### Claims Decision Was To Placate State Officials

"I am stepping aside on my own free will and choice and hold no ill will or animosity toward anyone." With that, Floyd Schools Superintendent E.P. 'Pete' Grigsby, Jr. last Wednesday relinquished the post he has held for the past nine years. His resignation, both as superintendent and as secretary to the Board of Education, will take effect on Sept. 4, the date of the next regular board meeting.

Assistant Superintendent Ray Brackett has been instructed by the board to prepare the agenda for its next meeting, when he expects to be named acting superintendent. Brackett also made it clear he hopes to be selected by the board to fill out the three years remaining in Grigsby's contract period.

A citizens' group, meanwhile, is pressing board members to open up the process of selecting a new superintendent. In a letter to The Times, the 15-member executive committee of the Floyd County Education Forum urges citizens to insist that "the selection of a new superintendent be based on a review of applications gleaned from a welladvertised job description that has been widely distributed.

"When we have another superintendent, we want it to be someone we all want, not just five board members,' said Barbara Gullett, of Wheelwright, a member of the committee. "We need to really straighten this mess out and put someone in there who's qualified.

Citizen participation on a committee to recruit or screen applications for the superintendency would be "definitely a good idea," Mrs. Gullett said.

After vowing recently that he would fight to keep his job, Grigsby went quietly, distributing a prepared statement in the hot, crowded boardroom around 10:15 p.m. after the board had weighed his future in a 11/2-hour closed session. The superintendent later repeated a charge that he was the "sacrificial lamb" in a peace offering designed to placate state education authorities, who have given Floyd officials until August 15 to show why the state should not consider taking over the operation of coun-

ty schools here. Grigsby said that, for the good of the schools, he decided to yield to an ultimatum originating in the office of state Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald when it became clear that most members of the Floyd board-Dr. Mary Hall was the only member to stick by him in the end-

were prepared to go along with it. "I think I've done the right thing if the state holds up their end of the bargain, if they get out of Floyd county and leave it to the board to operate the schools."

According to Dean Murray, resource manager for the Army Corps of Engineers at Dewey Dam, Corps Ranger Jack Nichol was the first investigator on the scene. Murray said Nichol, Park Ranger Ron Hayes and State Trooper Greg Roberts searched the shoreline for clothing, an abandoned vehicle, or anything which would indicate a man had been swimming there. Nothing was found, and, according to Park Ranger Jerry Daniels, no missing persons reports had been received by

Daniels said witnesses reported seeing a white male, about 20 years old, swim what they considered to be dangerously far from shore, begin floundering and go under. No one questioned by investigators knew the identity of the apparent victim.

Rescue squad members arrived around 4:45 p.m., and dragged the lake for several hours. They made a second attempt to locate the reported victim yesterday (Tuesday), but their search was interrupted when they were called to help salvage a pick-up truck and camping trailer which had plunged into the lake sometime between 4 and 4:30 that

# 'Home Folks' Haven't Forgotten, Combs Learned Here Saturday

Eastern Kentucky came out in force last Saturday to honor former Governor Bert T. Combs at Jenny Wiley State

Kentucky's 50th governor was honored with Bert Combs Day proclamations and awards from Mayor Harold Cooley, Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo, attorney Woodrow W. Burchett, Mayors Elmer Ferguson, of Wheelwright and Bill Gorman, of Hazard; and Judge-Executives Paul Salyer, of Magoffin county and Paul Patton, of Pike county. Cooley awarded Combs the key to the city

It was a day marked with speeches, testimonials and handshakes, similar to many the former governor and judge must have experienced in the past, but this one was special, he said, because he wasn't running for any office.

"This is a red-letter day for me. In three-score years and ten, I've picked up some awards and plaques, some deserved, some not. But this means more. I've always said, no matter how many states you carry, or offices you achieve, it's how you're received by your friends and neighbors. And I know you've come here knowing I can't do anything for you," he said with a grin.

In introducing Combs, local businessman and member of the Bert Combs Day organizing committee, Marvin Music said "study the facts and you'll see, Bert Combs made the greatest governor Kentucky ever had."

Music said the idea to honor Combs came from State Senator Benny Ray

The Mountain Parkway, which opened up Eastern Kentucky to the Bluegrass in the early 1960's, was envisioned by Combs before his election in 1959. He had wanted, he said, to build the highway, but didn't think it financially feasible. Longtime friend and Frankfort engineering executive William H. May told him he should build a toll road, "if I couldn't build one free.

May volunteered to gamble on his election, said Combs, and did the design planning for the entire parkway with the understanding that if Combs were elected, he would be paid; if Combs lost, Bill May is responsible for building

the parkway," said Combs. "It could just as well have been named the 'William H. May Highway,' although I'm not suggesting you do it.'

The Mountain Parkway, of course, was not the only achievement of Comb's administration.

During his term, Combs built 160 miles of limited-access, four-lane toll roads, which included not only the Mountain Parkway but also the West Kentucky Parkway, and the beginning of the Bluegrass Parkway; 63 miles of interstate highway and 54 miles of other multi-lane roads.

He was equally aggressive in upgrading education in the state. With Combs in office, 500 one-room schools were closed, and 32 high schools and 102 elementary schools opened. Public school teachers received pay raises of more than 20 percent, and a statewide educational television network was

Combs began the community college system, increased state support of higher education by 115 percent, and

### **UK Finds Desired Support** At Alumni Rally Held Here

In what had all the appearance of an academic pep rally, officials of the University of Kentucky met with alumni and "friends" of the university last Thursday in Prestonsburg Community

College's Pike auditorium. The meeting, one of 34 held simultaneously across the state, was an effort to drum up support for UK's fight against some options being considered by the state Council on Higher Education, which university officials feel are not in UK's best interest: UK president Dr. Otis Singletary has been sharply critical of several suggestions made by the council in its attempt to cut waste and duplication in the state's universities.

In a video-taped message, later reiterated by community college Chancellor Charles Wethington, moderator of the PCC meeting. Singletary outlined the offensive elements. They included removing the 13 community colleges from UK's control, closing UK's law and dental schools, merging the UK and University of Louisville medical centers under one board, and reducing support for research and public service programs in agriculture.

Singletary told the group if they didn't want these things to happen, to "send them the message," referring to both state government officials and the Council on Higher Education (CHE).

But the UK president said he did support some of the council's recommendations, notably that Kentucky needed one "comprehensive," flagship university. And, he said, "it should be the University of Kentucky.'

Among the 82 in attendance at PCC were several UK dental students from Floyd county, which Wethington used to underscore eastern Kentucky's dependence on the university.

State Senator Benny Ray Bailey and state Representative Jim Rose, Hindman Democrats, were there to voice support for UK and higher education in general. Both said they were against the closing of any college or university. Bailey also specified he was against the closing of Chase Law School in northern Kentucky, which is in potential danger of being closed by the CHE.


Bailey said he felt the CHE proposals had had some positive effects on UK,

'I think we've had some pretty good discussions, and I think it's probably good for the university some of the things that've been said," he said. Bailey went on to say he was against limiting enrollment. "When we start limiting enrollment, it limits my people, the poor people." And he said he was in favor of UK keeping control of the community colleges. "UK's had it from the beginning, and they've done a pretty good job," he said.

'As long as I'm in the state senate, UK's gonna have a pretty strong advocate," Bailey concluded.

Rose said he was glad to see the university becoming more aggressive. He said he was "not for closing any schools or breaking up the community colleges. I'm not for closing any program at the university. I will always support the university," he said.

The need to remove asbestos from two grade schools was cited by Supt. E.P. Grigsby, Jr. last Wednesday as the reason for again postponing the opening of Floyd schools. The first day of classes, originally set for Aug. 8 and delayed un-

til Aug. 12, is now scheduled for Aug. 19. News of asbestos in the schools drew a question at last Wednesday's board meeting from Joyce Everly, leader of a 1979 drive to clean the cancer-related material out of Prestonsburg High School. A state observer at the meeting wondered aloud during a break why the board waited until July 10 to authorize a contract for its removal. And board member Dr. Mary Hall argued for opening all schools but those affected by the

Grigsby defended the schools' maintenance staff from any suggestion of negligence, attributing the school-

opening delay to the heavy volume of maintenance work which had to be done over the summer. Clark Elementary and Garth Vocational schools were reported to have had all asbestos removed and to have been certified by the state Air Quality Division. Prestonsburg and Wheelwright high schools were said to be awaiting certification, although workers were reported to be still removing asbestos from Wheelwright yesterday (Tuesday). The asbestos was yet to be removed from Prestonsburg and Osborne grade schools.

No bids were received for insuring the school bus fleet and coverage was due to expire on August 15 unless a contract could be secured in the meantime, the board was told. Transportation Director Ed Patton said Monday that a contract was being negotiated and that coverage

# Brackett Says He Expects To Be New Superintendent

For Ray Brackett, who will be 53 this month, the resignation of E.P. Grigsby, Jr. offers the chance of realizing a longheld ambition-to be superintendent of Floyd county schools.

Currently assistant superintendent for finances, Brackett expects to be named acting superintendent by the Floyd Board of Education at its Sept. 4 meeting. And, in an interview last Friday, he made no secret of his hopes of taking over from Grigsby permanently.

"I think I'm going to be superintendent. That's my goal and objective. That's what I've had 20 years of hard experience working for," he said.

If his hopes are realized, Brackett will be the first non-native to head the county school system, he said. Born in Lexington, he was schooled in that city and in Louisville, settling in this county in 1957 after serving in Korea with the U.S. Marine Corps, earning a master's degree at the University of Kentucky, and marrying Frances Preston, of Allen.

After nine years in the classroomhe was teacher and head football coach at Wheelwright High School-Brackett was brought into the system's central administrative staff, where he has been ever since. A school social worker at first, he was for seven years director of the Title I (remedial reading) program, and is in his 13th year as assistant superintendent and finance officer.

Among other things, Brackett was busy Friday collating answers to a series of questions (see box) put to Floyd school officials last month by Robert E. Spillman, associate superintendent for local services in the state Department of Education. The answers constitute Floyd county's response to a demand by the state Board of Education that it show by August 15 why the state should not take over the schools here under Kentucky's 1984 "academic receivership" law. Grigsby and the Floyd board also faced possible ouster for "willful neglect

Unlike Grigsby, who sometimes said he found state demands difficult to satisfy or even understand, Brackett said he was confident that Floyd officials would be able to convince the state that they are capable of running their own

Spillman, in a July 8 letter to Board Chairman Dr. J.D. Adams, accused Floyd school officials of paying "simple lip service" to the concerns both of the state board and of Floyd citizens. But Brackett said education officials here would respond to the state "not with talking but with action.'

Whether the issue is asbestos in the schools, fire code deficiencies, bidding violations or lack of an adequate inventory, Brackett said, "we will provide factual answers, with evidence, dates and completion.'

Department heads "will be given an opportunity to perform and will perform," Brackett vowed, explaining, (See Story No. 1, Page 4)

# KY 80 Victim **Identified As** Floyd Woman

The body of a woman found on KY 80 in Knott county early Tuesday morning was identified later as that of Linda Cook, of Grethel.

Knott Coroner Ken Gayheart said the victim had apparently been pushed or had jumped, from a moving vehicle. He said there was a deep gash at the back of the woman's head, another on a foot and that her back was a mass of lacerations and contusions.

State Police Detective Oliver Combs and other officers were investigating the death and were seeking the identity of the driver of the vehicle in which Miss Cook may have been a passenger. Her body was found in the eastbound lane of the highway, and it is surmised that the vehicle of which she was an occupant was travelling toward this county at the time. The body was found by a coal truck driver at a point about 11/2 miles east of the junction of the Hindman connector with KY 80.

Early clues to the victim's identity were found in the initial, "K" on a key chain and the initials, "LKB," on a 1972 Betsy Layne High School class ring which the woman wore.

Acquaintances said that David Smith, a Pike county man who reportedly shot himself to death Saturday night, had been a companion to Mrs. Cook. Her husband, Wendell Cook, is said to have committed suicide about two years ago. Mrs. Cook was reportedly agitated and depressed in recent days. She leaves three young children, who have been in the care of relatives.

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

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#### Take Off the Kid Gloves

Some of the most bitter criticism of state government is directed at two agencies, the Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) Board and the state Parole Board.

The newspapers in recent days have published two items which add fuel to the flames.

One tells of the Shepherdsville, Ky. liquor store owner's selling to a group of high school pupils beer and high-proof wine from which one, a boy of 15, became intoxicated and drowned in a nearby stream.

For this violation of state law and for the consequent death of a young boy, the ABC Board suspended the license of the liquor store for 45 whole days, after which the owner may return, if he chooses, to selling more wine and beer, or even whiskey, to other children.

Meanwhile, the owner of the liquor store continues with business as usual while the license suspension is being appealed.

The other newspaper story tells of a Johnson county man who was sentenced in 1982 to 20 years in prison for his admitted participation in the baseball bat slaying of his step-father and a year later, after walking away from prison, became involved in the invasion of the home of Paintsville Mayor James Trimble and the robbery of Trimble and members of his family. For that caper the escapee got five more years.

And now, after little more than three years' time in prison on "paper sentences" totalling 25 years, this man who was involved in a beating murder, escape from prison and a vicious robbery is eligible for parole. And his parole is expected as soon as employment and a place to stay can be found for him.

The ABC Board should have closed the liquor dealer's place permanently. The Parole Board makes court convictions a joke. But neither may be entirely to blame. They work within the frame-work of laws enacted by the General Assembly. So it would seem reasonable to suppose that if the people of Kentucky want liquor stores to feel the power of the law and criminals to pay the price judges and juries specify for them, laws that mean just those harsh realities, and nothing less, will have to be enacted and this kid glove treatment of violators ended.

Some Floyd students will be stranded Monday as the result of a regulation handed down by the state Board of Education three months ago, Patton told the board. The new rule, which requires a seatbelt for every passenger in vehicles designed to carry fewer than 10 persons, will affect 20 contract drivers who haul students in cars and pickups out of hollows not accessible to regular buses.

Nine small buses purchased this summer will meet state requirements and will be able to handle about half of those dependent on contract runs, Patton said. The board authorized the transportation director to shop around for six more used minibuses but some students will be without transportation in the interim. School officials will attempt to notify parents of the affected students before school opens. Patton said.

With the centralization of the nutrition program, school menus wil be uniform across the county, will be published weekly by The Floyd County Times, and will cost the same at all schools. The new price, 70 cents, represents a nickel increase for most students.

ing mechanism, causing it to veer toward the hillside, he reportedly told investigators.

In trying to regain control, Hoover apparently turned the steering wheel to the left and the truck and 21-and-a-half-foot trailer it was towing crashed into the lake. Hoover jumped from the vehicle before it left the road. He was reportedly uninjured except for a slight bump on the head, though he told investigators he thought he had been knocked unconscious for several minutes after he jumped.

Although Rescue Squad members continued the search for the reported drowning victim, a spokesman said he was unsure how long the search would continue if no new evidence was found.

Chiding Floyd school officials for a "lack of good faith" in bringing county schools up to standards demanded by the state, Robert E. Spillman, associate superintendent for local services in the state Department of Education, spelled out state concerns in a strongly-worded letter to Floyd Board Chairman Dr. J.D. Adams, a copy of which The Times has obtained.

A "show cause" order issued July 2 by the state Board of Education "appears to insist upon a demonstration... that you are assuming your statutory responsibilities to assure an efficient system of schools and that, of course, requires you to hold Superintendent Grigsby responsible for his management of the school system," Spillman wrote in the July 8 letter to Adams. The letter lists 18 questions for Floyd administrators to consider

Spillman said last week that he drew up the questions to help school officials here after some had indicated they were unclear about what the state board was expecting of them. Adams promised Spillman an answer at the close of last week's meeting of the Floyd board, but Asst. Supt. Brackett said later that replies to the questions, which were routed to the particular administrators deemed responsible, were still being collated. He noted that Floyd county has until tomorrow (Thursday) to meet the state board's challenge of July 2. Spillman's questions, edited slightly for brevity and clarity, follow

1. Why has the Floyd Board of Education permitted a breakdown in direction and supervision of staff by the superintendent?

2. Why has the board permitted poor management practices to continue and siphon off funds needed for instructional programs and facilities

3. Why has the board permitted the superintendent numerous extensions and delays in complying with an order of the state Fire Marshal? 4. Why are not funds available to implement the Fire Marshal's directives?

5. If funds are not available, what steps are being taken by the board to insure that they will become available? 6. What steps have been taken by the board to assure parents that school

buildings can be safely evacuated in the event of a fire or disaster? 7. Why has it taken repeated meetings with the Fire Marshal's office—over a period of almost 10 years—to implement its order?

8. Why has the board, even after being informed, permitted the school system to use inappropriate bidding procedures? 9. Why has the board, after being advised of the legal requirements, allow-

ed bidding statutes to be circumvented? 10. Why, in order to circumvent bidding statutes, did the board pass an 'emergency' resolution when, in fact, no emergency existed?

11. Why has the board permitted bid specifications to be vague, ambiguous and difficult to interpret? 12. Why, after being advised on numerous occasions, has the board not re-

quired all employees to follow accepted accounting procedures?

13. What plans does the board have to hold violators accountable for shortages in monies? 14. Apart from merely passing resolutions, what action has the board taken

to see that proper accounting procedures are followed? 15. Why has the board operated without any inventory control after this has been repeatedly brought to its attention not only by the state board and state

Department of Education but also by the inspector-general's office of the U.S. Department of Agriculture? 16. How is it that the school system has enough money to buy large inventories of bus parts and janitorial supplies but has no money for desks and

17. Why, contrary to state Board of Education regulations, does the Floyd board continue to employ teachers to teach courses outside their field of study? 18. Why has the board permitted the superintendent to respond to state Board

of Education directives in a vague and evasive manner? "We specifically call to your attention a letter of June 27, 1985 from Mr. Grigsby to Supt. McDonald," Spillman noted, adding, "Responses of this type do nothing more than demonstrate your lack of good faith."

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"That's the U.S. Marine Corps in me." If he is given a chance to administer Floyd schools, what will count is performance, not political loyalty," said Brackett, who added, "Good performance is good politics.

"In fact, I think the school system is moving in that direction already,' Brackett said, citing as an example the greater involvement of principals in selecting a school's faculty

In response to those who have charged that a change of superintendent will not alter the direction of Floyd schools as long as current board members remain in office, Brackett cautioned against hasty judgments. "I think it would be unfair to comment on the board until we see," he said, adding, "I have seen a major change in the board. I see a positive attitude on the part of the board. I see them asking more questions. They are attending seminars. They are becoming more knowledge-

able. Even for erstwhile critics, whom Brackett once endured with an ire that was etched in his face if rarely put into words, Brackett held out on olive branch last week. "We need to capitalize on our critics," he said. "You can profit from your critics. Sometimes people you think are your worst enemies turn out to be your best friends. They want input, they want to be heard. If people want to talk to me, I'll listen.'

#### Release of Little Ordered by Judge

Charles Little, of Topmost, held here since June 1 on a charge of passing a phony check at a Prestonsburg jewelry store, was ordered released from jail Friday for want of an indictment.

Little's attorney, Public Defender Sandra Simmons, successfully petitioned Circuit Judge Hollie Conley for a writ of habeas corpus after District Judge Harold Stumbo turned the petition down.

Simmons cited a rule that no one may be held for more than 60 days without being indicted. Judge Stumbo held that the rule applied only if a grand jury had met during the 60 days. But Judge Conley ordered Little released on unsecured bond pending any action by the Floyd Circuit Court grand jury, which next convenes in September

#### Calls for the Facts Of School Situation

For several months, the citizens of Floyd County have been a captive, relatively uninformed audience to the charges and countercharges emanating from the State Board of Education concerning the Floyd County School Board and its Superintendent. To my knowledge the specific charges have not been made public, but, very generally, they eem to involve mismanagement of school funds, failure to properly preserve and maintain school properties and at least a suggestion of possible violations of law.

The State Board issued a "Show Cause Order" for the local board to explain and justify their acts or omissions, or face the consequences of removal from office as an "educationally deficient" school district under a law enacted by the 1984 General Assembly.

The rhetoric employed by both sides has left the people of this county confused. Putting aside all personal or political allegiances to the members of the local board and its Superintendent, one must finally come to the conclusion (if he hadn't known it for years) that something is drastically wrong with the administration of our local school system. The policy and politics leaders on the board apparently believed that the resignation of the Superintendent would alleviate the pressure from Frankfort, and, without publicly dealing with the charges, accepted his resignation by a four to one vote last Wednesday evening

This event occurred approximately three weeks after the chairman of the Board called a special meeting to consider the removal of the Superintendent, which was abruptly cancelled without any credible explanation. The Superintendent's public resignation was preceded by the Board's private "Executive Session" which lasted for approximately one hour. Insofar as casual observers could determine, the executive session was attended by the five board members, the Superintendent and the Superintendent's personal lawyer. Executive sessions of public bodies are permitted under the law of the Commonwealth, but only for limited subjects. Even if this particular session was technically legal, which is doubtful, it underlines the tendency of this local board to utilize such private proceedings to conduct the schools' public business away from the public's eye.

In spite of the Board's hour-long session with the Superintendent (or perhaps because of the privacy of its nature), questions remained unanswered concerning the future of the school system. In submitting his resignation, the Superintendent alluded to his continued relationship with the Board. Was this discussed in the Executive Session? What is that relationship to be? In what capacity will he serve? At what salary? Who will be the new Superintendent?

The pathetic aspect of this entire scenario is that the State Board of Education is attempting to do what we as citizens, parents and teachers should have been doing years ago-taking a long, hard look at the administration of our school system. The opportunity to do so is available now, provided all aspects of the present situation are made public.

The people of this county are entitled to know the truth about the charges leveled by the State Board of Education. I hope that the local board will see fit, without compulsion from others, to lay bare the facts and circumstances concerning the State Board's investigation, not for the purpose of placing blame, but to correct the mistakes, reassess the true objectives of their public trust and move forward to establish and maintain an efficient school system.

### Floyd County Public Schools UNIFORM CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

(Editor's Note: The Floyd County Board of Education adopted a uniform code of conduct for Floyd school students on June 26, 1985. The new discipline code was prepared by a committee of school administrators, teachers, parents and students, including Ruth Ann Akers and Dolores Smith, parents; Harold Burchell and Joyce Watson, teachers; Steve Dawson and Debbie Hall, students; McDowell High School Principal Gary Frazier; Asst. Superintendent Ronald L. Hager; and Board Member Dr. Mary Hall. The Floyd County Times will publish the entire code in installments as a public service.)

The Floyd County Public Schools have the responsibility to provide public education for children until they graduate or reach the age of twenty-one (21). To discharge this function effectively and equitably, school authorities and parents must ensure an environment in each school which is conducive to the learning process for all students. While there are many factors which affect the learning environment, perhaps the most pernicious is the problem that results from inappropriate conduct and lack of consistent and effective disciplinary response.

This is a commitment to the establishment of consistent application of the code and as a means for modification of behavior to deal with

dropouts and academic achievement.

Federal and state laws confer rights and freedoms to every citizen both in and out of school. At the same time every citizen has the responsibility to respect the identical rights of others. In the school environment these rights and responsibilities must be harmonious with the learning process. School authorities are thus allowed a broader range of powers in maintaining an orderly environment than is allowed enforcement authorities in society generally, provided they adhere to the requirements of due process and other constitutional standards.

Organizations, businesses and industries cannot operate successfully without procedures, goals, expectations and satisfied workers; neither can schools. Rules which establish discipline guidelines for students are necessary and basic to their growth and development. Thus it becomes the responsibility of local school districts to have a discipline code which reflects the community's standards and expectations for student

Schools must prepare students for their responsibilities as adults in a democratic society. To accomplish this goal, there must be respect and mutual trust between parent, teacher and student. The discipline code is the tool. Therefore, the discipline code should be consistent and reasonable and should strive to facilitate the development of students' self-control and self-discipline. In this regard, the student discipline code becomes an integral component of the educational process and a symbol of the commitment of parents, students and administrators to the maintenance of an effective learning environment. II. INTRODUCTION

The responsibility for the operation of the Floyd County School System is vested in the local school board (KRS. 160.290). The Superintendent serves as executive officer who implements the laws, responsibiltiies and School Board Policy. The Building Principal is responsible for the supervision, control, and management of the building, pupils, and visitors at school activities in which pupils participate, whether held on or off the premises in the name of the school.

Students in the Floyd County Public Schools are provided the right to an education in the public schools. The United States Supreme Court has held that students may not be deprived of the opportunity to a public education without good cause in which procedural due process is observed. It is the responsibility of each student to behave in a manner that does not threaten, interfere with, or deprive other students of their right

This code shall be mandatory and enforced in a fair and equitable manner, without regard for race, gender, or disability, in the Floyd County Public Schools, at all school-related events, and in all phases of pupil transportation, to and from school and for school-related trips. In all actions involving a student and school personnel, the Floyd County Board of Education will support the principal, teachers or other school employee who acts within his/her authority in enforcing the Student Conduct Code.

This Code was adopted by the Floyd County Board of Education on

III. DISSEMINATION AND ORIENTATION

This code shall be distributed annually, at the beginning of school, to each student, teacher, administrator and upon request, each parent. During the first week of school, students, teachers, and administrators shall be oriented to the contents of the code either in large or small group sessions. The entire document shall be explained in full detail during these sessions. Parents may attend the sessions or choose to secure a copy of the code. The entire document shall be published in the local newspaper. The principal shall post, in a conspicuous place, a notice informing anyone entering the school where a copy of this code may

Additionally, in order to assure the school that parents have received this book and have read the policies, it is required that the parental assurance form be detached, signed, and returned to the school to be filed with the student's records.

IV. LOCAL SCHOOL RULES

Individual schools of the Floyd County School System shall provide a list of local school rules and detailed in-school discipline procedures. which will be placed in each student handbook. The local rules and procedures will not replace or contradict the provisions of this code

The local school rules shall be developed or amended by the principal. utilizing a participatory process which includes parents, teachers, and students, with review and approval by the Superintendent.

he said Friday. "If they wanted my head, if they wanted me to be sacrificed, I've only got two years to go (to retirement). I can live with it.

Those who "wanted his head" were a majority of Floyd board members, certain unnamed "elected county officials, and state Superintendent McDonald, Grigsby said. Barbara McDaniel, a spokeswoman for Mrs. McDonald, has repeatedly denied that the state superintendent entered into any agreement calling for Grigsby's ouster.

Although his resignation statement spoke of "an understanding" between Grigsby and the board on the role Grigsby would continue to play here for the next two years, that matter appeared to be still in dispute this week.

Grigsby was represented in Wednesday night's executive session by his attorney, former assistant attorneygeneral Robert L. Chenoweth. Brackett and Ronald Hager, the other assistant superintendent, were excluded from the

In response to reports that the board had agreed to keep him on as an assistant superintendent or as an "administrative advisor" and at an increased salary, Grigsby said only that he sought to stay on "in some administrative capacity that I'm qualified for." He said he expected no increase in salary other than a proposed raise for all administrators on which the board is expected to vote next month.

(Grigsby is paid \$44,817 as superintendent, plus \$2400 as board secretary. A proposal under discussion for some time would give administrative personnel in this county a raise ranging from between five and eight percent)

However, Brackett indicated that, if he is named superintendent, Grigsby will have no place on the central administrative team. "If we fire a principal, we don't leave him on the faculty at that school. We give the new principal a free hand," Brackett said. In any event, he expected the board would not name a new assistant superintendent but that he would serve both as superintendent and finance officer, Brackett

Grigsby, who will be 51 this month, began his career in education 28 years ago, serving for the first four years in Perry county and in this county ever since. A former University of Kentucky basketball player, he was well-known as coach at McDowell for 13 years. He served two years as assistant superintendent before being named superintendent nine years ago. Grigsby needs two more years of employment in the schools to be eligible for maximum pension benefits.

as governor was the upgrading of the State Parks. During his administration, six new parks were created, and nine others were so improved as to be like new. Combs added 15,000 acres to the park system, and spent \$20,000,000 developing the parks to be the envy of many other states. Combs was born on August 13, 1911, in

Clay county, at Manchester. He moved to Prestonsburg in 1938, after graduating second in his class from the University of Kentucky Law School. He practiced law here from 1938-'42, before entering the army, where he served on the staff of General Douglas MacArthur. Later promoted to Captain, he was named chief of the Investigation Section of the War Crimes Department.

After being awarded the Bronze Star and Medal of Merit, Combs was discharged in 1948 and returned to Prestonsburg to practice law. In 1950 he was named city attorney, and, later, commonwealth's attorney for the 31st Judicial District. In 1951 Combs was appointed and later elected Judge of the Court of Appeals. In 1959, he was elected the 50th governor of the Commonwealth.

But Combs's life of public service did not end when he left the Governor's mansion. In 1963 he received the Joseph P. Kennedy Award for Oustanding Contribution to the Field of Mental Retardation, and in 1967 was appointed to the U.S. 6th Judicial Circuit Court of Appeals. In 1978, Combs was appointed by President Carter as a member of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament

A number of prominent Kentuckians issued testimonials honoring Combs in recent weeks, among them Governor Martha Layne Collins, who said:

Kentucky has been blessed to have had the leadership and continuing influence of Governor Combs... We are still building on his many accomplishments in education, which included the community college system. Through his service to groups such as the Prichard committee, he remains involved in issues directed toward improving life in Kentucky. I join you in saluting Governor Bert T. Combs."

Gov. Collins also cited Combs achievements in building tourism through a better state parks system and in highway construction.

Senator Wendell Ford said, "of Governor Combs, I would say that he was one who never lost his connection with his beloved mountain people while being a Governor for all of Kentucky. I was fortunate to have had the opportunity to learn from him.

Though Combs is through with politics himself, he doesn't seem to be through with politicking.

'We need another mountain man as governor," said Combs, "for you can do more if you're up there at the top. We need continuity at any form of government, be it mayor or county judge. You can't do it all in four years. We do have important leadership coming up in Eastern Kentucky.'

spoke highly of State Representative Greg Stumbo, saying he was "beginning to be a strong man in Frankfort, and I know he'll use his influence to help Eastern Kentucky and all of Kentucky.

### **Abell Says Justice System** Helps Criminal, Harms Victim

Crime victims have too long been victimized by the justice system itself, while the criminal has been given many legal benefits, according to Richard Abell, deputy assistant attorney general for justice programs with the U.S. Justice Department.

Abell served as keynote speaker for the Kentucky Prosecutors Conference, which ran from August 8 through 10 at Lexington's Hyatt-Regency Hotel. He replaced Lois Haight Herrington, Assistant Attorney General for Justice Programs, who was unable to attend due to illness. The conference was jointly sponsored by the Kentucky Attorney General's Office and the Prosecutors' Advisory Council (PAC)

"We were quite fortunate to have Mr. Abell speak in favor of the rights of crime victims," Atty. Gen. David R. Armstrong said.

Armstrong has indicated that he will work for victims' bill of rights during the 1986 Kentucky General Assembly.

In a recent telephone interview, Abell said, "Our justice system is predicated toward the defendant and insensitive to victims. The defendant often receives free medical care, a roof over his head and free meal, while the victim often pays for his own medical care and must take time off of work, losing income. In some states, rape victims must even pay for their own rape exam." (In Kentucky, rape examinations are free to victims and are paid for by the Attorney General's Office.)

The federal Victims of Crime Act is an important piece of legislation which will provide money directly to Kentucky and other states for victims' programs, with the money in the fund coming from federal criminal fines and penalties, Abell said. The Act allots \$75 million for states' victims' programs. Kentucky's share for 1985 is \$195,000 for victims' compensation and \$683,000 for victims' services. The state's total allotment for 1986 will be nearly \$1.3 million. States' programs which benefit victims of violent crime, such as murder, rape and other crimes against the person, are being earmarked for a major portion of the money, Abell said.

The statistics on violent crime in the United States are frightening, despite a general decline in the percentages of violent crime since 1983, Abell said. There were 35 million victims of crime last year, with 5.9 million people being victimized by violent crime. Statistics show that for every 100 violent crimes, only 48 are reported to police. Of that number, 21 result in an arrest and 11 of those are prosecuted. Only eight cases result in convictions, with only two criminals being sent to prison. And the time served in prison by those convicted is even more discouraging, Abell said. The average prison term for muder is five years, nine months, and for rape, two years, nine months. Of the nation's 460,000 prisoners, 97 percent are violent

A victims' bill of rights is an excellent focal point to bring the plight of crime victims before law enforcement officials, the judiciary, the media and the general public, Abell said.

"Anything of this sort focuses attention on the problem and away from the defendant," he said. "We should be more concerned with the person injured than with the predator.

#### Cave Run Camp Open to Autos

# Training Cost to State **Employers May Be Cut**

A Kentucky employer wants to increase production. An examination of the company's budget shows there isn't enough money to pay for the training costs for new workers. There is help, however, through the Department for Employment Services and its programs to reduce training costs.

How employers can save money on training, as well as on unemployment insurance taxes, will be among topics discussed at 14 seminars across the state in September and October. The department is sponsoring the seminars at the request of the state's employers. 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

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
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
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### Renovating the Front Green

When you mow your lawn, what are you cutting down? Do you have a good stand of grass, or do you have a collection that would choke a weedkiller salesman?

According to Dr. A.J. Powell, extension turf specialist with the University of Kentucky, mid-August through September is the best time of the entire year to renovate a lawn. Fall renovation gives grass seedling far longer to establish an adequate water seeking and absorbing root system than spring seeding. However, be sure plenty of water is available and that you'll be willing and able to apply it.

According to Dr. Powell, turf renovation can be done for reasons other than to remove weeds by planting desirable, more competitive species or by outright killing them. Turf can be renovated to redo areas damaged by pests or heavy traffic, or where thatch buildup is causing problems with water and chemical

Turf is frequently renovated to change grass species, most frequently from water-fussy bluegrass to far more drought-tolerant tall fescues. Or perhaps you tried a warm season grass like Bermuda or zoysia to take advantage of their superior green during summer, but decided that hasn't been worth their instant tan color the moment cold weather

Some areas to be reseeded may need tilling, some not. If areas are to be tilled, it will help to apply a weedkiller like Roundup or Kleenup to kill all existing vegetation (grass and weeds alike). A week or so later, till the area, level out any bumps or depressions, and mix in any organic matter or sand needed to improve soil drainage and aeration.

There can be problems with this conventional reworking method. If your lawn area has trees and shrubs, their allimportant shallow feeder roots can be damaged by the tiller. There may also be dust or mud, soil erosion, water runoff and a big brown area for several

How can you avoid this? In small or sparse areas, mow whatever exists very low and rough the surface up by raking, or scatter the seed and cover with a thin layer of good topsoil.

For large areas, rent a dethatcher that will not only pull up accumulated organic matter but will also leave small slits for seed to fall into. Running the machine over the area several times, including after seeding, will work the area up well yet will leave a cover of green

A dethatched area should be mowed regularly to keep existing vegetation

from shading new grass seedlings. Wait to apply fall nitrogen fertilizer until after the seeds have germinated, and don't apply weed killers until the new grass has been mowed at least twice.

Timely Tip: New pruning saws are available with wood-plane blade teeth instead of conventional pointed teeth. The new teeth pull chips rather than sawdust, and operate on the pull of the saw rather than on the push.

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

# State Health Care Plan **Awaits Federal Approval**

Pending federal approval, the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources has accelerated the schedule for implementation of KenPAC, a health care plan for low-income mothers and children covered by the Medicaid program.

The new timetable includes two phases for the Kentucky Patient Access and Care System (KenPAC), according to Human Resources Secretary Al

"We now have a federal waiver request for KenPAC under review in Washington, D.C. and anticipate approval late this year," Austin said. 'Therefore we will begin recruitment of physicians for KenPAC contracts next month. We then plan to enroll eligible recipients beginning in January, assuming we have the federal go-ahead. The new timetable calls for enrollment of recipients as each family's eligibility review comes due.

An estimated 225,000 recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children and AFDC-related Medicaid recipients will participate in KenPAC. The original plan called for implementing the program in a dozen counties before bringing the program on-line statewide.

Austin said, "Enrollment of recipients at their normal six-month eligibility determination time will eliminate an extra trip for them as well as save some time for our own staff. If we're able to get going in early January, we should have most clients in touch with family doctors by July 1.

The revised KenPAC timetable would allow any eligible participant to choose a KenPAC physician as soon as the program begins. Early enrollment would not change a family's eligibility review

Enrollment remains mandatory for eligible Medicaid clients. Recipients not making a voluntary selection would be assigned to a participating physician. Both the patient and the doctor have total freedom to reject or request a different assignment, whether it be by voluntary or involuntary enrollment.

KenPAC is designed to assure the availability and continuity of health care for participants through assignment to contracting physicians. Eligible Medicaid recipients would have a physician knowledgeable about their health and medical histories. The physician would, because of familiarity with the individual, be better able to prescribe preventive medical treatment.

In addition to healthier recipients, the KenPAC plan would reduce Medicaid expenditures through early detection of potentially serious illness requiring costly treatment. The KenPAC physician also will help to eliminate unnecessary health care services through proper management of the client's medical

KenPAC is projected to have potential savings to the state Medicaid program of a minimum of \$2.5 million a year once fully implemented.

Each KenPAC physician would be required to approve treatment of a Kennon-emergency cases or after-the-fact in







With the opening of squirrel season (Saturday, August 17) just a few weeks off, sportsmen are reminded that permission to hunt or fish on privately owned land is a privilege extended by the landowner.

In Kentucky, the landowner's right to say who may hunt or fish on his land, and who may not, is guaranteed by law. The landowner-sportsman relationship is one of trust and mutual responsibility whose roots are common sense and good manners.

Respect for landowners' rights and property is at the very foundation of good landowner-sportsman relations. From the sportsman's point of view, if you value the opportunity to fish or hunt on someone else's land, it's a good idea to maintain a good rapport with the landowner-to take an active interest in his land and its resources. This may mean sharing the bag or creel with the landowner, promptly reporting sagging or downed fences, or livestock in

For those who disregard the law and are convicted of trespassing in violation of KRS 150.993, the penalty for entering land without the oral or written consent of the owner is a fine of not less than \$15 nor more than \$100. But a complete understanding of this issue isn't possible without considering the responsibilities and rights of both parties.

The sportsman has an obligation to not damage the landowner's propertyhouses, fencing, outbuildings, trees or livestock. He is liable for any damage he may cause. For example, if a cow is accidentally shot, the sportsman is liable for the reasonable cost of replacement.

Conversely, the landowner is liable if he willfully or maliciously fails to guard or warn the sportsmen against a dangerous condition or activity such as a badtempered bull or an open well which it would be very easy to walk into by accident. But the landowner has no liability towards the trespasser. Persons who enter upon his land without permission cannot sue for compensation should they become injured because of a dangerous condition or activity on the property.

A notable exception is in the case of an "attractive nuisance," a cave, old house or some other structure or natural formation, which is inviting to trespassers. If the landowner knows trespassers are coming on his land to investigate this "attractive nuisance," the landowner can be held liable if he takes no steps to warn trespassers, or protect them from injury. In this situation, the landowner does have a responsibility to the trespasser.

When fishermen and hunters go afield they are said to accept the "doctrine of risk;" that is, they acknowledge the fact that dangers exist in their sport. These are termed "expected dangers." For example, if a rabbit hunter blows off his foot with his shotgun because he stumbled in a briar patch, it's an accident. If the firearm discharged because the safety wasn't on, it could be termed negligence on the part of the hunter, but in no way is the landowner liable.

If the sportsman pays money for the privilege to hunt, as in leasing land for waterfowl or deer hunting, then the landowner can be held liable for injuries from a dangerous condition or activity on the property. In this case, the paying sportsman is considered a licensee with rights protected by law. The licensee can assume that he's going to be reasonably safe, that failure to warn of a dangerous condition or activity is a form of negligence, and that he (the licensee) has the right to use the land based on the

The reverse is true in non-paying situations where the landowner simply gives verbal permission to the sportsman. By virtue of KRS 411.190, which is based on common law, the landowner who permits his property to be used for recreational purposes such as hunting, fishing, camping, picnicking, nature study, swimming, etc., is not required to keep his premises safe for use by others, or to give any warning if a

dangerous situation or condition exists. Kentucky is one of the few states in the U.S. that has a statutory limit to the liability of the landowner. The purpose of the statute was to encourage landowners to make their land available to sportsmen by limiting their liability. For general recreational purposes, verbal permission is sufficient, although trappers and persons who are going to hunt or shoot with a centerfire rifle of .240 caliber or greater, must obtain written

BREEDING POPULATION LOWEST IN 31 YEARS

The most recent surveys indicate that the total breeding population of ducks is now the lowest in 31 years, with declines since last year in all but one of the 10 duck species most sought by water-

Season time frames and bag limits issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service are expected to reflect this drop in duck numbers so hunters should be prepared for a shorter season and increased point values for most species of

Overall, breeding populations of ducks this year throughout Canada and the U.S. declined eight percent from the estimated total of 38 million birds in 1984. Several years of drought and the accelerated loss of habitat caused by dried up wetlands being coverted to agricultural land are blamed for the decline in ducks.

Commenting on these proposed changes for the upcoming 1985-86 duck season, Bill Graves, director of wildlife for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, explained that it's "simply time to be more conservative. Our duck populations are in a serious state of decline.'

Graves said that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is seeking to reduce the overall harvest by 25 percent and send more ducks back to the breeding grounds so that there will be better recruitment.

The more restrictive hunting season time frame (the time period in which states are allowed to set their hunting dates) and reduced bag limit proposed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will not just be in effect for Kentucky and other Mississippi flyway states, but throughout all four of America's migratory waterfowl flyways. That's just how severe biologists perceive the decline in breeding populations of ducks in North America. Kentucky's duck season will be set by the Fish and Wildlife Commission, at its August 23rd meeting in Frankfort.

In a report issued by the Office of Migratory Bird Management, mallard breeding populations were shown to have reached an all-time low of 5.48 million birds, a 35 percent decline over the 30-year average. And alarmingly, for the first time ever the continental northern pintail population fell below three million, a 50 percent decline! Other species of ducks that were shown to have declined drastically since 1955 are the American wigeon, 21 percent, Blue-winged teal, 24 percent, and Canvasback, 28 percent.

The North American waterfowl survey is the most extensive wildlife census in the world. Each May, biologists fly 38,000 miles of transects at low levels in small aircraft over major portions of the breeding grounds in Canada and the U.S. while crews on the ground seek out birds that cannot be seen from the air. The May surveys detail the condition of nesting areas as well as the numbers of ducks present.

In July, additional flights are made over the same areas to determine the number of duck broods produced. This information is used to forecast the fall population of ducks and to establish annual hunting regulations.

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
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
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

Within 15 working days of receipt of the complaint, Mrs. Dingus will respond in writing (or a method understood by the complainant) to the complainant and/or his or her designee. The response will offer a resolution or explain the position of the Floyd County Fiscal Court with respect to the complaint.

If the response by Mrs. Dingus does not satisfactorily resolve the issue, the complainant and/or his or her designee may request a hearing to be held within 15 working days of receipt of the response before the County Handicapped Coordinating Committee, Court-Prestonsburg, house Annex, 606-886-9193, Monday thru Fridays, 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m for resolution. Within 30 calendar days of the hearing, the complainant and/or his or her designee will receive the final resolution in writing (or a method understood by the complainant) as proposed by the County Handicapped Coordinating Commit-

All complaints received by Mrs. Dingus and responses from the CHCC will be kept by Floyd County Fiscal Court for a period of three years. These documents may be requested by the Office of Revenue Sharing should an investigation into alleged discrimination on the basis of handicapped status be

#### **Facing Competition** Parks Get Spruceup

Kentucky state parks are getting a fresh coat of paint this year to get ready for the 1986 summer season. Facilities at more than half of Kentucky's parks and shrines are being repainted as part of a major rejuvenation program designed to repair and maintain buildings and attractions.

"We're trying to create a good first impression for our visitors and reinforce our image as the finest parks system in the nation," said Bob Bender, the Parks Department's director of administrative

"The Department of Parks is trying to take care of what we already have. Bender said. "It's much less expensive to maintain rather than to replace.'

Another challenge the Kentucky parks system faces is stiffer competition from parks in surrounding states, the same states from which Kentucky draws its largest number of visitors.

#### **Nursing Home Care Faces Threat After Huge Medicaid Cuts**

More than 1,500 families, legislators, doctors, senior citizens advocates and long-term care professionals were in agreement on August 8 that quality nursing home patient care is severely threatened by the \$17.9 million Medicaid cuts in long term care.

The reduction in Medicaid reimbursement was announced on July 30 by Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary Elbert Austin, Jr.

The group was participating in a Frankfort public forum entitled 'Medicaid's Quality Care Crisis,' sponsored by the Kentucky Association of Health Care Facilities, which represents 223 licensed skilled, intermediate and personal care nursing homes in Kentuc-

A six-person panel, consisting of nursing home industry representatives, a physician, hospital discharge planner and an accountant, addressed the existing cuts and the drastic impact they will have on quality patient care.

Dr. Paul Willging, deputy executive vice-president of the American Health Care Association, referred to the cuts as ridiculous and detrimental to patient care in Kentucky. He viewed the cuts from the Cabinet as "setting a serious precedent for bureaucrats in other




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Job Corps Credited for Camp Aid

# Scientists Seek Secrets of the Sun

Grab your sunglasses and slather on the sunscreen. Head outside for the nearest lawn or beach chair and settle back to catch some rays while you read this story. There may be nothing new under the sun, but 93 million miles away on and in the sun there is hot news

Though the sun appears to earthlings as a benign, featureless source of warmth, light and a great tan, its looks are deceiving. True solar devotees describe the sun as a strange and mysterious orb, a seething cauldron of superheated gases contorted by intense magnetic fields, huge shock waves, explosive flares, violent eruptions and supersonic winds blowing all the way to Earth and beyond.

The "sun worshippers" who describe our star, the sun, this way have not come by their information on the beaches of St. Tropez. Rather, they are astronomers and physicists who have pieced together the current understanding of this life-giving celestial body from years of observations and theoretical calculations.

"Solar physics is at the real heart and soul of astronomy," declares Dr. Eugene N. Parker, a University of Chicago physicist who coined the phrase 'solar wind" in the mid-1950s and predicted its existence. "Pulsars, black holes and other X-ray (high-energy) objects are fashionable topics today, but the sun is the only emitter of X-rays where you can see what is going on. When we can explain what is happening on the sun, we will be able to explain what is happening on other stars. But right now, if you look closely at the sun, everything is mysterious and contradicts almost everything we thought we

There are, of course, some basic accepted facts about the sun. Located near the outer edge of a spiral galaxy, the sun is "very much a run-of-the mill star," says Dr. Robert W. Noyes, an astronomer at the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics in Cambridge, Mass., and author of The Sun, Our Star. It is 'average" in size (860,000 miles in diameter, or more than 100 times that of the Earth's), age (5 billion years old) and brightness (100 times dimmer than some of the Big Dipper's stars).

Like all stars, the sun generates its energy deep in a hot, dense, rotating core where the temperature is an incredible 15 million degrees Celsius. "Every second," Noyes says, "the sun processes about 700 million tons of hydrogen, converting it into helium. About 5 million tons are transformed into pure energy, but only a tiny amount of this energy is actually radiated outward from the core.

About 70 percent of the way to the surface, the process of "convection" takes over from radiation, and energy is carried the rest of the way to the surface in circulating eddies of hot gases. From there, energy passes rapidly from the surface up through the sun's lower atmosphere, the chromospehere, and its outer atmosphere, the corona. A fraction—one part in two billion—of the energy leaving the surface of the sun is intercepted by Earth, traveling this final interplanetary distance in 81/3 minutes.

In addition to visible light, the sun's energy is in the form of radiowaves and ultraviolet, infrared, gamma ray and Xray radiation. Their findings fill volumes

But there are plenty of unanswered questions. Consider, for example, the sun's most impressive and influential feature: its magnetic field.

Discovered in 1908, the field originates inside the sun, the result of rotational and convective motions. Virtually everything that happes on the sun is related to its magnetic field, which also interacts with the Earth's much weaker magnetic field.

And yet, Noyes says, "scientists still

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how the sun's magnetic field works." For starters there are sunspots, dark areas of magnetic activity on the solar surface, which have been observed to come and go since ancient times. The number of sunspots reaches a peak in a cycle that repeats itself approximately every 11 years.

Scientists do not understand the mechanisms of this cycle, but the mystery may soon be solved. It turns out that some other stars have magnetic "starspot" cycles. Although they are too far from Earth for their "spots" to be photographed, a star's rotation and magnetic activity can be measured indirectly by analyzing its light. Starspot cycles of 100 stars are now being studied on the 60-inch telescope at California's Mount Wilson Observatory by astronomers from the Center for Astrophysics and the Carnegie Institution. "Since many of the stars we're studying are younger than the sun," CFA astronomer Dr. Sallie L. Baliunas says, "we hope to learn more about how sunspots and their magnetic activity behaved when the sun was younger.'

Even more puzzling is the case of the corona, a hot, thin, gas where the sun's magnetic field manifests itself in strange and spectacular structures and events.

There, arches of magnetic fields thread through the superheated atmosphere like loops in a hooked rug. At some locations in this loopy lattice, there are large areas where the magnetic field loops are broken, and the field opens out into space. From these magneticaly open areas, known as coronal holes, electrically charged atomic particlesthe solar wind—rush out at speeds of 200 to 600 miles per second, bathing the Earth and interplanetary space with the very stuff of stars.

Solar prominences-clouds of relatively cool material—rise majestically thousands of miles above the sun's surface, inexplicably suspended high in the hot corona by magnetic fields. Unpredictably, the magnetic fields can become unstable, and a violent eruption ensues, sometimes in tandem with another violent event, a solar flare. Prominence and flare eruptions launch huge shock waves and enormous amounts of coronal material blasting through space—as often as once or twice a day.

Much of what scientists know about the corona comes from some 200,000 solar images taken by the orbiting Skylab space station in 1973. Skylab also partially answered a long-standing question about the corona-how it can be heated to 2 million degrees, when the surface of the sun below the corona is a mere 6,000 degrees Celsius.

"We now know that the corona's temperature is somehow caused by the conversion of magnetic energy into heat energy," CFA astronomer Dr. George L. Withbroe says, "but we don't exactly know how this is done. Nor do we understand, for example, why solar wind velocities are so great or how solar flares are generated.'

To help seek answers to some of these questions, the space shuttle will launch a small satellite in October 1986 carrying a coronal spectrometer designed by CFA astrophysicist John Kohl in collaboration with Withbroe and other scientists. This device, an instrument

of the normally invisible corona by creating artificial solar eclipses, will help idenfity the physical processes involved in the generation and acceleration of the solar wind.

Future studies may soon shed light on these and other solar enigmas, including what lies at the very core of the sun. Scientists have discovered that the sun is vibrating, and they can detect this 'global oscillation" using the new techniques of "helioseismology," which are similar to those used in terrestrial seismology

The global oscillation is actually made up of millions of tiny oscillations, each with its own characteristic frequency and geometry and reflecting conditions deep inside the sun's interior. To detect these minute motions, the National Solar Observatory in Tucson, Ariz., is currently setting up a worldwide Global Oscillations Network Group to provide 24-houra-day solar monitoring with optical telescopes.

"GONG," NSO Director Robert Howard says, "will provide the first detailed information on the structure and dynamics of the sun's interior," but even current studies are beginning to reveal patterns of rotation and convection in the interior. "Helioseismology," Noyes says, "may provide the key to the way these motions generate the magnetic fields which produce sunspots, the hot corona, flares and the solar wind."

Astronomers also are eagerly anticipating the large, orbiting Solar Optical Telescope, planned for launch in the 1990s. "Some of the most important magnetic structures on the sun are just too small to see from Earth "Parker of the University of Chicago says. "The Solar Optical Telescope will be able to see the motions of the structures that we think are involved in the conversion of magnetic energy into heat energy and resolve those structures right down to the footprints of the magnetic loops."

Adds Parker: "The Solar Optical Telescope will not only answer the No. 64 question: Why is the corona so hot? It will help solve many mysteries in the universe." But not all, for contrary to popular belief there will always be something new under the sun.

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

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
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

Approximately 2,200 invitations to attend the conference were issued in June to all local government leaders throughout the state.

Among the scheduled conference contributors this year is renowned network journalist and news commentator, Howard K. Smith. Mr. Smith will kick off the conference as the keynote speaker. Also scheduled to appear as workshop and session moderators are members of the Governor's Cabinet, state legislators and state and federal government leaders in the area of local government operations.

Special workshops and sessions will touch on such topics as alternative sources of revenue and funding in the wake of potential losses of general revenue sharing, the legislative process, solid and hazardous waste management, improving the adult and children's literacy rate and economic development strategies for local governments. During the course of the conference, several legislative and local government leadership organizations will meet to discuss proposals to be submitted to the General Assembly which relate direcly to local government issues. These proposals have been under consideration for several months and the conference will provide on open forum for discussion of these proposals among all those who stand to benefit

Topics for this year's conference sessions and workshops were selected on the basis of assessed statewide need and indications of the most prevalent problems and innovative solutions to these problems relatie to the state's local government units.

'Too often, the higher levels of government-the state and federal branches-garner most of the attention of the press and the general public,' Governor Collins added. "The local government units are the ones with which the general public has the most direct contact; therefore, we cannot stress enough the importance of providing local governments with the benefits of the higher levels of the administrative branches of government, the most important being technical assistance and alternative sources of program funding. We hope to address all these and many other topics during the 1985 Local Issues Conference," Gover-



The Sheriff's county revenue bond is set at \$50,000 which is not adequate to cover the taxes collected, and as a result, the county is not protected from possible loss. We recommend that the amount of the bond be raised to \$735,000 which would approximately equal the largest amount of taxes collected in a one-month period.

The county has shown marked improvement over prior years in both its accounting procedures and compliance
