Incident Stresses Wild Dog Problem

A call from a concerned Daniels Creek resident, Tuesday morning, may have saved the life of a young whitetail

deer. At the very least it has called attention to a major problem facing wildlife in this area. When dogs chased a half-starved yearling doe through her yard at about 9 a.m., drove it into the shallow creek nearby and attacked it. Mrs. Dallas Justice phoned the Eastern Kentucky Wildlife Federation number at Martin while her husband kept the dogs, described as "a pack of mutts," away from the injured deer.

Mrs. Curtis Hughes, wife of the federation president, referred the call to federation committeeman Bob Bailey since her husband was not at home, and Bailey drove immediately to Ivel to recover the animal while it still might be saved. The deer, suffering numerous wounds, was loaded into Bailey's pickup and later into the four-wheel-drive vehicle of state Conservation Officer Jimmy Goble, who arrived on the scene, and was rushed to the office of veterinarian Dr.

Rudolph Ousley on the Middle Creek Road near here for treatment Federation President Hughes said the incident stressed the problem of feral and half-wild dogs which roam Floyd county hills in large numbers, hunting in packs and devastating wildlife, particularly deer. "The problem is of epidemic proportions," said Hughes who commented that Tuesday's incident is only one of many such incidents. "There were 27 reported deer kills by dogs in the Seventh Conservation District," he pointed out, "and there were certainly others not documented.

The recent reopening of the animal shelter on the old Middle Creek Road by the federation, which is made up of area sportsmen and conservationists, is designed in large part to help alleviate the problem of the unwanted puppy that is cast out to live off the land and hunt down wild game, Hughes said.

Hughes encouraged anyone who might be witness to incidents similar to that on Daniels Creek to call the federation at-

Highways Head Sees New Work At Record Pace

"Build us a road and we will prosper. Build us a four-lane and you will be the one to set in motion economic activity unprecedented in the Big Sandy area.

That was the point state Sen. David Lemaster wanted to make last Thursday to Transportation Secretary Dr. Floyd G. Poore. It was a point made repeatedly during a dinner sponsored by area Chambers of Commerce at May Lodge at which Poore was guest speaker.

Nor did the Secretary seem slow to get the message. While road maintenance funds are scarce—the money currently set aside would see Kentucky roads resurfaced only once every 78 yearsnew highways will be built at an unprecedented rate over the next five years, Poore said.

And much of the roadbuilding, he pointed out, will be in eastern Kentucky Look for a \$78 million upgrading of KY 3 between Auxier and Inez, engineering studies on a four-lane corridor between Prestonsburg and Paintsville, and construction of a spur to link Right and Left Beaver creeks via Sizemore, he said.

The latter project appeared in doubt after construction estimates came in at \$10 million or more when only \$4.5 million had been earmarked for the spur in bond money. But Poore noted that the project is in the Transportation Cabinet's six-year plan and said he was committed to seeing it implemented.

Permits Banned On Disputed Land

In cases where landowners and coal perators are in dispute over broadform eeds, the state must stop issuing stripmine permits, a federal judge ruled last

The ruling came in response to a complaint by five eastern Kentucky residents, including Everett Akers, of Finance Hollow, near Martin. The surface owners argued that federal law requires the states to hold up permits until courts resolve property disputes betveen landowners and mining firms.

The issue arose in the wake of a revised state law which took effect last July 13. The law bars stripmining under broadform deeds unless landowners give their consent-on the argument that those who sold their coal under the turn of the century deeds did not foresee its being extracted by modern methods like stripmining, auger mining or mountaintop removal.

The state Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet held hat it was not required, before it issued permit, to determine whether the applicant was in conformity with state law. But U.S. District Judge William O. Bertelsman said Congress intended that the state regulatory agency "ascertain that a prima facie showing of the right to surface mine under state law has been properly documented by the applicant." Bertelsman issued a preliminary in-

154 Beat Deadline Here For Place on May Ballot

Last Wednesday's filing deadline found no lack of candidates for the 25 offices for which elections will be held this year. Some 154 candidates put down \$20 each at the county court clerk's office to enter their names for offices ranging from mayor to magistrate, while two filed in Frankfort as candidates for district judge.

In countywide races, incumbent John M. Stumbo, of Harold, will meet Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen, of Prestonsburg, in the May 28 primary election of a Democratic nominee for

judge-executive. Prestonsburg physician Dr. Larry Leslie has filed as a Republican, although his candidacy faces a possible legal challenge.

Challenging Carla Boyd, of Eastern, in the Democratic race for county court clerk, are Hershel Hamilton, of Beaver, Sally Stephens Osborne, of Prestonsburg, and Ray Turner, of Drift. Ray Dempsey, of Weeksbury, will be the Republican nominee.

Three attorneys, all Democrats, will vie for the chance to represent the county in place of County Attorney Arnold Turner, Jr., who is not seeking reelection. They are Danny P. Caudill, of Martin, David A. Barber, of Prestonsburg, and Cassie J. Allen, of East Point.

Sheriff Henry C. Hale, of Blue River, will face five opponents in the Democratic primary-Harold Joseph, Jr., of Prestonsburg, Roger Webb, of West Prestonsburg, Paul H. Thompson, of Prestonsburg, Billy Lee Craft, of Auxier, and Linzie Hale, of Prestonsburg. This year is the first time in the state history that an incumbent sheriff has been eligible to run for a successive

Jailer Lawrence Hale will have opposition from Democrats Sid Triplett, of Bevinsville, Avery "Jackie" Hamilton, of Melvin, and Ernest Burchett, of Emma. The Democratic nominee will face Republican Astor Hunter, Jr., of Emma,

in November. Coroner Roger Nelson, of Dwale, is being challenged by Jimmy G. Layne, of Prestonsburg, in the primary. Property Valuation Administrator Lovel Hall, Democrat, is unopposed. Three Prestonsburg men-Paul D. Greene, Damon Newsome and James Lafferty-have filed for county surveyor, a position which has been vacant since 1983 and which carried no real responsibilities for several years before that.

Filing in Frankfort for judge in the 31st district were incumbent Harold J. Stumbo and former Public Defender Ned B. Pillersdorf, both of Prestonsburg. Because only two candidates filed in the non-partisan race, they will not appear on the ballot until November.

In a Feb. 19 letter to County Clerk Carla Boyd, Asst. Deputy Attorney-General Walter C. Herdman said Larry Leslie, candidate for judge-executive, is disqualified from either voting or being a candidate in the May primary since he switched party affiliation from Democrat to Republican since last November's general election. No one has yet challenged Leslie's candidacy.

A carnival worker convicted of selling marijuana last October on the grounds of Prestonsburg Elementary School was fined \$500 on each of two counts in Floyd District Court yesterday (Tuesday).

The case, which saw two Ohio men harged after Prestonsburg police officers raided a van on the school grounds during last year's Jenny Wiley Festival, ended in a complicated deal worked out by their attorney and agreed to by judge and prosecutor Tery R. Warner, 28, of Reedsville,

Ohio, pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor counts of trafficking in marijuana. Warner was found in a van parked near the Snyder Amusements carhival last Oct. 11. Police said he was splitting a quantity of marijuana and bagging it. Eight bags, containing about seven ounces of the drug in all, were confiscated. Sale of eight ounces constitutes

a felony

Two felony counts against Benny L. Branham, 33, of Pomeroy, O., were dismissed. The owner of the van, he was charged with carrying a concealed deadly weapon and possessing a defaced firearm after police discovered in the van a 9 mm. pistol from which the serial number had been erased by filing.

Under the deal contrived by defense attorney Gary Johnson, the two men forfeited the bonds they posted on their arrest. \$1000 of Warner's \$1500 bond was designated as "proceeds of criminal activity" and was ordered confiscated under a new state law and turned over to the city police department. The rest of the bond went to pay one of his fines. Branham also signed over \$500 of his \$600 bond to pay Warner's other fine.

The plea bargain was approved by Asst. County Attorney Eric Hall and Det. Sgt. Mike Ormerod, of the city police.

For four weeks the jury has heard evidence in complaints brought by 1100 families against the manufacturer of Bendectin, Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and consolidated in a single trial. But Chief Judge Carl Rubin has insisted from the start that children with visible birth defects be barred from the courthouse

In a lunch-hour meeting with the group, the judge explained that the only issue before the court at this time is the technical question of whether the anti-nausea drug in fact caused birth defects. If the jury deliberating that issue was swayed by sympathy for their children, a decision favorable to them could easily be overturned on appeal, Rubin told the group.

If the jury decides against the suburban Cincinnati drug maker, a second trial will determine Merrell Dow's liability for the drug's harmful effects. Only if the second trial also goes against Merrell Dow will families be able to get into court individually and seek damages and only then will the nature of their children's birth defects become germane, the judge explained.

"I don't want to try this case a second time," Rubin said, referring to his fear that the U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals could overturn a verdict for the families if deformed youngsters attend-

Warming Weather Brings Out **Pests of Different Sorts**

The recently warming weather has stirred insect and insect-related pests into activity throughout Kentucky. The insects seem to be distributed generally throughout the state. The insect-related pests concentrate around the state

Dr. Chris Christensen, Extension entomologist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said many types of insects will be stirred from their dormancy by the warmer temperatures. Termites and winged ants will be seen swarming.

The insect-related pests are the unscrupulous, often unlicensed, salespeople who have begun making their rounds in the state selling pest control services of disputable need and of questionable value.

Christensen said it is easy to tell the difference between termites and flying

'Lots of people get mighty concerned when they see anything other than a housefly buzzing around in their house, especially when they see dozens or even hundreds of them. They immediately think. Oh no. termites! But termites don't look like ants. Here's how to tell. A termite has two sets of wings, both the same length. Flying ants have two sets of wings, but the rear wings are shorter. Flying ants have eyes and termites don't. Flying ants have narrow waists and termites have fat waists.

'Don't let anybody sell you an expensive termite treatment just to get rid of a bunch of flying ants. The ants aren't hurting anything and they'll leave in a

few days, anyway," Christensen said. Donnie Tipton, of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture Division of Pesticides, said the borders of Kentucky are a favorite area for individuals peddling questionable pest control services.

We get calls from all over the state, but the edges of the state seem to be especially popular among the illegal pest control people. They come into the state, make a little money and retreat back across the state line before we can catch them, Tipton said.

In Kentucky any individual who uses pesticides for hire, regardless of the type of pesticide, is licensed by the state. An individual who represents himself or herself as being certified in Kentucky will have an identification card to prove it.

'The card will say, "Kentucky Department of Agriculture, Division of Pesticides Identification Card," and will have the name of the pesticide applicator and the company he or she works for. It will be signed by Mike Stivers and will have an expiration date of June 30, 1985," Tipton said.

Even if an individual is properly licensed, that doesn't mean you necessarily need the service that is suggested. Christensen said homeowners should ask a few questions before agreeing to any pest control services.

'Ask them what chemical they're using and at what strength. There aren't any secrets in this business, and if the pesticide applicator can't or won't tell you what chemical he's using I'd watch out," Christensen said.

Kathy Dorman, assistant attorney general for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, said there are a few general guidelines that can help prevent being ripped off by high-pressure door-to-door salesman

"First of all, remember that any kind of sale for more than \$25 soliticted at your home can be cancelled within 72 hours," Dorman said. That means that even if a contract is signed, it is not valid until 72 hours have elapsed.

Dorman, Tipton and Christensen all suggest not agreeing to anything the first time a sales person calls. Get quotes, estimates and references, and get a look at a state pesticide applicator's license. If you are suspicious try to get a description of the vehicle the person is driving and a license number. Call the Department of Agriculture to report any suspicious pest control sales

"If somebody insists that you need service immediately, or says they can't come back tomorrow or the next day because they're too busy. I'd be suspicious. Make them give you a written estimate. The estimate should include a sketch of the house showing the areas where termite damage exists, how extensive the damage is, and how much it's going to cost to take care of the problem," Christensen said. Then go get a few more estimates. Many companies offer free estimates.

Dorman suggested checking with the Better Business Bureau about a particular company's reputation. She also said it's a good idea to ask for references and actually call a few of the company's previous customers to ask how they liked the service.

There's a lot of good people out there providing pest control service. Christensen said, "You just have to be a little careful to be sure you get one of them. and not one of the unscrupulous ones

Prestonsburg City Councilman Bobby L. Watson, who submitted a letter of resignation to Prestonsburg City Manager David Evans following the February 18 meeting of the city council, announced this week that he had decided to withdraw his resignation.

"I will serve the remainder of my term as councilman and will seek the office of Mayor of Prestonsburg on a write-in ballot." Watson said.

His decision to run for mayor on an Independent ticket brings to four the number of candidates seeking the ofice in Prestonsburg.



New Fire Season In Roaring Start

Whipped by wind that came in powerful, fitful gusts, fires swept 954 acres of woodland in the area Monday while a total of 202 firefighters struggled to contain the blazes under the most discouraging conditions.

And Floyd county suffered most among the six counties in the Eastern forestry district, said Joe Ferguson, Floyd county ranger with the Prestonsburg-based Kentucky Forestry Division's district office. Other counties in the district are Pike, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin and Lawrence.

Foresters fought 17 fires in this county. "There were many fires we could not get to, Ferguson said. Rain that fell during the night at least temporarily eased the situation, but Ferguson said smouldering trees that may fall later as the leaves dry out may mean more fires. He added that Forestry personnel would fly over the area Tuesday in an effort to

spot possible sources of new outbreaks. Foresters estimate that half of Monday's blazes were deliberately set, the remainder resulting from ill-advised attempts to burn off gardens or other farming areas during a day of high winds.

ed the trial "This is the best shot you're ever going to have at a Bendectin case."

Mrs. Risner said last week she found the argument persuasive. "I really didn't understand it at first but after the judge came down I understood it better," she said. "We don't want to have to go through this again, either.'

For her son, a sixth-grader at Clark Elementary School, last week's protest brought fleeting celebrity status, as he was interviewed by two Cincinnati television channels. But this week it was back to the books and to his job as manager of the school's basketball

Despite three operations, James walks with a pronounced limp as the result of malformed hip sockets. He was also born with malformities in his elbow and wrist joints. And, like many children whose mothers took Bendectin in the early weeks of pregnancy, he is smaller than normal for his age.

Mrs. Risner, who is married to Emzy Risner, a foreman with the Branham and Baker Coal Co., said she took Bendectin when she was pregnant with James in 1972. Five years later, she read a news report of the lawsuit being mounted by families under the aegis of the Association of Birth Defect Children and contacted the group's leader, Mrs. Betty Mekdeci, of Orlando, Florida.

Attorneys studied their case and agreed to include them among plaintiffs in the class action suit, Mrs. Risner said. She said she hoped publicity about the trial will alert other families that they. too, might have grounds for a claim for damages against Merrell Dow

At the start of the fifth week of testimony Monday, Merrell Dow attorneys called as a defense witness Dr. Bryan D. Hall, an associate professor of pediatrics and chief of the division of genetics at the UK College of Medicine. who said he believes Bendectin does not cause birth defects.

The drug was prescribed for 33 million women in the U.S. and overseas between 1956 and June, 1983, when Merrell Dow voluntarily took it off the market.














Population Boom Has Ended for Kentucky But Floyd Shows Gain

The first population figures collected since the 1980 census show that Kentucky's population, which was in an upward surge five years ago, has not only skidded to a halt but has actually lost

Floyd and most counties of the socalled Mountain region showed gains. however, but not at the fast pace reflected in the 1980 head count. Estimates for a period of two years (April 1, 1980 to July 1, 1982) show that Floyd county had a population gain of 2.4%, up from a population of 48,764 in 1980 to 49,900 in '82.

Martin county had the heaviest percentage gain, 3.6, in the area. Magoffin's gain, percentagewise, was the same as Floyd's, and others were lower-Pike 1.2, Knott 1.5, Johnson 1.6. Lawrence, Perry, Letcher and Leslie also showed gains.

Area counties recording losses include Boyd, Rowan, Owsley, Menifee, Lee, Elliott and Breathitt.

Fulton and Todd counties in western Kentucky suffered the heaviest losses, each dropping by 4%-plus. Bourbon county in the Blue Grass area was a loser. Fayette county showed a gain but Jefferson county lost.

Dr. Thomas Ilvento, a sociologist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said that in the years since the last census 28,000 more people have left Kentucky than have moved into the state. The rate of exodus from the cities has been four times greater than the migration from Kentucky's rural areas.

The difference between the birth rate and the death rate has more than made up for the number of people who left, which means the state has more people than it did two years ago, but the new citizens are babies. Those who left were the ones Kentucky can least afford to lose-economically productive adults. Ilvento said.

"During the 70s the state posted net migration gains of around 6 percent following decades of net migration losses when more people left the state than moved to it. The first part of the 80s suggests a return to the substantially slower rates of population growth of earlier decades," Ilvento said.

The rapid growth of the 70s caught many state and local officials off guard. Following years of population loss, there was a sudden, often overwhelming, increase in demand for local services such as schools, water systems, roads, and police and fire protection.

Ilvento said plans that have been developed to provide services based on the needs projected by the growth patterns of the 70s may not be appropriate

"These figures are compiled on a statewide basis, and suggest that trends noted in the 70s are no longer appropriate for planning. Some counties in the state are not experiencing the same trends, and local planning should be based on local figures," Ilvento said.

Just looking at the numbers doesn't tell the whole story. When the numbers are connected to the types of individuals they represent, the picture becomes more serious. The state's tax base is disappearing faster than the need for



While there have been some encouraging signs recently-marijuana use is down slightly-drug and alcohol abuse among our young people is still of epidemic proportions.

The average age of initial drug and alcohol experimentation in the United States is twelve-and-a-half. Formerly, sneaking a cigarette or a swig of beer might have been a way of testing the limits in early teenage years, but today's teens use a wide variety of drugs, including marijuana and cocaine.

On the one hand, young people hear pro-drug messages in popular songs and see advertisements that associate good looks and success with tobacco and alcohol.

On the other hand, parents, teachers and health authorities tell them about the dangers of these chemicals. But because many of them are members of two-worker or single-parent families, they alltoo-often must make important decisions entirely on their own.

Many aren't prepared to make them. They respond by running away, dropping out, attempting suicide, and getting involved with

Help is on the way, though, as a result of a cooperative program of Lions Clubs International and the Quest National Center. Designed for 10-14 year-olds from grades 6-8, and called "Skills for Adolescence," it's a comprehensive curriculum meant to give young people the confidence and skills they must have to resist the lure of drugs and

Developed by a team of 57 nationally known educators, writers and experts on adolescence that included Bill Cosby, among other notables, the program offers all the materials needed for successful involvement of teachers, parents and



These include a 500-page teacher's manual, a book of stories and essays for students, a student workbook-journal, and a newsletter and other materials for parents.

Launched in selected schools in five states in January, 1984 with the help of the W. Clement and Jessie V. Stone Foundation, "Skills for Adolescence" is now being made available in the United States and Canada through local Lions Clubs.





\$66,000 Loan Made To 8-County Co-Op

A new fresh vegetable processing plant in Lee County, near Beattyville which will serve 200 farmers in an eightcounty area, has been made possible through a \$66,000 Community Development block grant approved by the Kentucky Commerce Cabinet.

The grant was made to Lee county fiscal court, which in turn is loaning the funds for the project to Mountain Farms Co-op at low interest rates. Money from repayment of the loan will remain in Lee county to finance other community projects, Commerce Secretary Carroll Knicely said.


Farmers in Lee, Powell, Estill, Wolfe, Breathitt, Leslie, Clay and Owsley counties formed the co-op last fall with technical assistance from the Department of Agriculture and the University of Kentucky Extension Service. Morehead State University, through its Appalachian Development Center, also assisted with the project.

Co-op members will be growing 100 acres of cucumbers and 200 acres of bell peppers for fresh produce markets across the Southeast. The co-op will charge members a fee to receive, wash, grade, box and cool the produce. The vegetables then will be shipped to a produce broker in Georgia for distribution to the markets. The Agriculture Department assisted in negotiations with the brokerage company





Cervical cancer can be one of the most curable of all cancers, yet it kills thousands of women each year. These deaths could be avoided if the disease is detected in its earliest stages. There is a simple painless test to determine if cervical cancer is present. The Pap test takes only a few moments of a woman's time. Women over age 45 are especially urged to have regular pap tests.

The Floyd County Health Department is having pap clinics March 4, and March 13, 8:30-11:30 and 1-2. These clinics are free services of the Health Department and are open to women of all ages.

There will be a glaucoma screening clinic at the Health Department Friday, March 8. This clinic is a free service of the Health Department and is open to persons of all ages, but those age 40 and over are especially urged to take advantage of this screening, since this is the high risk age for the disease.

A nurse from the Health Department will be in Wayland at the Methodist Church, March 11, 10-2. She will offer T.B. skin tests, urinalyses, anemia screening, blood pressures and immunizations. This clinic is a free service of the Health Department and is open to the public.

One of the most important responsibilities of County government is the maintenance of our county roads and bridges. Every single citizen needs and deserves adequate access to their residence. Meningitis Threat At School Fading

The case of meningitis that developed last Thursday in the Betsy Layne Elementary School and created concern among parents of other children attending the school is not contagious, the Floyd County Health Department said Tuesday after receiving a report on a laboratory test.

Six-year-old Anthony Kidd, of Honaker, became ill at the school and was taken to the Pikeville Methodist Hospital. Later, he was taken to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, where the laboratory tests were made. Parents became panicky as the fear of a possible epidemic mounted.

But the laboratory reported that the meningitis is Type H, which is neither contagious nor infectious, Earl Compton, health department and administrator, said.

The health department reacted to the meningitis threat by placing members of the child's family under medication and recommending sanitation measures and other precautionary action at the

With the threat of an epidemic past, the health department is no longer worried about children attending the school, Compton said. But is suggested that if a child develops an earache or headache or has a high temperature, it should be taken to its family doctor. Type H meningitis in its early stages is not unlike the outset of influenza, Compton said.



Fear of Losing Beds Removed For Nursing Home Residents

paid for by Medicaid may now leave the facility for certain hospital stays and overnight visits with relatives without fear of losing their beds, Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary Al Austin said today

Before Dec. 1, when the Department for Social Insurance issued an emergency regulation allowing Medicaid to pay for beds while residents were away overnight, the beds were not reserved, even when the resident was in the hospital.

According to Austin, this policy placed a severe hardship on some residents. The practice of not paying for nights away from the nursing home was started in 1981 as a cost containment

Review of Mental Impairments By JIM KELLY

Social Security District Director A recent change in the Social Security law is important for many people with mental impairments. The Social Security Administration must establish new rules by early 1985 for evaluating mental impairments in the Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) programs. Here are ways people may be affected by the change:

1. New applicants. Until the new rules are in use, mentally impaired people who file disability applications will have their claims decided under current rules. If a claim is allowed, benefits can begin. If it cannot be allowed, the claim will be reviewed automatically for a possible allowance when the new rules

2. Prior denials and terminations. Mentally impaired people who had an appeal of a termination decision pending on or after June 7, 1983 will have their cases automatically reviewed when the new rules are in effect. However, most mentally impaired people whose disability benefits were denied or stopped for medical reasons between March 1, 1981 and October 9, 1984 need to reapply to get a decision under the new rules. If they do so by October 9, 1985, the application may be considered to have been filed at the time of the latest denial or termination. Should the claim be allowed, Social Security benefits could be retroactive up to 12 months from the date of the new application. Anyone wishing to reapply should contact any Social Security office for more information and to avoid the possible loss of benefits.

If you wish more information about the new rules for evaluating mental impairments or about other changes in the Social Security law for disabled people, contact your Social Security office.

"We also discovered that the turnover in occupancy of these longterm care beds resulted in additional administrative costs to the Medicaid program and to the facility involved.'


Department for Social Insurance Commissioner Jack Waddell, whose department administers Medicaid, said older persons contacted the cabinet to protest the policy and that Governor Martha Layne Collins also heard from many people on this issue

"We had reports that older persons were actually refusing to go to the hospital against the advice of their doctor, because they were afraid they'd lose their bed and have to find another nursing home," Waddell explained.

Under the regulation, which received legislative review on Feb. 12, beds are reserved for up to 14 days per hospital stay for treatment of an acute condition. Total days away from the nursing home can't exceed 45 in one year and be paid by Medicaid.

In addition to retaining the bed during certain hospital stays, the nursing home resident may keep the bed for up to 15 days a year while they are away for other reasons.

"They may leave to stay overnight with relatives on a holiday or for a trial home visit to see if they are physically ready to leave the facility to live at home," Waddell said. "You can't put a price on being with a relative at Christmas, or attending such special events as the wedding or graduation of a grandchild. I'm sure we gain far more than it costs. Going home for even one night can be the best medicine avail-



Program Offers Free Help With Drug Information Service

Somewhere in Kentucky, a worried father's concern for his teenage son keeps growing. The bright-eyed, tousleheaded young fisherman of last summer has become a belligerent rebel in just six months, and the problem seems to be getting worse.

The father suspects drugs may be to blame, but how can he approach the problem and where can he turn for advice on how to help, rather than alienate, his troubled son?

A good starting point is to dial 1-800-432-9337. That's the toll free number for the Cabinet for Human Resources' Drug Information Service for Kentucky (DISK). Callers may obtain free information on drug abuse education programs and information on where help for abusers is available.

Parents who suspect their child may be a drug abuser are often sent a copy of the book "When It's Your Child," according to Dianne McAvoy, who has been director of DISK since it began in June 1983. The book contains suggestions on what course of action a parent can take to help a child who is involved with drugs. DISK also has a referral list of local drug and alcohol abuse counselors for those who desire

"I get a lot of calls from teachers and community action groups who want to set up drug education programs for young people," said McAvoy, "Our 'Prevention Resources' manual offers them a wide selection of educational materials to choose from.

She emphasized that DISK plays an important part in the efforts of the Department for Mental Health/Mental Retardation Services' Division of Substance Abuse to publicize the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse.

"When I get a request for information, I try to determine exactly what the indivdual's needs are," McAvoy explained. "There are dangers in giving out too much or too little information.

Giving out too much information to a client could result in his ignoring most of what he receives, she added. A deluge of facts might also confuse the person about which direction to take.

"On the other hand, if you don't give out enough information or give out inaccurate information, you're going to wind up with people making poor decisions on the basis of that information," McAvoy

While drug abuse is still a problem in Kentucky, she noted that teenagers' attitudes towards drugs are changing.

"More and more young people are seeing drugs as a problem now-much more so than six or seven years ago," she said. "Even pot is less socially acceptable now than it was then, when it was at its peak.

Whenever a reference is made to 'drug abuse," alcohol abuse is automatically considered part of that term, McAvoy explained. While drug abuse is getting closer scrutiny, intoxication is still considered "socially acceptable" to some people.

"Drunk driving has received a lot of attention lately and people are concerned about it," she said, "but heavy drinking and drunkenness are still considered 'macho' in many social circles.

Statewide, there are nearly 4,000 Junior Historians organized in chapters in Kentucky's elementary, middle, and secondary schools. Members participate in competitions for awards recognizing excellence in 29 areas of historical research. They also attend workshops and summer archaeology programs sponsored by the state KJHS.

On a local level, KJHS chapters are organizing county history museums, sponsoring local history fairs and celebrations, researching the architecture of their town, serving as guides to historic walking tours, and producing slide shows for the public on the history of their county. These are simply a few of the projects completed by Junior Historians during the past year!



PENICILLINS

Penicillins are antibiotic, anti-infective drugs derived originally from a mold called penicillium. Lately, a variety of penicillins are produced by chemically modifying the basic chemical contained in the mold. All penicillins contain the same basic chemical structure. However, the structure is modified to produce drugs with different bacterial characteristics. As a result, one may be preferable to another in a given situation. Penicillins may either kill the organisms causing infection or merely slow them down, allowing the body's defenses to take over. Some penicillins are active against only a few bacteria, while others are active against a wide variety. Penicillins are not effective against viruses, fungi, rickettsiae or yeasts. Always take all the penicillin prescribed by your doctor.





The criminal's father beats him up, the princess's mother is an alcoholic, the weirdo's parents just ignore her, and so on. Not that these problems don't exist, but everything seems a little pat; the armchair analysis is too neatly wrapped up in prepackaged psychological bundles of angst. On the other hand much of

what goes on here is very true, often disturbing, and probably highly recognizable by most high school kids. The sex, the drugs. The peer pressure and the parental inadequacies are all very real concerns. But Hughes gives these kids a sensitivity, vulnerability, openness and depth of awareness that makes the proceedings seem artificial and contrived. Thus, this juvenile version of "The Big Chill" may not meet with popular success, but will probably be used to spark discussion by every high school guidance counselor in Ameri-





Roses in Miniature

Most gardeners look for easy ways to put color in their home landscapes and flower gardens. Annual flowers provide lots of blossoms and color, but must be planted each year. Perennial flowers don't have to be planted each year, but their period of effective bloom and color is generally short. There are woody flowering shrubs, but they require pruning to prevent overgrowth and often are hard to use as cut flowers.

Is there a solution, even a compromise? There's a group of flowers, relatives of the queen of the garden flowers, the rose, that can fill many of our flower needs. What are they? They're miniature roses, also called fairy, baby, dwarf, and Tom Thumb

Miniature roses are just what the name implies—smaller-sized rose flowers on smaller-sized rose plants. They are more versatile than their shrub-size counterparts because they can be used as border plants in front of taller shrubs, as low hedges, in rock and perennial gardens, in window boxes, patio containers, and hanging baskets. They are also used frequently as houseplants, adapt well to flower arranging, and are often featured in their classes at flower shows.

Miniature rose plants generally vary from four to 18 inches tall, with an average around one foot. Some of the miniature climbers may actually sprawl up to five feet if not supported. And some are grafted to make miniature tree roses.

While their flowers are smaller than standard hybrid tea, grandiflora or floribunda roses, they are generally more numerous and continuously bloom from spring till fall frost. Breeding work has developed several hundred varieties in a full range of colors and petal numbers. Their flowers tend to open fully in full sun with perhaps one drawback—a general lack of the much-loved rose fragrance.

While standard roses are obtained by budding the desired variety onto a wild or seedling rootstock, miniature roses are grown on their own roots (i.e., cuttings are taken and rooted). This feature tends to make them more winter or cold hardy because no loss will occur due to freezing at a bud union.

Miniature roses require less cultural maintenance than standard roses, especially with regard to pruning. With standard roses, each cane needs to be pruned yearly to remove dead or diseas-

ed wood and to direct the growth habit. With miniatures, an occasional shearing

will suffice.

Miniatures are the same as standards as to most of their requirements. A well-drained, loamy soil in a full sun location is best. Miniatures can be planted out after frost, and should be watered and mulched like standards. They can get the same disease and insect problems—black spot, powdery mildew, aphids and spider mites—as standards, so a good monitoring or preventive spray schedule is desirable.

If miniatures are to be raised indoors, they need full sun from a southern exposure or 14 to 18 hours a day of artificial light. They grow best at temperatures of 60 to 70°F, and prefer a relatively high humidity level.

Miniature roses are easy to propagate from stem cuttings, but be aware that many varieties are patented, making it illegal to root and sell these cuttings yourself. For a wide choice of varieties it may be necessary to order plants from the many excellent mail order nurseries in this country.

Timely Tip: If you enjoy feeding the birds in winter, consider growing some of their food seeds in your garden this year. If you try sunflowers, grow a black seeded variety (such as Hybrid 894 from Burpee Seed Co.) to provide more kernel, protein and fat per seed.





More Road Reconstruction Heavily Favored in Dist. 12

A survey of motorists in this state highway district (No. 12) shows that 84 percent think there should be more spending for road reconstruction. Some 88 percent of those surveyed said spending for road maintenance should be increased.

The statewide survey, conducted by the Kentucky Transportation Research Program, UK Center of Engineering, shows that a majority of motorists want more spending for road reconstruction, maintenance and safety improvements.

Responding to a question asking if 'you think government spending (for transportation) should increase, stay the same, decrease, or stop completely," 69 percent in the statewide survey said spending for road maintenance should increase, 30 percent said it should stay the same, and one percent said it should

Paintsville Veteran Kills Ex-Wife, Child

A Paintsville mother and her infant daughter were shot to death Saturday, and police have charged the woman's former husband with the deaths.

The victims were identified by Johnson Coroner Bryan Fraley as Kathy Marie Woody VanHoose, 30, and her 9-month-old daughter, Dawn Michelle.


The coroner said Mrs. VanHoose went to the home of her former husband, Carl Thomas VanHoose, 30, on State Street in Paintsville, about 10:30 a.m. to drop off their daughter. Witnesses told police that an argument broke out, and Mrs. VanHoose got out of the car. VanHoose shot Mrs. VanHoose several times, then shot his daughter, who was strapped into a car-seat in the back seat of the car, the coroner said.

VanHoose then fled to nearby Paint Creek and held a .38-caliber revolver to his head, threatening suicide, Fraley said. VanHoose's grandmother, Lucy VanHoose, talked him into throwing down his gun.

VanHoose was arrested by Kentucky State Police and Paintsville City Police detective Mike Horn. He was charged with the slayings and lodged in the Johnson county jail.

VanHoose, a veteran, was a student of Mayo Technical and Vocational School, Paintsville.

Report to Kentucky

IRS MUST LIFT VEHICLE LOG BURDEN An item that was slipped into the Tax Reform Act of 1984 has businesspeople across the nation angry, and justifiably so. A provision in the new law requires taxpayers to keep cumbersome records of business vehicle use

The provision requires "contemporaneous records"-itemized travel logs-of business use of certain assets. including vehicles. The requirement was added to the bill during a House-Senate conference, without adequate review by Congress.

In recent weeks, my office has received hundreds of letters on this matter from Kentuckians in all types of businesses, including physicians, farmers and salespeople. They complained that the new law causes them senseless paperwork because it requires that a continuous log of trips be maintained. Under previous law, business use of an automobile was deductible as long as the taxpayer maintained adequate records or sufficient evidence to support the claim.

Most everyone agrees that the Internal Revenue Service needs adequate enforcement tools to prevent tax evasion. But this bill goes too far in burdening all people in business just to catch a few who stretch the law

Because of this problem, I have cosponsored a bill which would result in total repeal of the new provision, returning the former system for business vehicle deductions. In case this bill meets roadblocks, I have introduced another measure which would exempt those who use their vehicle entirely for business from the requirement. This includes an exemption for those who, for certain reasons, use their automobiles in travel to and from work.

If Treasury Department officials oppose these alternatives, they can come up with their own. But it is clear that taxpayers must be relieved of this unnecessary, time-consuming paperwork

New Ranking System Asked For State's School Districts

tional Improvement recommended a new ranking system for Kentucky's 180 educational districts at its meeting last Wednesday in Frankfort.

The proposed ranking system would use a decile method for interpreting the results of achievement tests administered to students. Under this method, each district would qualify for one of 10 levels on the basis of its test

The decile approach endorsed by the committee would tell those interested what percentile grouping a particular district lies in, said Marcia O'Neill-White, chairwoman of the subcommittee on school district ranking.

"Knowing that your district ranks among the top 20 percent in the state, for example, is a great deal more helpful in interpreting the effectiveness of your schools than knowing that students scored 23rd on their tests," Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald said.

Along with the decile form of ranking the advisory committee recommended that other indicators about the district also be given. Indicators that have a proven relationship to academic outcome include the pupil-teacher ratio, the dropout rate and the attendance rate, the committee said.

Other indicators related to the economy of the district would also be given, O'Neill-White said. They include such statistics as the local financial index, assessed property value, percentage of local revenue and figures pertaining to instructional costs and perpupil expenses,


