Allen May Ask Jury To Hear Union Story

Officials Deny Politics Played Part in Probe

Charges by hospital union officials that assault indictments issued last week by a Floyd circuit court grand jury against several union members were the result of "political manipulation" brought a vigorous denial Tuesday by Commonwealth's Attorney James Allen and a pledge that he would call the jury back into session to hear the union's side of the story.

The indictments stemmed from incidents related to the strike by members of the National union of Hospital and Health Care Workers against Highlands Regional Medical Center, now entering its tenth week. Named on assault charges arising from a fight between union pickets and hospital security guards were Tom Woodruff, district president of the union, Larry Daniels, president of the hospital local, and Gwen Calhoun, a union member. Calhoun, her sister, Geneva Skeans, and their father, Henry Calhoun, were indicted on. assault charges in the alleged beating of Helen Smith, a non-striking hospital worker, May 1. Charging in a press release late last week that the indictments were politically motivated, Woodruff noted that both Commonwealth's Attorney Allen and his assistant, Jerry A. Patton, have "hospital administration connections." Allen's sister is married to Dixon Nunnery, brother to assistant hospital administrator Donald Nunnery: Patton's wife is a supervisor at the hospital and his mother secretary to hospital administrator Clarence Traum.

Abandoned Mine Work Recesses. Stream Yet Acid

The left fork of Middle Creek is a dead stream. Its water runs yelloworange all the way from David to the Mountain Parkway and not even a crayfish can tolerate its acid flow. Below its confluence with the right fork, similar conditions exist, all the way to the Big Sandy

The source of the pollution, seepage from the mouths of four abandoned mines in the Rough and Tough Branch section of David, is the next target of the Rural Abandoned Mines Program (R.A.M.P.) which began work in the David area last spring, according to Steve Yorton, area engineer for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service.

The David Community Development Corporation was the first town in a 14-county area of Northeastern Kentucky to take advantage of the Soil Conservation Service-administered program, and in October, 1979, \$180,000 was allocated to correct environmental damage along Rough and Tough as well as on the mountain which separates David from Howard's Branch, Magoffin county.

Autopsy Asked In Girl's Death

The death of 16 year-old Joann Dale Ratliff, Betsy Layne High School student, who was found dead in an apartment on Fife Fork of Chloe Creek, near Pikeville, early Saturday, is under investigation by Kentucky State Police, and an autopsy has been ordered by Pike county Coroner Bradford Hall.

Results of the autopsy have not been received from the State Police laboratory in Frankfort.

Coroner Hall said that others present in the apartment had attempted to revive Miss Ratliff by putting her in a shower, but that she was dead at 7 a.m. and was pronounced dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital at approximately 9:30 that morning.

The State Police investigation is being conducted by Detective Don Phipps who emphasized that there is at this time no evidence as to the cause of death. In fact, he said, "She might have died of a heart attack." He added that he understood Miss Ratliff was spending the night with a friend at the time of her death.

The daughter of John and Betty Ann Schmidt Ratliff, of Stanville, Miss Ratliff was born in Evergreen, Illinois. She was a student at Betsy Layne High School and was a member of the Church of Christ

In addition to the parents, she is survived by an half-brother, Joseph Schmidt, of Provo, Utah.

Tally Is Delayed As One Precinct Fails To Report

About 16,000 voters turned out to choose among 91 candidates for political office-all but four of them Democrats-in Tuesday's primary ballot

Among the countywide offices at stake, voters chose Allen auto dealer Jerry Lafferty, Jr. by a comfortable margin over County Planner Dick Leslie as judge-executive, Henry Hale over Joe Wheeler Lewis as sheriff, and Arnold Turner, Jr. over Burnis Martin as county attorney.

Long-time Coroner James J. Carter was upset by Roger Nelson, by a wide margin. Other incumbents toppled included District 1 Magistrate Ray Wilcox, beaten at the polls by Gerald DeRossett and E. "Shag" Branham, and District 4 Magistrate Hershell Hamilton, bested by Lowell Samons and Ermal Tackett.

Election results were not totalled until about 10:45 Tuesday night, the tabulation delayed by the late arrival of the tally from Precinct 19 at Martin. The results, including absentee

Cutbacks Concern Teachers . . . Job Anxiety May Be Less Here

The anxiety Kentucky teachers have about their jobs next school term may not be as keen here as in other counties, although some cuts in the Floyd

Floyd county teachers are expected to know the complete hiring picture after next Tuesday's meeting of the Floyd County Board of Education. A month ago, projected cuts in funds were already taking their toll in the Title I remedial reading program, with the assistant director, three of the four social workers and all three nurses dropped. But all these except the nurses were scheduled for reassignment.

"This is having a drastic effect on teaching jobs in Kentucky," she said. "We're doing everything we can to see that the teachers are treated fairly and

Solid Waste System **Makes First Pickups**

Ten gleaming-white trucks, yellow lights flashing, trundled up the county's hollows last week, the first week of the county-operated garbage collection system. And, according to Bob McAninch, chairman of the county solid-waste commission, the operation was carried out with remarkably few snarls

For a few days, he conceded, phones at the county offices rang steadily with complaints of missed pickups. On Tuesday-one day on which the calls were actually logged—26 Right Beaver residents called the judge-executive to report that the compactor trucks had passed them by.

But 26 out of 2200 households in that area still represents a small margin of error for the first week of operation, McAninch argued. Over 90 percent of the county's households had their trash collected on schedule last week, he claimed, and he predicted that figure would improve as drivers become more familiar with their routes.

Under the new garbage ordinance, which has already attracted attention as a possible model in other parts of the country, all householders will be required to subscribe to the collection service, at a monthly fee of six dollars. Anyone failing to comply will be guilty of a misdemeanor, according to the ordinance

McAninch said this week he anticipates a good response to the system, At first, attempts will be made to win over by persuasion any who prove reluctant to comply with the ordinance, but ultimately the law will be enforced, he said. With a \$1.5 million bond debt to be repaid, the county will have no choice but to collect the fees. he pointed out.

Despite scattered opposition to the mandatory system-during a trial run two weeks ago, drivers were occasionally threatened by angry residents-the attitude of the public has generally been favorable, some (See Story No. 2, Page 4)

county instruction staff have already taken place or been indicated.

A record number of Kentucky teachers are anxiously awaiting the decision on whether they will have jobs next fall, according to Joyce Dotson, president of the Kentucky Education Association (KEA), which has about 29,000 teacher-members (85 to 90 percent of all teachers employed in the state).

School officials here have been hoping that natural attrition-retirements and resignations-will take care of most of the cuts in the teaching staff that will be required because of losses, or projected losses, in funding.

"A lot of teachers are living with anxiety and turmoil," Mrs. Dotson said last week. "They don't know whether or not they'll have a job next year, and they're just waiting.

She said that this year is the first time the layoffs "have happened to this degree.

Mrs. Dotson said that some of the layoffs are because of declining enrollment-a situation that she said 'no one seems to have any control over.

But she added that much of the fear about possible teacher layoffs is being generated by proposed federal budget cuts.

that their rights are protected through all this.

She said that some teachers expect to find out June 1 about their job status, but that many will have to wait until August for notification.

"In the meantime, their benefits have been cut off, and most of them are having to pick up insurance on their own," she said.

She said the layoffs are having the most devastating effect on families in which both husband and wife are teachers.

James P. Melton, executive director of the Kentucky School Boards Association, said that school boards in the state are in a dilemma over how many teachers to retain next year.

"Boards are having to take the Reagan budget and the announced cutbacks in education into consideration in staffing next year," he said.

He said the problem is aggravated by a deadline that school boards must follow in notifying teachers whom they intend to lay off.

School boards are required by law to notify any teacher they may not be able to rehire the next school year by (See Story No. 3, Page 4)

Mayor Says Validity Of Bidding Doubtful

Even as the state Department of Finance made a point last week of the funds it has disbursed to the counties and municipalities for road repairs this year. Martin officials were squabbling over payments to a paving contractor there.

In the nine months ending March 31, Floyd county has received \$514,140 from the state for road work, \$251,161 from gasoline taxes and the balance from old severance tax monies, Finance Secretary George L. Atkins announced. In the same period, the city of Prestonsburg received \$103,283, Martin \$27,320, Lackey \$12,878, Wayland \$9,757, Allen \$6,581, Burton \$5,853, and Wheelwright \$5,785.

The dispute over Martin's use of the road funds erupted in recent weeks when Mayor Larry Hall refused to pay a contractor for paving several city roads. Hall said this week he feared the paving job had been improperly advertised and that he would not release the road monies before he had investigated the situation

Several councilmen charged in a newspaper advertisement last week that Hall signed a contract with R. & L. Paving Co., of Tutor Key, for paving work April 13 this year, but later refused to pay the contractor for the work. An initial bill for \$6000 was later paid but another bill for \$12,000 is still outstanding. The contractor reportedly refused to do any more work on the roads until the account is settled.

The advertisement, which extended mock congratulations to the mayor on the "huge success" of his "quest to prevent the people of Martin from having their streets repaired," was signed by Ken Peters, Phillip M. Jenkins, Alan Whicker and Joe Everage, all identified as members of Martin city council.

Hall said this week that state law may require more precise specifications than were spelled out in the city's contract with R. & L. Paving, a contract he termed "open-ended" as to total cost





Electric Company Adopts Uniform Emergency Rules

News reports of this year's coal miners' strike have often referred to the 1978 strike that lasted several months

Because of that strike and other complications, coal stockpiles for many electric utilities ran dangerously low. The Kentucky Public Service Commission, in order to avoid a catastrophe, adopted emergency regulations that dealt with the conservation of electric energy during the period. The strike ended soon after the regulations were adopted, however, and warmer temperatures allowed coal barges to move on previously frozen rivers. The possible effects of the strike on electricity production were soon forgotten.

The need for uniform emergency procedures to be used in possible future cases was not forgotten though.

The Public Service Commission and some of the state's largest electric utilities have been working together for the past few months on procedures to be followed if a coal shortage should ever again exist.

With the approval, April 8, of Kentucky Power Co.'s plan, all of the state's electric utilities that are regulated by the commission now have emergency procedures that are fairly uniform. Some differences exist in the plans because of the uniqueness of each utility, but in general they follow guidelines the commission established.

Those guidelines include: 1. When coal supplies are decreased to 50 days' operation of coal-fired and a continued downward trend in coal stocks is anticipated:

A. Advise all wholesale customers of the number of days burn remaining. B. Use non-coal-fired generation as

much as possible. C. When certain plants drop under 50 days' supply, increase usage from more expensive plants that have more fuel

D. Discontinue economy sales to neighboring utilities.

E. Curtail the use of energy in all company offices, plants, etc.

2. When coal supplies are decreased to 40 days

A. Advise all wholesale customers of the number of days burn remaining.

B. At coal-fired generating plants, substitute oil for coal if plant design, oil storage facilities and oil availability will permit it.

C. Discontinue all short-term sales to neighboring utilities.

D. Limit emergency deliveries to neighboring utilities to situations where their customers would otherwise be dropped or where those utilities agree to return like quantities of energy within 14 days

E. Purchase energy from neighboring utilities to the extent practicable.

F. Purchase energy from industrial with generation facilities to the extent practicable.

G. Through use of the news media and direct customer contact, appeal to all customers to voluntarily reduce their use of electric energy as much as possible, and in any case try to reduce the non-essential usage of electricity. 3. When coal supplies are decreased to 30 days: A. Advise all wholesale customers of the number of days burn remaining. B. Discontinue emergency deliveries to neighboring utilities unless they agree to return like quantities of energy within seven days. 4. When coal supplies are decreased to 20 days:

customers of the mandatory program described in 5(B).

5. When cocl supplies are decreased to 15 days

A. Advise all wholesale customers of the number of days burn remaining. B. As a last resort, cctoffs would start in an orderly manner so that the impact on life and safety services would be minimal.

Each utility has its own plan and if customers want to know what it says specifically they should ask their utility to see it. Municipal utilities are not regulated by the commission and so were not required to file emergency plans.

As of April 15, three of the state's largest electric utilities who were contacted to check on their coal supplies, reported having more than 100 days of coal on hand.



dants, repeated the charge Tuesday, claiming that the commonwealth's handling of the indictments reflected a "bias" on Allen's part.

Johnson said he and his clients "feel put upon" by the commonwealth attorney's office, in that they were given no notice that the assault charges were to be presented to the grand jury and no opportunity to defend themselves before the jury

Allen replied that there was "absolutely no politics" involved in securing the indictments. He did not initiate the indictments, had no advance knowledge that they would be sought. did not participate in arguing the cases, and made no recommendations to the grand jury, he said.

Allen said he was indignant that the suggestion of political influence should even have arisen. Anyone who wished was welcome to testify before the grand jury, he said, explaining that a sign-up sheet was affixed to the jury room door for this purpose.

Hospital administration witnesses had approached the grand jury on their own initiative, accompanied by a private attorney who argued their case, he said While union witnesses would have been free to present their side of the case and seek indictments in their own behalf, it was not his responsibility to notify them or seek them out, Allen said.

Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Patton said he "had nothing to do with" the presentation of cases to the grand jury. There is no statutory requirement that both sides to a disputed charge be brought before a grand jury, he added

Johnson argued, however, that it is 'not uncommon'' for the commonwealth to invite both sides to appear before a grand jury in contentious disputes. The failure to call union witnesses in the present cases represented a "lack of sensitivity" on the part of the commonwealth, he charged.

In response to Johnson's charge, Allen said he would call the grand jury into special session as soon as possible in order to "make sure everybody has an opportunity to have their say.

Meanwhile, pickets and hospital officials appeared predictably weary this week as the strike dragged on without sign of resolution. Neither side appeared willing to budge from its original bargaining paosition, workers demanding salary increases which administrators insist would be insupportable. Failing any movement by either party, it seemed unlikely that the federal negotiator who has been managing the contract talks would recall representatives of union and hospital for further negotiations in the near future.

A bullet was said to have struck the hospital, shattering a window, early last Wednesday. Security guards at the hospital reported seeing a person carrying a rifle nearby shortly before the incident. The person left soon after in a 🌑

silver Thunderbird, they said. Otherwise, the scene at the picket line appeared generally peaceful, broken glass alongside the hospital entrance the only reminder of stormy confrontations earlier in the strike. Pickets and members of the recently augmented security force traded occasional taunts, and a movie camera operated by the guards followed the movements of anyone venturing near their van, but both sides generally kept their distance from each other. The recent hiring by the hospital of a Cincinnati-based security firm has elicited union charges that the administration "has turned the hospital into an armed camp," union officals claiming that the firm, Nuckols and Associates, is deploying more than 40 fully armed guards at the scene. A hospital spokesman claims the figure is inflated and praised the guards for their "restraint" in face of provocation by pickets.

A Statement by the Editor

This statement is being made because the integrity of the Floyd County Times and its staff has been questioned by a political advertisement which appeared in last week's edition.

In that advertisement Burnis Martin alleged, in effect, that the contents of his ad on April 29 were "leaked" from this office to his opponent, Arnold Turner, Jr., since Mr. Turner's ad in the same edition countered Mr. Martin's statement of that same date.

We maintain that whatever information Mr. Turner had about his opponent's newspaper statement came from some source outside this office. We have questioned our staff-advertising, compositors, proof readers, all-and they say both ads were handled as all others, as confidential between the advertisers and the newspaper as the advertising medium. As usual, we took all precautions available to protect the confidentiality of each candidate's ad.

This has been the policy of The Floyd County Times since its founding 54 years ago. During all these years, I have had several close kinsmen to seek office in the county, and never once was any of them given any information about what their opponents were saying against them in the newspaper. Never until now were we accused of such violation of trust.

Mr. Turner says his advertisement was in response to verbal statements heard from his opponent at various places and that he received no information from this office.

In fairness to Mr. Martin we must admit that his opponent's advertisement should not have appeared till the following week. This was an error of judgment, made at a time when an overworked staff, working with one member absent and under extreme pressure, failed to read the ad carefully to realize that it served as an answer to the Martin ad. For this we apologize.

At the same time we declare that we did not make Mr. Martin's advertisement, or any other, available to an opponent or competitor.

The mayor charged that Peters is not, in any case, a member of the city council, since a quorum was lacking at the council meeting in March when Peters was elected to fill the unexpired term of Councilman Bobby Sherman Dingus, who resigned.

Peters acknowledged that Councilman J. R. Key and David Chaffins had walked out of the meeting before the vote on his appointment was taken but said the mayor's continuing to chair the meeting and conduct other business represented implicit recognition that a quorum existed.

characterized Peters 38 'nitpicking'' the mayor's questions about his standing and about the propriety of the paving contract. "All the people of Martin want is to have their roads repaired," he said.

In announcing the road fund disbursements, Finance Secretary Atkins pointed out that local governments have already received over \$10 million more in road money under the "revenue sharing" program enacted by the 1980 legislature than they would have under the road aid program it replaced.

On the recommendation of Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. the General Assembly last year changed the state nine-centsa-gallon gasoline tax to a nine percent tax on the wholesale price of gasoline. Brown defended the measure as "the least painful method" of building up the road fund, which was over \$300 million short when he assumed office in December, 1979.

Local governments no longer need state approval to spend gas tax funds, though they are required to hold public hearings on their proposed expenditure.

Another 1980 bill restructured the mechanism for returning coal severance taxes to coal-producing counties. It established the Local Government Economic Assistance Fund, to be fed by half the severance taxes collected annually in excess of \$177.6 million and by half the tax on other minerals.

While no new severance taxes have been disbursed this year, funds collected under the new program are due to start coming to the counties in July. According to a recent Kentucky Coal Journal report, Finance Secretary Atkins estimated that Floyd county will receive \$863,000 from the fund in

"many the slip twixt the cup and the lip," or between voting place and the final recording of the vote by the election commission.

Time was when the number of votes cast in some precincts exceeded the number of legal voters. There were few absentees in those days-if you failed to show up to vote, somebody would perform your duty as a citizen for you. In one bond issue election, it was reported, bank mules (mules used to pull coal cars inside coal mines) were given surnames and became voters-for the bond issue, naturally. And the "Chain ballot" system of buying votes worked to perfection, not a weak link The voting all done, the polls closed, then the precinct election officers began the trip to Prestonsburg, bringing with them the cumbersome ballot boxes and their contents. The stories of what happened en route, may be apocryphal but there are those who stoutly maintain that those reports of stops along the way to "doctor" the ballots, even to lose a box, are true. Then, once the ballots were at the courthouse, began the long count of the vote-a work done not in a few hours but usually over a period of days. 'Watchers'' eyed every move of the tabulators and any others near the uncounted ballots. After that, with the long, weary hours of counting ended for the day, began the guarding of the ballots through the night till tabulation resumed next day

And what "slips"!

The county has more than \$2 million invested in what is designed as the answer to a problem that not only will not go away but which, if not met, will grow more dismaying ("bury ourselves in our own filth"). Its investment includes an approved landfill yet under construction, the purchase of seven large and three small compactor trucks and the acquisition of the franchises of independent waste collection systems which had been found wanting.

To meet this cost, \$1.5 million in bond indebtedness has been incurred (the remainder has been paid through a \$500,000 FmHA grant and a \$19,000 grant of Area Development funds). This bond indebtedness must be paid, and in the meantime labor, transportation and other current expenses must be met.

Members of the Solid Waste Commission, who have worked without compensation in unselfish public service, think the system will work. If it doesn't, what is the alternative?

Careful management, plus public support-a support that includes, above all, the paying of our bills for the service-will make it work.

The bottom line asks an important question: Are we willing to pay for what we get?

Gas Firm Asks Court To Halt Katy Friend Job

Prestonsburg's gas supply could be interrupted if developers of a tract at Katy Friend are permitted to continue to excavate near a pipeline there, Kentucky-West Virginia Gas Company officials claimed in a suit in circuit court Friday.

The gas company is seeking a court injunction against Ivel Moore, Don Goble, and Mat-Cour, Inc., developers of the 44-acre mountainside site which extends up Katy Friend Branch of Middle Creek from Pinhook Branch.

Plaintiffs claim the developers have undercut a 10-inch gas main for a distance of about 1000 feet and intend to expose the pipeline further by removing overburden from a coal seam along which the pipe has been constructed.

Damage to the pipeline, which carries gas to Prestonsburg and Paintsville, could result and maintenance would be impeded if the excavation is allowed to continue, it is claimed.

According to unconfirmed reports, the developers propose to construct an industrial park and an apartment complex on the site.

Suits filed in court represent only one side of the issue in dispute.

April 30 of the previous year, he said. If no notice is given, a teacher automatically has his or her job back. Although the possibility of rehiring some teachers does exist, Melton said, school boards are promising the jobs only to teachers to whom they can guarantee salaries.

Since financing for education next year is still uncertain, he said, many teachers will have to wait to find out if they will be rehired.

He also said that boards are not sure how the expected reductions in the state education budget next year will affect them

Melton said federal-financing cuts alone are expected to range from 12 percent to 25 percent.

A steady trend toward smaller enrollment in Kentucky schools has also contributed to a drop in school staffing needs, he said.

"There is no question that local boards have cut back on staff because of declining enrollment," he said. "The state money they get is based on students' average daily attendance."

Melton said that even if declining enrollment levels off in two years as surveys indicate, financing for education may still be uncertain.



For pickup, residents are required to place their garbage by the roadside in front of their properties, a requirement that McAninch acknowledges may work a hardship in the case of some, especially elderly, residents. Some individual exceptions to the rule may be worked out in time, he indicated.

The county still awaits a state operating permit for its new landfill near Garth, where clearing of brush is under way. In the meantime, the county continues to use the existing landfills for garbage disposal.

The new landfill will be out of bounds to private haulers, a fact that has elicited complaints from at least one contractor. Paul Slone, who has contracts with the cities of Martin and Allen to haul garbage, charges that denial of access to the county's only legitimate dump threatens to drive him out of business.

McAninch has replied that controlling access to the landfill is necessary if the dump is to be efficiently managed. The restriction is also mandated by the terms of the bond and federal grant financing the operation, he said.



scape on the mountain top above David, as the primary focus. Heavy equipment worked at the removal of mine spoil and red dog on the mountain and the barren slopes in the vicinity of the slag was seeded in grasses. In addition, crews worked through the summer to reshape 800 feet of creek channel on Rough and Tough, swampy areas were filled, and grading and seeding of spoil areas was accomplished. When the work wound up for the summer, though, the yellow water still ran and some residents worried that the acidic flow would never be stopped. Yorton, who works out of the SCS's Ashland district office, was quick to reemphasize the goals of the R.A.M.P. project in David, and he said Tuesday that correction of the mine seepage would be next in line when work is resumed, "hopefully in late August." Yorton said engineering plans for filling of the mine mouths must await approval and he also explained that budgetary cuts had also created some delays since the original \$180,000 amount set aside for the work had already been exhausted. "The work's definately going to run a good deal over the original figure," Yorton stated. The project at David is designed to be completed over a five-year period, according to Yorton, who pointed out, for example, that spoil areas seeded in grasses would be planted in trees "in a couple of years" after the topsoil becomes adequately stabilized. "A lot of this type of work involves maintenance," Yorton explained-"you keep coming back to see if vegetation is successful or if erosion problems recur.' Yorton stressed that all the work initiated through the R.A.M.P. project must first meet approval from local residents and community officials. "Through all of this we work closely with the people in David and make sure that what we're doing will prove satisfactory to them," he pointed out. He said a community meeting will be called before work on closing the mine mouths is begun.

Floyd Permits in April

Of the 157 underground and surface mining permits issued last month by the state Division of Permits, eight were to Floyd county mining firms and 24 went to companies in contiguous counties, Pike, Knott, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin.

Statewide, permitting activities for April authorized the disturbance of 4,315 new acres of land and resulted in the collection of \$223,800 in fees.

The Floyd county underground permits were to Kentucky Coal Co., 7.46 acres; Buckingham Coal Co., 11.87 acres; Ensol Coal Co., 1.76 acres; Gala Enterprises, 3.63 acres; Lone Oak Mining Co., 4.3 acres; Tryway Coal Co. (Mine No. 1), 6.42 acres.

May Appeal Tax Exam

Taxpayers who are not satisfied with the outcome of their federal income tax examination have the right to appeal within the service, or through the courts, or both, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The first step is to request an immediate meeting with the examiner's group supervisor, who possibly can resolve the issue at that point.

If no agreement is reached with the supervisor, taxpayers have 30 days to appeal through administrative channels. An informal conference can be arranged in any of the over 800 offices throughout the country with a representative of the Regional Director of Appeals, who has the authority to settle the case, regardless of dollar amount.

The Appeals Division is a totally different IRS organization independent of the Examination Division, and the role of the appeals officer is to bring an unprejudiced and unbiased point of view to the case. The appeals officer will try to reach a mutually satisfying settlement so that the case will not have to go to court.

Because the conference is informal, a taxpayer may represent himself or herself, or be represented by an attorney, certified public accountant, or an individual enrolled to practice before IRS. If a representative attends a conference without the taxpayer, a properly executed power of attorney or authorization must be filed. Additionally, witnesses can be present at the conference to support your position.

If there is still no agreement after the appeals conference, and provided the amount of tax in question is not more than \$5,000 in any tax year, the case can then go to an informal hearing under the small case procedures of the U. S. Tax Court. Under this procedure, however, neither the taxpayer nor the government can appeal the court's decision.

If the amount is more than \$5,000, the case will be heard under the regular procedures of the tax court. Of course, taxpayers can always elect to bypass the tax court by paying the tax and filing a claim for refund of the tax. If the claim is rejected, the taxpayer may file a refund suit in either the U. S. District Court or the U. S. Court of Claims. Furthermore, appeals can reach the Supreme Court, if it agrees to hear the case.

McDowell Unit Helps Persons Errors in Report With Alcohol, Drug Problems

major health problem in the United States, and climbing. Call it chemical dependency, alcoholism, drug addiction, or whatever. Approximately one out of every ten people who use moodaltering chemicals suffer from this illness. It knows no age, social, religious or ethnic boundaries. It is a complex progressive disease and if left untreated has effects that go far beyond the potential personal health problems to the user

Every alcoholic or chemically dependent person affects at least four other people with their using behavior. Families, fellow workers-in fact the whole community-feels the long range consequence.

What can be done about this problem? What do you do if someone you know is having problems with alcohol or other drugs? Hope it will go away? Wait until this poor person "wises up"? Wait until they ask for help?

"Wrong!" says Bob Good, director of the McDowell Hospital C.P.I. Unit, a new 28-day chemical dependency treatment unit. "Most of us know the basic symptoms of alcoholism or chemical dependency-irrational behavior, broken promises, threatsyet we expect the dependent person to make the rational decision that they need help, and wait for them to ask for

"It is nearly impossible for the dependent person to get and stay sober without help. It is also nearly impossible for them to realize they have a problem with alcohol or other drugs. Until someone shows them exactly what their behavior is like when they are using and what they can do differently, change is unlikely.

Good, who is himself a recovering alcoholic, says the greatest insight into the workings of the chemically dependent mind can be found in the Alcoholics Anonymous program. If anyone goes to open A.A. meetings, he says, he or she will learn from those recovering from the illness, that every one of them was forced by other people or circumstances to do something about their using behavior. Threat of divorce, loss of job, pressures from physicians may all motivate the alcoholic or drug dependent person to get help, Good adds. "The courts can also help by offering treatment as an alternative to a jail sentence for the chemically dependent."

The McDowell C.P.I. Unit helps people get that treatment. It is an inpatient treatment program offering the alcoholic or drug dependent person the opportunity to look at his or her past behavior and receive guidance in making changes.

'We also involve the family" says Good, "We want them to understand



Q—I'm considering purchasing a microwave oven, but I've heard they give off dangerous radiation. Is this allow children to do this) for long true?

A-Microwave ovens are not dangerous unless they are used improperly. When purchasing a microwave, be sure it was made after October 1971. All ovens made since then are covered by a radiation safety standard enforced by the Food and Drug Administration.

This standard sets the amount of microwaves an oven can leak throughout its lifetime at a level far below that known harmful to people. It also requires all ovens to have two independent interlock systems that stop the production of microwaves the moment the latch is released or the door opened. In addition, a monitoring system stops oven operation if one or both of the interlock systems fail. No residual radiation remains after the oven is turned off.

The following are tips on microwave oven operation which will add to the safety of having one in your home:

-Follow the manufacturer's instruction manual for recommended operation procedures and safety precautions for your oven model.

-Don't operate an oven if the door does not close firmly or is bent, warped, or otherwise damaged.

-Never operate an oven if you have reason to believe it will continue to operated with the door shut. -To add to the margin of safety

New Budget Cuts Announced

A \$36.4 million deficit in three benefit programs aimed at the state's "neediest citizens" has forced new budget reductions in the Department for "Human Resources, Human Resources Secretary Grady Stumbo has announced.

Stumbo said the new cuts, including reductions in some social programs, are necessary to temporarily maintain benefits in the Medicaid, Emergency Assistance and Aid to Families with Dependent Children programs.

"These programs are facing a deficit. We have made the decision to cut in other areas to allow the programs to continue to operate at current levels," Stumbo said.

Stumbo also announced that several programs aimed at treating alcoholism, earlier slated to be cut, will be restored.

The alcohol programs were part of \$20 million in reductions, Human Resources share of the state's general fund shortfall of \$185 million, announced in March.

"As a result of public testimony in favor of the alcohol programs, some programs have been withdrawn from the March list of proposed reductions," Stumbo said. "A savings of nearly \$2.7 million in operating costs in the health services and social services bureaus and executive policy support staff has allowed us to fund these programs."

Programs which will have funds restored include: Volta House, a program for recovering alcoholics in Hopkinsville; Alcoholism Recovery Community, a 30-day recovery program for alcoholics in Frankfort; Situation Identification Disposition a seven-day detoxification center in Lexington and the Lancaster Alcohol Program.

Support for the Child Evaluation Center at the University of Louisville funding for social services in local health departments, both earlier earmarked for cuts, will also be restored, Stumbo said.

Burger Queen Begins Change To Druthers

Burger Queen announced today that it has begun conversion of all 172 of its fast service restaurants to the new Druther's Restaurant concept announced earlier this year. Sign changeovers have begun in Kentucky, Tennessee and West Virginia. The company expects to have all of its restaurants converted by July 1, 1981. "Our new name more clearly explains the variety offerings of a wider menu of fish, chicken, salad bars and breakfasts, as well as hamburgers, said Thomas L. Hensley, president, who emphasized that ownership of the privately-held company had not changed, and that local operations would continue under current ownership and management.

until the end of the biennium and delays in some non life-threatening capital construction projects account for \$24 million of the new reductions.

The remaining \$12.4 million needed to make up the \$36.4 million deficit involves cuts in programs, Stumbo said. Health Services and 77 in the Bureau for Social Services are being affected by the new program reductions.

"We hope to move these people into, other vacant positions in the department," Stumbo said.

Stumbo warned that these measures are only temporary and if the Reagan proposals are approved in Washington benefit reductions in the Medicaid, Aid to Families with Dependent Children and Emergency Assistance programs are "inevitable."

Human Resources projects that the impact of the Reagan proposals on its programs could mean the loss of \$200 million in federal funds.

Among new program reductions Stumbo announced are:

Bureau for Social Insurance: --Eliminate Crisis Oriented Pro-

gram for Emergencies, \$1 million. -Eliminate Community Work Ex-

perience Program, \$290,500.

Each of these programs was eliminated for fiscal year 1981 and have now been eliminated for fiscal year 1982, which begins in July.

-Elimination of Child Care Special Allowance-Day Care, \$672,000. This program provides child care allowances for working mothers who are receiving benefits under the Aid to

Families with Dependent Children program. Bureau for Health Services:

-Emergency Medical Services Program Reductions, \$914,000, eliminates money for training, communication and technical support of the emergency medical services program. This cut does not affect the number of drivers or vehicles.

-Terminate Geriatric Screening Program, \$116,000.

-Terminate in-patient TB screening, \$80,000.

-Eliminate Easter Seals subsidies, \$90,000, involving subsidies to two summer camps for handicapped children.

 Eliminate state subsidies to health systems agencies, \$150,000.
 Eliminate Special Olympics Con-

tract, \$13,500.

Bureau for Social Services: -Close Jewel Manor, \$179,831, this

facility is a treatment center for delinquent females in Louisville.

-Reductions in programs for unwed mothers: \$80,000, involving discontinuing financing for four of five centers in Kentucky and neighboring states which house and educate unwed mothers. The Florence Crittenden Home in Lexington is the only center the department will continue to finance.

-Reductions in Bluegrass/Lincoln Trail ADD programs, \$30,500; Bluegrass ADD (reduction in adult day care meals), \$20,500; Lincoln Trail ADD (reduction in elderly recreation funds), \$10,000.

Retired Postmaster Looks Back 40 Years

By DOLORES D. HICKS This year marks off 77 years for the Tram Post Office and 77 years of Layne's as official representatives of the Post Office Department carried, sorted and stamped the mail at this tiny outpost of Uncle Sam's far-flung Postal Service

Tram was established in 1902, across the river from the mouth of Ivy Creek near where the present residence of Wendell Stratton now stands. It's sponsor, T.J. "Tom" Setser, was a business man, who, seeing the need for an office to serve the community and perhaps attract additional trade from the logging operations on Ivy Creek, sought successfullly to initiate its establishment

While casting about for a name, he thought of the logging operations over the Ivy Valley. Here was a long and winding wooden track haulway upon which logs were transported by truck with the aid of horses and mules. Universally, such a road was called a tram road. So the new unit in the Postal System was christened Tram, Kentucky.

Setser served only a short time, so short, in fact, that very few oldtimers and oldsters even remember that he had founded it and was ever postmaster. His successor was L. D. Layne, and he and his children have represented the Post Office Department since that day. One of his official acts was to move it approximately two miles up the river where it remained in his home for years. It was not a lucrative position. Some days there was the munificent remuneration of a few cents, totaling at the end of the month perhaps less than five dollars. If the remuneration was small, the labor involved to care for it was never ar-

duous either. It's paraphernalia: bags, mail, and stamps at one time were given the cramped quarters of a threeby-four-foot clothes room or "press" The mail, never heavy, was for people over an area now served by three other post office.

In these first few years of the century, the railroad was just beginning to creep into Floyd county. It entered the county in late 1902, and it took several more years to reach the present site of Tram. The mail for upper Sandy was carried on horseback from the railhead lower down the valley. For a long time, it was taken from the train at Whitehouse, but as the temporary terminals pushed southward the length of the horse trail mail routes shortened. When Tram was established, the terminal was at Dwale, Kentucky. Here men received the mail for transportation to Pikeville and way points. The carrier that would take the bag into the post office said, if it was cold, he would warm his toes while L. D. picked out the local mail. Many a time, due to the urgency of his journey, he would hurry up the sorting, cold toes or not. Some of these old carriers are but a name-like Jack Sweeney, the first to carry Tram mail, and Clyde Huffman, his successor.

In 1907, the railway passed Tram. Clyde Layne, son of L. D., who acted as assistant postmaster, relates the story of the first passenger train that passed. Tram bottom. It was memorable in more ways than one that this passenger train picked the spot for a derailment. Judge R. E. Stanley, father of Mrs. Ella Stanley Layne, wife of Clyde, was a passenger on the derailed train. Clyde was impressed by the snapping of the large steel ropes as the cars were pulled back onto the tracks.

Now that the railway was just across the river, the horseback carrier disappeared into the stores of memory. Men picked up the mail, either at the post office or at the train, and carried it across the river-another munificiently paid job at \$7 per month, and it was well earned by men like James H. Powell and William T. Honaker.

At Tram, when L. D. Layne resigned, his daughter, Zeola, was appointed. She served for years, and after her resignation her sister, Dolores, became postmaster and remains so today. This is her fortieth year. Judge Robert E. Stanley came, after a long career as a public official of Floyd county, to buy the old Pem Layne farm years ago. In doing so, he acquired what was then called Powell, but now Tram, Bottom. Stanley subdivided the bottom into lots and sold them. People built homes here and the old rail stop at Tram became a tiny hamlet.

About 1925, L. D. Layne found it necessary to move the post office across the river near the railroad station There it is today and while it is not now a large metropolitan office, it is a long way from the few cents a day of 77 years ago. The above information was published in the Floyd County Times, by the late Henry P. Scalf. I recall the date, January 10, 1941, when I was commissioned as postmaster of Tram post office. To reach the present site of the post office, I had to travel many years by boat, often on an icefilled river. I have had my homemade wooden boat shoved downstream several yards by huge chunks of ice. Then I'd have to travel a narrow path through mud to reach my job; then, upon my arrival, I was not to have a nice, heated building, but had to wait until I built a fire in my potbellied stove which took time to warm the building. After being postmaster for one year, I married Elliott Hicks, owner of a taxicab company in Prestonsburg. To us was born one child, a daughter, Wanda Jean. During my 40 years of service as postmaster, I am pleased to say the post office inspectors always found it appropriate to give me at least a 90% or higher efficiency rating. Among my pleasant memories, a patron, a mid-wife, brought in a newborn baby to be weighed on my post office scales. Even though this was May 15, 1958, I recall that the baby weighed 7 pounds and 14 ounces, and was 19 inches long. I had to carry a metal box which contained all postal essentials to and from work, and my pet dog, Skippy, would bark violently when any one came near the metal case. I would place the case under my bed when strangers came to our house. Skipy would manage to come inside and dart under the bed to protect the case. In latter years, I purchased a safe to be kept in the post office. Throughout my career, I recall many difficult experiences, as well as many rewarding experiences. I want to thank all past and present patrons who have been so nice to me in my 40 years of service at Tram

Marijuana Is Called Far from "Harmless"

Drug abuse is epidemic among American youth. Schools, parents, and-most of all-today's youth are suffering as a result.

Although there is much about which parents and teenagers disagree, recent national opinion polls show that they agree on at least one point; both groups list drug abuse as the single most serious problem facing young people today

Drug problems were not discovered by this generation of teenagers. Drug problems have been tragically underrated in our nation for years. Fully 30 percent of all deaths occurring in the United States today are premature because of the use of two drugs-alcohol and tobacco. While some of the 500,000 annual deaths caused by these legal drugs occur among young people, most of those who die are in their 40s and older.

Another statistic: during each decade of the twentieth century Americans lived longer. There was one, and only one, exception: Americans between the ages of 15 and 24 died at a 15 percent higher rate in 1977 (the most recent data) than they did in 1960. The primary causes of these tragic youthful deaths were accidents (especially auto fatalities), suicide, and homicide. The decades of the '60s and the '70s also saw unprecedented rises in teenage venereal disease, pregnancy, drug and alcohol use, and crime

One final spate of statistics: when it comes to "rises," nothing equals the rise in marijuana use in our nation during the last 20 years. In 1962 only 2 percent of youth 12 to 17 had ever used marijuana. By 1979 the figure had jumped to 31 percent.

Among high school seniors, more than 60 percent had used marijuana, 40 percent were regular users, and more than 10 percent used marijuana every day-averaging three and a half joints a day. This figure of nearly one in nine who smoke marijuana every day compares to 6 percent who drink alcohol every day among high school seniors. Among the nation's 12-to 17-year-olds, four million are active marijuana smokers compared to less than three million who smoke tobacco cigarettes.

Marijuana has joined tobacco and alcohol as the leading health hazards in our nation. As with alcohol and tobacco, it is during teenage years that lifelong decisions about use or nonuse are made. It is also among teenagers that health has deteriorated in recent years.

The effects of marijuana use

New scientific evidence has put to rest the comforting, but false, idea that marijuana use is "harmless." We now know that marijuana has most of the negative health effects of alcohol and tobacco as well as unique dangers all its own.

In reviewing this new evidence we should start with the smoke. Marijuana is a plant, a chemical factory. made up of more than 400 separate chemicals. Once it is burned it produces more than 2,000 separate chemicals. Is it surprising that researchers are just beginning to understand the short-term, to say nothing of the long-term, effects of marijuana smoking

After 60 years of widespread cigarette smoking, we discovered only during the last decade that cigarette smoke is bad for lungs. So is marijuana smoke. Marijuana smoke contains more tar and known cancer-causing agents than does tobacco smoke.

Smoking marijuana produces bronchitis, sore throats, coughs, and chest pains just as smoking tobacco does; only it seems to produce these changes much more quickly than does tobacco smoke. When marijuana smoke condensate is painted on the skins of laboratory mice, it produces cancer-the best indicator of the carcinogenicity of any smoke.

Although marijuana smoke is made up of thousands of chemicals, the intoxication and many of the other effects. seem to result primarily from a single chemical-THC or delta-9tetrahydrocannabinol. This chemical is drawn into the body with each puff on a marijuana cigarette.

Because it is fat soluble but not soluble in water (our body's waste disposal system of blood and urine is waterbased), THC stays in the body, especially the fatty tissues-including the brain and the reproductive organs.

Half the THC from a single marijuana joint is still in the body after one week, and measurable amounts are present one month after a single use. If the user continues to smoke, then the THC continues to accumulate in his or her body, especially in the brain and reproductive organs.

The brain is affected within seconds after the first puff. Peak effects are achieved in half an hour and, depending on the dose and the brain function measured, decline over several hours after use stops.

Memory is affected: the user has trouble making new memories. Time and space perceptions are distorted. The subjective experiences of dreamy relaxation, heightened sensation, and stretched-out time are direct results of

Are these changes totally reversible once a user stops using marijuana? We don't know. One researcher has found cell changes deep in the brain that persist at least six months after marijuana use stops. Former marijuana users often tell me that they do not feel normal for three to six months after they stop using the drug.

The hormone system is affected too. In males the sex hormone, testosterone, is reduced, as is sperm production. In females there are menstrual irregularities and other disorders. In one study, there was a fourfold increase in the number of miscarriages among female monkeys given marijuana compared to those who were drug-gree.

Most strikingly, the heavy user often finds less interest in work and school. The user finds authorities and parents to be a "hassle" and gradually scales down his or her goals. The A student becomes a C student. The C student drops out of school. Scientists call this the "amotivational syndrome." Youngsters I talk with call it 'burnout.'' While once uncommon, it is now familar to every high school student in the county.

Marijuana smoking clearly impairs driving. This is the more ironic since many marijuana smokers feel that they are "more into" their driving as a result of smoking pot, and because the driving impairment lasts several hours after the subjective sensation of being high has faded.

Confusing aspects

Much confusion exists on three points

The first point relates to the criminal penalties for possession and sale of marijuana. Although some states have reduced their penalities for possession of small quantities of marijuana possession is against every law in every state in the united States, not only by national law but by international treaty. Sale of marijuana is a felony offense throughout the country.

The second point of confusion arises from publicity about the medicinal value of marijuana. The crude marijuana plant product cannot be a 'medicine'' for any disorder. Modern medicine would find the specific chemical responsible for the effect sought and use that, not the crude plant. The only practical treatment related to marijuana today is the use of THC pills to reduce the nausea and vomiting sometimes associated with anticancer drugs. Marijuana itself is not a treatment for cancer, eye problems, breathing disorders, or any other condition.

The third source of confusion comes from the frequently mentioned conflict between those who argue that mari-

officials; parents can support laws to get rid of head shops, which sell marijuana paraphernalia; and organized parents can make life hard for the sellers of illegal drugs.

Both parents and schools can work with youth not only to say "no" to drugs, but also to say "yes" to the many ways youth need help in growing up, having fun, and becoming truly independent. The greatest threat to the independence and self-responsibility of young people today is drug dependence.

Every day I see young people aged 16 to 30 who are still at home but out of school and not working, dependent on their parents, and failing to make adequate relationships with peers of both sexes because of drug dependence. Equally common are youth of great promise who have settled for very low goals because of their use of marijuana

Youth are not the only ones in our society with drug problems. They are not the only ones who will benefit from a new family-based, comprehensive program to prevent drug abuse. I recently spoke with a U. S. Congressman who told me his wife stopped smoking cigarettes because their child hounded her after he learned about the effects of smoking on health.

Peer pressure works not only to get people into drugs but to get them off drugs, too. I stopped smoking cigars when my wife complained about my bad smell, and I stopped drinking alcohol when my children reached teenage: they did not ask me to stop, but I felt more comfortable talking with them about drugs and alcohol once I stopped. Parents have almost as much to gain from drug abuse prevention as children.

Carl Rice dropped by during the singalong and offered encouragement and agreed going after crappie might be the best move. There are crappie in Dale Hollow, lots of crappie.



Lose Inches Without Effort?

How many of us have been easy prey for advertisements guaranteeing "Inches lost with effortless exercise" or "Lose inches and pounds in just weeks"? With a growing concern and desire on the part of the general public for physical fitness and beautiful bodies, the number of such advertisements and the number of health spas and figure salons behind these promotions has increased over the last few years. Most everyone wants a trim, fit body, but what many consumers often fail to realize is that unwanted pounds and inches will not disappear simply by investing in a spa or salon membership. Weight loss requires effort and willpower on the part of an individual.

Attorney General Steve Beshear wants Kentucky consumers to know the facts concerning health spas and figure salons. "Do not let worthless guarantees or a desire for good health overrule your good common sense when it comes to signing a contract which will obligate you for a great deal of money and/or a long period of time," Beshear warns.

Before signing any contract for membership, it is a good idea to visit the spa or salon at the time of day that you will most likely use the facilities to make sure they are not overcrowded. While you are there, talk to other members about the upkeep of the equipment, dressing rooms, and other areas; whether workouts are supervised by professional staff members who actually have the background or educational experience to be qualified as a professional or expert; and whether these members are generally happy with their decision to join.

After you have inspected the facilities, you should prepare yourself for the sales pitch and the contract that you will be asked to sign. Do not sign the contract for membership immediately, even if you are told that if

Read the contract very carefully, making sure all blank spaces are filled in and that the cost and payment schedule, the length of the membership, the available facilities, and the method of cancellation are exactly as the salesperson has explained them to you. "A reputable company will give you a "cooling-off" period in which to change your mind or reconsider before signing the contract. Be sure that the cooling-off period explained by the salesperson is the same as that in the contract you are given to sign. Be suspicious of high pressure sales tactics and "guaranteed" results," said General Beshear.

Be shear recommended that you ask yourself the following questions before signing a contract with a health spa or figure salon:

1. Am I willing to invest in months or years of dues?

2. Am I sure I will utilize the service regularly enough to benefit from the program?

3. Are verbal promises the salesperson made the same as those in the written contract?

4. How much interest do I have to pay?

5. If I change my mind or am unable to attend the club, is the contract cancellable or transferrable to another person?

Once you have committed yourself to a spa or salon by signing the contract, there is usually no canceling or transferring of the membership contract. Some of the spas or salons will tell you that if you move out of town, your membership can be transferred to an affiliated club where you move. Be sure to ask to see a list of these affiliated clubs in order to determine whether there is a club in most areas of the state or country.

Aside from contractual considerations, you should also assess your present physical condition. It is a good idea to get a medical checkup and approval from a doctor before getting involved in any exercise program. Also, be sure that the contract allows cancellation if for some medical reason you can no longer use the services of the club.

In summary, before signing the spa or salon contract, each person should be absolutely sure they know what the club is offering, that what the salesperson has told them is not contradicted by the contract, and that they will and are physically able to utilize the facilities for the full period of membership.

If you have any questions concerning health spas or figure salons, contact the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601. The office has found that it can most effectively deal with written complaints and encourages you to write if you have a problem concerning a health spa or salon. 

Home for Child Cancer Patients To Be Near Lexington Hospitals

Plans for a new "home away from home" for children who are undergoing treatment for cancer, luekemia and other serious illnesses, and their families, were announced recently at the Central Kentucky Blood Center in Lexington.

The home will be owned and operated by non-profit Children's Oncology Services of the Blue Grass and fund-raising efforts will be spearheaded by volunteer officials and 23 McDonald's Restaurants in Lexington and surrounding counties.

Mrs. Phyllis H. Cronin, chairman of the non-profit group, in making this announcement, said, "This home will fill a tremendous need and will help both the stricken children and their parents fight their battle for life.'

The house will be named the Ronald McDonald House and is patterned after Ronald McDonald Houses near Children's Hospitals in more than 20 cities across the country. These homes were built through joint efforts of nonprofit groups, made up of parents of children with cancer and other concerned people, as well as McDonald's and National Football League teams. Lexington's Central Baptist Hospital, Good Samaritan Hospital, St. Joseph Hospital and the University of Kentucky Medical Center are currently treating nearly 175 children with malignant diseases, and see almost 50 new children cancer patients each year. Since these Lexington Hospitals serve as a primary center for in-and out-patient treatment of childhood cancer for Children from throughout the Commonwealth, many families travel great distances to be with their children during these critical times. Furthermore, effective treatment for these diseases often requires hospitalization for periods of many days to weeks. Many parents, who live in the Lexington area, will as well have the need to be close to their children during these periods of extended hospitalization.

"Second only to medical treatment, these children need the sustaining quality of family life. This house will enable parents and children to better cope mentally with the tremendous impact with which these illnesses hit all members of a family," Mrs. Cronin said.

When complete, the Blue Grass Ronald McDonald House will include comfortable private bedrooms, a lounge, playroom, a laundry, a common kitchen where families can prepare their own meals, and a manager's apartment.

Boats up to 18¹₂ feet long may now operated on all state-owned lakes, accoridng to a Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources regulation change which became effective May 6.

Prior to this change, the maximum length for boats on all but two of these lakes was 16¹₂ feet. Lakes Malone and Beshear, which already permitted 18¹₂ foot boats, are unaffected by the new regulation.

The length limit for pontoon boats remains at 22 feet (except for a 30-foot limit on Malone and Beshear). Houseboats are prohibited from these lakes and there is no length limit on canoes.

Many of these lakes were built by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources with money from hunting and fishing license sales. Hence, they are managed primarily as fishing lakes, with horsepower and boat size restrictions designed to favor fishermen.

The change from 16¹₂ to 18¹₂ maximum boat length was made "because fishing boats just keep getting bigger and bigger," says Charlie Bowers, director of fisheries for the Fish and Wildlife Department.

Other regulations governing motor sizes and use of these lakes remain the same. Let's briefly run down what may be used where:

The following lakes permit no motors at all (including electric motors)—Chumley, Dennie, Gooch, Martin County Lake and Kingdom Come Lake.

Only electric motors are allowed on Carter Caves Lake, Spurlington Lake, Marion County Lake, Elliott County Sportsman's Lake, Lake Washburn, Bert Combs Lake, McNeely Lake, Lake Mauzy, Carpenter Lake, Kingfisher Lakes, Metcalfe County Lake, Briggs Lake and all lakes on the Ballard Wildlife Management Area.

Motors larger than 7¹₂ horsepower may not be used on Greenbo Lake and the following lakes have a 10 horsepower maximum limit—Shanty Hollow, Bullock Pen, Boltz, Falmouth, Elmer Davis, Beaver, Herb Smith, Corinth and Wilgreen.

On Guist Creek, Malone and Beshear lakes, the maximum horsepower is 150. Skiing is permitted on these three lakes, but only in designated skiing zones between 10 a.m. and sunset. On Guist Creek and Beshear, the skiing "season" runs from the third Thursday in May through Sept. 30, while on Lake Malone, skiing is permitted from the same opening day through Oct. 31.

Boats in all these state-owned lakes must slow down to idle speed any time they pass other boats in which people are fishing. Swimming in these lakes is permitted only at specified swimming areas while a lifeguard is on duty.

New Ice Age in Prospect?

Is the earth headed for a disastrous new Ice Age—perhaps millions of years earlier than the most pessimistic predictions have indicated?

This ominous possibility arises from a startling discovery made just a year ago by an American spacecraft named Solar Max. On April 4, 1980, the craft made "one of the most unsettling discoveries in the history of science," according to science writer Lowell Ponte in the June Reader's Digest. It detected a sudden drop in the energy coming from our sun.

It was "only" a drop of two-tenths of one percent, but it shook one of science's most cherished beliefs that Earth's sun is a "constant star," whose live-giving radiance shines with a steadiness that is unwavering.

Solar Max's disclosure—which was confirmed a month later when the sun's energy output dipped again, this time for five days—presented us with unmistakable and disturbing evidence, says Ponte. It meant that "our local star, on whose light the life of our planet depends, was flickering like a candle in an unseen breeze."

From August 1979 until February 1981, scientists at 60 observatories in 18 nations coordinated efforts to learn more about our local star. NASA's launchings of Solar Max in February 1980 was part of that global effort, dubbed the International Solar Maximum Year. Noting that the sun's surface is a "violent place where vast explosions often erupt, and sunspots spread across the face in 11-year cycles,' Ponte explains why the idea of a sun that varies in constancy is upsetting. We've been living in a period of unusually high sunspot activity, which has a general effect of making the Earth's weather warmer. He asks, "What will happen when the sun reverts to its more normally inactive behavior?" One answer may lie in the past. During medieval times when a period of maximum sunspot activity occurred, there was a population explosion in Scandinavia and the Vikings colonized seemingly temperate areas they named Greenland and Vinland (the latter was probably Nova Scotia). When sunspot activity abated, Ponte reports, "a bitter chill swept Eruope, and colonists everywhere in the North Atlantic died."

Sophisticated research is giving scientists new and greater understanding of the ways the sun touches our lives. But ominously, what they're learning about our flickering star is not necessarily comforting.





Sturgill To Chair

Racing Commission Newly appointed State Racing Commission member William B. Sturgill was elected chairman of the ninemember board at his first commission meeting May 18.

Sturgill, Prestonsburg native, a businessman and former eastern Kentucky coal operator, will continue to serve as state Energy and Agriculture Department secretary in addition to his new position.

Gov. Brown announced Sturgill's appointment during the meeting held in the commission's Lexington offices. The State Racing Commission regulates the throughbred industry in Kentucky.

Concerning the appointment, Gov. Brown said, "You have to look at racing as a business, and Bill knows how to get a job done. This will create a closer liaison between racing and the executive branch because nobody works more closely with me than Bill Sturgill.

Sturgill told the commission that in Kentucky last year the thoroughbred industry was a larger cash crop than tobacco. "We need to look seriously at the assignment that we have here, and I will certainly take my role as seriously as I do any other," said Sturgill.

According to the governor's office, Sturgill is licensed as a horse owner in Maryland but has never raced a horse in Kentucky. Sturgill replaces Brownell Combs, II, a Lexington breeder, who resigned last week.




Local musicians and bands will entertain crowds "almost continually"throughout the two-day festival with a variety of Kentucky folksongs and music.

Moving? Plan Ahead Is Attorney Advice

An estimated forty million Americans will move from one place to another at least once this year. With each move come potential headaches for the consumer. Avoid problems with your move by planning ahead and purchasing adequate protection for your goods in case of lost or damaged items. The smart consumer should shop around for moving companies as soon as the date of the move is known. Attorney General Steven L. Beshear comments, "Ask each company for a written estimate of the cost and approximate weight of your belongings. Check each company's moving contract to see if you will be charged more money if your belongings weigh more or even less than the estimated figure.'

It is also important to check the reputation of the moving company with others who have used the service recently, or with the Better Business Bureau in your community. Find out if the company delivers its loads on time, and if claims for lost or damaged goods are filed promptly.

handle your move, you should next carefully review the written agreement the company provides. Usually, the cost of the move is the primary concern of the consumer. The cost is determined by the weight of the load and the distance it is being shipped. "A mover is normally not legally bound by his estimate of the moving costs," notes Beshear. "The consumer will be quoted a price per number of pounds of goods to be moved. The final cost is not determined until the loaded truck is weighed."

The moving agreement will also outline the insurance protection your goods will receive against loss or damage. The majority of the companies will cover up to sixty cents per pound per article at no extra cost. However, if you have items that are smaller in size and valuable, you may want to consider purchasing additional coverage for replacement costs.

To insure the safety of your belongings, inventory the goods with the mover. Make sure you agree with his notations on the inventory. For example, if he erroneously notes that a chair leg is broken and it is later broken during the move, you won't be able to collect damages


Beshear stated, "When your goods arrive at your new location, inspect them immediately for loss or damage against the inventory list. You should have the driver look at any damaged items so he can report them to the company. The driver or a company agent will provide you with the forms to file a claim for the broken or misplaced items. Note all damage on the inventory list before signing it."

The Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) now requires all national moving companies to file a report each year telling how the customer is entitled to receive a copy of the report upon request. The ICC has also installed a toll-free number to accept consumer complaints or questions about household moving. You can call ICC at 1-800-424-5230.

If you have further questions about moving companies and the ICC is unable to help you, contact the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601

Rafting Begins on Cumberland River
