

## Grand Jury Will Probe 6 Slayings

### Jury Session May Not End This Week As Caseload Heavy

When the grand jury began its session here Tuesday morning, it faced a heavy case-load which included at least six slayings.

Early in the session the jurors began hearing the evidence gathered against the alleged slayers, mainly testimony offered by Kentucky state troopers and detectives. Indictments are expected before the jury adjourns. Larry Jervis is foreman of the jury.

"Looks like a busy grand jury session," Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen commented. "We may not get through, this week."

The murder investigation work will involve the slayings of:

Larry Wilson, on Buck's Branch, near Martin; Ellis Joe "Bo" Campbell, on Spurlock Fork of Middle Creek; Bennie Lewis, at Emma; the Lazar brothers, Walter and Reginald, at Estill, and Maurice Ray Collins, at Bypro.

The regular grand jury was spared the investigation of the sensational case in which three are charged with the murder of Mrs. Glenda Sharon Marshall when a special grand jury was empanelled and indictments were handed down recently against Mrs. Marshall's husband, Clyde Douglas Marshall, Bobby Gene McGuffey and Carl Harold McFarland.

Meanwhile, the trials of defendants indicted by earlier grand juries will be under way. Jurors empanelled for trial duty during the current term are:

Michael Alley, Auxier; Mildred Anderson, Halo; Ralph Little, Buckingham; Randy Bentley, Garrett;

## Burglars' Haul At Banner Store Said over \$5000

Burglars struck Jones' General Store at Banner last week, the second break reported in that community recently.

Proprietor Ronald Jones said he discovered the break when he arrived to open the store shortly after 8 a.m. Wednesday. A cash register containing about \$180 and merchandise valued at more than \$5000 was taken, he said.

The thieves gained entry by forcing a lock and then used a shopping cart and garbage pails to carry off beer, cigarettes, radios, food and clothing. The loss was not insured.

Jones said the store was equipped with a burglar alarm but he had not activated it the night of the break-in. An apartment above the store which is usually occupied was vacated about two weeks ago, he said.

Also the target of thieves recently was the home of Leo J. Rice, plumbing contractor, on Prater Creek. A United Parcels Service delivery man reported seeing two men drive away from the residence around 11:30 a.m., August 5.

The intruders entered by breaking a sliding glass door. They took a safe containing bonds and cash the family had been saving for a vacation, said Mrs. Maxine Rice. Also missing were two guns, a collection of silver coins, a microwave oven, a mantel clock, and a saxophone. Two Weedeaters were taken from a garden shed.

Although the loss amounting to several thousand dollars is covered by insurance, "You feel right sick, coming in and seeing it...things you've worked for," Mrs. Rice said.

## Zapata Ends Its Coal Operations By Recent Sale

The Zapata Corporation is quitting the coal business, where it reportedly lost money, to return to its original specialties of offshore drilling and oil and gas exploration where it make its millions.

Its coal subsidiary, Zapata Fuels, has sold its holdings, including Floyd, Lawrence and Magoffin county mines, to the Stanford Coal Co. for \$100 million.

Stanford Coal Co., a closely held firm, was incorporated only a few days before the Zapata Fuels purchase. It was organized by six coal managers of Zapata and is headed by Thetford H. Callahan, president of Zapata Fuels.

The properties conveyed in the transaction are the Bebe Coal Corp., which Zapata bought from Emmitt Conn, of Harold, and the Triple Elkhorn Coal Co. and Ridgeway Fuel Corp., both of which were acquired from Harry Hale Ranier, formerly of Prestonsburg, now of Lexington.

## State Auditors Claim Late Clerk's Debt Was More Than Half-Million

According to a state audit of the late C. Ollie Robinson's financial records released last week, the clerk owed the state and county more than half a million dollars at his death in February.

The clerk's bookkeeping practices were so informal they fell below minimum state requirements and made overall comment impossible, the audit report said.

Conducted by the office of Auditor of Public Accounts James B. Graham, the audit showed a deficit of \$510,671. The clerk was bonded for \$50,000 and a family member assessed the value of his estate at \$75,000.

Major claims on the estate have been filed by the state Transportation Cabinet—for \$288,989 in unpaid registration fees—and the Revenue Cabinet—for \$116,398 in delinquent taxes. The county has previously claimed \$51,047 in excess fees due for the years 1976 through 1981. And the Bank Josephine lists a \$15,058 "special fund" overdraft.

In addition, the final audit reveals \$11,408 in excess fees due to the county

for 1982 and 1983 and \$68,442 in other taxes owed to the county or county agencies for 1977 through 1983—about half of it in unpaid deed transfer taxes.

Robinson would not have had to pay the county excess fees for the past two years except that the auditors disallowed salary and overtime payments which had not been authorized by the fiscal court.

Also disallowed were 1982 payments totalling \$2132 which the auditors listed as personal rather than official expenses. The payments violated state law, the audit said.

In redlining salary and overtime payments, Graham points out that a May, 1981 fiscal court order authorizes only 10 fulltime and three parttime deputies for the clerk's office and sets maximum salaries for them. In 1982, Robinson paid \$41,239 beyond what the court had authorized and, in 1983, \$5083. The fiscal court may yet agree to accept the unauthorized salary and overtime payments, the audit notes.

## Conley Gets Tough With Truant Jurors

If you're called for jury duty, you had better be prepared to serve. That was the advice Circuit Judge Hollie Conley had for 61 potential jurors who turned up yesterday (Tuesday) for the opening of the court's fall quarter.

His hard line came in response to a flood of requests from those who wanted to be excused from jury service. He also had the support of the law, the judge noted bluntly.

While he would allow people to postpone jury duty for a good reason, only illness would excuse a person altogether, he said.

Danny Patton, safety director at National Mines, was passed over for this term. So was Elmer Johnson, who runs a cutting machine. Epp Banks would be in to serve as soon as he finished repairing an air-conditioner. Half a dozen more were passed over for job-related reasons.

For 17 who didn't show up at all, bench warrants would be issued, the judge said.

Serving on a jury is like going to jail, Conley said—it's never convenient but it sometimes has to be done. Of those who had petitioned him in vain to be excused, the judge said, "I'm sure you had some choice words for me under your breath. But this (jury duty) is part of our system."

Addressing the common argument that juries should be filled by those with nothing better to do, the judge reminded his audience that the Constitution provides for trial by a jury of one's peers. "That means a random selection—teachers, miners, retirees, young people, old people, men and women," he said.

If they were themselves in court, they would want their cases to be heard by "good people," the judge argued. "You wouldn't want stragglers."

In place of the old system, where three commissioners selected jurors from each section of the county—a system that had a way of turning up the same faces from one year to another—selection of potential jurors is now a computerized operation run out of the Secretary of State's office.

If you have a driver's license, or own a piece of property, or are registered to vote, or have an automobile registered in your name, you may be randomly selected and added to the list of about 1000 names furnished the court whenever the jury pool here runs low.

## Plea of Guilty Ends Court Case

A Wheelwright man pleaded guilty in circuit court Tuesday to a burglary charge stemming from a break-in at a Left Beaver service station last March.

Fred Greer, 21, was accused with Wiley Keith Pennington of breaking into a gas station owned by Freeman Newman at Hi Hat. Cigarettes, candy and tools valued at around \$1400 were taken.

Greer will be sentenced September 23. Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Albert Burchett has recommended that he be given a two-year jail term. The facts that the defendant has no prior record and that he cooperated with police in recovering some of the stolen goods are expected to be urged in his favor. He is married, with two children, and will remain free while awaiting sentence.

Pennington earlier pleaded guilty and received a three-year sentence.

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley followed the prosecutor's recommendation in giving Craig Triplett, 22, a five-year probation sentence. Triplett, of Jacks Creek, earlier pleaded guilty to receiving a stereo stolen from Slone's Market at Bevensville.





New Car Title Law Hailed As Bar to Theft of Vehicles

The heart of the state's new title law aimed at reducing stolen vehicle traffic in Kentucky went into effect yesterday (Tuesday).

"This is the beginning of the end of Kentucky's reputation as a dumping ground for stolen cars," Vehicle Regulation Commissioner Tim Helson said. Beginning Tuesday, all new applications for automobile and truck titles must be cleared through Frankfort.

Helson said the title applications will include the vehicle's identification number, its current odometer reading and details of any liens against the vehicle.

"We have personnel trained in detecting forged or altered documents to prevent fraud in the transfer of ownership. The vehicle's serial number will be submitted to the National Crime Information Commission to see if it has been reported as stolen," he said.

The new procedure involves completing the title application obtained at the county clerk's office. If a car or truck is being titled in Kentucky for the first time, a certified inspector from the sheriff's office must inspect the vehicle. There is a \$3 charge for the inspection. If it is a new vehicle purchased from a Kentucky dealer, no inspection is required, Helson said.

The owner will then give the completed application to the clerk who keys all the information into the statewide Automated Vehicle Information System (AVIS). If there was a lien against the vehicle with the former owner, it must be released in the county in which it was recorded prior to the current transaction.

The clerk's office will then forward the title application and lien release papers to Frankfort. There is a \$6 charge payable to the county clerk's office at this point.

If the vehicle is being used to secure a loan by the new owner, the title cannot be issued until the financial institution files the lien information with the county clerk's office, which will forward the data to Frankfort. Helson said the bank, loan company or credit union must submit the lien information within 30 days.

Once the title and lien information is received in Frankfort, Helson said the law requires that all paperwork be completed within five days.

If the vehicle must be licensed, there is a \$3 transfer fee and a prorated registration fee.

Helson emphasized that the new title document is a person's only proof of ownership of the car or truck. "The title should be stored in a secure place such as a safety deposit box. Under no circumstances should the title be carried in the vehicle," he said.

Floyd county native Rodney C. Bussey has been named acting director for development at Berea College.

Bussey will assume the responsibilities of Dr. C.J. Young who is resigning to become development vice-president at Rochester (N.Y.) Institute of Technology. Earlier this summer, Bussey was promoted to the position of associate vice-president for development, working under Dr. Young. Bussey also will continue as director of Berea's Alumni Association, a post he has held since 1975.

A 1963 Berea graduate, Bussey holds the M.A. degree in student personnel from Eastern Kentucky University. Prior to becoming Berea's alumni director, he was assistant headmaster of The Lexington School, Lexington, Ky.

During his eight years as alumni director, the Alumni Council has become more active, the program has been strengthened and alumni support from the college has significantly increased, according to President Willis D. Weatherford.

In his new position, Bussey will have responsibility for the completion of Berea's \$43.8 million Second Century Program, the largest capital program ever undertaken by any Kentucky college.

The Prestonsburg High School graduate is the son of Mrs. Nova Oberle, of Tutor Key, Johnson county, and the late Dawson Bussey, who lived in David and Prestonsburg.

## Summer Heat, Drouth Set Stage for Fires

Already there are those who will tell you that the coming winter will be a severe one, as cold as the summer has been hot.

Perhaps with better reason, forest rangers foresee a long and potentially destructive forest fire season. Prolonged heat and drouth have set the stage for that.

The alarm already has sounded in isolated areas, up to 60 days earlier than usual, and the chances of conditions improving this month are slim.

"Any kind of cigarette or match...can start the grass afire and it will just burn right on into the woods. It's flash fuel in these conditions," said Gene Reynolds of the state Forestry Division's Frankfort office.

State laws aimed at curbing forest

fires by banning open burning except between 4 p.m. and midnight do not take effect until Oct. 1, which is normally when leaves begin to fall, shrubs dry up and forest fires become a danger.

But because of the drouth, said Charles Crail at the U.S. Forest Service office at Winchester, "We could have a very early season this year."

The problem is statewide, from the dry forest floors of the eastern Kentucky hills to the parched pastures and croplands of extreme western Kentucky.

Only in a drought could one recent forest fire have started, said Dave Sorenson of the Forestry Division's Mayfield district.

"We're almost positive it was started by a piece of broken glass from an old jar," he said. "It magnified the sunlight just like a magnifying glass. Everything just came together just right and it started."

Reynolds said last week that rangers recently had been reporting a small fire about every day. "We've had nothing serious yet, but conditions are real serious."

Crews fought four fires in August in the Daniel Boone National Forest of eastern Kentucky, including one started by lightning Aug. 18 in the Stearns district.

Crail said he hoped this would not be a repeat of the 1980 forest fire season. "We started out with eight fires (in the national forest) that August, and it really blew up in November with 105 fires," he said.

Open fires were banned in the Daniel Boone Forest that year, and Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. issued a similar ban for 26 eastern Kentucky counties.

Such a ban might not be necessary, Crail said, "if people are real careful. Ninety-nine out of 100 of the fires are started by people."

"We spend a lot of tax money fighting these darn fires. We might better spend it on other things," he said. "We spend money to plant trees and food plots for wildlife, and on recreation areas and recreation trails. We don't want to see it go up in smoke."

## Nova gets 'Fever'

We think of infectious plagues as nightmares from the past, but occasionally nature reminds us that we are still vulnerable. "Nova" tells the story of one such terrifying episode in "Lassa Fever," airing Tuesday, Sept. 13 on PBS. (Please check local listings for time.)

"Lassa Fever" is a gripping story about the three-year battle against a previously unknown disease that struck a town in Nigeria in 1969, with a death rate far higher than that tallied by the bubonic plague of medieval Europe. It contains the elements of drama, suspense and character development of a stage play, combined with the powerful impact of a documentary.

It interweaves the personal fears and ambitions, and also the courage and dedication, of the people who took part in a major scientific detective drama. While their struggle attracted little media attention, they knew that the lives of thousands of people might depend on their skill and speed in finding and rooting out the mysterious killer.







# Busy as Mountain Doctor, Stumbo Keeps Options Open

What is Grady Stumbo doing, now that he's an also-ran in state politics? Working, as he did before his race for the Democratic nomination for governor—and work for him means being a full-time doctor.

Three months after the primary, Dr. Stumbo and two other physicians see some 70 patients a day at the clinic he founded near Hindman in 1972 after graduation from medical school.

The campaign speeches he fits into his schedule now are for Lt. Gov. Martha Layne Collins, the Democratic primary winner.

But Stumbo said, "Coming home to practice medicine in Knott county to me is not losing."

And in all likelihood, he said, "This coal miner's son is going to be back in the political arena."

Stumbo endorsed Mrs. Collins shortly after the primary. He has taped a radio advertisement for her and planned Labor Day appearances on her behalf Monday in Paducah and Madisonville.

He has met with his supporters, including the United Mine Workers Union, which backed him in the primary and now endorses Mrs. Collins, and he also spoke at the Fancy Farm picnic in western Kentucky.

There, in the First District territory of Rep. Carroll Hubbard, D-Mayfield, he joked that his support was so strong "that I might come down there and run for Congress."

Stumbo grinned. "I was having some fun with Hubbard," he said, but he added, "There are some good options coming up, both in the short term and the long run."

The 37-year-old physician has not said which options he might consider. "I'm not going to say," he said, smiling. "I'm going to practice medicine and keep my options open."

Stumbo said he had proved some points with his primary race.

"I've shown that an eastern Kentucky candidate can run a statewide race, that an eastern Kentuckian can be a serious candidate and get broad-based support."

"The people who predicted that I'd be lucky to get 40,000 votes got egg on their face," he said.

Dr. Stumbo discussed the primary campaign with Gary Cohn, Lexington Herald-Leader reporter, who wrote:

Meanwhile, Stumbo said the biggest disappointment in this year's gubernatorial campaign—other than losing, that is—was "the intellectual dishonesty of certain people and institutions."

"There are people who would say to you, 'We think you're the smartest guy, we think you'd make the best governor, we just think you can't win, and we can't help you.'"

"To a young fellow who's a little bit idealistic," Stumbo said, "that's a helluva blow."

"And that was the thing that discouraged me. There were some prominent people that said they were going to be for Harvey Sloane because he was going to win and they needed access."

"I tell you, I had an ex-governor who was committed to me. And once I openly announced and started running and the pressure got on him, he withdrew his support," Stumbo said. He refused to identify the ex-governor.

have less now, listening to their problems and their frustrations. You learn that by being down in it."

"If I'd stayed in Frankfort, I'd probably have been like any other bureaucrat."

Stumbo said he had plans he would not yet discuss to repay his campaign indebtedness, including \$300,000 he borrowed, and in turn loaned to the campaign, which he said was "just about the extent of it. I don't see that as a major problem."

The question of whether the personal loans were legal or ran afoul of the \$3,000 limit on campaign contributions is before the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance, but Stumbo said his lawyers advised that the loans were legal. "We intended to adhere to the law and that's what we'll do."

As for his political future, Stumbo said, "We'll just let the writers speculate."

"Our organization is staying intact, and we'll meet regularly when we get through this campaign."







## Swimmers, Robbers and Ghosts: A Crab for Every Lifestyle

A female blue crab may produce in a single brood as many as 2 million eggs, only a few of which will survive to maturity.

Like people, crabs have many different lifestyles. If there's an empty aquatic ecological niche, "chances are a crab will find it," says Dr. Austin B. Williams, a Smithsonian Institution research associate and expert on shrimps, lobsters and crabs for the National Marine Fisheries Service.

Thus, there are crabs that live in the sea, in fresh water and, as adults, partly or totally on land; crabs that walk, run, climb, swim or burrow; even crabs that live in or with animals in either a symbiotic or parasitic relationship.

This adaptability derives from evolutionary modifications in the basic principal structure of all "true," or brachyuran, crabs: a squat, broad compact body; tough, external skeleton called an "exoskeleton"; a pair of claws, and four pairs of walking legs radiating out from the sides.

The Atlantic blue crab, for instance, is superbly modified for skimming over the bottom of bays with a shallow, streamlined body and a fairly light skeleton. Its walking legs are lighter and flatter than those of many other crabs, and its two hind legs are flattened and rounded like paddles for rapid sculling. Though blue crabs typically eat worms, clams and other bottom-dwelling animals, their speed helps them catch prey and avoid predators.

All so-called "swimming crabs" have the same type of modifications, Williams says, but the Atlantic blue crab is one of the most successful. "The blue crab," he notes, "has one of the widest geographical distributions of the swimming crabs in the Western Hemisphere, from Nova Scotia to northern Argentina."

The semiterrestrial ghost crabs of tropical sandy beaches are similarly modified for speed, with thin, light skeletons. These crabs can move in all directions at speeds of up to 6 feet a second. Their large eyes are constantly on the alert for food and enemies.

Other rapidly moving semiterrestrial crabs are also exceedingly agile climbers. Among these are the tropical rocky shore crab and the mangrove tree crab. The slower moving robber (though technically not a "true" crab) of the


Pacific islands climbs sago palm trees to escape danger—and does some munching on fruit while visiting. Robber crabs, incidentally, got their names from their habit of walking off with things—sandals, knives, forks and reportedly a wrist watch or two.

Crabs not noted for their speed have evolved other protective mechanisms. Menippe mercenaria, a commercially important stone crab that lives on rocky bottoms or burrows in shallow water from North Carolina southward to Belize, has a thick, heavy skeletal armor and massive claws which form daunting defensive weapons. The large land crab, Cardisoma, digs burrows 3 feet deep or even deeper, down to the water table. A small living chamber at the bottom of the burrow provides a damp, cool retreat from heat and enemies during the day.

Spider crabs, with their long spindly legs and often small, delicate bodies, are masters of disguise. Their main camouflaging agents are frequently algae, but their methods of dress vary from one species to the next, notes Dr. Tuck Hines, a zoologist at the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center who has studied these crabs extensively on the West Coast.

One long-legged spider crab, Loxorhynchus crispatus, wears a gown of feathery brown or red algae on its backs and legs, while its small neighbor, Scyra acutifrons, is usually covered with a dense growth of sponges, barnacles and other small animals to blend in with the surrounding rocks. Many of these crabs, after shedding their exoskeletons, actually "plant" new algae and animals on the hooked hairs on their backs to restore their camouflage.

But the ultimate solution in protection has been found by the pea crab, Pinnotheres ostrum. This tiny, thin-shelled, frail-looking creature with poorly developed legs has no need for rapid locomotion, armor or disguises. It lives early its entire life inside an oyster, in an area between the oyster's shell and gill called the mantle cavity. This crab leaves its cozy, well-protected home to mate, but returns to an oyster to brood and hatch its eggs.

# Phone Group Opposes Rate Hike

Harold Telephone Company, Inc. and 14 other Kentucky independent telephone companies which operate within Kentucky have filed their statements to the Kentucky Public Service Commission concerning access charges.

Paul R. Gearheart, manager of Harold Telephone Company, Inc., reports that the independent group represents 15 of the 22 telephone companies in Kentucky. "Our serving areas are predominantly rural, and although our consumers do not comprise the majority of consumers in the Commonwealth, it is our position that these rural consumers have every right to equal treatment in these proceedings; a right that we feel they were not accorded in the Federal Communications Commission proceedings on interstate access charges," he said.

Gearheart said the group is adamantly opposed to the federal interstate access charge plan which has ordered telephone companies to add \$2 per month charge to residential customers, beginning next January 1. The charge will increase to \$3.00 in 1985 and \$4.00 in 1986. During this period, the rate for business subscribers will be \$6 per month. These interstate access charges will apply, even if a customer does not call out of the state of Kentucky. "We feel that it is grossly unfair to the residential consumer, especially those in rural areas, and those who place few long distance calls," Gearheart said.

"We urge the Kentucky Public Service Commission to prevent implementation of the FCC plan in the intrastate arena, since the only winner will be profit-seeking interexchange carriers and big business."

The biggest loser is the residential consumer, he contends, and the rural residential consumer will be hurt even more. Even before the intrastate jurisdiction is considered, the residential consumers will see, within five years, an average of an \$8 per month increase in the form of end-user and usage sensitive charges regardless of whether they make long distance calls or not. In all likelihood, they will not see a corresponding reduction in toll rates due to competition, he predicted.

Should the Kentucky Public Service Commission follow the FCC's lead and mirror the FCC Access Charge Plan, employing the use of end user charges to recover NTS (non traffic sensitive) costs and allowing the introduction of competition into the intrastate toll arena, the full impact both the interstate and intrastate charges will clearly place the basic telephone service out of the economic reach of the majority of the rural residential consumers, it is claimed.

The independent telephone group has urged this commission to take the following cause of action:

1. Move Slowly. The full impact that interstate toll competition will have on the consumer is unknown. No one knows for sure how these new rates will affect consumers, how many consumers will "drop off", and whether consumers will benefit at all from the federal plan.
2. Restrict any form of toll competition. Since toll competition is profit driven, the most lucrative markets will be sought, mainly those routes with the highest density or individual business customer who are high toll users.

The independent group of companies argue.

Assuming that these "entrepreneurial" carriers will not be required to provide universal service, to provide service to less dense high cost areas, and have no requirement to carry local exchange cost in their rates, the natural result will be to permit present regulated carriers to de-average toll rates and shed non traffic sensitive costs in order to compete. Therefore, in-

roduction of competition forces some access charge arrangement where non traffic sensitive costs are picked up in local service rates. It will push toll rates up in less dense routes, and encourage competing carriers into a price war for the high toll business customers. In this scenario, it is conceivable that rural toll rates would be priced considerably high to make up for revenue loss where competition is the greatest. Low toll users are disadvantaged and rural customers will be hit the hardest. The introduction of any competition in the intrastate arena toll sets the mechanism in motion thus setting up a domino effect. Therefore, any toll competition, including WATS resale, should be, for the present, delayed until some equitable method can be developed to protect universal service with rates that will generally be affordable by anyone. Gearheart said there are several bills in congress concerning the FCC interstate access plan and he suggested that telephone customers write their congressman and senators and request them to vote against any FCC decisions that do not protect universal service at a reasonable rate.

### Human Resources Head Plans Prestonsburg Visit


Human Resources Cabinet Secretary Buddy Adams will visit Prestonsburg tomorrow (Thursday) to examine local office facilities and to hear from field staff members of the cabinet's four departments about local impact of state programs and decisions. In addition to touring offices in 11 communities, Adams and members of the Frankfort central office staff will conduct regional public hearings in Pineville on Sept. 6 and in Pikeville on Sept. 7.

"We have a number of new programs in the 'working state' in each of our four departments and I have found it very helpful in the past to get a viewpoint on these programs from outside Frankfort. The field office employees sometimes have the clearest vision on how a decision made in the state capital affects the citizens of this state," Adams said. The public hearings continue a policy Adams began some months ago of seeking citizen comments on the wide range of cabinet programs and projects. "Sometimes we may give somebody an answer that resolves a question they have had for a long time. Or we may turn up a problem that can be corrected with a little more attention from Frankfort. But these public hearings provide the most direct way for me to gauge what people are thinking about the social programs this cabinet provides," he said.



## New Procedure in Effect On Non-Emergency Cases

By government mandate, Kentucky physicians are now required to comply with yet another administrative procedure when admitting Medicare and Medicaid patients to hospitals in Kentucky.

Beginning September 1, the cases of all Medicare and Medicaid non-emergency patients became subject to review by the Kentucky Peer Review Organization (KPRO) before they are admitted to a hospital.

KPRO is a federally funded state organization set up to review the medical necessity of hospital admissions. It currently reviews cases of Medicare and Medicaid patients after they are discharged from the hospital. The new regulation, called the Prior Authorization Review Program, requires that physicians obtain KPRO approval before the patient is admitted. Failure to comply may result in the loss of Medicare and Medicaid payment to both the physician and the hospital.

The patient probably won't even be aware this process is going on unless they appear at the hospital and the physician has not called in the authorization code. If this happens, the patient will have to wait—it's just another step in the bureaucratic process. This is how it works:

The admitting physician calls KPRO and talks to a Registered Nurse Health Care Coordinator (HCC). The information required includes the patient program (Medicare/Medicaid) identification number, the payment source (Medicare/Medicaid), the patient's sex, patient's birthdate, and the medical reasons that require the patient's admission to the hospital.

If the admission is approved, the physician caller will be given a "prior authorization number" that must accompany the patient to the hospital admitting office.

If the HCC can't approve the admission, the case will be referred to the KPRO Physician Advisor who will then call the admitting physician and further review the case and make a determination.

This regulation applies to all non-emergency Medicare/Medicaid patients except admissions for alcoholism, drug dependency, rehabilitation, psychiatric treatment, and routine maternity cases.
