Parade marshal this year is William M. (Bosh) Petry, well-known Martin businessman and Deputy Grand Master of Kentucky Masons. He will be honored with a reception given by John W. Hall Lodge No. 950 at the Holiday Inn, here, from noon until 2 p.m., Saturday.

Today (Wednesday) the children's competition in the Jenny Wiley Pageant will be held at 7 p.m. at the National Guard Armory, and at 8 p.m., Thursday, eight young women will compete there for the title of Miss Jenny Wiley. They are pictured elsewhere in this section.

Also on Thursday, there will be a fashion show at 7:30 in the auditorium of Prestonsburg Elementary School.

All through the day, there will be on



# Copperhead—Plus Legs, Feet Is Biological Oddball Rarity


A two-legged serpent in the parking lot of a Warco housing complex-and a poisonous copperhead, no less! Portent of evil? Harbinger of a half-runner blight? Or just a weird snake? Well, weird, for sure, probably to the point of

being a biological rarity in the extreme. Certainly Ambers Brown, resident of an apartment on John M. Stumbo Drive, recognized that "something wasn't right" Friday afternoon when the twoloot-long pit viper rared up in a threatening stance, partially supporting itself, he says, "on its two little feet and legs," which appear as two distinct, flipper-like appendages about four inches from the tail. Brown, armed with a tire tool, dispatched the unseemly serpent with a well-placed blow to the head. If that hadn't done the trick then it would have been high time to get the children off the street and start worrying about next year's bean crop!

# Older Workers Are Found To Be Reliable Employees

Need someone who is reliable, experienced and willing to work? Well you may find the person you are looking for in the Older Workers Program.

The program, funded by the Jobs Training Partnership Act, is designed to place people 55 and older in the job market. The purpose of the program is to provide experienced people who do not wish to retire with limited training and job placement services.

Glenda Hall, who is helping to coordinate the program, says that there has been a tremendous response by many older Floyd countians and that there is a surplus of applicants. It is hoped that more employers will take advantage of this virtually untapped resource.

According to Mrs. Hall, when the baby boomers turn 55, more emphasis will have to be placed on the dislocated and older worker. Now is the time, she adds, for employers to set an example and reach 55 the program will be in place to help them, also.

The goal of this new program is to help find employment for 60 participants a year, and the quota for this year is more than half filled.

The program also offers training skills for older workers requiring further education by providing short term training workshops. J.T.P.A. can furnish up to 50% of training costs for those eligible. Some of the work shops include employability skills and how to react in a job interview. A video camera is utilized to allow participants to judge their own performance during a interview and discuss ways of improving their approach.

Among things that Mrs. Hall said would be attractive to prospective employers is the reliability of the older workers. She said some of the advantages include experience, more free

hire older Americans, so that when they time to devote to their jobs, no maternity leave, and no young children at home.

> Those interested in the program can either be placed in fulltime or part-time employment, and it is unlikely that the older workers will interfere with young people's chances of finding a job since they will not be competing in the same job market.

Mrs. Slone, who is working for Add-a-Touch Florists at Martin, says that this is the first job she has held in the community. 



#### Morehead Appoints New Education Dean

\*Dr. Jim Bowman, formerly professor and program analyst for the School of Education at the University of Houston, Clear Lake, has been named associate dean for education at Morehead State University.

A member of the University of Houston's Clear Lake faculty since 1974, Dr. Bowman also served as chairperson of educational foundations and related studies. As program analyst, he was responsible for evaluating all programs related to provisional certification in education, including seeing that both program and course objectives compled not only with the school's goals but also with state law.

Dr. Bowman earned the B.S. degree in business administration with certification in education and a M.A. degree in sociology from Pittsburgh (Kans.) State University. He holds a Ph.D. degree in history and philosophy of education from the University of Oklahoma, where he also taught.

Vice president of the education division, World Future Society, Dr. Bowman is active in several professional organizations including the American Educational Studies Association. He also has served as president of the Southwestern Philosophy of Education Society.

Among his honors are selection by the University of Houston faculty as the 1984-85 recipient of the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Teaching and by the students in 1978-79 for the Piper Nomination for Excellence in Teaching Award. Pittsburg State University also gave him its Outstanding Young Alumni Award in 1981.

The co-author of three books, Dr. Bowman also has had numerous articles published. He also has served as a consultant to school systems and delivered more than 70 papers or addresses at professional meetings.

Dr. Bowman, his wife and their two children are residing in Flemingsburg.

#### Continuing Education

Did you know that your veterinarian hasn't finished school yet? Nor is he likely to finish within his career!

The reason he hasn't finished school is simple. He is required to keep himself updated on advances in veterinary medical matters by completing a certain number of continuing education courses each year, all designed to keep practicing veterinarians informed on the latest developments in their field.

An example of where these continuing education courses are offered is the annual Mid-America Veterinary Conference, held Oct. 3-6 this year in Louisville. Regarded as one of the best in the nation, the conference brings speakers in the specialties of large animal practice, small animal practice and equine medicine to Kentucky, where Kentucky veterinarians (and many from out of state as well) can learn about recent advances in veterinary medicine.

Constituent associations (regional veterinary groups) as well as specialized groups such as bovine, swine and small animal practitioners also hold conferences throughout the year for the same reason.

On a national basis, the American Veterinary Medical Association convention includes workshops which are attended by Kentucky veterinarians, who also attend the Western States conference in Las Vegas.

In recent years Kentucky has come to the forefront as a conference site. The American Association of Equine Practitioners will meet in Lexington in December, 1987.

Last year, the national association of bovine practitioners met in Louisville.

Veterinary medicine is not a static science, not one in which all the knowledge there will ever be has been gathered into one pool which you can memorize. The knowledge changes, sometimes daily, as new diseases are recognized, as new treatments and medicines are developed.

An excellent example is Potomac Horse Fever, a disease first recognized in 1979. Now, only eight years later, highly effective methods of treatment have been developed and a vaccine made available. Kentucky veterinarians who specialize in horses—and some for whom treatment of horses is only part of a larger scope of practice—have become authorities on the diagnosis and treatment of this disease, thanks to a process of continuing education.

If your veterinarian is absent from the office around the first of October, or at other times of the year, and gone to a convention, now you know why. Veterinarians feel an obligation to give you their very best—and keeping abreast of the latest knowledge is an important step in that direction.



dense undergrowth to crawl with the characteristic undulating, slithering movement of modern snakes, the legs proved of no value and gradually disappeared over millions of years. This is the scientist's explanation. On the other hand, the Biblical text tells us the snake was condemned to its low place in the scheme of things because of its part in destroying the domestic peace and tranquillity of a place called the Garden of Eden

In any case, some snakes, primarily the reptile class which includes the boa constrictor, still show, occasionally, vestiges of real legs which appear as barely noticeable 'anal spurs.' Ambers Brown's specimen, a pit viper, which also includes rattlesnakes, water moccasins and numerous other species, is remarkable, because pit vipers just aren't supposed to have anal spurs, much less little, fan-like feet.

Brown said, Monday, that both the University of Kentucky and the University of Tennessee have expressed interest in the snake.

Dr. Wayne H. Davis, of the University of Kentucky School of Biology, confirmed that certainly a two-legged copperhead is unusual but could not say whether or not others have been reported.

Photos have been taken, the snake is adequately preserved, and while Mr. Brown busies himself with showing the oddball reptile to the scores of curious folks who keep showing up at his door, we'll try to get more detailed information on just how strange the Warco copperhead really is.

#### **Health Officials Advise** Some To Take Flu Shots

Kentucky health officials advise that people who need flu shots should get them during the next six weeks. Aithough most people who get the flu recover fairly easily, influenza can produce serious complications and can be fatal for people with other health problems.

"People who have chronic heart or lung disease should have an influenza vaccination-this recommendation includes children older than six months," said Michael Moser, M.D., chief epidemiologist in the state Department for Health Services. "Those with chronic kidney disease or diabetes and residents of nursing homes and other chronic care facilities should also be immunized."

In addition, health officials say that it is a good idea for everyone older than 65, regardless of their health status, to get a flu shot. Other individuals who should be vaccinated are physicians, nurses and other health care professionals who have extensive contact with high-risk patients, such as people with chronic heart or lung disease

Flu shots can be given to almost anyone, except people with a severe allergy to eggs. Normally those who have a short-term illness with fever are advised to wait until they've recovered before getting a flu shot.

Pregnant women are advised to wait until the second or third trimester of pregnancy before taking the vaccine. A pregnant woman should always consult with her physician before being immunized.

than 18 should not take aspirin while sick with a flu-like illness because of the risk of Reye's Syndrome, a disease that affects the central nervous system and liver and is associated with the combination of flu and aspirin use in children and teenagers. It is fatal in 10 to 40 percent of cases

During the 1986-87 influenza season, the number of flu cases tracked by the Department for Health Services peaked in early January, but cases were reported as early as November and as late as the end of March, according to Reginald Finger, M.D., communicable disease branch manager.

'Last year's flu season was our first for the new formal system of tracking flu cases in Kentucky," said Finger. "As we continue that tracking this season, we'll be able to compare the levels of activity with those of last year.

Twenty counties are participating in the flu tracking effort this year. County coordinators, who are health department employees, poll between one and 20 physicians for the number of flu-like illnesses treated in a week's time. They also call area schools for absenteeism reports. Coordinators then report to Finger's office. The calls will be made weekly, starting the week of Nov. 6 and going through the last week in March.

Prior to his election, Doctor Barton served the association as trustee and is a former chairman of the KMA Board of Trustees. He also served as chairman of the Kentucky Medical Political Action Committee.

Doctor Barton, a member and former president of the Whitley County Medical Society is a past president of the medical staff of Southeastern Baptist Hospital. He is also president-elect of the medical staff of the Baptist Regional Medical Center in Corbin.

Doctor Barton and his wife, Joan Much Barton, reside in Corbin.

#### **Low Fat Diets** Can Be Harmful

Many people have recently become aware of the health benefits of a diet lower in fat. High fat diets have been associated with increased risk of stroke, heart attack and cancer. But many people also assume that if a low fat diet is good for an adult, it must also be good for children, including young infants. According to a new booklet from the American Institute for Cancer Research that could be a serious mistake.

The American Institute for Cancer Research notes that while adults should limit fat in their diets, fat is an essential dietary element for developing children. Attempting to restrict dietary fat for children under 18 months of age, by limiting them to skim milk or low fat solid foods, may result in babies not getting the fat necessary for normal development of their brains and nervous

The Institute's new booklet, "Infant Nutrition: Sound Eating Habits Start Early," provides basic information on sound nutrition for young children. It notes that babies who are either breast fed or bottle fed on a regular formula will get sufficient amounts of dietary f for normal development. Problems of cur when parents attempt to limit the baby's diet to the low or no fat foods they themselves are eating.

The Institute notes that as a baby is switched over to solid foods it is important to begin teaching the child positive eating habits. This includes providing a broad variety of foods, with a special emphasis on fresh fruits and vegetables. It is also a good time to limit sweets. Although even newborn babies seem to be born liking sweets, studies have indicated that what the baby is fed during the first year may influence his taste for sweets later on.

The American Institute for Cancer Research is a national, nonprofit organization which focuses on the relationship between diet and cancer. Through its Dietary Guidelines for Lower Cancer Risk, the Institute has recommended that adults lower their dietary fat intake from the current average of 40 percent of calories to 30 percent or less. It has published "Infant Nutrition" to help make parents more aware of the proper nutritional standards which should apply for children and which can be different from those for adults.

#### **Forest Fire Season** Is Oct. 1-Dec. 15

October 1-December 15 is "Forest Fire Hazard Season," according to state During the period, the law prohibits

burning anything capable of spreading fire within 150 feet of the woods. The noburning provisions are in force throughout the day except between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and midnight.

The cabinet's Division of Forestry advises that even after 4:30 p.m., no one should burn unless the wind is calm. It is also illegal to start a fire at any time on or near one's timberland without taking all reasonable precautions to prevent the fire from spreading. The law requires that all outdoor fires be attended until extinguished.

Forestry Director Donald Hamm explained that reasonable precautions include the following:

The ground should be cleared around a fire, tools should be handy, the fire should be fed slowly, and it should be manned until it is completely out.

"Burning only in the late evening and taking adequate precautions would rid Kentucky of one of the leading causes of forest fires," Hamm said, referring to fires which accidentally spread when people burn trash and other unwanted

Hamm said that division field personnel are now making final preparations for the fall fire season with the hiring, training, and equipping of emergency fire fighting crews.

To report a forest fire residents are encouraged to call the Division of Forestry in Prestonsburg, phone 886-8562. Residents outside of the Prestonsburg calling area can call collect to report a forest fire.



A proposal to restrict the amount of non-economic damages that can be awarded in injury cases was one of the 10 top-ranked suggestions for Constitutional Amendments included in the final report of the Special Commission on Constitutional Review released on August 25 in Frankfort. The commission was created by the 1986 legislature to make recommendations for modernizing the state's 96-year-old Constitution.

"In our opinion, this action is long overdue and would have a positive impact in regarding the medical liability problem in Kentucky," said Dr. Richard Hench, a Lexington internist who serves

"The proposed Constitutional Amendment would in no way limit a person's right to sue when he or she has been truly injured through negligence. In fact, cases for the truly injured will have a better change of swift justice and fair compensation if the courts are not burdened with unwar-

ranted suits.' Dr. Hench noted that a recent survey of 330 Kentucky doctors in family practice or in obstetrics and gynecology showed that over the past eight years 36 percent simply quit delivering babies and another 19 percent cut back. In addition, another 12 percent said they might stop soon.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment as recommended by the Commission would be to amend Section 54 to read as follows:

"The General Assembly shall have no power to limit the amount to be recovered for economic loss, including medical expenses, property damage, and lost earnings arising from injuries resulting in death, or for injuries to person or property. The General Assembly shall have the power to limit the amount to be recovered for non-economic loss. punitive damages and all other nonpecuniary damage arising from injuries resulting in death or from injuries to person or property.'

#### \* Cancer Hopeline

QUESTION: I know that a diet high in fiber and low in fat may reduce my risk of cancer. So I'm trying to increase the amount of fiber I eat. But I'm curious, is there a limit to how much fiber a person should eat?

ANSWER: Good nutrition means eating for variety, balance and moderation. While the National Cancer Institute recommends increasing the amount of fiber in your diet, their dietary guidelines also emphasize the need to eat a balanced diet.

Americans now eat 10-15 grams of fiber daily. Populations that have diets with twice this amount have a lower rate of cancers of the colon and rectum. Therefore, the National Cancer Institute advises Americans to double the amount of fiber they are currently eating. A minimum of 20 grams and an upper limit of 35 grams daily are considered safe and suitable levels. The amount of fiber in foods can be determined from many product labels.

The lower limit of 20 grams is consistent with NCI's recommendation to double current fiber levels, estimated to average about 11 grams daily. However, fiber helps to move food quickly through the intestine and out of the body. Eating too much fiber may upset the digestive system and interfere with the absorption of essential vitamins and nutrients N views the 35 grams limit as a safety factor to caution against over consumption

As always, it is a good idea to check with your doctor before making any major change in your diet, particularly if you have any other medical conditions that might be affected by a change in



#### The Case for LPN's

We're writing this letter to those people who are interested in an education and perhaps are misinformed about some very important facts concerning vocational education and Practical Nursing.

Most people are probably aware of the current controversy that the "LPN" is on the way out or they are going to stop training LPN's because only RN's will have jobs. It's important that people hear both sides and not only the one presented by people who want only to perpetuate this issue

First of all, vocational education is very much alive and supporting the health occupation of practical nursing. The state of Kentucky has 14 state operated practical nursing programs and two private schools which train competent bedside practitioners. members of the health team that provide a very necessary service. Granted the LPN is not college trained, but by choice, desire, or for financial reasons, they enroll in vocational programs of practical nursing and perform well and have good State Board pass rates.

Many practical nursing graduates continue their education in local colleges and as educators we've always encouraged them to use our programs as stepping stone to a higher education if that is their desire. We've assisted students in finding information about college programs that they are interested in. We've never told a student that he must go to college instead of a vocational school. People have the right to information that is not biased nor incorrect. College personnel need to be aware of programs that are available in their community and provide information that allows the student to make a choice as best suits their needs.

Yes, there is a move by the American Nurses Association that there be only two levels of "Entry into Practice," the BSN and ADN, both taught in the college system. In Kentucky in 1986 the proposal was not introduced into the legislature because many people rejected the idea because of loss of jobs and the resulting higher health care costs. Become informed! This is not law yet. Not one practical nursing school has been closed in Kentucky. The LPN programs are still in session and enrollment is increasing. Our graduates are employed in many areas of health care. Many facilities would find it difficult to function without them.

Together we've taught practical nursling for over 16 years and have over 300 graduates that have marketable skills and confidence in themselves. Many of them have chosen to continue their education by working towards a college degree. Many times without their beginnings in the vocational school their dream of college and a profession might never have been realized. If we close the LPN schools, where do the next 300 students go?

Why must everyone be made to feel that a college degree should be or has to be everyone's goal? Vocational education provides a very necessary and worthwhile as well as satisfying educaion. The training for a job and life skills that practical nursing provides is only one field in vocational education.

rch has been done that indicates that the LPN programs are adequately training students and that there is a real need for them. Do we eliminate the LPN because the job description is changing or do we continue to support LPN's, who have always been such a viable part of the health care team?

As educators, we owe it to the public to encourage any student to do their best in whatever field they choose. We need to realize that the stress of school and family adjustment is enough to cope with without being told that they should do something else or what they are wasting their time. Educators should also respect the past experiences of their students. No one needs to hear the kind of criticism that destroys confidences and the self esteem, especially when the person is trying to better themselves. The sad thing is that many times the people who are being critical do not have all the facts. As professionals it is our responsibility to be aware and communicate correct information.

We have 40 students enrolled in the Practical Nursing class in Pikeville and 27 in the Paintsville class at Mayo State Vocational School. Our graduates are finding jobs in all areas of health care, and as their roles change, they are adapting to the communities need within their scope of practice.

The community, including physicians and health care facilities, have available a competent, well-trained practitioner who has the confidence and skills to serve the public. What's even more important is that they have the desire to serve the community. With continued support by well informed people in our communities, practical nursing will never die-only flourish as it has for many years

#### Go, Team, Go!

Does fan participation, in sports, increase an athlete's motivation or is fan participation a determinate athletic motivation, at all. The purpose of this article is to examine both sides of this issue. Many psychologists agree that positive reinforcement increases motivation and, therefore, affects performance. Positive reinforcement is a reward of some kind, such as cheering when a football team executes a good play or scores a touchdown. The following is an example of how fan participation, positive reinforcement, may have or may not have been a factor in one football's team victory and another football team's defeat.

The setting is a football stadium in Prestonsburg on a Friday night. It is a perfect night for a high school football game. Everyone is bundled in warm clothing to ward off the brisk fall weather. Two football teams, the Prestonsburg Blackcats and the Belfry Pirates, are on the field preparing for the big game. There are approximately 20 minutes on the game clock. The Belfry Pirate band begins to play and the Pirate cheerleaders begin to lead their fans in cheers. They are pepping up their already enthusiastic crowd of followers. The Prestonsburg Blackcat band and cheerleaders are nowhere to be seen. The football stands continue to fill. The ratio of Prestonsburg fans to Belfry fans is approximately 3 to 2. Prestonsburg's band marches out of the high school and takes their place on the opposite side of the field to await the playing of the national anthem. Belfry's band continues to entertain the entire crowd and their cheerleaders continue to encourage enthusiasm. They are preparing their fans for the beginning of the game. After a long wait, the Prestonsburg Blackcat band marches onto the field to play the national anthem, The Star-Spangled Banner. The fans rise and salute the American Flag, or flagpole in this case since there is no flag on the flagpole to salute. The Prestonsburg band then plays the school song while their players rush back onto the field. The Blackcat band then takes its place in the stands. It is now game time and the excitement builds

Belfry's school is much larger than Prestonsburg's. Belfry is ranked a 3 A school; Prestonsburg is ranked a 2 A school. Belfry has a greater number of football players than Prestonsburg. Belfry is coached by Phillip Haywood, a former coach at Prestonsburg. Prestonsburg is coached by Chuke Williams.

Prestonsburg receives the ball and the game is underway. Prestonsburg makes a huge push towards the Belfry goal line. The Blackcat fans cheer them on. There is a fumble near the 15-yard line and Belfry recovers the fumble. From that point on, Belfry controls the game. It is now half-time and Belfry has a big lead over the Blackcats. The score is 26-0. Belfry has the lead. Both bands perform a field show during half-time. The fans enjoy hot chocolate and other goodies offered at the concession stand. The game resumes. Belfry's fans continue to rejoice in their team's efforts. The Prestonsburg fans remain silent. The enthusiasm has diminished for the Prestonsburg supporters. The band is not uttering a note. No drums are beating. No horns are blaring. There are no cheers of encouragement from the fans. Nothing, except for the cheers of the Belfry Pirate followers and the continuing support of the band and cheerleaders. The game continues on with Belfry leading. All that can be heard is the sound of their loyal fans screaming words of encouragement. The game ends with a score of 33-0. The Belfry Pirates have won over the Prestonsburg Blackcats.

This example was used to show how fan participation, positive reinforcement, may have helped produce a victory for the Belfry Pirates, and how low fan participation, negative reinforcement, may have been a psychological factor in the Prestonsburg Blackcat defeat. As stated earlier in this article, many psychologists agree that reinforcement plays a big role in determining the performance of an individual or individuals. They agree that positive reinforcement encourages positive results and negative reinforcement encourages negative results. Whether the performance displayed is that of a football team or of individuals acting in everyday life is irrelevant. Does fan participation make a difference? I leave the answer up to you.

# REPORT TO THE PEOPLE ON **SOLID AND HAZARDOUS WASTE**

When I assumed the office of Floyd County Judge/Executive on May 26, 1983, Floyd County Fiscal Court was in debt over \$750,000 and was being operated by the Kentucky Department of Finance. Our Solid Waste Department was also in debt. The solid waste system had been in operation 21/2 years. It was my responsibility to oversee the operation which had already been financed and in operation. I was told by many people including the Kentucky Department of Finance representative that there was no chance of saving the solid waste system and that it would have to be declared insolvent. I knew if this happened Floyd County would not be able to sell another school bond, hospital bond, housing bond, or bonds for any other worthy cause for many years to come. Bonds could not have been sold for the four schools that are now planned: Prestonsburg, Allen, Right Beaver and Left Beaver. Mr. Bob McAninch was asked to return to the Solid Waste System. Mr. Al Howell from the Department of Finance had prepared the 1983-84 Fiscal Court Budget placing \$225,000 into the Solid Waste. In the 1984-85 budget \$125,000 was budgeted for Solid Waste; in 1985-86, \$25,000 was budgeted; in 1986-87, no money was budgeted for Solid Waste. Our 1987-88 budget has no money budgeted for Solid Waste. This has taken many hours of work to get our Solid Waste on solid financial grounds. The money saved is now being used for other County Services.

In answer to many questions which the public has asked I would like to inform you that there has not been any talks or meetings concerning the taking of Pike County's solid waste. In fact, Pike County has recently received a grant from the Federal Government to build a new landfill.

The generators of hazardous waste are well known. Materials such as cleaning fluids, large amounts of asbestos, etc. are taken to a hazardous waste landfill near Cincinnati by a private hauler. The Solid Waste Commission refers hazardous waste generators to this private service.

Landfills do not pollute the air. The burning of household garbage does pollute the air. Not only does it pollute the air but the burning of garbage produces a dangerous poisonous gas which can kill humans. This is the reason this practice has been outlawed by the State and Federal Government.

The Floyd County Landfill is engineered to guard against the possibility of polluting the water. There is a series of environmental control drainage ditches surrounding the landfill. The only water that enters the landfill is the rainwater that falls on it. The waste is compacted on a three to one slope into daily cells. This design allows the rainwater that enters the landfill to be drawn to a french drain at the tow of the landfill through a system of leaching lines. Then, any leachate contained in the water is pumped back into the landfill. The water is tested periodically. The only pollutants in the water is mine runoff from abandoned coal mines. While man may make boundaries where he pleases, nature has little regard for man. Over one half of Knott County drains into Right Beaver Creek. To not work with Knott County as closely as possible would be environmentally irresponsible to the people of Right Beaver.

A false appearance has been created suggesting that the landfill is about to become regional. In December 1980 the Federal Government awarded a grant of nearly \$500,000 to the Solid Waste Project to build a regional landfill. Public hearings were held. In May 1981 the landfill was opened and it has accepted solid waste from other counties ever since. It has been a regional landfill for six and a half years. The only reason the grant was obtained was the promise that the landfill would be available to surrounding counties.

It has been pointed out that solid waste contains many items, i.e. batteries, generators, plastics, etc. The choice is disposal of waste all over the county by illegal dumping or disposal in one centrally located controlled area that is inspected and monitored environmentally.

It has been said that other counties would not take Floyd County's trash. The Solid Waste Commission knows of several landfills that gleefully eyeballs Floyd's Waste.

Others have said they are thinking of the future. Seven years ago the Solid Waste Project was thinking of the future. The Floyd Project has received two awards by the State. The landfill operators school will be conducted by the State this year on Floyd County's Landfill.

I have been appointed by Governor Martha Layne Collins to represent all Kentucky County Judges on a 25-member Kentucky Emergency Response Commission. This was mandated by the U.S. Congress Bill PL-99-499. We have held three meetings since April 1987.

A local committee has been appointed by the Emergency Response Commission. Floyd County has a 15-member committee. David Chaffins is Committee Chairman. All Floyd County companies having any hazardous material that is subjected to reporting under the new Federal Law must be reported to this Committee. The chemical's name, how it is stored, where it is stored, a report of any spills and how and where it is disposed of. There is no place in Eastern Kentucky this waste can be disposed of. The general public is urged to come before this Committee for any information concerning hazardous materials. The meeting place and time will be published in the paper. The next meeting will be held November 10, 1987 at 6:00 p.m. in the Floyd County Courthouse Annex Conference Room No. 105.

#### Harlan Photos Set For Capitol Exhibit

An exhibit of historic Harlan county photographs will be in the State Capitol Art Lobby, Oct. 12-Nov. 13.

"Harlan County Coal Camps-Benham and Lynch, Kentucky" is a series of industrial documentary photographs taken as the two towns came into existence and flourished from 1912 to 1948.

The Appalachian Archive of Southeast Community College in Cumberland has a unique collection of turn-of-the-century photographs that document the beginnings of two model coal camps in southeastern Kentucky. Benham was developed by the International Harvester company of Chicago in 1910, and Lynch was created by United States Steel of Pittsburgh in 1917.

The companies came into the region to mine the coal and found it necessary to also create self-sufficient industrial communities on land that had thus far supported only a few family farms and several isolated trading communities. The companies hired photographers to record, step-by-step, the progress of town construction and mine development, later donating over 4,000 of these photographs to Southeast Community

With a grant from the Kentucky Energy Cabinet, the archive staff has prepared a large exhibit of 149 of these photographs that will tour the state during the coming year. A select number will be exhibited at the art gallery in the state Capitol, beginning Oct. 12. The gallery, located in the east wing of the Capitol, is maintained by the Kentucky Department of the Arts. Admission is free. Hours are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays; 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturdays; and 1-5 p.m. Sundays.

Kentucky's civilian labor force estimate of 1,679,300 in July was 21,200 below the June figure of 1,700,500 and 15,300 below the July 1986 report of 1,694,600. #### **Farmers Think Land Values** Are Down 10 To 49 Percent

Kentucky farmers believe their land has decreased in value by 10 to 49 percent during the last five years, according to a study released by University of Kentucky agricultural economists.

"Although there have been widespread reports about the drop in land values during the agricultural recession, few, if any, of the reports have been verified by systematic research," said Mike Reed, one of the agricultural economists who surveyed more than 1500 farmers across

The averages of estimated price declines for land for all of Kentucky were 20 percent for crop land and 10 percent for pasture land, he said, although regional differences were large.

Western Kentucky farmers believed their land dropped in value the most of any region in the state, with their estimates of crop land declines at 49 percent and pasture land at 44 percent of the 1981 values, Reed said.

"This large drop explains why farmers in the western part of Kentucky seem to be having more serious financial problems than farmers in other regions," he said.

Central Kentucky farmers estimate the value of their land has dropped by 27 percent for both crop land and pasture The survey also found that farmers

are hopeful that their land will once again inflate in value, but few believe that it will reach the 1981 price by 1990.

"Generally, farmers across Kentucky expect land prices to increase by 15 to 16 percent by 1990," Reed said.

Farmers believed that interest rates, inflation and farm prices determine the price of land, Reed said.

#### Healthful Eating—That's Italian!

If your concept of Italian food is limited to a plate of spaghetti with tomato sauce or a slice of pizza pie, you're missing the excitement and variety of this healthful and popular ethnic cuisine. Italian cooking uses vegetables abundantly and often limits meat content, so it can be high in nutrients and low in fat.

Antipasto can be a healthful dish when it emphasizes raw or lightly steamed vegetables. And pasta is really a lowfat food when served without added fat in sauces and toppings. Of course, Italian cuisine does have some pitfalls, so avoid dishes topped with high-fat cheeses, and try to stay away from deep-fried foods, sausages, cream sauces and cheesecake.

Try these tips for healthier Italian

·Look for recipes that feature olive oil rather than butter, and remember that a little of this robust oil goes a long way. ·Use part-skim varieties of ricotta, mozzarella and other Italian cheeses.

•In Italian dressing, use equal amounts of oil and vinegar instead of the usual four-to-one ratio. If the dressing is too sharp, add a bit of water:

•Use fennel seeds in sauces for sausage flavor without the fat.

POLLO ALLA ABRUZZO Based on a traditional dish from Abruzzo, in central Italy, this dish has a mild flavor with a hint of cloves and a wonderfully moist, tender texture. Serve with brown rice or millet and a crunchy, colorful vegetable, such as

broccoli or carrots. 1 chicken, cut into 4 serving pieces and skinned (or 4 chicken breast halves)

1/4 tsp. sage 2 bay leaves

1 garlic clove, thinly sliced 6 whole cloves

1/2 tsp. dried rosemary 12 black peppercorns, crushed

1/8 to 1/4 tsp. crushed red pepper 1/4 cup chicken broth, water, or dry white wine

Place all ingredients in large skillet. Cover and cook over low heat for 50-55 minutes, turning chicken occasionally. Remove cover, increase heat to medium-high and cook, turning frequently, until sauce is reduced and chicken is just starting to color. In necessary, add a bit of water to prevent

This will produce four servings, but the calories and fat content will vary for this dish, depending on the cut of chicken used. If made with chicken breasts it will contain about 3 grams of fat and 144 calories per serving. When made using a drumstick and thigh, each serving will contain about 8 grams of fat and about





#### New Medical Claims Contract To Save Ky. \$2.5 Million

Kentucky's Medicaid program is expected to save at least \$2.5 million over the life of a new three-year contract for a Texas firm to process the thousands of claims made for Medicaid coverage.

Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary Al Austin recently announced that the agreement between the state Department for Medicaid Services and Electronic Data Systems of Dallas has been completed and is pending final approval by the U.S. Department for Health and Human Services. Medicaid services are purchased through a combination of state and federal funding.

Austin said the EDS proposal was selected from three bids submitted on the basis of ratings given for points including per claim charge, implementation costs, charges for computer services provided by the vendor and technical systems requirements.

Under the new contract, which takes effect July 1, 1988, EDS will receive 40.48 cents per processed claim. The estimated annual cost to the state will total \$5.7 million in payments to EDS for claims processing plus an estimated \$282,000 for postage

EDS has been processing Medicaid claims since December 1983 under a contract that is effective through June 30, 1988. Under the existing agreement, the company charges 50.75 cents per claim, including postage costs.

Medicaid Services Commissioner Hughes Walker said the new pact offers some improvements in addition to

"EDS will install state-of-the art software which will enable its staff to more quickly detect errors on claims.'

"The company also will assign additional staff to the task of determining whether health care coverage should be paid by Medicare or a private health insurance policy instead of Medicaid,"

Walker said. "When a Medicaid client's health care costs can be paid from another source, we save benefit dollars and are better able to serve Kentuckians who have no health insurance at all."

Payments for medical assistance benefits totaled \$606.2 million during the fiscal year that ended June 30. The current fiscal year budget allows for Medicaid benefits totaling \$700.8 million.

'We feel our new agreement with EDS will enable us to give health care providers more efficient service, which in turn will solidify their cooperation as we work to ensure continued access to medical care for some 334,000 Kentuckians who are eligible for Medicaid benefits," said Walker.

# State Presses Case In Asbestos Costs

Attorney General David L. Armstrong had announced that a critical decision was issued in the Commonwealth's asbestos case against 23 national asbestos manufacturers. The Kentucky Supreme Court refused the request of asbestos manufacturers' to immediately review the Franklin Circuit Court's decision relating to the statute of limitations.

According to Armstrong the Com-

monwealth will have a 10-year, rather than a five-year, statute of limitations as a result of this ruling. "The decision today will allow Kentucky to continue to bring a very important case to final trial in the circuit court," Armstrong said. "The asbestos products must be removed and will be a very expensive procedure. Manufacturers who had prior knowledge of the hazards should be

responsible for the cost and not Ken-

tucky's taxpayers." The lower court had previously ruled that the commonwealth had a 10-year statute of limitations.

The manufacturers had urged the court to exercise extraordinary relief and decide the issue while the case had not yet been brought to final trial in circuit court. The higher court refused to accept the manufacturer's attempt to establish litigation expense as grounds for extraordinary relief.

The decision stemmed from a lawsuit filed in Franklin Circuit Court charging that the manufacturers should pay the expense of removing all of the asbestos in the approximately 5,000 state-owned buildings because of the manufacturers' prior knowledge that their asbestos products could pose serious health

#### Country music has saved The Judds' relationship

As relative newcomers to the music business, the mother-daughter duo The Judds took country music by surprise in 1984. Mother Naomi and daughter Wynonna garnered the Country Music Association's Horizon Award, given to the most promising new country artist. Previous winners included such stars as John Anderson and Ricky Skaggs.

"It was the grandest moment of our life," Na-omi Judd recalls. "There we were, sitting among the greats of country music. And when our names were called, Wynonna and Llooked at each other with disbelief. I thought to mymail it to us? I don't want to go up there!" "

On Monday, Oct. 12, one of five new artists will pick up this year's Horizon Award at "The 21st Annual Country Music Association Awards," airing live on CBS. Host Kenny Rogers, a Horizon winner himself, will be joined by country music's finest at Nashville's Grand Ole Opry. Awards will be presented in 11 categories, with The Judds up for Entertainer of the Year.

"Country music is the voice of the common man," Judd says. "It's the soul of the earth. There's a genuine rapport among country musicians, a sense of family."

A native of Ashland, Judd married and moved to Los Angeles. But in 1976, after divorcing her husband, she brought young Wynonna back to her Kentucky roots. Inspired by Opry radio broadcasts, the pair began to sing and play together. 'We feel that country music has saved our relationship," Naomi Judd says.

The duo won Grammy Awards in 1985 and 1986 for Best Country Performance by a Duo. Last year, their "Rockin' with the Rhythm" LP was the year's best-selling country album. And their fourth album, "Heartland," was released to warm praise earlier this year.

'I suggested 'Heartland' because it meant 'a simple home, a secure home life and a sense of self-identity,' " Judd says of the album's title. And she says that when they aren't touring, the Judds do seek forts of their Ten. nessee home. "It helps us to stay focused," she says.

They are determined to stay sincere, in spite of their success. "If we hadn't made it with the patience and love that we learned as Christians, if we hadn't had that to guide us and nurture us, we wouldn't have made it," Judd says. "That's something we work on constantly.

Regardless, the HBO special breezes along. It opens and closes with Barr in a kitchen discussing the show with what appears to be (but isn't) her real family. At other points, she leaves the theater to enter a house trailer parked outside and deal with another husband and kids. Along with the satirical commercial, these segments help make this a true television concert. While few directors think of plopping a few cameras in front of a play and calling the result a movie, too many of them just set up cameras in a nightclub and call the result a TV special. Television has its own language, and for the most part Barr and producerdirector Rocco Urbisci speak it with wit and eloquence.

# Fall leaves, while beautiful to look at,

can become a health hazard when burned, Natural Resources and Environental Protection Cabinet officials warned

Division for Air Quality Director Roger McCann explained that smoke from burning leaves contains high concentrations of pollutants such as hydrocarbons, particulate matter, carbon monoxide, and nitrogen oxides. According to McCann, the pollutants released by leaf burning are generally the same as those in other burning processes, and because the burning is close to the ground, the smoke is more likely to be breathed before the pollutants have a chance to dissipate.

"Leaf smoke is especially dangerous for persons with respiratory diseases such as asthma, bronchitis, emphysema and pneumonia. Even in healthy people, it can cause nose, eye and throat irritations," said McCann.

tions," McCann stated.

Leaf burning is a serious threat not only to health, but also to safety and property. In addition to the Division for Air Quality's regulations, the Kentucky Division of Forestry has regulations governing leaf burning. During the forest fire hazard season, beginning Oct. 1, Division of Forestry regulations prohibit burning anything capable of spreading fire within 150 feet of a wooded area. The no-burning provision is in force throughout the day except between

McCann suggested other ways to dispose of leaves. "Let your leaves work for you," he said, "use them for mulch, plow them in to enrich soil, or compost them. If you can't use them, then bag them for collection or deliver them to a permitted landfill.'

#### **IRS Interest Rates** Rise By One Percent

The Internal Revenue Service has announced that interest rates for the calendar quarter beginning October 1, 1987 will increase from eight to nine percent for overpayments and from nine to ten percent for underpayments. 



# Trojans Fall To Rebels, 13-12 In Footbrawl Slugfest, Saturday

have a bench to clear. The Wheelwright Trojans, suffering from a season-long string of injuries, entered Saturday's contest against Allen Central with only 21 able bodies.

To make an already bad situation worse, the Trojans lost one of their most able bodies when fullback and linebacker, Doug Little, was tossed from the game following a bench-clearing slugfest late in the second quarter.

Little, Wheelwright's leading rusher on the season and one of their top defensive performers, proved to be the only permanent casualty of the illegal use of

The talented senior, after making his feelings known to Allen Central heads, was ejected from the game. With a gash on his hand, a result of a teething Rebel, Little stood helplessly on the sidelines as his Trojans fell victim to county rival, Allen Central, 13-12.

Little was ejected with 1:13 remaining in the second half. The Trojans had just scored a touchdown and trailed Allen

During the drive which ate up five minutes, Little accounted for 37 of Wheelwright's 69 yards, 16 of those coming on a second down and 21 pass play.

Handy Jackson, on a seven-yard run, scored the Trojan touchdown, and while Jackson crossed the goal line, Wheelwright and Allen Central fell to fighting back up the field.

After order was restored, the officials tossed Little out, the only player receiving such action.

Down to a slim 20 players, Wheelwright failed to execute on offense and couldn't stop Allen Central from doing

The Rebels, playing their homecoming game at Prestonsburg, scored a touchdown in the first quarter when Nathan Shelton hauled in a Darren Conn pass, and added what proved to be the winning score on their first possession of the second half.

Following two consecutive Wheelwright offsides penalties, Jeff Hughes broke loose for a 42-yard touchdown run, capping off a 68-yard, five-play Allen Central drive that took two minutes and 12 seconds off the third quarter clock.

Playing without regular backfield partner Mickey Parsons, Hughes accepted the additional responsibility by running for 115 yards and one touchdown. Hughes, a senior, was Allen Central's and the game's leading rusher.

Ball control was one of the important factors Donnie Daniels, Allen Central head coach, listed as being critical for

Although Wheelwright held the football over five minutes more than the Rebels, Allen Central managed to produce the control offense their coach

The Rebels ground out 179 yards rushing the football, and relied on a strong defensive effort in earning the one-point victory

"We went back to our regular defense this week," Donnie Daniels said. "I think maybe we confused the kids by trying to do too much on defense, so we went back to our basic stuff, and it showed tonight. We played a lot better defensively than we've been playing lately.'

surrendered two Wheelwright drives, increased their intensity late in the fourth quarter, denied Wheelwright points on good opportunities, and salvaged the Rebels second win of the season.

Trailing, 13-12, Wheelwright recovered a Rebel fumble on the 41-yard line when Brian Ray pounced on the loose pigskin. One play later, Handy Jackson, the Trojans' leading rusher with 99 yards, ran nine yards to the 50-yard line.

With under 10 minutes remaining in

Hood for a five-yard loss, and later denied the Trojans a pass completion, forcing Wheelwright to give up possession on a punt.

The Trojans weren't any worse for wear though. On the second play from scrimmage, Wheelwright regained control by recovering another Allen Central

#### **Akers Biggest Attraction** In Cougar-Bobcat Matchup

His Elkhorn City football team hadn't won a game all season, but in watching Randall Akers perform on the sidelines, one got the feeling that the coach was directing his team through a playoff

In 40-degree weather, Akers, Elkhorn City head coach, had worked up a sweat. His hair was wet from the perspiration of his own energy and clearly visible each time Akers introduced his baseball cap to the Mile High turf.

Stalking the sidelines with the same intensity as a caged lion, Akers yelled out instructions, willingly let his feelings, both good and bad, show, and gained more yards up and down the field than his Cougars have all season.

'Speak to me!" Akers yelled to one of his player who was slow about returning to his feet after being tackled on the Elkhorn City sideline. "Get up from there!" Akers said in the same excited tone, "You're all right. Emotional, well that doesn't go quite

far enough to describe this man. Akers produced as much energy in trying to get his players to give their all as the players expressed on the field.

But it all worked out Friday night. From their high-spirited coach to a young, and at that time winless team, the message was relayed, the effort succeeded, and Elkhorn City enjoyed their first victory of the season, 16-7, over Betsy Layne, Friday night.

Elkhorn City scored a touchdown in the second quarter; kicked a field goal as the first half came to a close, and added another touchdown in the third quarter to spoil Betsy Layne's homecoming, and drop the Bobcats to 1-4 on

'We're capable of winning some games, but we hadn't put it together yet," Akers said after the game. "We thought we had an opportunity to win this game, but we had an opportunity to beat Fleming Neon and Jenkins.'

Both of these opportunities had wound up like all other Elkhorn City games, in loses, but Friday night, Akers and his youthful Cougars would not be denied.

'The key for us was our offensive line play," Akers said. "We made some adjustments in our line before this game, and our defense just gutted it out.'

The Elkhorn City defense, despite two turnovers in the first quarter, shut Betsy Layne out until the 6:30 mark of the

second quarter. The Cougars had already struck for a touchdown minutes earlier when quarterback Chris Rose threw in the direction of wide receiver H.D. Fraley.

John Bush, Betsy Layne defensive back, had set his sights on an interception, but Fraley wrestled the football free of Bush's arms and raced on into the end zone for the touchdown.

Bush, a senior, intercepted two Rose passes, and recovered a fumble, but on this play Fraley and Elkhorn City came out a winner.

Betsy Layne, though, responded with a winner of their own, a 70-yard drive for touchdown immediately following Elkhorn City's score. On fourth down and 15 from the Bob-

cat 31, Todd Sturgill connected with Dwight Jarrell, who had beaten the Elkhorn City defense down the right Sturgill laid the football perfectly over

the left shoulder of Jarrell, who went on in for the score, capping off the fourminute and 44 second, 12-play drive. Jarrell's extra point kick tied the contest at

Unfortunately for Betsy Layne fans, that was the final score the Bobcats would get as the Elkhorn City defense 'gutted' out a second half shutout.

Five Bobcat turnovers, three coming

in the fourth quarter when Betsy Layne was playing catchup, didn't hurt Elkhorn City's cause. Neither did the 106 yards in Bobcat penalties. Elkhorn City, who took a 10-7 lead in-

to halftime when Chris Coleman booted a 26-yard field goal, held the Bobcats to 85 yards in the second half, and forced five turnovers.

The Cougars, in the third quarter, converted one of those turnovers into six points. Elkhorn City covered a muffed punt on the Betsy Layne seven-yard line, and took it on in when Chris Coleman dashed seven yards for the touchdown on the Cougars' first play.

Betsy Layne, on their following possession, ran one play then fumbled a turnover which represented the beginning of the end for the Bobcats.

On only one occasion in the second half did Betsy Layne hang onto the football long enough to sustain a drive.

With 7:18 remaining in the third quarter, John Bush intercepted a pass, stealing the football out of the arms of H.D. Fraley on the Bobcat one-yard line. The Bobcats slowly but surely march-

ed up the field. Helped out of the hole by an Elkhorn City offsides call, Betsy Layne ran the football 11 consecutive times, moving it to the Cougar 30, but gave the pigskin up when Todd Sturgill was stopped two yards short of a fourth down try for first down.

Betsy Layne could never find their way back into Elkhorn City territory and were denied all possibility to get back into contention in the fourth quarter.

With 5:28 remaining in the game, Mike Mullins intercepted a Todd Sturgill pass, and the act turned into a trend as Elkhorn City picked off three passes in the fourth quarter.

As the Cougars frantically tried to hold onto their apparent victory, Akers picked up his intensity along the way.

One running back made a mistake of not being ready to enter the game. After Akers rounded the youngster up, he sent him in to the game with a reminder, a swift kick to the backside, telling him to be in the right place at the right time.

After Rose picked off the second pass for the Cougars, Chris Hackney, Akers prize tight end, made another mistake.

On a running play, Hackney was confused as to his position, on or off the field, so he sprinted to the sideline. With some words of wisdom that most people in the Betsy Layne area could hear, Akers sent Hackney back into the game.

in the state in 3A, but in the season opener fell to Philip Haywood and Prestonsburg, 20-7. Then came that exciting game in 1981.

After taking a 30-6 lead in the third quarter, the Blackcats were forced to stave off a late Belfry rally, winning the game 30-26.

In New Orleans over 30,000 fans were on hand to watch the Saints tear apart the Los Angeles Rams 37-10. The Saints had the most regular players of any, as members broke ranks and crossed the

Playing with a team featuring 14 NFL regulars, New Orleans easily dealt Los Angeles, a team without any roster players, their third loss of the season.

Although it helped the Saints having more players from the regular roster wasn't exactly a guarantee for a victory this past week. Just check in with St.

The Cardinals had 13 players turn their backs on the player's union, but still lost to Washington, a team without any players who made their 1987 roster. Anthony Allen, a free agent wide receiver established a new Redskin record by catching passes that totaled 255 yards

Allen also caught three touchdown passes as Washington defeated the Cardinals 28-21 Sunday. A crowd of over 27,000 was on hand at RFK Stadium to watch that one.

Other teams didn't receive that much fan support. Only 9,800 fans attended in Buffalo, but even those weren't reward-

Larry Mason rambled for 139 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Browns, who kept pace with both Pittsburgh and Houston, each winners Sunday. The Bengals, the only team in the AFC Central to lose this past weekend, are now in fourth place in the division.

Mason's output was a single game high for Cleveland since 1984.

New England, 1-2, did not suffer as much as did the Bengals. All other Eastern Division teams lost also. Except, of course, Indianapolis,

The Jets fell victim to Dallas, and Miami lost to Seattle.



#### Tee Watkins Enters The Big Leagues!

Contrary to popular belief, fishing is not a matter of luck. And when you enter the world of competitive tournament fishing, luck plays practically no part in the game. You cannot enter a tournament and hope that you will get lucky and win. It just does not happen that way. Tournament fishing is a test of skills, and the only time luck might enter

into the picture is if you happen to catch

a big fish from within a school of smaller

Tournament fishing is a grueling, tedious, and unkind sport. But at the same time, it is usually enjoyable. Tournament anglers fish with those from other areas, and good friendships are often cultured. And nothing in this world (that I know of) can match the feeling you get from stepping before a cheering crowd of hundreds while clutching a clear, plastic bag full of fish. One dedicated Eastern Kentucky angler knows that feeling well, and Tee Watkins is making his mark in the tournament

Roger Watkins, a 34-year-old angler from Little Paint Creek near Prestonsburg, is quickly becoming a hot item on the Red Man Tournament Trail. Known to most as "Tee", he placed fourth in the final Red Man Mountain Division tournament held September 13 on Watts Bar Lake. A consistent string of top-fifty places, as well as three finishes in the top-twenty, earned him an eleventh place finish in the Red Man Mountain Division Tournament Trail. This in itself is a tremendous accomplishment. Eleventh place might not sound spectacular, but when you consider that this was out of 300 anglers at the very least, and probably more like 500 or 600, then you can better appreciate just how well this man has done

Tee's next stop will be a regional competition held on Georgia's Lake Seminole October 23 and 24. Here he will be competing against the top 24 anglers from each of the five divisions in this part of the country. Should he finish in the top ten there, Watkins will then travel to the Arkansas River to compete against the top 40 anglers in the nationwide Red Man Tournament Trail.

Tee Watkins began fishing tournaments nearly six years ago. Beginning, as most tournament anglers do, with club and 'open' tournaments, he rapidly progressed to the big leagues. Tee still fishes with the Bassin' Buddies club in Prestonsburg, and was angler of the year there in 1983 and 1985. In 1984, he began competing in the Red Man tournaments. "Although I didn't do too well at first," Tee says, "I learned a great deal fishing with good anglers from other areas, and this has really helped me. Bass fishing is a learning experience, and I think I learn something new every time I fish with a different

Although Tee is actively involved in tournament fishing, he still remains employed as an electronic switchman with South Central Bell. But fishing is rapidly becoming a major part of his life. For the past two years, Tee has taught "The Basics of Bass Fishing", a six week community service class, at Prestonsburg Community College. Tee states, "This course, as the name states, covers the basics of bass fishing. We talk about the different kinds of bass (largemouth, smallmouth, and spotted), as well as basic techniques to catch

"I try to give the students an overview of fishing the five basic types of lures: crankbaits, topwater baits, worms, jigs, and spinnerbaits. I feel the secret to successful bass fishing is being able to use these five baits productively, and to understand why they work, where to use them, and when to use them. I also believe an angler cannot be successful unless he knows and uses all of the little things pertaining to bass fishing, and I try to cover that as well." Examples of these 'little things' include spooling line, tying knots, retying baits periodically, sharpening hooks, watching your line, etc. (If you are interested in learning more about this course, contact the Prestonsburg Community College.)

The blunt truth of the matter is that tournament fisherman could not do what they do without the help of sponsors. Watkins states, "Mountain Marine in Pikeville has helped me tremendously, and I could not have made it this far without their help." Roger Green at Mountain Marine, located behind Magic Mart on the North Mayo Trail, sponsors

Tee with a fully equipped Cajun boat. Although not often recognized, the number one sponsor of any tournament angler is a supporting spouse and fami-Tee is married to Sharon Rice Watkins ("the girl of his dreams", as Sharon says). Tee and Sharon have two children, Jeremy Teeson, 7, and Telah

Tournament bass fishing is perhaps the most difficult way to make a living of any of the sporting professions. Think about it. How many people do you know that play football, basketball, baseball, or golf. Relatively few most likely. And once you get out of high school, that number drops tremendously. But look how many professional sporting teams and professional golfers there are in the country. Then consider how many people you know that fish-a heck of a lot more. In fact, recent studies show that approximately 46.1 million Americans over the age of 16 fish for bass. And I would venture to say that less than 300 make a living fishing professionally in competitive tournaments. Now that is some competition!

It is also a mental sport, in that you have to be thinking all the while about what these fish are doing and how you might catch them, and at the same time concentrating on your lure or line to detect the slightest twitch or tap. Your concentration must be as keen during the seventh hour of the third day as it was during the first hour of the first day. It is a psychological game, and this is probably the toughest of all. You have to keep a positive attitude even if you have not caught a single fish in the past six hours. Should you become discouraged, you will, in all liklihood, lose the tournament.

In a single statement, Watkins summed up the difficulties of tournament fishing: "It keeps me humble."

Next time you see Tee Watkins, give him a pat on the back and wish him the best of luck. He has worked hard to get this far, and the support of family and friends can do much to help him along. Tee, I wish for you cloudy, grey skies, a little drizzle, and a gentle breeze (for you un-anglers, these are good weather conditions!). May there be bass in your weedbeds, and an 8-pounder waiting for your spinnerbait!

# Browning Enjoys Strong Finish As Cincinnati Ends Up Second

Tom Browning, Cincinnati Reds starting lefthanded pitcher, was expected to be an integral part of the Reds winning a Western Division title in 1987.

Things don't always go as expected. Before the season reached its trying times of July and August, Tom Browning was trying to regain his control and composure in the minor leagues.

Browning, after struggling early in the season, was shipped down to Nashville for additionwal instruction, and time to

work without hurting the parent club. Whatever took place in the minors had a major impact on Browning after the lefthander returned to Cincinnati.

Last week the former 20-game winner concluded a remarkable comeback with two victories as the Reds finished the 1987 season

In two games, Browning worked 16 innings, giving up only two earned runs while earning two victories.

Wednesday night, Browning began his final week of work with a victory over the San Diego Padres. The Cincinnati starter worked eight innings plus, giving up eight hits as the Reds won, 3-1.

Browning went into the ninth inning with an opportunity to earn his first shutout of the season, but Camello Martinex drilled a leadoff homerun. Browning surrendered another hit, then was lifted for lefthander John Franco.

Franco promptly surrendered a base hit to Randy Redy, but with two on and no outs, the little southpaw shut San Diego down, earning his 31st save while preserving the win for Browning.

With the save, Franco became only the third Cincinnati pitcher to ever record over 30 saves in one season. Clay Carroll, in 1972, had 37, and Wayne Granger saved 33 in 1970.

Browning, on three days rest, came back Sunday to do another pitching number, this time on the Houston

Through eight innings, Browning surrendered eight hits and only one run. Twice in the seventh and eighth innings Browning worked out of jams. In the eighth inning, he struck out back-to-back Astro hitters to snuff out a bases loaded one-out threat. Once again when Browning needed a

lift, Franco was called upon. The Reds reliever again found success, earning his 32nd save by working a perfect ninth inning, as the Reds won 2-1. In between Tom Browning wins, Cin-

cinnati took care of business, winning two of three games against San Diego and Houston. With the score tied in the fifth inning,

Lloyd McClendon drove in Tracy Jones. Cincinnati padded their lead in the sixth with back-to-back doubles from Dave Collins and Dave Concepcion. The Reds held on to claim a 4-3 vic-

sented their longest winning streak of the season. Three different times before Cincinnati had won four games consecutively,

but never more. Thursday, they won their fifth while dropping San Diego to their eighth loss in a row. The Reds stretched their successful

streak to six Friday night when Dave Collins scored five runs in leading Cincinnati to a 12-7 victory over the Houston

Trailing 6-5 going into the sixth inning, the Reds erupted for five runs, and added two more in the seventh to post the

Collins' five runs scored established a new single game season record for most runs scored in one game, and tied the alltime mark. A total of 13 Reds players had scored five runs in one game before Collins did it Friday.

After dropping their game, 6-4, to the Astros, Saturday, Cincinnati closed out their season on a positive note, defeating Houston in the Dome, 2-1.

Browning, 10-13, recorded the victory, his fifth consecutive winning decision.

With the win, Cincinnati closed out the season six games above the .500 mark

The season finished positively for Cincinnati, but it has the past three seasons. After being eliminated from playoff contention, the Reds have proven that they can play with anyone.

But in the past three seasons, and not since 1979, has Cincinnati proven they can win when it counts toward a pennant

Some folks in Cincinnati plan to change this during the winter. General Manager Bill Burgess is among them. "We are talking," the Regs GM said

Sunday in a radio interview. "We are already conducting conversations with other teams, and we'll get it done one way or the other.'

Burgess was discussing Cincinnati's pitching problems.

He also discussed some of the Reds' youthful talent: Terry McGriff, rookie catcher; "We were pleased and impressed with the progress of McGriff." Jeff Treadway, rookie second baseman; 'Jeff really proved that he can play in the major leagues." Paul O'Neill, rookie outfielder; "He definitely has a part in our outfield picture for next season." Kal Daniels, left fielder; "Daniels will some day win a batting crown. He's that good, but he will also be a batting cham-

pion with a lot of power.' With this type of young talent, some veterans may be in trouble. Dave Parker, even though he was one of the team's top offensive performers, is being shopped around, as is Nick Esasky,





In 1980, Kentucky's composite ACT score was 17.6, compared to the national 1980 composite of 18.5. The score of black Kentuckians was especially significant, Cox said. Kentucky's black high school students scored higher than the national average for black students, 13.6 compared to 13.4.

On the SAT, which was taken by 4,290 Kentuckians, Kentucky's score was 998, above the national average of 906. This was four points less than last year's Kentucky score. This apparent difference may be due to the relatively small number of students who take the SAT in Kentucky, Cox said.

### Vietnam Vets Memorial Dedication Set Nov. 7

Work has begun on Kentucky's memorial to its veterans of the Vietnam conflict, and a ceremonial groundbreaking and site dedication for the monument is scheduled for 11 a.m., Saturday, Nov. 7. The monument will be built near the Department of Library and Archives building on Coffee Tree Road in view of Kentucky's Capitol.

"We believe this unique monument will be a fitting memorial to the 1,062 Kentuckians who died in the Vietnam conflict, as well as to all of the state's citizens who served in Vietnam," said Adjutant Gen. Billy G. Wellman, who cochairs the dedication committee along with retired Maj. Gen. Zack Saufley.

The monument consists of a sundial with a 25-foot stainless steel pointer, or "gnomon," poised over a granite plaza. measuring 80 feet by 70 feet. The names of the Kentuckians who died in the conflict will be engraved on the plaza, and the tip of the gnomon's shadow will fall across each name on the day of the year that the serviceman was killed. Lexington architect Helm Roberts designed the monument.

The November 7 ceremony will include music by the Kentucky Army National Guard's 202nd Army Band, ceremonial flyovers by both the Kentucky Air and Army Guards, speakers and an artillery salute by the 2nd Battalion, 138th Field Artillery Brigade of the Kentucky Guard. The battalion served in Vietnam and lost several members in the conflict.

"We hope that many Kentuckians will come to the ceremony from all around the state," said James N. Halvatgis, executive director of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. "We offer a special welcome to veterans and families of Kentuckians who died in the conflict.

Some work on the site will be completed by the groundbreaking date; the memorial is expected to be finished sometime in 1988. The fund is working to raise a million dollars for the monument. For more information, contact its office in Louisville at (502) 589-4549.

### ENTEROTOXINS

Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association Sheep owers are likely aware of a group of toxin diseases called the enterotoxemias, but swine, goat and horse owners should know that while the problem is not common in their animals it can occur.

The causing agent, Clostridium perfringens, anaerobic bacteria commonly present not only in soil but in the alimentary tract of animals, has the capability of producing at least six potent toxins within the animal's body, four of which are important to farmers. Type B enterotoxemia is responsible for a disease commonly called lamb disentery, which occurs in lambs less than two weeks old and which may cause death without any outward signs. Less acute onset may produce sever abdominal pain, refusal to nurse and profuse, bloody diarrhea. Coma and death commonly follow in less than 24 hours. This Type B toxemia also occurs in goats, calves, foals and piglets. Symptoms are much the same.

Type C enterotoxemia causes much the same symptoms but may affect mature animals, and Type A enterotoxemia is not often seen in the United States though it has been reported in California. In lambs, it causes severe depression, pallor, jaundice and rapid breathing and causes the blood to break

Type D enterotoxemia is a major problem in feedlot lambs, and is sometimes known as "overeating disease." Sudden death may be the only indication, and those lambs which do not die quickly may show excitement, lack of coordination and convulsions. First affected may be those lambs which appeared to be in the best condition.

Regardless of type, the exact mechanism by which production of the poisons is triggered is obscure. However, under some conditions toxins are produced in excess of the animal's ability to cope with them. Excessive consumption of grain or milk is a known predisposing factor. In feedlots, outbreaks are most common a few days after the animals are put on full feed. In nursing twin lambs, outbreaks are rare because there isn't enough milk available to overeat.

Treating the condition yourself is not effective, it's simply too complicated. Antibiotics may help, though vaccination of pregnant adults and/or newborn animals is probably more effective. Toxoids, antitoxins, antiserums and bacterins are all available.

Your veterinarian is qualified to determine which type may be affecting your flock, whether it is a one-time occurence or likely to recur, and what method to use to prevent its reoccurence.

Now South Central Bell customers in Prestonsburg can place most of their '1+" long-distance calls through their 'preferred' long-distance company.

South Central Bell will continue to carry long-distance calls inside the home calling zone, which includes calls from Prestonsburg to Middlesboro and Winchester, for example.

"This is a significant event because it represents concrete evidence of the increased choices made available by competition in the communications business," said South Central Bell manager Art Willett.

About three months ago, South Central Bell mailed customers a ballot listing the long-distance companies that planned to serve the area and instructions on how to sign up

According to Willett, South Central Bell will be sending another ballot to customers who have not chosen a longdistance company

"The ballot will tell customers which long-distance company they've ten-tatively been assigned," said Willett. "By filling out the ballot, customers still may choose a company. Otherwise, their long-distance calls will be handled by the company they've been tentatively assigned.

"South Central Bell encourages customers to return the ballot to make sure they are signed up with the longdistance company they want to use," he

The percentage of customers assigned each long-distance company will be based on the percentage who selected it on the earlier ballot. For example, if 60 percent of the Prestonsburg customers returning the earlier ballot selected a certain company, 60 percent of those who did not select would be assigned that company.

Customers who want to use a longdistance company other than their preferred company will be able to do so by dialing a five-digit access code. Each long-distance company is being assigned a code on a nationwide basis so that it will be the same throughout the country.

### Asbestos Victims:

### Workers' Compensation

By Atty. General David L. Armstrong Much interest and concern has been expressed in recent years about the health hazards caused by exposure to asbestos. Much of this interest has particularly been focused on the potential health hazards posed by the exposure in the workplace. Employees who have become victims of an asbestos-related disease, which is an occupational disease, have the right to seek compen-

Up until last year Kentucky's worker compensation laws did not adequately accommodate victims of asbestosrelated illnesses. Diseases caused by asbestos, such as asbestosis and lung cancer, generally do not manifest themselves for 20 years or more. However, before 1986, Kentucky's law barred workers' compensation claims of occupational diseases if it was not filed within five years after the date of the employee's "last exposure" to the hazardous condition. As a result, some workers who were exposed to asbestos, were prevented from seeking compen-

Recognizing the need for this law to be changed to accommodate asbestos victims, the 1986 General Assembly passed a law, which provides an exception for asbestos-related disease victims. The law now states that workers with asbestos-related diseases have 20 years from the date he or she was last exposed to file a claim.

This new law is important to Kentucky's workforce, as virtually everyone could potentially be a victim of an asbestos-related disease. Kentucky's workers are our most vital natural resource and deserve to be protected under the law.

### Wood Chips and Coal Give Cheaper Power

to mix with coal which could power utility companies and provide power needs for large industries. So does the rest of the country

It's called wood, and the mixture could help clean up some of the nastier environmental problems of using coal

Don Graves, Extension forestry specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said utility companies in some other states, notably Michigan and Vermont, are already using wood chips mixed with coal to provide less expensive electrical

"Wood, unlike coal, has practically no sulfur emissions when burned," Graves said. "When it is burned with coal, it brings down the total level of sulfur emissions which occurs when coal alone

is burned. A low level of emissions is not only environmentally desired, it's required by EPA regulations. Power companies and large industries which use coal generally will buy only the top grade coal which emits no more than one and one-half percent sulfur, Graves said. Since much of Kentucky's coal, especially in the western part of the state, tests out from three to five percent, the marketability

of that coal is lower "However, if that coal were mixed at proper ratios with wood chips, the sulfur emissions could be reduced to within EPA guidelines," Graves said. "And the wood chips are there for the taking, usually right where the coal is being

Most Kentucky strip mine operations have to get rid of the woodlands on the ground before they begin operations, he explained. At present they just cut the trees, stack them, pour diesel fuel on them and burn them which represents a considerable cost just to get rid of

A UK research project analyzing the costs of Kentucky surface mining several years ago found that land clearning of surface mines could be done at a profit instead of a cost if trees were harvested as chips instead of bulldozed and burned. With a new machine called a Chiparvester, whole trees can be converted to chips in minutes. Five acres of forest can be cleared each day.

Yet, most mining operations don't bother with harvesting the chips and Kentucky utilities and industries haven't begun to consider using them to any

Why not?

Graves said it's the old story of people resisting changes in technology. Coal people are used to working with coal, and they don't want to fool with wood. Utility companies don't want to change their process even though to do so wouldn't cost much-perhaps just an additional conveyor belt for wood chips and a boiler modification.

"You can show people the economics, and they still won't do it quickly,

Kentucky abounds with a cheap fuel because they have to change their way of thinking," he said.

Eventually they will though, he said, because utilities will learn they can use a cheaper grade of coal which lowers their cost of business. Miners will learn they can sell more of their cheaper grades of coal as well as reduce the costs of their mining operations if they convince users of the advantages of using wood chip mixtures.

"Other states are already using the concept effectively and efficiently,' Graves said. "Any state with a large forest supply can. And one thing Kentucky has an abundance of is trees."





Everybody's Science

It's going on right now, right under your feet. Soil Wars

In the top few inches of the soil, "good" microbes are fighting "bad" microbes, and the winner helps determine the abundance and quality of farm

and garden crops. Every year, soilborne fungi, bacteria, and viruses attack more than 250 different crops, causing \$4 billion in damages

Chemicals used to kill these destructive microbes are expensive. Yet they often can't even get far enough into the soil to reach their target, and even when they do the microbe can eventually develop resistance. Environmental concerns further limit use and effectiveness of chemicals.

"It's smart to work toward pest control within the balances of nature rather than to spray pesticides," says Jack Lewis, a soil scientist with USDA's Agricultural Research Service in Beltsville, Md. That's why scientists are taking beneficial molds from the soil, breeding them, and returning them to the soil where they can attack and kill the harmful microbes.

Borrowing industrial techniques, scientists ferment the beneficial molds on cheap food sources such as molasses and brewers' yeast. After the molds multiply, the scientists put them in pellets, powders and sprays. Then, farmers and gardeners can apply them to the soil.

So far, laboratory tests have shown that the good molds can control soilborne diseases of cotton, potatoes, chrysanthemums, carnations, vegetables, oilseed crops, forage crops, and bedding plants, among others. Several companies are interested in marketing the product, particularly pharmaceutical and other industries that routinely use large-scale fermenta-

"Safe, nonpolluting disease control sometimes lasts for several seasons,' says George Papavizas, an ARS plant pathologist in Beltsville, referring to the results of laboratory tests of the soil

When commerical products are developed using these beneficial molds, farmers and gardeners will have to identify the disease attacking their crop. Then, they can buy and apply the specific mold that attacks that specific disease. Even then, however, integrated pest management—an approach that combines chemical controls, resistant crop varieties and proper cultivation with the newfound biological controlsmay be the best solution. (Agricultural Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture)

### **Social Security**

**Applying For SSI** 

People who believe they may be eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) payments should apply without delay, Jim Kelly, Social Security Director for the Big Sandy Area said recently. Payment can begin only with the day of application or the date of eligibility, whichever is later. In the case of a child, an application can be made by a parent or guardian or by some other responsible person.

The application process can be speeded up if the person brings along certain information at the time he or she applies; however, the application should not be delayed simply because all of the information is not available. Social Security personnel will help obtain whatever else is needed. This information includes:

The applicant's Social Security card; a birth certificate or other proof of age; details of income and assets (such as payroll slips, bank books, and copies of tax returns); details about living conditions (the landlord's name, lease, or mortgage); medical records for applicants claiming eligibility for SSI on the basis of disability or blindness.

Sometimes a blind or disabled person who lives in a public institution becomes capable of living in the community but lacks the necessary funds to do so. Monthly SSI checks may permit the person to live outside the institution.

As an alternative, a responsible person can apply on behalf of the institutionalized person when it appears that he or she will soon be discharged.

Additional information about the SSI program can be obtained at the Big Sandy Area Social Security office located on U.S. 23 between Prestonsburg and Paintsville. The telephone number is listed in your local telephone directory under U.S. Government.

### Judicial College

**Held At Jamestown** 

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, of the 31st Judicial Circuit, was among 86 active and retired circuit judges attending the 1987 Circuit Judges' Judicial College at Lake Cumberland State Park, Jamestown, September 20-24.

In opening the judicial education program, Dean Robert Lawson, University of Kentucky College of Law, addressed issues related to admissibility of trial evidence, including the use of expert witnesses, out-of-court statements made by youthful victims, and medical

Northern Kentucky University law professor Martin J. Huelsmann examined the history and current controversial status of judicial and governmental immunity from civil liability. He also provided an update on comparative negligence cases.

Maryland Court of Appeals Judge Charles E. Moylan, Jr., a nationally recognized authority of the Fourth Amendment's, limitations on unreasonable searches and seizures, offered a five-hour lecture on the U.S. Supreme Court's recent neo-conservative reappraisal of the amendment's intent. Judge Moylan examined the Court's current emphasis on the reasonableness clause of the amendment and the establishment of a "good faith" exception to the rule prohibiting the admission of evidence improperly obtained.

Other presenters included Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert F. Stephens and Administrative Office of the Courts Director Don. Cetrulo providing legislative and budget proposals for the court system; State Law Librarian Wesley Gilmer with an update on federal and state appellate decisions; and District Judges Michael B. Roney and Henry Weber on substantive issues of the Unified Juvenile Code relevant to circuit court jurisdiction.

The College was sponsored and conducted by the Administrative Office of the Courts Educational Services with program curriculum designed by the Circuit Judges' Education Committee. The College offered 17 credit hours towards the judges' mandatory continuing judicial education requirements.

### Elephant Rodeo Is KET Feature

Bayer's films introduce viewers to the private life of a rhinoceros and the miniature world of a spider. Bayer breaches the barrier of time with timelapse photography, and in less than a minute, reveals what actually may take days or weeks.

"Elephant Games" is produced and directed by Skip Blumberg. "Wildlife Photographer Wolfgang Bayer" is a production of KRMA/Denver.







### **MDA** Centers To Study ALS

The Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA), has created four research and clinical care centers dedicated to fighting the fatal nerve disorder amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease, announced Bob Saunders, president of the Central Kentucky Chapter of the voluntary health agency. "Establishment of the centers greatly expands MDA's multimillion dollar ALS research and clinical services program—the largest of its kind in the world," said Mr. Saunders.

"Thanks to the millions of caring Americans who support MDA's efforts, the association has been able to initiate this new ALS program, which is the single largest ever undertaken in our allout fight against ALS," stated MDA National Chairman Jerry Lewis, who first announced the news on his 1987 Labor Day Telethon.

The four new MDA ALS centers have been established at major research institutions already leading the assault against the disease-Baylor College of Medicine, Houston; New England Medical Center, Boston; the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, and the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

"The creation of the ALS centers will permit teams of clinicians and basic scientists to pool efforts to find the cause of the disease and an effective treatment." said Mr. Saunders. Major therapeutic trials in ALS are already taking place at the four institutions.

MDA's Houston ALS center, led by Stanley H. Appel, M.D., are investigating the involvement of the immune system in ALS. At MDA's Boston ALS center headed by Theodore L. Munsat, M.D., researchers are looking for a possible connection between ALS, which primarily affects adults, and other diseases that affect the same nerves in infants and children as does ALS in adults. The team at MDA's Los Angeles ALS center, headed by W. King Engel, M.D., will conduct tests to determine whether ALS involves a lack of some essential substance normally produced in the body. And Benjamin Rix Brooks. M.D. has assembled an MDA team of scientists in Madison, Wisconsin, and institutions in Chicago and Cincinnati to find out why ALS-which is not contagious—has occurred with unusual frequency among groups of people who have worked together or lived in the

ALS destroys motor nerve cells that control the voluntary muscles, causing progressive muscular weakness and wasting. It generally strikes between the ages of 35 and 65. There is as yet no specific treatment for the disorder, which causes death by weakening vital respiratory muscles.

MDA invested some \$7 million in ALS patient services and research in 1986 alone. The disease is one of 40 neuromuscular disorders, including the muscular dystrophies, myathenia gravis, and spinal muscular atrophies, that MDA strives to defeat through its wide-ranging research, patient care, and public health education programs.

Kentucky farmers likely will feel in their pocketbooks the outcome of a lawsuit won by two New Mexico potash

Prices for the fertilizer are expected to jump by \$30 to \$50 per ton as a result of a U.S. Commerce Department decision which found that Canadian suppliers were dumping their potash in the U.S. at below their cost of production, said Ken Wells, Extension agronomist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"In Kentucky, that could amount to as much as \$10 million more than Kentucky farmers may be forced to pay for their fertilizer next spring," Wells said.

Wells estimated that about 85 percent of the potash used in the U.S. is from Canadian suppliers and only about 12 percent from U.S. sources.

As a result of the ruling, Canadian suppliers will have to pay a "dumping duty" ranging from 9 to 85 percent, depending on how much the supplier had been cutting its U.S. price below its costs to entice U.S. buyers.

Although the dumping duties already have been placed on the Canadians, and the price to U.S. buyers has risen, the issue still is not permanently resolved. Final determination of the issue is to be made in February, after the Commerce Department holds hearings, the first of which will be in Washington, D.C. on Oct. 5, Wells said.

### Fresh Ideas for the Lunch Box

School's open and already the lunch box menus may start to seem a trifle boring. Tuna fish sandwich again? More peanut butter and jelly? Some kids, it seems, could eat the same meal 365 days a year, but it's a good idea to introduce a little variety to give them balanced nutrition and to keep them interested in

There's absolutely nothing wrong with tuna fish or peanut butter and jelly sandwiches-they can be wholesome sources of protein and other important nutrients. Since 60 percent of the sandwich is the bread, however, it's best to use a whole grain bread for added vitamins, minerals and fiber. For variety, try mixing carrots and raisins into the peanut butter spread or prepare the peanut butter stuffed into an apple or celery sticks.

Other non-sandwich ideas include cottage cheese or cheese spread in celery sticks or cucumber boats, tuna salad wrapped in a lettuce leaf, or chicken drumsticks. As the weather cools, send along a thermos full of vegetable soup

Every lunch should include a fruit or vegetable: pickles, carrot sticks, green pepper strips, cucumber slices and cherry tomatoes are good vegetable choices. Apples, oranges and bananas are fine, but add variety with seedless grapes, peaches, cubed watermelon, pineapple chunks and dried fruit.

SANDWICH BEAN SPREAD A bean sandwich may sound a little strange at first, but this delicious spread is nutritious and low in fat. Its mild flavor goes well with tomatoes in a

- 1 cup pinto beans (uncooked)
- 1 dry red pepper
- 1 clove garlic, minced 1 small onion, chopped
- 4 cups water
- 1/4 cup celery, chopped 2 tbsp. taco sauce (or chili sauce)
- 2 tbsp. ketchup Dash Worchestershire sauce

Hot pepper sauce to taste (optional) Rinse the beans and remove any stones or foreign matter. Place the beans, red pepper, garlic and onion in the water and bring to a boil.   - 1 cup water
- 2 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cups quick-cooking oats 3/4 cup butter or margarine

To prepare the filling, in a saucepan combine the chopped raisins, 6 tablespoons of sugar and the cornstarch. Gradually stir in the water and lemon juice. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to medium and cook and stir until mixture is thick and bubbly. Remove from

In a mixing bowl combine the flour, brown sugar and oats. Cut in the butter, and mix to a crumbly consistency.

Pat half of the mixture into an ungreased 9 inch by 13 baking pan. Spread the filling mixture, while still warm, over this base. Then sprinkle the remainder of the crumb mixture on top and pat gently.

Bake in a 375 degree oven for 20 to 25 minutes, or until the edges begin to brown and the top is golden. Cool and cut

A graduate of Betsy Layne High School, he was a member of the KET Scholastic Challenge Team and Floyd County Academic Team.



In reality, 12 million children-infants through 18-year-olds can and do suffer from diagnosable psychiatric disorders such as depression, attention deficit disorder and pervasive developmental disorders.

Serious depression, once thought to be an illness reserved for adults, is now known to affect 1 in 50 children. Every day, 18 young people kill themselves, making suicide the third leading cause of death among youngsters. Between 200,000 and 300,000 infants and toddlers are diagnosed as suffering from pervasive developmental disorders such as autism. Thousands of other children suffer from severe depression, anxiety disorders, schizophrenia, or attention deficit disorders, including learning disabilities and hyperactivity.

Some scientists think even toddlers may suffer from a form of depression. Children this age have not developed the intellectual capacity or social understanding needed for guilt, dread of the future or self-reproach. But they can feel sadness and loss, especially when they have suffered a severe deprivation such as chronic illness, physical handicap, parental death or abuse and neglect. As they grow older, children suffering from depression more closely resemble depressed adults.

Young people tend to express their moods more through actions than through words. They may act out in destructive ways. However, they feel worthless, hopeless, helpless, excessive guilty, fatigued, uninterested in activities they once enjoyed. They do poorly in school because they can't concentrate. They may feel suicidal.

Scientists think biological factors may contribute to a predisposition to depression. As in adults, some depressed children and teens have abnormalities in their hormonal systems, particularly the adrenal system, which governs the production of the hormone cortisol. The adrenal system is overactive in depressed adults. Likewise, some depressed children's adrenal systems don't respond normally to the body's regulatory mechanisms.

Because young people change more readily and are more open to help than many adults whose symptoms have become entrenched, depressed children often improve with treatment. Scientists have noted good responses among youngsters undergoing psychotherapy. Other studies suggest that children may respond to antidepressant medications at least as well as adults.

Autism, a rare pervasive developmental disorder that occurs in one out of 3,000 children, appears before 30 months of age. These children don't respond to their environments, fail to make eye contact, refuse affection, have repetitive behavior, and have severe language problems. With autistic children reach adulthood, about 15% will hold down a job and live a more or less normal life. Two-thirds, however, will require lifelong care and supervision. Scientists now think autism is caused by a malfunction in the brain, though researchers have not yet pinpointed the prob-
