benefit handicapped youngsters in the Morehead area. But while they were at it the four athletes, who included Prestonsburg high school graduate Jim Brown, managed to set a new world's record for the 24-hour relay run.

"We decided we'd might as well try for the record even though we didn't actually think we could break it," commented Brown, a MSU freshman and son of Jason and Nancy Brown, of Middle Creek.

Brown, along with teammates Tim Back, of Morehead, John Broders, of Somerset, and Steve Gosney, of Cincinnati, O., started the marathon Tuesday morning at 10 a.m. running in alternating mile relays. "Each of us would run a mile, relay the bat to the next man, and then rest about 15 minutes or so," Brown pointed out.

Recalling the run, Brown said, "We managed to keep up the pace, and by 1 o'clock Wednesday morning we knew we would break the record." Exhausted, the four "just coasted" after realizing they had set a new record. The runners covered 234 miles, beating the existing record of 133 miles set by a California team in 1977, and Brown pointed out that the MSU team quit with 45 minutes to go. "So we could have racked up several more miles," he commented.



Brown said the team received a lot of support from local people who brought food and refreshments throughout the run and offered encouragement to the weary runners.

Brown said this week that the idea that he and his fellow runners had set a world's record "is just now starting to sink in."

"I just hope now that I can continue to develop and turn into a good performer for Morehead," Brown said.

Research Commission (LRC), the rules committee and the Committee on Committees. President of the Senate and speaker of the house serve as co-chairman of the LRC.

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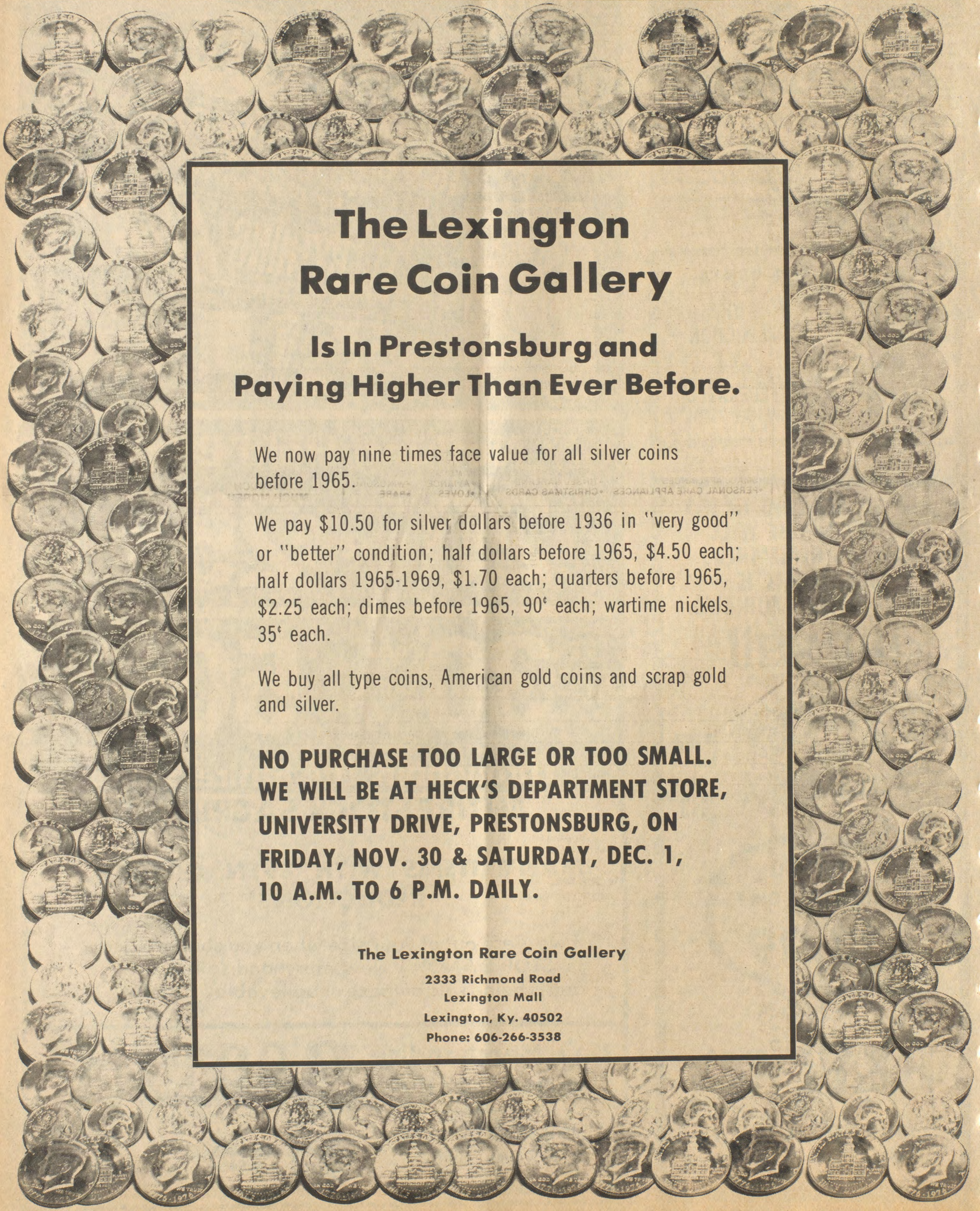

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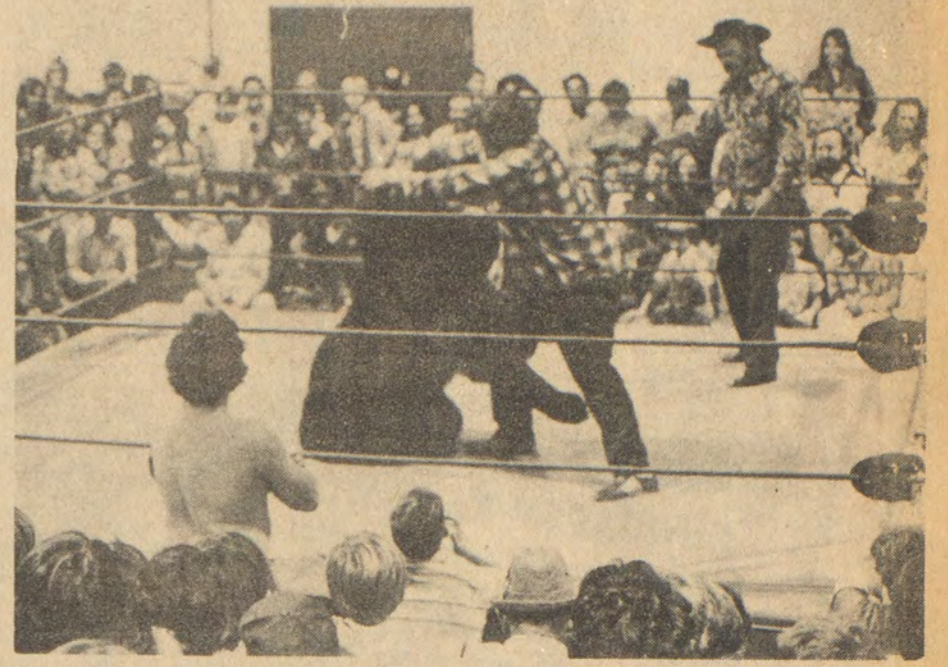
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Wrestling Draws Large Crowds Here

Former Secretary of Transportation Brock Adams challenged the automotive industry to re-invent the car. What does that mean? Can it be done? Is it being done? We asked the Department of Transportation and the Motor Vehicle Manufacturers Association: Can we

## Re-Invent the Car?

Telling the motor vehicle industry to "re-invent the car" is a lot like resurrecting Christopher Columbus and asking him to rediscover America.

The challenge to Detroit was sounded by former U.S. Secretary of Transportation Brock Adams — and his phrase lingers on. Actually, the car designers and engineers are fully aware of the need for creativity. The auto archives are full of companies that failed to satisfy public demand for innovation.

Seldom, if ever, does a year go by without a noteworthy improvement in the automobile. The U.S. Patent Office in Arlington, Virginia, has filed over four million papers in its long history, and automotive patents represent a high percentage of them. Some automotive patents go back beyond the day when the Duryea brothers rolled a single cylinder, gasoline powered runabout on the streets of Springfield, Massachusetts, over 80 years ago. That was the birth of the U.S. industry as we know it today.

To relate "invent" or "re-invent" to the total automobile is difficult. There are no Edisons or Howes or Whitneys in the annals of the auto industry because the car itself is a complex combination of many inventions. There are people who have worked on brakes, others who pioneered the storage battery, some who developed the internal combustion engine. The list goes on — and on.

There may not be a single area of the automobile that hasn't received some type of periodic improvement.

Of significance in these times of environmental concern is the progress made in lowering vehicle emissions. Hydrocarbons are down 85% from the uncontrolled products of the Sixties. Carbon monoxide has been reduced 82% and oxides of nitrogen emissions have been halved.

While manufacturers have improved fuel economy by nearly 50% in the past five years, the price and the supply of fuel remain uppermost in the minds of the motoring public as we near the Eighties. Manufacturers are committed to reaching the mandated 27.5 mpg fleet average by 1985.

The average of all domestic automobiles produced in 1980 will register at least 20 miles per gallon of fuel. It is true that the mpg figure has been mandated by the Federal government; but while the Federal government has set standards for fuel mileage, clean air and safety, it generally has left it to car and truck producers to determine how to reach those goals. In most cases there has been no attempt to legislate an invention.

When equipment has been mandated, the results generally have been unsatisfactory. A prime example was the ill-fated interlock system of 1974. It required a car starting sequence involving the seat belt. Congress finally killed the device after a public uproar.

Nobody needs to shove the motor vehicle industry onto the path of innovation. All of the competing companies wish they had more small, fuel efficient cars on the market. Wishing is just a fraction of the story.

Today there is an all-out effort to produce cleaner, safer cars that consume less fuel. More and more lightweight materials like high strength steel, aluminum and plastics are being used. Electronics are being introduced to control and monitor the operation of the engine and other parts of the vehicle.

Ahead, electronics will be in charge of virtually all engine movements including fuel and air intake and exhaust gas recirculation systems. They will tell us when our tires need replacing and will diagnose engine ailments. We already have computers that measure distances and estimate your driving time and miles per gallon of fuel.

Re-invent the car? More likely, we will improve on the transportation system that Americans want and need. Engines will be smaller, with more four- and six-cylinder entries, perhaps with a different kind of power plant like the electric car. Engineers can be expected to utilize what is good and focus on making it better.

Never have engineering challenges been greater. Between now and 1985, the vehicle manufacturers will be spending some \$80 billion to design cars that meet Federal fuel standards.

V.J. Adduci, President of the Motor Vehicle Manufacturer's Association, says, "Success will be measured by the marketplace. The customer has always been the ultimate arbiter of automotive innovation."

Too little has been added in recent years to the pool of scientific knowledge from which must be drawn the fundamental technological advances imperative for the automobile of the 1990's and beyond. The industry has spent only a very small fraction of its research and development dollars on basic research. It has concentrated its efforts and resources on applied technology to satisfy near-term federal standards for fuel economy, emission control and safety, and to meet consumer demands. At the federal level, there has also been only limited emphasis on basic automotive research.

The premise that the car will remain the prime means of personal mobility for the foreseeable future, and the industry's acknowledgment that it does not have the resources to overcome decades of inattention to the need for replenishing the science and engineering of automotive technology have brought Detroit and Washington together in a remarkable endeavor.

The five domestic auto manufacturers (including Volkswagen of North America) and the government, after months of discussion and planning beginning with last May's White House meeting with President Carter, are working to develop a jointly sponsored Cooperative Automotive Research Program. The program, designed to help lay the technological base for the next generation of automobiles, is before Congress as an important component of the Administration's Transportation-Energy Initiative. It would be financed in part by the proposed Energy Security Fund, which would provide \$800 million over the next decade. Based on a preliminary understanding, the manufacturers would match federal funding at levels of up to \$50 million a year.

The undertaking will have the following characteristics:

- A focus on basic research which can contribute substantially to improved automotive technology by developing knowledge in such fields as thermal and fluid sciences, structural mechanics, electrochemistry, aerodynamics, noise and vibration, materials science and processing, control systems, and friction and wear. (In-depth analyses of research opportunities in each area and an inventory of ongoing related research are underway.)
- A pluralistic approach, involving a range of university, industry and Federal laboratories in performing the research, to insure that there are independent sources of new ideas and an increased supply of automotive engineers.
- Personnel exchanges, especially between industrial and university laboratories, to maintain the flow of information and the transfer of new engineering knowledge.
- Wide and open dissemination of results to all interested parties, subject to patent provisions.
- A level of effort and timing determined by the capacity of the science and engineering community to absorb new funds and the competing demands on Federal and corporate resources.
- Industry financial participation that will include mechanisms for industry contributions through direct grants to universities, increases in effort at automotive laboratories, and other arrangements.
- Federal agency participation that will be determined by an evaluation of the policy responsibilities, research management capabilities and the role of research within each agency. To insulate the program from political and technological pressures of the various Federal regulatory programs, the initiative will not be managed by a regulatory agency.
- Decentralized project selection mechanisms, within an agreed upon general agenda of research areas, and avoiding specified quantitative technological targets, because of the inherent unpredictability of the results of this basic research.

Current work is focused on planning to provide the administrative and technical framework for the program. Working groups, including participants from government, industry, and universities are now formulating the detailed research agenda.

What began in December 1978 as a challenge to Detroit by former Transportation Secretary Adams has, with the responsive and farsighted partnership of the auto manufacturers, and the leadership of the Administration, evolved into a landmark cooperative program of much promise. The launching of the Cooperative Automotive Research Program represents an unprecedented investment in the future of the automobile industry and all that industry means to the nation's economy — not to mention the cherished personal mobility of the American people.

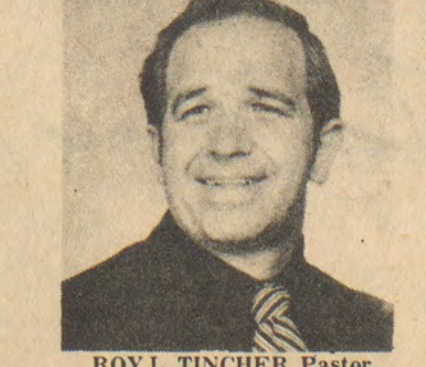

## ★ Consumer Report ★

CREDIT INSURANCE

The credit card has brought many conveniences to the American shopper. However, it has also created problems. One such problem is personal liability for lost or stolen cards. Thieves can take advantage of this situation by making large unauthorized purchases with stolen credit cards.

Many insurance companies now offer credit card insurance which limits your liability if your cards are lost or stolen. Credit card companies have also started offering this type insurance. Payments are usually low and are automatically charged to your account.

Before you consider buying such insurance, you should know that the law already protects your credit cards by limiting your liability for lost or stolen cards.

The Truth in Lending Act protects you from getting taken for large amounts of money by someone who has found or stolen your credit cards. If your cards are lost or stolen, you do not have to pay for any unauthorized charges, but you must write the company notifying them of the loss.

The most you will ever have to pay for any unauthorized charges is \$50 per credit card. Even if someone runs up several thousand dollars worth of charges before you report the card missing, your liability is still limited to \$50 per card.

Be sure to keep a list of your credit card numbers separate from your credit cards so you can immediately notify your card companies of your loss.

The Truth in Lending Act gives you added protection in that it states credit card companies may not collect any loss from you unless they can prove several things.

They must prove they issued you the card at your request or that you used it at least once before it was lost. They must also prove there was some means to identify you, such as a photo or signature strip on the card. Card companies must prove they notified you of your potential \$50 liability and they provided you with a

stamped, self-addressed envelope and form to notify them in case the card was missing.

Because the law already limits your liability for lost or stolen credit cards, you should carefully consider whether or not you actually need credit card insurance. Don't be tricked into buying coverage which the law gives you free.

However, if you have a large number of credit cards, insurance may be desirable. Whatever your decision, be sure you read and understand any insurance policy before you sign.

### Home Care Operator Paid For Deceased Patient Care

Information regarding possible fraud by a family care home operator has been turned over to the Fayette County Commonwealth's Attorney by the state Department for Human Resources.

DHR spokesman, Barbara Hadley, said officials of the department's guardianship program discovered payments for care and maintenance of a patient had been made to a home operator for 3½ years after that patient had died.

The erroneous payments, totaling \$10,000, were made because guardianship unit, which issues the checks,

was not notified of the death of the client. Neither did the client's survivors submit claim for death benefits from Social Security. Such a claim would have alerted department staff to halt checks.

The situation was further complicated by the fact that the personal care operator had moved her home from one county to another one week before the client died. Afterwards the operator was caring for only one patient in the new county residence, and she did not have to be licensed by the state.

"We feel this particular incident is an isolated one," Hadley stated. "But the fact remains that there was a lack of communication between the family care operator and the department, and within the department, and we will have to prosecute to recover the funds."

"Officials within the department have been concerned for sometime about the lack of our ability to provide appropriate guardianship services and to monitor the guardianship system," said Hadley. "Proposals have been developed to streamline the procedure and expand the staff in that area. Before they can be put into effect, we need legislative approval and budget appropriations, and we are requesting those from the 1980 General Assembly."

The state becomes the guardian of individuals when they are ruled incompetent by the courts and committed to the care of the Department for Human Resources.

### Sen. Ford To Address UK Stripmining Symposium

U.S. Sen. Wendell H. Ford of Kentucky will be among speakers at the first Symposium on Surface Mining Hydrology, Sedimentology and Reclamation in Lexington Dec. 4-7.

The symposium is being sponsored by the University of Kentucky, College of Agriculture, College of Engineering, Office of Engineering Continuing Education and Extension and the Institute for Mining and Minerals Research. It will be at the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

Ford will speak Dec. 5 on the congressional intent of the 1977 Surface Mine Reclamation and Control Act. Talks on implementation of the act and the act as it relates to private industry, Kentucky, research and the roles of the College of Agriculture and the College of Engineering will follow Ford's address that day.

Speakers will be, respectively, Walter N. Heiner, director of the Office of Surface Mining in the U.S. Department of Interior; Ben E. Lusk, president of the Mining and Reclamation Council of America; Gene Brandenburg, commissioner of the state Bureau of Surface Mining and Reclamation and Enforcement; Becky Green, director of environmental studies for NERCO in Portland, Ore.; C. Oran Little, associate dean for research in the UK College of Agriculture, and James Funk, associate vice president for academic affairs and coordinator of energy research in UK's College of Engineering.

The conference, intended to be an annual event, also will feature presentations of more specialized subjects in concurrent sessions on hydrology, sedimentology and reclamation. Six different mini-courses will be presented simultaneously two times.

The symposium has been organized to gather current information from various institutions, such as universities, government agencies and practicing engineering and consulting groups. The information will be disseminated for use by field reclamation and engineering personnel.

Stanley B. Carpenter, associate professor in the College of Agriculture's Department of Forestry, is program chairman.

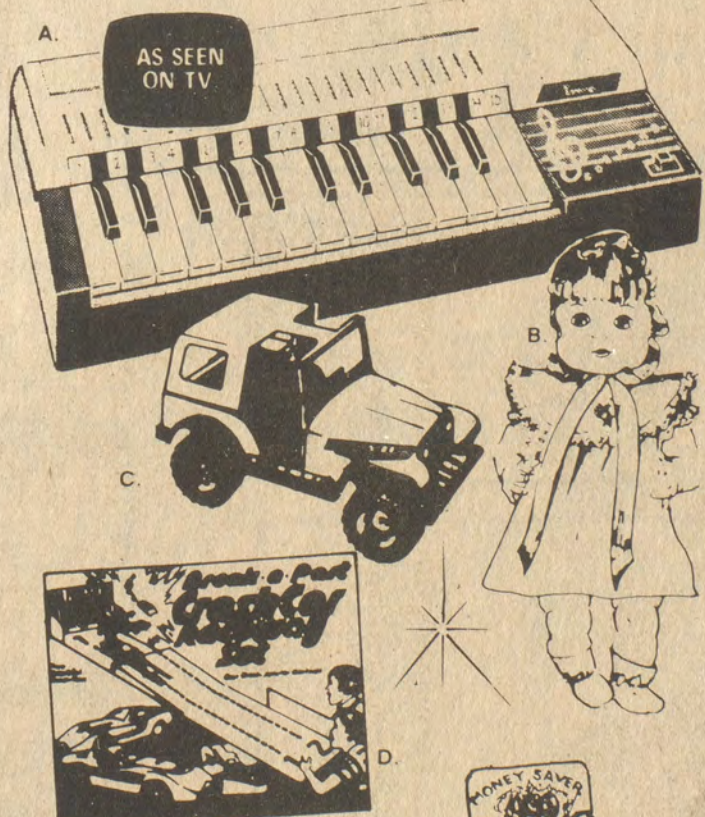

### Fuel Assistance Program Expected Ready Dec. 3rd

Low-income families faced with a loss of heat this winter can apply for financial assistance under the federal government's new Energy Crisis Assistance Program.

Grants totaling \$3.5 million have been approved for the state and are expected to become available to crisis-needy families by Dec. 3.

Administration of the program will be carried out by the state Department for Human Resources, Bureau for Social Insurance.

Unlike the state's Energy Cost Assistance Program, the federal money is not tied to age or disability requirements.

According to Jack Waddell, bureau commissioner, people may qualify who have an income at or below 125 percent of the poverty level and who are without or will be without heat within 15 days.

The program limits the amount of money a qualifying individual may have in checking and savings accounts. A single person is allowed to have cash assets up to \$1,500, while a couple may

have up to \$2,250. Real property such as homes, cars and jewelry are not counted. Applicants may receive up to \$400 depending on the amount needed to obtain or retain heating service. Generally the bureau will issue a check payable to both the applicant and the heat supplier.

If the \$400 limit is not used and another crisis occurs, application may be made for the balance.

To apply, applicants must state the amount needed to have the fuel bill paid and provide verification that a crisis exists and that their income and resource levels are within program limits. Checks will be issued approximately three to five working days after an application is made.

**Kentucky's Changing Economy**

The forecast for Kentucky is that the coming recession will not affect the state as badly as it will the United States as a whole. This is the conclusion of Dr. Charles Hultman, chairman of the Kentucky Council of Economic Advisors (KCEA) and Dr. Charles Renfro, acting executive director of the KCEA. Their forecasts have just been summarized in the September edition of Kentucky Economy: Review and Perspective.

According to their projections, personal income (the total of all income to Kentuckians including wages, salaries, interest, rents, etc.) will rise throughout 1980. For the year 1978, the total state personal income of 23.2 billion dollars was an increase of 13.07 percent over that for 1977. During 1979, personal income is expected to increase by 13.44 percent and during 1980, the anticipated increase of 11.25 percent will result in a total state personal income of 29.3 billion dollars.

Of course, much of the increase will be the result of inflation which is really not expected to fall below 10 percent for 1980. Even with inflation removed, the state will continue to fare well despite a mild national recession.

About 60 percent of personal income is in wages and salaries to individuals. These are expected to increase by around 11 percent during 1980 to a total of 17.7 billion dollars. Most of this increase is expected to be in the wages and salaries paid to workers in manufacturing (14

percent increase) rather than in the wages and salaries paid to others (9 percent increase). Despite these increases, employment is expected to decline during 1980.

Total non-agricultural employment is expected to decline by about .7 percent from 1979 to 1980. Most of this decline will occur during the last quarter of 1979 and the first quarter of 1980. By the end of 1980, the state is expected to be recovering from whatever effects the recession will cause.

Most of the decline in employment will occur in manufacturing, contract construction, federal government, and agriculture. The durable goods manufacturing sector (which includes the automobile industry) will be affected the most, a projection which may be low as a result of the recent action by the Federal Reserve Board. Credit to purchase durable goods will be harder to get during the next year.

What will be the outlook for Eastern Kentucky? A lot depends upon what the federal government does over the next year and how serious will be its commitment to coal and to fighting inflation.

Under the assumption that the federal government will be committed to increased coal production, the KCEA projects that employment in coal mining will increase during 1980. They project that coal mining man-days will increase from the 1978 total of 8.6 million to over 11 million in 1980. There may be some shifts in this employment, however.

One of the anticipated effects of the new permanent federal regulations for coal mining will be a reduction in the number of small coal mines. If this is true, then much of this increase in coal mining employment will be as a shift from employment in small mines to employment in larger mines. This could have a significant effect on the Eastern Kentucky economy.

If inflation continues to rise as expected, however, we can anticipate a tighter squeeze on credit and this will affect the ability of even large coal mines to operate. The next few months should be very interesting.
